 2015-16 PRESEASON NOTES

## 20-Win Seasons

With the win over Saint Mary's in the first round of the NIT in 2015, Vanderbilt registered its eighth 20 -win season in the last 12 years and its 19th overall in program history. Coach Kevin Stallings' eight 20 -win seasons is the most by a Vanderbilt coach.

## Coach Stallings Now In 6th Place In SEC Wins

Head Coach Kevin Stallings, the school's all-time winningest coach, is in his 17th season with the Commodores and 22nd overall as a head coach. Stallings has 313 career wins at Vanderbilt and 436 overall as a head coach. He has eight 20 -win seasons in the last 12 seasons, with 11 total postseason appearances, six NCAA tournaments, and two Sweet 16 's (2004 and 2007). He is also one of five SEC coaches to win 300 or more games at one institution, joining Kentucky's Adolph Rupp, Florida's Billy Donovan, and LSU's Dale Brown and Harry Rabenhorst, and is now in 6th place all-time on the SEC wins list after surpassing Tubby Smith after the Alabama win at Memorial Gym.

## Young Team Grew Up

The Commodores, ranked as the 347th youngest team in the nation out of 351 teams in 2014-15, finished the season strong, finishing 10-4 in their last 14 games - all from freshmen and sophomores, who comprised seven of the eight players in Vanderbilt's primary rotation, with one senior, James Siakam.

## Damian Jones Show

Sophomore Damian Jones, the team's leading scorer and rebounder, scored $20+$ points in eight games as a sophomore and finished first in the SEC in field goal percentage, 3rd in blocks (2.0), and 10th in scoring. He posted his 8 th $20+$-point game of the year at Saint Mary's, when he tied a career-high with 10 field goals made and scored 21 points. He also had a career-high 15 rebounds vs. Tennessee. He scored in double figures in 28 games as a sophomore and has scored 10 points or more in 48 career games.

## Wade Baldwin Named AII-SEC Freshman

Baldwin was named to the SEC All-Freshman team after finishing the season fifth in the league in assists (4.4) in all games and leading all SEC freshmen in assists. He finished the season 6th in all games in steals (1.5) and 3rd in A/TO ratio (2.2). In league games only, he finished fifth in steals (1.7), fourth in assists (4.5), and 8th in A/TO ratio (2.0). He finished tied for 6 th all-time on Vanderbilt's single-season assist list and is VU's all-time freshman leader on the single-season assist list with 155 assists. He recorded 50 steals in 2014-15, the 2nd most in 13 years.

## SEC Freshmen Leaders

Riley LaChance led all SEC freshmen in scoring at 12.3 ppg in all games and in league games only (12.2), while Wade Baldwin IV led all freshmen in assists with 4.4 per contest and steals in league games only with 1.67 per game. Matthew Fisher-Davis led all SEC freshmen in threes made with 2.1 per game.

## Baldwin In Elite Company

Baldwin, along with D'Angelo Russell of Ohio State, finished the season as the only freshman guards to average at least nine points, four assists, and four rebounds per game.

## All-SEC Selections

Vanderbilt sophomore center Damian Jones was named to the All-SEC 1st Team and the All-Defensive Team, while freshmen Wade Baldwin IV and Riley LaChance were honored on the All-Freshman Team. The trio become the 32nd, 33rd, and 34th selections, respectively, to be honored as an All-SEC team member of the Kevin Stallings' era, while Jones' first-team honor is the program's 56th selection since 1949 and the first since 2012 when John Jenkins and Jeffery Taylor were named to the team. Baldwin IV and LaChance became Vanderbilt's 13th and 14th selections on the All-Freshman team, and the first time in the history of the program that Vanderbilt has had two players selected to the team.

## Block Party

The 2014-15 team blocked 186 shots on the season, which set a new Vanderbilt season record, surpassing the 2008-09 team, which blocked 174 shots that season. The Commodores' 186 blocks ranks 14th nationally. Against Saint Mary's in the NIT First Round, Vanderbilt tied a then-program record with 11 blocks, and then followed that up with a 13 -block performance against South Dakota State, which set a new program single-game record.

## Assist Numbers

Vanderbilt had 541 assists on the season, which tied the seventh-best season in Commodore history for assists. Wade Baldwin had 155 assists to lead all Commodore players, with Shelton Mitchell 103 and Riley LaChance 102, marking only the third time in Commodore history that three players have registered 100 assists or more. Vanderbilt has only had two other seasons in its history in which three players have had 100 or more assists - 1988-89 (Barry Goheen, 130, Barry Booker, 118, Derrick Wilcox, 173) and 1993-94 (Billy McCaffrey, 133, Ronnie McMahan, 108, Frank Seckar, 110). The Commodores also ranked first in the SEC in assist percentage (assists on made baskets) and fourth nationally.

## Threes From Everywhere

The Commodores finished the season with four different players shooting $40 \%$ or better from three in 2014-15 (at least 10 made threes), only the third time since the three-point line came into existence in 1986-87 that a Vanderbilt team has accomplished that. Wade Baldwin IV, Luke Kornet, Jeff Roberson, and Matthew Fisher-Davis all shot $40 \%$ or better on the season, with Baldwin leading the way at 43.9\%. In 1987-88, five Commodores - Barry Goheen, Barry Booker, Charles Mayes, Scott Draud, and Derrick Wilcox shot above 40\%, the most in program history.

## LaChance Led All SEC Freshmen In Scoring

Freshman Riley LaChance, who was named to the All-Freshman team, finished the season as the leading freshman scorer in the SEC at 12.3 points per game in all games and also led the conference among freshmen scorers with 12.2 per game. He finished the season second among all SEC freshmen in three's made per contest at 1.9 per game (behind teammate Matthew Fisher-Davis), which was sixth in the conference overall. LaChance won four SEC Freshman of the Week honor, which set a new program record. He poured in two consecutive 26 -point games against Purdue and Western Carolina in 2014-15, and had three $20+$ point games. In all, he scored in double figures in 24 contests.

NASHVILLE - Vanderbilt dominated the second half en route to an 83-56 season-opening win over Trevecca Nazarene.

Damian Jones scored a career-high 24 points, while freshman Riley LaChance added 13 and Luke Kornet scored 10 to lead Vanderbilt.

Jones, a preseason All-SEC first-team selection, was 10 of 13 from the field and grabbed 12 rebounds as Vanderbilt (1-0) overwhelmed Trevecca (1-1), which is transitioning to NCAA Division II.

Trevecca managed to keep it close trailing 33-30 at the half, but Vanderbilt opened the second half on a 13-0 run, which included a couple spectacular dunks by Jones.

Three freshmen, including LaChance, started for Vanderbilt, which is in a major rebuilding mode. The team had only seven scholarship players a year ago and must now rely heavily on a rotation of five freshmen.
"There's going to be some inconsistencies with us," said Stallings. "I would like to think, in my more rational moments, that I would know that part of that is having a team as young as our team is."

Jones, a sophomore from Baton Rouge, La., will be asked to lead the Commodores and that's what he did against overmatched Trevecca, which is about a 15 minute drive from Vanderbilt.

Stallings knows that Jones will have be the one that guides his young squad.
"We need him to be a guy that can lead us and his play inspires confidence throughout the rest of our team," Stallings said. "His play today did that. Let's see it happen against guys that look more like him, play more like him, and are more his level of ability."

Jalen Palm led the Trojans with 11 points.
Vanderbilt was able to dominate inside as Trevecca didn't have an answer for Jones or Kornet, who finished with 10 rebounds. The sophomores blocked four shots apiece and altered several others.

The 6 -foot-10 center scored 21 points and had six rebounds, leading the Commodores to a $72-62$ win over Lipscomb.
"We better have that card to play or we're going to have some trouble on nights," Vanderbilt coach Kevin Stallings said. "We were able to get him the ball and he made some nice moves. He made a nice jump shot out there on the perimeter, which he's worked hard on and been excited to break out."

Stallings has high hopes for Jones, a preseason AllSoutheastern Conference selection.
"He's really tough and he's proven that at the highest level," Lipscomb coach Casey Alexander said. "You just can't let him inch his way closer to the rim. He's going to catch it and they do a lot of good stuff to get him the ball at the optimal spot."

Jones hit 8 of 15 from the floor and 5 of 7 from the foul line.
"We have a lot of plays set up to get the ball to me in the post," Jones said. "It keeps me going, it keeps my energy high always getting me the ball."

Luke Kornet and Wade Baldwin IV added 11 points each for the Commodores.

Vanderbilt dominated inside, outscoring Lipscomb 30-18 in the paint.

Vanderbilt took charge quickly with a 16-1 run that gave the Commodores a 19-6 lead as Lipscomb went over 7 minutes without a field goal.

Vanderbilt's James Siakam had six rebounds and two points after missing the season-opening win over Trevecca to attend his father's funeral in Cameroon.

Luke Kornet made his first nine shots from the floor en route to a career-high 24 -point night, leading Vanderbilt to a 78 -46 win over Tennessee State in the first round of the Barclays Center Classic.

The 7 -foot forward didn't miss a shot until he bounced a 3-pointer off the front of the rim with 12:45 left.

He tied a Memorial Gym record for highest field goal percentage, 90.9 , by hitting shot 10 of 11 , including three 3-pointers. Jeff Taylor also hit 10 of 11 against TSU on Dec. 19, 2009.
"Once you just see the ball go in a couple of times, you'll start feeling a little bit of a rhythm to it and that's what happened tonight," Kornet said. "Once I stepped out and shot the first 3, I had a really good feeling that it was going to go in."

With Kornet playing so well, the Commodores (3-0) didn't need much from Damian Jones, who entered the game as the Southeastern Conference's leading scorer at 22.5 points per game. The 6-10 sophomore scored 13 points after scoring 20-plus in his first two games.
"They were in zone a lot in the first half and we put our two big guys down low," Commodores coach Kevin Stallings said. "Damian probably got Luke some shots just by his mere presence because l'm sure the defense kind of shades over to him."

Kornet was perfect in the first half, making all six of his shots from the floor and his only foul shot for 14 points.

Many fans in the crowd of 7,446 yelled "Luuuke" when he drained a 3 -pointer from the corner to give the Commodores a 38-20 lead with 3 seconds left in the first half.

Kornet's first three baskets were dunks. His father, Frank, played at Vanderbilt from 1986-89.

Kornet powered Vanderbilt to a 15-6 lead in the early going.

Kornet also had seven rebounds and two blocked shots. He has made 14 of his last 17 shots, including Thursday's win over Lipscomb. Jones had eight rebounds and two blocks.

Riley LaChance also scored 13 for the Commodores.
No one from the Tigers (2-2) scored in double figures as they shot 32.7 percent from the floor. Vanderbilt hit 60.9 percent from the floor.

TSU narrowed the deficit to $26-20$ before the Commodores closed the first half with a 12-0 run. They extended it to 15-0 when Jones converted a three-point play early in the second half.

Wade Baldwin IV led the Commodores with 10 assists and Shelton Mitchell added seven.

Vanderbilt made nine 3-pointers in a 63-53 win over Norfolk State in the preliminary round of the Barclays Center Classic.

The Commodores have made at least one 3-pointer in 900 consecutive games, dating back to the inception of the shot in 1986.

UNLV and Princeton are the only other college teams to make a 3-pointer in every game since the shot was implemented.

Freshmen guards Riley LaChance and Wade Baldwin IV led Vanderbilt with three 3-pointers apiece. Baldwin led four Commodores in double figures with 13 points.

LaChance added 12 and Matthew Fisher-Davis and James Siakam 11 each.

Vanderbilt is off to a 4-0 start for the first time since 2007 when it opened with 16 straight wins

The Commodores, one of the top shooting teams in the Southeastern Conference, hit 44 percent. They cooled off in the second half after hitting 63.2 percent in the first 20 minutes.

Norfolk State (2-3), a Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference member, struggled offensively, hitting 32.1 from the floor. Jeff Short was held to five points, 12.3 below his average, as he hit 2 of 11 from the floor.

D'Shon Taylor led the Spartans with 19 points and Malik Thomas added 13.

Vanderbilt's Damian Jones, who entered the game as the Southeastern Conference's second-leading scorer at 19.3 points per game, scored six points. Teammate Luke Kornet, who scored a career-high 24 points in Sunday's win over Tennessee State, had a quiet night with five points.

Norfolk State jumped out to an 11-8 lead before Vanderbilt answered with a 12-0 run to take a 20-11 advantage.

Following an inbounds, Mitchell had the ball stolen by Mack, who was fouled by Matthew Fisher-Davis. Mack made one of two free throws, and Rutgers knocked away the inbounds pass to seal the win.

LaChance hit 9 of 13 from the floor, including three 3-pointers, and all five of his foul shots. His last 3-pointer came from 37 feet to give Vanderbilt a 72-58 lead as Purdue was mounting a comeback.

It was the most points by a Vanderbilt freshman since A.J. Ogilvy scored 27 against Auburn in 2008.

Vanderbilt (6-2) ended a four-game losing streak against the Big Ten, earning its first win since an NIT victory over Indiana in 2005.

It was Vanderbilt's first game in nine days after taking time off for final exams.

Vanderbilt's Damian Jones added 15 points and James Siakam had 12.

It was the first road game for the Boilermakers (8-3), who are 6-1 at home and 2-1 on neutral courts.

Purdue is $6-16$ on the road during the last two seasons, including losses in its last seven away games last year.

It was the first meeting between the schools since Vanderbilt beat Purdue in 1965.

Rapheal Davis led four Boilermakers in double figures with 15 points. Isaac Haas added 13, Kendall Stephens had 11 and Bryson Scott had 10.

The Commodores hit 9 of 14 from beyond the 3-point arc.

Both teams featured young lineups that each included three freshmen starters.

Vanderbilt freshmen guards Wade Baldwin IV and Shelton Mitchell helped generate offense from the backcourt with six assists apiece.

The loss ended Auburn's five-game winning streak.

Auburn's Antoine Mason, a Niagara transfer who scored the Tigers first six points, led the visitors with 16. Vanderbilt enjoyed a 35-17 edge on the defensive glass. Commodores forward Luke Kornet and Siakam each grabbed 10 rebounds. All 10 of Kornet's rebounds were on the defensive end. Jones added eight boards

Auburn's K.T Harrell, who entered the game as the SEC's second-leading scorer ( 17.9 ppg ) was held to eight points on 3 of 9 shooting as Vanderbilt's Jeff Roberson guarded him tightly.

Auburn's Jordon Granger hit a 3-pointer to cut Vanderbilt's lead to $55-50$ with 2:13 left.

LaChance answered with a layup to increase the Commodores' lead to 57-50 with 1:05 left.

FAYETTEVILLE - Bobby Portis is rarely one to talk at extended length about his personal success on the basketball court.

The Arkansas sophomore is perfectly comfortable, however, letting his growing list of achievements make his case as one of the Southeastern Conference's best.

Portis continued his emergence on the national stage with a season-high 32 points and the No. 23 Razorbacks won their seventh in a row, beating Vanderbilt 82-70.

It's the first time since the 2007-08 season that Arkansas (13-2) has started 2-0 in conference play, and it did so in familiar fashion -- scoring 31 points off a seasonworst 22 turnovers by the Commodores (11-4, 1-1).

More than anyone, it was Portis -- who scored 21 points in the second half and finished 13 of 18 from the field -- who led the Razorbacks to their 16th straight win at home. He was three points short of his career best of 35 points set last season against Alabama.

He also finished with 11 rebounds, including nine on the offensive end.

Michael Qualls added 20 points for Arkansas, while Ky Madden added eight points, six assists and three steals in front of a season-high of 16,049 in Bud Walton Arena.

While the Razorbacks celebrated their hot start, Vanderbilt's four-game winning streak came to a sudden halt.

Damian Jones and Matthew Fisher-Davis each had 14 points to lead the Commodores. Luke Kornet added 11 and Riley LaChance had 10 -- though Portis' effort and the turnovers were far too much to overcome.

Vanderbilt, however, twice cut Arkansas' lead to one point in the second half on dunks by Jones -- including 53-52 after a thundering putback throw down by the 6 -foot-10 sophomore.

After a pair of free throws by Qualls, the Razorbacks quickly forced a pair of turnovers by the Commodores -their 18th and 19th of the game -- and extended the lead to 60-52 after a putback by Qualls and 3-pointer by Ky Madden.

Despite shooting 66.7 percent (16 of 24) in the second half, Vanderbilt was unable to cut Arkansas' lead to fewer than five points after that.

NASHVILLE - The Georgia Bulldogs did not want to start Southeastern Conference play losing another game.

Thanks to some timely free throws, the Bulldogs left a gym where they have had little success over the years as winners.

Kenny Gaines scored 17 points, and the Georgia Bulldogs hit nine of their final 10 free throws Wednesday night in holding off Vanderbilt 70-67 for their first SEC win this season.

With the win, the Bulldogs (10-5, 1-2) also snapped a nine-game skid to Vanderbilt overall with their first win at Memorial Gym since the 2005-06 season and only their 14th overall in 68 games in this series.

Marcus Thornton also added 16 points for Georgia, and J.J. Frazier added 11.

Riley LaChance scored 21 points for Vanderbilt (11-5, $1-2)$, and Damian Jones added 10.

Georgia never trailed after scoring the first seven points. But the Bulldogs went cold after Gaines' 3 with 5:53 left put them up 61-50, and Vanderbilt pulled within 63-61 with 28.4 seconds left on a 3-pointer by LaChance Charles Mann hit a pair of free throws then Frazier hit five of his six attempts to seal the win.

Gaines finished hitting 5 of 7 from 3-point range as the Bulldogs finished with a season-high 103 -pointers. They shot better beyond the arc ( 10 of 17) for 58.8 percent than inside where they shot 48.9 percent ( 22 of 45 ).

The Commodores outrebounded Georgia 36-27 to help them stay close and overcome cold shooting early as they hit only three of their first 12 shots. Only LaChance, scoring nine of his points in the first half, kept Georgia from running away early, and the freshman hit all three of his 3 s in the final 28.4 seconds to keep it close late.

Luke Kornet finally hit Vanderbilt's 10th 3-point attempt with 42 seconds left, but Georgia took a 31-22 lead into halftime.

Gaines opened the second half hitting a 3 , then followed with a dunk giving the Bulldogs their biggest lead yet at 35-22. But they couldn't push the lead past 14 points.

The Commodores stayed close with an occasional 3-pointer, and Wade Baldwin IV hit their fourth of the second half followed by a bucket by Jones to pull within 58-50 with 6:23 left. Gaines simply answered with his fifth 3 of the game.

Georgia didn't hit another shot from the floor, setting up a frantic final minute.

Vanderbilt (11-6, 1-3) was paced by Damian Jones' 21 points. Riley LaChance had 12 for the Commodores, who dropped their third straight game.

Both teams struggled offensively at the start before Vanderbilt began to expand the lead thanks to Mississippi State turnovers.

After taking a 12-10 lead, the Commodores went on a 14-4 run and held their largest lead at 26-14 with two minutes left in the first half. The Bulldogs scored the final four points of the half and trailed 26-18 at halftime.

Vanderbilt shot just 39 percent in the first half and made 5 of 10 free throws. Mississippi State hit 35 percent from the field and had 11 first-half turnovers. The Bulldogs owned the backboards 23-11 in the first half

Vanderbilt led 35-28 with 16 minutes left in the game before the Bulldogs went on a 14-0 run to take a 42-35 lead. Thomas and Gavin Ware combined for 12 of the 14 points during that run, including Thomas' first eight points of the game.

Ware finished with seven points and a game-high 13 rebounds. Oliver Black had six points and seven rebounds for Mississippi State, who controlled the boards 41-28, with 14 offensive rebounds

Mississippi State shot 38.6 percent for the game but made 20 of 27 ( 74.1 percent) at the free throw line. Vanderbilt was held to 38.5 percent shooting and was just 5 of 20 beyond the arc. The Commodores also struggled at the line making 9 of 17 .
"We're disappointed and they played with more urgency in the second half," Vanderbilt coach Kevin Stallings said. "I've got to figure out a way to get our guys to play more confidently. All of those flaws were forgotten thanks to the Harrisons' 11 combined points down the stretch, with nine coming from Aaron.

Aaron Harrison, whose clutch 3s earned Kentucky three straight NCAA tournament wins last spring, finished with 14 points, all in the second half. Andrew Harrison added five points as Kentucky (18-0, 5-0 Southeastern Conference) survived its third tight game in five league contests.

Kentucky needed that resolve to put away Vanderbilt (11-7, 1-4)

The Wildcats didn't lead by double digits until early in the second half, and that 45-33 advantage lasted briefly as the Commodores began answering from the perimeter to stay within reach.

Five combined 3-pointers by Riley LaChance (16 points) and Matthew Fisher-Davis (13) helped Vanderbilt pull within 58-54 with 2:36 left. The Commodores never got closer as the Harrisons closed it out for the Wildcats.

Damian Jones had 11 points and seven rebounds for Vanderbilt, which shot 42 percent in losing its fourth straight and third in a row by a close margin. Fisher-Davis missed a 3-pointer with 15 seconds left and Wade Baldwin IV missed another jumper seconds later that Kentucky's Willie Cauley-Stein rebounded to seal the game.

Quarterman then scored the first bucket in overtime, giving LSU its first lead since late in the first half.

The Commodores tied it for the ninth and last time at 73 on Riley LaChance's second straight jumper, and Quarterman answered with a jumper and two free throws to clinch LSU's fourth straight win over Vanderbilt.

Shelton Mitchell missed a tying jumper with 3.6 seconds, and the Commodores (11-8, 1-5) lost their fifth straight. Vanderbilt coach Kevin Stallings said he thought Mitchell might have drawn some contact on the shot.
"We got it six feet from the goal and pretty clean look," Stallings said. "Anytime you get a clean look, you can't argue."

Mickey finished with 25 points and 11 rebounds for LSU. Jarell Martin added 19 and 12 rebounds, Keith Hornsby 11 and Jalyn Patterson 10.

Luke Kornet led Vanderbilt with 22 points. Freshman Wade Baldwin IV had a career-best 18 points, and Damian Jones added 13.

Both teams had a chance to win in regulation.
With seven seconds left on the shot clock and 15.3 seconds left, Jones took a timeout. Martin threw the ball into the backcourt on the inbound pass, and Quarterman had to rush a jumper that hit off the left rim. James Siakam scored 12 points, grabbed 11 rebounds and blocked five shots as Vanderbilt snapped that Southeastern Conference skid by beating Florida 67-61.
"Undefeated for February," Vanderbilt freshman guard Wade Baldwin IV said. "I don't even know what happened in January."

The Commodores (12-10, 2-7) got their first win since Jan. 6 , opening the game by scoring the first 15 points and they never trailed. But after a slow second-half start, Florida found its flow.

Trailing 33-27 with 12:20 left to play, the Gators finished the game on a 13-0 run over 5:13 -highlighted by a Robinson dunk giving UF its first lead of the half - to pull ahead 40-33.

The Gators led down the stretch until Vanderbilt went on a 12-4 run to take a 47-46 lead with 43 seconds, but Robinson's late dunk and a pair of Chris Chiozza free throws sealed Florida's victory.

The win gave Donovan 499 in his career.
LaChance led the Commodores with 17 points on 7-of-18 shooting - including a 3 -for- 7 mark from threepoint range.

Sophomore center Damian Jones fouled out with 5:59 remaining.

Damian Jones scored 16 points and led five Commodores in double figures as Vanderbilt routed struggling Missouri 76-53.

The Commodores (15-12, 5-9 Southeastern Conference) now have won two of their last three and improved to 4-2 in February. They scored the first seven points of the game and never trailed. The Commodores hit a season-high 103 -pointers in posting their biggest margin of victory in a SEC win since winning 73-31 at Mississippi State on Feb. 23, 2013

Wade Baldwin IV scored 13 points for Vanderbilt. Matthew Fisher-Davis, Riley LaChance and Luke Kornet each added 11.

Missouri (7-20, 1-13) lost its 13th straight for the longest skid in school history. Montaque Gill-Caesar led the Tigers with 11 points while Johnathan Williams II, their leading scorer averaging 12.6 points per game, was held to six points.

Missouri started shooting poorly, missing six of its first seven shots. Vanderbilt had no such issues and quickly opened up a 14-4 lead and pushed that to as much as $24-10$ on a jumper by Fisher-Davis with 8:56 left in the half. The Tigers strung together six straight points to trim that lead under double digits. Gill-Caesar hit a 3-pointer, then Keanu Post scored on a layup with eight seconds left to pull Missouri within 35-29.

But Josh Henderson beat the buzzer, tipping in a missed shot by Shelton Mitchell giving Vanderbilt a 37-29 halftime lead.

Jones opened the second half scoring six points within the first four minutes for Vanderbilt, and the rout was on as the Commodores pushed their lead to as much as 27 with 2:42 left on a 3-pointer by Baldwin. That was the Commodores' 10th 3-pointer as they hit 41.7 percent for the game.

Tennessee had an even harder time stopping it Luke Kornet scored 18 of his 21 points in the second half as Vanderbilt made its last 13 field-goal attempts to beat Tennessee 73-65 hand the Volunteers their fourth straight loss. Six of the first nine shots during that torrid stretch were 3-pointers.

Vanderbilt (16-12, 6-9 SEC) erased a 13-point, second-half deficit by making a season-high 13 3-pointers on 25 attempts.

The Commodores' sizzling finish was all the more surprising because of how poorly they'd played earlier in the evening. After being outscored 25-3 in the final 12 minutes of the first half, Vanderbilt shot 84.2 percent (16 of 19) overall and 9 of 11 from 3-point range in the second half.

Kornet was 5 of 6 from 3-point range and 6 of 7 overall. Wade Baldwin IV and Damian Jones each added 13 points for Vanderbilt, which went on a 27-5 run to turn a 45-32 deficit into a 59-50 lead. Josh Richardson scored 20 points and Derek Reese had 13 for Tennessee (14-13, 6-9).

Since winning four of its first five SEC games, Tennessee has lost eight of its last 10. The Vols also have lost four straight home games for the first time since 1994-95.

Vanderbilt's shooting accuracy helped the Commodores win on a night when they were completely dominated on the boards.

Tennessee outrebounded the Commodores 37-19 and outscored them 24-0 in second-chance points. Vanderbilt's 19 rebounds were the fewest Tennessee has ever allowed at Thompson-Boling Arena, Tennessee's home floor since 1987-88. Vanderbilt only had one offensive rebound all night.

Vanderbilt avenged its most painful loss of the season. Tennessee had won 76-73 at Vanderbilt in overtime on Feb. 11 after the Commodores' missed free throws helped the Vols erase a five-point deficit in the final 15 seconds of regulation.

When Alabama fouled the Commodores, they simply hit 15 of their final 16 free throws to seal the win.

Vanderbilt, which shot 84.2 percent in the second half beating Tennessee 73-65 in Knoxville on Thursday night, missed its first six shots.

The Crimson Tide matched their biggest lead at 3824 on a 3-pointer by Obasohan in the final seconds and led 38-27 at halftime, a margin trimmed by back-to-back 3s from Baldwin that turned out to be the start of Vandy's comeback.

"Listen, we're not going to win if you don't make some shots," Stallings told the freshman guard. "So, he decided to make four of his next five."

Fisher-Davis actually made four straight 3-pointers during a key stretch in the second half, rallying Vanderbilt to a 92-77 win over South Dakota State in the second round of the National Invitation Tournament.

Wade Baldwin IV had 20 points, 10 rebounds and nine assists, and James Siakam had 14 points and seven rebounds for Vanderbilt, which broke a school record with 13 blocked shots -- including four by Luke Kornet -eclipsing the previous mark of 11 set in a first-round win at St. Mary's. The Commodores broke the single-season school record with 182 blocked shots, surpassing the 174 they had in 2008 and 2009.

Damian Jones added 15 points and Fisher-Davis finished with 12 after going 4 for 11 from the field, including 4 for 9 from 3 -point range.

Cody Larson led South Dakota State (24-11) with 18 points and 10 rebounds.

Fisher-Davis picked up the slack for teammate Riley LaChance, who was called for his fourth foul with 16:31 left. His first three 3-pointers capped a 16-0 run that turned a two-point deficit into a 14 -point lead. Reed Tellinghuisen's basket gave the Jackrabbits a $59-57$ lead with $9: 12$ left, but the Commodores answered with a 16-0 run to take a $73-59$ lead.

Baldwin, a freshman guard from Belle Mead, New Jersey, did everything in his power to get Vanderbilt one step closer to the Big Apple. The Commodores hit 18 of 22 shots in the second half for an 81.8 percent clip after connecting on just 38.5 percent in the first 20 minutes.

PALO ALTO - Anthony Brown scored a season-high 26 points and dealt a hard hit that sent 7-footer Luke Kornet to the locker room with a concussion midway through the second half, and Stanford held off Vanderbilt 78-75 on for a berth in the NIT semifinals.

Freshman Matthew Fisher-Davis hit a 3-pointer with 28.8 seconds remaining to pull Vanderbilt within 77-75 but missed a long 3 under pressure from well beyond the arc in the waning seconds.

Marcus Allen missed his first free throw with 22.3 seconds to go, giving the Commodores a chance to tie.

Fisher-Davis scored 18 points with a season-best six 3 -pointers for Vandy (21-14) in a testy, physical game that featured flying elbows.

Stanford (22-13) will face the winner of Wednesday's quarterfinal game between Old Dominion and Murray State in the semifinals next Tuesday in New York.

The Cardinal won the NIT in 1991 and 2012.
Chasson Randle hit a 3 with $1: 16$ left on the way to 16 points two days after a career-high 35 -point performance in a second-round win against Rhode Island. Randle moved into second place on Stanford's career scoring list, but will have a good chance to become the program's leader in his next game.

Nastic scored a key basket with $5: 30$ to play that ended a stretch of five missed field goals in a span of 6 -plus minutes without a basket.

With 12:40 left, Fisher-Davis was whistled for a flagrant foul when he threw an arm up into Allen's face that sent him awkwardly backward. Then at the 11:01 mark, Brown was hit with his own flagrant after he clobbered Kornet with an elbow to the face and the dazed sophomore forward had to be helped to the locker room as he struggled to walk straight. He didn't return.

It has been a whirlwind week for the Commodores, who showed few signs of being wiped out from two games in the Bay Area in a six-day span. They won at Saint Mary's College in Moraga on March 18, then topped South Dakota State at home two days later before making another long trek out West.

Vanderbilt, the Southeastern Conference's top 3-point shooting team this season, knocked down 12 of 253 s and kept it close late from long range.

Damian Jones, averaging a team-high 18.7 points in his three previous games for Vanderbilt, was held to eight points as the teams met for the first time since Dec. 30 , 1988, in Nashville.
