VANDERBILT RE-VU

An early deficit was too much to overcome for Vanderbilt against Louisville in the Battle of the Barrel in an 8-5 loss on Tuesday. Ethan Paul drove in a career-best four runs, including a three-run homer. The Commodores were no-hit on Saturday by Kyle Simonds at Texas A&M to drop the series finale 3-0. Patrick Raby took his first career loss, giving up two runs over 4.2 innings. Vanderbilt evened the series on Friday night with a 6-1 win behind Kyle Wright, who picked up the win with seven scoreless innings. Jeren Kendall singled three times and stole three bases. The Commodores were shutout for the third time this season in a 1-0 loss at Texas A&M on Thursday night. Jordan Sheffield was the tough-luck loser giving up one unearned run over seven innings.

FIGHTING FLORIDA

Vanderbilt travels to Florida to take on the top-ranked Gators with all-time record of 71-130-1 dating back to 1927. Last year, No. 10 Florida took two-of-three from No. 9 Vanderbilt in Nashville with the Commodores and Carson Fulmer winning the opener 2-0 behind a complete game from Fulmer before the Gators evened the series with a 7-3 win the next day. The Gators scored six runs over the final four innings, including two in the 10th inning, to rally by Vanderbilt for a series win in the finale. The Commodores' last trip to Gainesville produced a series victory with the two teams trading shutouts in the first two games, including another Fulmer shutout on Friday night, before the Dores exploded for a 16-2 win on Saturday.

LEADING OFF

Jeren Kendall has been quite comfortable in the top spot in Tim Corbin's lineup. In 11 games as the leadoff hitter this year, Kendall is hitting 413 (19-for-46) with seven extra-base hits, 14 runs and 11 RBI. Kendall has occupied the two-spot in the order the most with 32 starts and has hit third in the order six times.

DOWN THE STRETCH

The Commodores have been good down the stretch in recent years. In the final two Southeastern Conference series over the last four years the Dores are 16-8 with six series victories. This time a year ago through 49 games, Vanderbilt was 35-14 overall with a 17-7 record in league play before finishing 4-3 over the team's final seven games to enter the postseason 39-17. While the 2015 offense produced a better team batting average to this point (.298 to .275), the current pitching staff has the edge in team ERA (2.88 to 2.98).

RABY, SHEFFIELD, WRIGHT ON NATIONAL PITCHER OF YEAR LIST

Three Vanderbilt pitchers have been named to the National Pitcher of the Year watch list with Patrick Raby, Jordan Sheffield and Kyle Wright all making the list. Raby has been outstanding in his freshman season carrying a 6-1 record with a 2.09 ERA in 12 games, eight starts, into the weekend. Sheffield has been dominant, leading the team with seven wins and 92 strikeouts. Wright has been stellar with an ERA of 1.89 through his first 12 starts. The Vandy trio leads a contingent of 10 Southeastern Conference pitchers with the Dores' three pitchers on the list matching Louisville for the most in the nation. Carson Fulmer became the second Commodore pitcher to win the award last year, joining David Price (2007).

BASE THIEF

Jeren Kendall stole three bases in last Friday's win at No. 2 Texas A&M to move his season total to a careerhigh 23. Kendall's 23 stolen bases are the most since the legendary Tony Kemp stole 34 bases on his way to being named the SEC Player of the Year. Kendall's 23 stolen bases are tied for the league lead entering the weekend with Missouri's Jake Ring, LSU's Cole Freeman and Tennessee's Nick Senzel.

THE ALL AMERICANS

Six Commodores earned preseason All-American status led by junior Bryan Reynolds, who was on every major preseason All-American list. Pitchers Ben Bowden, Jordan Sheffield and Kyle Wright all saw their names appear on various All-American teams. Sophomores Jeren Kendall and Will Toffey both received preseason accolades after earning Freshman All-American status last season.

REYNOLDS. TOFFEY NAMED PRESEASON ALL-SEC

Junior Bryan Reynolds and sophomore Will Toffey were named preseason All-SEC by the league's coaches. Both Commodores were tabbed as second team members.

COMMODORES DEBUTING NEW NIKE UNIFORMS

Vanderbilt is one of only three teams in the nation to be wearing Nike's new Vapor Elite uniform. The Commodores are joined by Oregon and North Carolina in the new uniforms. Three new elements are highlighted in the uniforms: the Vapor Elite Pants are 20% lighter than the sport's traditional knit pants, the Vapor Elite Jersey, made from stretch woven fabric, offers maximum mobility with minimal weight and the True Vapor Fitted hat features an exclusive bill construction designed to reduce weight, improve moisture management and relieve pressure against the forehead.

NUMBER NINE

Sophomore Will Toffey changed his uniform to No. 9 after earning Freshman All-American honors while wearing No. 10 last season. The No. 9 was Toffey's uniform number throughout his prep career and when it came available the Barnstable, Mass. native asked Coach Corbin to make the move into a new jersey.

FRESHMAN CLASS TABBED NO. 1

For the record fourth time, Vanderbilt's recruiting class has been ranked No. 1 by Baseball America. The Commodores' 13-man class is comprised of seven pitchers and six position players from nine different states. Vanderbilt's fourth top class in the Baseball America poll (2005, 2011, 2012, 2015) stretches the Dores' record with only Florida and Arizona State claiming multiple top classes with two each. Vandy is also riding an unprecedented 11-year streak of Top 25 classes. The 2015 class is the latest top class for Corbin and recruiting coordinator Travis Jewett after hauling in the second of back-to-back classes in 2012.

COMMODORE NOTES

DORES TABBED TO FINISH SECOND IN SEC EAST BY COACHES

The Commodores were picked to finish second in the SEC East by the league coaches while receiving one vote to win the East division and the league. Top-ranked Florida received 13 votes to win the division and the league making them a unanimous choice (coaches cannot vote for their own team). The rest of the East was picked with South Carolina third, Kentucky fourth, Missouri fifth, Georgia sixth and Tennessee seventh. In the West Texas A&M was picked to take the title followed by LSU, Arkansas, Mississippi State, Ole Miss, Auburn and Alabama.

SWITCH IT UP

Vanderbilt's roster features four switch hitters with juniors Ro Coleman and Bryan Reynolds, sophomore Tristan Chari and speed freshman Alonzo Jones. Coleman and Reynolds have combined for 282 hits in their careers with Reynolds posting a pair of 90-hit seasons in his first two years on West End.

REYNOLDS, WRIGHT NAMED TO GOLDEN SPIKES WATCH LIST

Bryan Reynolds and Kyle Wright are on the 50-man preseason watch list for the Golden Spikes Award, given annually to the nation's top amateur player. Reynolds enters his third season at Vanderbilt having already compiled 186 hits in his career. The Brentwood, Tenn. native has starred on each of the Commodores' past two teams, helping the Dores capture the national title in 2014 as a Freshman All-American and ushering the team back to the national championship series last season. Wright led all Vanderbilt pitchers with 29 appearances a year ago as a freshman. The Huntsville, Ala. native went 6-1 with a 1.23 ERA taking over as the Commodores' closer down the stretch and finishing the year with four saves. The right-hander picked up Freshman All-American and Freshman All-SEC honors for his work on the bump that included 62 strikeouts in 58.2 innings.

VANDY BOYS GO TO D.C.

For the second straight fall, Vanderbilt traveled as a team with 2015's trip ending in Washington D.C. The Commodores trained at the Naval Academy in nearby Annapolis, Md. during the morning and took educational sites in the afternoon. The Vandy Boys visited the White House, Lincoln Memorial, Vietnam War Memorial, Jefferson Memorial, the Holocaust Museum, the National Archive, Arlington National Cemetery and the Naval Academy campus.

COMMODORES NAMED NO. 1 PROGRAM BY D1BASEBALL.COM

Vanderbilt was named the top program in the nation during the fall by D1Baseball.com. The website ranked programs based on "the overall health of the program, based on recent history, coaching staff quality, facilities, scholarship/financial aid situation, conference dynamics, and recruiting and player development proficiency." The Commodores led the way in the rankings with 12 more SEC schools in the top 70.

Head Coach Tim Corbin begins his 14th season at the helm of the Vanderbilt baseball program. During his tenure, Corbin has turned the Commodores into a national power and taken the program to unprecedented success leading Vanderbilt to the top of college baseball in 2014 with the school's first-ever men's national championship.

Corbin's overall record of 567-271 (.677) is second all-time in terms of wins at Vanderbilt, and first in terms of winning percentage for coaches with 100 games or more. In his career as a head coach Corbin is 673-409 (.622).

The 2015 Commodores marched back to the College World Series for the second straight year to give the program it's first-ever consecutive trips to Omaha finishing as the national runner-up, losing in three games to Virginia in a rematch of the 2014 CWS championship series. Vanderbilt finished the season 51-21 for the second consecutive year making it the

only program in the nation with three straight 50-win seasons.

The Dores rallied to win nine straight games, the team's longest winning streak of the season, in the NCAA Tournament to reach the CWS finals sweeping through the Nashville NCAA Regional in dominant fashion before toppling national seed Illinois on the road to reach Vanderbilt's third trip to the College World Series. VU rolled through the Regional with wins over Lipscomb, Indiana and Radford. The 21-0 victory over Radford shattered the school record for margin of victory in the NCAA Tournament and matched the NCAA mark. The Commodores continued the roll in Illinois with a pair of dominating wins over the Illini to win the school's first-ever road Super Regional. Back in Omaha for the third time in five years, the Commodores rolled through their half of the bracket with a come-from-behind victory over Cal State Fullerton and two wins over TCU. The Dores provided plenty of drama in the win over the Titans, winning on Jeren Kendall's walk-off home run in the bottom of the ninth inning for a 4-3 victory in the resumption of a suspended game. Vandy won it's third straight game at TD Ameritrade Park via the home run in the team's first game against TCU with Zander Wiel's seventh inning solo homer scoring the only run of the game. VU breezed into the championship series with a 7-1 victory in the rematch against the Horned Frogs three days later. Vanderbilt claimed the opening game against Virginia 5-1 behind a dominant Carson Fulmer start that saw the right-hander turn in 7.2 scoreless innings in his final start as a Commodore.

Dansby Swanson and Carson Fulmer led the team in their final season in Black & Gold earning first team All-American honors with Swanson picking up National Player of the Year honors from D1Baseball.com and Perfect Game. Fulmer was named National Pitcher of the Year with Swanson earning the Brooks Wallace Award as the nation's top shortstop. The duo also became the second pair of Vanderbilt teammates and the fourth in the history of the Golden Spikes to be finalists in the same year joining David Price and Pedro Alvarez from 2007. Corbin has coached three different pairs of teammates to be finalists for the Golden Spikes with the four Vanderbilt players joining Clemson's Khalil Greene and Jeff Baker. Fulmer became the third Vanderbilt pitcher to pick up SEC Pitcher of the Year honors after becoming just the fourth pitcher in the league's history to win the pitching triple crown, leading the nation's premier league in wins, ERA and strikeouts. Freshmen Will Toffey, Jeren Kendall and Kyle Wright were consensus Freshman All-Americans.

Three Commodores were selected in the first round of the MLB Draft, another program first, with Swanson, Fulmer and Walker Buehler all joining a growing group of Vanderbilt first round picks to bring the total to 14 overall, 12 in the Corbin era. Swanson became the second Commodore to hear his named called first with the Arizona Diamondbacks taking him No. 1 overall. Vanderbilt is one of two colleges to have multiple top picks with David Price and Swanson. Fulmer was taken eighth overall by the Chicago White Sox and Buehler 24th overall by the Los Angeles Dodgers. Fulmer and Buehler became the eighth and ninth VU pitchers under Corbin to be selected in the first round joining Jeremy Sowers (6th overall, Cleveland 2004), David Price (1st overall, Tampa Bay 2007), Casey Weathers (8th overall, Colorado 2007), Mike Minor (7th overall, Atlanta 2009), Sonny Gray (18th overall, Oakland 2011), Grayson Garvin (59th overall, Tampa Bay 2011) and Tyler Beede (14th overall, San Francisco). In Corbin's program since 2003, an astounding 48 pitchers have been selected in the MLB Draft. Five more Dores heard their name called during the draft for a total of eight; the most since a school and SEC record 12 were selected in 2011.

Vanderbilt finished off the school's second-ever national championship with a dramatic 3-2 victory over Virginia in the finals of the College World series to cap a 51-21 season in 2014. The 51-win season marked the third time in the last four seasons Corbin had led the Dores to at least 50 wins as the Vandy skipper was named the consensus National Coach of the Year. Corbin's Commodores rose to the occasion in the postseason sweeping through the Nashville Regional with wins over Xavier and Oregon before taking down Stanford in three games of the Super Regional to advance to Vanderbilt's second College World Series in school history. Hawkins Field hosted NCAA Regionals and Super Regionals for the third time in four years. Once in Omaha, Corbin continued to push the Commodores with wins over rival Louisville in the first round and comeback win over UC Irvine. VU reached the championship series with a dramatic, walk-off win over Texas on Tyler Campbell's bases loaded, infield single. The team sealed the national title in the third game thanks to an eighth inning, solo homer from John Norwood and clutch pitching from Adam Ravenelle over the final two frames. The final victory in Omaha gave the Dores a 10-3 record in the NCAA Tournament.

Corbin reached two more milestones during the regular season with his 500th victory at Vanderbilt, a 5-1 victory at Missouri on May 3, 2014, and his 600th career victory with a win at Arkansas on April

For the second time in his career Corbin was named the SEC Coach of the Year by the league's coaches after the Commodores posted one of the best seasons in school history in 2013. The Commodores matched the school record with a 54-12 mark and smashed the Southeastern Conference record, finishing the conference slate an amazing 26-3. Vanderbilt won every series during the regular season, including nine series sweeps. The squad outscored opponents by an average of 8.2-3.9 runs per game with the pitching staff turning in a sub 3.00 ERA for the second time in three seasons. Five Commodores earned All-American honors led by first team All-Americans Tony Kemp and Tyler Beede. Kemp became just the second Commodore in history to be named SEC Player of the Year and just the third in league

history to win both Freshman of the Year and Player of the Year awards in his career. Over the summer, Beede pitched for Team USA to become the 12th Vanderbilt player to don the Stars & Stripes.

The Commodores' SEC regular season championship was the team's second in three years and third under Corbin. For the fourth time in five years the Dores played in the SEC Championship game and made their eighth straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament hosting Regionals for the third time in school history and Super Regionals for the second time.

In 2011 and 2012 the Commodores' freshman class was tabbed as the nation's best by Baseball America, becoming the first school in the poll's 13-year history to post back-to-back top classes. Vanderbilt's 2012 freshman class was the unanimous top class, also picking up the honor from Collegiate Baseball. Since Corbin's arrival in 2003, Vanderbilt has earned three top-ranked recruiting classes (2005) and is the only school in the nation to have more than two top classes.

In 2012, one of Corbin's prize pupils, David Price, was named the American League Cy Young Award winner. Price was the top overall pick by Tampa Bay in 2007 after a stellar career at Vanderbilt. The southpaw went 20-5 with a 2.56 ERA and 205 strikeouts over 211 innings for the Rays to become the first Commodore to win the Cy Young.

The Commodores' magical run to Omaha in 2011 saw several school records equaled or passed. VU won 54 games to match the school record set in 2007 and set the SEC record with 12 players selected in the Major League Baseball draft. Hawkins Field hosted the NCAA Regional round for just the second time in history and Super Regionals for the first time with the Dores sweeping through both rounds en route to the College World Series. Individual awards supplemented the team's success with Grayson Garvin earning SEC Pitcher of the Year and Tony Kemp picking up SEC Freshman of the Year honors. Garvin became the second VU pitcher to earn the prestigious league award joining David Price, while Kemp is the second Commodore to be named the league's freshman of the year along with Pedro Alvarez. All four awards have come under Corbin's watch. Sonny Gray, Jason Esposito, Aaron Westlake and Garvin all garnered All-American honors with Kevin Ziomek, T.J. Pecoraro, Conrad Gregor and Kemp being named Freshmen All-American.

In 2007, Corbin guided the Commodores to their best season ever, finishing with a school record 54 wins. The team also achieved a No. 1 national ranking for the first time in school history and held that honor for 13-of-15 weeks during the regular season.

The Vanderbilt baseball team also swept through the Southeastern Conference, winning both the regular season and tournament crown for the first time ever and it marked the first time an SEC team had done it since 1996. The team lost only one conference series the entire season against SEC West Division winner Arkansas in Fayetteville and avenged the series loss by defeating the Razorbacks in the SEC tournament title game.

The conference recognized Corbin for the work he had done, naming him SEC Coach of the Year. Corbin also picked up Co-National Coach of the Year honors from College Baseball Insider and regional Coach of the Year honors by the American Baseball Coaches Association.

The Commodores hosted their first-ever NCAA regional as the No. 1 National Seed and arrived as a power in college baseball. Corbin's success and methods of running the Vanderbilt program has earned him respect among the college and international baseball communities. In the summer of 2006 he managed the USA Baseball National Team to a 28-2-1 record that culminated with a gold medal finish at the FISU (International University Sports Federation) World University Championship in Havana, Cuba. The .919 winning percentage set a new national team high and it garnered special recognition by the United States Olympic Committee.

Corbin, along with his coaching staff, are a tireless group that saw their recruiting efforts pay in 2005, 2011, 2012 and 2015 as their recruiting class was labeled the nation's best by Baseball America. Professional baseball has also taken notice of the program with a nation-leading 12 Commodores being selected in the first round since 2003.

Before Corbin was hired as the 21st coach in program history, Vanderbilt had not earned a spot in the conference tournament in a decade but made the post-season tournament in 2004. During the 2004 regular season, Vanderbilt swept a series against Mississippi State for the first time. It was one of three conference whitewashes and one of five series wins in all. His efforts earned him the 2004 Vanderbilt Coach of the Year award and a nomination for the Nashville Sports Council's Sports Person of the Year. Plus, a school-record five players were named to the SEC All-Tournament team, five players were drafted on the first day and seven VU players in all were chosen in the Major League Baseball Draft, topped by No. 6 overall pick, pitcher Jeremy Sowers.

Corbin came to Vanderbilt following nine seasons as an assistant coach at baseball power Clem-

son. During his time there (1994-2002), the Tigers had more victories than all but four programs.
