
VANDERBILT COACHES





After another Sweet 16 for the Commodores in 2006-07, the school's second appearance in four years, Vanderbilt head coach Kevin Stallings solidified his place among the nation's top collegiate coaches when he was selected by SEC coaches as the league's Coach of the Year.

This kind of success comes as no surprise to the players who put on the Vanderbilt jersey when adjectives like competitive, personable, passionate, intense, honest, hard working, knowledgeable, and prepared describe their coach and the program they represent.


Eight seasons into his stay in Nashville, Stallings has put into place a strong base with six postseason appearances, two NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 appearances in 2004 and 2007 and three 20-win seasons. Stallings became the first coach to take two Vanderbilt teams to a Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament since the 64-65 team format and became the winningest Commodore coach in the NCAA Tournament after the run in 2007 to push his all-time record in the NCAA Tournament to 4-2.

The list of accomplishments for the current Vanderbilt coach continues to grow:

- Stallings became the second Vanderbilt coach in school history to have three 20-win seasons (Roy Skinner) after the 2006-07 season.
- He was named SEC Coach of the Year by SEC Coaches, the first at Vanderbilt since Eddie Fogler won the award in 1993. He is only the third coach ever to accomplish the feat at Vanderbilt.
 - He was one of 15 finalists for National Coach of the Year.
- \bullet He has coached two SEC Players of the Year (coaches) Dan Langhi in 1999-2000 and Derrick Byars in 2006-07.
- Now tied for 30th amongst winningest coaches in the SEC (at SEC institutions) with Bonnie Graham of Ole Miss at 144 wins.
- He coached three SEC Academic Honor Roll members in 2006-07 in Dan Cage, Ross Neltner, and Ted Skuchas. It pushed his total number of SEC Academic Honor Roll selections to 23 during his eight-year tenure.
- He now has 257 career victories as a head coach, which makes him the sixth current SEC coach with 250 or more wins, and his 144 Vanderbilt wins ranks him third all-time in the Commodore record books behind Roy Skinner (278; 1959, 1962-76) and Bob Polk (197; 1948-58, 1960-61).

In fact, in his 30 years as a player or coach, success has followed Stallings throughout his basketball career as a player at Purdue, an assistant at both Purdue and Kansas and his previous head coaching position at Illinois State. During the time span, Stallings has been a part of 20 seasons with 20-or-more victories and a basketball season has concluded during postseason play 24 times. Since coming to Vanderbilt in April 1999, Stallings has compiled a 144-108 record, while moving his 14-year overall coaching mark to 257-171.

Stallings has guided the Commodores to postseason play in each of the last four seasons, including two Sweet 16 appearances in the last four years. In fact, Vanderbilt is one of only two SEC teams (Florida) and only 16 teams nationwide to accomplish that feat. The 2003-04 campaign saw the Commodores advance to their first



NCAA Tournament since 1993, reaching the Phoenix Regional Semifinals before bowing out to Connecticut, the eventual national champion, and in 2006-07, the Commodores knocked off George Washington and Washington State before dropping a 66-65 decision to Georgetown in the East Regional Semifinals.

In 2003-04, Vanderbilt set a school record with a 12-0 start, knocked off five nationally ranked opponents and advanced to the semifinals of the SEC Tournament. All of this before reaching the "Big Dance" and concluding its run with a 23-10 overall mark. In 2006-07, Vanderbilt had the SEC Player of the Year in Derrick Byars and knocked off seven ranked opponents during the year.

In all, Stallings has coached in six postsason tournaments, two NCAA tounaments and four NIT's. The Commodores reached the NIT in 2000, 2002, 2005, and 2006, and in 2005, the Commodores made the quarterfinals of the NIT, winning at Indiana and outlasting Wichita State at the buzzer before falling at Memphis, one step short of reaching the semifinal round in New York City.

QUALITIES OF A CARING COACH

Throughout his tenure at Vanderbilt, Stallings has proven himself as a coach whose intensity from the bench and drive to compete matches his reputation as a talented tactician and his genuine concern for players. Since coming to Nashville, Stallings has embraced the Commodore basketball tradition while building a program based on quality players and dedicated students.

He has molded Commodore players into some of the finest in the SEC. Former Commodores Dan Langhi and Matt Freije blossomed under the direc-

tion of Stallings. Langhi earned the 2000 SEC Player of the Year award while Freije became Vanderbilt's all-time leading scorer. Derrick Byars became Stallings' second player of the year in 2007, and guard Shan Foster was named as an All-SEC second-team selection.

At the same time, Stallings makes sure his players perform in the classroom. At Vanderbilt, all 20 of his seniors either have earned or are currently working toward their college degree. While at Illinois State, five Redbirds achieved Academic All-

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

TRACK RECORD FOR SUCCESS

Prior to coming to

Vanderbilt, Stallings coached six seasons at Illinois State (1994-99) in his first head coaching opportunity. Following the most successful coach in school history, Stallings raised the program to higher standards, taking four teams to postseason tournaments, including two



trips to the NCAA Tournament. He became the first men's basketball coach in the history of the Missouri Valley Conference to win back-to-back regular season and conference tournament titles in 1997 and 1998. As the Redbirds head coach, Stallings averaged 21 wins a season, compiling a 123-63 record.

"He helped me develop as a player and take my game to a level I didn't even know I could reach. But even more important, he helped me grow as a person. That's what sets him apart from most coaches: his ability to help players improve both on and off the court."

As an assistant coach, Stallings worked with two of the nation's most well known and respected mentors in the nation – Gene Keady, his college coach at Purdue, and Roy Williams at Kansas.

After helping lead the Boilermakers as a player (1980-82) to three postseason tournament appearances, including a NCAA Final Four appearance in 1980, Stallings served as an assistant coach under Keady from 1983-88. On Keady's staff, Stallings helped direct Purdue to six NCAA Tournament appearances and three Big Ten championships while tallying a 140-44 overall record.

"More than anything,
I think what Gene Keady taught me
was that good teams have good players
and great teams have great teammates,"
Stallings said. "I think his greatest
strength was his ability to get a team
to achieve as close to its potential as
possible on a very consistent basis.
That's because of his ability to
motivate people to be a willing part of
what he called 'being a company man.'


I believe in that and I believe in him. It's obvious that he was brilliant in that way."

Stallings left Purdue to join Williams' coaching staff at Kansas in 1989. Over the next five seasons, the Jayhawks made four NCAA Tournament appearances, enjoyed two trips to the Final Four, finished as the 1991 national runner-up and accumulated a 132-38 mark during Stallings' stay.

"The thorough nature in which Roy Williams approaches his job was the biggest aspect I took from my time at Kansas. Roy is very detailed, very organized, and very meticulous. Not only is he a great coach and great recruiter, but he runs his program with precision and with great organization."

A 1978 graduate of Collinsville High School outside of St. Louis, Stallings played under the legendary Vergil Fletcher, who was inducted into the National High School Athletic Coaches Association Hall of Fame during the 2004 summer.

Stallings earned his undergraduate

degree in business management and marketing at Purdue in 1982 before receiving a Master's degree from Purdue in 1985.

BRAD FREDERICK



Brad Frederick is in his ninth campaign at Vanderbilt after joining Kevin Stallings' first Commodore coaching staff in 2000.

The son of former Kansas University Athletics Director Bob Frederick, Brad grew up in Lawrence, Kan., and sat in on numerous Jayhawk practices at Allen Field House under former head coaches Larry Brown and Roy Williams.

Frederick played three seasons as a reserve forward at North Carolina, including the final season of legendary coach Dean Smith's career and the two-year coaching tenure of Bill Guthridge.

"That's one reason I went to North Carolina," Frederick said. "I wanted to learn from Coach

Smith. Besides teaching me numerous things on the basketball court, he also showed me how to run a program."

As a Tar Heel, Frederick was part of two Final Four teams and two ACC Championship teams. He was the recipient of the team's Rick Sharp Award, which goes to the player who contributes the most behind the scenes. As a senior at UNC, Frederick also served as an assistant coach for the North Carolina junior varsity program under former Tar Heel great Phil Ford.



Frederick won the Athletic Director's Scholar-Athlete award twice during his junior and senior year and graduated with honors in political science and history.

Stallings met Frederick when the current Commodore head coach was an assistant at Kansas from 1989-1993.

Frederick, 30, married Jocelyn Isenburg of Longmeadow, Mass., in June 2005.


Vanderbilt, Staff (2001-Present) Dan Muller is in his eighth season as a member of the Vanderbilt basketball program.

Prior to joining the Vanderbilt staff, Muller spent two years playing professionally in Argentina, Vancouver and Belgium.

Muller is no stranger to head coach Kevin Stallings after playing for him at Illinois State (1995-98). Muller helped the Redbirds to two regular season and Missouri Valley Conference Tournament championships and four postseason appearances, including trips to the NCAA Tournament in his final two seasons.

Ranked eighth in career scoring, Muller posted career marks in four categories, while helping ISU to a 91-36 record during his stay. He also was a three-time member of the MVC All-Defense Team and was named the MVP of the MVC Tournament as a senior.

Off the court, Muller was just as successful. He was a two-time GTE Academic All-American and was a recipient of the NCAA's Post-Graduate Scholarship. He also was named a Bone Scholar, the highest academic honor at ISU.



In 2003, Muller earned his MBA from the University of Florida.


King Rice is in his second season at Vanderbilt.

The former point guard at North Carolina and assistant coach at Oregon, Illinois State and Providence, was named to the Vanderbilt staff in June 2006.

Rice, 38, served as an assistant to Stallings for five seasons at Illinois State from 1994-98, helping the Redbirds advance to postseason play four times, including two appearances in the NCAA Tournament. Rice helped spearhead recruiting efforts and was noted for his solid relationships with players.

Prior to his stint in Normal, Ill., Rice began his coaching career as an assistant on Jerry Green's Oregon staff during the 1993 campaign. Following his five seasons with Stallings at Illinois State, Rice was an assistant for two years (1999-2000) at Providence under current head coach Tim Welsh.

As a point guard at North Carolina from 1988-91, Rice played under legendary coach Dean Smith helping the Tar Heels to a 29-6 overall mark and appearance at the NCAA Final Four in 1991. He finished his career ranked third on the Tar Heels all-time assist list with 629. His assist numbers rank 11th all-time in the Atlantic Coast Conference, averaging 6.2 assists in 140 career games. Rice was voted most outstanding senior by his teammates in 1991 after receiving recognition as the squad's top defensive player during his junior season.



A native of Binghamton, N.Y., Rice earned his bachelor's degree in communications from North Carolina in 1992.

Rice served as head coach of the Bahamian National team for three seasons from 2002-2004.

Along with North Carolina teammate Rick Fox, Rice formed CarolinaPros, Inc., in 1998. The service organization currently sponsors a variety of community-based events and provides assistance through mentoring programs, scholarships, skill development and donor education.

Rice worked as a professional trainer to Fox for five years. Fox logged 13 seasons in the NBA with the Boston Celtics and Los Angeles Lakers from 1992-2004.

Rice's family includes his wife, Summer, son, Alexander and niece, Dominique.

A trusted friend and talented instructor, Richardson came to Vanderbilt after serving four years as head coach at Illinois State.

He succeeded Stallings as the Redbird head coach after the two had combined to lead Illinois State to a 123-63 record in six years.

During that tenure, regarded by many as the most successful in school history, the Redbirds won two Missouri Conference championships, made two trips to the NCAA Tournament and had two berths in the NIT. He also had the opportunity to coach Dan Muller, who is currently on the Vanderbilt

In his four years as head coach, Richardson directed Illinois State to a 56-64 record with two second-place finishes in the Missouri Valley and one trip to the NIT.

Richardson gained a reputation as an excellent shooting instructor and the Illinois State field goal and free throw percentages during his tenure are proof of that ability. He was responsible for three of the top four free throw percentage seasons and three of the top five field goal percentage seasons in Illinois State history. His 2002-03 squad led the nation, shooting 44 percent from behind the 3-point line.



Prior to going to Illinois State, Richardson compiled a 193-146 record at Nazareth Academy High School in LaGrange, Ill., a Chicago suburb. He began the boys basketball program there and in his last 10 years had a 182-84 mark with three conference championships.

Richardson graduated from St. Xavier (Ill.) in 1977 and was a two-time basketball team captain. He was inducted into the school's athletics hall of fame in 1991. He received his master's from Chicago State in 1986.

He and his wife, Nancy, have three children; Mary Beth, Katie, and Matthew.

Neal Clark - Academic Advisor

Neal Clark is in his third full season as academic counselor for the Commodore men's basketball team after arriving at Vanderbilt in February 2005. Clark also works with the women's bowling team.

Prior to joining Vanderbilt, Clark had worked in a similar role with the football squad at the University of Kentucky since August 2003, assisting as a liaison between the university's central advising service and the athletic department. Clark also served as the Assistant Director of Student-Athlete Services for football at James Madison University from June 2002 to July 2003.

Clark earned both his bachelor's degree (1992) and master's degree (2002) in social work from Kentucky. He worked two years with the athletic department's community outreach program from 1999-2000 before serving as an academic graduate assistant from 2000-2002.

Clark is married to Tanya Stith of Louisville, Ky.

Mark Davis - Strength & Conditioning Coach

Mark Davis is in his eighth season as the strength coach for the men's basketball program. He also works with the women's track and field, women's cross country and swimming and diving teams.

Davis majored in psychology at Wittenberg University in Springfield, Ohio, where he earned his bachelor's degree in 1988. In 1994, he earned his master's degree in exercise science and physical education from Arizona State. Prior to Vanderbilt, Davis worked as Head Strength and Conditioning Coach at Tennessee State from 1997-1999. He also served as the strength and conditioning coach at Nebraska from 1995-1997.

Shannon Gordon - Athletic Trainer

Shannon Gordon is in his first season as the athletic trainer for Commodore men's basketball, and his second season at Vanderbilt. He worked with the nationally ranked VU baseball team in 2006-07

Gordon came to Nashville after working as an athletic trainer at Ohio University. He worked closely with the men's basketball team as well as the football and women's soccer squads.
