STADIUM IMPROVEMENTS * SEEKING SIXTH WIN

VANDERBILT STADIUM GETS FRESH LOOK; PHASE I CONSTRUCTION WORK COMPLETE

Enthusiastic Commodore fans attending home games this season are seeing the first substantial improvements to Dudley Field and Vanderbilt Stadium in more than a decade.

Constructions crews completed Phase 1 work on Vanderbilt Stadium in late August. The result is a clean, refurbished look for the stadium, built in 1981.

The completed construction is the first of five phases outlined in a \$60 million athletic facility enhancement plan. The project was announced last winter by Vanderbilt Vice Chancellor of University Affairs and Student Athletics David Williams II.

Among the football stadium improvements completed in the Phase I work are:

- New brick exterior renovation to south end of stadium facing McGugin Athletic Center and Jess Neely Drive. The work extends the brick facade included at the adjacent Hawkins Baseball Field.
- Painting of stadium exterior.
- Addition of new Vanderbilt Bookstore and Commodore Grille outlets on concourse.
- New eastside concourse artwork featuring Vanderbilt Athletics "It's Good To Be Gold" theme. The artwork includes action images of several recent Vanderbilt standouts, such as football players Jay Cutler, Earl Bennett and Chris Williams, golfer Brandt Snedeker, hoopsters Shan Foster and Chantelle Anderson, and baseball players Pedro Alvarez and David Price.
- New exterior signage and installation of large
 "Star V" logos on the press box structure.

Bobby Johnson's football team also benefited from the addition of FieldTurf artificial surface at its practice facility this summer.

Phase I construction also is aimed at enhancing both Memorial Gym and Hawkins Field. New men's and women's player locker rooms, and post-game press conference facilities are under construction at Memorial Gym, along with the installment of a new wooden gym floor. At Hawkins Field, work is under way to expand capacity with the addition of seating areas in left field and right field.

The facility project is expected to continue for several years. Phase II, expected to get under way after the 2008 football season, calls for total renovation of both stadium gates facing Jess Neely Drive, and the continuation of the brick exterior facade down Natchez Trace. Work on the long-anticipated Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame also is expected to start after the season.

The project also calls for future construction of new football player locker and meeting rooms, and expanded training and academic support facilities.

LOOKING FOR FOURTH STRAIGHT HOME WIN

The Commodores look to stay unbeaten in Vanderbilt Stadium this season when it hosts Duke Saturday.

Vanderbilt, 5-2 overall, has captured home victories over South Carolina (24-17, Sept. 4), Rice (38-21, Sept. 13) and Auburn (14-13, Oct. 4) to open the season. It marks the first time Vanderbilt has captured its first three home games since 1982 when the Commodores topped Tulane, No. 14 Florida and Ole Miss in Vanderbilt Stadium. That 1982 squad went 6-0 in Vanderbilt Staidum enroute to the Hall of Fame Bowl, becoming the first Commodore squad to enjoy an undefeated/untied home campaign since 1955.

The Commodores will attempt to win four consecutive games in Vanderbilt Stadium since a similar streak that started with a 1991 win over No. 17 Georgia and continued through a 1992 victory over Ole Miss.

COMMODORES SEEKING SIXTH WIN

Vanderbilt looks to reach six wins in a season for the first time in more than two decades Saturday when it faces 3-3 Duke.

The Commodores, at 5-2 and off to their best start since 1956, are looking to reach six wins for the first time since going 8-3 en route to the 1982 Hall of Fame Bowl.

Last Saturday, the Commodores were unable to reach 6-1 for the first time since 1950 when they fell at Georgia 24-14. Only eight teams in Vanderbilt football history have reached 6-0 to start the season: 1928, 1921, 1916, 1915, 1912, 1904, 1903 and 1897.

VANDERBILT VS. THE ACC

Vanderbilt is 65-57-5 all-time against current ACC teams. In the last 10 years, the Commodores are 7-3 vs. ACC opponents. In the last 25 years, Vanderbilt has a 14-17 overall record against ACC members.

OUT OF THE TOP 25 🛨 HOMECOMING RESULTS

COMMODORES FALL FROM TOP 25 AFTER SECOND LOSS

After four consecutive weeks as a nationally ranked team, the Commodores fell from the Top 25 on Sunday after dropping their second straight game Saturday at Georgia.

Despite dropping a 24-14 decision to the No. 10 Bulldogs in Athens, Vanderbilt continues to earn votes in every major poll. The Commodores received 61 votes in the Associated Press poll, 28th among 37 teams getting votes. Vanderbilt also received 20 votes in the latest *USA Today* Coaches Poll, and rank 31st in that ballot. The Commodores received 70 votes in the Harris Interactive Poll, good for 30th place.

The Commodores' top ranking this season

was No. 13 by the Associated Press after defeating Auburn on Oct. 4 to go 5-0. The No. 13 ranking was Vanderbilt's highest by the AP since consecutive wins over Chattanooga and Alabama pushed the Commodores to No. 13 during the 1956 season. The highest Vanderbilt has ever appeared in the AP Poll is No. 7 after a Commodore win over No. 6 LSU on Oct. 28, 1937.

Vanderbilt played its third consecutive game as an AP ranked squad when it visited Georgia last Saturday. It ties the longest continuous time that a Vanderbilt squad has been ranked in the

Vanderbilt remains one of six SEC teams earning votes in the latest AP ballot, joining Alabama, Florida, Georgia, LSU and Kentucky.

Before this year, Vanderbilt last reached the AP Top 25 on Oct. 1, 1984, a day after toppling Alabama 30-21 to move to 4-0.

Vanderbilt's football history includes a 30-year stretch (1904-34) as the South's dominant power under Dan McGugin. The AP Poll began publishing its rankings in 1936, two years after McGugin retired from the Vanderbilt position.

Vanderbilt has been ranked by the AP in 11 different seasons: 2008, 1984, 1958, 1956, 1955, 1950, 1948, 1947, 1942, 1938 and 1937.

VANDERBILT HOMECOMING RESULTS SINCE WORLD WAR II

The Commodores are 25-34-3 in homecoming games on campus Since World War II.

Vanderbilt has also struggled in recent homecoming appearances. The squad has lost its last five homecoming games, including a narrow 20-17 loss to nationally ranked Georgia last year.

The Commodores last homecoming victory came against Connecticut – 28-24 – in 2002.

Since WWII, Vanderbilt is 9-3 in homecoming encounters against teams not affiliated with the Southeastern Conference. The Commodores lost 37-27 to Navy (in 2003) in their last homecoming game against a non-SEC squad.

The Commodores are 16-31-4 against SEC homecoming foes, and have lost the last six homecoming outings against SEC teams. Its last homecoming win against an SEC opponent came in 1998 - a 17-14 decision over South Carolina.

Other facts regarding Vanderbilt homecoming results include:

• In its last 10 homecoming games, the Commodores are 3-7, with victories over Connecticut (28-24 in 2002), The Citadel (58-0 in 1999) and South Carolina (17-14 in 1998).

Vanderbilt-Duke Series Notes

- ★ Dating back to 1992, Vanderbilt has captured the last six games played between the schools, including the last three played on the Nashville campus (1992, 1998 and 2000).
- ★ One of the icons of Duke football history, Wallace Wade, served as an assistant coach for powerful Vanderbilt squads in 1921-22 under Dan McGugin. Those Commodore units were two of McGugin's strongest teams, and included a halfback named Jess Neely and All-Americans Wade, McGugin, Bomar and Neely. All are now members of the College Football Hall of Fame. In 1967, Duke's football stadium was renamed Wallace Wade Stadium.

KEY GAMES IN THE DUKE SERIES

- ★ 2006 Chris Nickson turned together one of the finest offensive games in Vanderbilt history, passing for 250 yards and two TDs and rushing for 150 yards and three scores in the Commodore victory. Vanderbilt jumped out to a 35-7 lead before Duke rallied.
- ★ 2001 Anchored by running backs **Lew Thomas** and **Rodney Williams**, the Commodores scored three touchdowns in the third quarter to open a 35-14 margin during a 42-28 win at Duke. Thomas and Williams both rushed for more than 100 yards, becoming the first Commodore duo to do so in seven years. Thomas gained 123 yards before leaving with an injury while Williams finished with 155 yards and two scores. The Commodores also registered four interceptions.
- ★ 2000 John Markham matches a school-record by hitting four field goals in a 26-7 Vanderbilt win in Nashville. Markham's last field goal was a career long of 52 yards.
- ★ 1999 Vanderbilt scored 17 unanswered points to break a 14-14 third quarter tie enroute to a 31-14 victory at Duke.
- ★ 1998 Vanderbilt edged Duke 36-33 in double overtime when **Markham** nailed a 19-yard field goal. The game was a wide-open affair, featuring a 100-yard Vanderbilt rusher (**Rodney Williams**) and 100-yard receiver (**Anthony Jones**).
- ★ 1992 A late TD by Eric Lewis gave Vanderbilt a 42-37 win. Tony Jackson rushed for 123 yards and returned a kickoff 97 yards for a TD.
- ★ 1986 A 70-yard run by Carl Woods sealed the first win over Duke.

VANDERBILT VS. NON-SEC OPPONENTS

Vanderbilt has won seven of its last eight games action involving non-Southeastern Conference opponents. The lone loss in non-SEC play since the 2006 opener at Michigan was a 31-17 decision to ACC member Wake Forest in the 2007 season finale.

In the last decade, the Commodores are 20-12 in non conference games.

This season, the Commodores are 2-0 in non-conference games: victories at Miami (Ohio) and vs. Rice.

Under Bobby Johnson, the Commodores are 13-10 in non-conference action. The team is 2-1 this season in non-SEC games.

In the last decade, the Commodores are 22-14 in games against non-SEC teams. The record includes a 7-3 mark versus ACC opponents.

DUKE'S DC SON OF FORMER 'DORE COACH

Duke defensive coordinator **Mike MacIntyre** is a former Vanderbilt student and the son of a former Commodore head coach.

MacIntyre, in his first year with David Cutcliffe's Blue Devil staff, played at Vanderbilt in 1984-85 under his father, George MacIntyre. who served as the Vanderbilt head coach from 1979-85. He transferred to Georgia Tech, playing there in 1987-88.

MacIntyre's dad also served as Bobby Johnson's position coach at Clemson.

Prep Teammates Plentiful Saturday

Two Commodore players will be facing former high school teammates when Vanderbilt meets Duke this Saturday.

- **Joel Caldwell** (R-Jr., safety) and Duke center **Bryan Morgan** were teammates at Hoover (Ala.) H.S.
- Johnell Thomas (Fr., DE) and Duke's **Kyle Hill** (R-Fr., OT) were teammates at powerful Boone (Fla.) H.S., in Orlando.



COMMODORE COACHES WITH ACC TIES

Several Commodore coaches, including Head Coach Bobby Johnson, has ties to the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Johnson faced the Blue Devils from 1970-72 as a receiver and defensive back at Clemson. Later, in 1993, he served as Clemson's defensive coordinator.

Four members of the Commodore offensive staff – assistant head coach/offensive line coach **Robbie Caldwell**, offensive coordinator **Ted Cain**, quarterbacks coach **Jimmy Kiser** and receivers coach **Charlie Fisher** – spent extended periods coaching at ACC schools near Duke

Caldwell coached offensive lines for 11 years at North Carolina State, then left in 2000 to work two years as the offensive line coach at North Carolina. Caldwell left UNC to accept the Vanderbilt assistant head coach/offensive line position under Johnson in 2002.

Caldwell, Cain, Kiser and Fisher all spent years working at North Carolina State during the Wolfpack tenure of Dick Sheridan. Cain, Caldwell and Kiser were members of Sheridan's first N.C. State staff in 1986 — Cain as offensive coordinator, Caldwell as offensive line coach and Kiser as receivers coach. Fisher coached Wolfpack receivers a decade later (1997-98). Before coaching at N.C. State, Kiser and Fisher also coached together at Lenoir-Rhyne College in North Carolina.

One of North Carolina State's top defensive linemen during the early 1990s was **Ricky Logo**, the Commodores' defensive line mentor.

Vanderbilt linebacker coach **Warren Belin** was a defensive standout at Wake Forest, starting three years at linebacker. An ACC All-Academic student, Belin graduated in 1990.

Secondary coach **Jamie Bryant** served one year on the defensive staff at North Carolina before accepting the job at Vanderbilt.

Conditioning director **John Sisk** also worked several years on the Clemson strength staff.

NEW STARTERS HELP OFFENSE LINE

The pair of first-time starters inserted into the Commodore lineup at Georgia appeared to give the Vanderbilt offense a lift in Athens.

Eric Hensley (R-Jr., OG) and **Kyle Fischer** (R-Fr., OT) earned their first career starts against a Georgia defense that ranks among the NCAA's best in numerous statistical categories, including total defense and rushing defense.

The insertion of Hensley at right guard and Fischer at left tackle helped spark a Commodore offense that struggled mightily in a 17-14 loss at Mississippi State one week earlier.

While Vanderbilt managed just 245 total yards against the Bulldogs, the Commodores did feature one of their most balanced attacks of the season, producing 114 rushing yards and 131 passing yards. The 114-yard rushing total represents the second most allowed by the Georgia defense this season. The passing total is the second most produced by Vanderbilt this season.

The new Commodore offensive line also refused to allow a Georgia sack of QB **Mackenzi Adams**, who also started his first game of the 2008 season.

COMMODORE RED ZONE EFFICIENCY

One of the keys to Vanderbilt's 5-2 record is the Commodores continuing success in the red zone.

Despite ranking 10th and 12th in the Southeastern Conference in total defense and total offense, the Commodores are among the national leaders in red zone categories on both sides of the ball.

The Commodore offense is tied for the conference lead with Florida in converting red zone opportunities. Through seven games, Vanderbilt has converted red zone changes at a 96 percent clip (22 of 23). The lone drive inside an opponent's 20-yard line that did not result in Commodore points came as Vanderbilt took a knee to conclude a victory over Rice.

On defense, the Commodores rank second behind Kentucky in red zone efficiency, limiting opponents to points at a 67% clip (14 of 21 possessions).

On Saturday, the Commodore offense scored on both of its drives inside the Georgia 20-yard line (Mackenzi Adams' TD passes of 17 and 18 yards to WR Jamie Graham). On defense, Vanderbilt held Georgia without points on one of four red zone opportunities.

The Commodore success also extends to producing – and limiting – touchdowns in the red zone.

The Vanderbilt offense tops the SEC – and ranks among the national leaders – with producing 17 touchdowns in its 23 red zone tries. The 74% touchdown success rate including 11 rushing scores and six TD passes. Only one other conference team, LSU, has an offensive success rate over 65%.

The Vanderbilt defense also ranks in the top third of the SEC in limiting red zone touchdowns. Commodore opponents have scored TDs on just 10 of 21 red zone possessions (four rushing/six passing). The 48% success by opponents is tied with South Carolina for fourth in the conference.

The Commodores struggled in both categories one year ago, producing points at a 70% rate, while allowing opponents to score on 83% of red zone opportunities.

'Dores – SEC Interception Leaders

The Commodore defense, led by a veteran defensive secondary, continues to rank among the SEC leaders in interceptions after picking off two passes by Georgia's standout QB Matt Stafford.

The Commodores' 13-interception total trails Tennessee's league leading total of 14, and is tied for fourth in the NCAA behind the Volunteers, North Carolina and Iowa.

Junior CBs **Myron Lewis** and **D.J. Moore** connected interceptions against Georgia.

Lewis and Moore share the team lead with junior safety **Ryan Hamilton**. The trio have three interceptions each.

Hamilton contributed all of his interceptions in the Commodores' 23-17 win at Ole Miss Sept. 13. Lewis sealed the Vanderbilt 14-13 win over Auburn with a late interception.

Senior safety **Reshard Langford** have a pair of interceptions.

Langford and Moore leads all Commodores with 10 career interceptions each. They are tied for second in the SEC among active players behind the 11-INT total of Derek Pegue of Mississippi State.



Positive Turnover Margin Key to Vanderbilt's Early-Season Success

When Vanderbilt holds an advantage in turnover margin, Commodore chances for victory increase significantly. Need look only at the last two games – both losses – to see the impact of turnovers.

Last Saturday, Vanderbilt and Georgia each committed two turnovers. The Bulldogs scored touchdowns following both Commodore miscues.

Two weeks ago in Starkville, Vanderbilt was edged by Mississippi State after committing more turnovers than an opponent for the first

time this season.

In Vanderbilt's first five games – all victories – the Commodores either owned a position advantage in turnovers or matched their opponents in the decisive category.

Vanderbilt enters the Duke game with a +7 turnover margin, ranking second in the SEC and 12th in the NCAA. game tied for the NCAA lead with a +9 turnover margin.

The Commodores will face a Blue Devil team also succeeding in the turnover margin category in David Cutcliffe's first year. Duke is third in the ACC – and 8th in the NCAA – with a +8 turnover margin.

Vanderbilt's advantage in turnovers is due to 13 interceptions by the Commodore defense. The interception total is second most in the SEC.

While the defense has posted an abundance of interceptions, it has forced just four turnovers from fumbles.

At the same time, the Commodores have committed 10 turnovers: five fumbles and five interceptions.

Upson Continues Strong Punting Display

Junior **Brett Upson** continues to perform like an All-Southeastern Conference punter.

Upson has been on a roll in recent weeks. He was named SEC Specialist of the Week for the second time this year after his performance at Georgia. Upson averaged 44.6 yards on seven punts against Georgia. None of his punts were returned by the Bulldogs.

He also continued to pin opponents deep in their territory. Georgia started three drives inside their 20-yard line, including twice at the 5-yard line, due to Upson's accurate punts.

Two weeks ago, Upson was SEC Specialist of the Week for a superb outing against Auburn.

Upson is averaging a career-high 40.8 yards on 44 punts. His net average of 38.3 yards leads the SEC and ranks 13th in the NCAA. He has seven punts of 50 yards or more, and has succeeded in pinning opponents inside their 20-yard line at an amazing 38.6 percent rate.

Second Half Success Key to Vanderbilt 5-2 Start

The Commodores' 5-2 start has been keyed by scoring success after intermission.

Vanderbilt has outscored its first five opponents 72-34 in the second half, and 123-58 after the first quarter.

The Commodore defense has held three of its last five opponents – Rice, Ole Miss and Auburn – scoreless after intermission. Georgia scored 10 second half points while Mississippi State notched two TDs after halftime.

The Vanderbilt defense didn't allow a third quarter touchdown until the Mississippi State game. Prior to playing in Starkville, the only third-quarter points allowed this season was a field goal by Miami (Ohio) in the opener.

Vanderbilt also holds a 34-17 scoring advantage over its opponents in the fourth quarter.

The second half advantage continues a trend witnessed by recent Bobby Johnson squads. Twice in the last three years, 2005 and 2007, Vanderbilt has finished the season with a scoring advantage over its opponents after intermission.

COMEBACK COMMODORES: FIVE WINS AFTER FACING DEFICITS

The Commodores' path to a 5-2 record has followed a familiar trail: to various ways to overcome deficits.

Bobby Johnson's squad has faced deficits in every game this season, yet managed to find ways to register five victories and just one loss.

After capturing five straight comeback wins, the Commodores could not duplicate the feat at Mississippi State or at Georgia where it fell behind by 14 points, the team's highest deficit of the year.

In each of Vanderbilt's five wins, the Commodores have put together a string of unanswered points to prevail. In four of the five eventual wins, Vanderbilt trailed by at least a touchdown.

• Against Auburn, the Commodores fell behind 13-0 early in the first quarter after the Tigers drove 49 yards for an early touchdown and turned Vanderbilt's only turnover of the game into a second touchdown.

After the second Auburn score, the Commodore offense came together behind reserve QB Mackenzi Adams and the defense stiffened. While Adams directed two scoring drives and accounted for more than 200 yards of total offense, the defense limited Auburn to less than 100 yards of total offense during the last three quarters.

- At Ole Miss, the Commodores twice trailed by 10 points, 10-0 and 17-7 in the first quarter before coming back to record a 23-17 victory. The Vanderbilt offense provided three possessions that resulted in Bryant Hahnfeldt field goals after the first quarter, the defense held Ole Miss without points for the final three quarters.
- On three occasions during the first half, the Rice Owls took a seven-point lead on the Commodores before Vanderbilt reeled off 24 straight points to secure a 38-21 decision.
- In its Southeastern Conference opener, Vanderbilt trailed South Carolina 10-3 at halftime, then scored 21 unanswered points to take a 24-10 margin en route to an eventual 24-17 win.
- In the opener at Miami, the Commodores trailed 3-0 early before putting together a 17-0 stretch to take the lead for good.

'Dores Limit Infractions at Georgia

Vanderbilt returned to its discipline approach at Georgia, committing just three penalties against the Bulldogs after getting flagged for a rash of infractions at Mississippi State.

The Commodores top the SEC – and rank among the NCAA leaders – in both fewest penalties (4.1 per game) and fewest penalty yardage (35.4 per game). They concluded the Georgia game with three infractions for 31 yards, after getting called for a season-high 10 flags at Miss. State.

Duke also does a great job limiting infractions. They enter the Vanderbilt game as Atlantic Coast Conference leader in both categories.

Supportive Crowds Watch Commodores

An enthusiastic sellout crowd of 39,773 watched Vanderbilt defeat Auburn Oct. 4 in Nashville, continuing a strong showing by Commodore fans at the admission gates.

In Vanderbilt's two earlier home wins – vs. South Carolina on Sept. 4 and vs. Rice on Sept. 13 – more than 36,500 fans were in attendance.

Through three games, the 'Dores are averaging crowds of 37,997. The current figure marks 95.5% of capacity in Vanderbilt Stadium.

The Commodores have three more home games on the schedule, two of which (Florida on Nov. 8 and Tennessee on Nov. 22) are sold out.

Capacity in Vanderbilt Stadium was reduced in 2001 when a 1,500-seat bleacher section located in the north end zone was removed.

2008 SEASON TICKETS SOLD OUT FOR VANDERBILT SCHEDULE

Vanderbilt football season ticket sales were at their highest levels in more than a decade, according to Commodore athletic officials.

Season ticket sales surpassed the 19,000-mark this season as officials announced Vanderbilt home sellouts against Auburn, Florida and Tennessee.

The total of 19,175 represents the most sold by Vanderbilt Athletics since 1996 when the home schedule included Notre Dame and Tennessee.

The 2008 sales level is well ahead of last year's final sales total of 15,191. In 2006 – the last year Vanderbilt hosted Tennessee, South Carolina and Florida on its Nashville campus – 11,367 season tickets were sold.

GRAHAM NOTCHES FIRST CAREER TD CATCHES

Jamie Graham (R-Fr., WR) made a name for himself in Memorial Gym last winter. This fall, he's quickly becoming a key Commodore on the gridiron.

Graham made two circus catches for touchdowns in Vanderbilt's 24-14 loss at Georgia Saturday. The receptions, both from QB Mackenzi Adams, were the first touchdown catches for the versatile product of Whites Creek H.S. in Nashville.

Graham topped the team with four receptions and 46 receiving yards (36). He added an 8-yard rush and two punt returns for 15 yards.

'08 OFFENSIVE LINE: 7 FIRST-TIME STARTERS

Vanderbilt has started eight different players along the offensive front this season – and seven have started for the first time ever.

The trend continued at Georgia when **Eric Hensley** (R-Jr., OG) and **Kyle Fischer** (R-Fr., OT) earned starting assignments.

The 'Dores entered the season with just one O-lineman (OG **Ryan Custer**) with any starting experience. He had three previous starts.

Two 'Dore Wins vs. Ranked Teams

Vanderbilt failed at Georgia last Saturday to defeat a third ranked opponent in the same season for the first time in team history.

Earlier this year, the Commodores have topped ranked Auburna and South Carolina in Vanderbilt Stadium.

On Oct. 4, the Commodores defeated No. 13 Auburn 14-13 in front of an ESPN national audience and capacity crowd. On Sept. 4, the 'Dores claimed a win over No. 24 South Carolina.

The win over South Carolina marked the first time in team history that Vanderbilt has defeated Top 25 teams in three straight seasons.

The victory over Auburn gave Vanderbilt two wins over ranked opponents in the same season since 1955 when No. 17 Kentucky was a 34-0 regular season victim and No. 8 Auburn fell in the Gator Bowl.

Since 2006, the Commodores are 4-7 against ranked opponents. Prior to 2006, Vanderbilt lost 51 straight games against ranked foes.

The victory over South Carolina was the Commodores' first home win over a ranked opponent since defeating No. 25 Ole Miss 31-9 on Sept. 19, 1992.

D.J. MOORE: MR. VERSATILITY

D.J. Moore (Jr., CB/KR) continues to affirm his status as one of the nation's most versatile and productive players.

Named First Team All-SEC by the Associated Press last year, Moore was all over the field at Georgia. On defense, he topped the team in tackles and intercepted a pass. On offense, Moore saw action as a wide receiver on more than a dozen plays, rushing twice for 14 yards. He also added a 25-yard kickoff return and two punt returns.

Moore, a product of Broome H.S., in Spartanburg, S.C., is the SEC's only four-way player, contributing as a CB, WR, PR and KR.

Earlier this season, Moore singlehandedly shifted the momentum in games against Rice and Miami (Ohio) that eventually became Commodore victories. For most of the Vanderbilt win at Ole Miss, the Rebel offense decided to test other cornerbacks besides Moore. Against Auburn, Moore's versatility helped the Commodore defeat the Tigers for the first time in more than five decades.

Moore's activity on offense against Georgia was the most of his Commodore career. He was used as a rushing threat on rocket sweeps and as a receiving target, though he did not register a catch. One year ago, Moore was nearly a difference maker against Georgia, rushing twice for 48 yards, including one run for 39 yards.

Moore ranks as the SEC's No. 3 punt returner with a 18.8-yard average.

While Commodore fans thought Moore was special in the season opener, he might have been more remarkable in the win over Rice. He accumulated 206 all-purpose yards on just seven touches against the Owls. It ranks as Moore's career high for all-purpose yardage.

Moore opened against Rice with a 39-yard kickoff return, then added 17 yards on his first punt return. One play later, Moore went 24 yards on a reverse, leading to Vanderbilt's first touchdown.

Moore took over the Rice game in the fourth quarter. After the Vanderbilt defense forced a Rice possession, Moore took the ensuing punt 67 yards to the Rice 1-yard line. On Rice's next possession, Moore stopped an Owl threat with an interception deep in Vanderbilt territory, returning the pick 31 yards.

Moore's performance at Miami was just as remarkable. In the span of 5:42 on the game clock, Moore intercepted a Miami pass attempt, forced a fumble on a quarterback sack that took the RedHawks out of field goal range, then returned the Miami punt 91 yards to the 1-yard line. The plays led to 10 points.

Against Miami, Moore contributed a 91-yard punt return – second longest in Vanderbilt history.

Moore focused on defense against South Carolina, contributing four tackles, including a 2-yard loss, and deflecting a pass that resulted in Reshard Langford's ninth career interception. In 2007, Moore was remarkable against theGamecocks, earning National Defensive Player of the Week honors with two interceptions in a 'Dore 17-6 win.

Moore is under consideration for numerous honors, including the Jim Thorpe Award, Nagurski Trophy and Bednarik Award.

In 2007, Moore was one of the nation's top CBs, sharing the SEC lead with six INTs. He also was superb on kickoff returns, compiling a team-record 823 yards and averaging 25.7 yards a return.

HAHNFELDT: TEAM'S ALL-TIME SCORER

Kicker **Bryant Hahnfeldt** (Sr., Nashville) has become the team's all-time leading scorer, earning national attention in the process.

Hahnfeldt added a pair of extra points at Georgia. For the second straight week, he did not attempt a field goal.

He added a pair of PATs in the win over Auburn, but missed his only two field goal attempts, from 40 and 49 yards. Hahnfeidt's 49-yarder was blocked.

Hahnfeldt provided the winning points at Ole Miss, scoring the team's last nine points by hitting field goals from 34, 31 and 40 yards in the 23-17 victory. He was one of three kickers across the nation to earn weekly recognition from the Lou Groza Award committee after the performance against Ole Miss.

Hahnfeldt has with 225 career points, 16 more than the total accumulated by John Markham (1997-2000). Both were standout kickers at Montgomery Bell Academy, a school located 1.5 miles west of Vanderbilt.

Hahnfeldt has shared the team's Specialist of the Week honors in four of five games. He is 7-of-9 in field goals, including three beyond 40 yards. He is also 20 of 20 on extra point attempts.

Hahnfeldt holds the team record for PATs made with 107. He needs eight field goals to surpass Markham's school record of 47.

HAMILTON HAS CAREER GAME AT OLE MISS; SWEEPS NATIONAL WEEKLY DEFENSIVE HONORS

Safety **Ryan Hamilton** (R-Jr., Wycombe, Pa.) swept national defensive player of the week honors following a remarkable performance in the Commodores' 23-17 win at Ole Miss on Sept. 20.

Quite simply, Hamilton enjoyed a career of highlights in a single game, significant enough to earn him the Football Writers Association of America Bronko Nagurski and Walter Camp Foundation National Defensive Player of the Week honors. He was also named the Southeastern Conference's top defensive player, and earned similar recognition from *USA Today*.

Hamilton's performance included tying a school record with three interceptions. Hamilton was responsible for totally changing momentum in the game in the first quarter, taking his first pick 79 yards for a Commodore touchdown. It was the fourth longest interception return in team history, and the first returned for a touchdown since **D.J. Moore** accomplished the feat against Eastern Michigan in 2007.

Hamilton's third interception came as time expired and sealed Vanderbilt's first victory in Oxford, Miss., since 1999.

Hamilton's three interceptions might not be his top highlight from the outstanding performance. Early in the third quarter, Hamilton made a huge defensive play, stopping a Rebel runner inside the Vanderbilt 1-yard line on 4th and goal. Four plays later, Hamilton recovered an Ole Miss fumble near midfield following a Vanderbilt punt.

Hamilton, who became the second Vanderbilt defender to win the FWAA's weekly award this season, added a fumble recovery and had six tackles (four unassisted), including a goal-line stop that prevented a Rebel score.

Hamilton will be added to the 2008 Bronko Nagurski Trophy Watch List. The Bronko Nagurski Trophy will be presented to the best defensive player in college football on Dec. 7 by the FWAA and the Charlotte Touchdown Club at the Westin Hotel in Charlotte.

JENNINGS WEARS KWANE DOSTER 'KD1' PATCH

This season, tailback **Jeff Jennings** (R-Sr.) became the second Vanderbilt player to wear the "KD1" jersey patch, one of the most significant recognitions awarded by the Commodore players.

The patch honors the memory of Kwane Doster, the only Commodore ever to receive the SEC Freshman of the Year Award. Doster was shot and killed in his hometown of Tampa, Fla., on Dec. 26, 2004. It was worn for the last two seasons by linebacker Jonathan Goff.

"It is a really big honor to wear the patch," Jennings said. "For the type of person Kwane (Doster) was, it is a real big honor to go out on the field and represent him.

"It means even more that I knew him and got to play with him. I really know what type of player and person he was, the type of work ethic he had and how much he wanted to win every game," Jennings added.

The team's Leadership Council votes on the player to wear the "KD1" patch. They recognized Jennings' leadership role and willingness to return from a serious knee injury suffered late in the 2005 season.

Jennings returned to action in the victory over Auburn after missing three games with an injury. He needs 67 yards to surpass 1,000 rushing years for his career.

MONAHAN OUT OF ACTION

Sophomore starting TE Austin Monahan became the second Commodore receiver likely out for the season when he suffered a shoulder fracture in Vanderbilt's 23-17 win at Ole Miss.

Two weeks earlier. **Chris Reinert** (R-Jr.) was lost for the season after suffering a broken left leg in the Commodores' victory over South Carolina.

Injured after catching a first-down pass at Ole Miss, Monahan was developing into a key contributor in his first year as a starter. He has four receptions for 45 vards.

The 'Dores also played without the services of senior receiver and co-captain **George Smith** for the first four games.

The Commodores will also be without freshman receiver John Cole for the rest of 2008. Cole suffered a knee injury at Miami and underwent surgery Sept. 10. He returned two punts for 23 yards against the RedHawks.

Junior DB **Darlron Spead** also is expected to miss extended playing time after sustaining a lower leg injury at the conclusion of an interception return against South Carolina.

Linebacker Brandon Bryant (R-Jr.) will not return this season after undergoing recent surgery to correct a leg fracture that occurred during the offseason.

COMMODORE NOTES * FORMER DORES IN THE NFL

STATISTICS DON'T ALWAYS TELL THE FULL STORY

Statistics don't always tell the full truth about a football team. The 2008 edition of the Commodores is a classic example.

Vanderbilt ranks at or near the bottom of the SEC in several key stat categories, including total defense (333.9 yards), total offense (249.4 yards), passing offense (96.1 yards) and rushing defense (143.3 yards).

Yet, the Commodores are 5-2 overall, 3-2 in SEC play, and outscoring their first six opponents by a 5.6-point margin.

On defense, the Commodores have been a bend-but-don't break unit. The unit also stiffens at the right time: opponents are scored just 10 touchdowns in 21 red-zone opportunities against the Commodores. The unit ranks second in the SEC behind Kentucky in the key red-zone statistic.

The defense also is one of the SEC's most aggressive. Vanderbilt tops the conference with 20 quarterback sacks, including four at Mississippi State and five against Auburn. The unit also has as many interceptions (13) than all but one team in the conference, and is a big reason why the Commodores rank second in the league behind Florida in turnover margin (+7).

While the Commodore offense is producing fewer passing yards, its also gaining yards on the ground (153.3 ypg, 6th in SEC) and has limited costly turnovers (10 total).

FIRST-TIME COMMODORE STARTERS

Eric Hensley (OG, R-Jr.) and **Kyle Fischer** (OT, R-Fr.) became the 15th and 16th Commodore this season to earn his first career start when they were in the opening lineup at Georgia Saturday.

There have been 10 first-time starters on offense and six on the Commodore defensive unit this season.

Besides Hensley and Fischer, other first-time starting assignments on offense are **Joey Bailey** (R-So., RG), **Brandon Barden** (R-Fr., TE), **Nick Forte** (OG, R-Jr.), **Reilly Lauer** (R-So., LT), **Bradley Vierling** (R-Jr., C), **Thomas Welch** (R.-Jr., RT), **Jared Hawkins** (TB, R-Jr.), **Jamie Graham** (R-Fr., WR) and **Austin Monahan** (So., TE). On defense, first-time starters are **Greg Billinger** (Jr., DT), **Adam Smotherman** (R-So., DT), **Broderick Stewart** (R-Jr., DE) and **T.J. Greenstone** (DT, R-Fr.), **John Stokes** (So., SLB), and **Chris Marve** (R-Fr., MLB).

COMMODORES SEEING INITIAL ACTION

Eighteen Commodores, including a trio of true freshmen, have enjoyed their initial collegiate action in the first five games of this season.

True freshmen seeing action in the opener were WR **John Cole**, CB **Casey Hayward** and safety **Sean Richardson**. Cole is out for the season with a leg injury suffered in the opener.

Four first-time players – Jamie Graham (WR), Brandon Barden (TE), Chris Marve (MLB) and T.J. Greenstone (DT) – have started this season for the Commodores.

Other Commodores getting into their first game are **Tim Fugger** (DE, R-Fr.), **Kyle Fischer** (OT, R-Fr.), **Udom Umoh** (WR, R-Fr.), **Brandon Barden** (TE, R-Fr.), **Rich Tompkins** (DB, Fr.), **Davis Flowers** (LB, R-Fr.), **Turner Wimberly** (WR, R-So.), **David Giller** (LS, So.), **Chris Aaron** (OC, R-So.), **Rob Ashabranner** (OC, R-Fr.) and **David Leinweber** (DE, R-Jr.).

COMMODORES WIN TWICE IN OXFORD THIS YEAR

In an oddity resulting from the 2008 schedule, the Commodores captured their second victory of the season in a town named Oxford when they defeated Ole Miss 23-17 two weeks ago in Mississippi.

In the season opener, Vanderbilt's paid a visit to Oxford, Ohio to face Miami University, leaving the scenic Ohio university community with a 34-13 victory over Miami.

More About the Commodores

SMITH - BEATING THE ODDS

WR **George Smith** continues to beat the odds. Vanderbilt's offensive co-captain and starting receiver was featured on ESPN.com this summer for his remarkable attitude and amazing recovery from a near-death experience in 2004.

In the last three years, the sixth-year senior from Pembroke Pines, Fla., has survived a serious ailment and gunshot attack to become a valuable starting receiver for the Black & Gold.

The fact that Smith is in uniform is remarkable. In April 2004, Smith was diagnosed with acute transverse myelitis, an illness that causing swelling of the spinal cord. For the next six weeks, Smith fought the illness in intensive care and eventually extensive rehabilitation. Smith returned to Vanderbilt the following semester, sat out the 2004 season, and finally received medical clearance during the 2005 preseason camp.

One of only three sixth-year players in the SEC this year, Smith has 81 career receptions, 1,045 career receiving yards and eight TDs.

After missing four games, Smith returned against Auburn, catching four passes for 48 yards.

Jamie Graham: Two-Sport Student-Athlete

When **Jamie Graham** (R-Fr., Nashville) made his first appearance in a Commodore uniform as a WR starter against Miami, he earned the distinction of being the only SEC student-athlete who played basketball in 2007-08 to participate in football this year.

Graham continues to develop as an offensive weapon. He caught two TD passes at Georgia after posting his first career TD against Rice with a 27-yard rush. For the season, Graham has eight rushes for 59 yards and 10 receptions for 76 yards. He also averages 6.0 yards on punt returns.

Graham redshirted on the football team in 2007, but became an intregal part of the Commodore men's basketball success last winter. After joining the hoops team after football ended, Graham became a fan favorite and defensive specialist in 15 appearances on the basketball court. He played important minutes down the stretch, helping the squad to a berth in the NCAA tournament.

Graham became the first Commodore to play both basketball and football since wide receiver Fred Baker did both in 1994-95.

SQUAD SERVED BY LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

Nine Commodores participate in the Leadership Council, serving as an entity that addresses team and student-athlete issues while acting as their teammates' voice in communicating with coaches.

Co-captains **Reshard Langford, George Smith** and **Bradley Vierling** are members of the Leadership Council.

Others voted by teammates to represent other various position groups include Mackenzi Adams, quarterbacks; Steven Stone, defensive line; Jeff Jennings, offensive backfield; Jake Bradford, receivers/tight ends; Bryant Hahnfeldt, specialists; and Patrick Benoist, linebackers.

KITCHINGS JUST THIRD CHANGE TO JOHNSON STAFF

First-year Commodore running backs mentor **Des Kitchings** represents just the third change to Coach Johnson's Vanderbilt staff in his tenure.

Kitchings, a former Furman offensive coach, replaces Kenny Carter, who joined the Florida staff.

Johnson arrived at Vanderbilt with the belief that consistency on the coaching staff would lead to greater stability in the program and better chances for team success. He has taken the principle to heart: under Johnson, Vanderbilt has experienced the fewest coaching changes in the SEC. Both coordinators — Bruce Fowler (defense) and Ted Cain (offense) — also have the conference's longest tentures.

The coaching staff has multiple links dating back three decades to Johnson's initial year in collegiate coaching when he served as a defensive ends assistant at Furman. Johnson is just the fourth head coach in Vanderbilt football history to reach seven years of service.

COMMODORES CONTINUE ANCHOR 'UNITY' TRADITION

For the fourth straight year, Vanderbilt is traveling with an authentic anchor as a symbol of team unity. Prior to each game, two players are selected to carry the anchor to and from the Vanderbilt locker room on gameday, either at Vanderbilt Stadium or to the opponent's home stadium.

Originally, the anchor was developed by the team's Leadership Council as a way of demonstrating team unity among the squad.

Coach Johnson is available briefly to reporters at the conclusion of practice.

Media photographers are permitted to shoot the first 30 minutes of practice.



INAUGURAL VANDERBILT ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME CLASS

On Sept. 12, 2008, Vanderbilt Student Athletics administrators, loyal supporters and longtime friends of the program welcomed the inaugural Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame. The distinguished 12-person class, introduced during halftime of the Rice-Vanderbilt game on Sept. 13, was determined by a panel of Student Athletics administrators with input from various outside sources. This winter, plans call for construction to begin on Phase II of the Vanderbilt Athletic Facility Project, work that includes more enhancements to Vanderbilt Stadium and a Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame addition to McGuqin Athletic Center.

Chantelle Anderson

Women's Basketball, 1999-2003

Chantelle Anderson is the most decorated women's basketball player in Vanderbilt history. The 6-6 Vancouver, Wash., native is the Commodores' only two-time Kodak All-American, the all-time leading scorer and was voted the school's Female Athlete of the Year three times. Anderson was a dominant inside force for the Commodores, concluding her career as the program's all-time leader scorer with 2,604 points.

Peggy Harmon Brady

Women's Golf, 1968-1972

She came to Vanderbilt after graduating from Central H.S. in Shelbyville, in an era when there was no varsity athletics for women. Out of the blue her sophomore year, Director of Athletics Jess Neely called to invite Harmon to represent Vanderbilt in the Intercollegiate. Perhaps Neely noticed she had won the USGA Junior Championship. While her pioneer story is inspiring, little did she realize that she was blazing a trail that her daughter, Chris, would follow decades later. They are the only mother-daughter All-Americans in school history.

John Hall

Football, 1951-1954

John Hall describes himself as an overachiever on and off the football field. The native of Knoxville was an under-sized defensive lineman who became Vanderbilt's first academic All-America in 1954, then enjoyed an enormously successful career that culminated as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Ashland, Inc., and president of the Vanderbilt Board of Trust.

Ryan Tolbert Jackson

Women's Track and Field, 1994-1998

A life-size photo of Ryan Tolbert Jackson dominates an entire wall of McGugin Center in recognition of her outstanding achievement as a track and field student-athlete. She is the only Commodore to ever win an individual NCAA championship., capturing the 400-meter hurdles with a meet-record 54.54 effort in 1997. She is a seven-time All-America recipient.

Roy Kramer

Director of Athletics, 1978-1990

A national champion football coach at Central Michigan, Roy Kramer arrived in Nashville in 1978. In a dozen years he energized Vanderbilt's athletic department with new facilities and popular coaches. By the time Kramer retired as SEC Conference Commissioner, many regarded him as the most powerful man in college athletics.

Clyde Lee

Basketball, 1963-1966

A tall and unpolished freshman from nearby Lipscomb High School enrolled in 1963 to play basketball for Coach Roy Skinner and Vanderbilt basketball was never the same again. Attendance boomed as fans flocked to watch "Colossal" Clyde Lee lead his team to 65 victories over three unforget-table seasons and establish himself as the standard by which all future Commodore stars would be measured. Old-timers call Memorial Gym's second and third tiers "the balconies that Clyde built."

Dan McGugin

Head Football Coach, 1904-1934

The winningest football coach in Vanderbilt history and one of college football's greatest innovators, Dan McGugin remains a legend more than seven decades after his death. When he finished his third decade as head coach of the Commodores, McGugin left behind a remarkable overall record of 197-55-10.

John Rich

Football-Baseball, 1945-1951

John Rich remembers being on the verge of expulsion from Vanderbilt University in the late 1940's and being given an unexpected second chance by the Dean of Students. He never forgot that golden opportunity and through the years as his coal business grew, he says he has tried to repay his beloved University with his time, by sharing his resources and lending his expertise. Rich also served the university for many years as a valuable member of the Vanderbilt Board of Trust.

Fred Russell

Baseball, 1925-1926; Nashville Banner Sports Editor, 1929-1998

Fred Russell was one of the great sports journalists of the 20th Century. Many admiring readers knew that. Fewer realized that he had played baseball at Vanderbilt. Mr. Russell covered and rubbed elbows with the legendary athletes of his day: his 25th anniversary at the paper was celebrated with appearances by Jack Dempsey, Bobby Jones and Red Grange. The press boxes of Vanderbilt Stadium (1982) and Hawkins Field (2002) are named in his honor.

June Stewart

Athletics Administration, 1973-1991

June Stewart joined the Vanderbilt athletic department in 1973 as a secretary in the sports information and National Commodore Club offices. By the time she retired 28 years later she was one of the most influential women in the Southeastern Conference. She also became the first female president of the College Sports Information Director of America (CoSIDA) organization.

Bill Wade

Football, 1949-1951

Bill Wade was Nashville's All-American boy. He was a prep legend, president of his Vanderbilt freshman class, a whiz on the gridiron where he became the No. 1 pick in the NFL Draft, a *Look Magazine* coverboy while a Commodore, and later quarterback of the world champion Chicago Bears. He was honored many times by many organizations, including the NCAA with its prestigious Silver Anniversary Award in 1976. Five decades after blazing a legacy on campus, Wade remains one of the school's most treasured student-athletes.

Perry Wallace

Men's Basketball, 1966-1970

Perry Wallace would have become a premiere Hall of Fame candidate even if he didn't make Southeastern Conference history by becoming the SEC's first African-American basketball player. Wallace was a star student-athlete, and left Vanderbilt as one of the greatest rebounders in team history. who went on to an outstanding career in law and education.
