Having advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament each of the last two seasons, Vanderbilt men's tennis coach Ian Duvenhage is looking for more as he enters his fourth season in Nashville.

"The goal is to not only make the NCAA Tournament year-in and year-out, but to advance past the second round," Duvenhage said. "To me, things really become meaningful when you reach the Sweet 16 and that is something we haven't done, and that is the next step."

To return to the NCAA Tournament for the eighth time in the past nine years and advance to the Sweet 16 for the first time since 2004, the Commodores will rely on a youthful team that features just one senior (Nick Cromydas) and six underclassmen.

Although the challenge may seem daunting given the youth of the team, anyone who has witnessed the continual progress of the program under Duvenhage wouldn't be surprised.

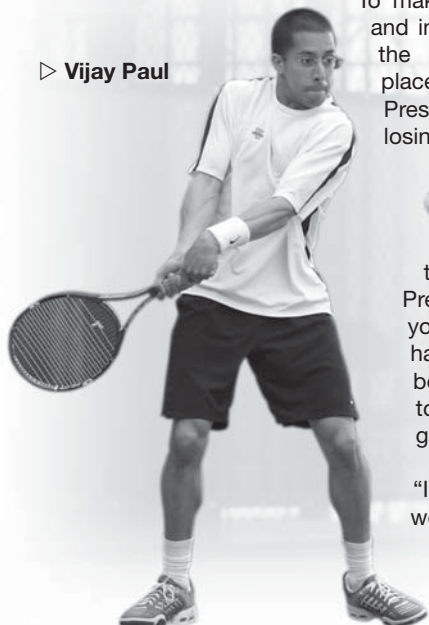
Since Duvenhage arrived in Music City prior to the 2005-06 season, he has increased Vanderbilt's win total and final ranking each year. He has also taken the team from 7-14 in 2006 (No. 71) to 11-13 in 2007 (No. 37) and 14-10 in 2008 (No. 26).

"I feel like we made tremendous progress in the first three years," Duvenhage said. "All teams have a collective knowledge and understanding of what it takes to be successful, and I feel this team coming back this year has a much better understanding of what it takes to be successful not only in Division I college tennis, but in the SEC."

Despite the vast improvements in final record and ranking, one mountain the Commodores have been unable to climb in Duvenhage's first three years has been the team's place in the ultra-competitive Southeastern Conference. Last year, the team finished eighth in the league and fourth in the SEC East with a 4-7 record.

"We talked at the end of the season about how we were eighth in the SEC and (ranked) 26th in the country," Duvenhage said. "It says how incredibly competitive the SEC is, but it also says that while we have continued to move up the rankings, we need to get in the top 20 on a consistent basis. Eighth in the SEC is not even remotely good enough."

To make that leap in the SEC and in the NCAA Tournament, the Commodores must replace departed seniors Ryan Preston and Evan Dufaux. By losing Preston to graduation, Vanderbilt also lost its No. 1 singles player for the past three years. Because of the loss of Dufaux and Preston, combined with the youth of the team, Duvenhage will count on a number of players to continue to make strides in their game this next year.

"In spite of the fact that we've come a long way and we are a much more mature team, we are still looking at a situation where only four

of our players are upperclassmen," Duvenhage said. "The majority of our kids are young and I like our freshman, but we are going to need a number of people to make a quantum leap this year and considerably raise their level."

Despite its youth, Vanderbilt has a lot of the intangibles that would usually be found with a veteran team.

"This team has tremendous desire and toughness," Duvenhage said. "There have been teams in the past that I've coached where I've felt like I've wanted it more than they do. I've never felt that even once with this team. They are really, really motivated and have a tremendous level of desire."

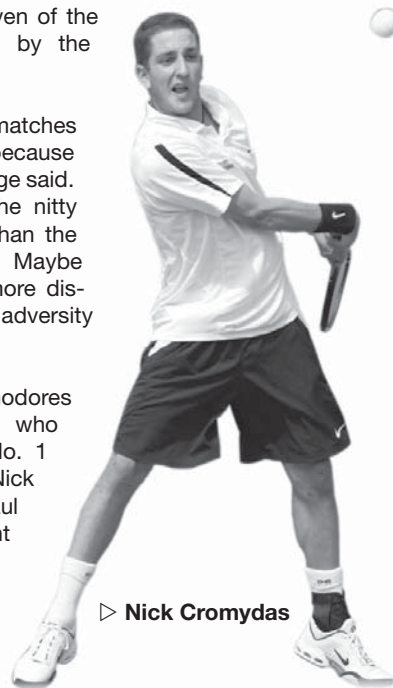
That desire and toughness was evident last year with seven of the team's 14 wins coming by the score of 4-3.

"We won a lot of close matches last year, and we did so because we were tough," Duvenhage said. "When it got down to the nitty gritty, we were tougher than the people that we played. Maybe not more talented, but more disciplined and we handled adversity better."

On the court, the Commodores have a host of players, who could contend for the No. 1 spot, including senior Nick Cromydas, junior Vijay Paul and sophomore Bryant Salcedo.

Cromydas ended 2008 as Vanderbilt's hottest player with wins in his final four matches, all

in the No. 2 position. The Glenview, Ill., native was Vanderbilt's only player to post a winning record in the SEC. A notably slow starter, Cromydas opened dual play with a 2-7 record, but finished 9-4 to close the season. In order for VU to start the season strong, Duvenhage knows that Cromydas' start will be key.

"He is the quintessential guy that you want in a deciding match," Duvenhage remarked. "His challenge this year is going to be that traditionally he is a slow starter. He comes in in the fall and he is one of those kids who needs to get away from the game from time to time, so what he does a lot is not play a lot of tennis in the summers, so when he hits his stride, it's March. I'd like to see him hit his stride by November."

Paul began last season on fire by winning his first six matches in the No. 2 position in dual play after going 10-3 in the fall. However, Paul hit a stumbling block midway through dual play before recovering to tie sophomore Alex Zotov for the team lead with 22 wins.

"He is one of the guys that has the potential of stepping up and playing No. 1 and being very successful at No. 1 because he's got the stuff," Duvenhage said. "The thing that I want Vijay to have this year is faith. We talk about it a lot. He loses faith in himself so easily. I'm looking for that to be different this year."

Joining Paul in the junior class are Scott Lieberman and James Moye. Lieberman is one of the most athletic players on the team. He didn't see any action in dual play last year, but he should have an opportunity to contribute this season.

"Scott will tell you that he has underachieved," Duvenhage commented. "I think he is very motivated and ready to live up to his potential. He is a terrific athlete. His problem isn't athleticism, his problem is focus, and he is working hard to make those corrections and I'm really hopeful that he will make them."

After not playing much at the start of dual play, Moye had one of the strongest finishes of anyone on the team, finishing 3-1 in the No. 6 position. Moye clinched Vanderbilt's win over Arkansas in the SEC Tournament and also won his singles match against Indiana in the NCAA Tournament.

"The guy leaves everything out there," Duvenhage said. "I have a great deal of confidence in his ability to compete and his ability to overcome adversity. He played a great match against Indiana in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, where he was cramping up and his opponent was cramping up, but James handled it better than his opponent did. I have a lot of confidence in his competitiveness."

Joining the four upperclassmen as returning letterwinners are sophomores Adam Baker, Andy Pulido, Bryant Salcedo and Alex Zotov.

A local Nashville product, Baker played in every match last season, finishing 7-10 in singles play and 14-18 in doubles play.

"He improved a great deal this summer," Duvenhage said. "I think his size is a huge plus. Fundamentally, he is very sound in every facet of the game. We've worked hard at improving his quickness and movement on the court. I think he can potentially contribute significantly."

Pulido made great strides during his freshman campaign and he should have an opportunity to contribute in 2009.

"He had some catching up to do last year," Duvenhage said. "He worked really hard. The desire is there and I'm hoping to see that he has closed the gap between him and the rest of the guys. He is a good enough athlete to contribute."

One of the most talented players on the team, Salcedo played the Nos. 3, 4, and 5 positions last year, while accumulating a 15-13 record. Salcedo should be primed to take the next step in his development this season.

"He can and should compete for No. 1," Duvenhage said. "He is a great hitter of the ball. There isn't a skill on the court that he doesn't have. He is a great kid, who is very motivated and works very hard."

Zotov tied Paul for the team lead with 22 wins. Like the rest of his class, Zotov showed significant improvement as the season progressed.

"Alex did a tremendous job for us last year," Duvenhage said. "He personified what it means to be gutsy and tough and to work hard. He is just a tough kid and a very important part of the team for this year. He worked unbelievably hard this summer to shore up some holes in his game and I think he did. By the end of July, I felt like he was doing things way better than he did last year."

Joining Vanderbilt's eight returning letterwinners are freshmen Alex DiValerio and Charlie Jones. Both players come to Vanderbilt with much acclaim, having both been selected as two of just 40 high school All-Americans in 2008.

A native of Malvern, Pa., DiValerio has enough talent that it will be difficult to keep him off the court as a freshman.

"He has terrific tools," Duvenhage said. "He just needs to learn how to use them. I think part of the problem is that it is pretty simple when you have two tools, but if you've got eight, then the decision making becomes a lot more crucial. We are going to have to help him bring his potential to fruition because his potential is enormous."

Like DiValerio, Jones, a native of Destrehan, La., will also have an opportunity to contribute immediately.

"He is very scrappy and quick on the court," Duvenhage said. "He does a lot of things well. We are going to work hard with him, and we will help him improve his serve and volley a lot. He is a blue-collar kind of tennis player and I predict that he is going to win a lot of tennis matches here in the next four years."

With such a young team comes a lot of uncertainty entering the 2008 season. However, any questions should be quickly answered this spring with the Commodores playing a non-conference schedule that resembles that of an NCAA Tournament field.

The non-conference slate includes matches against a minimum of four teams that finished 2008 ranked in the top 17 (Michigan, Oklahoma State, Texas and Tulsa). The number will likely go up when VU plays at the National Indoor Championships in January.

"I just felt like it was really important for us with this team this year to stress them early on," said Duvenhage of the schedule. "I want those guys to get their feet wet in a hurry and figure out what it is going to take for us to be successful quickly."

HEAD COACH • 4TH SEASON



Now entering his fourth season at the helm of Vanderbilt's men's tennis program, head coach Ian Duvenhage has quickly molded the Commodores into one of the top programs in the country.

After missing the NCAA Tournament in his first season (2006), Duvenhage has since taken the Commodores to the second round of the NCAA Tournament in each of the last two seasons.

The success experienced by Vanderbilt in the postseason should not come as a surprise to anyone who has followed the progress of Duvenhage in his three seasons in Nashville. He has guided Vanderbilt from 7-14 in 2006 to 11-13 in 2007 and 14-10 in 2008. The team has also improved its ranking each year from No. 71 in 2006 to No. 37 in 2007 and No. 26 in 2008.

While Vanderbilt's increase in win total and final ranking each of the last two years has been impressive, what may be even more impressive is the way the Commodores have reached those marks. This past season, 11 of VU's wins came against ranked opponents and all 10 of its losses were against ranked foes. The Commodores were also extremely successful when facing adversity. Each of the team's final five wins came by the score of 4-3.

Making the 2008 season even more successful was its success in the postseason. Not only did Vanderbilt defeat No. 38 Indiana in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, but it posted its first win in the SEC Tournament since 2003 when the Commodores topped Arkansas in the first round.

A veteran coach with 27 years of coaching experience, including 23 years coaching in the college ranks, Duvenhage, 49, continued to elevate the play of his players in 2008. Last season, Duvenhage helped 2008 graduate Ryan Preston become just the fourth player in school history to earn three All-SEC honors after guiding him from the No. 5 singles slot in 2005 to the No. 1 slot each of his final three seasons. Preston's success helped land him an invitation to the NCAA Singles Championship three years in a row.

Similar to the success experienced by Preston, Duvenhage helped senior Nick Cromydas climb from the Nos. 5 and 6 singles positions as a freshman to the No. 2 slot as a sophomore in 2007. In 2008, Cromydas progressively got better as the season went on. After starting 2-7 in dual play, Cromydas went 9-4 to close the year, while winning his final four matches.

Beyond the team's success on the court was its success in the classroom. The team posted a 3.19 cumulative GPA for the year and eight

players had GPAs of 3.0 or higher in the spring. Individually, Preston was recognized for his work in the classroom when he was named to the second team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District IV Team.

Hired on June 23, 2005, Duvenhage is the fourth men's tennis head coach since the program began in 1981.

Duvenhage's resume includes a 384-207 collegiate record, including a 32-37 mark in three seasons in Nashville. His 23-year college head coaching career includes 13 years at Florida and seven at his alma mater, the University of Miami. Duvenhage's impressive resume also includes one NCAA runner-up finish, two NCAA third-place finishes, four NCAA final eight appearances, and fifteen appearances in the NCAA sweet sixteen.

The native of Kuruman, South Africa, came to America through a tennis scholarship from the University of Miami. By the time he graduated with his M.B.A. in 1983, Duvenhage boasted a 52-17 career

record, competed in the NCAA singles championship his junior year and won a USTA doubles title with partner Michael Robertson in 1983.

Duvenhage served as head coach of the Miami women's tennis program from 1982 through 1988 and led the team to a 131-44 record with a .749 winning percentage. The Hurricanes participated in post season NCAA play all seven seasons of Duvenhage's campaign and were ranked in the national top five for four seasons.

In 1985 the Hurricanes saw one of their most successful seasons in team history when they competed in the NCAA finals and were ranked second in the nation. Duvenhage followed up the '85 season by leading Ronni Reis and Lise Gregory to the NCAA doubles championships and winning the Wilson intercollegiate Coach of Year award in 1986.

In 1988 Duvenhage signed on with the University of Florida and began his thirteen-year reign with the Gators. From 1991 through 2000, the Florida men's tennis team became one of only three schools to finish in the national top 16 for nine consecutive years in addition to winning two SEC titles. Duvenhage also coached four Gator national champions, 1993 NCAA doubles champions Mark Merklein and Dave Blair, 1994 NCAA singles winner Merklein, and 1999 singles winner Jeff Morrison.

Duvenhage received tremendous praise for his work with the Florida tennis squad. In 1991 Duvenhage earned the Co-Region 3 ITCA Wilson Coach of the Year award. In 2000, Duvenhage received the Region 3 Coach of the Year Award and Daily Tennis National Coach of the Year Award. In addition, the Gator coach received the highly competitive SEC Coach of the Year Award three times (1993, 1994, and 2000). Duvenhage has also served as coach of the USTA National Collegiate Team in 1999, 2001 and 2004.

In 2001, after thirteen years with the University of Florida, Duvenhage became the personal coach for Jeff Morrison and accompanied him to tournaments all over the world, including Wimbledon, the French Open, the Australian Open and the US Open. Duvenhage coached Morrison against the likes of Roger Federer, Andy Roddick, James Blake, Nicolas Massu, Ivan Ljubicic and Yevgeny Kafelnikov, and helped him to wins over Juan Carlos Ferrero, Arnaud Clement, Paradorn Srichaphan, Mikhail Youzhny, Mardy Fish, Taylor Dent, Wayne Ferreira and Vincent Spadea,

During his time coaching athletes on the professional tour, Duvenhage took advantage of his increased amount of free time to work on his other interests, including his love of oil painting.

In 2005 Duvenhage was ready to get back into the intense lifestyle of a Division I coach and snagged the opportunity when it became available at Vanderbilt.

Born Jan. 10, 1959, Duvenhage currently resides in Nashville with his wife Susan.

TOM BOYSEN

ASSISTANT COACH • 4TH SEASON



In three seasons at Vanderbilt, assistant coach Tom Boysen has helped head coach Ian Duvenhage mold Vanderbilt's program into a national power. Boysen has seen Vanderbilt improve from 7-14 in 2006 to 11-13 in 2007 and 14-10 in 2008. The team has also improved its ranking each year from No. 71 in 2006 to No. 37 in 2007 and No. 26 in 2008.

Boysen has also helped the Commodores reach the NCAA Tournament each of the last two seasons. In 2007, the Commodores reached the second round of the NCAA

Tournament after upsetting No. 18 Tulsa. This past year, the Commodores defeated No. 38 Indiana in the first round before falling to No. 4 Ole Miss.

Hired in August of 2005, Tom Boysen is entering his fourth season as assistant coach at Vanderbilt. A long time Florida resident, Boysen has more than a decade of coaching experience, including three years mentoring on the professional circuit prior to joining Vanderbilt's staff.

Boysen got into coaching tennis by teaching all ages at the club level. Eventually, Boysen found his niche with young adults and began coaching national caliber juniors. Boysen worked with several national standouts, including Lauren Kalvaria who ranked third in the nation and attended Stanford on scholarship.

Working mostly in Florida, Boysen's work with the state's most talented young athletes led him to meet current Vanderbilt head coach Ian Duvenhage, who was formerly at the helm of the University of Florida's men's tennis team.

Following his junior coaching tenure, Boysen traveled around the world working with professional athletes. One of Boysen's most successful students was Todd Widom, who ranked as high as 200 on the ATP charts and competed in three US Open Qualifying draws.

Boysen also coached Scott Lipsky and David Martin to numerous Challenger and Futures doubles titles. In 2007, Lipsky and Martin

reached the round of 16 in doubles at Wimbledon, the semis at Newport and finals at the Countrywide Classic in Los Angeles.

After three years on the circuit, Boysen was ready to try his hand at collegiate level coaching. Boysen had been eyeing the opening at Vanderbilt before he got the call from Duvenhage.

"I knew about the academic standards," Boysen said. "It was my goal to coach at a school with a good athletic reputation but also a good academic reputation. I knew I wanted to be associated with a great university and a coach who had a reputation for not only putting together a program, but also maintaining a top program."

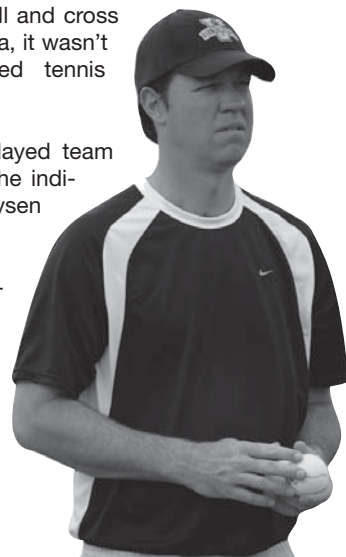
Duvenhage quickly inked Boysen after learning of his intentions to make the switch to the collegiate level.

"I'm just absolutely thrilled to have someone of Tom's ability and stature on our staff," Duvenhage said. "I have enormous respect for his coaching ability on the court in the heat of the battle. He is very even keeled, he doesn't get rattled or nervous. He has a calming effect on the players and he gets his ideas across in a very clear, concise manner."

As a youngster, Boysen began participating in team athletics through basketball and cross country. But growing up in Florida, it wasn't long before Boysen discovered tennis through fellow classmates.

"Up to that point I had only played team sports. I really fell in love with the individual aspect of the game," Boysen said.

A 1992 graduate of Central Florida with a degree in management, Boysen was also a member of the Knights' tennis program. During his time at UCF, Boysen began coaching at a country club and received an offer to teach fulltime upon graduation.

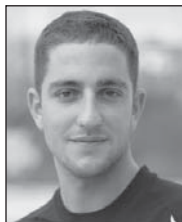

The 2007-08 season for Vanderbilt's men's tennis team was filled with numerous highlights that encompassed one of the most successful seasons in recent years. Led by third-year head coach Ian Duvenhage, the Commodores advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the second year in a row and finished the season ranked No. 26 with a 14-10 overall record and 4-7 mark in the ultra-competitive Southeastern Conference.

Vanderbilt's win total and final ranking were its best since the 2004 season when the team earned 16 wins en route to a final ranking of No. 16. However, the year's success shouldn't come as a surprise to anyone. Since taking over the reigns of the program prior to the 2005-06 season, Duvenhage has increased Vanderbilt's win total each season. He has taken the team from 7-14 in 2006 to 11-13 in 2007 and 14-10 in 2008. The team has also improved its ranking each year from No. 71 in 2006 to No. 37 in 2007 and No. 26 in 2008.

Making last season even more successful than the past two, was Vanderbilt's strong play in the postseason. After upsetting No. 18 Tulsa in the first round of the 2007 NCAA Tournament, Vanderbilt advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the second year in a row by knocking off No. 38 Indiana, 4-3. In the SEC Tournament, the Commodores defeated No. 46 Arkansas, 4-3, in the first round to advance to the quarterfinals for the first time since 2003.

Including its triumphs over Indiana and Arkansas in the postseason, 11 of VU's 14 wins came against ranked opponents. Reinforcing just how solid Vanderbilt was this season, all 10 of the team's losses came against ranked opponents. Not only that, but seven of Vanderbilt's 10 losses were against teams that advanced to the round of 16 in the NCAA Tournament.

After having a successful fall campaign, the Commodores opened the spring season on fire by winning their first five matches of the season before falling at No. 18 Michigan, 5-2. Vanderbilt's loss at Michigan would be its only blemish in a non-conference slate where the Commodores finished 9-1.

In conference play, Vanderbilt finished fourth in the SEC East, but it should be noted that the three teams that finished ahead of the Commodores (Georgia, Florida and Tennessee) were all ranked in the top 10 and advanced to the round of 16 in the NCAA Tournament with Georgia winning the national championship for the second year in a row.

The 2008 season will also be remembered for the unreasonable weather conditions that kept the Commodores indoors for seven of their 11 home matches. Despite having to play the bulk of its matches inside the Currey Tennis Center, Vanderbilt still finished its home slate 9-2.

The first match Vanderbilt was able to play outdoors was on March 2 against South Carolina. Although no one knew it at the time, the match

would also be a sign of things to come for the Commodores. The Commodores lost the doubles point and trailed the Gamecocks 3-1 before rallying for a 4-3 win. Clinching the win was Nick Cromydas, who dropped the first set in the No. 2 position, 6-2, before rallying to win the second and third set in a tiebreaker.

The comeback by Cromydas was just one of many examples of determination shown by VU in 2008. Including its win over South Carolina, each of Vanderbilt's final five victories of the season came by the score of 4-3. Not only were Vanderbilt's last five wins by one point, but all five of the wins also came after losing the doubles point. In fact, the Commodores lost the doubles point in 11 straight matches beginning on March 9 at LSU and continuing until the final match of the season when Vanderbilt took two out of three doubles matches from Ole Miss in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Vanderbilt's most pivotal match of the season may have come against No. 23 Alabama on March 23. Having lost three straight matches, the Commodores staged another typical comeback. Just like when it rallied from a 3-1 deficit to defeat South Carolina, Vanderbilt once again won the final three singles matches to clinch a 4-3 win over the Crimson Tide.

After defeating Alabama, the Commodores closed the season by winning two of their final five matches. Vanderbilt topped No. 38 Mississippi State on March 30 and concluded the regular season with a win at No. 40 Kentucky.

With Vanderbilt posting its first road SEC win of the season at Kentucky, the Commodores traveled to the SEC Tournament in Fayetteville, Ark. Facing Arkansas in the first round of the tournament, Vanderbilt won a dramatic 4-3 decision that was clinched by James Moye. In the quarterfinals, VU fell, 4-2, to top-seeded Georgia.

Despite the loss to Georgia, the Commodores were still selected to play in the NCAA Tournament for the seventh time in the last eight years. In the tournament, the Commodores moved to 8-0 all-time in the first round of the NCAA Tournament with a 4-3 win over No. 38 Indiana. The win was also Vanderbilt's fifth in a row by the score of 4-3.

In the second round of the NCAA Tournament, Vanderbilt looked like it may pull the upset over No. 4 Ole Miss when it won the doubles point for the first time in 12 matches to take a 1-0 lead in the match. Unfortunately the doubles point would be VU's lone point of the match, as the Rebels prevailed, 4-1.

Behind the success experienced by the team was the success of many strong individual performances. Led by seniors Ryan Preston and Evan Dufaux, Vanderbilt was an extremely young team in 2008 with only three upperclassmen (junior Nick Cromydas) on the roster.

On the court, the Commodores were led by Preston, who earned first team All-SEC honors and became just the fourth player in school history to be a three-time All-SEC selection.

As the team's No. 1 singles player for the third year in a row, Preston defeated five ranked players, including No. 2 Greg Ouellette of Florida. The Northbrook, Ill., native also won SEC Player of the Week honors on Feb. 19, becoming VU's first recipient of the award since 2003.

Preston's success on the court also earned him a bid to the NCAA Singles Championship for the third year in a row, where he lost in the first round to eventual national champion Somdev Devvarman of Virginia.

Off the court, Preston was named to the second team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District IV team. Preston was also Vanderbilt's male recipient of the SEC H. Boyd McWhorter Postgraduate Scholarship.

Also earning individual accolades last season were Dufaux and freshman Alex Zotov. Dufaux, who is joining the Peace Corps, was named to the SEC Community Service team and Zotov was named SEC Freshman of the Week on Jan. 29 after clinching VU's opening win against Michigan State.

Sophomore Vijay Paul tied Zotov for the team lead with 22 wins, but it may have been the play of Cromydas down the stretch that was most impressive. After battling injuries in the fall, Cromydas was Vanderbilt's most consistent player at the end of the season and won his final four matches of the year. He also was the only Vanderbilt player to finish with a winning record in the SEC (6-5).

In addition to the team's success on the court, the Commodores also succeeded in the classroom. The team posted a team GPA of 3.2 for the year and eight members of the team posted GPAs of 3.0 or higher in the spring semester.

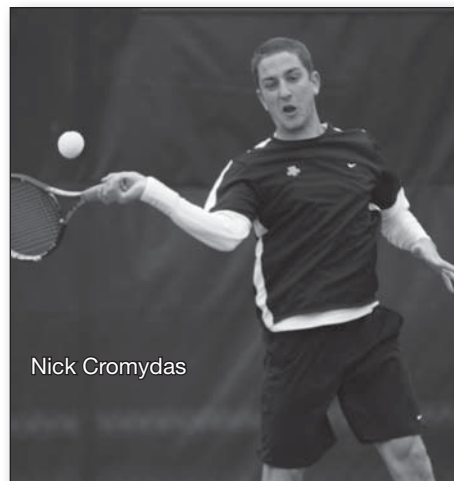

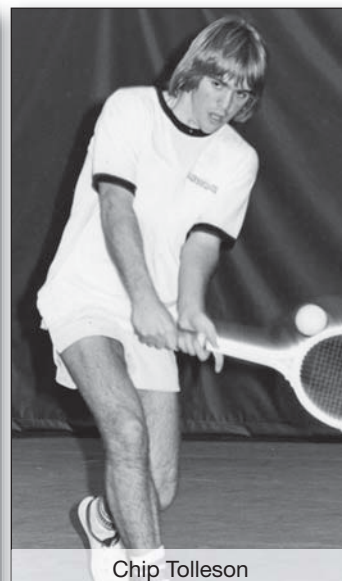

Bobby Reynolds
2002, 2003

In his three years with the Vanderbilt tennis squad, Bobby Reynolds fought his way to the top of the collegiate tennis rankings and helped lead the Commodores to their first ever NCAA Finals appearance. So it comes as no surprise that after five years on the pro circuit, Reynolds has created a buzz on the worldwide level over his powerful game.

Reynolds thrived from the beginning in the Vanderbilt environment, earning more than 20 singles wins his freshman year alone. As a sophomore, Reynolds took First Team All-SEC honors and finished the season ranked 15th in the nation. Reynolds wrapped up his collegiate career ranked No.1 in the country following Vanderbilt's run to the



NCAA Finals for the first time in school history. In addition, Reynolds became Vanderbilt's first two-time men's tennis All-American, with back-to-back honors in 2002 and 2003.

Since 2003, Reynolds has soared up the ATP charts, hitting a career high No. 77 in 2008. In doubles, he has been ranked as high as No. 52 (Oct. 2006). This past summer, he was the only American to reach the third round at Wimbledon.

Reynolds still holds six Vanderbilt records including Most Singles Wins (99), Best Singles Winning Percentage (73.9%), Most Doubles Wins by a team (with Eddie Coates) (26), Season Wins (46), Season Winning Percentage (86.8), and Season Doubles Wins (26).


Chris Groer
1996

In 1996, Chris Groer became the first Vanderbilt tennis player to earn All-American honors in nearly half a century. The Knoxville, Tenn., native compiled a 12-4 singles record and went 8-2 in SEC action his senior year, qualifying for the NAAs in both singles and doubles. Groer earned a final ITA ranking of No. 15 in singles.

Groer spent several years following his time with the Commodores touring on the pro circuit. Groer and doubles partner Andre Carlson went head to head with Andy Roddick and Brian Vahaly in 2003 in the semifinals of the International Series in Washington.

In 2000-2001 Groer served as Assistant Coach for Ole Miss, helping lead the Rebels to the SEC West title and a trip to the NCAA Sweet 16.

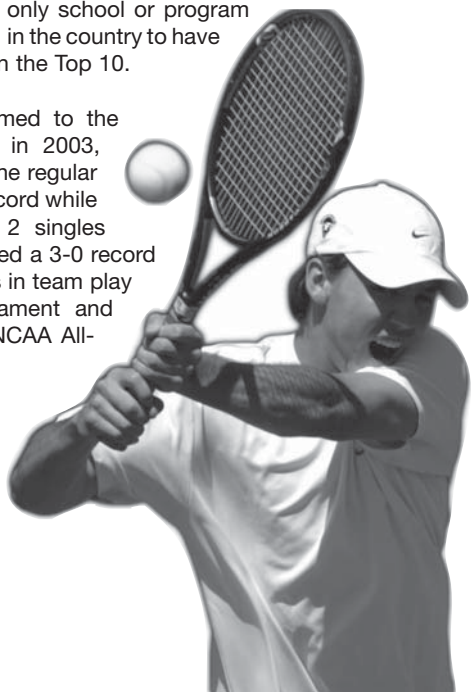

Chad Harris
2003, 2004

Chad Harris became Vanderbilt's third men's tennis All-American in 2003. The Aurora, Colo. native had an outstanding season for the Commodores, as he finished with 34 singles victories and a Top 10 national ranking. Harris and Bobby Reynolds made the Vanderbilt the only school or program in the country to have

two players ranked in the Top 10.

Harris was also named to the All-SEC First Team in 2003, as he finished with the regular season with a 9-2 record while playing at the No. 2 singles position. Harris posted a 3-0 record for the Commodores in team play at the NCAA Tournament and was named to the NCAA All-Tournament team.

In 2004 and 2005, Harris participated in ten USA Futures events.

1999: The Commodores made their NCAA Tournament debut in 1999. They were sent to Champaign, Ill., as the second-seeded team at the NCAA Regional. Vanderbilt defeated third-seeded Michigan, 4-3, before falling to host Illinois, the seventh-ranked team in the nation, 4-2.

2001: After a one-year absence, Vanderbilt returned to the tourney in 2001, traveling to an NCAA Regional in College Station, Texas. The Commodores won their first round match, upsetting Arizona State, 4-1, but were unable to knock off host Texas A&M, falling to the No. 4 Aggies, 4-0.

2002: The 'Dores returned to the NCAA's for the second consecutive season in 2002, traveling to Lexington, Ky., for the NCAA Regional. Vanderbilt avenged a regular-season loss to Ohio State, defeating the Buckeyes, 4-3, to advance. In the second round, however, eighth-ranked host Kentucky defeated the 'Dores, 4-3.

2003: After three unsuccessful attempts at advancing past the second round of the NCAA Tournament away from Nashville, the Commodores earned the right to host an NCAA Regional in 2003 and took advantage of the opportunity by beginning a record-breaking run. The Commodores defeated Tennessee Tech and No. 26 Pepperdine in the Music City before shipping off to Athens, Ga., for the NCAA National Tournament. There, Vanderbilt would take down No. 10 Texas A&M, No. 2 Baylor and No. 5 UCLA to advance to the NCAA Championship match. It was the furthest any group of Commodores had ever gone. And even though top-ranked Illinois ended Vanderbilt's dream season, 4-3, in a hotly-contested title match, the 'Dores had entered the national spotlight.

2004: In 2004, the Commodores found themselves once again facing top ranked Illinois in the final rounds of the NCAA tournament. For the second consecutive year the tournament's No. 1 seed, Illinois, bumped the 'Dores out of the contest. On their way to the quarterfinals, VU defeated Oregon in the first round and SEC foes Ole Miss and Georgia in the second and third rounds.

2005: Despite stellar performances by seniors Scott Brown and Matt Lockin, the Commodores were unable to continue past the second round in the NCAA tournament. The No. 38 Commodores upset the No. 28 Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets in round one, but fell to SEC tennis powerhouse Florida in round two.

2007: Under the guidance of second-year coach Ian Duvenhage, Vanderbilt returned to the NCAA Tournament in 2007 with a 4-2 upset win over No. 18 Tulsa. Ranked No. 45, Vanderbilt lost 4-0 in the second round to No. 15 LSU in Baton Rouge.

2008: For the seventh time in the past eight years, Vanderbilt played in the NCAA Tournament in 2008. VU downed No. 38 Indiana, 4-3 in the first round before falling to host and No. 4 Ole Miss, 4-1, in the second round.

TENNIS FACILITIES

Brownlee O. Currey Jr. Tennis Center

The Brownlee O. Currey Jr., Tennis Center was completed in November 1993. With the opening of its doors, the Vanderbilt tennis program provides one of the finest tennis facilities in the nation for varsity collegiate tennis. It was selected to host men's NCAA Regional Tournament in 1993.

Plans for the tennis center were unveiled in April 1993 when former Director of Athletics Paul Hoolahan announced that a \$2.2 million project was being made possible by the generous benefactors of Vanderbilt tennis. Nashville businessman Brownlee O. Currey Jr. spearheaded the fundraising for the project. Additional gifts were made by the Joe. C. Davis Foundation, the Fleming Foundation, Mrs.. Joanne Fleming Hayes, and Mr. Kermit C. Stengel.

The previous tennis center, which had provided three indoor courts, underwent several changes throughout the renovation. A two-story, 16,000-square-foot addition was made to the existing indoor structure, providing enough space for five indoor courts.

The lower level of the facility houses spacious locker rooms for both varsity teams as well as a training room and locker room space for visitors.

A special feature of the center is a state-of-the-art audio/visual room, also located on the second floor. Small video cameras are mounted at the north end of each indoor playing court, allowing the coaches to monitor and record matches in progress on all five courts. The room also serves as a classroom for the coaches and their teams.

In addition to the changes and adaptations to the interior of the tennis center, the building was given an exterior face lift as well. Its new red-brick exterior now matches the architecture of many buildings on the Vanderbilt campus.

Outdoor Facility

The fundraising for the renovations of the outdoor tennis courts began in 2001, and five years later Vanderbilt tennis fans and athletes are thoroughly enjoying their world class facilities.

The \$5 million project was completed just in time for the beginning of the 2005 tennis season.

The new outdoor complex at the Brownlee O. Currey Jr. Tennis Center includes nine lighted courts and seating for more than 1,000 spectators. The new facility also features concession areas and rest rooms.

One of the more important factors in designing the new courts was that of comfort, both to coaches and players as well as fans. As a result the six varsity courts are side by side, so coaches can freely move to any court during a match. In addition, the court layout allows fans to enjoy a great view from any seat, including the various picnic tables around the courts.

The fan friendly design of the courts makes weekday afternoon matches a popular destination for students as well as Vanderbilt Athletic staff members located in the McGugin Center just a few yards away.

One of the most dazzling features of the new facility is its state-of-the-art lighting system. The courts house some of the most powerful lights on the market so matches can be easily televised at night.

The inaugural season of the outdoor facilities drew more fans out to support the Commodores due to the added comfort and accessibility.

What is an academic counselor?

- An academic counselor's responsibilities include, but are not limited to, meeting weekly or bi-weekly with all student-athletes from their assigned athletic teams, monitoring study hall, checking class attendance, and referring the student-athletes to the appropriate campus-wide resources.

What is the goal of academic services?

- The Department of Student Athletics has a very active tutoring program with the goal of providing the student-athlete with the best possible academic assistance. The Tutoring Program has tutors covering over 30 different academic areas, and working with over half of our student-athletes.

How often do freshman meet with academic counselors?

- An Academic Counselor meets weekly with every freshman and all student-athletes who are in danger of falling short of achieving good academic standing by Vanderbilt University standards.

What do I do if I am going to miss class because of travel?

- Each student-athlete is instructed to give an official letter, supplied by The Stratton Foster Academic Center, to all of his or her professors with the dates and times, for the entire semester, they will miss class for athletically related travel. The counselors follow up this letter with an e-mail a week in advance, to serve as a reminder to the professors of his/her student-athletes who will not be in class.

When is the academic center open?

- The Stratton Foster Academic Center is open to every student-athlete on Sundays from 2:00pm-10:00pm, Mondays-Thursdays from 7:30am-10:00pm, and on Fridays from 7:30am-5:00pm. For quiet studying, thirty private study carrels are available in the bi-level facility. A computer lab is also conveniently located for student-athletes to write papers or do research while in The Stratton Foster Academic Center.

ADMINISTRATION


NICHOLAS S. ZEPOS
Chancellor

Nicholas S. Zeppos serves as chancellor of Vanderbilt University, accepting the position March 1, 2008.

The long-time Vanderbilt educator and administrator has been a vocal supporter of the Commodore student athletics program. Zeppos has given his endorsement to an athletics capital improvement plan expected to surpass \$50 million in the coming years.

Zeppos served in an increasingly prominent role during his ascension to the chancellorship since being hired by Vanderbilt as an assistant professor of law in 1987.

A distinguished legal scholar, teacher and executive, Zeppos served from 2002 to February 2008 as Vanderbilt's chief academic officer, overseeing the university's undergraduate, graduate and professional education programs and research in liberal arts and sciences, engineering, music, education, business, law, and divinity. As provost and vice chancellor, he chaired Vanderbilt's budgeting and capital planning council, as well as oversaw the dean of students and dean of admissions.

Zeppos has led a number of important initiatives at Vanderbilt, including the planning process for The Commons, a landmark transformation of the first-year experience; the Strategic Academic Planning Group; innovative efforts in undergraduate admissions and financial aid; and the development of new programs in Jewish studies, law and economics, and genetics, among others. He also has led the university's Shape the Future fund-raising campaign, which exceeded its \$1.25 billion goal two years ahead of schedule and set a new target of \$1.75 billion by 2010.

Zeppos was recognized with five teaching awards at the law school before serving as an associate dean, associate provost, and provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. He served as interim chancellor from August 1, 2007 until March 1, 2008, when he was appointed chancellor.

From 1982-1987, Zeppos practiced law in Washington, D.C., at the United States Department of Justice and Wilmer, Cutler & Pickering, where he specialized in appellate litigation involving complex regulatory, statutory, and constitutional matters.

Zeppos was born in Milwaukee, Wisc. He is a 1979 magna cum laude graduate of the University of Wisconsin Law School where he served as editor in chief of the Wisconsin Law Review and was selected as the outstanding graduate of his class, and a 1976 Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of Wisconsin where he studied history.

He is married to Lydia Ann Howarth, a graduate of the University of Chicago and Lawrence University, who is a writer and editor. They have two sons, Benjamin and Nicholas.


DAVID WILLIAMS II
Vice Chancellor for University Affairs

For the last five years, Williams has directed an initiative to more fully integrate Commodore athletics into the total Vanderbilt student life experience. With the support of former Chancellor Gee, newly appointed chancellor Nicholas Zeppos, the university's senior management team and Vanderbilt Board of Trust, Williams' efforts as Vice Chancellor for University Affairs and Athletics have been successful in creating opportunity for student-athletes to participate in programs across the Vanderbilt landscape.

Today, Williams' efforts has placed the Vanderbilt program among the nation's most innovative, offering a streamlined organization. Since sweeping changes were initiated in September 2003, Williams has firmly placed his stamp on the program. He has overseen the recruitment and hiring of seven outstanding head coaches. Williams has addressed facility concerns with a five-phase enhancement program expected to approach \$60 million and will affect virtually every Vanderbilt student-athlete by its completion date.

Vanderbilt athletics have blossomed under Williams. Nine sports participated in postseason action last year, just one shy of the school record set in 2006-07. An unprecedented seven Commodore athletes have been selected in the first round of their respective sports in the last three years. Off the field, the student-athletes' collective GPA has reached impressive levels.

Athletics is but a small part of Williams' influential Vanderbilt role. Williams also serves as General Counsel directing a staff of 14 attorneys, Secretary of Vanderbilt and its nationally recognized Medical Center, the Office of Risk Management, the University's Compliance and Conflict of Interest functions, and the operations of the University's Board of Trust.

Williams' campus participation also includes a tenured full professorship at the School of Law, lecturing on Tax Law, Sports Law and Education Law. He has taught a course on Law and Higher Education at Peabody College, and from time to time, courses in the undergraduate curriculum.

Williams came to Vanderbilt after serving in numerous administrative roles at Ohio State University over a 14-year period. When he accepted the Vanderbilt role, Williams was Vice President of Student and Urban/Community Affairs and Professor of Law at Ohio State.

A native of Detroit, Mich., Williams received a Bachelor of Science in Social Science and Master of Arts in Education from Northern Michigan University where he was a member of the track team. He also earned a Master of Business Administration and a Doctor of Jurisprudence from the University of Detroit, and an L.L.M. in taxation from New York University.

Williams and his wife, Gail, have two school-aged children: Samantha, who is a varsity swimmer and rising freshman at Brown University, and Nicholas, who is an eighth grader at University School of Nashville and competes in swimming, basketball, track and soccer. His wife serves as the Associate Director of Community Relations at Vanderbilt, and is chair of the Metro Transit Authority (MTA) board of directors.


LORI ALEXANDER
Associate Director of Student Athletics

Lori Alexander is in her fourth year overseeing the men's tennis program as the associate director of student athletics. She joined the Commodore team 11 years ago as a strength and conditioning coach working with women's basketball, lacrosse, tennis, golf, and soccer teams. Prior to her work with Vanderbilt, Alexander worked with athletes at the University of California-Berkeley for eight years.

During her time there, Alexander became chair of the Performance Enhancement and Advisory Committee which addressed concerns of student-athletes relating to performance and well being.

Alexander received her undergraduate degree in biology, health and physical education from Bethel College in 1984 before working as a graduate assistant at Notre Dame.
