Bulldogs On ESPN2

For the third time this season, the Bulldogs will appear on ESPN2. After knocking off Oklahoma State 35-14 in the opener on ESPN2, Georgia fell 16-12 to South Carolina on the network a week later. In 2005, the Bulldogs beat Vanderbilt 34-17 in Nashville on ESPN2. Georgia's all-time record on the network is 14-3.

Looking Ahead:

- UF: Georgia and Florida will meet in Jacksonville for the 76th time. The Gators have won 15 of the last 17 matchups, but Georgia leads the all-time series 46-37-2.
- TROY: This will be the first meeting. The Trojans finished the 2006 season 8-5 and a win over Rice in the New Orleans Bowl.
- AU: The Deep South's Oldest Rivalry will be renewed for the 111th time. Auburn leads the series with Georgia 53-49-8.
- UK: Kentucky snapped a streak of nine consecutive losses to Georgia last year.
- **GT:** Georgia is 6-0 against Ga. Tech under Mark Richt. The Bulldogs lead the series 58-36-5.

Bulldog Storylines: Four Things To Watch For Saturday

- **1. Defense:** How will Georgia respond after the 35-14 loss at Tennessee? The Bulldogs are -1 in Turnover Margin while the Commodores are +4.
- **2. Running Game:** With Thomas Brown out due to injury and the return of Kregg Lumpkin, how will Lumpkin and freshman Knowshon Moreno shoulder the load?
- **3. Good Road Start:** At Alabama, Georgia won the toss, scored a TD and then forced the Tide to punt. At UT, Georgia won the toss, was forced to punt and UT scored a TD.
- **4. Goodman Factor:** Junior **Demiko Goodman** made a highlight-reel touchdown catch to put Georgia on the board in Knoxville. Will his role increase in the coming weeks?

Bulldogs Look To Bounce Back

Under Coach Mark Richt, the Bulldogs are 13-4 following a defeat. Last year, Georgia had a stretch where it had four losses in a five-game stretch before finishing strong with three straight wins over top 20 opponents. Up next, Georgia (4-2, 2-2 SEC) faces Vanderbilt (3-2, 1-2 SEC).

On The Road Again

Since Mark Richt arrived at Georgia in 2001, the Bulldogs have been an impressive 23-4 in an opponent's stadium. This season, the Bulldogs are 1-1 on the road. The Bulldogs' most recent victory on the road came in Tuscaloosa against the 16th-ranked Crimson Tide. Sophomore quarterback **Matthew Stafford** clinched the 26-23 overtime win after finding senior split end **Mikey Henderson** for a 25-yard touchdown. The Bulldogs four losses came at #11 LSU in 2003 (17-10), #3 Auburn in 2004 (24-6), Kentucky in 2006 (24-20) and last Saturday at Tennessee (35-14).

About The Commodores

Vanderbilt opened the year with a 41-17 win over Richmond. Then, the Commodores fell 24-10 to Alabama before rebounding with a pair of victories over Ole Miss (31-17) and Eastern Michigan (30-7). Last week, Vanderbilt played its first road game of the 2007 season, and they fell 35-7 to Auburn. The Commodores are averaging 23.8 points a game while surrendering 20.0 points a game. Vanderbilt's most productive quarter this season has been the fourth where it has scored 44 points. Junior *Chris Nickson* (60-for-113, 757 yards, 6 TDs, 5 INTs) directs the VU attack and his favorite target is one of the league's top wide receivers in junior *Earl Bennett* (41 rec., 499 yards, 4 TDs). Defensively, the Commodores are led by senior linebacker *Jonathan Goff* with 40 tackles. They have 11 interceptions including three by sophomore cornerback *D.J. Moore*. Also, he has 37 tackles.

Georgia leads the all-time series with Vanderbilt 47-18-2. The series dates back to 1893.

2006 Flashback: Vanderbilt 24, Georgia 22

Georgia dropped to 5-2 following a 24-22 upset at the hands of the Commodores. Georgia managed just one offensive TD on a 23-yard pass from Joe Tereshinski to tight end Martrez Milner. The 16th-ranked Bulldogs carried a 13-7 lead to halftime but Vanderbilt responded with 14 points in the third quarter to take a 21-13 edge. Georgia cut it 21-16 with a 19-yard field goal by Andy Bailey and senior Tony Taylor gave Georgia the lead with a 24-yard interception return for a TD. A two-point conversion attempt failed to leave the score at 22-21 Bulldogs. Then, quarterback Chris Nickson and the Commodores responded with a 15-play, 65-yard drive that ended with a Bryant Hahnfeldt's game-winning 33-yard field goal with just two seconds remaining. The victory snapped an 11-game losing streak to the Bulldogs and spoiled Georgia's Homecoming for the first time since 1994.

One Of The Best

Georgia has one the SEC's best records during the last six seasons and the best over the last 11 seasons. The Bulldogs are 57-15 (.792) the last six seasons and 100-32 (.758) during the last 11 years. Georgia is the only SEC team to be ranked in the AP Top 25 ten straight seasons.

Richt Passes The Playbook Torch To Bobo

Mike Bobo, now in his seventh season on Georgia's staff, is in his first full year as offensive coordinator/QB coach. Bobo was given the reins of the Bulldog offense during the last two games of the 2006 season when Georgia knocked off #16 Ga. Tech and #14 Va. Tech, which boasted two of the nation's top defenses. The Hokies had the nation's top-ranked scoring defense.

In Georgia's 2006 win over Ga. Tech, it marked the first time since 1991 that coach Mark Richt did not call a play in a game.

Stafford Directs The Bulldogs

Georgia sophomore QB Matthew Stafford is 10-4 as a starter. He led Georgia to three consecutive wins over ranked opponents to close the 2006 campaign. Along with redshirt sophomore Joe Cox, Georgia's scholarship signal callers also include junior Blake Barnes and true freshman Logan Gray.

Matthew Stafford (So.):

- Connected with Mikey Henderson for a 25-yard TD pass in overtime to knock off #16 Alabama in Tuscaloosa; finished with 224 yds. passing

Goodman Aims To Be Another Target

Junior **Demiko Goodman** only has four catches this year and two have been for TDs. His latest TD was a nifty 26-yarder at Tennessee while the first covered 34 yards against Western Carolina.

Senior **Sean Bailey's** top statistical season as a Bulldog came in 2005 when he helped the team to another SEC title. In 11 games, he had 16 catches for 364 yards and four TDs. This season, Bailey has 17 catches for 251 yards and one TD. He missed the 2006 campaign with a knee injury. Meanwhile, senior **Mikey Henderson** had one of his finest moments when he recorded his first career touchdown catch, a 25-yard game-winner in overtime at #16 Alabama. This year, he has 14 receptions for 136 yards.

All-Purpose Threat Brown Sidelined With Injury

Senior running back **Thomas Brown** made a triumphant return this season after missing half of last year due to a knee injury. After a very productive start in 2007 including leading the Bulldogs with 830 all-purpose yards, Brown injured his collarbone at Tennessee on Oct. 6. He will be out at least a month. Brown ranks sixth in Bulldog history with 2,280 career rushing yards.

Moreno Now Pairs With Lumpkin

Redshirt freshman **Knowshon Moreno** has provided a spark for the Bulldog offense behind seniors **Thomas Brown** and **Kregg Lumpkin**. A product of Belford, N.J., he leads the Bulldogs in rushing with 462 yards. He

garnered more playing time after Lumpkin missed three games with a thumb injury. Lumpkin returned to the backfield against UT. However, Brown got injured in the first half against the Volunteers and now he's out.

Moreno ranks third on the team in receiving yards with 177 yards on 13 catches. He was named the SEC Freshman of the Week after the win at Alabama when he had 74 yards rushing and one TD. In his debut against OSU, he had 20 carries for 70 yards and two catches for 51

yards. In his SEC debut versus the Gamecocks, Moreno tallied 104 yards on 14 carries and had a 50-yard run against South Carolina. Moreno registered his first career touchdown on a 23-yard scamper against WCU and added a second against the Rebels.

Rebuilding Up Front

Georgia's offensive line this year features two seniors at new positions, two true freshmen and a redshirt freshman. Also providing depth have been a pair of JUCO transfers. In the 26-23 overtime win at #16 Alabama, the line did not surrender a sack. Against Ole Miss, the line paved the way for 328 rushing yards, which was the most since the win over the Rebels in 1991 (also 328 rushing yards). Seniors **Fernando Velasco**, who was named the SEC Of-

WCU, the Bulldogs started Sturdivant and Boling, which marked the first time in the modern era of Georgia football that true freshmen have started together on the line at tackle. Sturdivant started the season opener, which was the first time since 1989 that a Bulldog freshman offensive tackle had done that. Junior **Scott Haverkamp** (Butler CC) and sophomore **Vince Vance** have provided depth. Boling started at guard for the injured Haverkamp against #16 Alabama, Ole Miss and Tennessee.

The Bulldogs offensive line coach is **Stacy Searels**, who had been at LSU the past four seasons where the Tigers won a national title (2003), one SEC title (2003) and two Western Division crowns (2003, 2005).

The Long And Short Of It

Georgia's first touchdown of the season was a one-play, 14-yard drive against Oklahoma State that took just six seconds. In the win over Ole Miss, the Bulldogs had four drives that covered at least 80 yards, including a 96-yard drive on 10 plays. That was Georgia's longest drive since the Bulldogs had a 97-yard drive against Kentucky in 2004.

THE DEFENSE

A Look At The Defense Since 2001

Willie Martinez is in his third year as the defensive coordinator and seventh overall on Mark Richt's staff. Since 2001, a total of 29 former Bulldog defenders have moved on to the NFL (6 off the 2001 team, 4 from 2002, 3 from 2003, 4 from the 2004, 5 from 2005 and 7 from 2006).

The 2007 Bulldog defense, which featured six first-time starters in the season-opening win against Oklahoma State, currently ranks 5th in the SEC in scoring defense at 20.2 ppg. In the opener, Georgia held the Cowboys to 14 points and shut them out in the second half. The Cowboys averaged 35.2 ppg last year, which was seventh best nationally. In the Bulldogs' 16-12 loss to USC, the defense allowed a first-quarter TD and then limited the Gamecocks to just three field goals the rest of the way. While #16 Alabama erased a 10-point deficit in the fourth quarter, the Bulldog defense did not surrender a yard on three plays in overtime, forcing a Crimson Tide field goal. Then, Georgia won with a TD.

Points To Ponder

The Bulldogs have been far more stingy in the second half compared to the first half this year. After Tennessee's 21-point outburst in the second quarter to take a 28-0 lead, the Bulldogs surrendered just seven points in the second half in a 35-14 loss. Overall, the Bulldogs have allowed 121 points on the year with 74 in the first half and just 47 in the second half (including 3 points in OT).

Trailing 17-10 to start the third quarter, Ole Miss put together an 18-play touchdown drive that ate up 9:07. This was the longest drive against the Bulldogs since 2004. However, Georgia's defense would blank the Rebels the rest of the game as the offense responded with 28 points in the half. Also in the season opener, Georgia blanked Oklahoma State in the second half.

Linebackers Prove To Be Versatile Bunch

When the 2007 season began, senior **Brandon Miller** was Georgia's only linebacker with starting experience (15 starts including five in 2006). Georgia's other linebackers with playing time were sophomore **Darius Dewberry** and juniors **Marcus Washington** and **Dannell Ellerbe**. They would be replacing the 2006 group that had a combined 91 starts.

Ellerbe, who leads the team with 47 tackles, had a career high 12 in the loss to Tennessee. He has been the leading tackler for the Bulldogs in four games this year. Against the Vols, the Bulldogs used the same linebackers trio as they had versus Western Carolina with Ellerbe in the middle, Miller at "Sam" and Dewberry at "Will." This change came after Washington was injured against Ole Miss

Redshirt freshman **Akeem Dent** started at "sam" linebacker in place of Miller versus WCU and tied for the team-high with six tackles. Miller had his first career interception to go along with six tackles during the Bulldogs' victory over Ole Miss. Washington and redshirt freshman **Darryl Gamble** also each had



career-high outings with five stops apiece against WCU. Georgia switched it up against #16 Alabama and Washington responded with a career-high eight tackles in his first career start in the middle. Ellerbe slid to the starting WLB spot and set a career high with eight tackles.

Seasoned Secondary Tallying Tackles

Georgia's most experienced unit on defense is the secondary, and three of the team's top four tack-

lers are in this group. Senior strong safety Kelin Johnson has appeared in 43 games in his career, and he had a career-high 12 tackles in the loss at Tennessee. Redshirt freshman Reshad Jones is the heir apparent at that position. Jones set a career high against Tennessee with seven tackles. Currently, he ranks third on the team with 31 tackles. Sophomore Asher Allen made his first career start against WCU and followed that up with a teamleading and career-high 11 tackles in the win over Alabama. Allen ranks second on the team with 34 stops. Junior CJ Byrd and senior Thomas Flowers made their first career starts against Oklahoma State in the season opener. Against Ole Miss, sophomore Prince Miller started for the first time in his career and was the 10th first-time starter on defense as well as the 16th overall first-time starter for the Bulldogs in 2007.

The Bulldogs Up Front

Junior Jeff Owens and sophomores Geno Atkins and Kade Weston have been the starters of the interior of the defensive line. Owens earned SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week honors for his performance in the win over WCU. He had a career-high five stops, two tackles for a loss and forced a fumble.

Owens and Weston started the 2007 season opener while Atkins made the most stops with a career-high three tackles for a loss including a sack. Against USC, Weston came away with a career-high five tackles, a sack and two and a half tackles for loss. Atkins added two tackles, including one for a loss versus the Gamecocks and the Crimson Tide. Atkins made his first career start in the Tennessee game. He became the 17th first-time starter for the Bulldogs this year including 11th on defense.

At the ends, it's been sophomore **Roderick Battle** and senior **Marcus Howard** who are starters for the first time in their career this year. They have each made 14 tackles and have one sack. Overall, the Bulldogs have recorded nine sacks with junior linebacker **Marcus Washington** leading the team with two.

Cashing In

In Georgia's first four games this year, the Bulldogs forced just two turnovers and failed to convert those into any points. Against Ole Miss, Georgia got 14 points off of two Rebel miscues. Georgia recovered an Ole Miss fumble at their own 4-yard line in a game-changing moment with the Rebels already up 7-0. This was the Bulldogs' first stop in the red zone this season after 11 previous trips by opponents resulted in six TDs and five FGs. Then, Georgia marched 96 yards down the field for its longest touchdown drive since 2004. Senior SLB **Brandon Miller** snagged his first career INT early in the fourth quarter and eventually Georgia turned that into a touchdown. It was only the Bulldogs' second interception of the season.

Kelin Johnson Named To AFCA 2007 Good Works Team

Senior safety **Kelin Johnson** has been one of 11 players nationwide named to the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) 2007 Good Works Team for his outstanding efforts in the community.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Coutu Can Put It Through From 50-Plus

Georgia's special teams features one of the nation's top place kickers in senior **Brandon Coutu**.

For his career, Coutu is 43-for-54 in FGs including 5-for-10 from 50+ yards. Also, he is a perfect 86-for-86 in PATs. This season, Coutu is 8-11 in FG attempts and 21-for-21 in PATs.

Mimbs Hanging Them High

Georgia ranks first in the SEC in net punting at 38.8 yards. Redshirt sophomore **Brian Mimbs** is third in the SEC with an average of 43.7 yards on 27 punts, placing 12 inside the 20 yard line. Against UT, he punted seven times for a 48.6 yard average including a career-long 66-yarder. He placed four punts inside the 20 but also had one blocked. Mimbs earned the punting job in fall camp over freshman **Drew Butler**, son of former Georgia All-American Kevin Butler.

In the season opener, Mimbs did well with five punts for a 42.4 average in his first career start. His first career punt came deep in his own endzone and it covered 42 yards. Later in the OSU contest, he boomed a 51-yarder. Mimbs had seen action as a holder and kickoff specialist during his career. One of Mimbs' memorable moments came last year as he helped spark Georgia's 31-24 comeback over #14 Virginia Tech in the Chick-fil-A Bowl with a successful onside kick early in the third quarter. Georgia trailed 21-6 when Mimbs executed the kick and then recovered it. It led to Georgia's first touchdown.

Return Men

Senior **Thomas Brown** and sophomore **Asher Allen** have served as the kickoff returners while senior **Mikey Henderson** is handling the punts this season. Brown made a successful return from an ACL injury that came during a kickoff return last season against Vanderbilt. He tied a school record with a 99-yard kickoff return for a TD against Tennessee last year. Brown injured his collarbone in this year's UT game and will miss at least a month. Allen will likely return kicks. Allen has just one return this year for 27 yards coming against WCU. Brown was averaging 22.2 yards per return and was a gunner on the punt team too.

Henderson ranks among the SEC leaders in punt returns (13.5 yards per return), and often times, teams simply avoid kicking it to him. He is a 2007 Preseason First Team All-SEC Special Teams selection by the league coaches. Last year, he had a 14.7 average on 25 returns with a pair



of TDs. Against OSU, Henderson had three returns for 67 yards including a nifty 63-yarder that set up Georgia's final TD.

Bulldog From The Volunteer State

Senior placekicker **Andy Bailey** is the only player on Georgia's roster who is from the state of Tennessee. Bailey attended McMinn County High School in Athens, Tenn.

Snapper Henson Earns Scholarship

Junior snapper **Jeff Henson** is one of three Bulldogs who went from walk-on status to earning a scholarship before this season. Henson along with senior free safety **Andrew Williams** and senior linebacker **Chris Gaunder** were placed on scholarship by Coach Richt this summer. Williams and Gaunder see a majority of their action on special teams. Williams tallied a pair of tackles during the Bulldogs' 26-23 upset of No. 16 Alabama and Gaunder is the special teams captain for the Ole Miss game after his performance through the first four games of the season.

The 24-year-old Henson played football at West Hall HS in Gainesville and then went into the real estate business in 2003. A year later, he decided to attend Gainesville State where there is no football team. He arrived at Georgia as a walk-on in the fall of 2006 and earned the snapper job.

"Jeff has done an outstanding job handling this very difficult position," said Richt. "He's provided stability at an important spot and we feel he's well-deserving of the scholarship."

Senior offensive lineman **Fernando Velasco** leads the team with 19 consecutive starts. Senior running back **Thomas Brown** has the most career starts of any current Bulldog with 26 while Velasco is next with 19.

In the season-opening win over Oklahoma State, there were 12 Bulldogs who started their first career games at Georgia, including five on offense, six on defense and one on special teams (punter Brian Mimbs). After backing up future NFL draftees David Pollack and Charles Johnson, senior Marcus Howard got his chance to start versus Oklahoma State after playing in 37 games before the 2007 opener. A total of three true freshmen have made starts this year: tackles Trinton Sturdivant and Clint Boling and tight end Bruce Figgins.

Inside The Two-Deep

Looking at Georgia's two-deep on offense, there are nine freshmen listed on offense and four on defense.

On offense, Georgia's two-deep features five seniors, four juniors, four sophomores and nine freshman. On defense, Georgia features four seniors, seven juniors, seven sophomores and four freshmen.



Overtime Game Tidbits

*The 1996 UGA-Auburn overtime game in Auburn was the first in SEC history.

*The 1999 UGA-Ga. Tech game in Atlanta, Kendrell Bell blocked Luke Magnet's first 38-yard field goal in overtime but since it was third down and the Yellow Jackets recovered, they got to kick it again and this time he made a 38-yarder. Overall, the teams combined for a Georgia record 1,102 yards of total offense. Georgia had the first possession in OT and a Quincy Carter pass was intercepted in the endzone.

*Against Purdue at the 2000 Outback Bowl, Georgia set a record for the largest comeback in bowl history along with in school history. It once trailed 25-0 in the second quarter. Purdue missed a 43-yarder in OT, then Hap Hines made a 21-yarder for the win.

*In the 2000 UGA-Auburn game in Auburn, it marked the 1st time in 9 years that the home team won. Georgia got a 25-yard FG from Billy Bennett in OT but the Tigers answered with a TD for the win.

*Georgia built a 24-0 lead only to see Pur-

due cut it to 14 by halftime and then tie it at 24all with nine seconds left. In overtime, Kregg Lumpkin plunged in from one yard out for the go-ahead TD and then the Bulldog defense held as Tony Taylor intercepted a pass on fourth and goal at the four.

*The 2007 UGA-Alabama game in Tuscaloosa gave head coach Mark Richt a 2-0 record in OT games; Alabama failed to gain a yard in three plays and had to kick a field goal. Then, Georgia won the game on its first play -- a 25-yard touchdown pass to **Mikey Henderson**.

OKLAHOMA STATE

September 1, 2007 Sanford Stadium – Athens, Ga.

The 13th-ranked Bulldogs won their season-opener over Oklahoma State, 35-14, in front of a sell-out crowd of 92,746 at Sanford Stadium in Athens, Ga., and a nationally televised audience on ESPN2 to improve to 7-0 all-time in season-openers under Mark Richt.

Senior tailback Thomas Brown, who sat out the second half of



the 2006 season with a knee injury, returned to tally two scores for Georgia. The first came less than a minute into the game after the Cowboys had a botched punt attempt deep in their own territory. Mohamed Massaquoi recovered the ball, and Brown took it in 14 yards for the score in the next

play from scrimmage. Georgia's next score came on a two-yard run from fullback Brannan Southerland with 19 seconds left to go in the first quarter, while Brown notched his second touchdown at the 9:43 mark in the second on a three-yard run.

Quarterback Matthew Stafford threw for 234 yards and two scores, one to freshman tight end Bruce Figgins in his first career reception that increased the Georgia lead to 28-14 early in the second half. Michael Moore also reeled in a touchdown for Georgia's final score in the fourth quarter.

Redshirt freshman Knowshon Moreno led the team in rushing with 20 carries for 70 yards. Brown netted 48 yards with his two scores. Sean Bailey was Georgia's leading receiver with five grabs for 87 yards, while Moreno followed with 2 catches for 51 yards.

Oklahoma State had two touchdowns in the first half, one a 20-yard pass from Bobby Reid to Adarius Bowman in the first stanza and the other a five-yard rush from Dantrell Savage in the second. But the Bulldogs defense stifled the Cowboys in the second half, not allowing them to put another point on the board. Dannell Ellerbe led the team with seven tackles, while Kelin Johnson had five. Johnson also grabbed a key interception in the fourth quarter and returned it for 41 yards.

- Game captains were Thomas Brown, Kelin Johnson, Brandon Miller and Fernando Velasco.
- The Bulldogs improve to 26-2 against non-conference opponents under Richt including 18-0 in Sanford Stadium. The Bulldogs are 33-6 at home under Richt and 62-17 overall.
- The Bulldogs were 5-for-6 in the red zone, only failing to score late in the fourth quarter while running out the clock.
- Trinton Sturdivant started at left offensive tackle, the first Bulldog true freshman to do that in a season-opener at that position since 1989. Tight end Bruce Figgins was the first true freshman to start at tight end in a season-opener for the Bulldogs since at least 1964. In all, five true freshmen played for Georgia in this game.

SOUTH CAROLINA

September 8, 2007 Sanford Stadium – Athens, Ga.

Despite out-gaining South Carolina in total offense, 11th-ranked Georgia dropped its first contest of the year to the Gamecocks, 16-12, in front of a sell-out crowd of 92,746 at Sanford Stadium in Athens, Ga., and a nationally televised audience on ESPN2 to fall to 1-1 on the year and 0-1 in Southeastern Conference play.

USC found the end zone with 3:25 left in the first quarter on a



Cory Boyd nineyard rush, and that was the last time either team would reach paydirt. Gamecock kicker Ryan Succop's three field goals lifted his team to a 16-12 victory over Georgia, whose only scores on the night came from place kicker Brandon Coutu's four field goals. It was the first time a

Bulldog team did not score a touchdown since a 14-9 loss -- also to South Carolina in Athens -- in 2001.

The Bulldogs out-gained the Gamecocks, 341-314, in total yards of offense and special teams return yardage, 165-124, but it was the defense of USC in key situations that won the Steve Spurrier-coached team the game. The Gamecock defense stopped Georgia on 15 of its 18 third-down conversion attempts.

Redshirt freshman tailback Knowshon Moreno once again was a bright spot for the Bulldog offense, leading the team with 115 yards rushing. Senior tailback Thomas Brown added 49 yards rushing while compiling a total of 178 all-purpose yards including his kickoff returns. Sophomore quarterback Matthew Stafford completed 19 of his 44 passing attempts for 213 yards. He also threw his first interception of the season late in the fourth quarter to seal the deal for South Carolina.

Defensively, linebacker Dannell Ellerbe again led the team in total tackles with seven, six of them solo take downs. Sophomore Kade Westin had two-and-a-half tackles for loss to lead the squad in that department.

Worth Noting ...

- Game captains were Antavious Coates, Fernando Velasco, Thomas Brown, Marcus Howard and Brandon Miller.
- Georgia failed to score a touchdown in a game for the first time since a 14-9 loss to South Carolina in Athens in 2001.
- Knowshon Moreno's 50-yard rush in the third quarter was the longest run for a Bulldog since Thomas Brown's 52-yard TD in the 2006 Sugar Bowl against West Virginia.

WESTERN CAROLINA

September 15, 2007 Sanford Stadium – Athens, Ga.

The No. 23-ranked Georgia football team got back to its winning ways with a 45-16 victory over Western Carolina in front of a sold-out crowd in Sanford Stadium of 92,746 in Athens, Ga., to improve its season record to 2-1 heading into another Southeastern Conference contest at Alabama next weekend.

Despite a sluggish first quarter in which the only scores were a



field goal for each team, the Georgia offense broke out in the second quarter and scored 21 points to take a 24-9 halftime lead. It was all Georgia in the second half as well, beginning with Thomas Brown's four-yard rushing touchdown to open the third stanza. Western Carolina's only score in the second

half came on a Mike Malone two-yard run late in the game against Georgia's defensive reserves.

Redshirt freshman tailback Knowshon Moreno led the Bulldogs in rushing for the third straight game, gaining a net 74 yards against the Catamounts and scoring his first touchdown of the year on a 23-yard run in Georgia's final possession of the first half. Senior tailback Thomas Brown knotted two scores of his own, one a receiving touchdown in the second quarter and the other a four-yard rush early in the third.

Quarterbacks Matthew Stafford and Joe Cox combined to connect on 17-of-26 passes in the game with three touchdowns. Stafford had 14 completions for 174 yards and two touchdowns while Cox came in in the second half to complete 3-of-6 passes for 48 yards and one touchdown, a 34-yard grab by Demiko Goodman early in the fourth quarter.

Defensively, three Bulldogs led the team in total tackles with six. Akeem Dent, making his first start at Sam linebacker, had six solo tackles, while Reshad Jones and Brandon Miller each added six as well. Marcus Washington had the team's lone sack, a solid hit that resulted in an eight-yard loss for the Catamounts.

The No. 23-ranked Georgia football team placed itself back into the Southeastern Conference race with a thrilling 26-23 overtime victory over the No. 16 Crimson Tide in Tuscaloosa, Ala., in front of a sold-out crowd of 92,138 at Bryant-Denny Stadium and a nationally televised audience on ESPN. The Bulldogs improved to 3-1 on the year and 1-1 in league play with the win, beating Alabama in

STURUIVA

Tuscaloosa for just the second time in history.

Georgia scored early -- a 10-yard pass to Thomas Brown from Matthew Stafford on the opening drive of the game. The teams exchanged field goals in the second quarter and the Bulldogs took a 10-3 lead into the locker room at the half.

The Tide scored first in the second half, but a Knowhon Moreno rushing score and a Brandon Coutu field goal gave Georgia a 20-10 advantage early in the fourth. But Alabama stormed back, eventually knotting the score at 20-all with just more than a minute left to play. Coutu missed a 47-yard field goal as time expired and the teams went to overtime. The Bulldog defense held the Tide to a field goal in their first overtime possession, and then on Georgia's first play of overtime Stafford threw a ball to speedy receiver Mikey Henderson in the left corner of the end zone, which he pulled down to win the game for Georgia.

Brown was the team's leading rusher with 74 yards on 20 carries. Moreno also collected 74 yards and a touchdown on 17 carries. Sean Bailey led in receiving with five grabs for 74 yards. Stafford finished the game with 224 yards and two touchdowns on 19-of-35 passing.

Asher Allen was the team's leading tackler with 11 total tackles, including six of them solo hits. Marcus Washington picked up the lone sack on John Parker Wilson in the game.

Worth Noting . . .

- Game captains were Fernando Velsaco, Matthew Stafford, Jeff Owens and Brandon Miller.
- Georgia is now 4-2 all-time in overtime including 2-0 under Mark Richt. The last overtime game prior to this one was a 34-27 win over Purdue in the 2004 Capital One Bowl.

The No. 15-ranked Georgia football team amassed nearly 500 yards of total offense and Thomas Brown rushed for 180 yards and three touchdowns en route to defeating the Ole Miss Rebels, 45-17, in front of a sold-out crowd in Sanford Stadium of 92,746 in Athens, Ga., to improve its season record to 3-1 overall and 2-1 in the Southeastern Conference.



The Bulldogs fell behind early 7-0 and Ole Miss had the ball on Georgia's 4-yard line with 2:37 in the first quarter about to score and go ahead 14-0. However, a fumble by the Rebels led to a 50-yard rushing touchdown for Brown in the ensuing Georgia possession. A Mohamed Massa-

quoi touchdown reception and exchanged field goals gave Georgia a 17-10 lead at the half.

Ole Miss' BenJarvis Green-Ellis tied the score with a 2-yard run in the third quarter, but that was the last time the Rebels would reach paydirt. A pair of running scores by Brown and two more by Knowshon Moreno and Fred Munzenmaier helped the Bulldogs finish off Ole Miss by a 28-point margin.

Georgia's 472 yards of total offense was its most of the season as was its 328 yards rushing. In addition to Brown's 180, Moreno collected 90 yards and a score. Quarterback Matthew Stafford finished with 144 yards on 13-of-21 passing. Kicker Brandon Coutu was 6-of-6 on extra points and also booted a 20-yard field goal.

Dannell Ellerbe led the team with eight total tackles, as five members of the Bulldogs defense compiled at least five tackles. Brandon Miller grabbed his first career interception and returned it for 13 yards.

Worth Noting . . .

- Game captains were Sean Bailey, Marcus Howard, Jeff Owens and Chris Gaunder.
- Senior Thomas Brown tallied a career-high 180 rushing yards on 16 carries and tied his career high with 3 TDs. It also marked the most rushing yards by a Bulldog since Verron Haynes' 207 against Georgia Tech in 2001.
- Georgia's 328 yards rushing was the most under Coach Richt dating back to 2001.
- Senior LB Brandon Miller recorded his first career interception early in the 4th quarter.
- The Bulldogs now have won eight in a row over Ole Miss and lead the series 30-12-1.
- Georgia's 96-yard touchdown drive was its longest since the 2004 season when the Bulldogs went 97 yards against Kentucky in a 62-17 win.

The No. 12-ranked Georgia football team suffered a 35-14 defeat at the hands Southeastern Conference rival Tennessee race in Knoxville, Tn., in front of a sold-out crowd of 107,052 at Neyland Stadium and a nationally televised audience on CBS. The Bulldogs fell to 4-2 on the year and 2-2 in league play with the loss, their second to Tennessee is as many years.

Tennessee took initiative from the beginning of play, forcing



Georgia to punt on its first drive and scoring a touchdown on the subsequent possession. Three second quarter Volunteer scores, including a LaMarcus Coker 56-yard touchdown reception on a flea flicker from Lucas Taylor sent Georgia into the locker room at halftime down 28-0.

The Bulldogs

scored first in the second half with a Demiko Goodman 26-yard leaping touchdown reception from quarterback Matthew Stafford. But Tennessee played solid defense and stormed back, netting a third quarter touchdown of their own when Arian Foster had a four yard scoring scamper, his second of the game. Tennessee combatted Georgia's late game efforts, which included a two yard Tripp Chandler touchdown reception from Matthew Stafford, to hold off the Bulldogs and secure a 35-14 victory.

Knowshon Moreno was the team's leading rusher with 30 yards on 13 carries. Running back Thomas Brown had six first half carries for 20 yards, but went down with a collarbone injury in the first half and would not return. Tripp Chandler led in receiving with four grabs for 33 yards. Stafford finished the game with 174 yards and two touchdowns on 16-of-33 passing.

Dannell Ellerbe and Kelin Johnson tied for the team lead in tackles with 12 apiece, including nine solos for Ellerbe. CJ Byrd and Brandon Miller each had a tackle for loss.

Worth Noting . . .

- Junior receiver Demiko Goodman's third quarter touchdown catch was just his third reception on the year, but second touchdown.
- Sophomore DT Geno Atkins made his first career start, and is the 17th first-time starter for the Bulldogs this season, including the 11th on defense.
- Mark Richt fell to 23-4 in opponent stadiums and 3-1 in Knoxville, making this the first time he has ever lost there, and his first road defeat since Nov. 4, 2006, a 24-20 loss at Kentucky.
- Both Dannell Ellerbe and Kelin Johnson tallied a career high in tackles with 12 apiece.
- Senior RB Kregg Lumpkin saw his first action of the season since going down with an injury Sept. 1st vs. Oklahoma St.
