## Commodores Claim First SEC Tournament Championship Since 1951

Vanderbilt defeated eventual national champion Kentucky, 71-64, in the SEC Tournament Championship in New Orleans on March 11 to win its first SEC Tournament championship since 1951, ending a 60 -year drought.

## Three Commodores Drafted In First 31 Picks of NBA Draft

History was made for Vanderbilt basketball on NBA Draft night, when Festus Ezeli, John Jenkins, and Jeffery Taylor each heard their names called at the Prudential Center in Newark, N.J., at the 2012 NBA Draft. It marks the first time the Commodores have had three picks in the first two rounds of the draft, and with John Jenkins being selected as the 23rd pick by the Atlanta Hawks, it was the first time since 1988 that a Vanderbilt player was chosen in the first round (Will Perdue).

Ezeli was chosen 30th, the final pick of the first round, by the Golden State Warriors, while Taylor was picked one pick later at 31 by the Charlotte Bobcats.

## All Five Starters Depart From 2011-12

Besides the three NBA draftees, the Commodores also saw the departure of senior point guard Brad Tinsley, who ended his career second all-time on Vanderbilt's assist list, and starting four-man Lance Goulbourne, who averaged 8.7 points and a team-high 6.9 rebounds per game. The Commodores also lost senior sixth man Steve Tchiengang.

In all, 88\% of Vanderbilt's total point production must be replaced in 2012-13.

## Stallings Closing In On Becoming All-Time Winningest Vanderbilt Coach

Vanderbilt head coach Kevin Stallings, who is in his 14th season as Commodore head coach, has 261 career victories with the Black and Gold, and trails all-time coaching leader Roy Skinner by only 17 wins (278 career wins). Stallings' record as Vanderbilt head coach is 261-159.

## Stallings' Success

After the 2011-12 campaign, Coach Stallings has had seven 20-win seasons in the last eight, with six NCAA tournament appearances and two Sweet 16's (2004 and 2007). Stallings has the most 20 -win campaigns in Vanderbilt history, and is the first Commodore coach to lead Vanderbilt to three consecutive NCAA Tournaments (2010, 2011, 2012).

## Win Totals

Vanderbilt's 25 wins in 2011-12 was the most since the 2007-08 season and the second-most win total since the 1992-93 season. Additionally, the Commodores' seven 20-win seasons in the last nine years is only third to Florida, who has had nine, and Kentucky, who has had eight. Other school totals: Miss. St. (6), Tennessee (5), Ole Miss (4), S. Carolina (4), LSU (3), Alabama (3), Arkansas (3), Auburn (1), Georgia (1).

## International Presence

The Commodores are represented by three countries on this year's roster - the United States, Cameroon (James Siakam), and Germany (Kevin Bright) - to continue Vanderbilt's line of foreign players. VU has had a player from outside of the United States on its roster for every season dating back to the 1996-97 campaign. The countries represented in the last 16 years (Ivory Coast, Poland, Austria, EngIand, Australia, Cameroon, Nigeria, Sweden, Germany).

## 3-Point Streak Continues Through 26th Season; VU One Of Three Teams To Hit A Trey In Every Game Since 198687 Season

Vanderbilt has made a 3-pointer in 832 consecutive games, a streak which began at the inception of the 3 -point line in 1986-87. The Commodores rank second only to UNLV for the longest streak in Division I basketball. Vanderbilt, UNLV and Princeton are the only three schools in college basketball to have made at least one 3-pointer in every game played since the 3 -point line was implemented.

## Individual Notes

- Jenkins led the SEC in scoring for the second consecutive season for the first time since 1996 and 1997. Jenkins was named a first-team All-SEC selection and a third-team Associated Press All-American.
- Taylor was also a first-team All-SEC selection. Jenkins and Taylor's selection to the first team was the first time the Commodores had two players on the first team since 1989, when Barry Goheen and Frank Kornet were selected.
- Taylor leaves Vanderbilt has the school's second all-time leading scorer, behind Shan Foster, with 1,897 career points.
- Jenkins' 696 points is second all-time on Vanderbilt's single season scoring list, behind Billy McCaffrey's 699 points in the 1992-93 season.
- Ezeli is now the Commodores' all-time leading career shot blocker with 207. He surpassed former VU great Will Perdue in his senior season (157).

NASHVILLE - John Jenkins scored 24 points, Jeffery Taylor added 21 and 11 rebounds as No. 7 Vanderbilt opened the season with a 78-64 victory over Oregon.

Brad Tinsley had 13 points for Vanderbilt.
The Commodores hadn't been ranked in the preseason since November 1993 when they were No. 23, and they haven't been ranked this high since 1965 when they were fifth. That might be why they opened a bit slowly and even trailed by as many as six points early.

But the Commodores took control with an 18-0 run over the final $2: 33$ of the first half and the first few minutes of the second.

Oregon fell to $0-4$ when opening against a ranked opponent. But the Ducks didn't go down easily as Tony Woods had 12 points and Brett Kingma and E.J. Singler added 10 each.

Vanderbilt led by 20 with $13: 36$ to go, but Oregon came back with 14 straight points. The Ducks got as close as 6257 on a jumper by Kingma with 5:09 left. Taylor answered by putting back his own miss with $4: 41$ left, then Jabari Brown had a turnover at midcourt. Johnathan Loyd missed both free throws, then Taylor hit a jumper to start a 12-0 run to seal the win.

The Ducks finished with 20 turnovers, which Vandy turned into 24 points.

Brown missed all of last season after tearing a tendon in his finger early, and the sophomore guard helped hold Vandy forward Jeffery Taylor to just nine points and forced the senior into six turnovers.

Cleveland State has four seniors back from a team that won the Horizon League last season. The Vikings hadn't played since an exhibition Wednesday night and looked very fresh, while Vanderbilt (1-1) appeared sloppy and slow after opening Friday night with a late tipoff against Oregon.

Cleveland State scored first on a 3-pointer by Trevon Harmon within the first minute and never trailed. The Vikings forced Vanderbilt into 21 turnovers - 15 of them steals. Harmon finished with 11 points and Jeremy Montgomery added 10.

John Jenkins, the Southeastern Conference's leading scorer with 19.5 points last season, had 17 for Vanderbilt. Lance Goulbourne added 11.

With the early tipoff, Cleveland State came into a Memorial Gym barely half full, and the Vikings jumped to a 16 -point lead and were up 37-24 at halftime. They outshot Vanderbilt, hitting 50 percent (27 of 54) compared to 35.3 percent ( 18 of 51 ) and scored 22 points off the Commodores' turnovers.

The Commodores (2-1) bounced back after losing to Cleveland State to drop from No. 7. John Jenkins, the Southeastern Conference's leading scorer last season, hurt his right ankle in the loss when he stepped on a player's foot in the first half, while senior center Festus Ezeli is out with a sprained knee until at least December.

Brad Tinsley, Lance Goulbourne and Kedren Johnson each added 12 points. Rod Odom had 10.

Joe Willman led Bucknell ( $0-2$ ) with 17 points. Joshea Singleton had 12 and Mike Muscala and Brian Fitzpatrick 10 apiece.

NASHVILLE - Indiana State studied how Cleveland State guarded John Jenkins back in November. Then coach Greg Lansing put Steve McWhorter on Vanderbilt's best player, as he usually does with any opponent.

McWhorter held the Southeastern Conference's top scorer to a season-low 11 points and the sophomore guard hit two free throws with $3: 32$ left to put Indiana State ahead for good as the Sycamores upset No. 25 Vanderbilt $61-55$ for their first win over a ranked team since 2006.

Indiana State (8-2) earned its fifth win in 12 games against SEC teams and first since beating Vanderbilt on Dec. 22, 1984, in Terre Haute. The Sycamores are off to their best start since opening $8-1$ in 2005-06, and Lansing called this a big win for his program.

RJ Mahurin had a career-high 14 points off the bench, and Carl Richard and Jordan Printy each finished with 11. Jake Odum added 10 for the Sycamores, whose last win over a ranked team came on their own court against No. 14 Butler on Dec. 12, 2006.

Vanderbilt (6-4) lost its third non-conference game at home this season, with Cleveland State being the first. That's the most since the 1977-78 season.

Looking rusty, Vanderbilt fell behind by 12 early. The Commodores scored only once after Lance Goulbourne's three-point play with $6: 32$ left, and Jeffery Taylor's layup with 53.2 seconds remaining just wasn't enough.

Taylor finished with 21 points and Brad Tinsley had 12. Taylor had no answer for why the Commodores couldn't hold onto the lead.
"We're going to have to figure it out. It can't keep going like this," he said. "We're a much better team than we're playing right now."

Vanderbilt, considered a top-10 team at the beginning of the season, came in unranked after a Dec. 17 loss to Indiana State. The Commodores came in with a 0-2 mark against ranked teams this season, with losses to Xavier and Louisville -- both in overtime.

But the Commodores looked worthy of their preseason ranking, smothering the Golden Eagles on defense and doing just about anything they wanted on the other end.

Things went poorly from the start for the Golden Eagles, who shot 1 for 16 from the field to start the game.

Marquette tried to get the ball to Crowder down low early on, but it wasn't working with several Vanderbilt defenders collapsing on him every time he touched the ball. Crowder started the game 0 for 7 .

NASHVILLE - John Jenkins hit five 3-pointers and scored 26 points as Vanderbilt overcame a sluggish start and beat Miami (Ohio) 69-62 for the Commodores' fourth straight victory.

Coming off a 74-57 win at then-No. 14 Marquette, the Commodores (10-4) opened this game like so many this season at Memorial Gym struggling to find the basket, hitting only two of their first 14 shots. They finally heated up, especially from 3-point range where they hit 8 of 18 ( 44.4 percent) for the game.

Jeffery Taylor and Brad Tinsley each added 11 points, and senior Festus Ezeli blocked four shots to become Vanderbilt's career leader, passing former NBA player Will Perdue.

Freshman Brian Sullivan came off the bench and led the RedHawks (4-8) with 24 points, going 8 of 10 from beyond the arc. Julian Mavunga had his eighth double-double this season but was held to a seasonlow 14 points, along with his 11 rebounds.
The RedHawks, whose losses include 66-60 at thenNo. 13 Xavier, pulled within 43-41 as Mavunga scored six points and Jon Harris hit a 3-pointer with 12 minutes left. Jenkins answered with another 3 , then hit a jumper after a pump fake to push the lead to 48-41.

Miami (Ohio) pulled within $59-55$ as Drew
McGhee capped a 9-3 spurt. Jenkins hit a fall-away jumper to push it to $61-55$ with $3: 58$ left, then the Commodores forced Miami (Ohio) into its fourth shot clock violation of the game.

Brian Sullivan hit his eighth 3 to pull Miami (Ohio) within 63-58 only to have Ezeli block Josh Sewell's layup with 1:46 left. Miami (Ohio) never got closer than five as the Commodores hit all six free throws in the final 67 seconds to win.

$\star$ Festus Ezeli tallied four blocks in the game, breaking the all-time record at Vanderbilt for blocks. He now has 159 in his career. The center added seven rebounds in the victory.

NASHVILLE - The Vanderbilt Commodores finally are healthy, and they look more like the team expected to be among the nation's best with each passing victory.

John Jenkins scored 17 points and Jeffery Taylor added 16 as Vanderbilt routed Auburn 65-35 in opening Southeastern Conference play with the Commodores' fifth straight win.

Vanderbilt started the season ranked No. 7 only to drop out with four losses, two in overtime to ranked opponents in Xavier and Louisville, with senior center Festus Ezeli out with a sprained right knee. Stallings has had players miss practice time with concussions and sprained ankles too

Ezeli made his second start of the season Saturday, and the Commodores (11-4, 1-0) improved to 49-11 all-time in SEC openers at Memorial Gym. They did it with one of their best shooting performances this season in the first half in opening up a 38-19 halftime lead. They hit 50 percent (12 of 24 ) from the floor and were even better beyond the arc hitting 9 of 16 (56.3 percent). Five different players hit at least one 3 in the half.

Vanderbilt also showed off some defense holding Auburn to the fewest points scored this season. For Vanderbilt, it was the fewest points allowed since a 33-31 loss to Mississippi State on Jan. 30, 1982.

Brad Tinsley added 12 points and Ezeli grabbed eight rebounds and scored four points.

Jenkins, the SEC's leading scorer, also hit 5 of 8 from 3-point range.

The Tigers shot 27.3 percent ( 15 of 55 ) for the game. Vanderbilt outrebounded the Tigers 42-34 with the Commodores' lone struggles coming at the free throw line where they shot 8 of 16 ( 50 percent).

NASHVILLE - The Vanderbilt Commodores have proven time and again how well they can shoot the ball, especially beyond the arc. Now they are showing they can win a bit ugly, too.

John Jenkins scored 18 points, hitting all nine of his free throws, and Jeffery Taylor added 16 points as Vanderbilt held off Georgia 77-66. It's the Commodores' seventh straight win and keeps them undefeated in Southeastern Conference play along with only No. 2 Kentucky.

Vanderbilt coach Kevin Stallings credited his team's experience with four senior starters for helping pull out this victory.
"Not a thing of beauty, but over the course of 16 games it's not going to be pretty all the time," Stallings said. "So we won one that was a little ugly today, and we'll take it."

The Commodores (13-4, 3-0) didn't lead by more than six until Lance Goulbourne grabbed a rebound off Festus Ezeli's missed free throw and laid it back up for a 68-60 lead with 2:58 left. Vanderbilt sealed this victory at the free-throw line where the Commodores hit 15 of 22 in the final 4:53.

Vanderbilt wound up outrebounding Georgia 3527 and had a big edge at the free-throw line (30 of 44) compared to Georgia (16 of 20). It was Vandy's most free throws made and attempted since going 35 of 45 on Dec. 4, 2010, in a win over Belmont.

Georgia (9-8, 0-3) never went away in losing its third straight overall and fifth straight in this series. Vincent Williams hit a 3 to pull the Bulldogs within $62-60$, but they never got any closer. Kentavious Caldwell-Pope had a team-high 19 points, including four 3-pointers.

The result was another double-digit win that threatened to get really lopsided. John Jenkins had 20 points and Jeffery Taylor scored 17 to help the Commodores beat the Crimson Tide 69-59 for their eighth straight win.

They never let Green (six points) or Mitchell (zero) get going.

Releford made his final five shots after a 1 -for-11 start and also had six steals. Trevor Lacey added 10 for Alabama.

Bost scored on a layup with 51.8 seconds left in overtime and No. 18 Mississippi State edged Vanderbilt 78-77, snapping the Commodores' eight-game winning streak.

The Bulldogs (16-4, 3-2 Southeastern Conference) won in Memorial Gym for the first time since 2004 and snapped their own three-game skid in Nashville. They appeared headed toward another loss after trailing 39-28 at halftime.

Vanderbilt (14-5, 4-1) had plenty of chances to extend its winning streak but missed three shots after Bost's layup, the last a 3-point attempt by John Jenkins that hit the front of the rim just before the buzzer.

Bost scored 24 points, Steele finished with 15 , and Arnett Moultrie had his 11th double-double with 21 points and 14 rebounds.

Jenkins led Vanderbilt with 21 points, Jeffery Taylor had 19, and Festus Ezeli had 12 points and 14 rebounds. Lance Goulbourne added 12 points with a career-high four 3s

In a game featuring four of the SEC's top scorers - and with 16 NBA scouts watching - these teams put on a show from beyond the arc. The Bulldogs hit nine of 10 after halftime, while Vanderbilt was 14 of 27 overall - its most 3 s since hitting 15 against Mississippi State on March 5, 2008.

I think that first start got us the win almost because we hit them in the mouth so hard it was easy for us to keep going with it. Jeronne Maymon led Tennessee with 15 points. Freshman Jarnell Stokes had 10 rebounds but only six points and seven turnovers in the fourth game of his very short career. It was his second straight start.

John Jenkins scored seven of his 26 points in the final 4:34, and Vanderbilt held off Middle Tennessee 84-77 Saturday for its 10th win in 11 games in a game that was much tighter than the final score.

The Commodores (16-5) handed Middle Tennessee (20-3) its first loss since Dec. 7. They outrebound ed the Blue Raiders 28-22 and hit 24 free throws in 30 attempts to Middle Tennessee's 16 of 22.

Festus Ezeli scored a season-high 21 points and sank a career-best 11 free throws for Vanderbilt. Taylor added 17 points and Lance Goulbourne had 11.

LaRon Dendy led Middle Tennessee with a career-high 22 points. JT Sulton had 12 points before fouling out, and Bruce Massey and Marcos Knight each had 10.

Both teams came in streaking, with Middle Tennessee's streak tied for third-longest in the nation The Blue Raiders, whose campus is about 40 miles southeast of Nashville, have never won at Memorial Gym in a series Vandy now leads 29-4, but they certainly came close in this game.

The teams swapped the lead eight times with 10 ties, and Vanderbilt was up 44-39 at halftime. Middle Tennessee led by as much as eight in the first half, taking advantage of a cold-shooting start by Vanderbilt, and the Commodores never led by more than six as the teams went back and forth most of the second half.

Ricky Scott scored 18 points and the Razorbacks equaled their Southeastern Conference-best with nine 3 s in pulling away to an $82-74$ victory over No. 25 Vanderbilt on Tuesday night.

Five players scored in double figures for the Razorbacks (16-6, 4-3), who improved to 16-0 in Bud Walton Arena this season. Julysses Nobles added 17 points for Arkansas.

The Commodores ( $16-6,5-2$ ) led $40-37$ in the second half before Arkansas' Hunter Mickelson tied the game with a 3 -pointer. That started a stretch where the Razorbacks hit six of seven field goals from behind the arc and took a 59-46 lead.

Vanderbilt, which was led by John Jenkins' 19 points, was unable to get closer than seven points after that.

Jeffery Taylor added 18 points for the Commodores, while Festus Ezeli had 14 and Steve Tchiengang 10.

Arkansas equaled the best start to open a season since the 1993-94 national championship team had the same home mark for the entire season. Only that team and the 1997-98 team have gone undefeated at home since the arena opened in 1993.

The Razorbacks entered Tuesday night with home wins over two ranked teams already this season: then-No. 15 Mississippi State and then-No. 20 Michigan. They used big first-half runs in both of those wins, but didn't follow that script in falling behind 3432 at halftime to the Commodores.

This time, Arkansas pulled away in the second half with its 3 -point barrage against a Vanderbilt team that had won 11 of 12.

LSU (13-10, 3-6) lost for the fourth time in five games. Reserve Storm Warren had a team-high 13, Anthony Hickey and Ralston Turner had 12 and Justin Hamilton 10.

The Tigers had something to do with Vanderbilt's sluggish play. They have held 12 opponents under 60 points this season and looked to be on track for a 13th when the teams were tied at 27 at halftime.

LSU did hold the SEC's best 3-point shooting team to 35 percent (7 of 20), well below Vanderbilt's 42.9 percent average beyond the arc.

But with Ezeli playing much better after his left knee had been hurting the past few days, the Commodores had a $38-22$ scoring edge in the paint and they tied LSU at 37 -all on the boards where the Tigers had been the SEC leader in offensive boards. But they were able to count on Jenkins. The SEC's leading scorer buried two consecutive 3s to give the Commodores a 12-point lead, $56-44$, their biggest thus far, with 6:02 remaining.

John Jenkins hit six 3-pointers and finished with 22 points, and Vanderbilt beat Florida (No. 13 ESPN/ USA Today, No. 16 AP) 77-67 to clinch a first-round bye in the Southeastern Conference tournament.

The Commodores had been 5-7 in the final home game each season under coach Kevin Stallings, who has tried a variety of approaches to handle the emotions of the night. The Wildcats might not really care about the SEC tournament. The Commodores did.

Jeffery Taylor scored 18 points, Jenkins added 17 and Vanderbilt rallied with a $16-2$ run over the final 5 minutes to end the Wildcats' 24 -game winning streak that lasted more than three months.

Except for a late, desperate rally, the Ivy League's best had trouble hanging with the only private school in the Southeastern Conference.

John Jenkins made all six of his late free throws and scored 27 points Thursday to help Vanderbilt hold off Harvard 79-70 in an East Regional game, otherwise known as "The Brain Bowl."

Vanderbilt's senior-heavy group won its NCAA opener after the Commodores went winless in the tournament in 2008, ' 10 and ' 11 despite being seeded 4th, 4th and 5th. The Commodores ( $25-10$ ) were a ` 5 ' for this one, as well, but came in with a victory over top-ranked Kentucky last weekend and armed with plenty of lessons from past failures.

They built an 18 -point lead early in the second half and saw No. 12 Harvard (26-5) trim it to five with 1:51 to go. But the Commodores went 8 for 9 from the line from there and won despite not making a field goal over the final 5:22.

On Saturday, Vanderbilt faces Wisconsin, a 73-49 winner over Montana, earlier at The Pit. The Commodores have made it out of the first weekend only twice in their history.
Jeffery Taylor, who won a state title with Hobbs High School here at The Pit, finished with 15 points for Vandy while another senior, Festus Ezeli, grabbed 11 rebounds, blocked four shots and altered many more.

This was a sweet win for Vanderbilt, considering its tournament history. The Commodores had lost to Richmond, Murray State and Siena over the last four years -- becoming the punch line for a veritable who's who of first-round bracket busters.

Jenkins, a junior, could have gone to the NBA last year but decided to stick it out, along with four seniors in the starting lineup.

Berggren got his right hand on Lance Goulbourne's overhand heave, however, and the Badgers, celebrated a return trip to the Round of 16, where they lost last year to Butler.

The fourth-seeded Badgers (26-9) were led by Jordan Taylor's 14 points and also got 12 from Berggren, 11 from Evans and reserve Ben Brust and 10 from Mike Bruesewitz.
