



HEAD COACH JAMES FRANKLIN



Doubters said it could not be done, but in two short years Vanderbilt Head Coach James Franklin has already taken the Commodores to heights not seen in decades, while completely changing the culture of the football program. Now, as Franklin enters his third season on campus, Vanderbilt's future appears brighter than ever before.

Armed with a tireless work ethic, contagious personality, strong leadership and an invigorating passion for his team, Franklin has guided Vanderbilt to back-to-back bowl games for the first time in school history, signed the highest-rated recruiting class in school history three years in a row, energized the Commodore fan base, and mentored a squad of student-athletes that collectively earned praise for their academic achievement.

The program's all-around success has turned heads of fans and media members across the country as people look to learn more about the mind behind the team's rise from the depths of the SEC.

In two years, Franklin has reshaped the image of Vanderbilt football by not only the team's success, but also through his energy and love for the program. He has created a fun, energetic and close-knit family atmosphere that players crave.

His passion for Vanderbilt is also on full display publicly through his relentless promotion of the program and random acts of kindness.

Whether it is speaking to local organizations in Nashville, halting a press conference to hug a grateful bystander, helping Vanderbilt freshmen move into dorms, allowing an inspiring 11-year-old boy to lead the team onto the field for homecoming, passing out ice cream on campus or sitting in the home of a potential student-athlete, Franklin spreads goodwill and vision for the program to all that will listen.

To help spread his message, Franklin has provided unprecedented access to what takes place behind the scenes with his program. From pregame and postgame locker room speeches, to team meetings and trips inside the war room on signing day, Franklin has made a conscious effort to provide the public with an inside look at his program.

His efforts have paid dividends with feature stories and videos landing on prominent websites such as SI.com and ESPN.com and in publications such as Sports Illustrated, the New York Times and the Washington Post. Just last August, a video featuring Franklin awarding a scholarship to walk-on fullback Marc Panu went viral, collecting 400,000 views on YouTube and was featured on ESPN SportsCenter.

Hired as the first African-American head coach in Vanderbilt gridiron history on Dec. 17, 2010, Franklin's off-the-field accomplishments have been outstanding, but the results on the field have simply been staggering.

In his initial season with Vanderbilt in 2011, Franklin became the only first-year coach in school history to guide the Commodores to a bowl game and surpassed the total wins achieved by the program in each of its previous two seasons. As an encore, all Franklin did in his second season was run circles around what he achieved in 2011 and more, much more.

He guided Vanderbilt to a 9-4 overall season, matching the school record for wins last achieved in 1915, and ending the season with the longest winning streak in the Southeastern Conference, having won seven straight. It was Vanderbilt's longest win streak since an eight-game streak in 1948.

The remarkable 2012 campaign also included Vanderbilt tying another school record with five victories in SEC play. One of those conference





wins, against Tennessee, marked Vanderbilt's most decisive victory in the series since 1954.

The team also won on the road in 2012. Three of Vanderbilt's five SEC wins came at Missouri, Kentucky and Ole Miss. A convincing win at Wake Forest gave Vanderbilt four road victories, the most by a Commodore squad since 1948.

Vanderbilt's victory at Missouri was Franklin's first road triumph in the SEC. The team's 40-0 shutout at Kentucky was its second shutout of the season, marking the first time Vanderbilt had two shutouts in the same year since 1968. The win at Ole Miss was its sixth win of the season and came after facing a 23-6 deficit in the third quarter.

The Commodores culminated the season with a 38-24 win over N.C. State in the 2012 Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl. After the victory Franklin also was named as one of five finalists for National Coach of the Year honors from the Bryant Awards.

Vanderbilt also ended the season ranked No. 20 in the USA Today-Coaches Top 25 poll and No. 23 in the Associated Press ballot. It marked the program's first inclusion in the final Top 25 poll since 1958.

Other wins came against Presbyterian, UMass and Wake Forest. Vanderbilt won at Wake Forest, 55-21, and scored the second-most points ever allowed at BB&T Field. The win also helped Vanderbilt eclipse 300 points for the second straight year – a first in school history.

Vanderbilt excelled in all three phases of the game in 2012. On offense, the team scored 40-plus points on five occasions for the first time since 1915. The team's 30.0-point scoring offense was the highest of the modern era, and best by any Vanderbilt unit since World War I. The defense allowed just 18.2 points per game during the regular season – the fewest since 1975. On special teams, Vanderbilt had an All-SEC punter and kicker in the same year for the first time in team history.

Vanderbilt finished among the nation's best in a number of defensive statistical categories, ranking No. 6 in pass efficiency defense, No. 14 in

FRANKLIN'S ACCOMPLISHMENTS BY THE NUMBERS

1 TOP 25 POSTSEASON RANKING
Franklin's Commodores ended the 2012 season ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 for the **FIRST** time since the writers went to a post-bowl vote in 1968. Vanderbilt was No. 23 in the AP Poll and No. 20 in the coaches' ballot.

2 BACK-TO-BACK BOWL APPEARANCES
Franklin has guided Vanderbilt to **BACK-TO-BACK** bowl games for the first time in school history. Before Franklin became the head coach, the Commodores experienced just four total bowl appearances in 121 years.

4 DECISIVE VICTORIES IN CONFERENCE PLAY
Vanderbilt has captured **FOUR** Southeastern Conference games by 23 or more points during Franklin's tenure. From 1957-2010, Vanderbilt had four total wins against SEC opponents by 23+ points.

7 FINISHING ON A WIN STREAK
The Commodores concluded 2012 by winning **SEVEN** straight games, the team's longest win streak since 1948. Vanderbilt owns the longest active streak in the SEC entering the 2013 season.

9 MOST WINS IN A SEASON SINCE 1915
In 2012, Franklin's Commodores tied a program record with **NINE** victories. It marked the most wins by a Vanderbilt team since it joined the SEC in 1933.

15 MOST WINS IN FIRST TWO YEARS BY VANDERBILT COACH SINCE 1904-05
Franklin has a **15-11** overall record at Vanderbilt. The only Vanderbilt coach to win more games in his first two years was College Football Hall of Famer Dan McGugin.

16 ENTHUSIASM SOARS ON CAMPUS
Vanderbilt played before three home sellouts, the most since 1996. Total home attendance during the 2012 season spiked **16** percent.

19 TOP 20 RECRUITING CLASS
The Commodores' 2013 recruiting class was ranked **No. 19** nationally by Rivals.com. It was Vanderbilt's highest recruiting class since the recruiting website was created in 1998.

30 EXPLOSIVE OFFENSIVE PRODUCTION
The Commodores scored 390 points during the 2012 season, the highest single-season total since 1915. The team's **30.0-POINT** scoring offense was the highest average since 1916.

pass defense, No. 15 in scoring defense and No. 19 on total defense.

Franklin also helped mentor three players to school records in 2012. Running back Zac Stacy became Vanderbilt's all-time leading rusher and was the first player in school history to rush for 1,000 yards in back-to-back seasons. Receiver Jordan Matthews set Vanderbilt's single-season receiving yardage record with 1,323 yards and accumulated 94 catches, the second highest receptions total in Vanderbilt and SEC history. Kicker Carey Spear set a new school record by making 20 of 24 field goals.

In two seasons at the helm, Franklin has compiled a 15-11 overall record. Only one other Vanderbilt head coach, College Football Hall of Fame member Dan McGugin, registered more victories (16, 1904-05). Franklin's success through two years is unmatched since the Commodores became charter members of the SEC in 1933.

Vanderbilt's performance in SEC action under Franklin has been impressive. Four of the team's seven conference wins under Franklin have come by 23 points or more. From 1957-2010, Vanderbilt had four total wins against SEC opponents by 23-plus points.

In non-SEC games, Franklin's Vanderbilt teams are 7-1, including an 4-0 mark in 2011.

Franklin has also reversed a historical struggle for the Commodores – finishing seasons on a strong note. For the first time since 1948, the 2012 Commodores were undefeated during the month of November. Franklin's teams are 6-2 in November. In the decade before he arrived on campus, the 'Dores was just 3-32 in November games.

The success of the team on the field has also translated to the stands. In 2012, home attendance jumped 16 percent, with Vanderbilt Stadium experiencing three sellouts.

Franklin has also pushed for facility upgrades for the Vanderbilt program. Before the 2012 season, a new video board and hillside seating area in the south end zone were added to Vanderbilt Stadium. Additionally, new stadium lights enhanced the gameday experience and an artificial surface improved playing conditions on Dudley Field.

In late October, the team's new Indoor Practice Facility is expected to open near McGugin Athletics Center and existing practice fields. Franklin pushed for the much-needed venue, which will feature a regulation football field, upon arriving on campus.

Prior to Franklin's arrival on campus, the Commodores posted consecutive two-win seasons. In his first season at Vanderbilt, Franklin guided the 2011 Commodores to an appearance in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

Prior to accepting the Vanderbilt position, Franklin spent five seasons coordinating highly productive offensive units at the University of Maryland and Kansas State University. From 2008-10, Franklin served as offensive coordinator, and later added the title of assistant head coach. In 2010, he helped the Terrapins to an impressive 9-4 turnaround in 2010. That season, Franklin's explosive offense averaged 32.2 points and topped 50 points in three games. Maryland redshirt freshman quarterback Danny O'Brien finished the 2010 season as one of the nation's most efficient signal callers, throwing for 2,438 yards, 22 touchdowns, and only eight interceptions while earning ACC Rookie of the Year honors. First team All-ACC receiver Torrey Smith, an eventual second



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round NFL pick, flourished under Franklin's system, finishing 2010 with 67 receptions, 1,055 receiving yards and 12 touchdowns.

Franklin went to Maryland after spending the 2006-07 seasons as offensive coordinator at Kansas State. He helped the Wildcats earn their first winning season in four years and a berth in the inaugural Texas Bowl. In 2006, Franklin focused on mentoring talented true freshman quarterback Josh Freeman. In 2007, Franklin's offense produced a 3,000-yard passer (Freeman), 1,500-yard receiver (All-America wide receiver Jordy Nelson), and 1,000-yard rusher for the first time in school history.

Today, Freeman and Nelson have found great success in the NFL. Freeman is the starting quarterback for Tampa Bay after being selected in the first round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Nelson grabbed a touchdown pass in the Green Bay Packers' 2011 victory in Super Bowl XLV.

Franklin spent the 2005 season coaching wide receivers for the Green Bay Packers. During that season, wide receiver Donald Driver set new career-high marks with 86 receptions for 1,221 yards.

After his brief but successful NFL tenure, Franklin returned to the college ranks for the opportunity to devise offensive schemes and gain in-game play calling experience at the coordinator level. Franklin's opportunity with the most storied team in the NFL came on the heels of a five-year role coaching wide receivers at Maryland. During his tenure, the Terps earned three postseason berths including an appearance in the 2002 BCS FedEx Orange Bowl.

Franklin's role expanded to recruiting coordinator in 2003. Franklin delivered back-to-back recruiting classes ranked in the Top-25 by Rivals.com.

Early in his career, Franklin committed himself to being a student of the game: taking strategies, tools and tips from great coaches at a variety of competitive levels.

Franklin began his career in 1995 as the wide receivers coach at Kutztown (Pa.) University. Then, he returned to his alma mater, East Stroudsburg (Pa.) University learning the game from the defensive side of the ball coaching cornerbacks and safeties under veteran coach Denny Douds. He then earned a Division I position at James Madison University coaching wide receivers.

In 1998, Franklin earned his first opportunity to participate in the NFL's Minority Coaching Fellowship Program. Franklin interned with the Minnesota Vikings, the Philadelphia Eagles and the Miami Dolphins. Franklin also worked with Mike Price coaching tight ends at Washington State in 1998. The following year, Franklin helped Idaho State rank among the NCAA's best in total offense as ISU's receivers coach.

Franklin developed a passion for the game as a four-year letter-winning quarterback at East Stroudsburg. He was a two-time Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference selection. As a senior, he garnered MVP honors and was a Harlon Hill Trophy nominee for Division II Player of the Year after setting seven school records.

Franklin earned a Bachelor's in psychology from East Stroudsburg in 1995 and a Master's in educational leadership from Washington State in 1999.

Franklin and his family have become fast fans of Nashville. He and his wife, Fumi, are the parents of two daughters, Shola, 6, and Addy, 5.

2008-10 MARYLAND (assistant head coach/offensive coordinator/QBs)

On December 23, 2007, Ralph Friedgen sways Franklin back to Maryland as the Terps' assistant head coach and offensive coordinator. In February 2009, Friedgen designates Franklin as his successor at Maryland... The Terrapins go 9-4 overall in 2010, finishing second in the ACC's Atlantic Division and winning the Military Bowl... Quarterback Danny O'Brien earns ACC Rookie of the Year and Freshman All-America honors under Franklin's mentorship, ranking third nationally among freshmen in pass efficiency rating... O'Brien throws for 22 touchdowns against only eight picks after becoming the team's starter in Week Four... Franklin's 2010 offense ranks among the nation's best in limiting turnovers... Torrey Smith, now starting with the Ravens, also flourishes in 2010, catching 67 passes for 1,055 yards to earn first-team All-ACC honors... For the fourth time in his career, Franklin also is honored as a Top 25 recruiter by Rivals.com for helping to secure a class that included a number of four-star athletes... In 2008, the Terps defeat four ranked teams en route to a win in the Humanitarian Bowl to cap an 8-5 record... Terp WR Darrius Heyward-Bey becomes No. 9 overall pick of the 2009 NFL Draft.

2006-07 KANSAS STATE (offensive coordinator/quarterbacks)

As K-State's offensive coordinator, Franklin helps Wildcats to 7-6 record in 2006, topped by a 45-42 win over No. 4 Texas. K-State plays in the Texas Bowl, its first postseason game in three years... Under Franklin's guidance, K-State offense in 2007 becomes first in team history to feature a 3,000-yard passer, 1,500-yard receiver and 1,000-yard rusher in the same season... QB Josh Freeman (eventual 2009 1st-round pick of Tampa Bay) sets many school records, including 3,353 passing yards... WR Jordy Nelson becomes an All-American by catching 122 passes, and is a high draft pick of the Packers... Nelson is a starting receiver for Green Bay.

2005 GREEN BAY PACKERS-NFL (assistant coach/wide receivers)

Assisting Head Coach Mike Sherman, Franklin mentors a strong receiving arsenal that includes Donald Driver, Javon Walker and Robert Ferguson catching passes from Brett Favre... Despite an injury to Walker, the Packers rank sixth in team receiving yards... Driver sets career highs with 86 receptions for 1,221 receiving yards.

2000-04 MARYLAND (wide receivers/recruiting coordinator)

Franklin helps Maryland to three consecutive bowl games starting with the 2001 squad... Maryland also achieves three straight seasons of 10 wins or more (2001-03), including appearance in 2002 FedEx Orange Bowl... Terps followed Orange Bowl berth with 30-3 victory over Tennessee in 2002 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl and 41-7 win over West Virginia in 2003 Toyota Gator Bowl... FRANKLIN GUIDES 'DORES TO AUTOZONE LIBERTY BOWL ★ Dec. 31, 2011

James Franklin concludes his first year as head coach by leading the Commodores to the AutoZone Liberty Bowl, becoming the initial coach to guide the Commodores to a postseason appearance in his first season.

NATIONAL SIGNING DAY ★ Feb. 1, 2012

Fueled by the Liberty Bowl appearance, diligence and hard work, Franklin lands a 22-player class that keen recruiting observers describe as the best Commodores in decades. The class includes four 4-star prospects, including six of the best high school seniors across Tennessee.

ATTENDANCE GROWS FOR 2ND BLACK & GOLD SPRING GAME ★ April 14, 2012

Franklin's second spring drill on campus concludes with more than 8,000 spectators watching the Black squad earn a convincing 33-0 victory in the Black & Gold Spring Game. It marks the largest audience for the spring finale since the early 1990s.

PACKED HOUSE FOR UNIFORM UNVEILING EVENT ★ July 11, 2012

Commodore fans packed into Barnes & Noble at Vanderbilt in mid-July to watch Vanderbilt players unveil stylish new uniforms for the upcoming season. Serving as MC, Franklin brings down the house while introducing white helmets to the Commodore uniform collection.



TEAM WELCOMES FACILITY UPGRADES AS SEASON NEARS ★ August 2012

Excitement surrounds the Commodore program as players arrive on campus to open preseason camp. Inside the program, coaches, staff and student-athletes are thrilled to cut the ribbon on a massive McGugin Center facility upgrade that includes a 140-person auditorium and team room, and new meeting rooms for each position grouping. Across Jess Neely Drive, crews are putting the finishing touches on a state-of-the-art video board, 400-seating capacity berm and new artificial turf in Vanderbilt Stadium.

OWNING THE NATIONAL SPOTLIGHT WITH HOME OPENER ★ Aug. 30, 2012

Franklin's 'Dores own the national spotlight as they kick off ESPN's 2012 coverage of college football by hosting South Carolina on Thursday night.

THE STREAK BEGINS WITH HOME WIN OVER AUBURN ★ Oct. 20 2012

Playing before a second straight home sellout, the Commodores smother Auburn's offense and ride a huge rushing effort by Zac Stacy to a 17-13 win. Late in the game, Stacy breaks the team record for career rushing yards.



COMEBACK SEALS WIN IN OXFORD ★ Nov. 10, 2012



For the first time in team history, the Commodores' 2013 signing class is among the Top 20 classes by Rivals.com. While all 26 signees have three-star ratings, 13 from the class boast four-star consideration.





John Donovan enters his third season on the Vanderbilt staff having coordinated two of the team's most productive offenses in the modern era.

Donovan, who assisted James Franklin at the University of Maryland prior to joining him at Vanderbilt, serves as offensive coordinator and running backs coach.

In 2012, Donovan's offense produced 390 points and 4,936 total yards, the highest season total witnessed at Vanderbilt since World War II.

Donovan's balanced attack also resulted in three of the finest individual seasons ever by Vanderbilt players. Zac Stacy became the team's most decorated running back ever, setting career records with 3,143 rushing yards and 30 rushing TDs. Stacy also became the first Commodore to ever produce back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons. Jordan Matthews set a team single-season record with 1,323 receiving yards. His 94-reception total also ranks No. 2 all-time

among Commodores. Quarterback Jordan Rodgers also produced a career year, passing for 2,539 yards and 15 touchdowns.

The offense also showed marked improvement in turnovers and third down efficiency.

Donovan also overlooks the play of Commodore running backs. Besides helping Stacy, Donovan mentored Wesley Tate and Brian Kimbrow in 2012. They combined for 789 yards and 11 touchdowns.

In 2011, Donovan's offense was the SEC's most improved. The offense averaged 26.7 points, nearly 10 points more than in 2010. Stacy also set new single-season team records with 1,193 rushing yards and 14 rushing touchdowns in 2011.

Franklin and Donovan were key offensive assistants under Ralph Friedgen at Maryland – Franklin serving as coordinator and Donovan working with running backs. In 2010, they helped the Terps to a 9-4 record and one of the nation's most impressive year-to-year turnarounds. That season, Maryland featured a powerful offensive attack that averaged 32.2 points. The unit was also efficient with just 14 turnovers.

The 2010 campaign was Donovan's fourth at Maryland working with running backs. His top back, Da'Rel Scott, enjoyed a breakout campaign with 1,133 rushing yards and first team All-ACC honors in 2008.

Donovan mentored Maryland quarterbacks in the 2006 and 2007 campaigns. In 2006, Donovan coached All-ACC quarterback Sam Hollenbach to his finest year as he threw for 2,371 yards and 15 touchdowns, and was named MVP of Maryland's Champs Sports Bowl victory over Purdue. Prior to taking over as running backs coach in 2005, Donovan served as Maryland's assistant recruiting coordinator under Friedgen, who hired Donovan as a graduate assistant from 1998-2000 at Georgia Tech.

A 1997 graduate of Johns Hopkins, Donovan was a three-year starter at defensive back for the Blue Jays, earning 12 career interceptions.

Donovan earned a bachelor's in sociology from Johns Hopkins in 1997. He later earned a master's in economics from Georgia Tech.

Donovan and his wife, Stacey, are the parents of a son, John Patrick, 7; and two daughters: Cate, 5, and Shea, 3.

BOB SHOOP

Defensive coordinator and safeties coach Bob Shoop returns for his third year after guiding two of the most impressive 'Dore defenses in many years.

Shoop's 2012 defense continued the same positive trend that began in 2011 when it enjoyed stunning, across-the-board improvement.

In 2012, the unit ranked among the nation's best in several key

statistics: 14th in pass defense, 15th in scoring defense and 19th in total defense

Vanderbilt's 18.6-point scoring defense has been bettered only once in the last 30 years on campus. Its pass defense averaged allowing just 191.8 yards, third in the SEC. The Commodores' total defense of 339.9 ranked fifth best in the conference.

Shoop's attacking squad also performed well in third down situations. In 2012, the unit ranked fifth in the SEC

– and 25th in the NCAA – in third down success. The 'Dores allowed just 18.2 first downs. The pressuring unit also producing tackles for losses in bunches, ranking second in the SEC with 97 tackles for loss.

Several of Shoop's defensive standouts enjoyed individual success. Cornerback Andre Hal garnered All-SEC honors. Shoop also mentored rapidly-developing safeties Kenny Ladler and Javon Marshall. The duo

shared the team lead with 60 total tackles.

Shoop directed the 2011 unit to staggering levels of improvement. Under Shoop's guidance, the Commodore defense ranked ninth in the NCAA in pass defense efficiency and 18th in total defense. The 2011 defense was paced by All-America cornerback Casey Hayward, who tied the team career record with 15 interceptions, and linebacker Chris Marve, who earned All-SEC honors for the third straight year.

Shoop joined Vanderbilt following a superb four-year tenure as defensive coordinator at William & Mary where the one-time Columbia head coach guided a remarkable transformation of the Tribe defense.

At William & Mary, Shoop's defenses ranked among the top units in NCAA FCS football. In 2009, W&M ended the year first nationally in rush defense and second in scoring defense. The performance helped earn Shoop the 2009 *FootballScoop* NCAA FCS Coordinator of the Year Award.

Shoop's résumé spans two decades, including three stints as a defensive coordinator (Yale, 1994-96; Villanova, 1997; William & Mary, 2007-10) and three years as the head coach at Columbia (2003-05).

Before becoming Columbia's head coach, Shoop served as secondary coach at Boston College from 1999-2002. As an assistant, Shoop has been on the winning sideline of three classic college rivalries: Army-Navy, Harvard-Yale and Boston College-Notre Dame.

Shoop played collegiate football at Yale. He earned honorable mention All-Ivy accolades in 1987 as a receiver and was recognized with Yale Football's prestigious Robert Gardner Anderson Memorial Award for team spirit, dedication and leadership. He also earned four letters in baseball. A native of Oakmont, Pa., Shoop was inducted into the Allegheny-Kiski Valley Sports Hall of Fame.

Shoop and his wife, Maura, have two children, Tyler and Jay. Shoop's brother, John, is the offensive coordinator at Purdue.

CHARLES BANKS

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR;
TIGHT ENDS

Charles Banks enters his third season at Vanderbilt as special teams coordinator and tight ends coach under James Franklin.

After working alongside Franklin at Maryland in 2009-10, Banks brought his special teams expertise to Vanderbilt last year and quickly achieved across-the-board Commodore improvement in the third phase of football. In 2012, Banks continued his remarkable job with Vanderbilt special teams.

Behind the placekicking of Carey Spear and the punting of Richard Kent, the 'Dores put together arguably the finest combined special teams effort in school history.

Spear was sensational, earning All-SEC honors after setting school records with 20 field goals and 87 points scored by a kicker. He also ranked among the SEC's most accurate kickers, hitting 83.3 percent of his field goal attempts (20-of-24).

Kent wasn't outdone by Spear. The third-year starter averaged 44.9 yards, the fourth highest average ever by a Commodore. Kent's ability to directionally punt was extremely effective in limiting returns and pinning teams deep inside their 20-yard line.

Jonathan Krause also made huge strides as a punt returner. His 11.2-yard average in 2012 was the team's second highest in the 20 years. Krause also became the first 'Dore since 1968 to score on two returns.

Banks also mentored a young and improving corps of tight ends. A pair of redshirt freshmen who developed nicely during the season, Steven Scheu and Kris Kentera, combined for 18 receptions and three touchdown catches.

Banks has experience coaching offense, defense and special teams. He also has coached at the NFL, collegiate and high school levels.

Prior to arriving at Vanderbilt, Banks distinguished himself at Maryland. In 2010, Terrapin special teams played an instrumental part in one of the NCAA's most impressive year-to-year turnarounds as the Terps improved seven games in the win column enroute to a 9-4 overall season. That season, Banks mentored Maryland's Tony Logan to a 18.8-yard punt return

average and first team All-ACC honors. In 2009, another Banks' standout at Maryland, Torrey Smith, earned All-ACC honors by breaking the conference single-season record for kickoff return yards. Smith is now a NFL star with Baltimore. Banks also groomed Nick Ferrara to freshman All-America honors as a placekicker in 2009.

Banks enjoyed success as an assistant at the University of Richmond from 2007-08. In Banks' final game at Richmond, the Spiders claimed the

2008 NCAA FCS national title with a win over Montana.

Banks directed superb Richmond special teams. In 2008, the Spiders ranked high nationally in several special team stats. In 2007, his pupil Justin Rogers was named the conference's Special Teams Player of the Year.

Banks had two stints at Hampton University (2000-04; 2006) and spent 2005 with the St. Louis Rams. While serving as an assistant special teams coach in St. Louis, the Rams improved from 32nd to 17th in NFL special teams

George Barlow enters his second year as Vanderbilt's defensive backs coach and defensive recruiting coordinator. He joined James Franklin's staff after serving as interim head coach and defensive coordinator at the University of New Mexico.

Barlow is one of three highly respected former FCS defensive coordinators on the staff. The unit is directed by Bob Shoop, former coordinator at William & Mary. Brent Pry, formerly at Georgia Southern, serves as assistant head coach, co-coordinator and linebackers coach.

In his first season at Vanderbilt, Barlow mentored the team's defensive backs into one of the SEC's most productive units. The corps was an important ingredient of a defense that ranked third in the SEC and 14th in the NCAA in pass defense.

Barlow also did a superb job developing first-year starting cornerback Andre Hal. The junior was named second team All-SEC after posting 16 passes defended as a shutdown cover opposite Trey Wilson, who inked a NFL free agent deal with Jacksonville after the season.

Prior to joining Vanderbilt, Barlow served three years at New Mexico after

successfully mentoring defenses at James Madison University, one of the top teams in the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (FCS).

Barlow began the 2011 season as UNM's assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. Four games into the season, Barlow was named the Lobos' interim head coach. The 2011 UNM defense was led by All-Mountain West Conference linebacker Carmen Messina, who broke the WAC career record with 454 tackles.

Barlow joined New Mexico after experiencing tremendous success at James Madison. He helped guide the Dukes to the 2004 NCAA I-AA national championship and FCS postseason appearances in 2006, 2007 and 2008.

Barlow's JMU was consistently among the nation's best. In 2006, the Dukes were second nationally in sacks and fourth in rush defense. In 2005, the unit ranked first nationally in rush defense. In JMU's championship season of 2004, the Dukes set the I-AA record for sacks. His top pupil at JMU was linebacker Akeem Jordan, the 2006 AFCA I-AA Player of the Year.

Serving as JMU's running backs coach in 1999 prior moving to the defensive staff, Barlow tutored Curtis Keaton to team records with 1,719 rushing yards and 20 rushing TDs. Keaton was later selected in the fourth round of the 2000 NFL Draft. The following year, Barlow coached JMU's Delvin Joyce when he became the first Division I-AA player to reach the 1,000-yard career mark in rushing, receiving, punt returns and kickoff returns.

Prior to JMU, Barlow spent three years at Oklahoma, coaching safeties and linebackers in 1998 after serving as a defensive graduate assistant in 1996-97.

Barlow was an all-conference safety at Marshall from 1986-90. He was a member of the 1987 Thundering Herd squad that played for the I-AA title.

Barlow graduated in 1990 with a degree in business administration concentrating in finance and business law.

Barlow is the parent of a daughter, Kierstin Paige.

Josh Gattis enters his second year on the Vanderbilt offensive staff. He coaches the team's wide receiver corps and serves as the team's offensive recruiting coordinator.

In his first year with the Commodores, Gattis enjoyed superb success, mentoring the most productive wide receiving tandem in team history.

Gattis, who joined the Commodores after serving as receivers coach at Western Michigan in 2011, helped Jordan Matthews and Chris Boyd put together receiving statistics unmatched by any other Vanderbilt duo. The Matthews-Boyd tandem totalled 144 catches and 2,097 receiving yards, 217 yards more than the next closest Commodore duo.

Matthews was superb, earning consensus First Team All-SEC and third-team All-America honors after registering 94 catches and 1,323 receiving yards. Boyd also enjoyed a sensational season with 50 catches and 774 receiving yards. They combined to haul in 13 touchdown passes.

In just two years as a collegiate coach, Gattis has mentored All-America receivers at both Vanderbilt and Western Michigan.

Prior to arriving in Nashville, Gattis helped Western Michigan to a 7-6 mark and the 2011 Little Caesars Pizza Bowl, just the fifth postseason bowl in team history.

Gattis' top pupil at Western Michigan, wide receiver Jordan White,

established a slew of team and Mid-American Conference (MAC) records en route to consensus All-America recognition. As a senior in 2011, White topped the nation with 140 receptions and 1,911 receiving yards. His 17 touchdown catches ranked third in the NCAA. He finished his career with

306 catches and set a new MAC record with 4,187 receiving yards. White capped his WMU career by setting a Little Caesars Bowl record with 265 receiving yards.

White became Western Michigan's first consensus All-America recipient, earning recognition from the Associated Press, Walter Camp Football Foundation, American Football Coaches Association, Sports Illustrated and Yahoo! Sports. White was drafted by the New York Jets and continues to play for the NFL team.

Two other WMU receivers, Chleb Ravenell and Robert Arnheim, produced career campaigns under Gattis: Ravenell posting 67 receptions for 839 yards and nine touchdowns; Arnheim registering 62 catches for 702 yards and four touchdowns.

Gattis joined Western Michigan after serving as a graduate assistant in 2010 at the University of North Carolina.

Gattis was a two-time All-ACC recipient during a superb career at Wake Forest. He was a three-year starter at safety, finishing his career with 32 starts, 253 total tackles, six forced fumbles and 12 interceptions.

Gattis participated in the 2007 Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine Game. He was drafted in the fifth round of the 2007 NFL Draft by Jacksonville. He played the 2007-08 season with the Chicago Bears.

Gattis earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in sociology from Wake Forest in December 2006.

**RUN GAME COORDINATOR;

Herb Hand returns for a fourth year as the Vanderbilt offensive line coach. He also adds the duties of run game coordinator this season.

In 2012, Hand continued to use innovation to maximize the effectiveness of his offensive line. Hand's belief in preparing linemen for multiple positions was on full display late in the season with the play of redshirt junior Wesley Johnson and redshirt senior Ryan Seymour. Johnson, recognized as an honorable mention All-SEC selection, played extremely well at both tackles. Seymour, a starting guard who was picked by Seattle in the 2013 NFL Draft, performed at a high level when moved to Johnson's vacant left tackle role.

Several other members of Hand's corps performed well in what became the most potent offensive attack in modern Commodore history. Sophomore Joe Townsend and redshirt freshman Jake Bernstein were extremely productive when inserted during the season at center and guard, respectively.

In 2011, Hand did a remarkable job molding an undersized offensive line corps into a cohesive unit. The line helped Vanderbilt add 25.8 yards to its rushing average and 41 yards to its average total offense. The unit also allowed nine fewer sacks than

the year before.

In 2011-12, the line paved the way for Zac Stacy to establish new team career and single-season rushing records. The St. Louis draftee finished with 3,143 rushing yards and 30 TDs.

Prior to joining Vanderbilt, Hand worked three years at Tulsa, serving as assistant head coach, offensive coordinator and line coach. Hand helped guide Tulsa to consecutive GMAC Bowl games behind one of the NCAA's most explosive spread offenses. As Tulsa's co-coordinator, Hand coached a line that paved the way for the nation's top ranked offense in 2007-08. He was a finalist for national offensive line coach of the year in 2008.

Before joining Tulsa, Hand spent six successful years at West Virginia, serving as tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator. Hand helped the Mountaineers to three Big East titles and five straight postseason bowls, including a 38-35 win over SEC champion Georgia in the 2006 Sugar Bowl.

That 2006 West Virginia team finished 11-2 and was among the nation's top-10 teams for most of the year. Hand helped guide an offense that ranked second nationally in rushing, third in scoring, and fourth in total offense.

Prior to joining West Virginia, Hand was a graduate assistant at Clemson in 1999-2000 when the Tigers played in the Peach Bowl and Gator Bowl.

Before that, he served as defensive coordinator and special teams coordinator at Concord (W. Va.) College. He also was defensive coordinator at another university in the state, Glenville State, where he helped coach the squad to three WVIAC Championships.

In 1990, Hand received his bachelor's in history from Hamilton College. He also earned a master's in 1993 while coaching linebackers from West Virginia Wesleyan.

Hand and his wife, Debbie, have three children: sons, Trey, 17, and Cade, 11, and daughter, Bailey, 15.

NOTES: Pry's ability to develop freshmen Darreon Herring and Jake Sealand into key contributors last year helped solve a depth issue at the position. The duo combined for 57 tackles and three forced fumbles.

Pry got career seasons from returning starters Chase Garnham and Archibald Barnes, developed Karl Butler into a quality third starter, and introduced three first-year players into key reserve roles.

Garnham topped the corps with 84 total tackles, seven sacks and 12.5 tackles for loss after moving to middle linebacker. Barnes contributed 66 tackles while Butler added 48 stops.

Pry also mentored a pair of true freshmen, Darreon Herring and Jake Sealand, and redshirt freshman Larry Franklin into key reserve contributors in 2012. The trio combined for 75 total tackles.

In 2011, Pry built a solid unit around All-SEC recipient Chris Marve. The linebackers were vital to Vanderbilt's improvement in virtually every defensive statistical category. The defense soared in SEC and NCAA rankings, finishing the year 18th nationally in total defense. Marve

finished the year by earning All-SEC honors for the third straight season.

Pry joined Vanderbilt after leading a resurgence at Georgia Southern. With Pry's help, the Eagles roared back to national prominence among Division I FCS teams in 2010. With Pry serving as defensive coordinator and safeties coach, Georgia Southern advanced to the 2010 NCAA FCS national semifinals and beat No. 1-ranked Appalachian State in the regular season.

Pry joined Georgia Southern from the University of Memphis, where he served three years as the Tigers' defensive line coach. At Memphis, he was part of a staff that guided the Tigers to two bowl games.

From 2002-06, Pry served at La.-Lafayette, holding positions of assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. The 2005 Lafayette squad earned a Sun Belt title and featured five players that eventually played in the NFL. Pry was an assistant coach at Western Carolina from 1998-2001, mentoring the defensive line for two years, then secondary and special teams for two years. He also worked three years as a graduate assistant at Virginia Tech.

Pry began his coaching career at East Stroudsburg (Pa.) University in 1993. During Pry's tenure, East Stroudsburg's offense was directed by a standout quarterback who now serves as Vanderbilt's newest head coach.

A free safety at Maryville (Tenn.) College in 1988, Pry later transferred to the University of Buffalo. Pry lettered in 1990, then suffered a career-ending injury in 1991, only to return as a student coach in 1992.

Pry is a second generation college football coach. His father, Jim, has coached at the college level for more than 35 years.

Pry and his wife, Amy, are the parents of a son, Colby, and two daughters, Madeline and Catherine.

RICKY RAHNE

QUARTERBACKS

Ricky Rahne returns for his third season as Vanderbilt's quarterback coach. The coaching ties between Rahne and James Franklin date to the mid-2000s when Rahne served as offensive graduate assistant under Franklin at Kansas State.

Rahne's work with senior Jordan Rodgers in 2012 helped produce one of the finest campaigns ever by a Vanderbilt quarterback. Rodgers,

prospering under Rahne's guidance, finished the year ranking among the team's single-season Top Ten passers with 2,539 yards and 15 touchdowns. More importantly, Rodgers substantially improved as an efficient quarterback during his final season, hitting on a career-high 60 percent of his passes and ranking among SEC leaders with just five interceptions. After the season, Rodgers signed a free agent deal with Jacksonville.

In 2011, Rodgers and Larry Smith enjoyed success under Rahne's watchful eye. Smith increased his completion percentage to a career-high 55% and provided superb leadership through the season. Rodgers also responded well when called upon at midseason, passing for 1,523 yards, the highest total ever by a first-year Vanderbilt quarterback. Rodgers also threw nine TDs.

NOTES: Under Rahne's watchful eye, Jordan Rodgers was a totally different QB as a senior in 2012. He completed 60 percent of his throws for the fifth highest yardage total ever by a 'Dore, and produced one of the SEC's best TD-to-INT ratios.

Rahne, who enjoyed a record-breaking collegiate career as quarterback at Cornell University, and Franklin were members of the Kansas State staff during the 2006-07 seasons.

While on the Wildcat staff, Franklin and Rahne helped mentor talented quarterback Josh Freeman into an All-Big 12 signal caller and an eventual first-round NFL draft pick.

Rahne served as a full-time member of the Kansas State coaching staff from 2007-10. He held the position of tight ends coach under legendary Wildcat head coach Bill Snyder in 2009-10 after mentoring Kansas State running backs the first two years as a staffer.

In 2010, Rahne helped Kansas State secure a berth in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl at Yankee Stadium after a 7-5 regular season. In 2009, Rahne tutored first team All-Big 12 tight end Jeron Mastrud, who ranks second in school history in receptions among tight ends. Directing the Wildcat running backs from 2007-08, Rahne helped tutor All-Big 12 selection James Johnson, who became the fastest Wildcat to rush for 1,000 yards in a season in 2007.

Rahne served as the Wildcats' graduate assistant during the 2006 season, working hand-in-hand with Franklin with Wildcat quarterbacks. Specifically, they helped develop a young Freeman into K-State's starting quarterback.

Eventually, Freeman put together one of the greatest careers ever by a Kansas State signal caller and became a first-round draft pick of the Tampa Bay Bucs. Freeman, who just completed his fourth year as an NFL starter, is considered one of the league's future stars at quarterback.

Before joining Kansas State, Rahne worked as a Cornell running backs coach in 2005 mentoring first team All-Ivy running back Luke Siwula, and as an assistant defensive coach at Holy Cross in 2004.

A native of Morrison, Colo., Rahne finished his career as Cornell's all-time leader in nearly every passing category and earned the team's MVP honors three times.

Rahne earned a degree in industrial and labor relations from Cornell.

Rahne and his wife, Jennifer, are the parents of two young sons, Ryder and Jake.

SEAN SPENCER

DEFENSIVE LINE

Sean Spencer enters his third year on James Franklin's staff. He coaches the Commodores' defensive line.

Several in Spencer's corps, including ends Walker May, Kyle Woestmann and Caleb Azubike, and tackles Jared Morse, Barren Dixon and Vince Taylor, enjoyed career campaigns last year.

In just two years, Spencer has developed one of the deepest lines in recent Vanderbilt history. In 2012, Spencer used 10 players in his defensive line rotations.

Woestmann closed the 2012 season in superb fashion, totalling six sacks. Azubike set a new team record for true freshmen with four sacks. May, posted 10.5 tackles for loss and three quarterback sacks. Morse registered 26 tackles, including nine for losses. Dixon and Taylor also developed into key interior contributors.

In 2011, the defensive front fed off Spencer's energy, with several standouts enjoying career years, including defensive end Tim Fugger and tackle Rob Lohr. Fugger, drafted by Indianapolis and now with Arizona, was rewarded for an impressive 2011 campaign with second team All-SEC honors, posting eight sacks and 13.5 tackles for loss. Lohr, who signed as a free agent by Kansas City after the 2012 season, also ranked among the SEC's most productive defensive tackles with 11.5 tackles for loss and 4.5 sacks.

Spencer came to Nashville after two successful years at Bowling Green. Spencer's top pupil at Bowling Green, defensive tackle Chris Jones,

garnered six quarterback sacks in 2010, including 3.5 sacks in a win over Central Michigan that helped Jones earn National Defensive Lineman of the Week honors. Jones later also earned All-MAC Conference recognition.

The BGSU defensive front posted 40 sacks during Spencer's tenure. He also helped Bowling Green to the Humanitarian Bowl in 2009 despite opening the year without a single returning starter on the defensive front.

Spencer enjoyed two successful stints at UMass, serving from 2007-08 after working with the Minutemen from 2001-03. He was a defensive line coach in both tenures, and also guided UMass special teams in 2007-08.

In 2007 the Minutemen ranked among the nation's best with 44 sacks. That UMass unit was led by All-America and Buck Buchanan Award finalist David Burris. In the early 2000s, Spencer mentored another top Minuteman defensive lineman, Buchanan Award finalist Valdamar Brower.

Spencer enjoyed team success at UMass, helping the Minutemen to consecutive Colonial Athletic Association titles.

Spencer mentored two special teams phenoms at UMass: kick returner Courtney Robinson and punter Brett Arnold. Robinson earned first team All-CAA honors after breaking the team's record for kick return yards. Arnold earned first team All-America honors.

Spencer spent the 2006 season at Hofstra University where he was the defensive line coach for the Pride. In the summer of 2006, Spencer took part in an NFL summer internship with the New York Jets.

Prior to Hofstra, Spencer served as linebackers coach at Villanova University in 2005 where he coached All-American Brian Hulea. Spencer also spent the 2004 season at the College of Holy Cross and served the 2001-03 seasons as an assistant at UMass. Previously, he served tenures at Trinity College, Shippensburg University and Wesleyan University.

Spencer started three years at free safety at Clarion University.

Spencer is the parent of a daughter, Alysia.

DWIGHT GALT

DIRECTOR OF PERFORMANCE ENHANCEMENT

Dwight Galt enters his third season as Director of Performance Enhancement of the Vanderbilt football program. A veteran strength coach of three decades, Galt joined James Franklin's staff before the 2011 campaign.

Vanderbilt football student-athletes have flourished under the strength and conditioning program instituted three years ago by Galt and his top assistants, Chuck Losey and Barry Gant.

The year-round program aimed at improving speed, agility, strength, and power throughout the Commodore roster has produced superb results. The 2012 squad held an impressive 191-129 scoring advantage over opponents after intermission. It marked the second consecutive season that Vanderbilt has vastly outscored foes in the second half.

Galt came to Vanderbilt from Maryland, where he worked with Franklin while conditioning some of the Terps' finest gridiron teams

and players.

Many Galt pupils rank among the elite performers at the NFL Combine.

At the 2013 combine, Vanderbilt's Zac Stacy ranked high among all running backs in several categories, including the broad jump, bench press and 20-yard shuttle. Later, at the team's Pro Day, several other Commodore seniors trained by Galt registered impressive agility and strength feats.

In past years, performances by a slew of Galt-trained athletes have amazed NFL scouts, such as tight end Vernon Davis, receiver Darrius Heyward-Bey and cornerback Dominique Foxworth. Davis and Heyward-Bey rank among the Top 10 all-time performers at the combine: Davis posting the fastest 40-yard dash ever by a tight end (4.36) and Heyward-Bey running the fastest 40 (4.30) by a wideout in more than a decade.

Currently, nearly 40 former athletes trained by Galt are active in the National Football League.

Galt served as Director of Strength & Conditioning at Maryland for the last 17 of 27 years he spent with the football program. After starting as a full-time strength coach with Maryland in 1989, Galt was named Maryland's Head Strength Coach in 1993, with responsibility over 27 varsity sports.

Throughout his career, Galt has been fortunate to mentor several superb assistants who have become industry leaders: including University of Virginia head strength coach Evan Marcus, Penn State head strength coach Craig Fitzgerald and Washington Redskins head strength coach Ray Wright.

Galt and his wife, Janice, have been married for 34 years. They have four children: Angie, 30; Teri, 29; and 26-year-old twin sons, Dwight IV and Tommy.

All four children played intercollegiate sports: Angie as a softball catcher at Brown University; Teri as an all-conference soccer defender at Frostburg State (Md.). Both sons played football at Maryland and remain active in collegiate athletics: Dwight IV is strength associate head coach at Penn State; Tommy is the offensive line coach at North Greenville (S.C.) University.


Barry Gant Jr. enters his third year at Vanderbilt, serving as assistant director to Dwight Galt.
