VANDERBILT IN SEASON OPENERS

Vanderbilt, in its 121st year of organized football, enters the Northwestern contest looking for its 78th victory in season openers. The Commodores are 77-39-4 all-time in openers, including wins the last three years.

- ★ In 2009, Vanderbilt topped Western Carolina 45-0. They also defeated Miami (Ohio) and Richmond in 2008 and 2007, respectively.
- ★ The Commodores have captured four of their last five openers after enduring a seven-game losing streak from 1998-2004.
- ★ Vanderbilt is 10-15 in its last 25 openers.
- ★ Vanderbilt is 5-5 in its last 10 openers against non-SEC members.

VANDERBILT VS. BIG TEN IN OPENERS

This marks the first time that Vanderbilt has opened the season at home against a Big Ten opponent. The last time the Commodores played a Big Ten foe to open the season was in 2006 when Vanderbilt took on Michigan in 'The Big House'.

The Commodores are 2-2 all-time against current members of the Big Ten in season openers: losing to Michigan in 2006 (7-27) and Indiana in 1979 (13-44), and defeating Northwestern in 1947 (3-0) and Purdue in 1941 (3-0).

THE NORTHWESTERN SERIES

The two teams have met twice before, both games played at Northwestern, with Vanderbilt posting a win and a tie. The Commodores victory was a 3-0 shutout in the season opener on September 27, 1947, marking the smallest margin of victory for Vanderbilt in five seasons. The last game, played on Oct. 4, 1952, ended in a 20-20 tie.

VU-NU: BOTH ACADEMIC ACHIEVERS

Vanderbilt and Northwestern have this in common: the academic prestige.

Of the 23 current schools in the SEC and Big Ten, Vandy and Northwestern are the only private institutions in their respective conferences. Not to take away from the other universities, but the Commodores and Wildcats have set themselves apart.

In the *U.S. News and World Report's* "National Universities Ranking" edition, Vanderbilt University is tied at No. 17, tops in the SEC. Northwestern is ranked No. 12, and also tops the Big Ten.

Both schools value academic standards and it shows on the gridiron. Student-athletes at both schools maintain a high GPA. Both teams have recently earned the prestigious Academic Achievement Award presented by the American Football Coaches Association: Vanderbilt in 2008 and Northwestern in 2007.

VANDERBILT ALL-TIME VS. BIG TEN

The Commodores look to improve on their 7-17-2 mark against active Big Ten opponents. The last Vanderbilt victory was a 32-20 decision at Penn State on Oct. 19, 1957.

Most of the games played against the Big Ten were road games for the 'Dores, with Vanderbilt posting a 1-1-1 record at home. The victory came was a 26-0 shutout of Purdue on Oct. 3, 1942.



VANDERBILT NOTES



CALDWELL: FIRST-YEAR HEAD COACH

Robbie Caldwell, the 26th head coach in Vanderbilt football history, will be one of just 11 first-time head coaches in the NCAA FBS subdivision this season.

Caldwell, a veteran of more than three decades of collegiate coaching, was named to replace Bobby Johnson at Vanderbilt on July 14th following Johnson's unexpected retirement.

Caldwell and Kentucky mentor Joker Phillips are the Southeastern Conference's only first-time head coaches this year. A third, Derek Dooley of Tennessee, is serving his initial year at the school after having moved from the head coaching position at Louisiana Tech.

Besides Caldwell and Phillips, other first-time FCS head coaches are Sonny Dykes (La. Tech), Dan Enos (Central Michigan), Jimbo Fisher (Florida State), John "Doc" Holliday (Marshall), Mike MacIntyre (San Jose State), Larry Porter (Memphis), Jeff Quinn (Buffalo), Charlie Strong (Louisville) and Willie Taggart (Western Kentucky).

Caldwell has the most collegiate coaching experience of the 11 coaches, with Holliday having the second longest tenure.

Vanderbilt is one of 23 schools that will feature a new head coach roaming the sidelines in 2010.

HERB HAND NEWEST 'DORE COACH

Herb Hand, a veteran offensive coach with excellent credentials, is the newest Vanderbilt coach, joining the staff on Aug. 5.

Hand, 41, will serve as Vanderbilt's offensive line coach and is the first staff addition by new head coach Robbie Caldwell.

Hand came to Vanderbilt after three years at the University of Tulsa, a tenure that featured some of the NCAA's most productive offenses. As Tulsa's offensive coordinator, Hand directed 2007 and 2008 Hurricane offenses that topped the nation. Tulsa's 2008 unit averaged 570 yards and 47 points, both tops in the NCAA.

Hand also spent six successful years with the University of West Virginia's productive spread offense before going to Tulsa. With Hand on staff, the Mountaineers' 2006 attack ranked among the top five nationally in rushing offense, total offense and scoring offense.

DUTIES CHANGE FOR SIX ASSISTANTS

Six Commodore assistant coaches have new responsibilities this season.

- ★ Longtime defensive coordinator **Bruce Fowler** will assist Caldwell as assistant head coach. He will also mentor linebackers.
- ★ Jamie Bryant becomes the sole defensive coordinator and continues as the secondary coach.
- ★ Rick Logo has added recruiting coordinator duties to his primary role as defensive tackles coach.
- ★ Running backs coach **Des Kitchings** has added running game coordinator duties.
 - ★ Mike Pelton, hired last spring, will coach defensive ends.
- ★ **Ted Cain**, former offensive coordinator, will serve as tight ends coach and special teams coordinator.

SMITH TAPPED TO START AT QB

Larry Smith (R-Jr.) will start at quarterback for the Commodores against Northwestern, head coach Robbie Caldwell announced Sunday.

Smith, a product of Prattville (Ala.) High School, won the starting job over redshirt senior **Jared Funk**, junior transfer **Jordan Rodgers** and redshirt freshman **Charlie Goro**.

"Larry has separated himself, and deserves to get the ball," Caldwell said. "He has the big edge on experience, and really understands the offense. I expect to see Larry play well Saturday.

"Jared also did a great job and really made it a competition. He'll be the No. 2 guy and will be ready to play if called upon. We have confidence in both of them," Caldwell added.

Smith has 10 career starts, including in Vanderbilt's 2008 Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl victory over Boston College. Inserted as the starter last year and in charge of a new offensive scheme, Smith struggled during the first half of the campaign, then suffered a season-ending hamstring injury against Georgia Tech in what appeared to be his best performance of 2009.

VANDERBILT IN 2010: LOTS OF YOUTH

Looking for a quick description for Robbie Caldwell's first Vanderbilt squad. *Youthful* would work.

With one week of preparation remaining for the season opener, the Commodore depth chart features an array of sophomores, redshirt freshmen and true freshmen.

With only eight seniors expected to contribute in the opener, the Vanderbilt dress roster is likely to feature more than 50 sophomores and freshmen.

The Commodores are dominated by youth. The roster includes 28 sophomores, 14 redshirt freshmen, and 20 true freshmen.

Many of the young Commodores will be counted on to play key snaps against Northwestern. Nearly 30 sophomores and freshmen are featured on the Vanderbilt two-team depth chart.

As many as seven Commodores are expected to earn their first starting assignment against Northwestern.

Caldwell has also raved about the 2010 Commodore signing class, suggesting that many of the newcomers will see action early in their careers. Two or more freshmen appear in the mix at three different position groupings: wide receiver, offensive line and defensive secondary.

HOPING TO BREAK THE .500 MARK

Vanderbilt coaches are 12-12-1 in their Commodore debut. Robbie Caldwell is looking to become the first Commodore coach to win in his debut since Woody Widenhofer when his Vanderbilt team topped North Texas 29-12 on Aug. 30, 1997.

FOUR 'DORES FROM ILLINOIS

Four Commodores, including potential defensive starter **Tim Fugger** (R-Jr., DE), hail from the state of Illinois.

Besides Fugger, other Commodores from Illinois include quarterbacks **Jared Funk** (R-Sr.) and **Charlie Goro** (R-Fr.), and defensive lineman **Josh Jelesky** (R-So.).

All four of the Commodores played prep football at suburban schools near Chicago. The Northwestern campus in Evanston is located north of Chicago on the shores of Lake Michigan.

Goro was arguably the most accomplished prep player, having guided Maine South High School to its first 14-0 season and the 8A state title. Goro was named Prep All-American by Parade Magazine.

Funk, one of two graduate students on the Commodore roster, has enjoyed the best August camp of his career, entering last week with the starting quarterback job at stake.

FUGGER FACES PREP TEAMMATE

In 2006, Montini Catholic School of Oak Brook, Ill. made their 14th consecutive playoff appearance with **Tim Fugger** and **Chuck Porcelli** anchoring the offensive front as well as the defensive line.

Fugger, a standout tight end/defensive end, was a senior playing next to Porcelli, a junior offensive lineman and defensive tackle.

After their senior campaigns, Fugger committed to Vanderbilt and Porcelli committed to Northwestern. Fugger is now a starter at defensive end while Porcelli is a reserve right tackle.

ONLY SEC-BIG TEN MATCH THIS YEAR

The Northwestern-Vanderbilt encounter marks the only occasion that teams from the Southeastern Conference and Big Ten Conference will face off in the 2010 regular season.

Representatives of the two power conferences are likely to meet at the conclusion of the season in three postseason bowls: Outback, Capital One and Gator.

In 2008, Vanderbilt's season opener at Michigan also marked the only regular season game between schools from the two leagues.

VANDERBILT VS. NON-SEC FOES

Vanderbilt is 10-5 in its last 15 games against non-Southeastern Conference opponents. The Commodores were 2-2 last year: topping Western Carolina and Rice; losing to Army and Georgia Tech.

In the last decade, the Commodores are 24-10 in games against non-SEC teams.

VANDERBILT: SOLID IN SEPTEMBER

The Commodores will look to continue their recent trend of solid early-season play when Northwestern visits Nashville.

Since the 2005 opener, the Commodores are 15-6 in games played before October 1. Last year, despite a 2-10 overall record, Vanderbilt was 2-2 in September.

In 2005 and 2008, the Commodores went 4-0 in September. From 2000-04, Vanderbilt struggled in September, going 4-16.

SMOTHERMAN START STREAK TO END

Adam Smotherman's consecutive start streak of 23 games, second longest on the Commodore roster, is expected to end against at the Northwestern game.

Smotherman, a redshirt senior defensive tackle, has been ruled out of the opener.

One of four co-captains, Smotherman has worked hard to return from an ACL tear sustained during spring drills, and remains ahead of schedule on this rehab.

Chris Marve (R-Jr., LB) has the longest active starts streak (25).

VANDERBILT'S TOUGH SLATE

College football insiders say the Commodores' 2010 schedule ranks among the nation's most difficult.

Ten of Vanderbilt's 12 opponents this season made postseason appearances during the 2009-10 season. Six of the 10 played in bowls on or after January 1. An 11th foe, Wake Forest, went 5-7 last year after making three straight bowl appearances.

Vanderbilt's 12 opponents won at a 58.4 percent clip in 2009, going a combined 90-66. Remove Eastern Michigan's winless campaign, and the remaining 11 teams went 90-54 one year ago.

Phil Steele's College Football Preview listed the Vanderbilt schedule No.12 toughest among 120 NCAA FBS teams.

The Commodores are slated to play four teams ranked in Associated Press preseason Top 25 (Florida, 4th; Arkansas, 17th; LSU, 21st; and Georgia, 23rd). Three other 2010 foes received AP Top 25 mention: South Carolina, Connecticut and Ole Miss.

RUNNING BACK BY COMMITTEE

The Commodores enter the season with uncertainty at running back, a position considered one of the team's strengths entering preseason camp.

Three of Vanderbilt's top four backs – sophomores **Warren Norman** and **Zac Stacy**, and redshirt freshman **Wesley Tate** – have missed substantial work during August drills due to a variety of reasons.

Fortunately, the preseason fog surrounding the position appears to be lifting.

The status of Norman, the reigning Southeastern Conference Freshman of the Year and arguably the team's most explosive player, remains in limbo. After undergoing a knee scope last week, Norman is listed as questionable for Saturday.

Entering game week, Stacy and Tate appear ready to play against Northwestern. Stacy, who ran for 478 yards last year (#8 all-time among Vanderbilt freshmen) has been full-go for the last week after suffering a mild knee sprain early in camp. Tate, the younger brother of former Notre Dame All-American receiver Golden Tate, has displayed plenty of promise in his first year on campus, but has been limited at times due to injury.

Kennard Reeves, a fifth-year senior who owns a 5.7-yard rushing average for this career and posted 153 yards in 2009, could see substantial action against the Wildcats.

CHICAGO BEARS ROSTER KIND TO BOTH TEAMS

Of the 25 former Vanderbilt and Northwestern players currently competing to claim NFL roster spots, nearly a third of them are members of the Chicago Bears.

The Chicago roster features five former Vanderbilt standouts: WR Earl Bennett, QB Jay Cutler, LB Hunter Hillenmeyer, DB D.J. Moore and OT Chris Williams.

Three Northwestern grads are currently with the Bears: WR Zeke Markshausen, LB Nick Roach and DE Corey Wooten.

The Bears have more former Commodores and Wildcats than any other NFL team.

FIELD OR BOOTH

Both Commodore coordinators – **Jimmy Kiser** (offense) and **Jamie Bryant** (defense) – will work from the coaches' booth.

Bryant will be joined by **Mike Pelton** in the booth. Running backs coach **Des Kitchings** will work with Kiser upstairs.

MARVE, NORMAN PRESEASON ALL-SEC

Standouts **Chris Marve** and **Warren Norman** have been named to the Preseason All-Southeastern Conference team by coaches and writers.

Marve, a junior LB from Memphis, and Norman, a sophmore RB/RS from Stone Mountain, Ga., were both named first team all-conference.

Both earned All-SEC recognition from league coaches last year after putting together excellent seasons: Marve ranking as the SEC's No. 2 tackler; Norman walking away with SEC Freshman of the Year honors as the conference's all-purpose yardage leader.

Marve, one of four co-captains, has been named to watchlists for the Nagurski Trophy, Butkus Award and Lombardi Award. He enters his third season as a starter trying to become the first SEC player to achieve three consecutive seasons of at least 100 tackles since former Vanderbilt All-America linebacker Jamie Winborn accomplished the feat in 1998-2000.

In 2009, Marve posted 121 tackles, including 57 solo stops. Marve notched double-digit tackles in seven of 12 games, including a career-best 18-tackle performacne against Georgia Tech. For his efforts, Marve was awarded the team's postseason Most Valuable Linebacker Award.

Norman produced one of the most productive freshman campaigns in SEC history one year ago. He topped the SEC with 1,951 all-purpose yards, breaking Herschel Walker's freshman SEC record in the process, and matched another league mark with three kickoff returns for touchdowns. Norman also ranked seventh in the SEC with 783 rushing yards, the second highest total ever by a Commodore freshman.

OTHER TOP RETURNEES

SEAN RICHARDSON (Jr., Safety) Regarded as one of the SEC's top safeties, Richardson blossomed as a starter at strong safety in 2009, earning 84 total tackles and 4.5 tackles for loss.

CASEY HAYWARD (Jr., DB) Displayed excellent cover skills, picking off two passes and defending seven others. He also added 58 total tackles, including 8.5 for loss.

BRANDON BARDEN (R-Jr., TE) Finished 2009 with 29 receptions, good for 357 yards and a TD. Former prep QB ranks as Vanderbilt's active career leader with 57 receptions and 565 receiving yards.

RYAN FOWLER (R-So., PK) Untested entering '09, Folwer connected on 11 of his last 12 attempts, including final eight. Fowler's 16 FGs tied a school record, earning Freshman All-America and SEC honors.

T.J. GREENSTONE (R-Jr., DT) Extremely productive on the field, 2010 co-captain posted 38 total tackles and two QB sacks last year.

ZAC STACY (So., RB) Playing much of his freshman season at less than full speed, Stacy rushed for 478 yards. Forms sold 1-2 sophomore RB punch with Warren Norman.

COMMODORE NOTES

REMEMBERING RAJAAN BENNETT

The Commodores are without one student-athlete who was expected to be a key member of the 2010 signing class, **Rajaan Bennett**.

Bennett, a highly sought-after running back from McEachern High School in Powder Springs, Ga., died tragically on Feb. 18, 2010. Bennett was the victim of a residential shooting that shocked the McEachern and Vanderbilt communities. This Friday, the school is expected to honor Bennett by retiring his No. 5 jersey and erecting a monument on campus.

At a memorial service days after the death, his literature teacher read an essay entitled "Strength" written by Bennett within a week of his death.

The essay closed with the following lines:

"There will never be a time that I will give up. I work hard at whatever I do for that man upstairs to smile down on me with the rays of the sun.

"My drive cannot be stopped or even slowed down, because every obstacle has a way around it.

"Every day I become stronger from the weights physically, the books mentally and life emotionally. There is no limit to my strength and at the end of the day, I want to be known as the strongest."

Bennett rushed for 1,857 yards and 28 touchdowns as a senior captain, helping McEachern to an undefeated regular season. A Rivals' 4-star recruit and one of Georgia's most decorated seniors, Bennett earned the state's AAAAA Offensive Player of the Year Award. At McEachern, Bennett was a campus leader and honors student.

The son of Narjaketha Bennett and the late Charles Bennett, Rajaan is survived by a younger brother and sister.

- Warren Norman (RB/RS, So.) and Taylor Loftley (DT, R-So.) were teammates at Chamblee High School east of Atlanta.
- Linebackers **John Stokes** (Sr.) and **DeAndre Jones** (R-So.) and **Walt Wepfer** (R-Fr., punter) were teammates at University School in Memphis.

Two walk-on defensive players — **Marc Panu** (R-Fr., DT) and **Dan Sutton** (R-So., DB) — were teammates at Whitefield Academy near Atlanta.

ONLY THREE 'DORES STARTED EVERY GAME IN 2009

Due largely to a rash of injuries, only three Vanderbilt position players started all 12 games last year: LB **Chris Marve**, D**T Adam Smotherman** and CB **Casey Hayward**.

Two other Commodores with 11 starts in 2009 – WR **John Cole** and safety **Sean Richardson** – endured hand surgeries during the season.

MONAHAN LOST FOR SEASON WITH ACL INJURY

Austin Monahan (R-Jr., TE) will miss the 2010 season after suffering an ACL tear in an early August practice.

It marks the third consecutive year that the unfortunate Monahan has sustained a seasonending injury. Last year, he tore an ACL at midseason. In 2008, Monahan suffered a shoulder fracture after making a catch at Ole Miss.

2010 VU ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

The 2010 Vanderbilt Athletic Hall of Fame class will be introduced at halftime of the Northwestern-Vanderbilt game. The recipients also will be honored during a Sept. 3 banquet.

The distinguished class was determined by a panel of Student Athletics

administrators with input from various outside sources.

Each recipient was nominated for consideration through a process open to the entire Vanderbilt Athletics constitency, including followers and administrators.

ERNEST "BUCKY" CURTIS • FOOTBALL • 1947-50

Ernest "Bucky" Curtis served Vanderbilt well during his four years with the Commodores, cementing himself as one of the nation's elite receivers. He led the nation in several receiving categories and received All-American honors from several outlets in 1950. Curtis knew how to make the big play, averaging an eye-popping 29.3 yards per catch his senior season. He is just one of five Vanderbilt a\lumni to have won the prestigious NCAA Silver Anniversary Award, honored in 1975. Curtis also distinguished himself with four years of service in the United States Navy.

SHAN FOSTER • BASKETBALL • 2004-08

The fans who packed Memorial Gymnasium on cold winter nights during Shan Foster's four years at Vanderbilt were always in for a treat. To the tune of setting the program's all-time scoring record, the sweet-shooting Foster was the SEC's deadliest 3-point threat and one of college basketball's most exciting players. He helped lead Vanderbilt to NCAA Tournament appearances in 2007 and 2008, its first consecutive bids since the early 1990s. Foster saved his best for last, putting up a career high in scoring as a senior and receiving SEC Player of the Year honors. An extraordinary ambassador for his school, his sport and his community, Foster will forever be looked at as one of the best to ever call himself a Commodore.

HEIDI GILLINGHAM JACKSON • WBB • 1990-94

Heidi Gillingham stood above everybody else in the SEC, but not just because of her height. At 6-feet-10-inches in game sneakers -- the tallest player in Vanderbilt women's basketball history -- Gillingham exceeded the lofty expectations that were created when she arrived on campus. She led the Commodores to their only Final Four berth in 1993, and her 131 blocks in the 1991-1992 season is still a conference record. Her exploits earned the Commodores the nation's No. 1 ranking for six weeks during the 1993 season. Off the court she was admired and appreciated as well, being voted Homecoming Queen by the student body in October of 1993.

CHRIS GROER • TENNIS • 1993-96

It's no coincidence that the men's tennis program began to turn around when Chris Groer joined the team. A walk-on with an academic scholarship, Groer rose to become the first Vanderbilt men's tennis player to be named an All-American in the modern era in 1996. Groer personified the best in Commodore student-athletes with his accomplishments in the classroom as well, becoming the first tennis player in school history to be named an Academic All-American. After a successful professional career, Groer became an intelligence specialist for the Department of Defense and now works as a researcher in the Oak Ridge National Laboratory.

ANN HUTCHESON PRICE • TENNIS • 1969-71

Ann Hutcheson played for the women's tennis team in the days before Title IX, meaning the program was non-scholarship and essentially self-coached. Nevertheless, Hutcheson was a Southern and national standout at both singles and doubles and always represented the university with dignity and grace. After tennis came another successful endeavor as a physician. Dr. Price serves as the Associate Dean of Alumni Affairs for Vanderbilt's School of Medicine.

FRANK LORGE • SWIMMING • 1969-72

Frank Lorge is considered by many as the best swimmer in school history. In addition to breaking records and winning conference championships as a backstroke specialist, Lorge was a true intellectual, receiving a Civil Engineering undergraduate degree in 1972, his Doctorate of Jurisprudence in 1980 and a Master of Science degree in Environmental and Water and Resources and Engineering in 1982, all at Vanderbilt. He won the 1990 Masters National 200-meter backstroke and currently trains for more competition.

ED MARTIN • MBB ASST. COACH • 1985-89

A coach on the court and in life, Ed Martin was not only a mentor for standout players like Will Perdue and Jeff Turner early in their careers as a Commodore assistant, but also regarded as the father of Vanderbilt's Human and Organizational Development community service program. His efforts and example through the freshman course he taught on Community Service inspired many students to volunteer their time for the Nashville community. Despite a busy schedule befitting someone with a distinguished coaching career, Martin gave much of his own time to charitable service organizations, living what he taught. He passed away in 2005 at age 75.

JEFF PEEPLES • BASEBALL • 1970-73

Pitcher Jeff Peeples compiled an impressive list of achievements during his tenure at Vanderbilt, setting career record totals for wins and earned run average. With his sterling pitching leading the way, the Commodores won the 1972 SEC Championship, and he was one of only two pitchers in conference history to lead the SEC in ERA two years in a row. Jeff life was cut short, dying of a stroke at age 46 in 1996. Since 2001, Vanderbilt baseball has honored his memory by annually awarding the Jeff Peeples Award to the team's Most Valuable Player.

GRANTLAND RICE • 1898-1901

Vanderbilt alumnus Grantland Rice was a giant in the sportswriting world, widely regarded as the greatest in his profession and helping shape how generations of Americans would view sports in the process. His first four sentences about the "Four Horsemen" in the 1924 Notre Dame-Army game are some of the most famous ever written about American sports. Over time, his name became synonymous with sportswriting, although he always remained as humble as he was during the days he wore a Commodore uniform. His verse about "The One Great Scorer" was found posted in high school gymnasiums around the nation during the first half of the 20th Century. As a way of honoring the immeasurable contributions he and protégé Fred Russell made to the field, the Grantland Rice-Fred Russell Sports Writing Scholarship is awarded every year to an incoming Vanderbilt freshman who intends to pursue a career in sports journalism. He was elected to Vanderbilt Board of Trust in 1926.

WILL WOLFORD • FOOTBALL • 1982-85

Will Wolford was an outstanding offensive lineman for the Commodores during a strong run for the program in the 1980s. Vanderbilt head coach George MacIntyre hailed him as "the best lineman in the country" by his senior season, and he rewarded that confidence when the Buffalo Bills picked him in the first round of the NFL Draft. After a terrific professional career that included three Pro Bowl appearances, Wolford has moved on to become a color analyst for the Indianapolis Colts, while also serving on several community Boards and coaching his children's sports teams.
