## Commodores Advance to SEC Semifinals For Fourth Consecutive Season

Vanderbilt who won six out of their last eight games in 2013, advanced to their fourth consecutive SEC Tournament Semifinals as the number 10 seed at the 2013 tournament in Nashville. The Commodores knocked off number seven seed Arkansas in the second round and number two Kentucky in the quarterfinals before falling to eventual SEC Champion Ole Miss in the semifinals. The Commodores won their first SEC Tournament Championship in 2012 since 1951.

## Vanderbilt Returns Three Starters

After losing their top six players at the end of 2012, Vanderbilt played with a very young squad in 2012-13 (no seniors, ranked 322 in KenPom.com's experience rankings), and returns three starters for 2013-14 and eight letterwinners. The two starters lost were point guard Kedren Johnson, the team's leading scorer from 2012-13, who is suspended for the 2013-14 season after a violation of university policy, and Kevin Bright, who decided to return home to Germany to sign a professional contract. The Commodores also lost the services of freshman Sheldon Jeter, who elected to transfer.

## Stallings Wins Number 400, Closes In On Becoming AllTime Winningest Vanderbilt Coach

Vanderbilt head coach Kevin Stallings, who is in his 15th season as Commodore head coach, has 277 career victories with the Black and Gold, and trails all-time coaching leader Roy Skinner by only one win. The Commodores' mentor notched his 400th career win of his 20 -year career against Kentucky in the SEC Quarterfinals in Nashville in 2013. Coach Stallings is also the all-time wins leader at Memorial Gym with 187 wins

## Stallings' Success

Coach Stallings has had seven 20 -win seasons in the last nine, with six NCAA tournament appearances and two Sweet 16's (2004 and 2007). Stallings has the most 20 -win campaigns in Vanderbilt history, and is the first Commodore coach to lead Vanderbilt to three consecutive NCAA Tournaments (2010, 2011, 2012).

## European Vacation

In August, the Commodores ventured to Greece and Italy for a 10-day tour of the two countries, which included two games against a French Division I All-Star team in Greece and two against an Italian Division III squad in Rome. Vanderbilt came away 4-0 on the trip.

Freshman Damian Jones, who only played in the two games in Greece because of a school obligation, led the team with 13 points per game. In four games, Eric McClellan averaged 12.3 points per game, Rod Odom 11.5 points per contest, Dai-Jon Parker 10.3 per game, and Josh Henderson 10.0 points per game.

## International Presence

The Commodores are represented by two countries on this year's roster - the United States and Cameroon (James Siakam) - to continue Vanderbilt's line of foreign players. VU has had a player from outside of the United States on its roster for every season dating back to the 1996-97 campaign. The countries represented in the last 16 years (Ivory Coast, Poland, Austria, England, Australia, Cameroon, Nigeria, Sweden, Germany).

## 3-Point Streak Continues Through 27th Season; VU One Of Three Teams To Hit A Trey In Every Game Since 198687 Season

Vanderbilt has made a 3-pointer in 865 consecutive games, a streak which began at the inception of the 3-point line in 1986-87. The Commodores rank second only to UNLV (770) for the longest streak in Division I basketball. Vanderbilt, UNLV and Princeton (649) are the only three schools in college basketball to have made at least one 3-pointer in every game played since the 3-point line was implemented.

## Individual and Team Notes

- Forward Rod Odom is the team's leading returning scorer at 10.4 points per contest.
- The Commodores surrendered only 60.1 points per game, which marked Vanderbilt's best scoring defensive effort since 1950-51 (60.5 ppg).
- The Commodores were led in scoring by six different players in 2012-13, in rebounding by nine players, and six had different leaders in assists.
- $43.9 \%$ of Vanderbilt's attempts from the floor are threes, which ranked ninth out of 347 Division I teams. $38.7 \%$ of the team's total points comes off of threes, which ranked first nationally.


## Key Additions

Vanderbilt will welcome redshirt sophomore Eric McClellan, and two freshmen, Damian Jones and Luke Kornet, to the fold in 2013-14.

McClellan, a $6^{\prime} 4$ point guard who transferred from the University of Tulsa after the spring semester in 2012, practiced with the team last season after averaging 8.5 points, 2.5 rebounds and 2.2 assists in 23.1 minutes per game in 30 contests for the Golden Hurricane as a freshman. He also started 16 games for Tulsa in his freshman campaign.

Jones, a $6^{\prime} 10$ post man from Baton Rouge, Ala., signed with the Commodores in the early signing period after leading his Scotlandville Magnet School team to two consecutive Louisiana 5A Championships. He averaged 15.4 points, 8.0 rebounds, 4.0 blocks, and 2.0 assists in his senior season.

Kornet, a $6^{\prime} 10$ forward from Lantana, Texas, signed in the spring signing period with Vanderbilt. Kornet, the son of former Vanderbilt start Frank Kornet (1986-89), grew seven inches in his senior season at Liberty Christian School and averaged 15.0 points, 8.0 rebounds, 3.0 blocks, and 3.0 steals in his senior season.

NASHVILLE - Vanderbilt rolled to an 80-65 win over Nicholls State at Memorial Gym in the Commodores 2012-13 season-opener.

Vanderbilt has now won six-straight seasonopeners, dating back to the 2006-07 season. The Commodores (1-0 overall) are now 3-0 all-time versus Nicholls State ( $0-1$ overall).

Behind a career day from Kedren Johnson, the Commodores took complete control of the game at the start of the second half. Johnson set new careerhighs in points (25), rebounds (6) and assists (6). The Lewisburg, Tenn., native was an efficient 8-of-14 from the field, including $3-$ of- 7 from three-point range.

The Commodores came out of the locker room after half with a quick 6-0 run to extend their lead to 11 (34-23). From there, Vanderbilt continued its hot shooting as the Commodores would score 21 points in the first four and a half minutes of the second half.

Kevin Bright and Kyle Fuller each scored 15 points for the Commodores, while Bright led the team with eight rebounds in his collegiate debut. Fuller's 15 points were a new career-high, while he tied for the team-lead in assists with six, which also set a new career-high.

The Commodores shot 49 percent from the field for the game, including 66 percent from the field in the second half. Vanderbilt shot 72 percent ( 8 -of-11) from beyond the arc in the second half and 46 percent ( 12 -of- 26 ) for the game.

Fred Hunter led Nicholls State with 20 points and 10 rebounds, while Sam McBeath and T.J. Carpenter added 15 and 11 points, respectively.

Vanderbilt led by six points at the half, 28-22, behind 10 points from Johnson. Johnson (4-of-10 from the field) was the lone Commodore in double-figures in the first half.

Bright led all rebounders with seven boards in the first half. Johnson and Rod Odom each had four boards, apiece.

Both teams struggled from the field in the first half, as Vanderbilt shot 33 percent and Nicholls State shot just 31 percent. Vanderbilt held a slight rebounding advantage after one half, 21-19.

Fred Hunter led all scorers with 11 points for Nicholls State, while also adding a team-high five rebounds.

NASHVILLE - Freshman Sheldon Jeter scored a career-high 14 points off the bench to lead Vanderbilt to a 64-50 victory over William \& Mary.

The Commodores (6-6) smothered William \& Mary, which shot just 34 percent (16 of 47) from the field. Still, the Tribe (7-5) trailed by just seven with 7 minutes left. But Vanderbilt rattled off eight straight points, including consecutive 3-pointers from Kedren Johnson and Dai-Jon Parker to pull away.

Jeter was 6 of 7 from field and scored seven straight points twice.

Marcus Thornton paced William \& Mary with 14 points. Tim Rusthoven added 11 and Matt Rum had 10, while Kyle Gaillard grabbed 10 rebounds.

Vanderbilt coach Kevin Stallings picked up his 182nd win at home to become the all-time wins leader at Memorial Gymnasium. Stallings, in his 14th season, passed Roy Skinner, who won 181 games in 16 years over two stints from 1959-76.

Vanderbilt led 26-21 at halftime but missed its first five shots out of the break.

The Tribe took advantage, tying the game at 31 with a layup by Sean Sheldon. They couldn't jump back in front, as Vanderbilt went on a 13-4 run. Jeter closed out the spurt with seven straight points. The Commodores had missed 13 straight 3-pointers until Jeter snapped the skid with 12:10 left -- though replays showed he was inside the line -- as he sank a shot in the corner as he was fouled.

He missed the free throw but kept attacking the basket. He tipped in a teammate's miss later and drove the baseline for a 44-35 lead with 10:33 left and sparked a timeout from Tribe coach Tony Shaver.

William \& Mary, which entered shooting 48.6 percent, cut the lead to seven twice. Gaillard's jumper with 7:11 left pulled the Tribe within 48-41 but Vanderbilt made four straight 3-pointers to end the game.

NASHVILLE - To the Kentucky Wildcats, there's no doubt that Nerlens Noel's jumper left his hand before the shot clock buzzer sounded, and they couldn't be happier.

Vanderbilt coach Kevin Stallings disagrees.
That bucket allowed Kentucky to escape with a 60-58 win over Vanderbilt in the Southeastern Conference opener for both teams after blowing a 16-point lead.
"We're lucky to win the game," Kentucky coach John Calipari said.

Kyle Wiltjer's jumper with 1:57 left put Kentucky ahead to stay, but the Wildcats (10-4) also seemed to get a bit of help from officials by counting Noel's jumper with 17.3 seconds left that went in after the shot clock buzzer went off. Stallings took a timeout to plead his case, even patting his head as he talked to officials to signal shot clock violation.

But officials didn't review the play.
"They said it was not reviewable," Stallings said. "That's what they told me. It's not reviewable. The officials got together and said it's not reviewable. I don't really want to spend this press conference talking about a call that wasn't made. Obviously by my reaction, you could tell what I thought."

Kedren Johnson said he was right there and felt the ball still was in Noel's hands when the buzzer went off. Johnson made a 3 with 7.6 seconds left to pull Vandy within 60-58, and Kyle Fuller stole the inbound pass with 6.7 seconds to go giving the Commodores a last chance. Johnson's 3 hit the back rim just before the buzzer as the rally fell short for Vanderbilt (6-7).
"I knew it was a little bit too much to the right after I let it go," Johnson said. "Sometimes those still have a chance. Unfortunately, that one didn't go in for me."

Ryan Harrow led Kentucky with 16 points, Noel had 13 and Archie Goodwin 12.
"Even though it was an ugly win, at least we came out with the win," Harrow said.

Johnson finished with a game-high 18 points, and Rod Odom added 12 as Vanderbilt outrebounded Kentucky 42-37.

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. - Arkansas' Marshawn Powell stayed up until 6:30 a.m. the day after his scoreless effort in a loss Wednesday at Texas A\&M, watching old games and noticing his tendency to play well after starting quickly.

Powell put his studies to good use on Saturday, scoring 17 points as the Razorbacks pulled away for a \(56-33\) win over Vanderbilt.

The junior scored the first eight points for Arkansas (10-5, 1-1 Southeastern Conference), which bounced back from a season-worst 51-point effort in the 18 -point loss to the Aggies. Powell also added 6 rebounds and 6 steals to help ease the sting of Wednesday's disappointment.

While Powell regained his scoring touch on Saturday, the Commodores ( \(6-8,0-2\) ) narrowly avoided setting the school mark for scoring futility.

Sheldon Jeter had 8 points to lead Vanderbilt, which matched its season low for points and committed a season-worst 26 turnovers, leading to 23 points for the Razorbacks.

The Commodores started slowly, hitting one of their first 13 shots, and never fully recovered. They were 3 of 15 from the field in the first half and trailed 21-11 at halftime -- after closing with a relative offensive furry ( 5 points) in the closing minute and a half.

Vanderbilt finished 10 of 40 ( 25 percent) from the field, including a 2 of 15 effort from the 3 -point line, and has now lost four of its last five games. The Commodores, who entered the game next-to-last in the SEC in scoring at 59.5 points per game, also scored 33 points in a loss to Marist earlier this season.

NASHVILLE - Marshall Henderson saw nobody in front of him with time running out, so he heaved the ball at the basket, beating the buzzer to force overtime.

Just as the Mississippi guard planned.
His desperation heave gave the Rebels the extra time they needed, and Nick Williams' jumper put Mississippi ahead to stay in rallying to beat Vanderbilt 89-79 for their sixth straight win. Henderson said he knew he would come down and hit the overtime forcing shot.
"I didn't actually shoot it the way I wanted to shoot it," Henderson said. "I didn't have any rotation on it. I just kind of floated in there, but l'll take it."

The Rebels (14-2, 3-0) took it from there in extending the Southeastern Conference's longest winning streak by winning in Memorial Gym for the first time since 2001, and they had to do it by rallying from 13 points with 8:39 left. Cornell then went back to perimeter shooting but, with Vanderbilt switching to a zone defense, went cold from the outside. Vanderbilt answered with a 12-2 run, with eight points from Odom and six from Fuller. A rare five-point possession ended the spurt. As Odom sank his third 3-pointer, Fuller was fouled while setting his screen. He made both free throws to push the lead to \(52-40\) with \(9: 59\) left.

Kevin Bright hit the Commodores' 17th 3, giving Vandy a \(78-75\) lead with 3.2 seconds left in regulation. Henderson flung the ball at the basket from about 35 feet away, and he ran around the court celebrating. Williams hit his jumper with \(4: 34\) left in overtime, and the Rebels outscored Vanderbilt 11-1 in overtime to snap the Commodores' five-game winning streak in this series.
"It was just brainless on our part because we didn't match up the right way," Vanderbilt guard Kedren Johnson said of Henderson's shot.

Vanderbilt (6-9, 0-3) set a Memorial Gym record hitting 17 -pointers but couldn't overcome poor free throw shooting (10 of 23).

COLUMBIA - Vanderbilt coach Kevin Stallings thinks his young team may be growing up.

The Commodores held on despite squandering nearly all of a 10 -point lead in the second half to win their first Southeastern Conference game of the season, 58-51 over South Carolina.

Kyle Fuller scored 12 points and Dai-Jon Parker 11 for Vanderbilt (7-9, 1-3 SEC), which has had its share of problems finishing games this season. Middle Tennessee used a 16-3 run at the end to pull out a 56 52 win over the Commodores on Dec. 21. They wiped out a 16-point lead against Kentucky on Jan. 10 before losing 60-58. And this past Tuesday, Mississippi got a 3 -pointer at the buzzer to force overtime before pulling away for an 89-79 victory.

Things were slipping away for Vanderbilt once again at the Colonial Life Arena. This time, though, the Commodores called on some tough defense and solid foul shooting to earn their fourth straight victory over South Carolina.

The Commodores (7-9, 1-3) led 45-35 with 8:35 to go after a free throw by Shelby Moats. South Carolina (11-6, 1-3) used a 14-6 run over the next six minutes to get within a basket at 51-49, but the Gamecocks got no closer.

Vanderbilt went 0 -for-6 from the field in the last 6:27 but made seven foul shots down the stretch to keep in front. The Commodores' leading scorer coming in, Kedren Johnson, was held to three points, 12 fewer than his average, on 0 -of- 6 shooting
"This is a shot in the arm for us," Stallings said.
Brenton Williams had 16 points to lead South Carolina. Williams missed a 3-pointer with 1:41 left that would've given the Gamecocks a lead when they trailed 51-49.

Williams said teammate Bruce Ellington found him for an open 3 in the corner. "Unfortunately, I wasn't able to make the shot," Williams said.

Rod Odom extended the Commodores' lead with a pair of foul shots moments later. Fuller made 1 of 2 from the line, as did Sheldon Jeter. Fuller added one more foul shot for a \(56-49\) lead with 36 seconds left.

After Brian Richardson scored the Gamecocks final points on breakaway dunk, Johnson and Fuller each made one more foul shot to put the game away.

Four players scored in double figures to help the Commodores (8-9, 2-3 Southeastern Conference) win consecutive games for the first time in more than a month.

The Tigers (8-10, 2-3) cut the deficit to five points twice in the second half before Vanderbilt used the long ball to sprint away. Kyle Fuller, Sheldon Jeter and Kevin Bright each drained 3-pointers during a 13-3 run. Rod Odom emphatically capped off the spurt with a two-handed dunk after Josh Henderson found him streaking to the basket for a \(52-37\) lead with 12:28 left.

Fuller scored 14 points, Bright added 12 and Jeter had 10 as the Commodores won their seventh straight against Auburn.

Rob Chubb and Frankie Sullivan each scored 14 points and Brian Greene Jr. added 11 for the Tigers, who have dropped three straight.

Two straight layups by Chubb sparked Auburn, which made its first five shots. A baseline jumper by Jordan Price put the Tigers up 12-4 just 5:01 into the game.

After missing seven of its opening eight shots, Vanderbilt responded with a run of its own thanks to the play of three former starters. Bright popped off the bench with a straightaway 3-pointer, Henderson followed with a layup and Fuller scored five straight points. He bounced in a 3-pointer to cap off a 10-1 run and give the Commodores a brief 14-13 lead with 11:58 left in the half.

The game tilted back and forth until Vanderbilt ended the half with seven straight points. Coach Kevin Stallings delivered high-fives to his team after Auburn called a timeout with 1:22 left in the half following an offensive rebound and layup by Shelby Moats, which gave Vanderbilt a 34-27 halftime lead.

After the break, the Commodores picked up where they left off as Jeter scored five straight points to stake a 39-29 lead. After Auburn sliced the deficit in half, Fuller answered with a 3-pointer to spark the rout.

"There's not a whole lot to say about this going wrong or that going wrong," Stallings said. "They were much better and much faster. They shot better and rebounded way better. In every facet they whooped us."

Rod Odom matched a career high with 17 points and Kedren Johnson added 11 for Vanderbilt (8-10, 2-4 Southeastern Conference), which entered the day having won consecutive games for the second time this season.

But after a dunk by Sheldon Jeter gave the Commodores an 11-8 lead with \(15: 25\) left in the first half, Missouri scored 32 of the next 34 points in a span of 11:47. Vanderbilt trailed 49-20 at halftime.
"I thought we were improving coming into this game," Stallings said. "We had won two in a row, one a road game against a South Carolina team that came in here and played awfully well the other night. But we were just physically overmatched today. When they started making shots like that, we were in trouble."

Jabari Brown scored 21 points and Alex Oriakhi tied a career high with 18 for Missouri (15-4, 4-2). After going 11 of 51 on 3-point attempts their past two games, the Tigers hit 11 of 21 Saturday - including eight in the first half for a rare fast start.

Brown has scored in double figures in nine of his 10 games with the Tigers, and leads the team in conference play with 17.3 points per game. He entered the day leading the SEC with 3.23 -pointers per game, and shot 4 of 8 from behind the arc.
"I definitely feel like I'm getting more comfortable out there," Brown said. "It's a learning process. I'm just learning something from every game and moving forward."

Oriakhi's 12 rebounds, including six offensive boards, helped give Missouri a 40-18 advantage on the glass, including 24-7 in the first half. With senior Laurence Bowers missing his fifth consecutive game because of a sprained ligament in his right knee, Missouri coach Frank Haith said the past few games have been "healthy" for Oriakhi to be the go-to guy.

Vanderbilt guard Kedren Johnson had a chance to win the game for Vanderbilt as he drove to the basket in the closing seconds, but his shot went off the backboard and rolled off the front end of the rim. Kevin Bright grabbed the offensive board but missed the potential game-winner.

Skylar McBee added 10 points for Tennessee (11-8, 3-4 Southeastern Conference). Johnson led Vanderbilt (8-11, 2-5) with 14 points, all in the second half. Vanderbilt's Josh Henderson matched a career high with 13 points.

Stokes spent the first five minutes of the game abusing a Vanderbilt team with the SEC's worst rebound margin. Stokes, who was coming off an 18-rebound performance against Alabama, controlled both ends of the floor as the Vols took an early 12-0 lead.

Vanderbilt didn't make a basket in the first eight minutes of action and eventually fell behind 19-5, but the Commodores wouldn't disappear. They gradually chipped away at the lead and finally slowed down Stokes when Henderson came off the bench to guard him.

Vanderbilt went on an 18-3 run and turned a 19-5 deficit into a 23-22 lead on Kyle Fuller's three-point play with \(2: 36\) left in the half. Tennessee regained the lead 34 seconds later on a Stokes putback and led 27-23 at halftime.

Johnson, who had been leading Vanderbilt with 14.9 points per game this season, played just six minutes and didn't score in the first half after picking up two early fouls. But he came up big in the second half and sparked an 11-0 run that culminated with a Sheldon Jeter 3-pointer that tied the score at 52 with six minutes left.

Stokes put Tennessee back ahead for good by converting a three-point play with 4:14 after receiving a pass from walk-on guard Brandon Lopez, who hadn't played at all in the Vols' last five games.

Trevor Lacey helped end that drought by hitting a 3 -pointer with 56.8 seconds left that gave Alabama its first lead of the game, and the Crimson Tide wound up edging Vanderbilt 58-54 after trailing by as much as 11 in the second half.

It looked like that drought would reach 12 straight until Alabama (14-7, 6-2 Southeastern Conference) rallied despite hitting only one field goal after Andrew Steele's 3 -pointer with 5:57 left. The Crimson Tide wound up winning for the sixth time in seven games, finishing on an 18-3 run.

Steele, wearing a walking boot on his right foot after aggravating his ankle, said ending the drought took too long. Vanderbilt (8-12, 2-6) didn't hit a field goal after Kyle Fuller's 3-pointer with 7:10 left. Kedren Johnson had 15 points and Fuller 13.

The Crimson Tide came in tied with Kentucky for third in the SEC and traveling after edging Arkansas 59-56 in a late game Thursday night. Vanderbilt was well-rested after a \(58-57\) loss at Tennessee on Tuesday night, and the Commodores outshot Alabama 48.7 percent ( 19 of 39 ) to 38 percent ( 19 of 50 ) and outrebounded the Tide 31-27.

O'Bryant then made a pair of critical free throws for a four-point cushion which rendered Odom's 3 in the final seconds meaningless.

Odom finished with a game-high 20 points. Dai-Jon Parker added 11 points and nine rebounds for Vanderbilt, which has lost four straight.

LSU, which has now won four of five, exploded for an 18-2 run that gave the Tigers a 31-18 halftime lead.

Both teams shot poorly in what was a sloppy first 15 minutes, and Vanderbilt went ahead 16-13 on Kyle Fuller's layup.

Soon after, however, Malik Morgan's jumper ignited the game-changing run to close the first half. The spurt included a dunk by Andrew Del Piero that energized the crowd and three 3s by Hickey, the last coming at the halftime horn.

Even after its offense picked up, LSU still finished the night shooting 36 percent ( 18 of 50 ). Vanderbilt was even worse, at 31.5 percent ( 17 of 54 ). Only four players scored in double digits between the two teams, though LSU's Morgan and Charles Carmouche each had nine.

The Tigers took their largest lead on Andre Stringer's free throw that made it 35-23.

Sheldon Jeter's layup and Parker's 3 ignited an 8-0 Vanderbilt run, but LSU was back up by 11 when Stringer hit a 3 with \(8: 38\) to go.

LSU led 54-47 with under a minute to go, but Odom hit a 3, Stringer missed one of two free throws on the other end and then Odom made his second 3 to make it a one possession game in the final seconds.

NASHVILLE - The Vanderbilt Commodores finally found a way to finish off a big lead with a win, and coach Kevin Stallings hopes this can be a stepping stone.

Rod Odom scored 15 points, and Vanderbilt beat Arkansas \(67-49\) to snap a four-game losing skid. The Commodores, who had lost seven of their last nine, lost one in overtime, two others by a single point, another by two and another by four after blowing an 11-point lead with 7 minutes left.

Stallings said he was certainly fired up for his young Commodores after being kicked in the "you know whats" several times in the past few weeks
"At some point, human nature or common sense says their confidence is going to waver if they don't win," Stallings said. "They're going to lose faith, lose hope, lose confidence, lose trust, lose something, so you need something good to happen. They haven't shown any signs of that."

The Commodores also got a bit of payback for one of their ugliest losses this season.

Vanderbilt (9-13, 3-7 Southeastern Conference) managed only 11 points by halftime and matched a season-low in points while losing \(56-33\) to Arkansas on Jan. 12 in Fayetteville. This time, the Commodores held Arkansas to a season low in scoring. They also built their biggest halftime lead in SEC play at 35-24 and finally protected a lead by finishing off the win.
"How they performed when we went down to Arkansas gave us motivation to play harder and try to take it to them like they took it to us," Odom said.

Sheldon Jeter added 13 points and Josh Henderson had 11 for a team that hadn't won since Jan. 23 against Auburn.
"We've had some close losses that kind of hurt us, but at the same time that was just making us stronger and hungrier to get a win," Henderson said. "So we definitely needed this and happy we finally got it."

Arkansas (14-9, 5-5) failed to follow up its 80-69 upset of No. 2 Florida, and the Razorbacks still remain winless this season in true road games. They've lost all six, including their first four league games.

NASHVILLE - Jarnell Stokes scored 17 points and grabbed 10 rebounds for his sixth straight double-double to lead Tennessee to a \(58-46\) victory over in-state rival Vanderbilt.

Jordan McRae had 14 points and 11 rebounds as the Volunteers (13-10, 5-7 Southeastern Conference) won their third straight over the Commodores to match their longest winning streak in the series in nine years.

Tennessee led by as many as 16 and swatted away a late rally by Vanderbilt (9-14, 3-8), which was swept in the season series for the sixth time in 13 years.

After a 3-pointer by Kyle Fuller less than 10 minutes in, Tennessee stormed in front thanks to 53.3 -percent shooting ( 16 of 30 ) in the first half. McRae responded on the next possession with a running jumper off the backboard and the Vols surged ahead.

During a frenzied stretch, which included more than 6 minutes without stoppage in play, Tennessee gained control with a \(20-6\) run, including eight straight points from Stokes. His emphatic dunk with 1:47 left gave the Vols a 40-28 lead. Stokes charged untouched through the lane for an explosive, one-handed slam. The sophomore, who recorded his SEC-best 10th double-double of the season, wore a huge grin as he jogged down the court.

Trae Golden made his first start in more than a month and scored 12 points for the Vols.

Kedren Johnson scored 11 points and Kevin Bright grabbed 11 rebounds for the Commodores, who have lost five of six.

In the teams' previous meeting in Knoxville, Vanderbilt fell behind \(12-0\) before charging back only to fall short 58-57.

NASHVILLE - Texas A\&M probably didn't target DaiJon Parker as a perimeter threat.

After all, the Vanderbilt guard entered Saturday's game against the Aggies with just 123 -pointers this season. Little did they know, however, Parker had been squeezing time in between classes and after study hall to fine-tune his long ball.

Parker witnessed the fruits of his labor and caught Texas A\&M off guard with a personal-best five 3-pointers and a career-high 17 points to lift Vanderbilt to a \(63-56\) victory.
"It probably wasn't on their scouting report," Parker said with a wide grin. "I had to pull it out of my bag of tricks tonight. I had to come through for my team."

Rod Odom added a game-high 19 points as the Commodores (10-14, 4-8 Southeastern Conference) won the first meeting between the schools since 1955. Odom added a career-tying four 3 -pointers, including a clutch shot from the corner with 1 minute left, to help sink the Aggies (15-10, 5-7).

Before Saturday, Parker hadn't made more than two 3-pointers in a game. By halftime, he had three. He added another in a 20-6 run spanning both halves that allowed the Commodores to create some separation. His fifth and final 3 came in the left corner with more than nine minutes left.

On the next possession, with the Aggies guarding the 3 -point line, Parker drove the baseline, wiggled around Roberson and banked in a reverse layup with his right hand for the largest lead of the game, 46-33, with 8:37 left.

The Aggies chipped away though and kept the final minutes interesting.

After a jumper by Josh Henderson gave Vanderbilt what appeared to be a comfortable \(56-45\) lead with 3:18 to go, Texas A\&M rattled off six straight points.

LEXINGTON - Willie Cauley-Stein scored 20 points, and his two crucial blocks and key rebound in the final 34 seconds helped Kentucky outlast Vanderbilt 74-70 for its first win without injured star center Nerlens Noel.

Cauley-Stein, a 7 -foot freshman manning the post for Kentucky (18-8, 9-4 Southeastern Conference) with Noel sidelined, blocked attempts by Kyle Fuller and Kedren Johnson 9 seconds apart before grabbing Johnson's missed 3-pointer with 17 seconds left and drawing a foul.

Cauley-Stein made 1 of 2 free throws for 74-67 lead that offset Sheldon Moats' 3 for Vanderbilt (10-15, \(4-9\) ) with 3 seconds remaining. Cauley-Stein finished 8 of 10 from the field and grabbed seven rebounds to provide Kentucky a sorely-needed victory after the Wildcats were shellacked \(88-58\) Saturday at Tennessee in their first game since Noel sustained a season-ending left knee injury at Florida on Feb. 12.

Noel's first public appearance since tearing his anterior cruciate ligament boosted the morale of the Wildcats, who had to withstand another Commodores rally.

Trailing 51-41 with 14:46 remaining, Vanderbilt's \(18-10\) run over the next 10 -plus minutes got the Commodores within 61-59. Julius Mays answered with a 3-pointer to give Kentucky a five-point lead before Cauley-Stein added a basket leading up to his defensive heroics.

Archie Goodwin added 16 points and Ryan Harrow 12 for the Wildcats.

Johnson had 17 points and Rod Odum 16 for Vanderbilt.

Fuller added 14 and Henderson 13 for Commodores, who made 10 of 22 ( 45.5 percent) from beyond the arc. That still wasn't enough to overcome the Wildcats, who shot 29 of 56 overall and outscored Vanderbilt \(38-24\) in the paint.

Kevin Bright hit a pull-up jumper with 0.8 seconds left that bounced off the rim and then the backboard before falling through, and Vanderbilt rallied from a 17-point deficit to edge Georgia 63-62 for the Commodores' second straight win.

The freshman didn't expect the ball to come to him. When it did, he dribbled to the baseline and just tried to get a shot off.
"When the ball first hit the rim, I thought it was going to bounce off," Bright said. "Luckily, it bounced back in."

Vanderbilt has had one SEC loss this season in overtime, two by four points and a couple by a single point.
"It feels good to finally be on the other side of that win," guard Kedren Johnson said.

Bright's shot went in with 0.6 seconds left in the game. Officials reviewed the play and pushed the clock to 0.8 . The extra two-tenths of a second didn't matter.

Kentavious Caldwell-Pope scored 20 points and had 14 rebounds for Georgia (13-15, 7-8). His desperate fling at the bucket bounced harmlessly off the left side of the backboard as the buzzer sounded.

The Commodores (12-15, 6-9) now have won three of their last four, trying to climb up from the league's bottom four teams and avoid playing on the opening night of the SEC tournament in two weeks.

Johnson scored 17 points. Reserve Sheldon Jeter matched his career high with 14 points, all in the second half, and Bright finished with 11 as Vanderbilt extended its winning streak to eight straight over Georgia. Vandy hit 17 of 18 at the free throw line and had a season-low four turnovers.

The Commodores showed poise that was missing a month ago.

Vanderbilt ended the regular season by staring down a late South Carolina charge and holding on for a 74 -64 victory on Saturday. Rod Odom and Dai-Jon Parker each scored 18 points and the Commodores, who held on after their 12-point lead evaporated to two with less than four minutes remaining.
"I'm real proud of our team for hanging in there this regular season and fighting all the way to the end and never giving in through some of the disappointments we had," Vanderbilt coach Kevin Stallings said of his team, which has won six of its last nine games.

The Commodores (14-16, 8-10 Southeastern Conference) charged to a \(36-25\) halftime lead behind 16 first-half points from Odom.

But South Carolina (14-17, 4-14) pulled within two, 56-54, on Lakeem Jackson's layup with 3:45 left. But his unconventional one-handed free throw missed and failed to complete the 3-point play.

Vanderbilt center Josh Henderson answered with a layup off a pick and roll. Then, with the shot clock winding down, Parker made his third and final 3 -pointer. The shot glanced off the backboard and through the net for a 61-54 lead with 2:23 to go.

Brenton Williams' third 3-pointer off an offensive rebound chopped the deficit to \(66-62\) with 35 seconds remaining. Vanderbilt silenced the comeback by making eight of 10 free throws in the last 51 seconds.

The Commodores (15-16) lost the top six players off that title team with three now playing in the NBA. They will play No. 2 seed Kentucky in the quarterfinals Friday night in a rematch of last year's championship game.

Arkansas (19-13) lost for the 12th time in 13 games away from Fayetteville including three times on neutral courts. Not even the fans calling the hogs helped it feel enough like home as the Razorbacks last led at 9-7.

Rod Odom led Vanderbilt with 20 points, Kyle Fuller had 19, Johnson finished with 13 and Dai-Jon Parker 11.

BJ Young led Arkansas with 16 points. Marshawn Powell had 13 before fouling out late and Michael Qualls added 10.

These young Commodores made it way too interesting as Arkansas clawed its way back, trimming a 59-43 lead to 70-68 on a pair of free throws by Young with 50.9 seconds left. Then Vanderbilt, which had hit as many 3-pointers in the second half as free throws ( 6 of 15), hit 5 of 6 at the line in clinching the win in the final 19.8 seconds.

Vanderbilt finished 17 of 30 at the line.
Only three of the current Commodores even averaged more than three minutes a game on last season's team, and the growing pains were very obvious all of this season as the Commodores racked up 10 close losses in the SEC including one in overtime, two by four points, one by two points and a pair of road games by a point.

But the Commodores now have won five of their last six, and they used their shooting prowess beyond the arc. Vanderbilt ranks eighth out of 347 Division I teams, taking 43.6 percent of its shots from 3-point range, and third nationally scoring 38.5 percent of its points off 3 s .

And they put a serious dent in Kentucky's hopes of having at least a chance to defend its national title in the process. Dai-Jon Parker scored 12 points, and Vanderbilt beat Kentucky \(64-48\) Friday night in a rematch of last year's Southeastern Conference tournament championship won by the Commodores.
"It's been a long time since l've been as proud of a team as I am this team here," Stallings said. "I'm very proud of this team and very proud of this season, and we're 16-16. That's the first time we've been .500 in about five months. But you know what? I wish it was better than that, but very proud of them."

Actually, Vandy was 6-6 at the start of SEC play before losing to Kentucky. Now the 10th-seeded Commodores have won six of their last seven in giving Stallings his 400th career victory, and they will play either Missouri or Mississippi in their fourth straight semifinal on Saturday.

They came out and hit 18 of their first 27 shots, including their first five of the second half, in building a 48 -27 lead. Kentucky clawed back with 10 straight points, the last a high-flying dunk by Goodwin to pull within \(48-37\) with \(12: 43\) to go. NASHVILLE - Marshall Henderson scored 23 points as Mississippi beat Vanderbilt 64-52 Saturday in the Southeastern Conference tournament semifinals, putting the Rebels just one more win away from making sure their NCAA tournament berth is automatic.

The third-seeded Rebels (25-8) came here needing wins to sharpen their postseason resume. Now they will play No. 13 Florida, a \(61-51\) winner over Alabama, in Sunday's championship game where the winner advances to the NCAA tournament.

Reginald Buckner also had 15 points, and Murphy Holloway added 12 for Ole Miss. The Rebels now have won six of seven to reach the championship game for the first time since 2001. Another win would give coach Andy Kennedy his first NCAA berth and the Rebels' first since 2002.

No. 10 seeded Vanderbilt (16-17), the defending tournament champion, lost for only the second time in eight games. Kedren Johnson had a team-high 12 points.

Kennedy, the Rebels' winningest coach, has at least 20 victories in four straight seasons and became the fifth SEC coach to win 20 in six of his first seven seasons, but missing out yet again on an NCAA berth could threaten his job security.

The Rebels played without point guard Jarvis Summers, who hit his head hard in Friday night's win against Missouri. They didn't need him as they wore down Vanderbilt, with the Commodores playing their third game in as many days along with going to class the past two days.

Ole Miss outshot Vandy 44 percent ( 22 of 50 ) to 33.9 percent ( 19 of 56 ) as the Commodores went a chilly 6 of 30 behind the arc. The Rebels also finished with a 41-36 edge on the boards.

Ole Miss didn't grab its first lead until the opening minute of the second half, but the Rebels took control with a 15-2 run a few minutes later.
