The University of Pennsylvania men's basketball team has its longest non-conference winning streak in more than seven years, so fall-term exams probably hit at a bad time. After a 13-day layoff from game action, the Quakers will look to get the momentum started back up again with a daunting task, as they make the trip to Nashville to face SEC opponent Vanderbilt.

Home is Where the Wins Are

Penn entered the 2014-15 season with 809 wins at The Palestra, which opened in 1927. In an informal survey of the other NCAA Division I programs, only Washington (946 wins at Hec Edmundson Pavilion) and Butler (834 wins at Hinkle Fieldhouse) boast more wins in their current home than the Quakers. The Edmundson Pavilion was opened in 1927, while the Bulldogs opened Hinkle in 1928.

Did You Know...

Jerome Allen is one of four former Penn players currently serving as a head coach at the Division I level? The others are **Fran McCaffery** (Iowa), **Andrew Toole** (Robert Morris) and **Matt Langel** (Colgate).

Youth

Six of the 16 players on Penn's roster this year are freshmen, while a seventh—senior **Matt Hanessian**—is new to the varsity after three years playing on the Quakers' JV team.

Inexperience

After **Tony Hicks** (1,464 career minutes) and **Darien Nelson-Henry** (1,017), the other five returnees expected to dress today entered the season with a combined 1,408 career minutes of action. (Senior **Camryn Crocker**, 621; senior **Greg Louis**, 537; sophomore **Dylan Jones**, 130; sophomore **Matt Howard**, 113;

sophomore **Matt Poplawski**, 7).

The Youth Getting Experience

Penn's seven newcomers—the six freshmen and Hanessian—have played 674 of the team's 1,625 minutes this season (41.5 percent).

Quaker Notemeal of Note

• Penn has had four different freshmen win Ivy League Rookie of the Week in a five-week span already this season (**Antonio Woods**, Nov. 17; **Mike Auger**, Nov. 24; **Darnell Foreman**, Dec. 8; **Sam Jones**, Dec. 15); *according to the Ivy League's basketball media guide, no team has had four different players earn the award in the same season (dating back to 1984-85).*

• Penn has won three in a row for the first time since the Quakers won seven in a row near the end of the 2011-12 season.

• Penn has won three non-conference games in a row for the first time since winning four such games near the start of the 2006-07 season.

• Penn has won two straight non-conference road games for the first time since the 2006-07 season (January 6 at Elon, January 18 at La Salle).

• Penn has led for all but 2:01 in the last three games, and has not trailed in its last 109:17 of game action.

• Penn has outrebounded its last six opponents and seven of eight this season; *the Quakers' +14 rebound margin against Marist on December 9 was a season high.*

Notemeal vs. Marist

• Marist scored 42 points, the fewest by an opponent in a game since NJIT scored just 40 on January 17, 2009; *Penn is 8-0 when holding its opponent under 50 points in the Jerome Allen coaching era.*

• Marist set opponent lows in the Allen coaching era in first-half points (14), field goals made (11), and field-goal percentage (21.2).

• For the first time this season, Penn (a) made more three-point field goals than its opponent (6-4) and (b) committed fewer turnovers than its opponent (20-21)

• Penn outrebounded Marist 45-31, the seventh time in eight games the Quakers have outboarded their opponent this season; *the 45 rebounds were one shy of the team high in the Allen coaching era.*

• Freshman **Sam Jones** had 19 points, setting a season/career high in that category for the second-straight game.

• **Jones** also set a season/career high with five three-point baskets, and tied season/career bests in rebounds (4) and steals (2).

• **Jones** tied a Penn player high in the Allen era by going 5-of-6 (83.3 percent) from beyond the arc in the game; *he has 21 field goals this season, 16 of them are three-pointers.*

Ivy League Preseason Poll

Penn was picked to finish seventh in the Ivy League's Preseason Media Poll, which came from the votes of two members of each school's media contingent in addition to one national voter.

Defending champion Harvard was a unanimous selection to win the title, garnering all 17 first-place votes and 136 voting points. Yale was second (108), followed by Columbia (94) and Princeton (88). Brown was selected fifth by the media (75 points), followed by Dartmouth (47), the Quakers (39), and Cornell (25).

Ivy League Rookie of the Week (11/17)

- **Jones** became the fourth different player to lead Penn in scoring in a game this season (also **Tony Hicks**, **Mike Auger** and **Darien Nelson-Henry**).
- Senior **Greg Louis** nearly had his first double-double this season with 13 points and nine rebounds, both season highs; he tied for game-high honors in rebounds with teammate Nelson-Henry.
- This was the third double-figure scoring game of **Louis'** career, and his first since he scored 10 points against Lafayette on January 8, 2013.
- **Louis** also tied a career high with two steals.
- Sophomore **Matt Howard** set a season/career high in assists (4) and tied a season/career best in rebounds (6).
- **Nelson-Henry** tied a career high with three steals.
- Sophomore **Matt Poplawski**, a walk-on from the men's soccer team, played eight minutes; that matches the total minutes he had played in his career prior to tonight.
- Senior **Matt Hanessian**, a walk-on who played the last three years on the JV program, scored his first varsity points tonight on a first-half basket.

Notemeal at Binghamton

- Penn won in its red uniforms for the first time in the **Jerome Allen** coaching era (previously 0-10 in such games).
- Penn scored 79 points, a season high.
- Penn was 26-of-51 from the field, the third time in five games the Quakers have shot better than 50 percent.

- Penn hit a season-high nine three-point baskets and shot a season-best 47.4 percent beyond the arc.
- Penn had six different players score in double figures, a first in the Allen coaching era.
- Junior **Tony Hicks** scored 18 points and led Penn in scoring for the fifth time in seven games this season; *all of Hicks' points came in the second half, and 16 of them came in the final 11:16.*
- Junior **Darien Nelson-Henry** set a season high with 16 points, and finished one rebound shy of his second-straight double-double; *he led Penn in rebounding for the fourth-straight game and the fifth time this season.*

• Freshman **Darnell Foreman** had his first double-figure scoring game at Penn, set season/career highs in points (11) and rebounds (8), and tied a season/career high with four assists; *on Monday, Foreman was named Ivy League Rookie of the Week, becoming the third different Penn player to earn the honor already this season.*

• **Sam Jones** had his first collegiate double-figure scoring game with 11 points, and tied season/career highs in assists (3) and three-point field goals (3).

• **Howard** had his second double-figure scoring game at Penn, with 10 points, and set a season/career high with three assists; *he already has more points this season (64) than he had in 17 appearances last year (36).*

• Freshman **Antonio Woods** tied his season/career high with 11 points.

Notemeal at Navy

- Penn had its lowest point total in a win since a 54-53 victory at NJIT on January 17, 2013.
- Penn had season highs in blocked shots (5) and steals (9); *it was the Quakers' highest steal total since they got 10 last January 2 at George Mason.*
- **Hicks** tied a career high with eight rebounds; *the other time he did that was November 12, 2013 at Monmouth.*

• **Nelson-Henry** had his first double-double of the season (11 points, 10 rebounds); *it was the sixth double-double of his career, and Penn is 5-1 in those games.*

• **Nelson-Henry's** rebound total was one shy of his career high, and he also tied a season/career best with three assists.

• **Howard** tied season/career highs in assists (2) and steals (3), and set a career best in blocked shots (2).

• **Sam Jones** tied his season/career high in rebounds (4), and set season/career bests in assists (3), steals (2) and minutes (24).

Notemeal at Wagner

• Penn shot a season-high 57.6 percent from the field (19-of-33); a season-high 36.4 percent on three-point shots (4-of-11); and made a season-high 19 free throws.

• Penn had just 33 field-goal attempts, a low in the **Jerome Allen** coaching era.

• **Nelson-Henry** was the only Penn player to score in double figures, with 11 points.

Notemeal at Temple

• Penn shot a season-high 81.8 percent from the foul line (18-22).

• **Howard** set career highs in points (15), rebounds (6), steals (3) and minutes (31); it was Howard's first double-figure scoring game at Penn.

• In his second appearance this season, sophomore **Dylan Jones** had another six-point, three-rebound performance in 11 minutes.

• **Poplawski** and freshman **Shawn Simmons** saw their first game action of 2014-15.

Notemeal From Lafayette

• Penn cut a 17-point deficit to two points (62-60), but never tied or held the lead.

• After going 0-for-7 on three-point shots in the first half, Penn was 6-of-11 (54.5 percent)

beyond the arc in the second half.

• **Hicks** tied a Penn single-game record for assists, with 13. This mark had been attained three times previously, by Zack Rosen (2/5/2011 vs. Harvard); Tim Begley (1/18/2005 vs. Lafayette); and Dave Wohl (2/14/1970 vs. Brown).

• **Hicks** also tied a career high with four steals.

• **Auger** nearly had his first collegiate double-double, scoring 18 points and grabbing nine rebounds.

• After going scoreless in Penn's opening game, **Auger** had 28 points in the last two games and shot 12-of-17 (70.6 percent) from the field in that time.

• **Woods** knocked down three three-point shots, a season/career high.

• After missing the first two games to injury, **Dylan Jones** saw his first game action of 2014-15 and had six points and three rebounds in nine minutes.

Notemeal From Rider

• **Auger** scored 10 points and was the only other Penn player in double figures.

• **Auger** also led Penn with eight rebounds, and played a team-high 32 minutes.

• **Nelson-Henry** scored Penn's first six points, but was saddled by foul trouble after that and finished with eight in only 15 minutes.

• After scoring 11 points in his debut, **Woods** had seven points, five rebounds and four assists (with just one turnover).

• **Sam Jones** scored nine points on a trio of three-point baskets.

Notemeal From Delaware State

• This marked just the fourth time in program history that Penn's season-opening game went to overtime; the other seasons when that happened were 1928-29; 1988-89; and 2007-08.

• Penn is now 3-8 in overtime games under head coach Jerome Allen.

• **Hicks** also took 13 foul shots, the most by a Penn player since Zack Rosen took 15 against Delaware on December 22, 2010.

• In his collegiate debut, **Woods** was the only other Penn player to score in double figures (11 points).

• In his first game since January 4, **Louis** started and had five points and six rebounds in 29 minutes.

Preseason Notemeal of Note

• Junior **Tony Hicks** is expected to be the leader of this year's youthful squad. An All-Ivy honorable mention honoree as a freshman, he led the Quakers in scoring last year as a sophomore (14.9 points per game) while finishing first on the team in free throws made (84) and second in assists (78) and three-point baskets (37).

• **Hicks** also boasts a unique status in the long, illustrious history of University of Pennsylvania basketball. As a high school senior in Chicago, he earned a spot on the prestigious *Parade* All-America Team, one of 40 players nationwide to be so recognized. When he came to Penn, he became the first *Parade* All-America to suit up for the Quakers.

• Like Hicks, junior center **Darien Nelson-Henry** figures to play a major role in the success of the Quakers this season. He played in 24 of the Red and Blue's 28 games last year—missing four at midseason due to injury—and averaged 10.6 points and 5.3 rebounds per game. Nelson-Henry also led the Ivy League in field-goal percentage both overall (.590) and in conference play (.654).

• Junior **Jamal Lewis** played in 26 games last year, starting eight. He averaged 2.8 points and 1.4 rebounds per game, dishing out 44 assists and grabbing 15 steals. *Lewis is coming back from a lengthy illness, and has no timetable on a return.*

• All three seniors on the roster are coming off injury-plagued seasons as juniors. One of them, **Greg Louis**, also missed his entire freshman year due to injury and thus still has an extra year of eligibility. He averaged 4.6 points and 2.9 rebounds in eight appearances last year, including four starts at forward.

• Another senior, **Patrick Lucas-Perry**, was Penn's top three-point threat two years ago—38 of his 49 field goals came from beyond the arc, and he led the Quakers in that category. "PLP" had a trio of 15-point games—UMBC, at Temple, at Brown—and 14 against Cornell. Last year, Lucas-Perry played in just five games before being shut down for the season. *He is injured, and has no timetable on a return.*

• The third senior is guard **Camryn Crocker**, who started eight games as a sophomore and played in 27 and had one of the best assist/turnover ratios in the Ivy League (1.38). He was shut down after just six games last year.

• Sophomore **Matt Howard** looked like he might be emerging as a breakout freshman last year after a pair of solid performances during Penn's Ivy home weekend with Cornell (8 points) and Columbia (7); however, he

suffered a season-ending injury the next week in practice. In 17 appearances overall, Howard averaged 2.1 points and 1.6 rebounds.

• Sophomore **Dylan Jones** is expected to pick up more of the slack in the frontcourt after seeing time in 21 games last year. He averaged 1.6 points and 1.2 rebounds per contest, highlighted by a 10-point, five-rebound game against Big 5 foe Saint Joseph's.

• The third sophomore on the roster, **Matt Poplawski**, is actually a converted men's soccer player who joined the program late last season after a solid season with the JV team. An All-Ivy soccer player as a freshman for the Quakers' Ivy title-winning team, he made four appearances for the hoop team last year and scored his only points against Harvard.

• Penn actually has two players on this year's roster who were a part of the JV program last year. The other is senior **Matt Hanessian**.

• Among the freshmen, **Darnell Foreman** helped Pitman High School win the Group I state title and earned South Jersey Times Player of the Year honors as well as first-team All-South Jersey by the *Courier Post*, the *Philadelphia Inquirer*, and *South Jersey Times*.

• Another freshman, **Antonio Woods**, played his high school basketball for former Villanova and 76ers standout Michael Bradley. Woods was City, Conference and District Player of the Year last year, and helped Summit Country Day to conference, sectional and district titles each of his four years.

• **Sam Jones** comes to Penn after helping his high school team, Gilbert Christian, win a pair of Arizona Interscholastic Association championships. He was the AIA's Division III Player of the Year as a senior.

Penn Coaching Career

• Returned to Penn as a volunteer assistant for the 2009-10 season, then promoted to the interim head coach position on Dec. 14, 2009.

• Formally named the John R. Rockwell Head Coach of Men's Basketball on March 30, 2010, after going 6-15 as interim coach.

• Penn improved from 6-22 his interim season—he was 6-15 as interim coach—to 13-15 his first full season, then 20-13 in 2011-12.

• In Ivy League play, Penn went 5-9 in Allen's interim year—he was head coach for every Ivy game that season—then improved to 7-7 in 2010-11 and improved upon that to go 11-3 and finish second in 2011-12, a game behind Harvard in the standings. (Penn went into its final game at Princeton with a chance to gain a share of the title, but fell to the Tigers 62-52.)

Penn Playing Career

• A four-year starter from 1992-95, led the Quakers to Ivy League titles each of his last three seasons, all of them coming via a perfect 14-0 mark. (Penn also won its last Ivy game his freshman year, in 1991-92, as well as its first five Ivy League games in 1995-96, giving the Quakers a 48-game Ivy winning streak that remains the conference record.)

• Ivy League Player of the Year in 1992-93 as a sophomore—sharing the honor with Columbia's Buck Jenkins—and again as a junior in 1993-94, making him one of three Penn players to earn the honor twice.

• Three-time first-team All-Ivy and All-Philadelphia Big 5 selection.

• Ended his career as the program's all-time leader in assists (504) and steals (166). Scored 1,488 career points, which is currently ninth on Penn's all-time scoring list, and grabbed 482 career rebounds from his guard position.

• Inducted into the Philadelphia Big 5 Hall of Fame in February 2009.

Why is He Listed as Penn '09?

Jerome Allen left Penn following the 1994-95 basketball season to pursue his professional basketball career, attending NBA draft camps and such. At the time, he was two classes shy of his degree from Penn's Wharton School of Business. Upon the conclusion of his playing career in Europe, Allen returned to coach with the Quakers and also took those final two classes to complete his degree.

• Penn's 1992-93 squad went 22-5 overall, wrestling the Ivy crown away from Princeton after the Tigers' four-year run before losing in the NCAA first round to Massachusetts.

• In 1993-94, Penn went 25-3 overall and earned an NCAA first-round victory over Nebraska before losing to Florida in the second round.

• Captain of the 1994-95 team that went 22-6 and again advanced to the NCAAs, losing to Alabama in overtime in the first round.

Pro Playing Career

• Second-round draft pick of the NBA's Minnesota Timberwolves and spent two seasons in the NBA with Minnesota, Indiana and Denver.

• He then enjoyed a stellar professional career in Europe—primarily Italy—before retiring at the end of the 2008-09 season.

Coaching Background

• In the summer of 2007, did an internship with the San Antonio Spurs, serving as an assistant coach on their summer league team at the Las Vegas NBA Summer League and the Rocky Mountain Review in Salt Lake City, Utah. As part of that program, he participated in both practice instructing and game scout.

• In February 2009, awarded the head coaching position for Snaidero Basket of Italy's Serie A, with whom he had previously played for four seasons. With that, he became the first person in 15 years to be promoted to head coach while still actively playing in one of the top European leagues (Italy, Spain, Greece, Russia, France, Turkey).

Philanthropy

• Founded Brothers Embracing Brothers (BEB) in 1997. In an attempt to convey the message of neighborhood involvement, BEB established a men's basketball league. Over the years BEB evolved and began working with the neighborhood youth. With a new mission in place, Hood Enriched was formed with the objective to cultivate the academic and athletic attributes of inner-city youth.

• Using the motto "expect to be exceptional," students were exposed to educational analysis exams and monitored thereafter. In addition, a summer job program allowed participants to develop proper workplace behavior.

PHILADELPHIA — Penn had a 59-52 advantage after Tony Hicks hit a three-pointer with 8:30 left. The Quakers knocked down just one field goal the rest of regulation, and that allowed the visiting Hornets to climb back into it.

The lone field goal was another trey by Hicks, and gave Penn a 65-61 lead with 3:19 left. However, DeAndre Haywood used an old-fashioned three-point play to get DSU within one. Darien Nelson-Henry missed a lefty layup on Penn's next possession, and then Hicks missed the front end of a 1-and-1. Kendal Williams missed a jumper that would have given DSU the lead, but he hustled to force the ball out of bounds off a Penn player, and then Tyshawn Bell was fouled and hit one of two free throws to tie the game.

Both teams missed three-pointers, and then Hicks drove just to the right of the lane but his shot bounced off the rim and away as time expired.

Delaware State won the OT tip and immediately scored for its first lead since 44-43 early in the second half. Hicks hit a pair of free throws to tie it again, but Bell hit his own freebies to give the Hornets a lead they would not relinquish.

Penn had a chance to tie it, down 75-72 and with the ball with 14 seconds left. However, Hicks' three-point shot was off the mark and Haywood rebounded. He was fouled and hit both shots.

Two Quick Notes...

• This was just the fourth time in program history that Penn's season opener went to overtime (also 1928-29, 1988-89, 2007-08).

• Junior **Tony Hicks** took 12 three-point shots, tying a Penn player high in the **Allen** coaching era.

ANNAPOLIS, Md. — Penn led by as many as 19 with 12 minutes left in the game, 49-30, but Navy scored 14 of the game's next 17 points as the Quakers stagnated on offense. When Brandon Venturini knocked down a three-point for the Midshipmen, Penn's lead was just 52-44 and there was still 5:25 left to play.

Penn was able to lock down on defense, and received a huge boost when Darnell Foreman knocked down a jumper in the lane a minute after Venturini's trey. That put the Quakers' lead back in double digits, at 54-44.

Penn continued to struggle offensively, but Navy also had its problems and could not get back within single digits. The Quakers finally added to their lead with 2:34 to play off a nice escape from a double-team out top, Tony Hicks finding Matt Howard who quickly fed Darien Nelson-Henry for a layup.

PHILADELPHIA — A youthful and inexperienced University of Pennsylvania men's basketball team has had trouble dealing with prosperity in the early part of this season. The Quakers had no such trouble on this night, jumping out to a 20-point lead before the game was 15 minutes old and rolling past an undermanned Marist squad.

Penn simply dominated a majority of the first half, highlighted by a 14-point run that turned a 10-4 game into a 24-4 blowout. It was 35-14 at the break, the fewest points by an opponent since Princeton scored just 13 in the first half of a game on February 14, 2006.

The second half provided little in the way of drama, as Penn's lead went below 20 points just once, at 37-18, and expanded to as much as 28 (59-31) before Marist scored the game's last 11 points in the final three minutes.

Did You Know...

• **The University of Pennsylvania participated in the first intercollegiate 5-on-5 basketball game in history?** On March 20, 1897, the Quakers were defeated by host Yale, 32-10. (Perhaps not surprisingly, Penn would wait nearly five years before playing its next intercollegiate game.)

• **Penn entered the 2014-15 season 12th on the NCAA Division I list of all-time winningest programs?** The Quakers had 1,714 victories in program history at the start of the season.

• **Penn has won 25 Ivy League championships and made 23 NCAA Tournament appearances?** After Penn and Princeton, no one else in the Ancient Eight has won more than four titles.

• **Jerome Allen is one of four former Penn players currently serving as a head coach at the Division I level?** The others are **Fran McCaffery** (Iowa), **Andrew Toole** (Robert Morris) and **Matt Langel** (Colgate).

• **From 1970-79, Penn went 223-56 overall, a .799 win percentage?** The only schools with better win percentages during that decade were UCLA (273-27, .910) and Marquette (252-40, .863). UNC was fourth (239-65, .786), while Kentucky was fifth (223-69, .764).

• **Penn is the most recent Ivy League team to compete in the Final Four?** That happened in 1979, when the Quakers won the East Region and played in Provo, Utah along with Michigan State (featuring Magic Johnson), Indiana State (featuring Larry Bird), and DePaul in what is still considered one of the most famous Final Fours of all-time. Penn lost to Michigan State in the semifinal round, then fell to DePaul in triple overtime in one of the last consolation games ever played. (The last one would be played two years later, in 1981.)

• **Penn's 1970-71 team holds a unique distinction in the annals of college basketball?** That Quaker squad went 28-1 overall, losing in the NCAA Tournament East Regional final to Villanova. The Wildcats would later vacate the win due to the use of an ineligible player in the game. Thus, in the NCAA's eyes, Penn's record that year is 28-0—making them the only “undefeated” team in history to play in the NCAA Tournament but not win it. (There have been undefeated teams that did NOT play in the NCAA Tournament, most notably Kentucky in 1953-54 and N.C. State in 1972-73.)

• **Penn holds the second-longest conference winning streak in NCAA Division I history?** The Quakers won 48 straight Ivy League games from 1992-96, including three straight 14-0 seasons in 1992-93, 1993-94 and 1994-95. The overall record for conference wins is held by UCLA, which won 50 straight Pac-10 games from 1971-74.

• **Penn is the only team to defeat the University of North Carolina in an NCAA Tournament game played in the state of North Carolina?** On March 11, 1979, the ninth-seeded Quakers defeated the top-seeded Tar Heels, 72-71, in an East Regional second-round game played at Reynolds Coliseum in Raleigh. (That day is known by fans on Tobacco Road as “Black Sunday,” as second-seeded Duke also lost at Reynolds, to St. John's.) UNC has played 31 other NCAA Tournament games in the state during its history, and won them all.

• **Penn's 1919-20 team is considered that year's national champion?** The Quakers went 20-0 during the regular season, clinching the Eastern Intercollegiate League title with a four-overtime win over Princeton (still the most OTs played in program history). Penn then met the Western champion, the University of Chicago, in a best-of-three series to determine the national champion. The Quakers lost the first game in Chicago, 28-24, but rebounded to win Game 2 in Philadelphia, 29-18. The rubber game was played in Princeton, N.J., with Penn coming out on top, 23-21. Later, the Quakers were awarded the Helms Foundation National Championship. (Penn also played Chicago for the national championship at the end of the 1907-08 season, losing twice to the Maroons.)

• **Penn's home court, The Palestra, has hosted 48 NCAA Tournament games?** The first ones took place in the tournament's first year, 1939, when it hosted the East Regional. The most recent took place in 1984, when Penn hosted an opening-round tripleheader.

• **When Koko Archibong took the floor for Nigeria at the 2012 Olympic Games in London, he became the first Penn basketball player to play in the Olympics?** The 2003 graduate was joined in London by fellow Quaker Susan Francia, a gold medal-winning rower for the United States. The University of Pennsylvania has been represented at every Summer Olympic Games since 1900, the only school to boast such a tradition.

• **Of the three most recent Penn players to play in the NBA, two are currently on the Quakers' coaching staff?** Head Coach **Jerome Allen** played for Minnesota, Indiana and Denver from 1995-97, while assistant coach **Ira Bowman** played for Philadelphia and Atlanta from 1999-2001. (The third is Allen's classmate and backcourt mate at Penn for three years, **Matt Maloney**, who was with Houston, Chicago and Atlanta from 1996-2003 and started at point guard for the Rockets' Western Conference final team in 1996-97.)

• **Hall of Fame coach Chuck Daly was once the head coach at Penn?** Before he won a pair of NBA titles as head coach of the Detroit Pistons in 1989 and 1990, and before he headed up the “Dream Team” at the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona, Daly spent six years at the Quaker helm, going 125-38 (including a 74-10 Ivy League mark) and winning four Ivy titles.

• **Penn can count among its alums the Executive Director of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC), Jim Haney?** He graduated in 1971 after three seasons with the varsity, and earned the Bus McDonald Award as a senior. The Quakers were 68-13 (38-4 Ivy, 9-3 Big 5) during Haney's career.
