Vanderbilt 0 Miss. St. 42

By Bill Trocchi Special From Commodore Report STARKVILLE, Miss.—At least no one tore an ACL.

Nine years after the Commodores suffered a 42-7 season-opening drubbing at Mississippi State in which three players suffered torn ACL injuries, Vanderbilt lost its 1998 season-opener, 42-0, at the same venue.

And while Vanderbilt escaped Scott Field with its health, it did not leave with much else, at least on the positive side.

"What happened out there is something you hope doesn't happen," said Vanderbilt coach Woody Widenhofer.

Something like the first pass of the game getting intercepted and returned for a touchdown? Or the next pass getting intercepted? Or a fumbled snap? And that was just the first quarter.

The Commodores finished with 126 yards offense and four turnovers. Vanderbilt did not convert a third down in the first three quarters and ended the game 1-11 in that category.

"This wasn't what I thought it would be," first-year offensive coordinator Steve Crosby said. "We have to make some changes. Mississippi State didn't really show us anything that we haven't been practicing against. We just did not perform."

Mississippi State, meanwhile, looked to be in midseason form. Star tailback James Johnson rushed for 111 yards on 23 carries to lead a Bulldog attack that rolled up 424 yards. Through the air or on the ground, MSU made plays when it had to against Vanderbilt's defense, which featured seven new starters from last year.

VU junior quarterback Hi Lewis saw his collegiate debut turn into a nightmare on the very first

series of the game. Pressured by State's Barrin Simpson, Lewis threw his first pass high into the flat, where it was graciously accepted by Anthony Derricks, who returned it for an easy touchdown. Before you could say ESPN2, Vanderbilt trailed 6-0.

"We knew if we were going to come out and beat this team, we were going to have to play perfect and not turn the ball over early," said H-Back Todd Yoder.

The turnovers had just begun, however. Lewis threw another interception on his next pass, and the Bulldogs turned it into six more points nine plays later. Two passes, two interceptions, two MSU touchdowns.

Vanderbilt's defense hung in against the huge MSU offensive line, holding the score at 15-0 until midway through the third quarter.

Late in the third, Vanderbilt gave MSU the ball at the Dores' seven-yard line when Greg Zolman fumbled while being sacked. The Bulldogs cashed in with a four-yard touchdown pass from Wayne Madkin to Lahitia Grant.

The Commodores trailed 25-0 after three quarters, and things got worse in the fourth. With Vanderbilt's defense on weary legs, MSU tacked on 17 more points.

"I still have faith," said defensive tackle Jason Smith. "But this was totally unexpected."

Came Vanderbilt 7 Alabama 32

BIRMINGHAM, Ala.—The future
of Vanderbilt football was on
display at Legion Field. And for
one quarter that future seemed
bright.

In the next three quarters, however, the present and past of Vanderbilt football showed up. The result, a convincing 32-7 Alabama win

"I thought in the first half we went out there and battled pretty good," said Vanderbilt head coach Woody Widenhofer. "We gave up a few big plays which we normally don't do. We got burned in some areas. We have to keep working. Nobody ever said it was going to be easy."

It looked easy during one three-minute stretch of the first quarter. Redshirt freshman defensive end Doyle Crosby ended Alabama's first drive of the day after just three plays with an athletic interception at the Vanderbilt 29-yard line.

True freshman quarterback David Wallace then marched the Commodores to midfield over the next five plays. Wallace hooked up with Tavarus Hogans for the first first down of the drive and then scrambled seven yards on a thirddown to give VU another first down at the 50-yard line.

After an incomplete pass, Wallace hit Hogans in stride on a slant pass five yards down field. Hogans beat safety Warren Foust in the open field and galloped into the end zone for Vanderbilt's first touchdown of the season.

"I'm not a big-time player," Hogans said, "but I feel I am kind of explosive. And every time I get the ball, I feel I have a chance to score. It felt real good to go up 7-0, but you have to keep pouring it on and playing ball."

Following the Hogans score, however, Vanderbilt's offense stalled. The Commodores failed to pick up a first down on their next five possessions—three ended with a punt and two ended with Wallace interceptions.

"Early on in the first quarter we found out what the offense can do," said linebacker Jamie Winborn. "After the first quarter they kind of fell off. But we did complete more passes and looked better than we did in the first game."

The Tide—ahead 14-7 at the half—seized control of the game in the third quarter with a touchdown and two safeties. The Vanderbilt offense ran 17 plays for -10 yards in the quarter.

"We saw progress in the first half, but we regressed in the second half," said guard Brian Gruber. "We just made mental mistakes and stupid errors."

"(Alabama) played us very well defensively up front," Widenhofer said. "We just didn't run the ball as well as I thought we could. The reason we went to this offense was to knock them out of these eight and nine-man fronts and maybe open up the running game."

The offense was not entirely to blame for this loss. The young Vanderbilt defense was burned for 400 total yards and 32 points.

Hississippi 30 Vanderbilt 6

Special From Commodore Report NASHVILLE—As soon as David Wallace threw the ball, he knew he wanted it back.

As it headed toward Rodney Williams, there was Ole Miss defensive end Shane Elam, reading the play perfectly and turning the game irreversibly toward Ole Miss.

Elam picked off Wallace's pass and raced 87 yards into the end zone midway through the third quarter, turning a close contest into what turned out to be Vanderbilt's third one-sided loss in three games.

"That absolutely broke our back," said Vanderbilt coach Woody Widenhofer. "It took a lot out of our football team."

Vanderbilt dropped a 30-6 decision to visiting Ole Miss,

lowering its mark to an unsightly 0-3 on the season.

The Commodore offense showed signs of life in the first half, gaining 175 yards, but only mustered 60 in the second half.

As one-sided as the final score was, it looked as if there was an excellent chance the game would be tied as late as the third quarter. With Vanderbilt trailing 14-6, Vanderbilt found itself with a first-and-goal at the Ole Miss eight-yard line. On second down, the game changed.

Ole Miss threw a zone blitz at Vanderbilt's freshman quarterback, and Wallace played right into the Rebels' hands.

"All week on film, the swing pass was wide open," Wallace said. "This time, they dropped the end to cover that guy. I still made a poor pass to Rodney."

A potential tie game quickly turned into a 21-6 Ole Miss advantage, and the upset hopes of the Commodores were ended.

GAME Vanderbilt.... 16 TCU 19

Special From Commodore Report FORT WORTH, Texas—Woody Widenhofer emerged from the Vanderbilt locker room at Amon Carter Stadium just minutes after TCU's thrilling 19-16 double overtime win.

"It is hard to win," said Commodores' Widenhofer, the second-year head coach. "It is hard to win a football game."

And if you are wearing black & gold these days, it can seem impossible to win a football game. Vanderbilt appeared to have the game wrapped up twice Saturday night—once in regulation and once in the first overtime—but the young Commodores simply could not find a way to win.

"You really have to pay a heck of a price to win a game," Widenhofer said.

Had the Commodores been able to muster one defensive stop or convert a 42-yard field goal, they would have picked up their first win of the 1998 season.

Instead, they found themselves searching for answers with an 0-4 record and a nine-game losing streak.

The much-maligned Vanderbilt offense played its best half of the season Saturday night, putting together three long scoring drives on its final three possessions. The final drive—which covered yards on 11 plays—gave the Commodores their first second-half lead of the season.

Rodney Williams capped the drive with a brilliant 18-yard scoring run to put Vanderbilt ahead 13-10 with just 1:31 remaining.

Following Williams' touchdown, the run-oriented Horned Frogs took over at their own 23-yard line with two timeouts and just 87 seconds remaining.

But Patrick Batteaux, TCU's

rookie quarterback, the ran Horned Frog two-minute offense with poise. He completed 5-of-8 passes and converted three times on third down.

TCU's 10-play drive culminated with a 50-yard gametying field goal from redshirt freshman Chris Kaylakie with four seconds remaining in the game.

Kaylakie's field goal sent the game to overtime, where the 'Dores won the coin flip and elected to go defense first. TCU's first possession ended without a point as Kaylakie's go-ahead 33-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Alphonso Harvey.

Widenhofer then made the decision to send place kicker John Markham out on first down to attempt a 42-yard game-winning field goal.

"I have seen too many games go by the wayside trying to get the ball in a little bit closer," Widenhofer said.

Markham's kick, however, was blocked at the line by TCU defensive end Aaron Schobel. The first overtime painfully ended with the score still tied 13-13.

Markham rebounded with a 47-yard kick to begin the second overtime period, putting Vanderbilt on top, 16-13.

On the ensuing TCU possession, tailback Basil Mitchell scampered 16 yards on the second play to give the Frogs a first-andgoal at the eight. Two plays later, LaDainian Tomlinson busted through from four yards for the game-winning score.

The TCU players mobbed the field in celebration, while the shell-shocked Commodores slowly made their way to the locker room.

GAME W. Michigan.. 27 Vanderbilt 24

NASHVILLE—"I'm at a loss for words," said Vanderbilt coach Woody Widenhofer, shortly after his team dropped a heartbreaker to Western Michigan, 27-24. "It is hard, tough, very emotional and our team is hurting."

For the second week in a row, Vanderbilt watched the opposing team score the game-winning points on the final play, then rush the field in celebration.

Western Michigan kicker Brad Selent split the uprights from 37 yards as time expired and the Broncos handed Vanderbilt a demoralizing loss.

The Commodores and Broncos appeared headed for overtime when VU's John Markham booted a 46-yard field goal with 37 seconds remaining to complete a 10-point Commodore comeback and tie the score, 24-24.

But Vanderbilt's defense, for the second straight week, could not come up with a stop in the final minute. Starting at its own 20, Western gained five yards on first

down, then came up with the play of the game. Quarterback Tim Lester threw a long pass to redshirt freshman Micah Zuhl, who outbattled Jimmy Williams and came up with an acrobatic catch at the Vanderbilt 32-yard line. Two plays later, Selent ended the game with his 37-yarder, touching off a wild Western Michigan celebration.

Vanderbilt jumped out to a 14-0 lead in the game, with Rodney Williams leading the way. Williams 156 yards rushing was his third straight 100-yard effort. His running set up Vanderbilt's first touchdown, a 21-yard scamper by freshman Lew Thomas.

After holding Western Michigan three-and-out, the Commodores extended the lead to 14-0 on a 27-yard TD pass from David Wallace to Tavarus Hogans.

But the Broncos regrouped and scored 21 straight points in the remainder of the half.

Western drove 75 yards for one touchdown, then converted two Vanderbilt turnovers for their other 14 points, including a fumbled kickoff by VU linebacker Antuian Bradford.

A 38-yard field goal by Selent gave Western Michigan a 24-14 lead in the third quarter, and it appeared the Broncos were going to run Vanderbilt out of its own stadium.

But Jimmy Williams returned an interception to the Vanderbilt 44, and the Commodores drove 56 yards in seven plays to cut the lead to 24-21.

Vanderbilt held Western Michigan, then began at its own 19 with 7:57 to play. The Commodores needed 15 plays and 7:20 to cover just 52 yards to set up Markham's game-tying 46-yard field goal attempt.

GAME Vanderbilt 6 Georgia 31

By Bill Trocchi Special From Commodore Report ATHENS, Ga.—Turnovers and punting problems dropped Vanderbilt into a big hole early against the Bulldogs, and the Commodores never recovered.

While there were not many bright spots for the Commodores, one was the emergence of redshirt freshman quarterback Greg Zolman, who saw his first meaningful action of the season when he was inserted in the second quarter with Vanderbilt trailing 24-0.

Zolman went on to complete 13 of 21 passes for 162 yards and one touchdown, moving the offense better than his predecessor, freshman David Wallace, who completed 8 of 15 passes.

The performance led Zolman to the starting assignment for the next two games before an injury sidelined him for the Florida game. He resumed his starting role in the final two games of the season.

Zolman hooked up with Adam Ditto for a 36-yard touchdown midway through the third quarter, the first touchdown in both of their careers. The toss came with Vanderbilt trailing 31-0 and closed out the scoring on the day.

Vanderbilt running backs Jared McGrath, Rodney Williams and Lew Thomas combined for 166 yards on 34 carries for a 4.9 average.

Georgia's two-way star Champ Bailey scored two touchdowns for the Bulldogs, including a 44-yard pass from Jon England in the third quarter that essentially put the game away.

Georgia built a 24-point first-half lead courtesy of a muffed punt by Webb, a fumbled kickoff by Lew Thomas and a blocked punt that was returned for a touchdown by Glenn Ford.

SAME S. Carolina ...14 Vanderbilt 17

NASHVILLE—It is offensive
coordinator Steve Crosby's favorite
play. He's been waiting to call it all
season. It's called 'Victory.' The
quarterback simply takes a knee
and watches the clock wind down.

Vanderbilt quarterback Greg Zolman ran the play to perfection as 'Victory' ended the game. And it started a celebration.

"Oh, man. It's outstanding," said senior defensive tackle Alphonso Harvey. "I feel three and a half years of bad memories have been erased."

Bad memories weren't the only thing erased. Vanderbilt's 17-14 win over South Carolina was the Commodores' first win in 11 games and it ended a 22-game SEC losing streak.

Zolman, making the first start of his career, enjoyed the most productive day for a Vanderbilt quarterback this decade. He completed 15 of 29 for 279 yards, the most by a Commodore since John Gromos threw for 299 yards against Georgia in 1989.

"He was splendid at times and forced at times," said head coach Woody Widenhofer. "But he took them down on the winning drive. I thought it was a pretty gutty performance."

Zolman engineered a nifty sixplay, 80-yard drive to put the Commodores ahead midway through the fourth quarter. He was 3-for-3 for 71 yards on the drive, hooking up with Tavarus Hogans for 15 yards, Nezih Hasanoglu for 15 yards and Elliott Carson for 41 yards on a beautifully executed tight end screen.

Two plays later Jared McGrath dove in untouched from the one to give the Commodores their first fourth-quarter SEC lead since November of 1995.

"That was a great drive," Zolman said. "The coaches made great calls and we executed when we needed to execute."

South Carolina, also searching for its first league win, had two more chances to regain the lead.

The Gamecocks managed three first downs on their next possession, but their drive was stopped at their own 31 yard line. Senior Damien Charley came up with the key defensive play, dropping quarterback Anthony Wright for a nine-yard loss on first down at the 45.

Vanderbilt had an opportunity to work precious time of the clock on its next drive, but two penalties—both illegal blocks in the back—negated positive plays. The Commodores were forced to punt, after running just 91 seconds off the clock.

South Carolina had one final chance, taking over at its own 23 with 4:21 remaining. The Gamecocks worked the ball to midfield, but the Vanderbilt defense stiffened.

Wright hooked up with running back Boo Williams on first down at the VU 43, but safety Ainsley Battles dropped Williams for a two-yard loss. Wright then missed on three straight passes, the final attempt batted away by free safety Jamail Carter with 16 seconds remaining.

"I was thinking about the TCU game on every play (of the final drive)," said linebacker Jamie Winborn. "I made sure everybody on defense gave their whole effort on every play. We were not going to let them get into field goal range. We were not going to let the game go into overtime."



Special From Commodore Report NASHVILLE—One week after Vanderbilt Stadium resembled a carnival, it turned into a rollercoaster. And at the end of the ride, the Commodores may have felt a little queasy, but exhilarated nonetheless at the first two-game winning streak in three years.

Big plays were tossed around like little pieces of Halloween candy all afternoon in the Commodores' 36-33 double-overtime win. But there were two in the second overtime that determined the game.

The first came on the first play of Duke's possession. Freshman linebacker Jamie Winborn broke through on a blitz and sacked Duke quarterback Bobby Campbell, forcing a fumble which Winborn quickly pounced on. Just like that, the Duke possession was done, and Vanderbilt needed just three points to win its second dramatic game in as many weeks.

Just as he did at TCU earlier in the season, Widenhofer sent out the field goal unit on first down. Unlike at TCU, however, Widenhofer called a fake. Holder Billy Miller sprinted around the right end for nine yards on first down, setting Vanderbilt up at the Duke 16. The offense then trotted on to the field for one play—a 14yard run by Jared McGrath.

The field goal unit returned with the ball at the two, and kicker John Markham banged through the winning field goal, touching off the second wild celebration at Vanderbilt Stadium in as many weeks.

"Overtime games are killer on both teams because there is so much pressure," said Vanderbilt tackle Clay Condrey. "There is so much emotion."

The game did not appear headed for overtime early in the third quarter. Duke had possession of the ball, trailing 30-13 when Winborn drilled Campbell from behind on a sack, knocking the ball loose. Vanderbilt's Matt Stewart scooped up the ball at the Duke 26-yard line and sprinted into the end zone for an apparent touchdown and an even larger Vanderbilt lead.

But referee Ron Cherry saw the play differently and determined Stewart illegally batted the ball toward the goal line in his attempt to scoop up the fumble. What looked like a 36-13 lead with an extra point pending turned into a 15-yard penalty against Vanderbilt and a first-and-10 for Duke at midfield.

The Vanderbilt crowd violently booed after every play for the rest of Duke's possession, which ended in a 52-yard field goal by Sims Lenhardt, his second 50-plus field goal of the day.

Duke eventually closed the gap to 30-23 and then mounted a dramatic game-tying drive. The Blue Devils converted a third-and-six, a fourth-and-16 (on a questionable pass interference call) and a fourth-and-10 on its way to the end zone and a 30-30 tie with 3:12 remaining.

The fun was just beginning.

GAME Vanderbilt 17 Kentucky 55

Special From Commodore Report LEXINGTON, Ky.—The chants came rolling down from the Kentucky faithful in the waning moments last Saturday.

"One more vear." they pleaded. "One more year."

After the passing clinic Tim against Couch put on the Commodores, one could understand the sentiment.

Couch, the junior superstar who would leave early for the NFL, lit the Commodores up like a pinball machine, completing a remarkable 44 of 53 passes for 492 vards and five touchdowns.

Whatever you want to call it— Basketball on Grass, Air Raid 2 or Mummeball—the Kentucky attack was something to behold on Saturday. The Wildcats ended the day with 679 yards and six touchdowns against a beleaguered Vanderbilt defense that afterwards had no choice but to give testimony to Kentucky's offensive prowess.

"We gave up some big plays," said noseguard Ryan Aulds. "You can't do that against Kentucky because they have so much offensive firepower. They can put you down real quick if you slip up. It is really hard to defend a team with that kind of an offense."

The turning point came late in the first half with Kentucky leading 10-3. Vanderbilt attempted a fake punt at its own 24-yard line. For the first time in five tries this season, the fake failed, and Kentucky quickly scored on a Couch to Yeast pass two plays later.

The game quickly got out of control in the third quarter, which featured more points in 15 minutes any Vanderbilt-Kentucky game has seen since 1990 as the Wildcats tacked on 31 points.

unfortunately And, for Vanderbilt fans, there was no fourth-quarter suspense. After

escaping the Commodores by an average of 6.3 points the past three seasons, the top-ranked Volunteers crushed Vanderbilt 41-0 much to the delight of the majority of the 41,600 orange-tinted fans packed into Vanderbilt Stadium.

"They are a well-deserving No. 1," said Woody Widenhofer. "In the four years I have been here, that is the toughest football team they have had. When they made the switch from Peyton Manning to Tee Martin (at quarterback), that made them get more physical and run the football."

Tennessee used a steady diet of running back Travis Henry, mixed in with an efficient passing attack, to wear down the Vanderbilt defense. Henry, filling in very well for the injured Jamal Lewis, rushed for 136 yards.

The Volunteer defense, ranked just fifth in the SEC, limited the Commodores to just 174 yards, VU's lowest total since the second week of the season.
