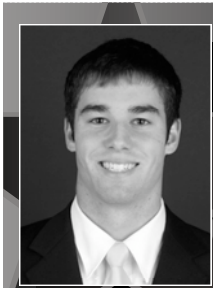

Omaha Challenge

The Commodores ended their fall conditioning with the fourth annual Omaha Challenge. The staff designed the competition to build team unity through numerous resistance, agility and conditioning tests.

Events included bench press reps, 360-yard sled pull, pull-ups, mile Omaha run, a towel hold and a tire flip-and-roll among others. The Challenge concluded with an obstacle course which included a monster tire flip and tractor push, as well as tests of brute strength, speed, agility, plyometrics and the burning desire to win.

Rock Stars won the team competition with 3,141 points, edging past the East/West All-Stars that finished with 3,134 points. The Rock Stars squad was comprised of Stephen Shao, David Price, Steven Liddle, Matt Shao, Carter Hawkins, Parker Hanks, Alex Hilliard, Brian Harris and Russell Brewer.

Freshman pitcher Mark Lamm of Team JUCO had the best score among pitchers with 560 points, one more than fellow JUCO member and team captain senior Casey Weathers. Sophomore outfielder Jonathan White led all position players with 562 points, besting last year's individual champion Parker Hanks who finished with 543.

Named the top pro prospect out of the New York Collegiate League by *Baseball America*. Hit .365 with three doubles, a homer, triple, 16 RBI and 11 stolen bases in as many chances in 18 games.

Pitcher • New England Collegiate Baseball League - Torrington

Helped lead the team to the Southern Division championship after going 4-1 with a 3.19 ERA in 10 appearances, including six starts. Struck out 30 with 18 walks in 42.1 innings.

The Southeastern Conference



The Southeastern Conference, with its storied 73-year history of athletic achievements and academic excellence, has built perhaps the greatest tradition of intercollegiate competition in baseball of any league in the country since its inception in 1933.

The SEC posted another landmark season in 2006 as the conference had an NCAA-high eight teams earn selection to NCAA post-season play and Georgia advanced to the College World Series. An SEC squad has now appeared in the College World Series 21 of the last 22 years. Ole Miss won the SEC tournament title over Vanderbilt. Alabama and Kentucky shared the SEC regular-season title with a 20-10 conference record.

The Southeastern Conference boasts ten former National Players of the Year, nine Baseball America Coach of the Year and seven Collegiate Baseball Coach of the Year honors. 126 student-athletes have been named first-team All-American, seven of which came in 2006.

In 2006, 40 former SEC players were listed on MLB opening day 25-man rosters, while 55 were taken in the 2006 MLB Amateur Draft, three in the first round. Tennessee's Luke Hochevar was the first overall pick of the draft by the Kansas City Royals. Georgia's Brooks Brown and Chris Coghlan of Ole Miss were both selected in the supplemental first round of the 2006 Major League Baseball Draft. Brown was selected by the Arizona Diamondbacks with the 34th overall pick, and Coghlan was selected by the Florida Marlins with the 36th overall pick. With those three selections, the SEC has now had a first round selection in each year since 1991 and 58 total in the first round during that time.

The 2006 SEC Baseball Tournament, held in Hoover, Ala. drew 108,173 fans, marking the third time in the last four years the total has surpassed the 100,000 plateau. The championship game drew over 9,000, bringing the total from the 2005 and 2006 championship games, all involving out-of-state-teams, to over 20,000.

The SEC drew a record-high 1,602,536 fans to its on-campus ballparks in 2006, double that of the next closest conference. Seven SEC teams drew in excess of 100,000 fans to their parks in 2006. The SEC averaged a new league-high 3,862 fans per game in 2006. In addition, for the first time in league history, all 12 SEC schools averaged more than 1,000 fans per game.

SEC NOTES

* The SEC has sent 33 teams to the College World Series since 1990. That was accomplished despite no SEC teams making the field in 1992. LSU has been to Omaha 10 times and Florida and Georgia four times, while Alabama, South Carolina, and Mississippi State and Tennessee have been three times each. Auburn has been once, while Arkansas advanced in 2004.

* SEC teams have won six of the last 17 national championships, with LSU winning five (1991, 1993, 1996, 1997, 2000) and Georgia claiming the 1990 title. The SEC has finished runner up three times in that time, 1997, 2002 and 2005.

* SEC teams are 61-57 since 1990 in Omaha, a 51.7 winning percentage. Not counting games against each other, the SEC has a 46-43 record in the CWS since 1990, a 51.7 winning percentage.

* The SEC has played 25 games in the "Final Four" of the College World Series since 1990, an average of 1.5 per year. Only four times, 1992, 1994, 2003 and 2006, has the SEC failed to get a team to the "Final Four" of the CWS.

* The SEC has averaged nearly eight games played per year in the College World Series since 1990. In 2004, 12 of the 15 games played in Omaha involved a SEC team. In 1997, the SEC had a team in 13 of the 14 games played in the CWS. Since 1990, an SEC team played in 103 of the 239 games played in the College World Series, an amazing 43 percent of games.

* The SEC has sent nine of its 12 schools to the College World Series since 1990 - Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee.

* Since 1990, 108 SEC squads have been invited to the NCAA Tournament, an average over six per season. The SEC set yet another NCAA record in both 2004 and 2005 with nine teams earning postseason births. The SEC also had a NCAA-record five teams earn regional host sites in 2004 and 2006.

* The SEC has had an NCAA-high 10 different teams compete in the 56-year history of the College World Series. In those appearances, the conference has registered a 83-98 record, a 45.8 winning percentage.

* Since 1990, 22 SEC squads have posted 50+ win seasons, while 82 have won 40+ games in a season, including five teams in 2006.

* The SEC posted a 253-92 record against non-conference foes in 2006, a 73.3 winning percentage. Since 1990, the SEC has accumulated a 4065-1536-4 record against non-conference teams, a 72.5 winning percentage.

* SEC teams have also been strong in the polls. Since 1990, 80 conference teams have appeared in the final Baseball America poll, 85 in the final Collegiate Baseball poll and, since 1992, 77 in the final ESPN Coaches poll.
