VANDERBILT RE-VU

The Commodores recorded their 10th shutout of the season with a 4-0 win over MTSU on Tuesday night. Ryan Johnson dominated over eight scoreless innings to earn his fourth win of the year. Vanderbilt let a lead slip away in a 3-2 loss at South Carolina on Saturday. Jeren Kendall provided all the offense for the Dores with a solo homer and later scored after a leadoff double. The Commodores' bullpen faltered late in a 5-2 loss on Friday night at South Carolina. Rhett Wiseman drove in the Dores' only two runs. Vanderbilt used another scoreless outing from Carson Fulmer to record the Dores' ninth shutout of the year in a 12-0 win at South Carolina.

TAKING ON THE TIGERS

Vanderbilt welcomes Missouri to Hawkins Field for just the second time in history. The Commodores are 6-0 all time vs. the Tigers dating back two years to 2013. Vandy swept Missouri in the teams' first meeting at Hawkins Field and followed up with a sweep at Missouri last season. Carson Fulmer worked six innings on Saturday to clinch the series with his third win of the season last May. The Dores finished off their second straight SEC sweep on Sunday with a 3-1 win.

VANDY BLANKINGS

The Commodores lead the nation with 10 shutout victories this season already passing last season's total of eight shutouts. The Dores matched the school record set in 2004 on Tuesday night with a 4-0 shutout. Vanderbilt has used Carson Fulmer's strong starts each of the last two weeks to post shutouts of Ole Miss and South Carolina. Five of the team's shutouts this season have come during Fulmer's starts. Four other starting pitchers make up the difference with Kyle Wright starting two shutouts and Jordan Sheffield (Arkansas), Tyler Ferguson (Quinnipiac) and Ryan Johnson (MTSU) all starting one shutout each. Since 2011, Vandy has posted 33 blankings.

SWANSON ON BROOKS WALLACE AWARD WATCH LIST

Shortstop Dansby Swanson was named to the initial Brooks Wallace Award watch list. The award is given annually to the top shortstop in the nation by the College Baseball Hall of Fame. Swanson is one of five players from the Southeastern Conference on the list joining LSU's Alex Bregman, Alabama's Mikey White, Florida's Richie Martin and Georgia's Nick King. Swanson leads Vanderbilt in hits (58), doubles (14), triples (5), home runs (7), runs (51) and stolen bases (12) so far this season.

CLOSE LOSSES

Vanderbilt's recent struggles have seen the team drop four one-run games, accounting for four of the squad's losses over the last two weeks. Prior to the last two weeks, the Commodores were 7-2 in one-run games. The Dores have lost leads in all four one-run losses over the last two weeks, something they had done just three times prior to the recent slump. Vandy went 9-5 in one-run games last season.

HITTING RO-BOT

Ro Coleman has transformed into a hitting robot over the last 15 games with hits in 14 of them. Coleman is 24-for-68 (.353) with 10 runs scored and seven RBI during the stretch. The Vandy leadoff hitter has five multi-hit games over his last seven games, including a career-best four-hit night at South Carolina last Thursday when he finished a triple shy of the cycle. Over his last five games Coleman is 11-for-25 (.440) with four RBI and four runs scored.



Since Tim Corbin's arrival at Vanderbilt in 2003, no SEC school has sent more players into professional baseball with 77 Commodores being drafted by MLB teams.

Entering the 2015 season, the Commodores have more wins than any team in the SEC since 2011 with 194 victories.

The Commodores' impressive came to an end April 14. Vanderbilt had not lost three straight games since early in the 2012 season when the team dropped five straight (March 16-23). Since that five-game losing streak the Dores had played 216 games without losing three straight going 161-55 (.745). Among major league baseball's greatest teams only the 1902 National League champion Pittsburgh Pirates can match the Dores streak. The Pirates had no three-game losing streaks during their 103-36 campaign. The 1906 Chicago Cubs' and 2001 Seattle Mariners' teams that won 116 games apiece had one losing streak of at least three games something the 1998 (four losing streaks of at least three games) and 1927 (three) world champion Yankees could not accomplish.

VANDY ROSTER FEATURES FIVE PRESEASON ALL-AMERICANS

Five Commodores earned preseason All-American accolades led by juniors Walker Buehler, Carson Fulmer and Dansby Swanson. The trio have been selected as first team All-Americans by every media outlet that produces an All-American preseason team. Swanson was tabbed a second and third team All-American last season before capturing the Most Outstanding Player award at the College World Series. Sophomores Bryan Reynolds and Hayden Stone also picked up multiple preseason All-American nods after the duo earned Freshman All-American status last season.

BUEHLER, FULMER, SWANSON ON GOLDEN SPIKES LIST

Juniors Walker Buehler, Carson Fulmer and Dansby Swanson are all on the Golden Spikes Award watch list making Vanderbilt the only school in the nation with three players on the 50-player list. The trio leads a pack of a national-best 12 players from the Southeastern Conference. David Price is the only Commodore to ever win the award, picking up the national honor along with many others for his spectacular 2007 season that saw him strikeout a school record 194 batters.

KEY PIECES, EXPERIENCE BACK FOR DORES

An experienced roster takes the field for the Commodores this season with 17 returning lettermen on the 33-man roster. Vanderbilt returns a majority of the core of the national championship team from a year ago led by All-Americans Walker Buehler, Carson Fulmer, Bryan Reynolds, Hayden Stone and Dansby Swanson. Reynolds and Swanson led the team in hitting in 2014 with the 2015 roster bringing back 65% (426/655) of the team's hits from last season. The Dores were one of the leading teams in the country in doubles and return 105 of the team's 145 from last year (72.4%) along with 69 of the team's 120 stolen bases (80%) in 2014. On the mound, the trio of Buehler, Fulmer and Stone lead the way for a pitching staff that returns 60.2% (383/636) of the team's strikeouts, 60.7% (31/51) of the team's wins and 341.2 innings.

THE HOCKEY GUYS

Vanderbilt's roster is littered with multi-sport athletes but three freshmen on the team were standout hockey players prior to coming to West End. Tyler Green, Jeren Kendall and Will Toffey all had opportunities to play hockey past high school but chose the Black & Gold instead, including Toffey who turned down 2014 national champ Yale to attend VU.

VIVA LA DOMINICANA

The Commodores traveled to the Dominican Republic during Thanksgiving break last fall for a week of cultural emersion and baseball. The team played seven games against professional teams and spent time in a sugar cane village giving a clinic for the local children as well as doing community service. Vandy went 5-2 on the trip playing games against MLB Domincan Academy teams and two Dominican Winter League teams.

COMMODORE NOTES

COMMODORES PICKED TO WIN SEC

The coaches of the Southeastern Conference picked the Commodores to win the league in 2015 with 11 of the league's coaches picking Vanderbilt. Florida (2) and LSU (1) each received votes to claim the SEC title. The predicted order of finish in the SEC East: Vanderbilt, Florida, South Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia, Kentucky and Missouri. In the West division, LSU was picked to be the top team followed by Alabama, Texas A&M, Arkansas, Mississippi State, Ole Miss and Auburn.

CHAMPIONS' TOUR

Vanderbilt's national championship team was honored at multiple places in Nashville during the offseason. The team was recognized at a Tennessee Titans' game with Coach Corbin serving as the honorary 12th Titan. Vandy was also recognized at the Nashville Sounds, Nashville Predators and by the metro city council with a city resolution. CWS Most Outstanding Player Dansby Swanson was honored in his hometown of Marietta, Ga. with his own day and a key to the city.

SEC NETWORK BRINGS NEW ERA

The SEC Network brings a new era to college baseball with over 450 games on the family of ESPN networks. For the Commodores, 35 games will air on SEC Network+ including 26 Vanderbilt home games. The Dores will also be featured on ESPNU, ESPN2 and the SEC Network's linear channel a total of 12 times during the regular season. Kevin Ingram and former Commodore Andrew Harris are slated to call the action along with Max Herz for Vanderbilt's SEC Network+ games this year.

DORES ON THE AIR MORE THAN EVER IN 2015

Vanderbilt's flagship station WNSR 560 AM/95.9 FM is set to broadcast 51 games in 2015, the most ever. Only five games of the team's regular season slate will not air on the radio with all five games coming in the first two weeks of the season (Feb. 15, 18, 21, 22 and 28). Once again Eric Jones will call the team's games until The Voice of the Commodores Joe Fisher concludes the Commodores' men's basketball season. Audio of all 56 games on the Dores' schedule will be available on the team's Vanderbilt Game Day app and vucommodores.com for free.



Head Coach Tim Corbin is in his 13th season at the helm of the Vanderbilt baseball program. During his tenure Corbin has turned the Commodores into a national power and taken the program to unprecedented success leading Vanderbilt to the top of college baseball in 2014 with the school's first-ever men's national championship in the Dores' second trip to the College World Series in four seasons.

Corbin's overall record of 516-250 (.674) is second

all-time in terms of wins at Vanderbilt, and first in terms of winning percentage for coaches with 100 games or more. In his career as a head coach Corbin is 622-388 (.616).

Vanderbilt finished off the school's second-ever national championship with a dramatic 3-2 victory over Virginia in the finals of the College World series to cap a 51-21 season in 2014. The 51-win season marked the third time in the last four seasons Corbin had led the Dores to at least 50 wins as the Vandy skipper was named the consensus National Coach of

the Year. Corbin's Commodores rose to the occasion in the postseason sweeping through the Nashville Regional with wins over Xavier and Oregon before taking down Stanford in three games of the Super Regional to advance to Vanderbilt's second College World Series in school history. Hawkins Field hosted NCAA Regionals and Super Regionals for the third time in four years. Once in Omaha, Corbin continued to push the Commodores with wins over rival Louisville in the first round and comeback win over UC Irvine. VU reached the championship series with a dramatic, walk-off win over Texas on Tyler Campbell's bases loaded, infield single. The team sealed the national title in the third game thanks to an eighth inning, solo homer from John Norwood and clutch pitching from Adam Ravenelle over the final two frames. The final victory in Omaha gave the Dores a 10-3 record in the NCAA Tournament.

Corbin reached two more milestones during the regular season with his 500th victory at Vanderbilt, a 5-1 victory at Missouri on May 3, 2014, and his 600th career victory with a win

at Arkansas on April 19, 2014.

For the second time in his career Corbin was named the SEC Coach of the Year by the league's coaches after the Commodores posted one of the best seasons in school history in 2013. The Commodores matched the school record with a 54-12 mark and smashed the Southeastern Conference record, finishing the conference slate an amazing 26-3. Vanderbilt won every series during the regular season, including nine series sweeps. The squad outscored opponents by an average of 8.2-3.9 runs per game with the pitching staff turning in a sub 3.00 ERA for the second time in three seasons. Five Commodores earned All-American honors led by first team All-Americans Tony Kemp and Tyler Beede. Kemp became just the second Commodore in history to be named SEC Player of the Year and just the third in league history to win both Freshman of the Year and Player of the Year awards in his career. Over the summer, Beede pitched for Team USA to become the 12th Vanderbilt player to don the Stars & Stripes.

The Commodores' SEC regular season championship was the team's second in three years

and third under Corbin. For the fourth time in five years the Dores played in the SEC Championship game and made their eighth straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament hosting

Regionals for the third time in school history and Super Regionals for the second time.

The 2012 Vanderbilt Commodores overcame a slow start to the season to post the team's seventh straight trip to the postseason. The Dores finished the season as one of the hottest teams in the nation winning four of the last four SEC series of the regular season, including series victories over No. 3 Kentucky and at No. 4 LSU. Vanderbilt rolled into the SEC Tournative Section 1. ment having won 12 of the last 15 regular season games. Corbin guided the Commodores to the championship game for the sixth time in nine trips, losing to a red-hot Mississippi State team in the final. Vanderbilt made the NCAA Tournament with a trip to the Raleigh Regional finishing runner-up to host NC State to end the season 35-28.

For the second consecutive season (2011-12) the Commodores' freshman class was

tabbed as the nation's best by Baseball America, becoming the first school in the poll's 13-year history to post back-to-back top classes. Vanderbilt's 2012 freshman class was the unanimous top class, also picking up the honor from Collegiate Baseball. Since Corbin's arrival in 2003, Vanderbilt has earned three top-ranked recruiting classes (2005) and is the only school in the

nation to have more than two top classes

In 2012, one of Corbin's prize pupils, David Price, was named the American League Cy Young Award winner. Price was the top overall pick by Tampa Bay in 2007 after a stellar career at Vanderbilt. The southpaw went 20-5 with a 2.56 ERA and 205 strikeouts over 211

innings for the Rays to become the first Commodore to win the Cy Young.

The Commodores' magical run to Omaha saw several school records equaled or passed. VU won 54 games to match the school record set in 2007 and set the SEC record with 12 players selected in the Major League Baseball draft. Hawkins Field hosted the NCAA Regional round for just the second time in history and Super Regionals for the first time with the Dores sweeping through both rounds en route to the College World Series. Individual awards supplemented the team's success with Grayson Garvin earning SEC Pitcher of the Year and Tony Kemp picking up SEC Freshman of the Year honors. Garvin became the second VU pitcher to earn the prestigious league award joining David Price, while Kemp is the second Commodore to be named the league's freshman of the year along with Pedro Alvarez. All four awards have come under Corbin's watch. Sonny Gray, Jason Esposito, Aaron Westlake and Garvin all garnered All-American honors with Kevin Ziomek, T.J. Pecoraro, Conrad Gregor and Kemp being named Freshmen All-American

The 2010 Commodores racked up the second-most wins in school history finishing the year with a 46-20 mark, eventually falling at Florida State in the third game of the Super Regional. In order to get to Florida State the team advanced out of the Louisville regional, a place that saw the Dores' 2009 season end. During the regular season, Corbin led the Commodores to a 16-12 mark, good enough for third in the Southeastern Conference East division behind Florida

and eventual national champion South Carolina.

The 2008 draft saw eight Commodores selected, highlighted by Pedro Alvarez who was taken with the second overall pick by the Pittsburgh Pirates. Vanderbilt became the first school in draft history to have the first overall pick (David Price in 2007) and second overall pick in consecutive drafts.

In 2007, Corbin guided the Commodores to their best season ever, finishing with a school record 54 wins. The team also achieved a No. 1 national ranking for the first time in school history and held that honor for 13-of-15 weeks during the regular season.

The Vanderbilt baseball team also swept through the Southeastern Conference, winning both the regular season and tournament crown for the first time ever and it marked the first time an SEC team had done it since 1996. The team lost only one conference series the entire little all SEC tealin lad dulie it since 1350. The tealin lost only one conference series are office season against SEC West Division winner Arkansas in Fayetteville and avenged the series loss by defeating the Razorbacks in the SEC tournament title game.

The conference recognized Corbin for the work he had done, naming him SEC Coach of the Year. Corbin also picked up Co-National Coach of the Year honors from College Baseball

Insider and regional Coach of the Year honors by the American Baseball Coaches Association.
The Commodores hosted their first-ever NCAA regional as the No. 1 National Seed and

arrived as a power in college baseball. Corbin's success and methods of running the Vanderbilt program has earned him respect among the college and international baseball communities. In the summer of 2006 he managed the USA Baseball National Team to a 28-2-1 record that culminated with a gold medal finish at the FISU (International University Sports Federation) World University Championship in Havana, Cuba. The .919 winning percentage set a new national team high and it garnered special recognition by the United States Olympic Committee

In 2006, he led a youthful Commodore squad to a 38-27 record and sixth-place finish in the rugged Southeastern Conference. The team was the youngest team in the league, with seven everyday starters being freshmen or sophomores. For the second time in three seasons, Corbin guided the team to the SEC Tournament Championship game and the young squad also gained valuable NCAA experience after advancing to the championship round of the Atlanta Regional. The 2006 team posted impressive series wins over College World Series participant Georgia, Super Regional participants South Carolina and Ole Miss, and took series on the road against Florida and LSU. The team handed LSU its worst conference loss at home in school history in

In 2004, Corbin not only directed the Commodores to their first NCAA Tournament appearance in 24 years, he guided them to their first-ever Super Regional as they swept through the Charlottesville Regional with victories over George Mason, Princeton and host Virginia. In the Charlottesville Regional with victories over George Mason, Princeton and nost Virginia. In the Super Regional, they fell to the eventual national runner-up, Texas, but still carved out a piece of history as the first team in NCAA baseball history to make it that far one year after having finished with a sub-500 record. Along the way Vanderbilt racked up 45 wins, was the only team to rank among the SEC's top five in earned run average (first), batting average (fourth) and fielding percentage (first) and finished with a .703 winning percentage, which was third-best in the highly competitive conference, which sent nine schools to the NCAA Tournament. The Commodores' school-record .978 fielding percentage was second in the nation, and their

30 error-free games were 11 more than the previous season.

His first Vanderbilt team in 2003 finished 27-28 overall and 14-16 in the SEC, good enough for second in the Eastern Division. It earned a conference tournament berth with a season-ending sweep of Tennessee capped by a dramatic ninth-inning rally in the series finale. The overall and conference victory totals were the most by a first-year Vanderbilt coach and were made more impressive by the fact that the Commodores were 12-5 in one-run games. That squad set then school records for fielding percentage (.972), fewest errors in a season (60), most saves in a season (15) and fewest walks allowed in a season (168). The team notched series victories over nationally-ranked conference foes LSU, Auburn and Florida, each among the top 15 at the time. Plus, on May 6, 2003, Vanderbilt recorded the first perfect game in school history, which was a collective effort. Four different pitchers contributed to the 4-0

victory over Western Kentucky.

Corbin, along with his coaching staff, are a tireless group that saw their recruiting efforts pay in 2005, 2011 and 2012 as their recruiting class was labeled the nation's best by Baseball America. Professional baseball has also taken notice of the program with eight Commodores being selected in the first round since 2003.

Before Corbin was hired as the 21st coach in program history, Vanderbilt had not earned a spot in the conference tournament in a decade but made the post-season tournament in 2004. During the 2004 regular season, Vanderbilt swept a series against Mississippi State for the first time. It was one of three conference whitewashes and one of five series wins in all. His efforts earned him the 2004 Vanderbilt Coach of the Year award and a nomination for the Nashville Sports Council's Sports Person of the Year. Plus, a school-record five players were named to the SEC All-Tournament team, five players were drafted on the first day and seven VU players in all were chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft, topped by No. 6 overall pick, pitcher Jeremy Sowers.

Corbin came to Vanderbilt following nine seasons as an assistant coach at baseball power Clemson. During his time there (1994-2002), the Tigers had more victories than all but four

programs.

Prior to his tenure at Clemson, Corbin was head coach at Presbyterian College for six seasons beginning in 1988. There he restarted a baseball program that had been dormant for several years.
