Overview

Wake Forest will play its final regular season game of the 2007 season when it visits Vanderbilt on Saturday, Nov. 24 . . . Kickoff is slated for 2 p.m. EST . . . The Deacons are 7-4 overall and have completed ACC play with a 5-3 record . . . Vanderbilt enters the game 5-6 overall and 2-6 in the SEC . . . The Commodores are playing to become bowl-eligible while the Deacons are already eligible . . . Wake Forest's 18 wins over the past two seasons are the most-ever by Deacon teams in consecutive seasons . . . WFU will attempt to become just the fifth team in school history to win eight or more games in a season . . . Wake Forest, the defending ACC Champion, can still gain a share of the Atlantic Division title of Miami defeats Boston College on Saturday . . . That would create a three-way tie for first in the Atlantic Division at 5-3 between Wake, BC and Clemson.

Series

Vanderbilt holds a 7-3 lead in the all-time series that originated in $1964\dots$ Vanderbilt has won four straight in the series . . . Wake Forest's last win over VU was in 1992 by a 40-6 score at Vanderbilt . . . That win started the Deacs on a six-game winning streak . . . VU is 3-2 vs. Wake Forest in games played in Nashville . . . Each of the last two games have been decided by four points or fewer . . . Wake Forest is 6-11 all-time in games played in the state of Tennessee . . . The Deacons are 31-61-2 all-time against the current members of the SEC . . The Deacs and 'Dores are also scheduled to meet in 2008 and each year from 2010 to 2015.

Head Coaches

Wake Forest head coach **Jim Grobe** (**Virginia '75**) is in his seventh season with the Deacons and has a record of 44-39 including last year's 11-3 mark . . . Grobe, who spent six seasons at Ohio University, is in his 13th season overall as a head coach and has a career mark of 77-72-1 . . . Grobe was the unanimous choice as the ACC Coach of the Year in 2006 and was honored as the National Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association, the Bobby Dodd Foundation, the Associated Press, The Sporting News and CBS Sportsline.com. . . . Vanderbilt head coach **Bobby Johnson** (**Clemson '73**) is in his sixth year with the Commodores and has a record of 20-49 including a 5-6 mark this season . . . Johnson went 60-36 in eight seasons as the head coach at Furman . . . For his career, Johnson owns a record of 80-85 in 14 seasons.

The Matchup

Vanderbilt is 3-0 this season against non-conference opponents with wins over Richmond, Eastern Michigan and Miami, Ohio . . . Wake Forest is 2-1 in non-ACC games with wins over Army and Navy and a 20-17 loss to Nebraska . . . The Commodores are 4-3 at home this year . . . Wake Forest is 2-3 on the road and has dropped its last two road games, at Virginia and Clemson . . . The Deacs have won three straight non-conference road games with a victory at Navy in 2007 and wins at Ole Miss and Connecticut in 2006 . . . Wake enters the game coming off a 38-18 win over North Carolina State . . . Vandy has dropped three straight including a 25-24 heartbreaker at Tennessee on Saturday . . . Wake Forest is second in the nation in completion percentage at 70.9% . . . Wake Forest leads the nation in defensive touchdowns with eight . . . The Deacs have six interception returns for touchdowns to go with a pair of fumble returns . . . WFU has 10 non-offensive touchdowns including one punt return and one kickoff return Vandy has two non-offensive touchdowns, an interception return and a fumble return.

What To Watch For

- Sam Swank has converted 99 consecutive PAT attempts in his career going into the Vanderbilt game.
- WR Kenneth Moore needs 11 receptions to set an ACC record for catches in a season. He enters the game with 78 catches.
- Moore also needs 140 receiving yards to become just the third Deac to hit the 1,000-yard mark.
- A win for Wake Forest would be its eighth of the season. Only four times in school history has a Deacon team won eight or more games in a season.

Back-To-Back Bowls

- Wake Forest is bowl-eligible for the second straight season.
- The Deacons have never been to bowl games in consecutive seasons.

Wake Sets Record For Wins in Consecutive seasons

- Wake Forest has set a record for the most wins in consecutive seasons.
- With 11 wins last year and 7 victories in 2007, the Deacons have won 18 games since the start of the 2006 season.
- Previously, the most wins in consecutive seasons occurred last year when WFU's 11 wins coupled with four wins in 2005 for a total of 15 victories.

Winningest Senior Class

- Wake Forest's current crop of seniors is the winningest senior class in school history.
- With 26 wins, this group has exceeded the previous four-year win total set by the senior classes of 1947 and 1942 which each won 25 games.
- This will be the first senior class to graduate with a winning record (26-21) since the 1988 seniors posted a four-year record of 22-21-1.
- With a winning percentage of .553 (26-21), this crop of seniors has the highest winning percentage of any Deacon senior class since the 1953 seniors posted a .564 winning percentage (20-15-4).
- A win in the season finale vs. Vanderbilt would lift the seniors' winning percentage to .563.

Curry Sets Linebacker Interception Record

- Junior LB Aaron Curry intercepted a pass against North Carolina State and returned it 57 yards for a touchdown.
- It was Curry's fourth interception of the season and his third return for a touchdown.
- Curry tied the NCAA record for interceptions returned for touchdowns in a season by a linebacker with three
- Curry shares the record with Malcolm Postell of Pittsburgh who also had three in 2004.
- Curry moved ahead of teammate Alphonso Smith to set the record for interception yards in a season.
- Smith now has 165 return yards this season while Curry has 226.
- Entering the season, the record for interception yards in a season was 128 by A.J. Greene in 1987.
- Coming into the 2007 season, Wake Forest's record for career interception yards was 176 by Ronnie Burgess (1981-84).
- Curry is now the Deacons' season (226) and career (256) interception return yardage leader.

Curry, Justice Earn Player of the Week honors

- C Steve Justice was named the ACC Offensive Linemand of the Week on Nov. 19 and LB Aaron Curry earned the honor as the league's Defensive Back of the Week.
- \bullet Justice graded out at 92 percent against NC State, successfully completing his assignment on 70 of 76 plays and leading the team with 4.5 knockdown blocks .
- Curry had a team-high eight tackles including six solo stops and two assists.
- He also had an interception which he returned 57 yards for a touchdown.

Jim Grobe vs. In-State Opponents

- Wake Forest has swept the Tobacco Road Series for the second straight year.
- This marks the first time in school history that Wake has won consecutive Tobacco Road Series.
- In each of the last two years, WFU has defeated Duke, North Carolina and North Carolina State.
- \bullet Under Grobe, the Deacons are 22-5 against North Carolina-based schools.
- Wake has won its last nine games against North Carolina institutions.
- The Deacons' last loss to an in-state school was a 31-24 defeat vs. North Carolina on Nov. 13, 2004.
- In the ACC, the Deacs are 7-0 vs. Duke, 4-2 vs. UNC and 4-3 vs. NC State.
- Against non-ACC North Carolina schools, Wake is 5-0 vs. East Carolina, 1-0 vs. NC A&T and 1-0 vs. Appalachian.
- In 2006, Wake Forest swept the Tobacco Road Series by beating UNC, NC State and Duke for the first time since 1987.
- Wake Forest won the 2006 Tobacco Road series by defeating Duke (14-13), UNC (24-17) and NC State (25-23).

Jim Grobe and "Peahead" Walker

- Wake Forest head coach Jim Grobe and former head coach D.C. "Peahead" Walker are the two winningest coaches in Wake Forest history.
- Walker, Wake's head coach from 1937-50, won 77 games with the Deacs.
- Grobe, now in his seventh season, has won 44 games.
- Grobe and Walker are the only two coaches in Wake Forest history with three 7-win seasons.
- Grobe and his staff went 7-6 in 2002, 11-3 last year and are 7-4 this season.
- Walker posted identical 7-3 records in 1939 and '40 and an 8-1 mark in 1944.

Skinner Sets Offensive Pace

- Wake Forest QB Riley Skinner is the most accurate passer in school history.
- Skinner has completed 186 of 257 passes this year, a rate of 72.37%.
- Skinner's career completion percentage of 69.1% is the best-ever by any WFU quarterback.
- \bullet This week Skinner ranks second in the nation in completion percentage behind Texas Tech's Graham Harrell at 72.7%.
- Skinner has completed 70 percent or better of his pass attempts in seven games this year and 13 games in his career.
- \bullet He has thrown for 200 or more yards six times this season.
- Wake Forest is 5-1 this year when Skinner throws for 200 or more yards.

NCAA Career Stat Leaders

- Kevin Marion is fifth in the nation among active players with 86 kickoff returns and fifth with 2,061 KOR yards.
- Riley Skinner is fourth among active players with a 69.1 career completion percentage.
- Alphonso Smith is 12th in the country with 12 career interceptions. He ranks 11 in career interception return yards.
- Aaron Curry is seventh in the country with 256 career interception return yards.
- Sam Swank is fifth among active players with 58 career field goals. He is 13th in career accuracy (78.4%) and 15th in career scoring (273 points).

Deacs Second in Completion Percentage

- As a team, Wake Forest is second in the nation in completion percentage.
- Wake Forest has completed 229 of 323 passes for a completion rate of 70.90%.
- Only Texas Tech at 72.05% (500-694) has a higher completion percentage than Wake Forest.

Moore Sets School Reception Record

- Senior Kenneth Moore set the school record for pass receptions in a season after catching eight passes vs. NC State on Nov. 17.
- Moore now has 78 receptions on the season, surpassing the previous season mark of 72 set by Desmond Clark in 1997.
- The ACC record for receptions in a season is 88 set by NC State's Torry Holt in 1998.

Add Moore

- WR Kenneth Moore is the ACC leader in receptions with 78, an average of 7.1 per game.
- Moore is tied for ninth in the nation in receptions per game.
- Moore is tied for fourth in ACC history for receptions in a season with 78.
- He has four 100-yard games this season: 126 receiving yards vs. BC, 181 receiving yards vs. Navy, 119 rushing yards vs. Nebraska, and 100 receiving yards vs. Duke.
- Moore's 15 receptions vs. BC and Navy tied the school record and is one shy of the ACC record.
- In 2007, Moore has scored three rushing touchdowns, five by reception and one punt return.
- He is the only player among the top 10 scorers in the ACC with a rushing, receiving and return TD.

Matt Robinson earns Sixth Year

- Wake Forest defensive end Matt Robinson was recently granted a sixth year of eligibility by the
- Robinson missed all of the 2006 season after suffering a fractured knee cap in the 2005 season finale against Miami.
- Robinson missed the 2003 season, his first on campus, due to preseason shoulder surgery.
- Robinson has started four games this season on the defensive line this season and 26 games in his career.

Last Meeting with Vanderbilt

- Vanderbilt posted a 24-20 win over Wake Forest at BB&T Field on Sept. 1, 2005.
- Jeff Jennings scored on a 5-yard run with 1:48 to play to give the Commodores the win.
- The win was VU's first in a season-opener in eight years.
- VU QB Jay Cutler threw for 276 yards and one touchdown while running for 89 yards.
- Micah Andrews rushed for a career-high 254 yards on 34 carries.
- Sam Swank booted field goals of 34 and 22 yards for the Deacons.

ACC The Last Two Years

- Wake Forest is second in the ACC behind Virginia Tech for the most ACC wins over the last two
- Since the start of the 2006 campaign, the Deacons have gone 11-5 in regular season ACC games.
- WFU is tied with Georgia Tech with 11 wins.
- Virginia Tech has the ACC's best record at 12-3.

Interception History

- In nearly seven full seasons of play under Jim Grobe and defensive coordinator Dean Hood, Wake Forest has intercepted 19 passes that have been returned for touchdowns.
- In 44 seasons from 1956 through 2000, Wake Forest had 17 interceptions returned for touchdowns.

Marion Nears KOR Record

- Wake Forest senior Kevin Marion is the ACC leader and ninth in the nation in kickoff returns with a 29.9 average.
- Marion has 26 returns for 777 yards this season.
- He is Wake Forest's all-time leader in career kickoff return yards with 2,061.
- The previous record holder was John Stone (1998-2001) who had 1,906 career KOR yards.
- Marion has 86 career kickoff returns and is approaching the school career record of 87 set by Anthony Williams (1988-91).
- Moore's 2,061 career kickoff return yards is third in the ACC behind UNC's Eric Blount (2,313) and Marcus Wall (2,120), also of UNC.
- Against North Carolina on Oct. 27, Marion returned two kicks for 181 yards.
- His first kickoff return against the Tar Heels went for 98 yards and a touchdown, giving the Deacons a 17-3 lead in the second quarter.
- He added an 83-yard return early in the fourth quarter that gave WFU the ball at the UNC 14 and led to a Josh Adams touchdown run.
- Marion's return for a score vs. UNC was the first by a Deac since John Stone went 93 yards vs. Georgia Tech in 2001.
- Marion's 98-yard return tied the BB&T Field record set by Myles Savage against Maryland in 1997.

Swank a Groza Semifinalist

- Wake Forest kicker Sam Swank has been named as one of 20 semifinalists for the prestigious Lou Groza Award presented by the FedEx Orange Bowl.
- Swank is Wake Forest's all-time leading scorer with 273 points.
- He has converted 16 of 19 field goal tries this year and all 37 PAT attempts.

Thompson, Frazier Earn Academic All-District Honors

- OT Louis Frazier and DE Jeremy Thompson were each named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District 3 team.
- Thompson is a health and exercise science major.
- Frazier is a biology major who has been accepted to Wake Forest Medical School for next year.
- Frazier was a repeat selection to the District 3 team.
- Both Frazier and Thompson are now eligible for Academic All-America honors.

This Date in Wake Forest History

Nov. 24, 2001: Wake Forest running back Tarence Williams eclipsed the 1,000 yard mark for the season in this home shootout against Northern Illinois. Williams had 35 carries for 140 yards and a touchdown to lead the Deacons to their sixth win of the year, a 38-35 triumph over the Huskies. Wake Forest dominated the first half, outgaining the Huskies 266-52. The Deacons had 232 total yards on the ground on 58 rushing attempts, allowing them to hold on to their lead after giving up 28 points in the second half.

Nov. 24, 1990: The Demon Deacons had a strong end to the season, handling Vanderbilt 56-28 in Nashville. The win snapped a six-game losing streak that had included games against No. 1 Virginia, No. 19 Clemson and No. 4 Georgia Tech. Backup quarterback Keith West threw for three touchdowns and 229 yards and the Deacons came up just shy of 300 rushing yards to give them 523 yards of total offense. Vanderbilt closed the gap to 21-14 near the end of the first half, but the Deacons scored another touchdown with 6 seconds left to put the game out of reach. The Deacs' four touchdowns in the second half gave them a total of eight, and kicker Dave Behrmann tied a school record with eight PATs.

- Smith owns the school record and has tied the ACC mark for career touchdowns on interceptions with four.

Andrews Needs 100

- Senior RB Micah Andrews is on the verge of joining an elite group of Deacons.
- Only five players in school history have recorded a 100-yard rushing game in each of their four years of eligibility.
- Andrews had 125 yards vs. N.C. A&T as a freshman, 254 vs. Vanderbilt and 142 vs. East Carolina as a sophomore.
- As a junior, Andrews picked up 142 yards in the season opener vs. Syracuse but suffered a knee injury three games into the year.
- The only Deacons with 100-yard games in all four years are James McDougald (1976-79), Michael Ramseur (1982-85), Morgan Kane (1996-99), Topper Clemons (1982-85) and Anthony Williams (1988-91).

Scoring Spurts

While scoring spurts are usually associated with basketball, Wake Forest has made a habit of going on scoring runs in 2007:

- The Deacons held a 21-18 lead over N.C. State on Nov. 17 before scoring the final 17 points of the game.
- \bullet WFU held a 10-3 lead over North Carolina on Oct. 27 before going on a 13-0 run.
- The Deacs fell behind Navy 17-14 in the second quarter then outscored the Midshipmen 30-7 over the final 40 minutes of the game.
- Trailing Florida State 14-7, Wake ran off 17 straight points to take a 24-14 lead before winning 24-21.
- At Duke on Oct. 6, the Deacons trailed 9-0 before scoring 34 consecutive points to lead 34-9 in the third quarter.
- At home with Maryland on Sept. 22, WFU trailed 24-3 before scoring 28 unanswered points to win 31-24 in OT.

The only two coaches to leave Wake Forest's staff since Grobe came on board were Troy Calhoun who returned to the Air Force Academy and succeeded Fisher DeBerry as the Falcons' head coach following the 2006 season . . . Calhoun was replaced by Elrod . . . Wide receiver coach Kevin Sherman left after the 2005 campaign to accept a similar position at Virginia Tech and was replaced by Billings.

The Deacons posted a 5-4 mark in 2001, 4-3 in 2002, 1-3 in 2003, 2-6 in 2004, 2-2 in 2005, and 5-0 in 2006 . . . WFU is 3-2 in 2007 with a 20-17 loss to Nebraska, a 31-24 overtime win over Maryland, a 41-36 win at Duke, a 24-21 win over Florida State and a 17-16 loss at Virginia on Nov. 3.

Similar Season-Opening Shoulder Stories

When Riley Skinner suffered a separated shoulder in the season-opener at Boston College, a feeling of deja vu permeated the injury . . . In the 2006 season opener, Skinner came off the bench to lead the Deacons to a 20-10 win over Syracuse . . . Skinner got the call after starting QB Benjamin Mauk suffered a dislocated shoulder and broken arm while diving for a fumble . . . And Skinner was the number two quarterback because Brett Hodges had suffered a shoulder separation in the weeks leading up to the 2006 season.



Noting the NC State game

The Deacons defeated NC State 38-18 at BB&T Field on Nov. 17 . . . Kenneth Moore caught eight passes to set the school record for receptions in a season with 78... Aaron Curry's 57-yard touchdown return of an interception was his third of the year . . . He tied the NCAA record for interception returns for a touchdown in a season by a linebacker at three . . . Curry also moved in front of Alphonso Smith to become Wake's all-time leader in career interception return yards with 256 . . . The win gave the Deacs a 5-1 record at BB&T Field this season . . . The victory also gave Wake Forest back-to-back sweeps of the Tobacco Road Series (Duke, North Carolina, NC State) for the first time in school history . . . De'Angelo Bryant scored two touchdowns including his first career receiving touchdown . . . WFU set a record for average home attendance in a season at 32,595 . . . WFU won for the first time after winning the coin toss . . . Jim Grobe's record against in-state opponents improved to 22-5.

Noting the Clemson game

Wake Forest fell 44-10 at Clemson on Nov. 10...
The loss was the second straight for the Deacons... Wake Forest is 0-2 when winning the coin toss this season... Since the start of the 2006 season, Wake Forest is 17-7... Four of those losses have come against ranked teams, including #20 Clemson... QB Riley Skinner completed 20 or more passes for the sixth time this season... He finished the game 21 of 30 for 170

yards...TE Ben Wooster made his first career catch...Clemson became the first opponent since Duke on Oct. 6 to score on its opening drive...C.J. Spiller's 90-yard kickoff return for a touchdown marked the first time an opponent went the distance since Northern Illinois in 2002.

Noting the Virginia game

Wake Forest dropped a 17-16 decision at Virginia on Nov. 3... It was the first 1-point decision for the Deacons since a 14-13 win over Duke on Sept. 9, 2006 . . . It was WFU's first 1-point loss since a 42-41 overtime defeat at Northern Illinois on Aug. 29, 2002 . . . Sam Swank kicked three field goals to collect his 17th career multi-field goal game and his ninth three-field goal game . . . Swank also extended his school record for career PATs to 93 . . . Freshman WR Jordan Williams made his first career reception . . . He caught four passes for 18 yards . . . Virginia deliberately avoided kicking off to Kevin Marion, the nation's kickoff return leader . . . Marion had just one return for 26 yards . . . Kenneth Moore lined up at quarterback on Wake Forest's first play of the game.

Noting the North Carolina game

Wake Forest's 37-10 win over North Carolina on Oct. 27 marked its second straight victory over the Tar Heels... It was Wake's largest margin of victory over UNC since a 31-0 win in 2002... Jim Grobe improved to 21-5 against North Carolina-based schools... The Deacons have won seven straight games against in-state competition

... Sam Swank scored 13 points on three field goals and four PATs... That made him the Wake Forest career scoring leader with 251 career points ... Kevin Marion returned a kickoff 98 yards for a touchdown and added an 83-yard return that set up another touchdown... Aaron Curry intercepted two passes, returning one 77 yards for a score . . . Grobe's career record moved to six games over .500 for the first time in his tenure . . WFU's 37 points were the most it had scored against UNC since a 42-24 win in 1988.

Noting the Navy game

Wake Forest's 44 points vs. Navy marked the second-high point total by a Deacon team in the Jim Grobe era . . . The most points, 45, came in a 45-17 win over Clemson in 2003 . . . The Deacons also have posted a 44-6 win over Duke in 2005 and a 44-34 win over East Carolina the same season . . . Wake Forest's 20 point win over Navy marked the Deacs' greatest margin of victory since a 30-0 win at Florida State last season . . . Following Kevin Marion's 80-yard kickoff return to start the game, WFU put together a three-play scoring drive that resulted in a 13-yard touchdown pass from Riley Skinner to Kenny Moore with 14:01 to play in the first quarter . . . It ranks as the fifth-fastest touchdown in school history. . . Kenny Moore tied his own school record with 15 receptions vs. Navy . . . He also set a personal best with 181 receiving yards and two touchdowns . . . Josh Adams recorded his second consecutive 100-yard rushing day with 131 yards vs. the Middies.

Wake Forest defeated #21 Florida State 24-21 on ESPN on Oct. 11 at BB&T Field . . . The crowd of 32,906 was the largest home crowd of the season . . . Sam Swank's 48-yard field goal was his longest of the season and gave the Deacons a 24-14 win . . . The Deacons have now defeated Florida State in consecutive years for the first time in school history . . . Wake Forest suffered a blocked punt for the first time since Sept. 4, 2004 at Clemson . . . Chip Vaughn recorded his first career interception . . . Wake held FSU to 47 yards rushing . . . WFU was 6-of-17 on third down conversions including 6-of-11 in the second half . . . Riley Skinner threw two touchdown passes in a game for the first time in his career . . . Skinner now has started 13 victories in his career, the third-most in school history.

Noting the Duke Game

Wake Forest fell behind Duke 9-0 in the opening minutes of the game on Oct. 6 but rallied to score 34 unanswered points to take a 34-9 lead . . . The Deacons won the contest 41-36 . . . RG Barrett McMillin earned his first career start as did TB Josh Adams . . . DE Matt Robinson saw his first action since the season opener at Boston College when he suffered a sprained ankle . . . WR Chip Brinkman matched his career high with five receptions and set a new personal best with 31 receiving yards . . . De'Angelo Bryant made a career-high two receptions . . . He also scored on a 1-yard run on his only carry of the game . . . Kenny Moore's 53-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter was the longest carry of his career . . . Jonathan Jones had a career-best six tackles vs. the Blue Devils.

Noting the Maryland Game

Wake Forest's 31-24 overtime win over Maryland on Sept. 22 marked the Deacons' first-ever overtime win . . . WFU had been 0-4 in the extra period . . . WFU erased a 21-point deficit (24-3) to make the Maryland win the second-largest comeback win ever . . . WFU had trailed North Carolina 24-0 in 2001 before storming back for a 32-31 win . . . Maryland ran 14 offensive plays in the fourth quarter and gained just 29 yards . . . LB Hunter Haynes collected the first two sacks of his career . . . TB Josh Adams posted career-highs with 20 carries and 91 rushing yards.

Noting The Army Game

Wake Forest's first win of the season was a 21-10 victory over Army on Sept. 15, 2007 at BB&T Field . . . Redshirt sophomore Brandon Ghee earned his first career start at cornerback . . . Stanley Arnoux notched his second career interception . . . Josh Adams posted career-bests for carries (9) and rushing yards (64) in a game . . . He also scored his first career touchdown . . . Sam Swank's 64-yard punt was his longest of the season . . . Redshirt freshman RB Lucas Caparelli earned his first collegiate carries but left the game with a shoulder injury . . . WFU suffered its first fumble of the season . . . Quarterback Brett Hodges completed his first seven pass attempts and did not throw an incompletion until the final minute of the third quarter . . . Redshirt freshman LB Hunter Haynes earned his first collegiate start and made a career-high eight stops vs. the Black Knights.

Noting the Nebraska Game

Sophomore quarterback Brett Hodges made his first career start against Nebraska . . . He completed 12 of 24 passes for 140 yards and two interceptions . . . Hodges also rushed for his first career touchdown . . . TB Josh Adams saw his first action in the backfield . . . The redshirt freshman from Cary, NC carried eight times for 31 yards and also caught two passes for 11 yards . . . Hodges connected with WR Kevin Marion on a 61-yard pass play that was the longest of each player's career . . . CB Kerry Major had his first career interception, picking off Nebraska's Sam Keller late in the third quarter . . . Kenny Moore has now accumulated at least 100 yards in each of the first two games . . . Moore had 15 catches for 126 yards in the opener while he carried eight times for 116 yards vs. Nebraska . . . Moore totaled 199 all-purpose yards vs. the Huskers including 35 on receptions, 14 on punt returns and 34 on kickoff returns.

Alphonso Smith's interception on BC's first offensive play marked his seventh career pick \dots It was his second interception return for a touchdown \dots QB Riley Skinner has thrown at least one touchdown pass in 10 of his 14 career starts \dots He had career-highs for attempts (37), completions (28) and interceptions (3) \dots The 28 completions fell one shy of making the school top 10 list for completions in a game \dots Kenny Moore tied the school record with 15 receptions \dots The ACC record is $16 \dots$ Moore finished with a career-high 126 receiving yards \dots Chip Vaughn's 38-yard fumble



return marked his first career touchdown ... Brett Hodges saw the most extensive action of his young career when he replaced Skinner in the third quarter after the starter suffered a mild shoulder separation . . . Hodges completed 17 of 23 passes for 130 yards, all career-bests . . . He also threw his first career TD pass when he hit Kevin Harris with a 12-yard completion . . . DB Marcus Williams made his first career interception . . . Demir Boldin played for the first time since 2005 . . . TE John Tereshinski had career-highs with six catches for 75 yards . . . Kevin Marion also posted a career-high five catches . . . TE Zac Selmon matched his career-best with three catches.

Watch Lists

A number of Wake Forest players have made the Watch Lists for major postseason awards . . . Senior center Steve Justice is on the Rotary Lombardi Award Watch List as well as for the Rimington and Outland Trophy . . . Sophomore quarterback Riley Skinner is one of 35 quarterbacks on the watch list for the 2007 Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award . . . And punter Sam Swank is on the Watch List for both the Lou Groza Placekicker Award and the Ray Guy Punter Award . . . Swank was a semifinalist for the Groza Award and the Ray Guy Award in 2006 . . . Senior defensive end Jeremy Thompson is on the Ted Hendricks Award watch list.

Know Your Williams'

Wake Forest has five players with the last name of Williams . . . Three of those have first names starting with M (Marcus, Marshall and Mike) . . And in the case of Marcus and Marshall, both names start with MA . . . Equipment manager Demetrius Gibson has solved the problem by making the name plate on Marshall Williams' jersey "M. Williams" . . . Mike Williams will be "Mi. Williams" and Marcus will wear "Williams, Jr.."

BB&T Field

Wake Forest University plays all of its home games at BB&T Field . . . WFU and BB&T announced a 10-year agreement on Sept. 5 . . . "Wake Forest University and BB&T are both major hometown institutions," said Ron Wellman, director of athletics at Wake Forest . . . "We both share the same vision of Winston-Salem in terms of values, ideals and a future vision for the community" . . . "We're proud of our close relationship with Wake Forest University and the Demon Deacons athletics program," said BB&T Chief Marketing Officer Steve Wiggs. "This agreement takes BB&T's long association with

the university to a higher level, just as the football team is realizing its best performance ever on the field"... BB&T Corporation is the nation's 11th largest financial holding company and is headquartered in Winston-Salem.

Wake Forest Among National Leaders in Season Ticket Sales

Wake Forest University has sold almost three times as many season tickets as it has total enrollment . . . WFU sold 17,000 season tickets for the 2007 football season, an outstanding accomplishment for an institution of less than 5,000 undergrads . . . Including grad students, WFU's total enrollment is 6,739 . . . The following are season ticket sales for Football Bowl Subdivision (formerly I-A) institutions with a total enrollment (graduate and undergraduate) of less than 10,000:

Fast Starts

In the season opener against Boston College, Wake Forest kicked off to start the game . . . On BC's first play from scrimmage, WFU cornerback Alphonso Smith intercepted Matt Ryan's pass and returned it 21 yards for a touchdown . . . That play came with just 14 seconds elapsed off the game clock . . . That tied for the secondquickest score in school history . . . The Deacs also scored 14 seconds into a game against Virginia Tech in 1975 when they returned a fumble for a score . . . The fastest score in Deacon annals occurred in 1975 when Virginia fumbled the opening kickoff and WFU scored a safety . . . That came just six seconds into the game . . . Against Navy on Oct. 20, WFU scored on its third play from scrimmage with 14:01 remaining in the first quarter, the fifth-fastest touchdown in school history.

Attendance Soars

A crowd of 32,483 attended the home-opener between Wake Forest and Nebraska at BB&T Field on Sept. 8 . . . That marked the 16th-largest crowd ever at BB&T Field . . . The attendance at the Sept. 15 game against Army was 32,142, the 19th-largest crowd in BB&T Field history . . . WFU posted the 15th-largest crowd in school history with 32,906 vs. Florida State on Oct. 11

Wake Forest at Vanderbilt, Nov. 24, 2007

... The Deacons averaged 32,515 fans per home game last year to break the school record for season average ... WFU has broken its season attendance average in three of the last four years.

2006 Season Accomplishments

- Wake Forest won only its second ACC title and its first since 1970.
- The Deacons won the ACC's Atlantic Division after being picked to finish last by the league's media during the preseason.
- Wake Forest shattered the school record for most wins in a season with 11. The previous record was eight (1944, 1979, 1992).
- Wake Forest was the first team in history (out of 113) to go 6-0 in road games. Overall, the Deacons won seven contests away from BB&T Field (including the ACC Championship Game).
- Judging by win differential, Wake Forest was the most improved team in America. The 2005 Deacons went 4-7 and the 2006 Deacons are 11-2, a plus-seven compared to 2005.
- Wake Forest had six ACC wins for first time in school history.
- Wake Forest finished with a winning record in the ACC for the first time since 1988 and the seventh time ever.
- The Deacons were ranked in the top 25 for nine straight weeks for the first time ever.
- Wake Forest swept its ACC Tobacco Road rivals for the first time since 1987.
- Wake Forest's five wins in September marked the most victories in any month of any year in Deacon history.
- Wake Forest beat Florida State in Tallahassee for the first time since 1959.
- The Deacons won a game in Florida for the first time since 1959, snapping a 17-game losing streak.
- Wake Forest beat NC State in Raleigh for the first time since 1984.
- Wake Forest beat Maryland for the first time since 1998.

Grobe: National Coach of the Year

In his sixth season at Wake Forest, coach Jim Grobe's Deacons were picked to finish last in the Atlantic Division . . . Then Wake Forest lost its top pass rusher, its starting quarterback and its preseason All-ACC running back — all to season-ending injuries . . . But Grobe led the Deacons through the adversity and all the way to an ACC Championship, its first in 36 years . . . Grobe, who became the first Wake Forest coach to take the Deacons to a pair of bowl games in the ACC era, was named national coach of the year by his peers and the media . . . The media outlets and organizations that honored Grobe were the



American Football Coaches Association, Associated Press, Bobby Dodd Foundation, CBS Sportsline and The Sporting News...Legendary coach and current ESPN analyst Lou Holtz noted, "Among fellow coaches, there was no doubt that Jim Grobe was a special coach. He didn't need a season like this to validate himself. To the media, yes. To the fans, yes. But to fellow coaches, no."

Skinner Named ACC Rookie of the Year

Ouarterback Riley Skinner was voted the ACC's Rookie of the Year in 2006 as he led the league in three passing categories . . . He received 48 of a possible 80 votes from the league's media...The Jacksonville, Fla. native led the ACC in passing efficiency, completion percentage and interception rate . . . Skinner and Texas' Colt McCoy were the only freshmen quarterbacks in the country to post 10 wins as a starter . . . Clemson running back C.J. Spiller was the runner-up with 25 votes . . . Darrius Heyward-Bey of Maryland, North Carolina's Hakeem Nicks and Myron Rolle of Florida State each received two votes . . . Skinner became the third Wake Forest player to win the ACC's Rookie of the Year award . . . He joined James McDougald (1976) and Michael Ramseur (1982).

All-ACC Selections

Wake Forest set a school record by placing nine players on the All-Atlantic Coast Conference team in 2006 . . . Five Deacons were named first team All-ACC, tying Clemson for the most first-team selections . . . The selections are made by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association . . . Wake's nine selections broke a school record of six shared by the 1970 ACC championship team and the 1992 Deacon team . . . Earning All-ACC honors in 2006 were senior offensive tackle Steve Vallos, senior safety Josh Gattis and junior linebacker Jon Abbate . . . All three have departed . . . The lone first team selections returning are center Steve Justice and placekicker Sam Swank . . . Swank was one of just five sophomores to earn first team All-ACC . . . He was also named honorable mention as a punter . . . QB Riley Skinner was a second team selection despite not being on the ballot . . . Skinner received enough write-in votes to be chosen second team . . . Two other departed seniors, defensive end Jyles Tucker and safety Patrick Ghee, also earned honorable mention status.

Temporary Press Box Tower

Wake Forest is in the midst of a football stadium renovation with the construction of Deacon Tower . . . Phase Three of the BB&T Field renovation project began in January with the demolition of the former press box . . . Construction is well underway on the 123,000-square foot Deacon Tower project which will stand seven stories and 125 feet high and will include premium seating, a new President's box and upgraded press accommodations . . . Phase Three also includes ground level concessions and a signature entry point for the stadium . . . Phases One and Two, which included cosmetic and structural improvements to the stadium and installation of FieldTurf, were completed prior to the start of the 2006 season.

Grobe Signs New Contract

Head coach Jim Grobe signed a new 10-year contract on February 27, 2007 . . . Athletic director Ron Wellman made the surprise announcement at the conclusion of the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year banquet that night.

North Carolina Legislature

The North Carolina State Legislature honored the Wake Forest football team in Raleigh on March 7, 2007 as State Senators Fred Smith and John Snow, both Wake Forest graduates and former members of the Demon Deacon football team in the 1960's, presented a joint resolution that recognized Wake Forest's ACC Championship and berth in the FedEx Orange Bowl. Head coach Jim Grobe and the entire Wake Forest football team bussed to Raleigh to be on hand for the presentation.

The Nation's Biggest Turnaround

Wake Forest won seven more games in 2006 than it did in 2005 . . . In terms of actual wins and losses, the Deacons enjoyed the biggest positive turnaround in the nation . . . The Deacons went 4-7 in 2005, but returned 18 starters, including 10 on defense . . . Wake Forest went 11-3 in 2006 . . . This was not Grobe's first turnaround at Wake Forest . . . He inherited a Deacon squad that went 2-9 in 2000, but led the 2001 Wake Forest team to a 6-5 mark . . . Grobe came to Wake Forest after building Ohio University into a perennial contender in the Mid-American Conference . . . He inherited an Ohio program that had won 17 games in the 10 seasons prior to Grobe's arrival. Grobe coached there for six seasons and led the Bobcats to a 33-33-1 record.

Poll Position in 2006

The Deacons finished 18th in the 2006 AP poll, 17th in the *USA Today* poll and 14th in the BCS . . . Wake was in the top 25 for nine straight weeks, the longest streak in program history.

Successful Spans In History

Wake Forest won 24 games in the four seasons from 2003 to 2006, the most in a four-year stretch since 1944-47 under head coach D.C. "Peahead" Walker . . . Wake Forest went to the first-ever Gator Bowl on January 1, 1946 . . . The most wins in any four-year period in Wake Forest history is 25, set in 1939-42 and 1944-47 . . . Wake Forest's 37 wins in Grobe's first six years in Winston-Salem ties for the most wins in any six-year span in program history (1939-44).

Four Key Players Return

In 2006, Wake Forest should benefit from the return of senior running back Micah Andrews, senior defensive end Matt Robinson, junior wide receiver Demir Boldin and sophomore defensive back Brandon Ghee . . . Andrews, Boldin and Robinson were all projected starters last season. . . Technically, the trio does not count toward Wake Forest's returning starter total. . . . If they did, the Deacons would have 18 starters back, including 10 on offense. Both numbers would rank second in the ACC . . . Andrews, a 2006 preseason All-ACC running back, missed the majority of last season with a torn ACL injury suffered on September 16 at Connecticut . . . Robinson was the team's leading pass rusher as a freshman and sophomore in 2004 and 2005. But the lingering effects of a broken kneecap, suffered in the 2005 finale against Miami, caused him to miss all of the 2006 campaign . . . Boldin and Ghee did not participate in any football-related activities in 2006 because of academics . . . In 2005, Boldin played sparingly as a freshman in the first half of the season . . . By season's end, he was an emerging talent . . . Boldin ranked second on the team in receiving yards, fourth in receptions and yards and led the team with 14.9 yards per catch . . . Boldin was also the best blocker of all the receivers, which helped bolster the run . . . Ghee, a heavily recruited player, was expected to play a large role last season as a redshirt freshman, particularly on special teams. . . Following the graduation of three starters in the secondary, one of which was his older brother, Patrick, the younger Ghee has seen increased playing time this fall.



Attendance Record Falls

Wake Forest broke its season average home attendance record last year . . . An average of 32,515 fans saw the Deacons go 4-2 at BB&T Field where the capacity is 31,500 . . . Wake Forest has broken its season average attendance record in three of the last four years.

Prone To Picking Off Passes

Wake Forest intercepted 22 passes in 2006 to rank second in the nation . . . A total of 10 different Deacons picked off passes . . . Wake Forest had four players with three or more interceptions, including Josh Gattis (5), Riley Swanson (4), Patrick Ghee (3) and Alphonso Smith (3) . . . The Deacons intercepted a pass in 11 straight games, a streak that ended in the Orange Bowl.

Turnover Story

Wake Forest ranked second in the ACC and sixth nationally last year with a plus-13 turnover ratio ... The Deacons had 31 takeaways and only 18 giveaways ... Wake Forest forced a turnover in every game last season.

Keeping Everyone On The Shelf

The Demon Deacons did not play a true freshman in 2006 . . . Wake Forest and Colorado State were the only two teams in the country that could make that claim.

Head Coach Jim Grobe

In his first five years at Wake Forest, Jim Grobe brought respectability back to the Demon Deacon football program. In his sixth year, Grobe brought an ACC Championship and a berth in the FedEx Orange Bowl.

Long regarded as a coach who "gets the most



out of his talent," Grobe and his staff are now recognized as great coaches who coach great players.

And the accolades poured in.

In 2006, Grobe was the unanimous choice as the ACC's Coach of the Year in a vote by the league's media. He

was selected as the National Coach of the Year by American Football Coaches Association, Bobby Dodd Foundation, the Associated Press, The Sporting News and CBS Sportsline.com.

In 2006, Grobe's Deacons broke nearly every school record imaginable and reached several milestones.

Consider:

- Wake Forest won only its second ACC title and its first since 1970.
- The Deacons won the ACC's Atlantic Division after being picked to finish last by the league's media in the preseason.
- With 11 wins, Wake Forest shattered the school record for most victories in a season.
- The previous record was eight (1944, 1979 and 1992). Wake Forest was the first team in history (out of 113) to go 6-0 in road games.
- Wake Forest was the most improved team in America, winning seven more games in 2006 than in 2005. The 2005 Deacons went 4-7 and the 2006 Deacons went 11-3.
- The Deacons were ranked in the AP top 25 for nine straight weeks, the longest stretch in history. Wake Forest swept its ACC Tobacco Road rivals for the first time since 1987.
- Wake beat Florida State in Tallahassee for the first time since 1959, NC State in Raleigh for the first time since 1984 and Maryland for the first since 1998.

It hasn't been easy.

Grobe was hired in December 2000 to take over a Demon Deacon football program long regarded as an afterthought in the ACC.

Grobe inherited a Wake Forest program that won only 38 games in the 1990's.

In six seasons, Grobe's teams won 37 contests, earned two bowl berths and won an ACC Championship.

That is particularly impressive given the recent ACC expansion that introduced three nationally-prominent programs to the league.

Even with the rising level of play in the conference, making the ACC arguably the nation's best football league, Wake Forest has become even more competitive and successful.

Football observers have recognized Grobe's efforts in transforming Wake Forest as one of the rising programs, not just in the ACC, but on a regional and national basis.

The levels of excitement and expectation surrounding Demon Deacon football have reached unprecedented heights. That is a tribute to Grobe and his staff who believe the best is yet to come.

Grobe, who turned 55 in February, has gained a national reputation as a builder of programs.

He came to Wake Forest after turning a struggling Ohio University program into a contender for the Mid-American Conference championship.

In the seasons before Grobe left his assistant's position at the Air Force Academy to become Ohio University's head coach, the Bobcats won 17 games. In the six years under Grobe, they won 33 and finished with winning records in the Mid-American Conference five straight seasons.

Grobe coached at Ohio for six years (1995-2000. After taking over the reigns of a program that went 0-11 and was ranked last among Division I-A programs in 1994, Grobe led the Bobcats to a cumulative six-year record of 33-33-1.

A 1975 University of Virginia graduate, Grobe gained valuable experience as an assistant to Fisher DeBerry at the Air Force Academy prior to going to Ohio. He served as linebackers coach from 1984 to 1994, during which the Falcons produced a record of 84-50 and appeared in seven bowl games.

Grobe was born on Feb. 17, 1952. A native of Huntington, W. Va., Grobe earned his undergraduate degree (B.S.) in education from Virginia in 1975 and earned a Master's degree in guidance and counseling in 1978.

CHESTNUT HILL, MA - Boston College's Matt Ryan threw four touchdown passes to lead the Eagles to a season-opening 38-28 win over Wake Forest on Sept. 1 at Alumni Stadium

Wake Forest built a 14-0 first quarter lead. Alphonso Smith intercepted Ryan on the first play from scrimmage and returned it 21 yards for a touchdown. Kenneth Moore added a five-yard scoring catch from Riley Skinner with 8:05 to play in the first to stake the Deacons to a 14-0 lead.

Ryan threw scoring passes on two of BC's next three possessions. He hit Kevin Challenger on a 19-yard pass with 4:38 to play in the first. Following a 22-yard WFU pass that gave BC the ball at the WFU 38, Ryan's first pass went 38 yards to Rich Gunnell for a touchdown to tie the game at 14.

Game 2 Nebraska 20, Wake Forest 17 Saturday, September 8, 2007

WINSTON-SALEM, NC - Wake Forest held advantages in most offensive categories except for the final score in a 20-17 loss to 16th-ranked Nebraska on Sept. 8 at BB&T Field. WFU outgained the Huskers 236 to 115 on the ground and held a 376-373 advantage in total offense.

Nebraska took a 3-0 lead midway through the first quarter on a 22-yard field goal by Alex Henery. WFU's Sam Swank knotted the score with a 25-yard field goal early in the second quarter. The Cornhuskers went up 6-3 on Henery's 22-yarder with 7:41 to play in the second. Wake Forest took its first lead of the game with 5:13 to play when Hodges ran over from the one.

Following a WFU punt, Nebraska started from its own 20 and quarterback Sam Keller drove the Huskers to the WFU 25. He then hit Sean Hill for 25 yards and the touchdown giving NU a 13-10 halftime advantage.

Kenny Moore's five-yard scoring run with 10:52 to play in the third put Wake Forest ahead 17-13. Moore helped set up the score with a 38-yard run from scrimmage on a first-and-10 from the NU 47.

Nebraska regained the lead with 8:13 to play in the third when Marlon Lucky, who finished the game with 90 yards rushing, raced 22 yards for a score to give Nebraska a 20-17 lead.

Wake Forest had a prime opportunity to take the lead — or at least tie the score — midway through the fourth, when John Russell intercepted a pass at the Nebraska 10-yard line. The Huskers got the ball back three plays later when Zack Bowman stepped in front of Hodges's pass with 6:05 to play.

Wake Forest's last chance came after stopping Nebraska on downs with 1:54 to play. Ben Eisenhart seemed to intercept Hodges's third-down pass near midfield, but replay officials reversed the ruling. It did not matter — Hodges's final pass missed Kenny Moore, allowing the Huskers to run out the clock.

Nebraska — which rushed for 413 yards in a season-opening rout of Nevada — managed only 27 on the ground by halftime against Wake and finished with 115. Lucky, who had a career-high 233 yards rushing last week, had 90 yards on 24 carries.

WINSTON-SALEM, NC - In one of the most remarkable comebacks in school history, Wake Forest eliminated a 24-3 deficit late in the third quarter to post a 31-24 win over Maryland in overtime at BB&T Field.

Maryland built a 24-3 lead on rushing touchdowns by Lance Ball, Cory Jackson and Keon Lattimore. Following a 54-yard run by Darrius Heyward-Bey, the Terps faced 1st-and-goal at the Wake 3 with an opportunity to go ahead 31-3. But Alphonso Smith stepped in front of a Jordan Steffy pass and returned it 100-yards for a touchdown, the longest interception return in WFU history.

That interception sparked the Deacons. Riley Skinner closed the gap to 24-17 with a 1-yard plunge with 7:55 to play and then found tight end John Tereshinski in the end zone with three seconds left to pull Wake to within one at 24-23. Sam Swank knotted the game with his PAT.

In overtime, Wake Forest handed the ball to Josh Adams on three consecutive carries, the final one the winning touchdown from 6 yards out. On Maryland's overtime possession, Stanley Arnoux and Chantz McClinic sacked Steffy on third down before Jeremy Thompson sacked him on fourth down.

DURHAM, NC - Wake Forest fell behind 9-0 less than four minutes into the game then roared back by scoring 34 unanswered points in a 41-36 win at Duke on Oct. 6.

The win was Wake Forest's third straight win and left the Deacons with a 3-2 overall record and a 2-1 mark in the ACC.

After taking a 34-9 lead midway through the third quarter, Wake Forest yielded three straight touchdowns to the Blue Devils who managed to cut the margin to just five points at 34-29 with 11:05 to play in the game. Kenny Moore's 53-yard touchdown sprint with 2:24 left in the game sealed the win for the Deacons, despite a late touchdown by Duke that made the final margin just five points.

Duke took a 2-0 lead after a punt snap sailed over Sam Swank's head before he could retrieve the ball and throw it out of the end zone for a safety. Thaddeus Lewis then hit Eron Riley with a 68-yard scoring pass and the Blue Devils led 9-0 with 11:29 to play in the first quarter.

Wake Forest's scoring onslaught started with a 1-yard run by De'Angelo Bryant. Swank added a 26-yard field goal before Moore tallied the first of his two touchdowns, this coming on a 21-yard run. Micah Andrews' four-yard run with eight seconds left in the second quarter gave Wake Forest a 24-9 halftime lead.

In the third quarter, Swank hit an 18-yard field goal before Alphonso Smith intercepted a Lewis pass and returned it 30 yards for a touchdown, his third of the year.

Duke rallied behind Lewis who threw a two-yard scoring pass to Riley and a 31-yarder to Jomar Wright sandwiched between a three-yard run by Justin Boyle. After Moore's 53-yard touchdown run cemented the win, Duke added a late score on a 19-yard pass from Lewis to Austin Kelly. WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) - Kevin Marion returned a kickoff 98 yards for a touchdown and Wake Forest routed North Carolina 37-10.

Linebacker Aaron Curry returned one of his two interceptions 77 yards for a touchdown the Demon Deacons' ninth non-offensive TD of the season.

Riley Skinner completed 12 of 15 passes for 133 yards to help Wake Forest (6-2, 4-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) win its sixth straight and remain behind only unbeaten Boston College in the Atlantic Division race.

Marion also returned a fourth-quarter kickoff 83 yards to set up Josh Adams' second scoring run of the game. WFU won its seventh straight against a North Carolina-based team.

Curry picked Yates off twice, jumping in front of a fourth-quarter pass at the Wake Forest 23 and racing down the left sideline for his second interception return for a touchdown of the season - and the Demon Deacons' fifth of the year.

Wake Forest scored the first three times it touched the ball, with Curry intercepting Yates on the first play of the game to set up Sam Swank's 23-yard field goal.

Wake Forest then went 73 yards in 12 plays, with Skinner completing 4 of 4 passes for 48 yards and Adams running 6 yards for a touchdown to make it 10-0.

After Connor Barth made it a 7-point game with a 38-yard field goal early in the second, Marion took the ensuing kickoff at the 2 and burst untouched down the right sideline and into the end zone for the second-longest kick return in school history.

Swank became Wake Forest's career scoring leader, later adding field goals of 22 and 46 yards and kicking three extra points to move to 251 points - 11 ahead of the 240 scored by running back Chris Barclay from 2002-2005.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, VA - Mikell Simpson ran 1 yard for a touchdown with 2:18 to play Saturday and Virginia beat No. 21 Wake Forest 17-16, the Cavaliers' third one-point victory in four games and the first loss for the Demon Deacons in seven games.

Skinner hit Kenny Moore for 25 yards on a third-and-8, took a quarterback sneak 2 yards to the Virginia 32 on a fourth-and-1 and ran 12 yards when all his receivers were covered to the Cavaliers 18 on another third-and-8. On the touchdown, he scrambled to his right and had room to run, but stopped and threw a laser to Moore in the end zone.

That gave Wake Forest the lead at 13-10.

The Cavaliers drove 56 yards in 61 seconds just before halftime to take a 10-6 lead. Sewell and Maurice Covington teamed up twice on the drive — a 17-yard completion to start it and a 39-yarder for Covington's first career touchdown with 0:10 left.

Virginia missed an early chance when it drove to the Deacons 19 before Simpson and Sewell botched the exchange on a handoff and Chantz McClinic recovered for Wake Forest.

Wake missed one when Swank's 43-yard field goal try with 3:47 left in the first half hit the left upright.

Game 11 Wake Forest 38, North Carolina State 18 Saturday, November 17, 2007

WINSTON-SALEM, NC - De'Angelo Bryant scored two touchdowns and Aaron Curry returned an interception for a touchdown to lead Wake Forest to a 38-18 win over North Carolina State in the final home game of the season for the Deacons.

Bryant put the Deacs on the board first with a 1-yard run less than five minutes into the game. Redshirt freshman Josh Adams gave WFU a 14-3 lead midway through the second quarter with a 4-yard run. Bryant caught a 5-yard scoring pass from Riley Skinner with 2:14 to play in the second as Wake took a 21-3 lead to the locker room at halftime.

North Carolina State scored twice in the third quarter to pull within 3 at 21-18. Following Jamelle Eugene's 1-yard run, Skinner hit freshman Jordan Williams with a 62-yard pass that put the Deacs on top 28-18.

Curry had a 57-yard interception return for a touchdown with 5:24 to play in the game. It marked his third interception return for a score this season, tying the NCAA record for the most interception returns for a touchdown in a season by a linebacker.

The win left the Deacons at 7-4 overall and at 5-3 in the ACC.
