Derek Mason, regarded among the nation's top coordinators at Stanford, is the 28th head coach for the Vanderbilt Commodores.

Mason, who served as associate head coach and Willie Shaw Director of Defense for the 2013 Pacific-12 champion Stanford Cardinal, was introduced as the Commodores' coach by Vanderbilt Chancellor Nicholas S. Zeppos and Director of Athletics David Williams II in mid-January.

Mason becomes head coach of a Commodore program that has enjoyed consecutive nine-win seasons and postseason Top 25 rankings for the first time in team history. The 2013 Vanderbilt squad finished 9-4, capped by a 41-24 victory over Houston in the BBVA Compass Bowl.

"I am so excited to be at Vanderbilt," Mason said. "This university combines the best of what's good about college athletics and academics. We expect to be competitive and look forward to competing for an SEC East crown."

Since arriving on campus, Mason has attracted an outstanding signing class of 22 prospects, assembled a highly qualified staff that includes a former major college head coach and six coordinators, and effectively rolled out new offensive and defensive schemes during his initial Spring Practice. Increasingly, Mason also has become more visible in the city, contributing to several local community and university causes while making appearances at an array of social and sporting events.

Zeppos and Williams praised the 44-year-old Arizona native. Both said Mason quickly became their top choice during the January hiring process.

"Derek Mason is the leader we trust to continue the challenging but exciting work that has elevated the Vanderbilt football program to unprecedented heights," Zeppos said. "He embodies integrity, strategic thinking and a demonstrated commitment to success. He understands the important role that athletics plays in the life of a vibrant university, and that outstanding scholarly pursuits and top-notch sports are integral parts of the Vanderbilt experience. We are thrilled to welcome him to the Vanderbilt community."

"We are very pleased with our search. It was evident that the football world is aware of the tremendous progress our program has made and that was reflected by the deep pool of talent that showed an interest in our position," Williams said. "We talked to outside experts and did our own

Recent Mason Achievements

COACHED IN FOUR CONSECUTIVE BCS BOWLS

Since being hired by then-Stanford Head Coach Jim Harbaugh prior to 2010 season, Mason has been a key leader in arguably the greatest era of Cardinal football. In the last four years, Stanford has played in four straight BCS bowl games: the 2011 Orange Bowl, 2012 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, 2013 Rose Bowl and 2014 Rose Bowl. Alabama is the only other team that can make the same claim. During the four-year period, Stanford owns an overall record of 45-8.

COACHED BACK-TO-BACK PAC-12 CHAMPION TEAMS TO ROSE BOWL APPEARANCES

Mason's last two years at Stanford with Head Coach David Shaw concluded with appearances in the Rose Bowl. The consecutive appearances in Pasadena, by way of earning Pac-12 titles, ranks as a modern-day first for the Cardinal program.

evaluations and the person that always seemed to be in the spotlight was the same person that was at the top of our list and that was Derek Mason."

"We are so excited to be introducing him as our head football coach because we are confident he can build upon our successes on and off the field and that he will take us to the next level. Derek will be an asset to our university," Williams added.

Defensive coordinator at Stanford since 2011, Mason helped take the Cardinal to Rose Bowl appearances in 2013 and 2014, and consecutive Pac-12 titles with one of the nation's top defensive units. Under Mason, the Cardinal ranked among the NCAA national Top 15 in defensive efficiency for three consecutive years.

While facing seven ranked opponents and one of the nation's toughest schedules in 2013, Mason's defense ranked third in the NCAA in rushing defense (89.4 yards), 10th in scoring defense (19.0 points) and 16th in total offense (343.1 yards).

The Cardinal was one of only five teams last year to allow less than 100 rushing yards per game. The team was also among the best nationally in producing stops for negative yardage, ranking fifth with 44 sacks and seventh with 109 tackles for loss. The defense was also superb on third downs, holding opponents to a 32 percent conversion rate.

Off the field, the Cardinal ranks among the nation's best with a football graduation rate of 95 percent. Like Vanderbilt, Stanford ranks among the nation's elite academic universities.

In 2012, Mason was a finalist for the Broyles Award, given annually to the nation's top assistant coach, after directing a defense that ranks among the best in the nation and finest in Stanford history. The 2012 unit broke Stanford's single season record for quarterback sacks and topped the Pac-12 in numerous categories, including scoring defense and total defense, helping the Cardinal to a 11-2 season capped off with a Rose Bowl crown.

Mason's leadership paved the way to a historic defensive output in 2012, breaking Stanford's single-season sacks record (57) and pacing the Pac-12 in scoring defense (17.2 points), total defense (336.2 yards) and rushing defense (97.0 yards). In 11 of 14 games in 2012, Stanford held its opponent to 20 or fewer points, including a 14-point effort in the overtime win at top-ranked Oregon, who led the FBS with a 54.8 scoring average.

The 2012 Stanford defense held eight of 13 opponents under 100 yards rushing, and in a string of three consecutive games, the Cardinal recorded three of its top-10, single-game rushing defense performances in school history.

In 2011, Mason's first year as co-defensive coordinator, he teamed with

Jason Tarver to mold Stanford into one of the Pac-12's top defensive units. That season, the unit ranked either first or second in the Pac-12 in six defensive categories, including rushing defense, third-down conversion defense, scoring defense, total defense, sacks and opponent first downs. Stanford finished third nationally in rushing defense. Mason joined the Cardinal staff in 2010, serving as secondary coach under then-Stanford coach Jim Harbaugh. Mason's 2010 secondary, which featured three players now in the NFL, was one of the team's most improved units, posting 18 interceptions.

At Stanford, Mason helped develop an array of Cardinal defensive standouts, including All-Pro cornerback Richard Sherman of the world champion Seattle Seahawks, All-America defensive end Trent Murphy, All-America linebacker Shayne Skov, and All-Pacific 12 safety Ed Reynolds.

Prior to his arrival in Palo Alto, Mason served as an assistant defensive backs coach for the Minnesota Vikings from 2007 to 2009, playing a vital role in the team ranking sixth in total defense in 2008 and 2009 as the Vikings won NFC North titles each season. Mason was introduced to the NFL coaching circles through the Minority Fellowship program in 1996 with the St. Louis Rams and also spent time with the coaching staffs of the New York Giants and Oakland Raiders. He joined the Vikings staff in 2007, where he worked with defensive backs coach Joe Woods.

Before joining the Vikings, Mason tutored wide receivers at Ohio University under head coach Frank Solich, helping the Bobcats improve from 4-7 in 2005 to

a 9-5 campaign the following year that ended with an appearance in the GMAC Bowl. Mason spent the 2004 season as the wide receivers coach at New Mexico State, where he helped the Aggies lead the conference in passing.

During the 2002 campaign, Mason mentored the receivers and assisted with the special teams at Utah. The Utes also featured the NFL Draft's No. 1 overall pick in quarterback Alex Smith and eventual 7th round pick receiver Paris Warren.

Mason's move to Utah came after a three-year stint at Bucknell (1999-2001) in which he gained his first experience as a defensive assistant coach. At Bucknell, Mason served as defensive backs mentor for three straight winning Bison squads. His relationship with current Vanderbilt defensive coordinator David Kotulski – and introduction to the 3-4 defensive scheme – came at Bucknell.

Mason's first three collegiate positions came as an offensive assistant

at Mesa Community College (in 1994), Weber State (1995-96) and Idaho State (1997-98).

As a player, Mason was a two-year starter and four-year letterwinner at Northern Arizona. He was recruited to the university by Head Coach Larry Kentera, the grandfather of current Vanderbilt receiver Kris Kentera.

During his NAU career, Mason was influenced by several outstanding coaches, including Kentera, former Minnesota head coach Brad Childress, Jets offensive coordinator Marty Mornhingweg, Kansas City head coach Andy Reid, former Louisville head coach Steve Kragthorpe and current Vanderbilt offensive coordinator Karl Dorrell.

Mason earned a Bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Northern Arizona in 1993.

A native of Phoenix, Mason attended Camelback High School.

Derek and his wife, Leighanne, have two daughters, Makenzie, 14, and Sydney. 13.





With 26 years of coaching experience at the college and professional level, Dorrell brings a strong pedigree with him to the Vanderbilt position.

A former head coach at UCLA from 2003-07 where he was named the 2005 Pac-10 Conference Co-Coach of the Year, Dorrell has spent the previous six seasons in the NFL. His last two seasons were in Houston where he coached Texans' quarterbacks.

In addition to having head coaching experience, Dorrell has seven years of experience as a collegiate offensive coordinator. He was the offensive coordinator at Washington in 1999 and also served in the same capacity at Colorado (1995-98) and Northern Arizona (1990-91). Dorrell has coached on the collegiate level for 17 years and has been on the staffs of 12 teams that enjoyed postseason appearances.

In his two seasons with the Texans, Dorrell helped the team reach the playoffs in 2012, where he tutored QB Matt Schaub to his second career

Pro Bowl. Schaub tossed for 4,008 yards and completed 64.3 percent of his passes in 2012.

In 2011, Dorrell mentored Dolphins quarterback Matt Moore to a career season. Moore took over the reins in midseason and promptly earned career highs in completions, yards and touchdowns.

From 2008-10, Dorrell was wide receivers coach with the Dolphins. In that role, Dorrell saw Brandon Marshall and Davone Bess combine for the fourth-most receptions of any duo in the NFL.

Before returning to the NFL, Dorrell served as head coach at UCLA for five years, guiding the Bruins to five bowl games and a 35-27 overall record. In 2005, Dorrell led UCLA to a 10-2 record and No. 13 national ranking in the Coaches' Poll.

Dorrell's first full-time stint in the NFL came from 2000-02 when he served as wide receivers coach for Denver. Dorrell helped Rod Smith eclipse 1,000 receiving yards three times and a pair of Pro Bowl selections. In 2000, Ed McCaffrey posted 101 receptions for 1,317 yards.

A native of San Diego, Calif.,
Dorrell began his coaching career
as a graduate assistant at UCLA. His
first full-time position was as wide
receivers coach at Central Florida in
1989. Dorrell also coached at Northern
Arizona as offensive coordinator/wide

receivers coach from 1990-91.

Dorrell coached wide receivers at Colorado from 1992-93 and Arizona State in 1994 before returning to Colorado to serve as offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach of the Buffaloes from 1995-98. Dorrell also served as offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach at Washington in 1999.

A graduate of UCLA in 1987, Dorrell played wide receiver for the Bruins from 1982-86, where he helped lead the team to three Rose Bowls.

Dorrell and his wife, Kim, are the parents of two children: Chandler, who recently joined the Vanderbilt football team, and Lauren.

David Kotulski, who worked with Vanderbilt Head Coach Derek Mason during the 2012-13 seasons as a Stanford defensive assistant, will serve as the Commodores' defensive coordinator under Mason.

Kotulski mentored two highly productive inside linebackers during his two-year tenure with Stanford, Shayne Skov and A.J. Tarpley.

In 2012-13, Kotulski's interior linebackers helped produce one of the nation's top defenses for a Stanford program that captured back-to-back Pac-12 crowns and made consecutive Rose Bowl appearances.

In 2013, the Cardinal defense was one of five nationally to allow opponents less than 100 rushing yards per game, ranking third in the NCAA with a 89.4-yard rush defense average.

The 2013 unit also ranked 10th in scoring defense (19.0 points) and 16th in total defense, and was among the nation's best in producing plays for negative yardage with 44 quarterback sacks and 109 tackles for loss. In 2012, Kotulski's linebackers were key to Stanford's 57 quarterback sacks, a school record. That season, the Cardinal also paced the Pac-12 in scoring defense (17.2 points), total defense and rushing defense. Skov was Kotulski's most decorated player at Stanford, becoming a two-time All-America recipient, two-time All-Pac-12 honoree and 2012 Butkus Award finalist. Tarpley earned All-Pac-12 honorable mention recognition in 2013.


Skov and Tarpley also paced the 2013 Cardinal defense statistically, contributing 109 and 93 tackles, respectively. Skov also produced 13 tackles for loss, 5.5 quarterback sacks and 10 hurries.

Prior to joining the Stanford staff, Kotulski served six years directing one of the Patriot League's top defenses at Lehigh University. In 2011, Lehigh ranked in the top three in six Patriot League defensive categories, including total defense (315.7 yards), rushing defense (102.8 yards), interceptions and sacks. The Mountain Hawks also finished in the Top 20 nationally in both total defense and rushing defense.

After winning its second straight Patriot League title in 2011, Lehigh defeated Towson in the second round of the Football Championship Series

(FCS) playoffs before falling to eventual national champ North Dakota State. In 2009, Kotulski's Lehigh unit led the nation with 39 sacks.

Before joining Lehigh, Kotulski was defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Holy Cross in 2005 and Utah State in 2003-04.

Kotulski's familiarity with Mason dates back to an eight-year tenure at Bucknell University where Mason served as a defensive assistant.

Kotulski also has collegiate experience as the defensive coordinator at Utah State (2003-04) and linebackers/defensive line coach at Saint Mary's University (1990-94).

Kotulski earned a bachelor's in physical education in 1974 from New Mexico State, where he lettered as a linebacker and center.

Charles Bankins enters his fourth season at Vanderbilt as special teams coordinator. He also will coach running backs for the first time during his Commodore tenure under Derek Mason.

Since 2011, Bankins has brought superb special teams to Vanderbilt. In 2013, Bankins' special teams unit was a huge contributor to the Commodores' success.

Carey Spear led the kicking unit last year by converting 15-of-19 field goals and going 2-for-2 in field goals of 50+ yards, including a career-long of 54 yards at South Carolina. The senior captain booted three field goals to match a career-best in the

season-ending victory against Wake Forest, including the game-winner from 38 yards. First-year punter Taylor Hudson averaged 42.9 yards, landing 11 of 48 punts inside the 20-yard line. Darrius Sims emerged as the go-to-guy for the Dores on kickoff returns with an average of 22.8 yards per return.

Bankins coached tight ends from 2011-13. In 2013, tight ends Kris Kentera and Steven Scheu each set career-highs in receiving yards and each caught touchdown passes.

In 2012, Bankins continued his remarkable job with Vanderbilt special teams, helping Spear and punter Richard Kent both earn All-SEC recognition as the 'Dores put together arguably the finest combined special teams effort in school history. Spear was sensational, setting school records with

20 field goals and 87 points scored by a kicker. Kent averaged 44.9 yards, the fourth highest average ever by a Commodore.

Bankins coached tight ends and special teams at Maryland from 2009-10. In 2010, Maryland punt returner Tony Logan earned first team All-ACC honors after leading the ACC with a 18.8-yard punt return average. In 2009, another Bankins' standout at Maryland, Torrey Smith, earned All-ACC honors by breaking the conference single-season record for kickoff return yards. Bankins also groomed kicker Nick Ferrara to freshman All-America honors in 2009.

Prior to working at Maryland,

Bankins enjoyed success as an assistant at the University of Richmond from 2007-08. In Bankins' final game as a Richmond coach, the Spiders claimed the 2008 NCAA FCS national title with a victory over Montana.

Bankins had two stints at Hampton University (2000-04, 2006) and spent 2005 with the St. Louis Rams. He also coached a year at Indiana (Pa.) University and James Madison.

Bankins played running back for James Madison, where he earned a bachelor's degree in speech communications in 1994. He earned a master's from Eastern Kentucky in 1998.

Bankins and his wife, Katrina, are the parents of a daughter, Ashley, and son, William.



Gerry Gdowski comes to Vanderbilt after spending nine years at Ohio. He will coach Commodore tight ends after mentoring quarterbacks at Ohio, where he also held the titles of Assistant Head Coach and co-Offensive Coordinator. He also serves as Vanderbilt's recruiting coordinator.

During his tenure at Ohio, Gdowski helped mold Tyler Tettleton into one of the greatest quarterbacks in Bobcats' history. Under Gdowski's tutelage, Tettleton set Ohio career records in passing yards and touchdowns, and became the only quarterback in school history to post three straight seasons of at least 2,500 yards passing. In 2013, the Bobcats averaged nearly 27.4 points and 380 yards of total offense, including 245.4 passing yards.

Gdowski's 2011 offense was the most productive unit in modern Ohio University history, totaling 427 points and 6,241 total yards. In all, the Bobcats' offensive unit set eight program records during the year.

Other standout quarterbacks mentored by Gdowski at Ohio were Boo Jackson, (38 career touchdown passes), Theo Scott (20 touchdown passes in 2009), Brad Bower and Austen Everson (ranks among team's all-time Top Ten passers in numerous categories).

Gdowski went to Ohio after eight seasons at New Mexico State. He was the Aggies' recruiting coordinator and quarterbacks coach until 2003 when he took over as offensive coordinator. The Aggies ranked second in the Sun Belt Conference in 2004 in scoring offense and passing offense.

Gdowski began his coaching career at Nebraska, working with the quarterbacks, tight ends and receivers as a graduate assistant from 1991 to 1993. He then moved to South Dakota State, where he coached for three seasons. After two years as quarterbacks and wide receivers coach,

Gdowski was promoted to offensive coordinator.

As a player, he earned three letters at Nebraska under legendary coach Tom Osborne. Gdowski was the starting quarterback and team captain for the Cornhuskers in 1989 and was named to the All-Big Eight First Team. He was an eighth round draft choice of the New Orleans Saints that spring.

Gdowski excelled off the field at Nebraska as well. He earned CoSIDA Academic All-America honors in 1989 and was awarded the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Postgraduate Scholarship as well as the NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship. A 1990 graduate of Nebraska with a bachelor's in business administration, Gdowski also went on to earn his master's in education administration from Nebraska in 1996.

Keven Lightner enters his first season at Vanderbilt as offensive line coach. Lightner and Derek Mason have known each other for more than a decade, working together previously at Ohio U. and New Mexico State.

Lightner spent the last nine seasons mentoring the offensive line at Ohio. Mason was Ohio's wide receivers coach in 2005-06.

Thirteen linemen earned All-Mid-American Conference accolades, including five repeat selections, under Lightner's tutelage. In 2013, the New York Giants took guard Eric Herman in the seventh round of the NFL Draft. He was the first Ohio offensive lineman to be drafted since 1972.

In 2012, Lightner's line paved holes for running back Beau Blankenship, who rushed for a school record 1,604 yards and 15 touchdowns. During his time at Ohio, Lightner saw the Bobcats set single-season records for total offense, scoring, yards per game, passing, touchdowns, completions, first downs and plays. The Bobcats also won the MAC East title three times and played in six bowls.

Prior to working at Ohio, he spent two seasons at New Mexico State, where Mason was the wide receivers coach in 2004.

Together, Lightner and Mason helped New Mexico State lead the Sun Belt Conference in passing and total offense, and ranked second in scoring offense. In 2003, the Aggies ranked 12th nationally in rushing offense and led

the Sun Belt. Lightner's top pupils with the Aggies was Outland Trophy candidate Steve Subia and six-year NFL veteran Nick Cole.

Lightner coached the offensive line and served as co-offensive coordinator at Western Kentucky for the 2001 and 2002 seasons. In two years, the Hilltoppers were 20-7 overall, made the I-AA playoffs twice and won the 2002 national championship. Lightner coached three All-Americans and five all-league players at WKU.

Lightner served as an assistant coach at Division II Nebraska-Omaha for three seasons (1998-2000). The Mavericks won their conference and made the playoffs

twice. Lightner also coached two-time All-American guard Chris Bober, who played seven seasons in the NFL.

Prior to UNO, he also served as an assistant coach for two years at Division II Northern (S.D.) State, where he helped the Wolves produce their first 1,000-yard rusher in 25 years.

Before coaching at the college ranks, Lightner spent five years at two Nebraska high schools (Lincoln Northeast and Hastings) coaching the offensive and defensive lines.

Lightner played collegiately at Nebraska, where he earned first team All-Big Eight honors as an offensive tackle in 1987 and participated in the 1988 Hula Bowl. He briefly played professionally in three leagues - the NFL (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 1988), the CFL (Hamilton Tiger Cats, 1990) and World League of American Football (Montreal Machine, 1991-92).

A native of Hastings, Neb., Lightner earned a bachelor's in secondary education from Nebraska in 1996.

Marc Lubick is in his first season at Vanderbilt after serving as an offensive assistant coach with the NFL's Houston Texans. Lubick will mentor Commodore wide receivers.

Lubick served four years with the Texans, including the last two seasons as assistant wide receivers coach. While in Houston, he also served with current Vanderbilt offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach Karl

In Houston, Lubick worked with likely future Hall of Famer Andre Johnson, who continued to post stunning receiving statistics. In 2013, Johnson registered 1,407 receiving yards on 109 catches. In 2012, he recorded a benchmark season earning his sixth Pro Bowl trip and All-Pro recognition posting 112 passes and 1,598 receiving yards. It marked the second time in NFL history a player recorded more than 100 receptions and 1,500 yards in his 10th season or later.

In 2010-11, Lubick was part of a staff that guided the Texans' offense to several franchise records, including points scored and total yardage.

Lubick has 14 seasons of coaching experience, including eight seasons collegiately at Colorado State. He served as CSU's tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator from 2008-09 and receivers coach from 2005-07. During that time, he coached 7th-round pick and former Texans receiver David Anderson, along with former free agent signee Dustin Osborn.

Lubick launched his coaching career in 2000 as a defensive student assistant at CSU. Lubick spent the 2002 season as an academic graduate assistant coach at CSU, working with wide receivers. After the 2002 campaign, Lubick joined the St. Louis Rams for two years.

Lubick comes from a family of successful coaches. His father, Sonny, is considered the most successful head football coach in Colorado State

Frank Maile enters his first year on the Commodore staff, contributing his efforts as defensive line coach.

Maile served the last six seasons at his alma mater, Utah State, including the last three as defensive line coach.

During the last three years, Utah State has enjoyed virtually unparalleled success. Like Vanderbilt, the Aggies just played in their third straight postseason game for the first time in school history and has a combined 28-13 record over the three-year span.

In 2013, Maile's defensive line helped Utah State to a 9-5 overall record, capped by a 21-14 victory over No. 24 Northern Illinois and Heisman Trophy candidate Jordan Lynch in the Poinsettia Bowl. The USU unit held NIU's high-powered offense in check, and limited Lynch to just 39 rushing yards.

Utah State's 2013 defense ranked seventh in the nation in scoring defense (17.1 pts.), 8th in rushing defense, 12th in total defense and 15th in pass defense efficiency.

During the 2012 season, Maile helped Utah State's defense rank first in the Western Athletic Conference and seventh in the nation in scoring defense and sixth nationally in sacks. The unit also paced the WAC in total defense, passing defense and pass efficiency defense, and ranked second in the conference in rushing defense.

Utah State's 2012 defense also led the WAC and ranked second in the nation in red zone efficiency after allowing just 13 touchdowns and 15 field goals on 44 trips inside the 20-yard line.

In 2012, Maile coached three linemen to All-WAC honors: senior Al Lapuaho, redshirt freshman Jordan Nielsen and junior Connor Williams.

As a senior in 2012, Lapuaho finished with 35 tackles, 4.5 tackles for loss and 3.0 sacks. Nielsen finished with 5.0 sacks and 6.5 tackles for loss. Nielsen had 4.5 sacks and blocked two kicks during the year. Williams ended the 2012 campaign with a team-high six sacks.

During the 2011 season, Maile helped Utah State's defense end the year ranking first in the WAC in total defense, second in the conference in rushing defense and tackles for loss, and third in the league in pass efficiency defense and quarterack sacks.

In 2011, Maile coached senior defensive end Levi Koskan who earned second-team All-WAC honors after finishing the year with 27 tackles, 10.0 tackles for loss and a team-best 5.5 sacks, as well as six quarterback hurries. Overall, Koskan ranked eighth in the WAC in sacks and 12th in tackles for loss. Maile also coached Quinn Garner and Lapuaho that season, with both contributing 31 total tackles.

Prior to joining the Aggies as a full-time position coach, Maile spent two years as a strength and conditioning graduate assistant at Utah State.

Maile was a standout defensive lineman for the Aggies from 2004-07, enjoying 21 career games. He was a senior co-captain, finishing his career with 19 tackles for loss among 71 total stops. He also earned his bachelor's in interdisciplinary studies and his master's in education from Utah State.

A native of West Valley City, Utah, Maile was a first-team all-state defensive lineman at Alta (Utah) High School. He went on an LDS Church Mission to the Dominican Republic from 2001-03.

Maile, and his wife, Heather, are the parents of three sons, Maximus, Samson and Titan, and a daughter, Cecilia.

Brett Maxie joins Derek Mason's Vanderbilt staff as secondary coach after serving the last two years in a similar role with the crosstown Tennessee Titans.


After 16 seasons in the National Football League, Maxie's role as mentor of the Vanderbilt secondary is his first in the collegiate coaching ranks.



Kenwick Thompson, defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at San Jose State in 2013, is now associate head coach and outside linebackers coach at Vanderbilt.

Prior to joining San Jose State for the 2013 campaign, Thompson served six years as a key defensive assistant coach at the University of California under Coach Jeff Tedford.

At San Jose State, Thompson's responsibilities included mentoring Spartan linebackers. One of his top players was linebacker Keith Smith, who became just the second San Jose State player to become a four-year All-Mountain West recipient. As a senior captain under Thompson, Smith earned First Team All-MVC honors after leading the NCAA with 159 total tackles. His performances included back-to-back, 20-tackle efforts against Minnesota and Utah State.
