Head Coach Tim Corbin



In four seasons at Vanderbilt, Tim Corbin has raised expectations of the baseball program into one that is expected to be among the nations best on an annual basis.

Corbin's success and methods of running the Vanderbilt program has earned him respect among the college and international baseball communities.

This past summer he managed the USA Baseball National Team to a 28-2-1 record that culminated with a gold medal finish at the FISU (International University Sports Federation) World University Championship in Havana, Cuba in August. The .919 winning percentage was the highest ever for a national team and it garnered special recognition by the United States Olympic Committee in September.

Those results were probably to be expected, as Corbin has taken Vanderbilt to heights it has rarely seen in its long baseball history.

His overall record of 144-95 (.602) is the fourth best in terms of wins, and first in terms of win percentage for coaches with 100 games or more.

Last year he guided a youthful Commodore squad to a 38-27 record and sixth place finish in the rugged Southeastern Conference. The team was the youngest team in the league, with seven everyday starters either freshmen or sophomores. For the second time in three seasons, Corbin guided the team to the SEC Tournament Championship game and the young squad also gained valuable NCAA experience after advancing to the championship round of the Atlanta Regional.

The 2006 team posted impressive series wins over College World Series participant Georgia, Super Regional participants South Carolina and Ole Miss, and took series on the road against Florida and LSU. The team handed LSU its worst conference loss at home in school history in the process.

With virtually the entire team back, Corbin knows the expectations are there to build upon that success and take the Commodores to their first College World Series in school history. It is a goal that he and his coaching staff are determined to achieve in the near future.

In addition to on the field successes, the baseball program itself has had significant upgrades to the facilities with a brand new field-house, complete with new locker rooms for players, coaches and Commodore alums playing professional baseball. Also included are coach's offices, a classroom that overlooks Hawkins Field and a new weight room. These recent upgrades reinforce the excitement and commitment made to the baseball program due to the successes Tim Corbin has achieved as well as those he will strive to accomplish in the future.

He has already pushed the program to its most successful sea-

son, rewritten a significant portion of its record book, and ascended to the ranks of Southeastern Conference and national powers. For him, such excellence has been a constant in a career that covers two decades in both the collegiate and international baseball ranks.

Corbin, along with his coaching staff, are a tireless group that saw their recruiting efforts pay off last fall as the 2005 recruiting class was labeled the nation's best by Baseball America.

Professional baseball has also taken notice of the program as 29 players have been drafted over the last three years including 13 in 2005.

In 2005, Corbin directed the squad to its second consecutive 30-win season, an achievement that had not been done in over 15 years. The campaign was highlighted with series wins over Alabama, Mississippi, South Carolina and College World Series participant Tennessee.

In 2004, Corbin not only directed the Commodores to their first NCAA Tournament appearance in 24 years, he guided them to their first-ever Super Regional as they swept through the Charlottesville Regional with victories over George Mason, Princeton and host Virginia. In the Super Regional they fell to the eventual national runner-up, Texas, but still carved out a piece of history as the first team in NCAA baseball history to make it that far one year after having finished with a sub-.500 record.

Along the way Vanderbilt racked up a school-record 45 wins, was the only team to rank among the SEC's top five in earned run average (first), batting average (fourth) and fielding percentage (first), and finished with a .703 winning percentage, which was third-best in

the highly competitive conference, which sent nine schools to the NCAA Tournament. The Commodores' school-record .978 fielding percentage was second in the nation, and their 30 error-free games were 11 more than the previous season.

Before Corbin was hired as the 21st coach in program history, Vanderbilt had not earned a spot in the conference tournament in a decade. Not only has he led his team there twice, the Commodores made it to the 2004 championship game.

During the 2004 regular season, Vanderbilt swept a series against Mississippi State for the first time. It was one of three conference whitewashes and one of five series' wins in all.

His efforts earned him the 2004 Vanderbilt Coach of the Year award and a nomination for the Nashville Sports Council's Sports Person of the Year. Plus, a school-record five players were named to the SEC All-Tournament team, five players were drafted on the first day and seven VU players in all were chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft, topped by No. 6 overall pick pitcher Jeremy Sowers.

His first Vanderbilt team finished 27-28 overall and 14-16 in the SEC, good enough for second in the Eastern Division. It earned a conference tournament berth with a season-ending sweep of Tennessee capped by a dramatic ninth-inning rally in the finale. The overall and conference victory totals were the most by a first-year Vanderbilt coach and were made more impressive by the fact that the Commodores were 12-5 in one-run games.

That squad set school records for fielding percentage (.972), fewest errors in a season (60), most saves in a season (15) and fewest walks allowed in a season (168) — all of which were bettered in 2004. Three different players earned conference Player of the Week honors (the most for VU in a single season), and the team notched series victories over nationally-ranked conference foes LSU, Auburn and Florida, each of which was ranked among the top 15 at the time.

Plus, on May 6, 2003, Vanderbilt recorded the first perfect game in school history, which was a collective effort instead of the product of one dominant player on the mound. Four different pitchers contributed to the 4-0 victory over Western Kentucky University.

Corbin came to Vanderbilt following nine seasons as an assistant coach at baseball power Clemson.

During his time there (1994-2002) the Tigers had more victories than all but four programs. Clemson won more than 71 percent (434 wins, 172 losses) of its games, captured two Atlantic Coast Conference regular season titles, made nine appearances in the NCAA Tournament and reached the College World Series four times

(1995, 1996, 2000, and 2002). The Tigers ended the 2002 season with their ninth consecutive top 25 finish and their sixth top 10 finish since 1994.

Corbin was promoted twice during his tenure. He received the title of assistant head coach in 1998 and in September 2001 became associate head coach and recruiting coordinator.

Along the way, he crafted a national reputation as one of the most respected assistant coaches in the country. His efforts helped produce nine straight recruiting classes that were ranked among the top 25 nationally. His on-field work with outfielders and hitters helped 20 Clemson players earn All-America honors and 36 to be drafted to play professional baseball.

Corbin's dedication and attention to detail caught the eye of the national baseball publication *Baseball America* on numerous occasions. In 1997, it touted the Clemson coaching staff as one of the top five "College Recruiting Staffs" in the country. It later tabbed the 1999 Tiger freshmen class as No. 1 nationally. In 2000, Baseball America and the American Baseball Coaches Association named Corbin its National Assistant Coach of the Year.

In 2000, Southern California head coach Mike Gillespie served as skipper of the USA Baseball team and chose Corbin as an assistant for his staff. That group guided the Americans to a gold-medal finish at the World Championships in the Netherlands, and that team set a national program record for best winning percentage (.900).

Prior to his tenure at Clemson, Corbin was head coach at Presbyterian College for six seasons beginning in 1988. There he restarted a baseball program that laid dormant for several years. He directed Presbyterian College from NAIA to NCAA Division II status and had a 106-138 overall record. Along the way, the Blue Hose made three consecutive appearances in the South Atlantic playoffs (1991-93), and Corbin earned South Atlantic Coach of the Year honors in 1990.

Assistant Coach Derek Johnson



Derek Johnson is now in his sixth season as an assistant coach for the Commodores and is widely considered one of the top pitching coaches in the country. Three of his last four three staffs have led the Southeastern Conference in ERA while also being ranked nationally at No. 15 (2003), No. 7 (2004) and No. 17 (2005) respectively.

Johnson's 2006 staff led the SEC in strikeouts with 574 in 65 games, an average of nearly nine a game. Also in 2006, nine of his pitchers combined to record a school record scoreless innings streak of 38.2 innings over a span of five games in March.

Under his tutelage, southpaw David Price earned All-American honors and set a new Vanderbilt single season strikeout mark with 155 in 110.1 innings.

Two pitchers, Matt Buschmann and Greg Moviel were drafted and signed off of last year's team giving Johnson a total of nine of his guys signed into the professional ranks in five years.

In his five years at Vanderbilt, the Commodores' team ERA has been cut nearly in half, from 6.45 in 2001, two seasons before he arrived, to a Southeastern Conference-leading 3.38 in 2005.

In 2004, the staff had a 3.34 ERA, second best in school history, while all four regular starters finished with ERAs below 3.50.

That standard of performance was maintained over 575.1 innings, the most in program history. Combined, the VU staff struck out a school-record 518 batters and had 17 saves led by Ryan Rote's school-record 11. Jeremy Sowers became the third Commodores' pitcher ever to win at least 10 games in a single season.

Johnson's efforts earned him the 2004 Collegiate Baseball's National College Pitching Coach of the Year sponsored by JC Video but were nothing out of the ordinary in what quickly has become a distinguished career, which has included stints in the collegiate and summer league ranks.

In 2003 Vanderbilt's Jensen Lewis earned Freshman All-America honors and extended to five the number of consecutive years a player under Johnson's guidance was so honored. In 2005, David Price joined this group becoming the sixth pitcher to earn the honor under Johnson. Sowers (2002) and Stetson's Jack Collins (2001), Andy Wilson (2000) and Lenny DiNardo (1999) all likewise were honored. That same year four Commodores' pitchers (Lewis, Nick Pilkington, John Scott and Matt Buschmann) combined to pitch the first perfect game in Vanderbilt history and only the eighth in SEC history, a 4-0 victory at Western Kentucky.

Sowers capped his career in 2004 when the Cleveland Indians made him the No. 6 overall selection in the Major League Baseball draft. At Stetson, DiNardo ultimately developed into a third-round choice of the New York Mets in 2001 and was a two-time All-American and a member of the USA Baseball national team. Johnson has had seven pitchers drafted into professional baseball in four seasons in Nashville.

Before he came to Vanderbilt, Johnson spent four years as pitching coach at Stetson. During that time his team's won one Atlantic Sun Conference championship (2000) and earned two NCAA Tournament berths (2000 and 2001).

He began coaching at Eastern Illinois in 1994, one year after he was an All-Mid Continent Conference pitcher at the school. In 1995 he was hired by Southern Illinois, where he worked for three years as a pitching coach. He also has had summer stints as manager of the Decatur Blues in the Central Illinois Collegiate League (1994 and 1995) and pitching coach for the Anchorage Glacier Pilots (1996).

A native of Normal, Ill., Johnson is married to the former Tasha Huster. The couple has a three-year old son, Teague and a daughter, Taite born October 24, 2006.

Assistant Coach Erik Bakich



Erik Bakich, one of collegiate baseball's top recruiters, is in his fifth season as an assistant coach for the Commodores.

Through his tireless efforts as Vanderbilt's recruiting coordinator, the Commodores had the No. 1 recruiting class in the country in 2005 according to Baseball America. VU had the most freshman ranked in the top 100 of any school in the country and had five student-athletes named Player of the Year in their state.

The most recent recruiting class focused on Tennessee and the Commodores signed what some experts believe were the top six high school players in the state. The class was ranked No. 25 by Baseball America.

Since arriving in Nashville, all of his recruiting classes have been ranked in the Top 25.

In 2004-05, the freshman class consisted of nine players who were ranked 19th nationally.

His first recruiting class (2003) was ranked 24th in the nation by Collegiate Baseball.

In addition to spearheading the recruiting efforts, Bakich also is Vanderbilt's primary outfield coach and assists in hitting. In 2004 the Commodores generated the single largest jump in team batting average in team history when the players hit a combined .304 after having a collective .258 average the season before. Warner Jones became the first player in school history with at least 100 hits in a season and just the seventh to hit .400 for a season.

"Erik is without question one of the very best at what he does and it is one of the main reasons we are able to coach such good players," head coach Tim Corbin said.

Bakich began his coaching career in 2002 as a volunteer assistant at Clemson, where he contributed as a hitting coach and worked with both infielders and outfielders. That year the Tigers advanced to the College World Series.

Prior to that he worked one year as an assistant strength and conditioning coach at East Carolina, where as a player he was a central figure on a team that won Colonial Athletic Association championships in 1999 and 2000. He earned 1999 All-Regional honors for his performance at LSU. He had a .315 career batting average with 14 home runs and 85 RBI at East Carolina after two years at San Jose City College in California (1997-98), where he lettered as a third baseman and earned All-Conference and All-Northern California honors as a sophomore when he batted .452.

Bakich graduated from East Carolina in 2000 with a degree in Exercise and Sports Science. He has been a certified personal trainer for six years and in 2001 was fitness director for Sports Connection, a performance enhancing company specializing in baseball-specific training for young athletes.

He has been a consultant for other strength training and conditioning programs for high school, college and minor league players, and has made numerous speaking appearances at clinics across the country.

Bakich signed a professional contract with the Springfield Capitals of the Frontier League in the Independent Professional Baseball League in 2000 and played professionally into 2001.

He married the former Katherine Toulomelis on Dec. 10, 2005.

Shannon Gordon is in his first season as the athletic trainer for the Commodore baseball team.


Gordon comes to Nashville after working the past seven years as athletic trainer at Ohio University. He worked closely with the men's basketball team as well as the football and women's soccer squads.

Calitri played for four seasons at Clemson from 1997-2000, while Corbin was an assistant coach there.

Calitri helped lead the Tigers to the 2000 College World Series, then signed a professional contract with Cincinnati. The Boston, Mass., native played for three years in the Reds organization from 2000-02 and was a member of the Stockton Ports that won the California League championship in 2002.

He played in the Boston organization in 2003, before going back to Clemson to complete his degree requirements in the fall of 2004. He earned a bachelor's degree and worked in private business prior to his hiring at Vanderbilt.

Calitri married the former Ciari Egan on July 22, 2006.



John Sisk is in his fifth year at Vanderbilt as the Director of Speed, Strength and Conditioning. He has been working primarily with the football team and is now overseeing the baseball squad as well. His influence on the program and its student-athletes is having a positive impact.

Sisk joined Vanderbilt after working at Clemson where he was responsible for the conditioning of skilled-position athletes in football as the baseball program. He worked with Tim Corbin, who was an assistant there at the time. Among his Clemson pupils were current NFL players Woodrow Dantzler, Rod Gardner and David Patten, and San Diego Padres' shortstop Khalil Greene.

A native of Waynesville, N.C., Sisk played football at Western Carolina and graduated with a bachelor's degree in sports administration. After spending three years as a football and strength assistant at Tuscola High School, he joined Furman in 1993. Two years later, he was named to guide the Western Carolina strength and conditioning program. He joined Clemson In 1997.



Gabe Teeple is the newest member of the Vanderbilt strength and conditioning staff, having joined John Sisk's team this May.

Teeple, 30, previously served two years as an assistant strength coach at the University of Wyoming where he implemented workouts for several varsity sports, including football, wrestling, and track

E. Gordon Gee Chancellor

"Vanderbilt athletics - given what is happening in the intercollegiate world - will set the standard of excellence on and off the field. That is exactly our intent."

While Vanderbilt University Chancellor Gordon Gee is regarded as one of the nation's top leaders in the field of higher education, many in the Commodore community have come to recognize the enthusiastic chief executive as an unabashed fan of all Vanderbilt athletic endeavors.

Gee, who arrived on campus in 2000, rarely misses a Commodore athletic event, whether it's the excitement of Homecoming in Vanderbilt Stadium or a game in the VU Soccer Complex.

Gee also is a national leader in the area of academic reforms on American college campuses, frequently urging for higher academic standards at the Southeastern Conference and national collegiate levels.

In September of 2003, Gee acted on his belief that student-athletes should play a vital role in the university community. Editorials praised Gee after he restructured the Commodore athletics program into the Vanderbilt Division of Student Life and University Affairs. While aimed at helping to integrate student-athletes into the daily life around campus, Gee made it clear that Commodore athletics would compete at the highest level

"Vanderbilt is committed to competing at the highest levels in the Conference and the NCAA, but we intend on competing consistent with the value of a worldclass university," Gee said.

Gee's tenure is distinguished by his commitment that Vanderbilt further advance its mission of creating a culture of simplicity, clarity, agility and accountability. Strategic investments driven by Gee are intended to strengthen the character of Vanderbilt, and propel the university higher among the ranks of the world's finest institutions of higher education.

Gee places special emphasis on improving student life and increasing Vanderbilt's commitment to and participation within the community, specifically through the development and enhancement of world-class scholarship, teaching,



Vice Chancellor David Williams II is a key administrator in the Commodore athletic program and one of the most influential leaders on the Vanderbilt campus. In addition to serving as Vice Chancellor of University Affairs and Student Life, Williams is General Counsel and Secretary of Vanderbilt and the nationally recognized Vanderbilt University Medical Center.

As part of the restructuring announced in September 2003 by Chancellor Gordon Gee, Williams oversees the efforts to bring the university's athletic program together with the Division of Student Life and University Affairs.

In addition to overseeing athletics and student life, he directs the eleven-member General Counsel Office, the Office of Risk Management, the University's Compliance and Conflict of Interest functions and the operations of the University's Board of Trust

Williams also is a tenured full professor at the Vanderbilt School of Law, teaching Tax Law. Sports Law and Education Law. He also teaches an annual course on Law and Higher Education at Peabody and will conduct a Freshman Seminar on Law and the Legal System this fall.

Williams was named Vice Chancellor, General Counsel and Secretary of Vanderbilt in August 2000. He joined the university after serving in numerous administrative roles at Ohio State University over a 14-year period.

A native of Detroit, Mich., Williams received a Bachelor of Science in Social Science and Master of Arts in Education from Northern Michigan University. He also earned a Master of Business Administration and a Doctor of Jurisprudence from the University of Detroit, and a LL.M. in taxation from New York University.

Williams is active in the Nashville area community, serving as an executive member and director with several organizations.

Williams also supports youth athletic programs in the local community. He coaches youth basketball for the West Nashville Sports League and is a timer for
