HEAD COACH

GEOFF MACDONALD



Geoff Macdonald, Vanderbilt's longest- tenured coach, enters his 21st season as the head coach of the women's tennis team. Macdonald heads into the 2014 dual season as VU's active leader in career wins as a head coach.

During the previous 19 seasons, the two-time SEC Coach of the Year has placed the Commodores among the nation's elite programs on a consistent basis. Since Macdonald joined the Vanderbilt staff in 1994, the Commodore tennis program has developed a reputation for rapid player improvement, strong commitments to coaching, and unmatched excellence on the court and in the classroom.

Before Macdonald's arrival, the Vanderbilt women's tennis program had never been ranked higher than No. 28 in the nation. Under his leadership, the Commodores have finished no lower than No. 19 in 16 of the past 19 years, including a school record No. 2 ranking at the end of the 2004 season.

2014 was one of the most prolific seasons for the Commodores; generating an 11-0 home record and finishing out the year ranked No. 11. Under Mcdonald's leaderhip Vandy earned the program's 12th 20-plus win season in 2014, finishing the year with a 20-7 mark and its 13th appearance in the NCAA Sweet-16..

On March 7, 2014 Mcdonald earned his 500th win with the Commodores as the team sailed past SEC rival Missouri in a 7-0 victory.

In 2013, the Commodores finished 16-12 overall and 7-6 in Southeastern Conference play. Macdonald's team advanced to the second-round of the NCAA Tournament before falling to No. 13 Clemson. Vanderbilt has made it to the NCAA Tournament in each of Macdonald's nineteen seasons.

During the 2012 season, Macdonald guided the tennis squad to the NCAA Tournament. The

team advanced to the Second Round of the NCAA Championships before falling to one of the top teams in the country, Southern Cal. His 2008 squad defeated eight top-25 teams in route to its 11th straight sweet 16 appearance. During the first round of the 2008 NCAA Tournament, Vanderbilt's 4-0 win over Indiana State gave Macdonald his 300th career win, putting himself among the nation's best. The Commodores finished the year with a 20-6 (.769) record and were ranked 10th nationally by the ITA. While Macdonald's leadership continues to improve the Commodore program every season. Macdonald's impact was felt immediately in his very first year at Vanderbilt in 1995. The team finished the year 16-8, including an 8-3 mark in the SEC and advanced to the NCAA Championships for the first time in school history.

Once Vanderbilt began its rise to the top, the achievements kept coming. In 1996, the Commodores posted a 24-7 record, finished second in the SEC, advanced to the SEC Tournament Championship match for the first time and, once again, earned a berth in the NCAA Championships, advancing to the Round of 16. The team's 24 wins marked the the third most wins by a single team in the nation that year

The team continued to improve with each successful season and in 2001 the 'Dores finally found themselves in the national spotlight as they competed in the NCAA finals. The event marked the first time that any Vanderbilt sports team had played for a national championship. Despite falling to the Stanford Cardinals, Macdonald's squad ended the season with a 26-5 record and a No. 4 national ranking, while three singles players and two doubles teams earned individual bids to the NCAA championships.

The following season, Macdonald not only matched the success of the previous year, but led the 'Dores to a record-setting 27 wins. The team also advanced to the finals of the National Team Indoors tournament, which features sixteen of the top ranked teams in the country. Following the season, Sarah Riske and Aleke Tsoubanos were both named ITA All-Americans.

In 2003, Macdonald oversaw the final year of Sarah Riske's career, who became the school's only four-time All-American (two in singles, two in doubles). Riske left VU as the school's all-time winningest doubles player, but Tsoubanos surpassed that mark a year later. The `Dores finished the 2003 season with a 21-6 record en route to advancing to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament.

In 2004, the Commodores returned to the Final Four in the NCAA Tournament where they lost

to undefeated Stanford, the eventual national champions. The 2004 Commodore team included All American, All-Academic and ITA Scholar Tsoubanos, who is entering her sixth year as Macdonald's assistant. Other honors achieved by Commodores included Annie Menees' All Academic and ITA Scholar awards, while Audra Falk and Kelly Schmandt landed All-American honors.

In 2006, the Commodores posted a 23-5 record en route to the team's ninth consecutive NCAA Sweet 16 appearance, despite the young team's lack of senior representatives. Following the season, junior Amanda Fish became the seventh Commodore under Macdonald to receive ITA All-American honors.

Macdonald has earned three Coach of the Year honors, including SEC recognition for his 2001 team, which included four ITA ranked singles players. He previously earned the title at Duke and Louisiana State University, where he began his coaching career in 1988.

Macdonald is married to Kate Daniels, a highly acclaimed English professor at Vanderbilt.. They have three children - Sam, Gus and Janey. ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH

ALEKE TSOUBANOS



Former Vanderbilt standout Aleke Tsoubanos enters her eighth season as the associate head coach for the women's tennis team. Tsoubanos has played an essential role in bringing in some of the nation's top recruiting classes since her arrival and has been a key to the team's successes in the SEC and NCAA, including a trip to the Sweet 16 in 2011 and most recently in 2014.

"Aleke has had a real impact on our program," Vanderbilt head coach Geoff Macdonald said. "She has a great tennis eye and strong work ethic and relationship with our players. She is great working with people and knows all phases to the game which makes her an exceptional, bright young coach."

The addition of Tsoubanos led to instant success for the Commodores in 2008. Tsoubanos' coaching style led the Dores to its 11th straight sweet-16 finish and top-10 national ranking.

The St. Louis, Mo., native enjoyed a very successful college career. She was named an ITA All-American from 2002-04, a first-team all-NCAA selection, a first-team All-SEC selection in both singles and doubles and is the only player to win the ITA All-American Riviera doubles championship two consecutive years with two different partners. Tsoubanos also excelled off the court, being named to the All-SEC academic

team

"By excelling in tennis at the highest level and at Vanderbilt, she brings a lot of tennis experience and enthusiasm to our program and campus," Macdonald said.

Tsoubanos still holds four school records. She partnered with Kelly Schmandt in 2004 to win 15 consecutive doubles matches. She holds the record for best doubles winning percentage in a career, winning 82% of her doubles matches between 2000 and 2004. She has the most career doubles victories with 119 and registered 32 doubles victories in a season with both Sarah Riske ('03) and Kelly Schmandt ('04). The Commodores enjoyed some of their

most successful years while Tsoubanos was a member of the team. Vanderbilt made the NCAA title match in Tsoubanos' freshman season, falling to Stanford in the finals. VU also made the NCAA elite eight (2003) and final four (2004)during Tsoubanos' junior and senior seasons, respectively.

"I feel privileged to be working with Coach Macdonald and a group of highly talented student-athletes," Tsoubanos said.

Tsoubanos enjoyed success in the professional ranks during her career. Her doubles ranking rose as high as 126, winning four doubles titles while on tour. She made the doubles semifinals or better 23 times while on the International Tennis Federation circuit.

In 2005-2006, the Vanderbilt assistant played two seasons of World Team Tennis for her hometown team, the St. Louis Aces. While playing for the Aces, she scored doubles wins over such players as Anna Kournikova and Meghann Shaughnessy.



BROWNLEE O. CURREY JR. TENNIS CENTER



The Brownlee O. Currey Jr., Tennis Center was completed in November 1993. With the opening of its doors, the Vanderbilt tennis program provides one of the finest tennis facilities in the nation for varsity collegiate tennis.

Plans for the new tennis center were unveiled in April 1993 when former Director of Athletics Paul Hoolahan announced that a \$2.2 million project was being made possible by the generous benefactors of Vanderbilt tennis. Nashville businessman Brownlee O. Currey Jr. spearheaded the fund-raising for the project. Additional gifts were made by the Joe. C. Davis Foundation, the Fleming Foundation and Mrs. Joanne Fleming Hayes.

The previous tennis center, which had provided three indoor courts, underwent several changes throughout the renovation. A two-story, 16,000-square-foot addition was made to the existing indoor structure, providing enough space for five indoor courts.

The lower level of the facility houses spacious locker rooms for both varsity teams as well as a training room and locker room space for visitors.

A special feature of the center is a state-of-the-art audio/visual room, also located on the second floor. Small video cameras are mounted at the north end of each indoor playing court, allowing the coaches to monitor and record matches in progress on all five courts. The room also serves as a classroom for the coaches and their teams.

In addition to the changes of the interior of the tennis center, the building was given an exterior face lift as well. Its new red-brick exterior now matches the architecture of many buildings on the Vanderbilt campus.

The fundraising for the renovations of the outdoor tennis courts began in 2001, and five years later fans and athletes are enjoying the fruits of their patience and labor.

The \$5 million project was completed just in time for the beginning of the 2005 tennis season, where the team advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen for the seventh consecutive year.

The new outdoor complex at the Brownlee O. Currey Jr. Tennis Center includes nine lighted courts and seating for more than 1,000 spectators. The new facility also features vending areas and restrooms.

One of the most dazzling features of the new facility is its state-of-the-art lighting system. The courts are lighted with the most powerful lights on the market so matches can be easily televised at night. The inaugural season of the outdoor facilities drew more fans out to support the Commodores due to the added comfort and accessibility.

During the 2008-09 season, Vanderbilt added an electronic scoreboard to the outdoor courts, allowing fans to follow the action more closely. Electronic scoring was also added to the indoor courts at the same time. In the summer of 2009, Vanderbilt unveiled a new All-American display inside the Currey Tennis Center. The display recognized every tennis All-American who has donned the Black and Gold.

Prior to the 2013 season all 15 courts were re-surfaced and changed from green to blue. The new courts are to be slower than the privious ones, last resurfaced prior to 2011.

VANDERBILT ADMINISTRATION



Chancellor Nicholas S. Zeppos was raised in Milwaukee, where he spent many an afternoon watching the great Hank Aaron of the Braves slug home runs in the old County Stadium.

Named Vanderbilt's eighth chancellor in 2008, Zeppos has taken a keen interest in athletics at Vanderbilt during his more than two decades at the university.

"I don't do the operations," Zeppos said. "I don't call the plays, I don't throw the passes. I see my job as simply trying to do whatever I can to support all of the talented people who do these things."

This support has included the endorsement of an athletics capital improvement plan expected to surpass \$50 million, which orchestrates efforts to improve the student experience for athletes and assists with recruiting.

"One thing I consider the ultimate compliment is when a coach calls me and says, 'I've got a couple of recruits here. Could you meet them?'"

A distinguished legal scholar, teacher and executive, Zeppos served from 2002 to February 2008 as Vanderbilt's chief academic officer, overseeing the university's undergraduate, graduate and professional education programs and research in liberal arts and sciences, engineering, music, education, business, law and divinity. As provost and vice chancellor, he chaired Vanderbilt's budgeting and capital planning council, as well as oversaw the dean of stu-

dents and dean of admissions.

Zeppos has led a number of important initiatives at Vanderbilt, including the planning process for The Ingram Commons, a landmark transformation of the first-year experience; the Strategic Academic Planning Group; innovative efforts in undergraduate admissions and financial aid; and the development of new programs in Jewish studies, law and economics and genetics, among others.

In a bold move to strength Vanderbilt's commitment to admitting undergraduates on the basis of accomplishment and achievement, rather than their ability to pay, Zeppos significantly expanded the financial aid program in 2009. By replacing undergraduate, need-based loans with grant and scholarship assistance, the university opened its doors wider to highly talented and qualified students of all economic, cultural and geographical backgrounds. The expanded aid program is funded by a combination of strategic budget allocations, the university's Shape the Future fundraising campaign, which under Zeppos' leadership raised over \$1.9 billion, and the current Opportunity Vanderbilt campaign.

Zeppos was recognized with five teaching awards at the law school before serving as an associate dean, associate provost, and provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. He also served as interim chancellor for eight months prior to being formally appointed as Vanderbilt's eighth chancellor on March 1, 2008.

Zeppos is the Vice President of the 2012-13 executive committee of the Southeastern Conference.

In the Nashville community, Zeppos serves on the boards of the Nashville Area Chamber of Commerce and the Nashville Public Education Foundation. He also serves on the National Security Higher Education Advisory Board and the Freedom Forum Diversity Institute Board.

From 1982 to 1987, Zeppos practiced law in Washington, D.C., at the United States Department of Justice and at Wilmer, Cutler & Pickering, where he specialized in appellate litigation involving complex regulatory, statutory and constitutional matters.

Zeppos is a 1979 magna cum laude graduate of the University of Wisconsin Law School, where he served as editor in chief of the Wisconsin Law Review and was selected as the outstanding graduate of his class. He studied history during his undergraduate years at the university, where he was a 1976 Phi Beta Kappa graduate.

He is married to Lydia A. Howarth, a graduate of the University of Chicago and Lawrence University, who is an editor. They have two sons, Benjamin and Nicholas.

VANDERBILT ADMINISTRATION



Vice Chancellor of University Affairs and Athletics David Williams Il guides the Vanderbilt Athletics program.

Last December, Williams demonstrated his leadership by orchestrating the thorough search that led to Maryland associate head coach James Franklin becoming Vanderbilt's 27th head football coach.

Whether supporting coaches and student-athletes, presiding over impor-

tant athletic activities, or debating strategic policy changes in Commodore athletics, Williams plays a key leadership role in the administration of Vanderbilt Athletics

Since 2003, Williams has guided Vanderbilt Athletics into a bold new direction. Under Williams, the Vanderbilt program has had many successes on and off the field of competition. Williams has directed an initiative to more fully integrate Commodore athletics into the total Vanderbilt student life experience.

Today, Williams has firmly placed his stamp on the program, and has positioned Vanderbilt Athletics among the most innovative in the nation. The cumulative grade point for Vanderbilt student-athletes has continued to improve through Williams' tenure, reaching its highest level in more than two decades. Competitive success, such as a trip to the College World Series and NCAA postseason appearances for nine varsity sports in 2011, is becoming an expectation on campus. Individual accomplishment has been increasing, with 11 Vanderbilt athletes being selected in the first round of their respective professional sports in the last seven years.

Williams has overseen the recruitment and hiring of eight outstanding head coaches. Williams also has addressed numerous facility upgrades, including an extensive refurbishing of Vanderbilt Stadium and football locker rooms, expansion of Hawkins Field, addition of new tennis courts and amenities at Brownlee O. Currey Center, and renovations in Memorial Gym. He has also started a program to allow more overseas travel and study for Commodore teams and student-athletes.

Athletics is but a small part of Williams' influential Vanderbilt role. Williams also serves as General Counsel directing a staff of 12 attorneys and Secretary of Vanderbilt and its nationally recognized Medical Center. In addition, he oversees the Office of Risk Management, Compliance and Conflict of Interest functions, and the operations of the Vanderbilt University Board of Trust.

Williams' campus activities also include a tenured full professorship at the School of Law, lecturing on Tax Law, Sports Law and Education Law. He has taught a class on Law and Higher Education at Peabody College, and occasion, courses in the undergraduate curriculum.

Williams has reached outside of the Vanderbilt community in the area of intercollegiate sports. Williams served as a member of the SEC team that negotiated the recent SEC/ESPN/CBS contract, and is beginning his second year of a three-year term on the NCAA Division I Academic Cabinet.

He also serves as Chairman of the NCAA Infraction Appeals Committee. Williams was named Vice Chancellor, General Counsel and Secretary of Vanderbilt in 2000. His role moved toward administration of Vanderbilt student affairs and athletics in 2002.

Williams came to Vanderbilt after serving in numerous administrative roles at Ohio State over a 14-year period. When he accepted the Vanderbilt role, Williams was Vice President of Student and Urban/Community Affairs and Professor of Law at Ohio State.

A native of Detroit, Mich., Williams received a Bachelor of Science in Social Science and Master of Arts in Education from Northern Michigan University where he was a member of the track team. He also earned a Master of Business Administration and a Doctor of Jurisprudence from the University of Detroit, and an L.L.M. in taxation from New York University.

Before entering law school, Williams spent 10 years as a teacher and coach in the Detroit public school system.

Williams is active in the Nashville area community, serving as an executive member and director with several organizations. He is treasurer and finance committee chair of both the Nashville Symphony Board of Directors and Nashville Public Television. Some of Williams' other board memberships include the Nashville Sports Council, Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame, Adventure Science Center, 100 Black Men of Middle Tennessee, the Nashville Rotary and Special Olympics Tennessee.

Williams also supports youth athletic programs in the Nashville community. Professionally, Williams is an active member of the American Corporate Counsel Association, the National Association of College and University Attorneys and the American Bar Association. He is a member of the Continuing Legal Education committee of both the Nashville Bar Association and the NACUA. As a member of ABA's Section of Business Law, Williams has served as a member of the Corporate Counsel Committee. He held terms on two prestigious legal committees — the ABA Standing Committee on Public Education and the ABA Section on Legal Education and Admissions Standards Review Committee.

He recently completed consecutive three-year terms as a member of the Nashville branch of the Atlanta Federal Reserve Board.

Williams also is a member of the American Law Institute, and a past member of the Harry Phillips Inn of Court. He has served on a number of ABA Accreditation site visits of law schools and has completed a term on the Membership Review Committee of the American Association of Law Schools. Williams has written, lectured and participated in many seminars on topics of tax law, sports law, law and education, and legal history. Williams recently completed a three-year term on the board of directors for the National Association for Colleges and University Attorneys. He is serving a second term on Nashville Mayor Karl Dean's Procurement Standards Board.

Williams has taught at the law schools of the University of Detroit, Capital University, the Ohio State University and Vanderbilt, and directed the Ohio State University Law Program in Oxford, England in 1992 and 1995. He was elected outstanding law professor at both the University of Detroit and Ohio State.

Williams and his wife, Gail, have two children: Samantha, who is a varsity swimmer and rising senior at Brown University, and Nicholas, who is an 11th grader at University School of Nashville and competes in cross country, basketball, track and soccer. His wife serves as the Associate Director of Community Relations at Vanderbilt, is president of the University School of Nashville Board of Trustees, and is the immediate past chair of the Metro Transit Authority. Two older children: Erika, who is a grade school teacher in Detroit, is a graduate of Eastern Michigan University; and David Williams III, a two-time graduate of Bowling Green State, is an academic counselor at Michigan State.
