VANDERBILT WRAPS UP NON-CONFERENCE SCHEDULE WITH TRIP TO RICE

Vanderbilt finishes off the non-conference portion of its schedule when it travels to Houston to play Rice on Tuesday. The game tips at 7 p.m. CT and will be televised by CSS on a one-hour delay.

The Commodores (9-4) are coming off an 86-47 win over visiting Alabama A&M on Friday. Four Vanderbilt players reached double figures in scoring led by Derrick Byars' 20 points on 7-of-11 shooting. Shan Foster and Jermaine Beal added 12 points each while Dan Cage contributed 11 points.

Vanderbilt is coming off a strong showing in December, winning eight of nine games. Byars led all Commodores during the month with 16.4 points.

Rice (6-5) topped Western Carolina 67-62 at the Shamrock Office Solutions Classic in Moraga, Calif. on Dec. 29. The Owls are led by the nation's leading scorer in Morris Almond (30.3 ppg). The guard has reached double-figures in scoring in every game this season and also leads the team in rebounding with 6.1 per game.

Vanderbilt leads the all-time series with Rice 13-3. However, the Owls won the last meeting, a 78-77 decision at Memorial Gymnasium on Dec. 9, 1995.

SCOUTING RICE

Rice enters Tuesday's game having won four of its last five games. The Owls are coming off a 67-62 win over Western Carolina at the Shamrock Office Solutions Classic in Moraga, Calif.

Rice features one of the most gifted scorers in the nation in 6-6 guard Morris Almond. The Georgia native enters Tuesday's game averaging 30.3 points after dropping in 36

Entering last week the Owls led Conference USA in 3-point percentage (.445), were second in free throw percentage (.712) and third in field goal percentage (.486).

Rice won the last meeting in the series, 78-77, at Memorial Gymnasium in Nashville on Dec. 9, 1995. The lost snapped a 10-game win streak for Vanderbilt in the series.

Vanderbilt won the last meeting in Houston, 87-69, on Dec. 10, 1977.

COMMODORES TALLY EIGHT WINS IN DECEMBER

The Commodores closed out the month of December with an 8-1 mark (.889) with an 86-47 win Friday against Alabama A&M. It gave Vanderbilt its most wins in the month of December since the 1993 campaign when the Commodores were 8-0 that month and in the midst of a season-long 10-game win streak. That squad went on to win the SEC East title.

Vanderbilt's win percentage for December (.889) is the second highest for the final month of the calendar year since Vanderbilt was 7-0 (1.000) during the 2003-04 cam-

paign en route to the 2004 NCAA Sweet 16 run.

Commodore head coach Kevin Stallings improved to 43-12 (.782) in the month of December during his tenure.

Vanderbilt's nine games played in the month of December were the most played since the 1996-97 season (nine games). The school record for the most games during December is 11 (1966, 1970, 1971).

UPWARD TREND

After losing three of its four games in November, Vanderbilt has won eight of its last nine games entering the new year. The Commodores saw their seven-game win streak snapped in overtime by Appalachian State (87-79) in the championship game of the San Juan Shootout on Dec. 21.

BYARS LEADS COMMODORES IN DECEMBER

Senior swingman Derrick Byars led all Commodore scorers during December, averaging 16.4 points. He shot 49.5 percent from the field (53-of-107) and a team-best 42.0 percent from 3-point range (21-of-50).

Byars also averaged 4.2 rebounds and 3.2 assists during December.

Byars scored in double figures in all nine games during the month. He willed Vanderbilt to a 98-93 overtime win against Toledo with a career-high 28 points and five 3-pointers. The victory helped set the stage for Vanderbilt's seven-game win streak during the month.

Byars also poured in 18 point apiece against Lipscomb, Georgia Tech and Appalachian State. He ended the month with a 20-point effort against Alabama A&M.

- Ted Skuchas led the team shooting 70.6 percent from the field (24-of-34) during the month.
- Ross Neltner led Vanderbilt in rebounding (5.7 rpg) and was second in field goal shooting (59.4 percent).
- Alex Gordon handed out a team-high 37 assists to 14 turnovers.
- Dan Cage dished out 26 assists with six turnovers.
- Vanderbilt had 165 assists to 109 turnovers in the month while its opponents had 89 assists and 169 turnovers.
- The Commodores shot 74.2 percent from the foul line (141-of-190) during the month.

FOSTER & BYARS LEADING OFFENSIVE ATTACK

The wing tandem of Derrick Byars (15.2 ppg) and Shan Foster (14.3) lead Vanderbilt's offensive attack, currently averaging a combined 29.5 points and 9.3 rebounds on the season.

- Entering play Sunday, Byars ranked 12th in the SEC in scoring while Foster ranked 14th in the league.
- During the season, the duo has posted nearly identical numbers for 3-pointers made, free throws made, rebounds and steals. Byars is shooting 45.2 percent from the field (70-of-155) while Foster is shooting 42.1 percent (64-of-152).

NELTNER A STEADY PERFORMER

Ross Neltner continues to perform well in his first playing season with the Commodores after transferring from LSU. Neltner ranks third on the team in scoring (12.2 ppg) and is one of the team's best shooters and rebounders.

He leads the squad in rebounding with 5.7 per game and ranks second in field goal shooting at 59.2 percent.

The 2003 Kentucky Mr. Basketball honoree has scored in double figures in eight of Vanderbilt's last 11 games and recorded his first career double-double (15 points, 11 rebounds) against Nicholls State on Dec. 16.

- He accounted for a career-high 20 points on 8-of-12 shooting as well as eight rebounds against Toledo.
- He posted 16 points on 7-of-12 shooting to go along with seven rebounds against Appalachian State.

CASHING IN AT THE LINE

Entering Sunday, Vanderbilt led the SEC in free throw shooting at 73.6 percent for the season. Two Commodores ranked among the league leaders, including Shan Foster (sixth at 80.5 percent) and Ross Neltner (eighth at 78.3 percent).

- Dan Cage has made nine consecutive free throws; 47 of his last 51 from the line (92.2 percent) dating back to the start of last season; and 56-of-60 attempts (93.3 percent) since Dec. 1, 2004.

METCALFE MAKES FIRST APPEARANCE SINCE INJURY

Vanderbilt junior forward Alan Metcalfe made his first appearance on the court in over a month when he played eight minutes against Alabama A&M on Dec. 29.

Metcalfe missed 10 games and 37 days after breaking the second metatarsal in his left foot midway through the second half of Vanderbilt's 88-78 setback in Winston Salem on Nov. 21.

Metcalfe tallied four points and one rebound against Alabama A&M. He was averaging 5.5 points and 3.5 rebounds before the injury.

RODRIGUEZ JOINS COMMODORES AS A WALK-ON

David Rodriguez joined the Vanderbilt basketball squad as a walk-on Commodore head coach Kevin Stallings announced prior to Alabama A&M game on Dec. 29.

The 6-2, 180-pound sophomore guard from Sarasota, Fla. averaged 15 points, six rebounds and three assists as a senior at Out-of-Door Academy, a class 1-A school in Sarasota. He helped lead the Thunder to the District championship as a junior and was named the team's most valuable player as a sophomore and junior. He served as co-captain of two Thunder squads as a junior and senior.

Rodriguez, who wears No. 2 for the Commodores, played the final two minutes of Vanderbilt's 86-47 win against Alabama A&M.

Rodriguez joins junior Aubrey Hammond as one of two walk-ons on the Vanderbilt roster.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE SAN JUAN SHOOTOUT

- Derrick Byars and Dan Cage were named to the San Juan Shootout All-Tournament Team for their play in the Caribbean. Byars (46) edged Cage (45) for the most points scored in the tournament by a Commodore.
- Byars scored in double figures in all three games, including a team-high 18 points against Appalachian State in the championship game. Byars averaged 15.3 points and shot 47.2 percent (17-of-36) from the field in San Juan.
- Cage tied a career-high with 18 points thanks in part to four 3-pointers in the Commodores' game against UPR-Mayaguez. Cage, who also reached double figures in all three games, averaged 15.0 points while shooting a team-best 47.6 percent (10-of-21) from 3-point range.
- Ted Skuchas performed well with a career-high 17 points on 7-of-9 shooting to go along with six rebounds and three blocks against Tennessee Tech in second-round play. He was 5-of-5 from the field with 12 points against UPR-Mayaguez. For the tournament, Skuchas averaged 11.3 points and 4.7 rebounds while shooting 88.2 percent (15-of-17) from the field.
- Ross Neltner shot 63.6 percent (14-of-22) from the field during the tournament. He posted 16 points and seven rebounds against Appalachian State.
- Vanderbilt's 102-59 win over tournament-host UPR-Mayaguez set the Stallings era record for largest margin of victory (+43).

WORTH NOTING...

- Vanderbilt leads the league in turnover margin at +5.23. The Commodores rank second for the fewest turnovers in the SEC with 164. Only South Carolina (120 in 11 games) has taken better care of the basketball.
- The Commodores are first in the SEC with a 1.37 assist-to-turnover ratio. Vanderbilt is fourth in the league with 17.23 assists per game.
- Vanderbilt ranks third in the SEC in 3-point field goal percentage defense (.289). The Commodores held Alabama A&M to 1-of-14 shooting from beyond the arc on Dec. 29.
- Vanderbilt surrendered only 12 points in the first half of the Commodores 76-40 win over Nicholls State. It marked

the fewest points allowed in a half during the Stallings era.

- Vanderbilt's 15 steals against Nicholls State were the most under Kevin Stallings. Nine of the 10 Commodores who played against the Colonels recorded at least one steal. Jermaine Beal led the team with three.
- Vanderbilt's 73-64 win over No. 25 Georgia Tech snapped a nine-game losing to ranked opponents. The Commodores' last win against a Top 25 team came at home against then-No. 19 Alabama, 70-56, on Jan. 5, 2005. Vanderbilt's last home win against a Top 25 non-conference opponent came against then-No. 20 Virginia, 70-65, on Dec. 6, 1994.
- Vanderbilt cruised to a 104-62 win over East Tennessee State on Dec. 5. It marked the most points scored by a Commodore team since a 113-71 victory against Alabama A&M on Dec. 30, 1998. Previously, the most points scored by Vanderbilt under head coach Kevin Stallings were 101, posted in a 101-77 win over Western Kentucky on Dec. 18, 1999 and again three months later in a 101-89 win over Georgia on March 1, 2000.
- Three Commodores scored 20 or more points against Toledo in Vanderbilt's 98-83 overtime win on Dec. 2. Senior Derrick Byars netted a career-high 28, junior Shan Foster added 21 and junior transfer Ross Neltner posted a career-high 20. It marked the first time a trio of Commodores scored 20 or more points in a contest since the 1996 campaign. Malik Evans (29), Frank Seckar (27), and Drew Maddux (20) helped lead Vanderbilt to a 107-97 win over South Carolina in Memorial Gymnasium on Feb. 17, 1996.
- The Commodores trailed Toledo by as many as five points in overtime (92-87 with 2:27 left) before rallying for the victory. Vanderbilt scored 14 points in the extra stanza, the most points the Commodores have scored in an over-

- Shan Foster posted a standout week averaging 19.7 points and 6.3 rebounds in three Commodore victories over East Tennessee State, Lipscomb and Georgia Tech from Dec. 5 through Dec. 9. The wing player shot 52.7 percent from the field (20-of-38) and 50.0 percent (11-of-22) from 3-point range last week.
- Foster recorded his first career double-double with 29 points and a career-best 10 rebounds carrying Vanderbilt to a 104-62 win over East Tennessee State on Dec. 5. His seven 3-pointers against the Bucs were also a career-high.
- Foster netted 25 points on 9-of-14 shooting and five 3-pointers in Vanderbilt's 73-64 win over No. 25 Georgia Tech on Dec. 9. His two jumpers and a 3-pointer helped key the Commodores rally from a five-point deficit in the second half.

STALLINGS MILESTONES

- Vanderbilt head coach Kevin Stallings has achieved some milestones during the 2006-07 season.
- Stallings earned his 250th career coaching victory when Vanderbilt defeated No. 25 Georgia Tech, 73-64 on Dec. 9. In doing so, Stallings became the sixth active coach in the SEC to achieve 250 or more career coaching wins.
- Stallings moved into third place on Vanderbilt's all-time coaching wins list following the Commodores' 75-62 victory over Tennessee Tech in the second round of the San Juan Shootout. His career wins mark at Vanderbilt ranks behind only Roy Skinner (278) and Bob Polk (197).
- Stallings ranks as the second winningest coach at Vanderbilt's Memorial Gymnasium. He is second only to Skinner's 181 victories at the storied venue.
- For his career, Stallings owns a 254-163 overall mark in his 14th year. Stallings is 131-100 in his eighth season at Vanderbilt.

Stallings coached six seasons at Illinois State (1994-1999) where he amassed a 123-63 (.661) record before coming to Vanderbilt.

He played three seasons (1980-1982) at Purdue under Gene Keady before serving as an assistant in West Lafayette for six campaigns (1983-1988). He then worked as an assistant under Roy Williams at Kansas from 1989 to 1993.

Stallings reached the NCAA Final Four as a player at Purdue in 1980 and twice as assistant at Kansas in 1990 and 1993.

NEXT GAME: AT AUBURN

Vanderbilt opens SEC play at Auburn on Saturday, Jan. 6. Game time is set for 5:30 p.m. CT. The contest will be televised by FSN.

The Commodores own a 75-50 advantage in the all-time series. Vanderbilt won both meetings last year, 74-50 at Memorial Gymnasium and 76-71 in the first round of the SEC Tournament at Nashville's Gaylord Entertainment Center.

NWANKWO REMAINS A VALUED COMMODORE

College Park, Md., native Davis Nwankwo will watch today's game from the Vanderbilt bench after a heart condition — detected following his collapse at a practice last March — concluded his college playing career.

Nwankwo, played in 23 games, scoring 12 points and grabbed 30 rebounds last season as a redshirt freshman for the Commodores.

Nwankwo was advised to give up his athletic playing career following diagnosis of an enlarged heart condition known as hypertrophic cardiomyopathy. He suffered cardiac arrest during a practice session on March 6 leading up to Vanderbilt's appearance at the SEC Tournament.

Vanderbilt athletic trainer Mike Meyer revived Nwankwo after administering one shock from an automated external defibrillator (AED) and two rescue breaths. For his quick and steady response Meyer later was named the "Above and Beyond" Division I Athletic Trainer of the Year by the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA).

Nwankwo is believed to be only the second college athlete revived with this heart condition.

Considered a medical hardship, Nwankwo remains a student at Vanderbilt and attends Commodore practices. He will be present at all home and road contests.

METCALFE SHARES GRIEF IN TOLEDO'S LOSS

Vanderbilt junior forward Alan Metcalfe shares in the grief felt by the Toledo basketball program following the tragic loss of center Haris Charalambous earlier this fall.

The 21-year old reserve center for Toledo passed away on October 9 after collapsing near the start of a morning conditioning session.

Metcalfe and Charalambous were teammates in England as members of both the "Manchester Magic" Senior League Team and the England Junior National Team from 2000-2003.

Charalambous played in 23 games and averaged 0.8 points and 0.8 rebounds in 5.4 minutes for Toledo last season.

Metcalfe is from St. Helens, England while Charalambous was a native of Manchester.

COACHES TAB FOSTER FIRST TEAM ALL-SEC

Vanderbilt junior swingman Shan Foster was named Preseason First Team All-Southeastern Conference by the league's coaches.

Foster, who earned a similar postseason award from the coaches last year, ranks as the league's third-leading returning scorer, averaging 15.9 points a year ago. Foster finished his sophomore campaign ranked among the SEC's leaders in 3-pointers per game (second with 3.00), 3-point shooting percentage (fourth at .415), and field goal percentage (ninth at .451).

"Shan is very deserving of the award," head coach Kevin Stallings said. "For the better part of two years he has been very consistent and has proven to be one of the league's

best players.

"Preseason awards are nice but postseason honors have more meaning. I wouldn't be surprised if both Shan and Derrick (Byars) were on the list at the end of the season."

Foster is shooting 42.7 percent from 3-point range for his career - fourth best in school history. The Kenner, La. native ranks ninth at Vanderbilt with 159 career 3-pointers. His 90 3-pointers made a year ago tied for third place all-time.

The coaches' preseason All-SEC first and second teams consist of a minimum eight players on each squad. No ties were broken and no predicted order of finish was made.

SEC MEDIA PICKS COMMODORES FOURTH IN EAST

Vanderbilt was picked to finish fourth in the SEC Eastern Division by media attending the league's annual media days, Oct. 25-26, in Birmingham, Ala.

The Commodores received 138 points to finish behind defending national champion Florida (30), Kentucky (62) and Tennessee (84). South Carolina (146) was chosen fifth while Georgia (149) ended up sixth. Florida earned 28 of 29 first-place votes to win the division and 21 votes to be crowned the overall champion.

Alabama edged LSU in voting to win the Western Division title. The Crimson Tide received 16 votes to LSU's 13 votes.

HISTORIC MEMORIAL GYMNASIUM NOW IN 55TH SEASON

Storied Memorial Gymnasium is in its 55th season as the host venue of Vanderbilt basketball. The SEC's most historic hoops setting has played host to more than 800 men's contests as well as the 1984 and 1991 SEC Tournaments and 40 men's and women's NCAA Tournament contests (since the early 1980s).

As the oldest gymnasium in the SEC, Memorial Gymnasium is renowned for its end zone benches, raised floor and unique atmosphere. It was dedicated in 1952 as a memorial to all Vanderbilt men and women who served in World War II. It was built by the late master architect Edwin Keeble, who was commissioned to build a combination gymnasium/concert hall.

COMMODORES INK THREE SIGNEES

The Vanderbilt men's basketball program has received written commitments from three prospects during the fall signing period.

Head Coach Kevin Stallings announced Nov. 10 that center A.J. Ogilvy, guard Keegan Bell and forward Andre Walker have signed national letters of intent to attend Vanderbilt and play basketball for the Commodores beginning in the fall 2007.

"This is the start of a class that would be comparable to or even better than our current junior class," Stallings said. "We're off to a good start and look forward to signing one or maybe two more prospects."

Ogilvy, a 6-10, 250-pound big man from Canberra, Australia, is in his third season attending the Australian Institute of Sports where he has developed into one of the nation's premier post players. He averaged 16.5 points, 9.7 rebounds and 3.0 blocks in the 2006 Under-20 Nationals.

Ogilvy was named to the Oceania Under 19 Championship All-Star team after averaging 15 points, 10 rebounds and two blocks while competing in the 2006 qualifying series against New Zealand.

Other accolades for the Australian include representing the country at the Youth Olympics and being named the 2005 New South Wales Junior Basketball Player of the Year.

Ogilvy picked Vanderbilt over New Mexico, UNLV and St. Mary's.

"Some people have considered A.J. the best big man from Australia since Andrew Bogut," Stallings said. "He's a very exciting signee for us. He's almost seven-feet tall, moves very well and has a strong physical presence inside."

"He will come to us as one of the most complete post talents we've recruited at Vanderbilt."

Bell, a 6-1, 180-pound floor leader from Hazel Green, Ala. is listed among the nation's top 25 point guards by both Rivals.com and Scout.com. Bob Gibbons All-Star Report lists Bell as the 60th-best overall prospect.

Bell averaged 25 points and 11 assists as a junior at Bob Jones High School where he earned First Team All-State, All-Metro and All-Area accolades last season. He will play his senior campaign at Hazel Green High School.

Bell selected Vanderbilt over LSU and Ole Miss.

"Keegan has all the instincts you'd expect from someone who grew up in a basketball family," Stallings said of Bell whose father, Dan, has been a successful high school coach Alabama and Division I coach in Louisiana. "Keegan is an excellent ball handler and passer who possesses exceptional shooting skills and good quickness."

Walker is a 6-7, 210-pound forward from Flossmoor, Ill. The versatile Walker averaged 15 points, 8.2 rebounds and 2.6 assists at Homewood-Flossmoor High School as a senior last season. He is currently playing a post-graduate year at Brewster Academy, a prep school in Wolfeboro, N.H.

Named one of the most complete players in Chicago by the Chicago Tribune, Walker helped lead the Vikings to the Illinois Class 2A sectionals in both his junior and senior seasons. In summer 2005, Walker was a member of a Chicago Ferrari squad that won the 17-and-under AAU National Championship.

Walker chose Vanderbilt over Arizona State, Colorado and Seton Hall.

Jonathan Wallace had 16 points, and Jessie Sapp had 11 for the Hoyas.

Alex Gordon had 15 points off the bench, and Derrick Byars added 14 for Vanderbilt, which lost its season opener on its home court for the first time since 1990. Dan Cage had 10 points.

Fellow rookie Jamie Skeen added 16 points and 10 rebounds for the Demon Deacons (4-0), who took a double-digit lead late in the first half and stayed in control the rest of the way.

Shan Foster scored 23 points for the Commodores (0-2), who hung around but struggled to get the defensive stops they needed to get back in the game. Fellow wingman Derrick Byars added 18 points and a game-high 12 rebounds.

Most of that difficulty started with Smith, a 5-foot-11 freshman from Concord with impressive baseline-to-baseline speed. He provided the perfect floor leadership for coach Skip Prosser's up-tempo attack, repeatedly attacking the rim for easy baskets or to create opportunities for teammates. Behind Smith, the Demon Deacons shot 48 percent and finished with 17 fast-break points.
