STADIUM IMPROVEMENTS * SEEKING SEVENTH WIN

VANDERBILT STADIUM GETS FRESH LOOK; PHASE I CONSTRUCTION WORK COMPLETE

Enthusiastic Commodore fans attending home games this season are seeing the first substantial improvements to Dudley Field and Vanderbilt Stadium in more than a decade.

Constructions crews completed Phase 1 work on Vanderbilt Stadium in late August. The result is a clean, refurbished look for the stadium, built in 1981.

The completed construction is the first of five phases outlined in a \$60 million athletic facility enhancement plan. The project was announced last winter by Vanderbilt Vice Chancellor of University Affairs and Student Athletics David Williams II.

Among the football stadium improvements completed in the Phase I work are:

- New brick exterior renovation to south end of stadium facing McGugin Athletic Center and Jess Neely Drive. The work extends the brick facade included at the adjacent Hawkins Baseball Field.
- Painting of stadium exterior.
- Addition of new Vanderbilt Bookstore and Commodore Grille outlets on concourse.
- New eastside concourse artwork featuring Vanderbilt Athletics "It's Good To Be Gold" theme.
 The artwork includes action images of several recent Vanderbilt standouts, such as football players Jay Cutler, Earl Bennett and Chris Williams, golfer Brandt Snedeker, hoopsters Shan Foster and Chantelle Anderson, and baseball players Pedro Alvarez and David Price.
- New exterior signage and installation of large
 "Star V" logos on the press box structure.

Bobby Johnson's football team also benefited from the addition of FieldTurf artificial surface at its practice facility this summer.

Phase I construction also is aimed at enhancing both Memorial Gym and Hawkins Field. New men's and women's player locker rooms, and post-game press conference facilities are under construction at Memorial Gym, along with the installment of a new wooden gym floor. At Hawkins Field, work is under way to expand capacity with the addition of seating areas in left field and right field.

The facility project is expected to continue for several years. Phase II, expected to get under way after the 2008 football season, calls for total renovation of both stadium gates facing Jess Neely Drive, and the continuation of the brick exterior facade down Natchez Trace. Work on the long-anticipated Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame also is expected to start after the season.

The project also calls for future construction of new football player locker and meeting rooms, and expanded training and academic support facilities.

COMMODORES SEEKING SEVENTH WIN

When Vanderbilt faces cross-state rival Tennessee Saturday, the Commodores will be attempting to reach seven wins in a season for just the fourth time in the last 50 years.

The Commodores, coming off a 31-24 win at Kentucky, last captured seven regular season wins in 1982, going 8-3 en route to the Hall of Fame Bowl in Birmingham, Ala. Other seven-win Commodore regular seasons in the last half century came in 1975 (7-4) and 1974 (7-3-1).

The eight-win regular season in 1982 is a program standard since the 1940s. Prior to World War II, the Commodores were one of the nation's winningest programs, enjoying 22 seasons of at least seven wins.

'Dores Looking for Rare Fifth SEC Win

The Commodores will be looking to capture a fifth win in Southeastern Conference for just the second time in program history.

With earlier wins over South Carolina, Ole Miss, Auburn and Kentucky, the Commodores face Tennessee with a fifth SEC victory at stake. The only previous five-win season in conference play for the Commodores came in 1935 – the third year of existence for the conference.

The Commodores' last four-win SEC season came in 1982. Vanderbilt is a charter member of the SEC, founded in 1933 by several members of the former Southern Conference.

It's been a difficult task for Vanderbilt to reach the four-win plateau in SEC play. This is just the Commodores' seventh season of at least four SEC victories. Previous seasons of at least four SEC wins were 1982 (4-2), 1955 (4-3), 1949 (4-4), 1948 (4-2-1), 1938 (4-3), 1937 (4-2) and 1935 (5-1).

JOHNSON MOVES TO 5TH ALL-TIME IN WINS

Bobby Johnson moved into sole position of fifth place for wins as a Vanderbilt head coach with the 31-24 victory at Kentucky.

Johnson, in his seventh year at the helm of Commodore football, notched his 26th victory at Kentucky, passing former mentor George MacIntyre for sole position of fifth place in the historical category.

Dan McGugin, recognized as the father of Vanderbilt football and a legendary figure in the early 1900s, holds the Commodore record for wins by a head coach with 197. He continues to rank among the nation's all-time Top 25 winningest coaches.

Three of the four coaches ahead of Johnson – McGugin, Sanders and Ray Morrison – are members of the College Football Hall of Fame.

KNOXVILLE - Daniel Lincoln kicked a 33-yard field goal with 2:46 left to cap a 16-point fourth-quarter comeback and No. 19 Tennessee beat Vanderbilt 25-24 on Saturday.

The field goal redeemed Lincoln, who had missed an extra point and a 41-yard field goal attempt earlier.

The Vols were down 24-9 in the third quarter after Mackenzi Adams threw a 2-yard touchdown pass to George Smith.

After Tennessee scored 16 consecutive

points in the fourth quarter to take a one-point lead, Vanderbilt attempted their own comeback led by a 55-yard kickoff return by D.J. Moore, but a 49-yard field goal attempt by Bryant Hahnfeldt with :33 left sailed wide left.

Adams, whose three touchdown passes were a career high, finished 14-for-26 for 139 yards, and Cassen Jackson-Garrison ran 17 times for 86 yards.

Vanderbilt-Tennessee Series Notes

SERIES NOTES Vanderbilt snapped a 22-game losing streak versus Tennessee three years ago, earning a come-from-behind 28-24 victory in Knoxville. The Commodore win also ended a 14-game Vanderbilt losing streak in Nevland Stadium that dated to a 17-14 victory in 1975. Last year. the Vols rallied to win by scoring 16 fourth quarter points.

The Commodores have played Tennessee more than any other team. It is the fourth most frequently played rivalry in SEC history. The series is in dispute - Vanderbilt recognizes a 1918 win; Tennessee does not.

Vanderbilt controlled the early years between the universities, holding a 19-2-3 overall record through 1927.

BENOIST, STOKES NAMED DISTRICT IV ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

Commodore starting linebackers **Patrick Benoist** and **John Stokes** have been named to the Academic All-District IV Team as selected by the College Sports Information Directors and sponsored by *ESPN The Magazine*.

Benoist (Jr., Southlake, Texas) and Stokes (So., Memphis, Tenn.) will advance to the national ballot for the Academic All-America team, which will be announced in December. To be nominated for the Academic All-America process, a student-athlete must have a cumulative grade-point average of at least 3.30, be a sophomore or higher in academic and athletic standing, and be a starter or key reserve.

The Academic All-District IV team is comprised of players from the states of Michigan, Ohio, Kentucky, Tennessee and Alabama.

Benoist has a 3.38 GPA with a major in Economics. He has been one of the SEC's leading tacklers all season, currently ranking second in the conference with 78 total tackles. He also shares the Commodore team lead with 41 solo tackles, and has 5.5 tackles for loss, a pair sacks and three defensed passes.

Stokes has a 3.73 GPA and is undeclared, though he plans to pursue postgraduate studies in medicine. Stokes has six starts at OLB and has 19 total tackles. He also serves as the snapper on special teams.

Two 'Dore Wins vs. Ranked Teams

Vanderbilt's early-season victories over ranked opponents Auburn and South Carolina marks the first time in team history that the 'Dores have defeated two ranked squads in the same regular season.

The Commodores defeated No. 13 Auburn (14-13, Oct. 4) and No. 24 South Carolina (24-17, Sept. 4) in Vanderbilt Stadium.

Vanderbilt is 2-2 this year vs. ranked teams. The losses came at No. 13 Georgia (14-24, Oct. 18) and vs. Florida (14-42, Nov. 8).

On Oct. 4, the Commodores defeated No. 13 Auburn 14-13 in front of an ESPN national audience and capacity crowd. On Sept. 4, the 'Dores claimed a win over No. 24 South Carolina.

Only once previously (1955) has Vanderbilt topped two ranked teams. That season, Vanderbilt beat No. 17 Kentucky 34-0 in the regular season, then dropped No. 8 Auburn in the Gator Bowl 25-13.

Since 2006, the Commodores are 4-7 against ranked opponents. Before 2006, Vanderbilt lost 51 straight games to ranked foes.

The win over South Carolina marked the first time in team history that Vanderbilt has defeated Top 25 teams in three straight seasons.

It was the second sellout crowd of the season for the Commodores: the first came in a 14-13 Vanderbilt victory over Auburn on Oct. 4. The team's last home game, vs. Tennessee on Nov. 22, also is sold out.

Through five games, the 'Dores are averaging crowds of 38,407.

Defensive Unit Among Sack Leaders

COMMODORE SUCCESS UNDER THE LIGHTS

The Commodores are 6-1 in night games this year, including victories over SEC opponents South Carolina, Ole Miss, Auburn and Kentucky.

Vanderbilt is yet to win during the day, going 0-3 against Mississippi State, Georgia and Duke in consecutive weeks.

Since the 2005 opener, the Commodores are 14-5 while playing under the lights, including a 10-4 record in Vanderbilt Stadium. The team also has earned 10 victories in its last 12 night games.

COMMODORES SHOWING RED ZONE EFFICIENCY ON BOTH SIDES OF SCRIMMAGE

One of the keys to Vanderbilt's 6-4 record has been the Commodores' success in red zone situations on both sides of the line of scrimmage.

The 'Dores are among the national leaders in red zone categories on both sides of the ball.

The offense ranks third in the SEC converting red zone chances into points. Through 10 games, the team has converted 90% of its opportunities (27/30). RED ZONE SUCCESS RATE'Dore Unit'Success%SEC/NCAAOffense90%3/T-15Defense67%2/T-5

On defense, Vanderblt ranks second in the league, limiting opponents to points at a 67% clip (22 of 33 drives).

The success also extends to producing – and limiting – touchdowns in the red zone. The offense has notched 22 touchdowns in its 30 tries. Opponents have scored TDs on just 16 of 30 red zone possessions (six rushing/eight passing).

LANGFORD — SEC COMMUNITY SERVICE TEAM

Safety **Reshard Langford** (R-Sr., Tanner, Ala.) will be featured this week as the SEC Community Service Team Player of the Week on this weekend's Raycom Sports telecast of the Tennessee-Vanderbilt contest.

Langford, the Commodores' active career leader in tackles, has spent the last three summers working with young kids at the Martha O'Bryan Center, a Christian outreach ministry, serving as a mentor to inner-city youngsters in east Nashville. He has also spent time speaking to local elementary schools. Langford has also been actively involved in campus FCA activities.

He is expected to graduate in December with a degree in sociology from the College of Arts and Science.

Langford has been a standout on the field for the last four years. He tops all SEC secondary players with 45 consecutive career starts entering the Tennessee game.

Student-Athletes earn SEC Community Service Team recognition for their community service and campus activities.

COMEBACK COMMODORES: FIVE OF SIX WINS COME AFTER FACING DEFICITS

It took three months and 10 opponents, but the Commodores finally defeated a team without having to overcome a deficit.

After trailing nine straight opponents, Vanderbilt took an early 14-0 edge at Kentucky and never trailed en route to a 31-24 win. Bobby Johnson's squad has faced deficits in its first nine games, yet managed register five victories.

In each of Vanderbilt's first five wins, the Commodores put together a string of unanswered points to prevail. In four of the five eventual wins, Vanderbilt trailed by at least a touchdown.

 Against Auburn, the Commodores fell behind 13-0 early in the first quarter after the Tigers drove 49 yards for an early touchdown and turned Vanderbilt's only turnover of the game into a second touchdown.

After the second Auburn score, the Commodore offense came together behind reserve QB Mackenzi Adams and the defense stiffened. While Adams directed two scoring drives and accounted for more than 200 yards of total offense, the defense limited Auburn to less than 100 yards of total offense during the last three quarters.

- At Ole Miss, the Commodores twice trailed by 10 points, 10-0 and 17-7 in the first quarter before coming back to record a 23-17 victory. The Vanderbilt offense provided three possessions that resulted in Bryant Hahnfeldt field goals after the first quarter, the defense held Ole Miss without points for the final three quarters.
- On three occasions during the first half, the Rice Owls took a seven-point lead on the Commodores before Vanderbilt reeled off 24 straight points to secure a 38-21 decision.
- In its SEC opener, Vanderbilt trailed South Carolina 10-3 at halftime, then scored 21 unanswered points to take a 24-10 margin en route to an eventual 24-17 win.
- In the opener at Miami, the Commodores trailed 3-0 early before putting together a 17-0 stretch to take the lead for good.

D.J. MOORE: MR. VERSATILITY

D.J. Moore (Jr., CB/KR) continues to affirm his status as one of the nation's most versatile and productive players.

Moore put together one of the finest individual performances in recent Commodore history Saturday at Kentucky, contributing in virtually every phase of the game.

As a defensive back, he won Walter Camp Foundation National Player of the Week honors after posting a pair of key interceptions in Vanderbilt's important win. Moore's last pick sealed the Commodore win with 2:07 left.

In the first quarter, Moore was just as instrumental on offense, catching touchdown passes of 25 and 18 yards. The receptions was the first two of Moore's collegiate career.

He also contributed as a kickoff and punt returner.

Moore (Broome H.S., Spartanburg, S.C.) is the SEC's only athlete this year to see action at five positions (CB, WR, QB, PR and KR) and serve as a four-way contributor (Def./Off./PR/KR).

Earlier this season, Moore singlehandedly shifted the momentum in games against Rice and Miami (Ohio) that eventually became Commodore victories. For most of the Vanderbilt win at Ole Miss, the Rebel offense decided to test other cornerbacks besides Moore. Against Auburn, Moore's versatility helped the Commodore defeat the Tigers for the first time in more than five decades.

Moore's activity on offense against Georgia was the most of his Commodore career. He was used as a rushing threat on rocket sweeps and as a receiving target, though he did not register a catch.

While Commodore fans thought Moore was special in the season opener, he might have been more remarkable in the win over Rice. He accumulated 206 all-purpose yards on just seven touches against the Owls. It ranks as Moore's career high for all-purpose yardage.

Moore is the SEC's No. 3 punt returner with a 16.4-yard average. Against Miami, Moore contributed a 91-yard punt return – second longest in Vanderbilt history.

Moore focused on defense against South Carolina, contributing four tackles, including a 2-yard loss, and deflecting a pass that resulted in Reshard Langford's ninth career interception. In 2007, Moore was remarkable against the Gamecocks, earning National Defensive Player of the Week honors with two interceptions in a 'Dore 17-6 win.

MOORE NAMED THORPE AWARD SEMIFINALIST NOV. 4

Moore was named as a semifinalist for the 2008 Jim Thorpe Award on Nov. 4. He is one of 13 semifinalists for the nation's top DB award.

Other semifinalists besides Moore include Asher Allen, Jr., Georgia; Eric Berry, So., Tennessee; Emanuel Cook, Jr., So. Carolina; Vontae Davis, Jr., Illinois; Trimane Goddard, Sr., North Carolina; Malcolm Jenkins, Sr., Ohio State; Trevard Lindley, Jr., Kentucky; Taylor Mays, Jr., USC; Mike Mickens, Sr., Cincinnati; William Moore, Sr., Missouri; Alphonso Smith, Sr., Wake Forest; and Otis Wiley, Sr., Michigan State.

Moore has enjoyed an excellent junior campaign, contributing six interceptions, 43 total tackles and six defensed passes.

A three-year starter in the Commodore secondary, Moore has shown the versatility to play CB, WR and QB - and as serve the team's top returner.



NICKSON DIRECTS EFFECTIVE OFFENSE

The return of **Chris Nickson** (R-Sr., QB) to the starting lineup at Kentucky was a huge success.

After missing two of the Commodores' last three games, Nickson quided the Commodores to a 31-24 victory in Lexington.

Nickson, a product of Pike County H.S. in Brundidge, Ala., produced season highs in total offense (273 yards), pass completions (15), passing yards (155) and touchdown passes (3) while confidently directing the Commodore offense.

Just as importantly, Nickson protected the football. The Commodore offense did not register a turnover in the cold, damp conditions.

Nickson finished the night completing 15 of 27 passes for 155 yards passing and three touchdowns, all season highs. He also added 118 rushing yards rushing on 20 carries, the Commodores' second highest rushing total of the season this year behind Nickson's 166-yard output in the season opener at Miami (Ohio).

Commonwealth Stadium in Kentucky will always hold good memories for Nickson. In his only previous action in Lexington, Nickson produced one of the greatest individual offensive efforts in Vanderbilt history, throwing for 446 yards and accumulating 517 yards of total offense in a 38-26 loss.

Nickson ranks second all-time among Vanderbilt QBs with 1,390 rushing yards. He is 78 yards behind team record holder Damian Allen (1,458 yards, 1994-97).

Nickson also is currently ninth all-time among Commodore quarterbacks in passing yardage (3,394), but appears within reach of three others: Bill Wade (8th, 3,397), John Gromos (7th, 3,514) and Damian Allen (3,704).

Nickson also has accounted for 46 touchdowns – 29 passing and 16 rushing – during his Commodore career.

HAWKINS SOLID IN RUN GAME AT KENTUCKY

One year after suffering a serious injury against Kentucky, **Jared Hawkins** (R-Jr., TB) came through with arguably his finest career outing in the Commodores' 31-24 road win over the Wildcats.

Hawkins produced 133 yards of total offense – 84 rushing and 49 receiving – to help the Commodore offense to its best production this year against an SEC opponent. He also produced the winning margin on a 4-yard rush early in the fourth quarter.

The 84 rushing yards ties for the second most ever by Hawkins, behind only a 107-yard output earlier this year against Rice.

Hawkins also enjoyed an excellent effort as a receiving target out of the backfield, setting career highs in receptions (4) and receiving yards (49). His first catch from Chris Nickson went 39 yards, another career high.

Hawkins has 571 rushing yards this season, tops on the team. He can join the team's all-time Top Ten junior rushing charts with 39 more yards. He also ranks third on the team with 16 receptions.

Hawkins is the active career leader among Commodore running backs with 1,136 rushing yards. He ranks seventh in the SEC this season with a 57.1-yard average.

Notes from Win at Kentucky

- The 31-point output was the most points scored by Vanderbilt on the road against an SEC opponent since the Commodores produced 42 points in a double-overtime loss at Florida on Nov. 5, 2005.
- The Commodore defense held Kentucky without a first down until the third quarter. The Wildcats went into intermission with just 40 total yards. Kentucky's lone first down in the opening half came on a fake punt.
- Vanderbilt owned an impressive 39:18-20:42 advantage in time of possession, running 20 more plays (70-50) than Kentucky. The time of possession comparison was even more slanted toward Vanderbilt at halftime (24:50-5:10).
- The Commodore offense produced a season high of 368 total yards, including 213 rushing yards. The rushing total was the most against an SEC opponent since the Commodores' 239-yard total vs. Kentucky last year.
- In a year where the Commodore offense is finding production from many directions, the leading rusher against Kentucky was a quarterback (**Chris Nickson**, 118 yards) and the top receiver was a running back (**Jared Hawkins**, 49 yards).
- TE **Brandon Barden** continues to show development in his first varsity season. A redshirt freshman, Barden had four receptions for 20 yards, including a one-handed grab and dive into the end zone for his third career touchdown reception.

Barden ranks second on the team with 22 receptions. The Commodore leader is WR **Sean Walker** (27 catches).

- Despite an earlier block, PK **Bryant Hahnfeldt** posted his first field goal conversion in nearly two months. The conversion from 39 yards snapped an 0-5 streak for the team's all-time leading scorer.
- While D.J. Moore stole the spotlight with two interceptions, CB
 Myron Lewis and LBs Chris Marve and Patrick Benoist continued to play effectively for the Commodore defense.

Lewis topped the Commodores with seven total tackles, frequently stopping scrambling UK QB Randall Cobb for short gains. Marve and Benoist, both among the SEC's Top Ten tacklers, each contributed five stops to the Commodore cause.

• Brett Upson's punting statistics didn't dazzle, but his ability to function under fire sure came through.

Three personal fouls against Kentucky for roughing Upson were called during the game. Minutes after the third penalty was negated due to a Vanderbilt infraction, Upson came through with his best effort of the game – a 50-yarder. Upson averaged 42.0 yards per punt.

- The Vanderbilt defense held Kentucky to just one third down conversion in 10 attempts. The Vanderbilt offense was 7 of 15 on third downs.
- Vanderbilt's lone fourth down attempt, 4th & 4 from the UK 25-yard line, resulted in the Commodores' first touchdown a Nickson-to-Moore connection.
- The Vanderbilt defense held Kentucky to 241 total yards. It was the fourth time this season that a Commodore opponent was limited to 250 total yards or less.

CONTENDING ON THE ROAD

Vanderbilt's 31-24 victory over Kentucky continues a vast improvement for the Commodores in road results.

Vanderbilt is now 9-11 overall in road games since the 2005 season, when the Jay Cutler-directed Commodores opened with road victories at Wake Forest and Arkansas.

This year, the Commodores are 3-2 on the road, with wins coming at Miami (Ohio), Ole Miss and Kentucky. The team's two road losses came by narrow margins – three points at Mississippi State and 10 points at ranked Georgia.

Under Bobby Johnson's direction, the Commodores have posted some impressive road accomplishments:

- Winning for the first time at Arkansas (28-24, 2005);
- Winning in Knoxville for the first time since 1975 (28-24, 2005);
- Defeating nationally ranked opponents Georgia (24-22, 2006) and South Carolina (17-6, 2007).

Johnson's Commodores have now captured wins on five of the six campuses of SEC Eastern Division rivals. The only SEC East campus where Johnson's squad hasn't won is Florida.

RETURNING TO WINNING FORMULA

After suffering four straight losses, the Commodores returned to their winning formula at Kentucky: posting a positive turnover margin to compliment a solid defense and opportunistic offense.

The Commodores used the formula to open the season with five consecutive wins. The formula was missing in at recent four-game losing streak.

Turnover margin demonstrates the Commodores' tale of two seasons. Vanderbilt topped the nation in turnover margin in going 5-0. In the four losses, the 'Dores committed three more turnovers than they have forced.

In the victory at Kentucky, the Commodores owned an advantage in turnovers, posting two interceptions while allowing a lone fumble. The Commodores turned their first interception into seven points, then sealed the victory with the second interception.

The Commodores continue to rank high nationally in the key statistic. Vanderbilt's +7 turnover margin ranks second in the SEC behind NCAA leader Florida and 15th nationally.

'Dores Limiting Penalties

The Commodores continue to rank among the least penalized teams in the nation.

Vanderbilt is second in the SEC – and among the NCAA's Top 20 – in fewest penalties and penalty yardage. The Commodores have averaging 4.5 infractions and 40.2 penalty yards per game, slighting trailing SEC leader Alabama in both categories.

The 'Dores were called for four flags totalling 41 yards at Kentucky, one week after having single highs in both categories vs. Florida.

Vanderbilt is ranked 13th in total penalties and 18th in penalty yardage in the latest NCAA statistics.



HAHNFELDT: TEAM'S ALL-TIME SCORER

Kicker **Bryant Hahnfeldt** (Sr., Nashville) has become the team's all-time leading scorer.

Despite the achievements, Hahnfeldt has struggled in recent weeks, missing his last four field goal attempts.

He added a pair of PATs in the win over Auburn, but missed his only two field goal attempts, from 40 and 49 yards. Hahnfeidt's 49-yarder was blocked.

Hahnfeldt provided the winning points at Ole Miss, scoring the team's last nine points by hitting field goals from 34, 31 and 40 yards in the 23-17 victory. He was one of three kickers across the nation to earn weekly recognition from the Lou Groza Award committee after the performance against Ole Miss.

Hahnfeldt has with 237 career points, 28 more than the total accumulated by John Markham (1997-2000). Both were standout kickers at Montgomery Bell Academy, a school located 1.5 miles west of Vanderbilt.

Hahnfeldt has shared the team's Specialist of the Week honors in four of five games. He is 8-of-13 in field goals, including three beyond 40 yards. He is also 27 of 27 on extra point attempts.

Hahnfeldt holds the team record for PATs made with 114. He needs six field goals to ties Markham's school record of 47.

SECOND HALF SUCCESS KEY TO 6-4 RECORD

The 'Dores' 6-4 record has been keyed by scoring success after intermission. Vanderbilt has outscored its opponents 100-61 in the second half, including a 55-24 margin in the fourth quarter.

The Commodore defense has held three opponents – Rice, Ole Miss and Auburn – scoreless after intermission. Florida registered a lone third quarter touchdown against the Commodores.

The Vanderbilt defense didn't allow a third quarter touchdown until the Mississippi State game. Prior to playing in Starkville, the only third-quarter points allowed this season was a field goal by Miami (Ohio) in the opener.

Vanderbilt Stopping Losing Streaks to Rivals

HAMILTON HAS CAREER GAME AT OLE MISS; SWEEPS NATIONAL WEEKLY DEFENSIVE HONORS

Safety **Ryan Hamilton** (R-Jr., Wycombe, Pa.) swept national defensive player of the week honors following a remarkable performance in the 'Dores' 23-17 win at Ole Miss on Sept. 20.

Quite simply, Hamilton enjoyed a career of highlights in a single game, significant enough to earn him the Football Writers Association of America Bronko Nagurski and Walter Camp Foundation National Defensive Player of the Week honors. He was also named the Southeastern Conference's top defensive player, and earned similar recognition from *USA Today*.

Hamilton's performance included tying a school record with three interceptions. Hamilton was responsible for totally changing momentum in the game in the first quarter, taking his first pick 79 yards for a Commodore touchdown. It was the fourth longest interception return in team history, and the first returned for a touchdown since **D.J. Moore** accomplished the feat against Eastern Michigan in 2007.

Hamilton's third interception came as time expired and sealed Vanderbilt's first victory in Oxford, Miss., since 1999.

Hamilton also had 13 total tackles and a recovered fumble last Saturday against Florida.

Hamilton's three interceptions might not be his top highlight from the outstanding performance. Early in the third quarter, Hamilton made a huge defensive play, stopping a Rebel runner inside the Vanderbilt 1-yard line on 4th and goal. Four plays later, Hamilton recovered an Ole Miss fumble near midfield following a Vanderbilt punt.

Hamilton, who became the second Vanderbilt defender to win the FWAA's weekly award this season, added a fumble recovery and had six tackles (four unassisted), including a goal-line stop that prevented a Rebel score.

Hamilton will be added to the 2008 Bronko Nagurski Trophy Watch List. The Bronko Nagurski Trophy will be presented to the best defensive player in college football on Dec. 7.

2008 SEASON TICKETS SOLD OUT

Vanderbilt football season ticket sales were at their highest levels in more than a decade, according to Commodore athletic officials.

Season ticket sales surpassed the 19,000-mark this season as officials announced Vanderbilt home sellouts against Auburn, Florida and Tennessee.

The total of 19,175 represents the most sold by Vanderbilt Athletics since 1996 when the home schedule included Notre Dame and Tennessee.

'08 OFFENSIVE LINE: 7 FIRST-TIME STARTERS

Vanderbilt has started eight different players along the offensive front this season – and seven have started for the first time ever.

The trend continued at Georgia when **Eric Hensley** (R-Jr., OG) and **Kyle Fischer** (R-Fr., OT) earned starting assignments.

The 'Dores entered the season with just one O-lineman (OG **Ryan Custer**) with any starting experience. He had three previous starts.

A Youthful Commodore Starting Squad

One year after losing six players to NFL rosters, Vanderbilt Head Coach **Bobby Johnson** is playing a squad dominated by youth this season.

In Vanderbilt's loss vs. Florida on Nov. 8, the Commodore 22-player starting starting lineup included three seniors, 15 juniors, a sophomore and three redshirt freshmen.

VANDERBILT • TOAST OF TOSTITOS OCT. 4

Vanderbilt was selected as the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) on Oct. 4 after their 14-13 win over No. 13 Auburn.

It marked the second straight year that the organization has picked the Commodores as its top team of the week. In 2007, Vanderbilt was recognized after topping No. 6 South Carolina 17-6 in Columbia.

FORMER 'DORE DEMMAS TO BE HONORED

Former Commodore co-captain **Art Demmas** (Class if 1956) has been selected as one of four individuals nationwide for the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame's prestigious Chapter Leadership Awards next month in New York.

A 1956 co-captain, Demmas was a starting tackle for the 'Dores' 1955 Gator Bowl squad. After his college career, Demmas became a high school football official and eventually advanced to the NFL where he worked 28 seasons, including four Super Bowls.

JENNINGS WEARS KWANE DOSTER 'KD1' PATCH

This season, tailback **Jeff Jennings** (R-Sr.) became the second Vanderbilt player to wear the "KD1" jersey patch, one of the most significant recognitions awarded by the Commodore players.

The patch honors the memory of Kwane Doster, the only Commodore ever to receive the SEC Freshman of the Year Award. Doster was shot and killed in his hometown of Tampa, Fla., on Dec. 26, 2004. It was worn for the last two seasons by linebacker Jonathan Goff.

"It is a really big honor to wear the patch," Jennings said. "For the type of person Kwane (Doster) was, it is a real big honor to go out on the field and represent him.

"It means even more that I knew him and got to play with him. I really know what type of player and person he was, the type of work ethic he had and how much he wanted to win every game," Jennings added.

The team's Leadership Council votes on the player to wear the "KD1" patch. They recognized Jennings' leadership role and willingness to return from a serious knee injury suffered late in the 2005 season.

Jennings returned to action in the victory over Auburn after missing three games with an injury. He needs 12 yards to surpass 1,000 rushing years for his career.

Austin Monahan (So., TE) was just developing into a reliable starter when he was suffered a season-ending shoulder fracture in Vanderbilt's 23-17 win at Ole Miss. Injured after catching a first-down pass at Ole Miss. Monahan was developing into a key contributor in his first year as a starter. He has four receptions for 45 yards.

Earlier this year, a fifth receiver, Chris Reinert (R-Jr.), was lost for the season to a broken left leg in the Commodores' victory over South Carolina.

On the defense, Brandon Bryant (R-Jr., LB) will not return this season after undergoing recent surgery to correct a leg fracture that occurred during the offseason.

Senior safety **Reshard Langford** also has a pair of interceptions.

Junior nickelback **DarIron Spead** also returned against Florida after missing six games with a lower leg injury. Spead was hurt returning an interception against South Carolina.

Consistency on Defense

While the Commodore offense has struggled with presistent injuries, the Vanderbilt defense have not faced personnel depletions.

The defensive starting lineup against Kentucky matched the season opener at Miami (Ohio).

More About the Commodores

SMITH - BEATING THE ODDS

WR **George Smith** continues to beat the odds. Vanderbilt's offensive co-captain and starting receiver was featured on ESPN.com this summer for his remarkable attitude and amazing recovery from a near-death experience in 2004.

In the last three years, the sixth-year senior from Pembroke Pines, Fla., has survived a serious ailment and gunshot attack to become a valuable starting receiver for the Black & Gold.

The fact that Smith is in uniform is remarkable. In April 2004, Smith was diagnosed with acute transverse myelitis, an illness that causing swelling of the spinal cord. For the next six weeks, Smith fought the illness in intensive care and eventually extensive rehabilitation. Smith returned to Vanderbilt the following semester, sat out the 2004 season, and finally received medical clearance during the 2005 preseason camp.

One of only three sixth-year players in the SEC this year, Smith has 82 career receptions, 1,064 career receiving yards and eight TDs.

After missing four games, Smith returned against Auburn, catching four passes for 48 yards.

Jamie Graham: Two-Sport Student-Athlete

When **Jamie Graham** (R-Fr., Nashville) made his first appearance in a Commodore uniform as a WR starter against Miami, he earned the distinction of being the only SEC student-athlete who played basketball in 2007-08 to participate in football this year.

Graham continues to develop as an offensive weapon. He caught a TD pass against Florida, his third of the season. He also has a TD rush for the Commodores. For the season, Graham has eight rushes for 59 yards and 13 receptions for 98 yards. He also averages 4.9 yards on punt returns.

Graham redshirted on the football team in 2007, but became an intregal part of the Commodore men's basketball success last winter. After joining the hoops team after football ended, Graham became a fan favorite and defensive specialist in 15 appearances on the basketball court. He played important minutes down the stretch, helping the squad to a berth in the NCAA tournament.

Graham became the first Commodore to play both basketball and football since wide receiver Fred Baker did both in 1994-95.

SQUAD SERVED BY LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

Nine Commodores participate in the Leadership Council, serving as an entity that addresses team and student-athlete issues while acting as their teammates' voice in communicating with coaches.

Co-captains **Reshard Langford, George Smith** and **Bradley Vierling** are members of the Leadership Council.

Others voted by teammates to represent other various position groups include Mackenzi Adams, quarterbacks; Steven Stone, defensive line; Jeff Jennings, offensive backfield; Jake Bradford, receivers/tight ends; Bryant Hahnfeldt, specialists; and Patrick Benoist, linebackers.

KITCHINGS JUST THIRD CHANGE TO JOHNSON STAFF

First-year Commodore running backs mentor **Des Kitchings** represents just the third change to Coach Johnson's Vanderbilt staff in his tenure.

Johnson arrived at Vanderbilt with the belief that consistency on the coaching staff would lead to greater stability in the program and better chances for team success. He has taken the principle to heart: under Johnson, Vanderbilt has experienced the fewest coaching changes in the SEC. Both coordinators – Bruce Fowler (defense) and Ted Cain (offense) – also have the conference's longest tentures.

The coaching staff has multiple links dating back three decades to Johnson's initial year in collegiate coaching when he served as a defensive ends assistant at Furman. Johnson is just the fourth head coach in Vanderbilt football history to reach seven years of service.

COMMODORES CONTINUE ANCHOR 'UNITY' TRADITION

For the fourth straight year, Vanderbilt is traveling with an authentic anchor as a symbol of team unity. Prior to each game, two players are selected to carry the anchor to and from the Vanderbilt locker room on gameday, either at Vanderbilt Stadium or to the opponent's home stadium.

Originally, the anchor was developed by the team's Leadership Council as a way of demonstrating team unity among the squad.

INAUGURAL VANDERBILT ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME CLASS

On Sept. 12, 2008, Vanderbilt Student Athletics administrators, loyal supporters and longtime friends of the program welcomed the inaugural Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame. The distinguished 12-person class, introduced during halftime of the Rice-Vanderbilt game on Sept. 13, was determined by a panel of Student Athletics administrators with input from various outside sources. This winter, plans call for construction to begin on Phase II of the Vanderbilt Athletic Facility Project, work that includes more enhancements to Vanderbilt Stadium and a Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame addition to McGuqin Athletic Center.

Chantelle Anderson

Women's Basketball, 1999-2003

Chantelle Anderson is the most decorated women's basketball player in Vanderbilt history. The 6-6 Vancouver, Wash., native is the Commodores' only two-time Kodak All-American, the all-time leading scorer and was voted the school's Female Athlete of the Year three times. Anderson was a dominant inside force for the Commodores, concluding her career as the program's all-time leader scorer with 2,604 points.

Peggy Harmon Brady

Women's Golf, 1968-1972

She came to Vanderbilt after graduating from Central H.S. in Shelbyville, in an era when there was no varsity athletics for women. Out of the blue her sophomore year, Director of Athletics Jess Neely called to invite Harmon to represent Vanderbilt in the Intercollegiate. Perhaps Neely noticed she had won the USGA Junior Championship. While her pioneer story is inspiring, little did she realize that she was blazing a trail that her daughter, Chris, would follow decades later. They are the only mother-daughter All-Americans in school history.

John Hall

Football, 1951-1954

John Hall describes himself as an overachiever on and off the football field. The native of Knoxville was an under-sized defensive lineman who became Vanderbilt's first academic All-America in 1954, then enjoyed an enormously successful career that culminated as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Ashland, Inc., and president of the Vanderbilt Board of Trust.

Ryan Tolbert Jackson

Women's Track and Field, 1994-1998

A life-size photo of Ryan Tolbert Jackson dominates an entire wall of McGugin Center in recognition of her outstanding achievement as a track and field student-athlete. She is the only Commodore to ever win an individual NCAA championship., capturing the 400-meter hurdles with a meet-record 54.54 effort in 1997. She is a seven-time All-America recipient.

Roy Kramer

Director of Athletics, 1978-1990

A national champion football coach at Central Michigan, Roy Kramer arrived in Nashville in 1978. In a dozen years he energized Vanderbilt's athletic department with new facilities and popular coaches. By the time Kramer retired as SEC Conference Commissioner, many regarded him as the most powerful man in college athletics.

Clyde Lee

Basketball, 1963-1966

A tall and unpolished freshman from nearby Lipscomb High School enrolled in 1963 to play basketball for Coach Roy Skinner and Vanderbilt basketball was never the same again. Attendance boomed as fans flocked to watch "Colossal" Clyde Lee lead his team to 65 victories over three unforgettable seasons and establish himself as the standard by which all future Commodore stars would be measured. Old-timers call Memorial Gym's second and third tiers "the balconies that Clyde built."

Dan McGugin

Head Football Coach, 1904-1934

The winningest football coach in Vanderbilt history and one of college football's greatest innovators, Dan McGugin remains a legend more than seven decades after his death. When he finished his third decade as head coach of the Commodores, McGugin left behind a remarkable overall record of 197-55-10.

John Rich

Football-Baseball, 1945-1951

John Rich remembers being on the verge of expulsion from Vanderbilt University in the late 1940's and being given an unexpected second chance by the Dean of Students. He never forgot that golden opportunity and through the years as his coal business grew, he says he has tried to repay his beloved University with his time, by sharing his resources and lending his expertise. Rich also served the university for many years as a valuable member of the Vanderbilt Board of Trust.

Fred Russell

Baseball, 1925-1926; Nashville Banner Sports Editor, 1929-1998

Fred Russell was one of the great sports journalists of the 20th Century. Many admiring readers knew that. Fewer realized that he had played baseball at Vanderbilt. Mr. Russell covered and rubbed elbows with the legendary athletes of his day: his 25th anniversary at the paper was celebrated with appearances by Jack Dempsey, Bobby Jones and Red Grange. The press boxes of Vanderbilt Stadium (1982) and Hawkins Field (2002) are named in his honor.

June Stewart

Athletics Administration, 1973-1991

June Stewart joined the Vanderbilt athletic department in 1973 as a secretary in the sports information and National Commodore Club offices. By the time she retired 28 years later she was one of the most influential women in the Southeastern Conference. She also became the first female president of the College Sports Information Director of America (CoSIDA) organization.

Bill Wade

Football, 1949-1951

Bill Wade was Nashville's All-American boy. He was a prep legend, president of his Vanderbilt freshman class, a whiz on the gridiron where he became the No. 1 pick in the NFL Draft, a *Look Magazine* coverboy while a Commodore, and later quarterback of the world champion Chicago Bears. He was honored many times by many organizations, including the NCAA with its prestigious Silver Anniversary Award in 1976. Five decades after blazing a legacy on campus, Wade remains one of the school's most treasured student-athletes.

Perry Wallace

Men's Basketball, 1966-1970

Perry Wallace would have become a premiere Hall of Fame candidate even if he didn't make Southeastern Conference history by becoming the SEC's first African-American basketball player. Wallace was a star student-athlete, and left Vanderbilt as one of the greatest rebounders in team history. who went on to an outstanding career in law and education.
