## Five Starters Return in 2011-12

All five starters return with five other letterwinners ( 10 total). Only one player who saw somewhat significant minutes, Andre Walker, departed. Walker graduated with a degree in May and enrolled at Xavier as a graduate student where he will compete with the Musketeers this season. It marks the first time in the Stallings' era (since 1999-2000) that all five starters return from the previous season.

## 2010-11 Postseason Player Accolades

Junior John Jenkins was a first-team All-SEC selection, senior center Festus Ezeli and senior forward Jeffery Taylor were named to the second team. Taylor was also named to the league's AllDefensive team. Senior Brad Tinsley led the SEC in assists in his first season as a collegiate point guard in 2010-11 (4.6 per game).

## Commodores Led SEC In Several Categories

Vanderbilt led the SEC in scoring in all games (75.9) and SEC games only ( 73.8 ppg ). In all games, the Commodores finished statistically in the top three in scoring margin (3rd, +8.2 ), free throw percentage (2nd, .743), field goal percentage (3rd, .458), 3-point field goal percentage (2nd, .371), 3-point field goal percentage defense (2nd, .313), assists (3rd, 13.4), defensive rebounds (2nd, 26.0), and threes made (2nd, 7.7).

In SEC games only, Vanderbilt also led the league in three-point field goal percentage defense (30.5). VU finished in the top three in SEC games only in free throw percentage (2nd, .752), field goal percentage (3rd, .381), and threes made (3rd, 7.5).

## Individual Notes

- Jenkins led the SEC in scoring in overall games and SEC games only.
- Jenkins became Vanderbilt's all-time leading sophomore scorer in points and scoring average with 624 points and 19.5 ppg average.
- Four of Vanderbilt's five starters (Brad Tinsley, John Jenkins, Lance Goulbourne, Festus Ezeli) claimed an SEC Player of the Week award last season.
- Festus Ezeli set a new single-season block record of 87 in 2010-11, and is five blocks shy (152) of setting the new career blocks record currently held by Will Perdue.
- Ezeli was named the most improved player in the nation last year by Yahoo Sports.


## Four 1,000-point scorers?

Jeffery Taylor became the 41st player in Vanderbilt history to surpass the 1,000 -point barrier in 2010-11. John Jenkins is 16 points away from 1,000 and Brad Tinsley is 71 points shy of the mark. If Festus Ezeli repeats his 2010-11 statistical campaign, he would also surpass the 1,000-point mark.

## Stallings' Success

Coach Stallings has had six 20 -win seasons in the last eight, with five NCAA tournament appearances and two Sweet 16's (2004 and 2007). He is entering his 13th season in Nashville. He is the second winningest coach in Vanderbilt history behind Roy Skinner with 236 wins. Skinner has 278 wins.

## Getting to the Line

For the second consecutive season, Vanderbilt topped the league in free throws made and attempted in all games and in the 16 conference games. Vanderbilt attempted 837 free throws on the season, for an average of 24.6 attempts per game, and made 622 ( 18.3 per game). In league play, the Commodores attempted 383 free throws (23.9) and connected on 288 of those attempts (18.0).

Individually, Festus Ezeli was second in the league in free throw attempts with 216, with Jeffery Taylor finishing eighth in the conference with 167, and John Jenkins ninth with 161.

## International Flavor

The Commodores sport a very wordly roster, with players from four different countries. Festus Ezeli is from Nigeria, Jeffery Taylor is from Sweden, and Steve Tchiengang and James Siakam are from Cameroon.

## 3-Point Streak Continues Through 25th Season; VU One Of Three Teams To Hit A Trey In Every Game Since 198687 Season

Vanderbilt has made a 3-pointer in 796 consecutive games, a streak which began at the inception of the 3-point line in 1986-87. The Commodores rank second only to UNLV (770) for the longest streak in Division I basketball. Vanderbilt, UNLV and Princeton (649) are the only three schools in college basketball to have made at least one 3-pointer in every game played since the 3-point line was implemented.

## Commodores Add Three Freshmen In 2011-12

The Commodores have added three freshmen to the roster in 201112. Freshman point guard Kedren Johnson ( $6^{\prime} 4,215$ ), forward Shelby Moats ( $6^{\prime} 8,225$ ), and guard Dai-Jon Parker ( $6^{\prime} 3,190$ ).

## Vanderbilt And National Rankings

The Commodores ended the 2010-11 season ranked 29th in the nation in scoring offense (75.9), 35th in scoring margin ( +8.2 ), 27th in 3FG\% defense ( $31.3 \%$ ), 37th in free throw percentage (74.3), and 38th in blocks per game (4.8). Individually, John Jenkins ranked ninth in three-point field goals per game (3.1), 25th in three-point field goal percentage (40.8), and 30th in scoring ( 19.5 ppg ). Festus Ezeli finished

18th in blocks per game (2.6), and Brad Tinsley ended the year 27th in assist-to-turnover ratio (2.46).

## Looking For Three Consecutive NCAA Tournaments

The Commodores have appeared in two consecutive NCAA Tournaments, and are seeking a third consecutive berth for the first time in the program's history.

## Top 25 Recognition

Vanderbilt has been ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 for 18 of the last 34 weeks in 2009-10 ( 9 weeks) and 2010-11 ( 9 weeks). The 2007-08 team has the record for most weeks in the Top 25 with 16.
The highest ranking for a Vanderbilt team occurred in the December 28, 1965 poll, when Clyde Lee and company made it to number two in the country. The Commodores have been ranked in the AP top five 26 times, with the last time coming on March 8, 1993, when Vanderbilt was ranked fifth.

## Memorial Gym In Its 60th Season

The Commodores are entering their 60th season in the Southeastern Conference's oldest facility for basketball. Vanderbilt has an all-time record of 708-191 in its 59 years of existence. In 2010-11, the Commodores finished $14-3$, averaged 80.3 points per game, and shot $49.1 \%$ from the floor. Vanderbilt also made 8.4 3's per game, shot $41.9 \%$ from beyond-the-arc, and outrebounded opponents by a margin of +4.7 . VU also shot $77.4 \%$ from the FT line at Memorial Gym.

## As Jeffery Taylor Goes...

So do the Commodores. In 2010-11, Vanderbilt was 17-3 in games in which Taylor scored 15 or more points, and 6-8 in games in which he failed to reach the 15 -point barrier.

## The 2011-12 Schedule

May be one of the most difficult the Commodores have ever faced and one that could see the Commodores take on as many as 13 teams that participated in postseason play a year ago.

The home schedule includes the season opener against Pac-12 member Oregon (November 11) and a matchup with perennial NCAA tournament stalwart and Atlantic 10 member Xavier on November 28. Vanderbilt will also host the ESPN Gameday franchise for the first time from Memorial Gym on February 11 against Kentucky.

## All Five Starters Return

The Commodores' five starters from the end of the 2010-11 campaign all return - it marks the first time in the Stallings' era (since 1999) that all five starters have returned the following year.

## Jenkins With Team USA At University Games

Junior John Jenkins made the squad of 12 players to represent USA Basketball at the University Games in China, and led the team in scoring over their six-game span at 13.5 points per game. Team USA finished fifth at the event, which took place August 13-23.

But the Gamecocks' Sam Muldrow leaped up, got his fingertips on the ball, and ended up in his school's record books, getting just the second triple-double in South Carolina's history in an 83-75 win over the No. 22 Commodores in Columbia.

Muldrow owned overtime, getting five points, including a crucial 3 , and four blocks in the extra period. Freshman Bruce Ellington, in his first league game, got the Gamecocks (10-4, 1-0) to overtime. He scored 12 of the Gamecocks final 15 points in regulation -- burying four 3-pointers in seven minutes, including the final points of the second half that tied it at 72 with 2:09 to go.

He then gave South Carolina its first lead of the game with a layup on the first possession of overtime and his quick pass to Muldrow for an open 3 put South Carolina up 81-75 with 2:18 to go.
Ellington finished with 22 points and has scored at least 20 in five of the first 14 games of his college career.
John Jenkins led Vanderbilt (11-3, 0-1) with 27 points after missing the last game with a concussion. Jeffery Taylor added 14 points and Lance Goulbourne had nine points and 14 rebounds for the Commodores.

John Jenkins and Festus Ezeli scored 18 points apiece and Vanderbilt beat No. 24 Georgia 73-66 on to snap the Bulldogs' nine-game winning streak and ruin their first game back in the Top 25 since the end of the 2003 season.

The Commodores (12-3, 1-1) bounced back after blowing their SEC opener with an overtime loss at South Carolina last weekend that knocked them out of the rankings. This time, they never trailed while improving to 52-13 against the Bulldogs at home.

Georgia (12-3, 1-1) had its own problems, having to bus in from Athens, Ga., on Tuesday because of a winter storm. The Bulldogs had such trouble even getting a bus they missed practice.

Coach Mark Fox refused to blame the travel problems for the poor play and his Bulldogs' first loss since Nov. 26 against Temple.

The Bulldogs never got closer than three in the second half. Travis Leslie led the Bulldogs with 21 points, Gerald Robinson added 20 and Trey Thompkins had 13.

Jeffery Taylor had 15 points for Vandy. Ezeli had a
double-double, also grabbing 10 rebounds.
Vanderbilt couldn't protect a lead at South Carolina and lost 83-75 even though they never trailed in regulation. This time, before a sold-out crowd, the Commodores led 40-32 at halftime and stayed in front throughout.

It was the second time this season the Commodores watched a solid lead unravel. In an 83-75 overtime loss to South Carolina on Jan. 8, the Dores led by 11 points with 8:42 in the second half when the Gamecocks went on a 20-9 run to close out regulation.

Vanderbilt pushed the first-half margin to 17 points on a free throw by Tinsley with 2:03 before halftime, but Tennessee put together a modest 7-0 run to close the half and cut the halftime margin to $30-20$ in favor of the Dores.

The Vols used 48.7 percent shooting after the break to slowly chip away at the Commodores' lead, and a 3-pointer by Cameron Tatum with 3:03 to go gave them their first lead of the second half. Harris finished with 15 points, Tatum had 12 and Skylar McBee had 10.

Now Vanderbilt (17-6, 5-4) has won the first two games of a three-game homestand with No. 18 Kentucky visiting Saturday to remain knotted with three others for second in the SEC's Eastern Division. Tinsley's shot came off a screen, and he hit the shot even as Trevor Releford hit his arm.

Jenkins finished with a team-high 20 points for Vanderbilt. Jeff Taylor had 19 before fouling out with 90 seconds left, Tinsley had 15 and Ezeli had 11. Taylor said it was great to watch his teammates close out a tight game, but difficult to watch from the bench helpless.

Green finished with 23 points for Alabama, including shooting 10 of 11 at the line. Tony Mitchell scored 22 points, and Releford had 11 before fouling out late.

The Tide came in with the nation's third-stingiest defense and best in the SEC, holding opponents to 57.1 points per game. Vanderbilt is the SEC's best scoring offense, and the Commodores matched what Alabama had been allowing with less than 12 minutes left.

- With the win, Vanderbilt improved to 13-1 at home this year. The Commodores' 81-point performance Thursday marked their 10th time this year that they have scored at least 80 points at home (10-0).

Kentucky (17-7, 5-5) dropped to $1-5$ on the road in the SEC this season and to the bottom of the East.

Jenkins had Vanderbilt's first 30-point game against the Wildcats since Mike Rhodes had 34 on Jan. 19, 1980, in a loss, and the Commodores' first 30-point game since A.J. Ogilvy had 33 at LSU on March 4, 2009.

Festus Ezeli added 14 points, Steve Tchiengang scored all 12 of his in the first half off and Brad Tinsley had 11 for the Commodores.

Terrence Jones led Kentucky with 25 points, Knight had 20 and Liggins 10. Darius Miller played only 18 minutes before leaving with a groin injury.

Jenkins, the leading scorer in the Southeastern Conference, was scoreless before making a 3-pointer with $13: 15$ remaining when Georgia led $40-26$. It was the first of five 3 -pointers for the sophomore.

It was an important road victory for a Vanderbilt team best known for its home success. The Commodores (19-6, 7-4 SEC) are only 3-5 away from Nashville, including 2-3 in conference games.

The Bulldogs' last field goal came on a 3 by Travis Leslie for a 53-40 lead with 9:49 to go.

Led by Jenkins, Vanderbilt closed the game with a 24-3 run as Georgia managed only three free throws.

The Commodores moved past Georgia (17-8, 6-5) for second place in the SEC East. Gerald Robinson led the Bulldogs with 15 points.

Jenkins has scored in double figures in all 25 games this season, including 15 games with 20 or more points. He leads the SEC with his averages of 19.8 points overall and 22.3 in SEC games.

After ending his scoring drought, Jenkins had three more 3-pointers in a 12-0 run, capped by another 3 from Brad Tinsley, to cut Georgia's lead to 53-52.

Jenkins scored 22 points and the streaking Commodores used a dominant four-minute stretch in the second half to turn a tie game into a 77-60 rout over the Tigers.

The Commodores (20-6, 8-4 SEC) went on a 23-4 run after Auburn (9-17, 2-10) managed to tie it six minutes into the second half. Their fifth straight victory gave Vandy its sixth 20 -win season during coach Kevin Stallings' 12 years in charge.

This one might have been a little tougher than expected -- for a while, at least.

Then Jenkins and the Commodores got over it. He hit 5 of 11 3-pointers and scored 16 in the second half. Jeffery Taylor had 20 points and 10 rebounds for the Commodores while Brad Tinsley scored 16. Ezeli Festus only had six points but also blocked five shots.

Earnest Ross led Auburn with 19 points and Kenny Gabriel added 13. They were a combined 10 -of-18 shooting while the rest of the team made just 12 of 32 attempts.

Ross also had 10 rebounds and five assists but committed six turnovers.

The Tigers tied the game 42-42 on back-to-back 3 -pointers by Gabriel and Ross six minutes into the second half, but Vanderbilt quickly erased any hopes of an upset over the next four minutes.

With more than two dozen relatives traveling from Texas and Louisiana to see him play, Taylor scored 20 points and the 18th-ranked Commodores outscored LSU 49-26 in the second half for a comfortable 90-69 victory.

John Jenkins overcame a slow start to finish with 17 points for Vanderbilt (21-7, 9-5 Southeastern Conference), which bounced back from its first loss in six games last Tuesday against state rival Tennessee.

Vanderbilt, which shot 54.4 percent ( 31 of 57 ), trailed 43-41 at halftime but surged into the lead for good early in the second half with a 14-0 run during which Taylor dunked twice and hit two free throws.

Vandy then held the Tigers to 25 percent shooting (8 of 32 ) in the second half.

Storm Warren had a career-high 24 points and Ralston Turner added 18 for LSU (11-18, 3-11), which has lost 11 of 12 games.

Andre Stringer scored 10 points for the Tigers, who on Wednesday had snapped a 10-game losing streak with a victory at Mississippi State.

A strong first half put LSU in position to make it two straight wins, but the Tigers wound up looking overmatched by the Commodores, who had five players in double figures, including Lance Goulbourne and Brad Tinsley with 16 each and Festus Ezeli with 15.

The Wildcats showed plenty of grit in the final 1:36 with freshmen Brandon Knight and Terrence Jones combining to make 7 of 8 free throws as Kentucky won its 34th straight home game, the thirdlongest streak in school history.

Knight finished with 17 points and Jones added 15 points and nine rebounds for Kentucky, which avenged a loss at Vanderbilt on Feb. 12 by slowing down star John Jenkins.

Jenkins torched the Wildcats for 32 points in the first meeting but was held to 16 this time.

Ezeli led the Commodores (21-8, 9-6) with 22 points, 13 rebounds and three blocks but also turned it over three times.

Still, Vanderbilt was able to do something most of the previous 33 visitors failed to do when walking into Rupp, it made the Wildcats work for it.

The win clinched the third outright regular-season SEC championship for Florida and the first since the 2007 team of future NBA stars won the national championship.

Kenny Boynton scored 17 points, and seniors Chandler Parsons, Alex Tyus and Vernon Macklin each scored 13 points and made key plays down the stretch against Vanderbilt to help the Gators (24-6,
13-3) set a school record for conference wins.
Florida pulled away after a technical foul on Vanderbilt coach Kevin Stallings midway through the second half. That wiped out a potential tie for the Commodores (21-9, 9-7) and gave the Gators a sixpoint swing.

The Commodores had wiped away a 14 -point deficit behind a spirited 16-6 run and strong secondhalf play from Jenkins and Rod Odom, and seemed set to tie the game with 9:19 left. Jenkins appeared to make a layup and draw a blocking foul on Parsons. But a second referee simultaneously called charging on Jenkins and before the officials could confer, Stallings walked about 12 feet onto the court and put his hand on his hips, indicating to the official that his crewmate had called a blocking foul.

The official called a technical foul on Stallings, and Boynton made both shots. Instead of a 56 -all tie had Jenkins made his foul shot, the Commodores were down 58-53. The Gators inbounded the ball and Tyus hit a layup to make it 60-53.

Boynton then hit a 3-pointer a minute later to make it 65-54 with 8:05 left and Vanderbilt never seriously threatened again.

Led by Jenkins, Vanderbilt outscored the Bulldogs 11-5 the rest of the way.

Mississippi State was denied its fifth straight semifinals appearance and a chance to play in the championship game for the third straight year. The Bulldogs lost in overtime to Kentucky in last year's final after beating Tennessee for the 2009 tournament championship.

Vanderbilt opened the second half with a 9-0 run that included a steal and basket by Jenkins, followed by his 3-pointer. The surge gave the Commodores a 45-38 lead, but the Bulldogs recovered quickly to resume the pattern of frequent lead changes.
