ELEVEN 'DORE STORYLINES

How Does Brian Stamper Return From Injury?

Coaches and teammates will be looking to see the progress of Stamper, a current captain and three-year starter who missed much of the 2006 season with a back injury that required surgery.

WHO STEPS UP AT WEAKSIDE LINEBACKER?

Which linebacker will step forward to claim the vacancy left by Kevin Joyce's graduation? Sophomore Brandon Bryant and Patrick Benoist are leading candidates.

HOW MUCH WILL CHRIS NICKSON PROGRESS?

By the end of his first year as a starter, Nickson was among the SEC's finest multi-dimensional quarterbacks. This spring, Nickson needs to take his game to the next level.

WHAT WILL JEFF JENNINGS' RETURN MEAN?

Jennings, an excellent inside-in-the-tackles runner, is back after missing the 2006 season with a knee injury. If he's totally recovered, the Commodores' running back corps gets loads deeper.

WHO STARTS AT CORNERBACK?

Four returnees with starting experience are back, and three talented youngsters are ready to compete.

WHICH POSITION CHANGES WILL HAVE MOST IMPACT?

The coaches have hinted at position experiments, but offered few concrete details.

HOW DO COMMODORES IMPROVE SPECIAL TEAMS?

Kicking and punting are just part of the equation. The squad needs upgrades in all phrases.

WHO WILL START NEXT TO DT THEO HORROCKS?

The top candidates are sophomore Greg Billinger and senior Gabe Hall. This spring, one gets the nod.

WHICH NEWCOMERS WILL FIND A KEY ROLE?

Fifteen freshmen spent '06 as redshirts. Who developed enough to help in 2007?

WHERE DOES DEPTH AT SAFETY COME FROM?

The coaches need to identify quality depth behind starters Reshard Langford and Ryan Hamilton.

WHO STEPS FORWARD IN LEADERSHIP ROLES?

Reshard Langford, Marcus Buggs, Theo Horrocks on defense... Earl Bennett, Chris Nickson, Hamilton Holliday on offense? There are lots of candidates.

Few Commodores Expected to Miss Contact in Spring Drills

Few Commodores will enter Spring Practice limited by injuries, a far different picture than one year ago.

Coach Johnson said **Brian Stamper** (R-Sr., OT) is the notable exception. Stamper, who is progressing extremely well from back surgery in October, will be evaluated throughout the spring session. **Darlron Spead** (R-So., DB) also will be monitored quickly coming off a successful recent knee procedure.

Last spring, several Commodores, including DE Curtis Gatewood, PK Bryant Hahnfeldt, CB Sean Dixon and TB Jeff Jennings, missed most or all of spring drills recuperating from injuries.

Commodore Replace Kent State with Miami (Ohio) on 2007 Schedule

The Commodores will play their first eight-game home schedule in more than 100 years in 2007, but one of the non-SEC opponents will be a different Mid-American Conference squad than originally believed.

On Tuesday, March 13, SEC and MAC officials announced that Vanderbilt would face Miami (Ohio) on Saturday, Oct. 27, in Nashville, instead of MAC member Kent State.

Vanderbilt and Miami (Ohio) have played twice previously, with Miami capturing the last meeting – a 33-30 thriller – during the 2000 season opener in Nashville.

SIX TO WATCH

- ★ THOMAS WELCH, R-So., OFF. TACKLE Moved from TE in '06; promptly added 25 lbs. O-line is more versatile, deeper with Welch ready to play.
- ★ BRANDON BRYANT, R-So., LINEBACKER Bryant has all the tools, and needs a productive spring to make his case as a starter at weakside linebacker.
- ★ MYRON LEWIS, So., CORNERBACK Played safety and cornerback as a freshman, but observers think he could be a gifted cornerback for Commodores.
- ★ GREG BILLINGER, So., DEF. TACKLE Saw action as frosh; As consistency on the field improves, Billinger's role is likely to expand.
- ★ JUSTIN GREEN, R-FR., TIGHT END Limited at weight as a frosh, Green is up to 230 lbs., and potentially provides rare explosiveness at position.
- ★ BRENT TRICE, So., SAFETY Trice spent his first year learning the position nuisances. He gives the Commodores another physical presence at safety.

COMMODORE CAREER STARTS

The Commodore with more career starts than any other, offensive tackle **Brian Stamper** (R-Sr.) didn't play most of last year due to a back injury that required season-ending surgery.

Stamper, a captain in 2006, has started 36 games at offensive tackle over the last four years. He is the only Commodore with more than 30 career starting assignments.

Jonathan Goff (R-Sr.), also a captain from last year, has 28 consecutive starts, the most by an active Commodore. Goff has become a fixture at middle linebacker three years ago when inserted in the lineup for the Vanderbilt-LSU contest in Baton Rouge.

Twelve returnees – Goff, Earl Bennett (WR, Jr.), Marcus Buggs (LB, R-Sr.), Curtis Gatewood (DE, R-Sr.), Bryant Hahnfeldt (PK/Jr.), Hamilton Holliday (center, Sr.), Theo Horrocks (DT, Sr.), Cassen Jackson-Garrison (TB, Sr.), Reshard Langford (safety, R-Jr.), Chris Nickson (QB, R-Jr.), Brett Upson (P, So.) and Chris Williams (OT, R-Sr.) – started every game in 2006.

Spring Notes

Receiver Bennett Approaching SEC All-Time Records

Wide receiver Earl Bennett, Vanderbilt's first football All-America recipient in eight years, enters his junior season in a Commodore uniform within reach of Southeastern Conference career receiving records.

Bennett, who currently holds 10 school records and a pair of SEC marks, needs 48 receptions to overtake former Kentucky standout WR Craig Yeast as the SEC's career leader. The all-time receptions mark is one of several records seemingly within Bennett's grasp.

Bennett, a product of West End H.S. in Birmingham, Ala., has posted remarkable achievements in his first two years wearing Black & Gold. He followed a 79-reception campaign as a freshman in 2005 with an 82-catch performance (8th in the NCAA) last year, becoming the first player in SEC history to post at least 75 receptions in two different seasons.

Bennett's single-game accomplishments are amazing. In 23 career starts, he has caught at

least 10 passes in seven games, surpassed the 100-yard receiving plateau on seven occasions, and has six games of more than 150 receiving yards, topped by a 220-yard effort at Kentucky last year that is the most by SEC receiver in five years. In 2005, Bennett caught 16 passes against South Carolina, fourth most ever by a SEC player. That same year, he tied a 28-year-old SEC mark with five touchdown catches against Kentucky.

Bennett also is within reach of prominent Vanderbilt career receiving marks. Currently, Bennett ranks fourth in receptions (needing 40 catches), fifth in receiving yardage (942 yards shy of the record) and is tied for sixth in TD receptions (just six TD catches away from breaking the current mark).

Goff Among SEC's Top Returning Tacklers

Middle linebacker Jonathan Goff (Lynn, Mass.) ranks among the Southeastern Conference leaders in two key tackle statistical categories entering his fifth and final Commodore season.

Goff, a 2006 co-captain, ranks third among active SEC defensive players with 194 career tackles, trailing Kentucky's Wesley Woodyard (256) and Tennessee's Jonathan Hefney (226).

Goff also ranks third in career solo tackles with 141. Woodyard and Hefney also are ahead of Goff in this category.

Goff, named second-team All-SEC linebacker by the coaches last year, has started 28 consecutive games, the longest current streak on the Commodore roster.

Despite returning 17 starters from a year ago, Vanderbilt will go into Spring Practice "looking to put the best players on the field," Commodore Head Coach Bobby Johnson said.

"We have a lot of starters coming back this season, but we have to keep improving across the board. That's our No. 1 goal, to keep getting better in every phase with every practice," Johnson said. "The staff will be evaluating every area of our team, searching for the right combinations to make us better as we approach the 2007 season. We're committed to putting the best players on the field."

Johnson's Commodores return nine offensive starters, including such standouts as junior All-America wide receiver Earl Bennett, senior All-Southeastern Conference tackle Chris Williams and junior quarterback Chris Nickson. On defense, eight starters return, including a nucleus of three seniors — All-SEC linebacker Jonathan Goff, defensive tackle Theo Horrock and defensive end Curtis Gatewood — and juniors Marcus Buggs at linebacker and Reshard Langford at safety. Placekicker Bryant Hahnfeldt and punter Brett Upson also are back.

The Vanderbilt staff needs to identify two starters on the defensive line and at outside linebacker while continuing to build depth through the roster.

The Commodores open spring drills March 13. The team's featured spring practice, the Black & Gold Scrimmage, is free to the public on Saturday, March 31.

THE COMMODORE OFFENSE

QUARTERBACK: One year ago, the Commodores entered Spring Practice seeking to replace Jay Cutler, arguably the greatest player of the modern Vanderbilt football era, with an untested and unproven prospect. What a difference one year makes.

The Commodores enter spring drills in 2007 with the quarterback position looking like an area of strength.

Leading the signal callers into Spring Practice is redshirt junior Chris Nickson (6-1, 210), who put together a remarkable campaign in 2006 as a first-time starter with little game experience. All Nickson did was throw for 2,085 yards and 15 touchdowns, hitting nearly 55 percent of his passes, while rushing for a team-high 694 yards and nine scores. Just three guarterbacks in Vanderbilt history have compiled more total yardage in a season than Nickson's 2,779-yard accumulation.

The coaches are looking for Nickson to take his game up a notch this spring. They're looking for veteran decision making from Nickson, better passing accuracy, fewer mistakes that lead to turnovers, and greater efficiency in short yardage and red-zone situations.

The quarterback competition features three other solid candidates: Mackenzi Adams (6-2, 208, R-So.), Richard Kovalcheck (6-2, 222, R-Sr.) and **Jared Funk** (6-2, 200, R-Fr.). One of the top athletes on the Commodore roster, Adams looked good in limited duty last year, showing an ability to manage the offense while producing vards equally with his arm and legs. Kovalcheck joined the Commodores in the 2006 preseason, transferring from the University of Arizona where he started games over portions of two varsity seasons. Kovalcheck might own the strongest and most accurate arm of the four quarterback prospects. Funk enters Spring Practice as the wild card, coming into the session strengthened by Vanderbilt's off-season conditioning program for redshirt freshmen and more familiar with the Commodore offense after a year in the program.

RUNNING BACKS: This should be an interesting Spring Practice for the Commodores' deep and talented running back corps.

While the two top performers from last year's one-back set return in Cassen Jackson-Garrison (6-1, 220, Sr.) and Jared Hawkins (5-10, 192), the most watched back might be a guy that didn't play last year, Jeff Jennings (6-1, 222. R-Jr.).

Jennings missed the entire 2006 season recuperating from a knee injury that occurred late in the 2005 season. Jennings has completed a rigorous rehabilitation, and looks ready to contend for the starting job he owned two years ago. If he is back to the Jennings of '05 form, the Commodores are simply a better team, no question, Each of Jennings' strengths - running downhill inside the tackles and on key third and short first-down plays, catching the football out of the backfield and blocking blitzing linebackers - were occa-

sional problem areas with the Commodore attack last year. A healthy Jennings also pushes Jackson-Garrison and Hawkins to improve.

Jackson-Garrison started every game last year, showing plenty of grit by playing the season opener at Michigan less than three weeks after undergoing an emergency appendectomy. He set single-season career highs in rushing yards, attempts and receptions.

The powerful Hawkins was a productive rusher throughout his redshirt freshman campaign. He averaged nearly seven yards a carry, displaying an awesome ability to read teammates' blocks. Hawkins' game will expand as he becomes a more deft blocker in passing situations and a more dangerous receiving option out of the backfield.

Two other candidates at running back, **Gaston Miller** (5-7, 165, So.) and **Kennard Reeves** (5-11, 195, R-Fr.) will attempt to catch the eye of coaches this spring.

WIDE RECEIVERS: The wide receiving corps is topped by sophomore **Earl Bennett** (6-1, 202), the two-time All-Southeastern Conference recipient who is in the midst of a career that could go down as one of the finest in Vanderbilt and SEC history. Bennett racked up huge statistics for the second straight year in 2006 – 82 catches, 1,146 receiving yards, six touchdowns. As Bennett prepares for the 2007 opener, he stands just 48 receptions shy of the all-time SEC record.

Bennett is supported by **George Smith** (6-3, 195, R-Jr.) and **Sean Walker** (6-0, 180, R-Jr.). Smith averaged nearly 15 yards a catch as the team's No. 3 receiver in 2006 while Walker was one of the most pleasant Commodore surprises a year ago, catching 16 passes as a receiver and scoring a touchdown as a speedy specialist on reverses.

Bryant Anderson (6-3, 210, R-Jr.,), Alex Washington (5-10, 180, R-So.) and Justin Wheeler (6-0, 180, R-So.) will get an opportunity this spring to showcase their receiving targets. Other prospects at wide receiver include Larry Simmons (5-10, 165, R-So.), Chris Reinert (5-9, 185, Jr.) and Steven Goulet (6-2, 180, R-Fr.).

TIGHT ENDS/H-BACK: Brad Allen (6-4, 240, R-Jr.) and Jake Bradford (6-

6, 260, R-So.) will compete for the starting tight end/H-back role this spring. Both saw quality playing time at the position last year.

The development of **Justin Green** (6-7, 230, R-Fr.) will be interesting to watch this spring. As Green matures, he offers options for the Commodore offense that are unique to the roster. Walk-on **Matt Bubis** (6-0, 240, Jr.) also will get spring repetitions at the H-back slot.

OFFENSIVE LINE: Despite the losses of versatile linemen Mac Pyle and Elliot Hood, the Commodores appear to have solid depth on the offensive front, especially if **Brian Stamper** (6-5, 295, R-Sr.) returns healthy following back surgery that came late in the 2006 season. With a productive Stamper, the Commodores could return five senior starters up front. Without Stamper, the squad will need a couple of newcomers to solidify the unit.

If Stamper returns to full health, Vanderbilt possesses a pair of superb bookend tackles. Stamper earned second-team All-Southeastern Conference two years ago at right tackle. His counterpart across the line, **Chris Williams** (6-6, 315, R-Sr.), earned second-team All-SEC recognition last year and owns a rare blend of strength and agility to go with an excellent frame.

In the middle, the Commodores bring back durable **Hamilton Holliday** (6-3, 290, Sr.) at center. Holliday was one of the team's most pleasant surprises in 2006. As a first year starter who played virtually every offensive snap, Holliday was efficient as a blocker while making few mental errors.

Two redshirt seniors, **Merritt Kirchoffer** (6-5, 320) and **Josh Eames** (6-5, 310), started more than half of the 2006 season at left and right guard, respectively. Kirchoffer has the athleticism to be a standout and played well last year until suffering upper arm injuries midway through the season. Eames is arguably the best blocking technician on the line, but needs to come back from a late-season leg injury that forced him out of the lineup for nearly a month.

Two redshirt sophomores, **Brad Vierling** (6-3, 290) and **Ryan Custer** (6-4, 295), are versatile players with the ability to move into the starting lineup. Vierling has experience at guard and center, while Custer can play either guard slot, and could get a spring look across the line at defensive tackle.


COMMODORES IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Spring Outlook

Two offensive line prospects to watch this spring are tackles **Thomas Welch** (6-6, 280, R-So.) and **Eric Hensley** (6-6, 305, R-So.). Welch is an athletic big man who decided to move from tight end last year to aid the Commodores' sagging depth up front. He enters Spring Practice 20 pounds heavier than a year ago, and much stronger off excellent off-season conditioning. Hensley also moved forward since the 2006 season, impressing strength coaches with his drive to improve in the weight room and on the practice field. Several other young prospects, including **Drew Gardner** (6-5, 305, R-So.), **Ryan Vance** (6-3, 280, R-So.) and walk-on **Nick Forte** (6-2, 290, So.), will try to show coaches this spring that they deserve consideration for playing time.

THE COMMODORE DEFENSE

TACKLES: The interior leader is **Theo Horrocks** (6-3, 295, Sr.), a two-year starter and one of the most productive Commodore tackles in several years. The All-Southeastern Conference caliber Horrocks goes as hard as he can every snap, and continues to improve with each season. Last year, he posted career numbers in virtually every statistical category, ranking among the team leaders in forced fumbles, sacks, tackles for loss and total tackles. Horrocks also was a workhorse inside, playing more than 90 percent of the defensive snaps.

The coaching staff will use spring drills to evaluate several candidates hoping to replace graduated Ray Brown as the tackle slot next to Horrocks. **Gabe Hall** (6-1, 288, Sr.), one of the strongest players on the Vanderbilt roster, and **Greg Billinger** (6-3, 290, So.) are the most likely prospects to earn the opening. Hall played well for the Commodores early in the 2006 season only to become limited by injuries as the season wore on. With Hall sidelined, the inexperienced Billinger moved into a role spelling Brown.

Two other returnees, **Brandon Holmes** (6-4, 295, R-Jr.) and **Derrius Dowell** (6-3, 280, R-So.) have a chance to secure playing time this spring.

DEFENSIVE ENDS: Curtis Gatewood (6-3, 245, R-Sr.) is back after posting a superb season last year as a first-year starter. Gatewood displayed an off-the-edge quickness and toughness to take on 300-pound tackles as a junior,

exiting the season with seven sacks, three forced fumbles and 36 solo tackles. Gatewood is positioned for All-SEC consideration if he continues to improve.

Across from Gatewood, Commodore coaches need to identify a replacement for graduate starter Chris Booker this spring. A pair of talented redshirt sophomores, **Broderick Stewart** (6-5, 225) and **Steven Stone** (6-6, 255), are expected to compete for the starting role. Stewart was a big-play specialist last year, contributing five sacks while Stone produced 6.5 tackles for loss among his 24 total tackles.

David Whittington (6-2, 250, R-Jr.) and a pair of former linebackers, **Quavian Lewis** (6-3, 225, R-So.), **Teriall Brannon** (6-3, 230, R-Fr.) and **Kikko Logan** (6-2, 230, R-Fr.), will get a chance in spring drills to make their case for playing time at defensive end. Walk-on **David Leinweber** (6-5, 250, Jr.) also will get repetitions.

LINEBACKERS: All-America candidate **Jonathan Goff** (6-4, 235, R-Sr.) is a physical presence for the Commodores from his middle linebacker position and one of the top defensive players in the Southeastern Conference. Goff and strongside linebacker **Marcus Buggs** (5-11, 235, R-Sr.) give the squad a pair of solid performers and excellent leaders returning for their final year wearing black and gold.

Goff, highly regarded by NFL draft experts, continues the superb Commodore tradition at linebacker, and enters 2007 having started 27 consecutive games. Goff is the Commodores' active career leader with 194 total tackles. Goff enters spring drills in superb condition, five pounds lighter than a year ago.

Buggs became a vocal leader and impact hitter as a first-year starter in 2006. He should continue to blossom, and like Goff, serves as an excellent example at practice for the more inexperienced linebackers.

One of the top items this spring will be the competition to replace graduated Kevin Joyce at weakside linebacker. The staff will evaluate several candidates, including **Brandon Bryant** (6-1, 230, R-So.), **Patrick Benoist** (6-0, 215, So.), **Chris Johnson** (6-1, 230, R-So.), **Nathan Campbell** (6-3, 228, R-Fr.) and **Austin Newton** (6-2, 215, R-Fr.). The athletic Bryant contributed 18 tackles in a reserve role last year while Benoist was creating a key role for himself

as a freshman in 2006 before missing the last five games to injury. Johnson enters spring drills needing a strong showing to propel his Commodore career forward while the coaches were impressed with the practice abilities of Campbell and Newton as redshirt freshmen last year. Others, including walkons Dom Morais (5-11, 220, Sr.), and Bo Baggarley (6-1, 210, Jr.), also will compete this spring for playing time next fall.

SAFETIES: Vanderbilt returns an excellent young starting pair of safeties, but need to identify more depth at the position in spring drills.

The leader is two-year starting strong safety **Reshard Langford** (6-2, 215, R-Jr.), an All-Southeastern Conference caliber player who blends a knack for the football with a hard-hitting style rarely witnessed on the Commodore campus. Langford also gives the secondary an outstanding field leader.

Ryan Hamilton (6-1, 205, R-So.) returns after earning a starting job at free safety in '06. Hamilton struggled in the early season, learned from his mistakes, and became a solid contributor in the second half of the season.

The staff expects Brent Trice (6-2, 205, So.) to blossom in his first Spring Practice. The physical Trice worked his way into a second-team playing role behind Langford as a true freshman.

The Commodores lack experience behind Langford, Hamilton and Trice, and will look to walk-on **Roger Herndon** (5-11, 200, R-So.) and prehaps a player with cornerback experience to accept a bigger role at safety.

CORNERBACKS: One of the Commodores' deepest positions, five young cornerbacks with a bounty of experience are back vying for playing time this spring, along with three solid untested prospects.

Both starters from a year ago, **D.J. Moore** (5-10, 175, So.) and **Joel** Caldwell (6-1, 185, R-So.), are back after getting a taste of Southeastern Conference intensity as freshmen performers. While Moore and Caldwell periodically struggled in their initial year, each showed plenty of talent and should improve substantially in their second year of action. The Commodores also return two experienced redshirt juniors, Josh Allen (5-9, 182) and Jared Fagan (5-9, 180). Allen finished the 2006 season back in the starting lineup while Fagan's minutes increased as the season endured.

The Commodores' experienced cornerbacks will be pushed by a trio of largely talented newcomers. Myron Lewis (6-2, 195, So.) showed talent in a limited role last year, and could blossom as he competes for more time this spring, A pair of redshirt freshmen, Marquez Hall (5-9, 165) and Alan Strong (5-9, 175), impressed coaches and teammates on the practice field last year and enter Spring Practice with the benefit of an excellent off-season conditioning effort.

Dariron Spead (5-10, 185, R-So.), a superb open-field tackler, was the Commodores' top nickelback from a year ago. He could be limited as spring drills open recuperating from an off-season knee procedure.

THE COMMODORE SPECIAL TEAMS

With experienced performers returning at virtually every position, Vanderbilt needs special teams to become an area of strength if the squad plans to improve of its 4-8 season from a year ago.

PLACEKICKERS: The Commodores return a two-year starter **Bryant** Hahnfeldt (5-11, 180). The junior struggled at times last year, making eight of 17 field goals, but came back just nine months after undergoing knee surgery. With the injury another year in the past, Hahnfeldt enters Spring Practice more confident and stronger than a yar ago.

Hahnfeldt is the only Commodore kicking prospect with collegiate experience. Other kicking candidates include walk-ons Thomas Carroll (5-9, 165, R-So.) and John Laughrey (6-0, 180, R-Fr.).

PUNTERS: Sophomore **Brett Upson** (5-10, 175) is back after serving as the team's No. 1 punter as a true freshman. The first-year experience should help Upson, who started strongly only to slump toward the end of the year. One of Upson's top assets last year with solid hang time, with opponents averaging less than six yards per return.

Upson's main competition could come from Hahnfeldt, who was the Commodores' primary punter as a freshman in 2005 before suffering the knee injury.



Head Coach Bobby Johnson

As Bobby Johnson enters his sixth Spring Practice at Vanderbilt, his personal commitment to character, integrity, effort and playing the game of football with passion has become a focus of the Commodore program.

In five years, Johnson has directed a transformation of the program that has the student-athletes of Vanderbilt football positioned to succeed on and off the playing field. In the last two years, Johnson's squad has been more competitive than Commodore teams in nearly a decade. Though his last two teams narrowly missed bowl appearances, they did garner nine victories, including road wins at three of the Southeastern Conference's toughest venues – Arkansas, Tennessee and Georgia.


As Johnson continues to reshape the program, his impact on the 2007 squad will be more pronounced than ever before. The team, through Johnson's recruiting effort and a systematic program aimed at fully developing each student-athlete, is becoming the type of squad Johnson believes can compete effectively and consistently in one of America's premier conferences.

Nothing short of reaching that standard will satisfy Bobby Johnson, one of the NCAA's most highly respected coaches. Johnson expects a winner, on and off the football field. And he expects his players to believe they can achieve success, on and off the field.

Six years ago, Johnson walked onto the Vanderbilt campus after leading his Furman squad to the NCAA I-AA national championship game. When he accepted the Vanderbilt position, he came with a plan for success, built on the belief that the Commodores would succeed competitively only if each student-athlete, coach and member of the Vanderbilt football family worked to get better each day. Johnson's plan for success placed as much emphasis on coaches' effort in recruiting as it did players' conditioning – everyone associated with the program had to get better.

Johnson's plan is showing dividends. The Commodore coaching staff, from coordinators to strength staff, almost mirrors the group Johnson selected in his first months on campus. When the only two coaching vacancies during Johnson's tenure became available, he acted quickly to attract highly qualified replacements in offensive assistant Kenny Carter from Penn State and defensive line specialist Rick Logo from Troy. Last year, he expanded the roles of four current members of the staff. With head conditioning coach John Sisk, Johnson has witnessed a revival of the the Commodores conditioning program. An expansion in facility upgrades is occurring. The Vanderbilt locker room and adjoining Corridor of Captains is a showcase for both players and visitors. Commodore student-athletes lift weights and practice in state-of-theart facilities that did not exist prior to Johnson's arrival at Vanderbilt. The head coach has even enhanced the way players and coaches study game film by installing the latest in video and computer technologies.

The goal of winning football games at Vanderbilt is a formidable task for any coach. In 2005, Johnson directed his Commodores to their best record in years. The squad's five victories, which included three on the road, were the most by a Vanderbilt squad in seven seasons. Three wins in SEC play were the most by a Vanderbilt team since the league went to divisional play in 1992. Last year, Commodore fans watched their team play eventual national Florida, SEC West champion Arkansas and Alabama toe-to-toe, then go to Athens, Ga., and earn a thrilling win in front of 92,000 Georgia fans.


College football observers are taking notice of Johnson's efforts. Several Commodores are earning individual accolades. Three current Commodore starters, including All-America wide receiver Earl Bennett, earned All-SEC recognition last year. Experts believe Bennett, senior linebacker Jonathan Goff and senior offensive tackle Chris Williams may be among the nation's elite at their positions. In 2005, four-year starting quarterback Jay Cutler rewrote Vanderbilt record books, and eventually became the No. 11 overall pick of the Denver Broncos. Last year, Chris Nickson put together one of the finest seasons ever by a Commodore signal caller following Cutler, the 2005 SEC Offensive Player of the Year.

In his five-year tenure, Johnson's mentoring and straight-forward approach has had a positive impact on the Vanderbilt student-athletes, both on and off the field. Under Johnson, nine Commodores have earned All-SEC recognition. Johnson has produced 11 freshmen All-SEC selections, including Vanderbilt's first SEC Freshman of the Year in 2002. Off the field, the Commodores lead the conference in Academic Honor Roll recognition, with more than 20 earning that recognition last year. In recent years, cornerback Andrew Pace and fullback Clark Lea have been nominated for national awards. In 2002, line-backer Hunter Hillenmeyer earned the prestigious National Scholar Athlete

The national media have taken notice of Johnson's tenure at Vanderbilt. Last year, Johnson's Commodores opened the college football season for ESPN, traveling to Ann Arbor to play nationally regarded Michigan. In the last two years, 10 Vanderbilt games have been regionally or nationally televised. Numerous media outlets, from the *New York Times* and *Atlanta Journal*

The nation is taking notice of Johnson's Commodores. In 2006, Vanderbilt opened ESPN's college football coverage against Michigan.

Constitution to ESPN's SportsCenter and College Football GameDay, have featured the Commodores' progress and Johnson's approach to coaching.

The South Carolina native arrived at Vanderbilt in December 2001 from Furman University, armed with the ideal combination of professional success and personal well-being to turn the Commodores into winners. He left few accomplishments unfulfilled at Furman.

During an eight-year reign as head coach, Johnson guided the Paladins to a 60-36 overall record, a NCAA I-AA national runner-up finish, four NCAA appearances and a pair of Southern Conference titles. He mentored an abundance of All-Americans, including 2000 Walter Payton Award winner Louis lvory.

Johnson directed Furman to the pinnacle of success in 2001, culminating a tremendous rebuilding job by the head coach. The Paladins claimed a share of the Southern Conference, then scored three playoff wins to reach the I-AA national championship for the first time since 1988. In his last game directing the Paladins, Furman narrowly fell to No. 1 ranked Montana in the I-AA national title game.

Johnson's professional reputation is built on years of squeezing the most out of his players' abilities while urging them to put forth maximum effort on and off the field. His career has included roles as an academic advisor and admission office liaison. Academic achievement by his players remains a key element of his philosophy.

Johnson's coaching career, which covers 30 years, began in 1976 as defensive ends coach at Furman. In 1980, Johnson left the university to serve as an academic counselor at his alma mater, Clemson, but he returned

to Furman the following year. In 1983, he added the responsibility of defensive coordinator. In 1993, he accepted a similar position at Clemson. During his tenure as defensive coordinator at Furman, the Paladins were 91-31-3, claimed

Warren Belin, a 18-year veteran of collegiate coaching, enters his sixth year mentoring the Commodores' linebacking corps. Prior to the 2006 season, Belin also added Special Teams Coordinator responsibilities to his duties.

In each of Belin's years with the Commodores, he has coached stellar linebackers. Last year, his junior pupil Jonathan Goff ranked among the Southeastern Conference leaders in several defensive categories. Goff also was an All-SEC freshman selection in 2004. Outside linebacker Moses Osemwegie was named first team All-SEC by the coaches' in 2004 and 2005, finishing his collegiate career as the league's active leading tackler. Before that, middle linebacker Hunter Hillenmeyer earned the National Student Athlete Award while leading the SEC in tackles and wining all-league honors. Last winter, Hillenmeyer started for the Chicago Bears in the Super Bowl.

Belin came to Vanderbilt from SMU, where he continued the school's strong linebacking reputation. At least one Mustang linebacker was named All-Western Athletic Conference each year of Belin's service. Three pupils - Vic Viloria, Jason Simonton and Chris Bordano - were named All-WAC linebackers during Belin's tenure. Bordano was drafted by the NFL's New Orleans Saints.

Prior to joining SMU, Belin worked as an defensive assistant at William & Mary, serving as defensive line coach in 1995 and linebackers coach in 1996. He also served three years as a linebackers coach at Cornell (1991, 1993-94) and a year as linebackers coach at East Tennessee State in 1992.

A native of Marshville, North Carolina, Belin was a three-year starter and four-year letter winner at Wake Forest from 1987-90. He earned a bachelor's degree in Health and Sports Science from Wake Forest, graduating cum laude. He was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference All-Academic Team in 1990, and was a two-time ACC Academic Honor Roll recipient. Belin is active in FCA.

Belin is married to the former Yolanda Taylor. They are the parents of a daughter, Camryn, 5; and 2-year-old twin daughters, Morgan and MacKenzi.

Jamie Bryant

Jamie Bryant is in his sixth year as the defensive secondary coach for the Commodores. He joined the Vanderbilt staff after serving a year at the University of North Carolina.

Bryant's secondary personnel is headed by junor safety Reshard Langford, a defensive team leader and 2005 Freshman All-Southeastern Conference pick.

In 2006, Bryant's secondary was one of the nation's youngest corps, featuring a sophomore (Langford) and three freshmen starters. In multiwide receiver formulations, the Commodore nickelback was another freshman.

Despite the youth, Bryant had the unit ranked among the SEC leaders in pass defense for much of the season.

Bryant, 36, came to Vanderbilt after working one season at North Carolina with current Commodore assistant head coach and offensive line coach Robbie Caldwell.

Bryant assisted at UNC after serving a year at St. Francis (Pa.) University. His coaching career also includes a three-year stint at Clarion (Pa.) University and five years of high school experience.

The Tar Heels finished strong in 2001, using an aggressive defense to win seven of their final nine regular season games and the Peach Bowl over Auburn, 16-10. The Tar Heels ranked first in the ACC - and 15th nationally - in total defense. They also topped the conference in pass efficiency defense.

Prior to joining UNC, Bryant's efforts as defensive coordinator and secondary coach improved a struggling defense at I-AA St. Francis.

Bryant entered the collegiate coaching ranks in 1997 as linebackers coach at Clarion. His duties at Clarion evolved to secondary coach and special teams coordinator for his final two seasons.

From 1992-96, Bryant coached at three Ohio high schools, including a three-year stint as head coach at East Clinton High.

Bryant, native of Fredericktown, Ohio, was a three-year letterman at Ohio Wesleyan, graduating in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in economics management.

He and his wife, Elisa, are the parents of a 1-year son, Luke.

Ted Cain

Ted Cain, a former assistant at Furman and I-AA head coach with 29 years of coaching experience, serves as offensive coordinator and tight ends coach for the Commodores. The first assistant hired by Bobby Johnson at Vanderbilt, Cain enters his sixth year on the staff.

Cain's tenure at Vanderbilt has produced some of the most potent offenses in Commodore history. The 2005 offense, directed by current Denver Bronco QB Jay Cutler, produced more points and first downs than any Commodore offense in the last three decades. The team's 395-yard total offense average has been bettered only once since World War II. Last year, the offense continued to develop under first-year starting quarterback Chris Nickson. One of the chief beneficiaries of the scheme has been junior receiver Earl Bennett, who enters the 2007 campaign needing less than 50 receptions to become the SEC's all-time leader.

Cain's coaching resume includes a two-year stint as head coach at Virginia Military Institute, a distinguished tenure as offensive coordinator at North Carolina State University and many years of coaching services at Furman University.

Cain was a three-year letterman at tight end for Furman. After serving a two-year term as an U.S. Army second lieutenant, Cain began his coaching career as outside linebackers coach at Furman in 1977. The next year, he moved across the line of scrimmage, coordinating the Furman passing game and receivers. He continued in that capacity for eight years, playing a key role in helping Furman produce a 69-23-2 overall record.

The success at Furman led to Cain's move to North Carolina State in 1986. While serving as offensive coordinator and tight ends coach with the Wolfpack, Cain director seven of the top 10 passing seasons in North Carolina State history.

In 1997, Cain accepted his first head coaching job at Virginia Military Institute. Although there just two seasons, Cain worked to improve facilities and renew a commitment to strength training. Cain rekindled his relationship with Furman in 1999. Since the return, Furman went 30-9, and won a pair of conference titles.

Cain earned a bachelor's degree in geology and a master's in education from Furman.

Cain and his wife, Susan, are the parents of two children: Matt, 24, a Commodore offensive graduate assistant coach; and Erin, 21, a junior at Furman.

Kenny Carter enters his fourth year on the Vanderbilt staff as running backs coach.

In 2006, Carter accepted a larger role on the coaching staff, becoming the recruiting coordinator.

Last year, Carter mentored tailbacks Cassen Jackson-Garrison and Jared Hawkins, who combined for more than 900 rushing yards and eight touchdowns from the Commdoores' one-back set.

In 2005, he coached a youthful running back corps that included sophomore starter Jeff Jennings and Jackson-Garrison. Carter also directed the coaching of Steven Bright, who moved from quarterback to fullback/H-back. Bright become one of the Commodores' top offensive weapons as an aerial target out of the backfield. Jennings missed the 2006 season recuperating from a knee injury.

Carter joined Vanderbilt after coaching receivers at Penn State under legendary coach Joe Paterno. At Penn State, Carter was instrumental in the development of Bryant Johnson, a first-team All-Big Ten pick in 2002 and eventual first-round 2003 NFL draft choice of the Cardinals. Johnson ranks second all-time at Penn State with 2,008 career receiving yards and is fourth with 110 career receptions.

He has also served on coaching staffs at the University of Pittsburgh, LSU and the Citadel in addition to his tenure at Penn State.

Carter guided running backs at Pittsburgh under head coach Walt Harris, mentoring Kevan Barlow and Nick Goins. Barlow is a starter for the San Francisco 49ers while Goins started with the Carolina Panthers. Carter worked in the SEC in 1999, coaching outside linebackers at LSU.

A native of Camden, S.C., Carter served as a tight ends assistant at Furman in 1993, three years after graduating from the Citadel in Charleston. He returned to his alma mater in 1994, coaching there until joining the LSU staff. Carter served as assistant head coach at the Citadel during his tenure.

Carter is married to the former Bonnie Bridges. They are the parents of two children: Brey, 20, a sophomore at the Citadel, and Kennedy, 11.

Robbie Caldwell

Caldwell, a 30-year veteran of the collegiate coaching ranks, serves as Vanderbilt's assistant head coach and offensive line mentor. He enters his sixth year as a key member of the Commodore coaching staff.

In 2006, Caldwell patched together a youthful line corps decimated by injuries into a cohesive unit that allowed just 19 quarterback sacks on the season. He also mentored two of the SEC's brightest line products for 2007 in tackle Chris Williams and center Trey Holliday.

In 2005, Caldwell's unit provided solid protection for SEC Player of the Year Jay Cutler. The 2005 offense ranks among the all-time finest units to wear the Vanderbilt Black and Gold colors in terms of points, first downs and total offense. In 2004, Caldwell worked with All-SEC lineman Justin Geisinger, currently a member of the Tennessee Titans.

Before joining Vanderbilt, Caldwell, 52, served two years at North Carolina and 14 years at North Carolina State. His ties with Coach Johnson date back to his playing days and first coaching positions at Furman University.

At North Carolina State, Caldwell tutored the offensive line for 11 years, then had the added responsibility of assistant head coach from 1997-99. Caldwell coached 14 Wolfpack linemen to all All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors, and helped guide six of the top 10 total offenses in North Carolina State history.

Prior to joining the North Carolina State staff, Caldwell coached the offensive line at Furman from 1978-85, and served the university as a graduate assistant in 1976. He coached football and baseball at Hanahan (S.C.) H.S. in 1977.

At Furman, Caldwell coached six Southern Conference champion teams, including the national runnerup in 1985. Eight of his pupils at Furman were named first-team All-Southern Conference, and five captured the conference's Jacobs Blocking Award during his tenure.

Caldwell, a native of Pageland, S.C., was a three-year letterman at center for Furman, and was named the team's MVP in 1975. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in health and physical education in 1976.

Caldwell is married to the former Nora Lynn Lassister of Arlington, Va. They are the parents of a daughter, Emsley, 12.

Charlie Fisher

Charlie Fisher, a former Division II head coach, enters his fourth season working with Commodore wide receivers and sixth year on the Vanderbilt staff. In 2006, Coach Johnson awarded Fisher's effort by adding the title of Passing Game Co-Coordinator.

In 2005 and 2006, Fisher has mentored wide receiver Earl Bennett to unprecedented campaigns. Twice named first team All-Southeastern Conference, Bennett caught 82 passes in 2006, second most in Vanderbilt history and earned the distinction of becoming the first receiver in SEC history to post two seasons of at least 75 receptions. In 2005, Bennett put together one of the greatest freshman receiving campaigns in league history, breaking the SEC freshman mark with 82 catches. He also set an abundance of freshman team marks.

Fisher's 2006 receiving corps included three others – Marlon White, George Smith and Sean Walker – with at least 16 catches.

In 2002-03, Fisher mentored Commodore running backs.

Prior to joining the Commodores, Fisher served two years as offensive coordinator and quarterback coach at Temple.

Fisher also was successful during a two-year stint tutoring wide receivers at North Carolina State. The Wolfpack passing attack led the ACC and ranked ninth nationally in 1998, averaging 309 yards per game.

Fisher's coaching background includes a successful tenure as head coach of West Georgia State prior to moving to North Carolina State. From 1993-97, Fisher guided the Braves to a 36-17 overall record, the highest five-year winning percentage in school history. He began his tenure at West Georgia as offensive coordinator in 1991. From 1985-1990, Fisher served as a position coach,and eventually, offensive coordinator at Lenoir-Rhyne (N.C.) College.

Fisher played from 1977-80 at Springfield (Mass.) College. He also lettered as a shortstop in baseball. He earned a degree in physical education. Fisher earned a master's in sports management from Eastern Kentucky in 1984.

Fisher is married to the former Julie Shaffer of Watsontown, Pa. They are the parents of two sons: Brian, 18, and Brett, 12.

Bruce Fowler, a long-time assistant for Coach Johnson, is in his sixth season as the Commodore defensive coordinator. In 2006, he also assisted new line coach Rick Logo with defensive ends.

Under Fowler's direction in 2006, the Commodore defense forced opponents to average fewer points, first downs and total yardage than the previous year. The unit ranked favorably with their Southeastern Conference's counterparts until late in the season when injuries took its toll on the Commodores' defensive personnel.

Fowler, 47, served as Bobby Johnson's defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Furman prior to joining the coach at Vanderbilt. Their relationship on the field dates to the late 1970s when Johnson was Fowler's position coach at Furman.

Fowler, a Cincinnati native, served 16 seasons on the Furman coaching staff after starting as a graduate assistant in 1984. His coaching responsibilities continuously progressed during his tenure at Furman. For the last three years, Fowler was defensive coordinator and linebackers coach for the Paladins. He mentored Furman All-American Will Bouton, the Southern Conference defensive player-of-the-year in 2000. Since 1999, the Furman defense has played a crucial role in the Paladins' 30-9 overall record, two conference championships, three consecutive NCAA playoff appearances and an I-AA national runnerup finish last year.

Prior to coaching Paladin linebackers, Fowler directed the Furman secondary for six years, coaching six All-Southern Conference performers, including consensus All-America safety and current 49er John Keith. Fowler moved to the Furman defensive staff after serving several years as an offensive assistant for receivers.

Fowler earned two varsity letters at Furman. He was a member of the Paladins' first Southern conference championship team in 1978, started in the defensive secondary in 1979, and played on Furman's 1980 conference champion. He earned a bachelor's degree in physical education and master's degree in physical education from Furman

Fowler is married to the former Lindy Gilman. They are the parents of a son, Jake, 12, and daughter, Madison, 10.

Jimmy Kiser

Jimmy Kiser brings more than two decades of collegiate coaching experience to the Vanderbilt staff. He is in his sixth year as quarterback coach and added the title of Passing Game Co-Coordinator in 2006.

Best known as the mentor of former Vanderbilt standout quarterback Jay Cutler, Kiser did another superb job in 2006 coaching first-year starter Chris Nickson. With little experience entering the season, Nickson put together one of the finest campaigns ever by a Commodore signal caller, passing for nearly 2,100 yards and 15 touchdowns while accumulating more than 2,700 yards of total offense.

Cutler, mentored by Kiser in each of his four playing years at Vanderbilt, became the all-time leader in virtually every Commodore passing category. He earned SEC Offensive Player of the Year and First Team All-SEC honors in 2006, and was selected 11th overall in the NFL Draft by Denver.

A native of Cleveland, Ohio, Kiser served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Richmond in 2001, and as quarterbacks coach at Memphis in 2000. Previously, he served more than a decade at North Carolina State.

Kiser, 49, started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Furman. After coaching three years at Dunwoody (Ga.) High School, Kiser worked two years at Lenoir-Rhyne (N.C.) College, serving as offensive coordinator.

In 1986, Kiser joined the North Carolina Stat, serving as receivers coach (1986-95), quarter-backs and receivers coach (1996) and offensive coordinator (1997-99). In 1997, North Carolina State ranked second in total offense in the Atlantic Coast Conference, then led the conferece in passing offense and total offense the next year.

In 2000, Kiser moved to Memphis where he coached the Tigers' quarterbacks. In 2001, he served as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Richmond.

Kiser won four varsity letters at Furman, graduating in 1979. He was named All-Southern Conference as a wide receiver as a senior. He earned a bachelor's degree in economics and business administration, graduating cum laude. In 1982, Kiser earned a master's from the Clemson/Furman joint MBA program.

Kiser and his wife, LeAnn, are the parents of four children: Anna Lee, 19, Jodi 18, Jamie, 16, and Kelly, 6.

Rick Logo is the newest member of the Vanderbilt coaching staff, entering his second year as the Commodores' defensive line coach.

Logo came to Vanderbilt from Troy (Ala.)
University where he formerly served as co-defensive coordinator.

In 2006, two of Logo's pupils at tackle, senior Ray Brown and junior Theo Horrocks, put together career years for the Commodore defensive unit. Horrocks ranked among team leaders in several categories, including total tackles, tackles for loss, sacks and quarterback hurries. He shared the SEC lead with four forced fumbles. Brown prospered in his first injury-free season, contributing 36 tackles and a pair of tackles for loss. Junior defensive end Curtis Gatewood was sensational in a breakout campaign that included seven sacks, eight tackles for loss, three forced fumbles and 49 total tackles.

In 2005, Logo served as co-defensive coordinator and defensive tackles coach for Larry Blakeney's Trojan staff. Logo mentored Troy's defensive line from 2002-2004, a tenure that culminated in the Trojans' Silicon Valley Bowl appearance. Logo mentored three Trojan linemen who signed NFL contracts as a coach at Troy.

He joined Troy following one year at Western Carolina where he served as assistant head coach and defensive line coach. Before that, he worked seven years as a defensive assistant at Chattanooga.

A native of Santa Ana, Calif., Logo played four seasons as a defensive tackle at North Carolina State from 1989-92. That Wolfpack staff guided by Dick Sheridan included three current Commodore coaches — assistant head coach Robbie Caldwell, offensive coordinator Ted Cain and guarterbacks coach Jimmy Kiser.

Logo was an All-SEC and third-team All-America recipient at N.C. State, helping the Wolfpack to four consecutive bowls appearances.

After graduating from N.C. State in 1992 with a degree in sociology, Logo signed a free-agent contract with the Detroit Lions but suffered a career-ending injury during his first season.

Logo is a 1988 graduate of Spencer High School in Columbus, Ga., where he was a standout in football, wrestling and track and field. At Spencer, Logo earned all-state honors in his junior and senior seasons in football
