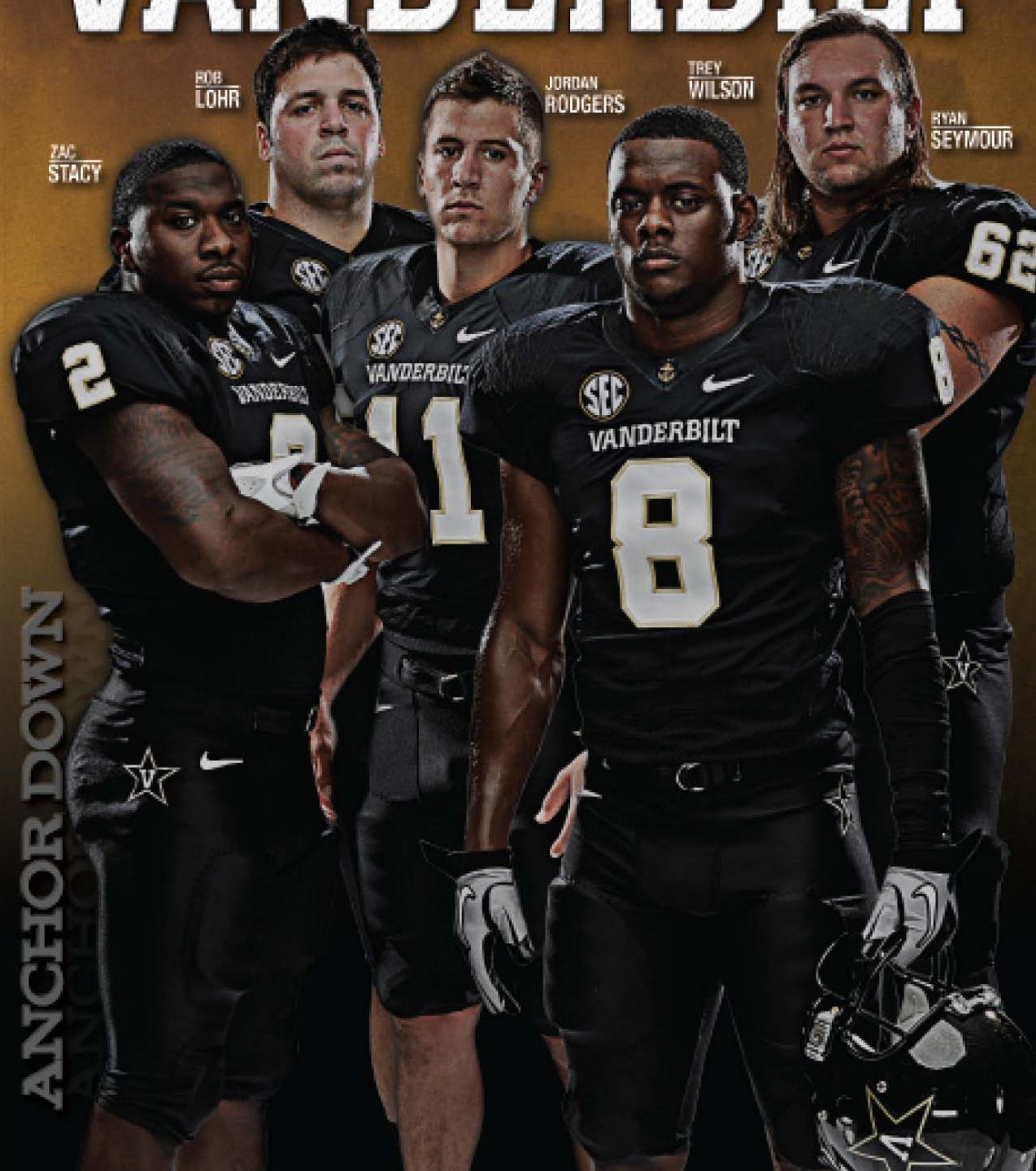

★ JAMES FRANKLIN'S FIRST YEAR



FRANKLIN INTRODUCED Dec. 17, 2010

Vanderbilt's 27th head coach – and first African-American – comes from Maryland. At 39, he's the youngest Commodore head coach in nearly two decades.

COACHING STAFF ANNOUNCED January 2011

Franklin's new Commodore staff includes three former Maryland assistants, a pair of former FCS defensive coordinators, three former BCS-level assistants and Vanderbilt's 2010 offensive line mentor.

ENJOYING THE STUDENTS Jan. 20, 2011

After a rousing introduction at men's basketball game, Franklin heads into the student section to greet Memorial Maniacs. Three weeks later, 17 students tryout for the football squad after Franklin visits dorms and fraternity row.

NATL. SIGNING DAY Feb. 15, 2011

Franklin makes a quick national splash, landing a 21-member class that includes two prospects with 4-star rankings.

SPRING GAME RETURNS TO CAMPUS April 17, 2011

Franklin caps first spring drills on campus by re-introducing the Black & Gold Spring Game. The televised event, capped by fireworks, draws thousands of Commodore faithful to Vanderbilt Stadium.

Playing on the road in Winston-Salem, the Dores' 41-7 win over Wake Forest is the team's sixth of the year.

NEW YEAR'S EVE ON BEALE
Dec. 31, 2011
Spurred on Franklin's urging, more than 30,000 Commodore fans journey to Memphis for a New Year's Eve match against ranked Cincinnati in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

NATIONAL SIGNING DAY
Feb. 1, 2012
Franklin's second class of 22 prospects ranks among program's finest. For first time ever, every signee is 3-stars or better. The class includes six elite players from Tennessee.





VANDERBILT ALL-STAR PROSPECTS



#8 TREY WILSON Sr., CB, Shreveport, La.

A senior cornerback, Wilson was one of the Commodores' top defensive playmakers in 2011. Wilson set a Vanderbilt team record – and shared the SEC seasonal lead – by returning two interceptions for touchdowns. His total of 11 passes defended ranks seventh among returning SEC DBs.

#62 RYAN SEYMOUR R-Sr., OT, Kingsland, Ga.

Seymour is a two-year starter who possesses the combination of strength and agility to play effectively at tackle or guard. As a junior, he was a recipient of weekly honors as the SEC's top offensive lineman. In 2011, Seymour's performance was one of the keys to Vanderbilt having the conference's most improved offense.

#94 RICHARD KENT R-Sr., P, Marietta, Ga.

A Ray Guy Award candidate, Kent was one of the SEC's most effective punters last year. His 41.2-yard net average ranked fourth in the SEC and was the highest by a Commodore since 1996. Opposing returners posted just 87 total yards on Kent's 64 punts last season.

#87 JORDAN MATTHEWS Jr., WR, Madison, Ala.

Matthews topped the SEC with a 19.0-yard per catch average as a sophomore. In his final six games, Matthews averaged 110.2 receiving yards.



VANDERBILT ALL-STAR PROSPECTS



#84 ROB LOHR R-Sr., DT, Phoenixville, Pa.

A Nagurski Trophy candidate, Lohr has been an extremely productive defensive tackle for the last two years. Lohr's 11.5 tackles for loss in 2011, which included five quarterback sacks, is the most of any returning tackle in the SEC. Lohr has started 25 consecutive games.

#67 WESLEY JOHNSON R-Jr., OT, Nashville, Tenn.

An Outland Trophy candidate, Johnson is one of the nation's most versatile offensive linemen. As a sophomore, he played effectively while earning multiple starts at center, guard and tackle. He has twice been recognized for weekly SEC offensive line honors. He has started all 25 games of his career.

#2 ZAC STACY Sr., RB, Centreville, Ala.

A Doak Walker and Maxwell Award candidate, Stacy is coming off the finest season ever by a Vanderbilt back. As a junior, he set team records with 1,193 rushing yards and 14 rushing TDs. Stacy ranks second among all active SEC running backs in career rushing yards and is SEC's top returning rusher from 2011. The senior needs 631 rushing yards to become the team's all-time career leader.

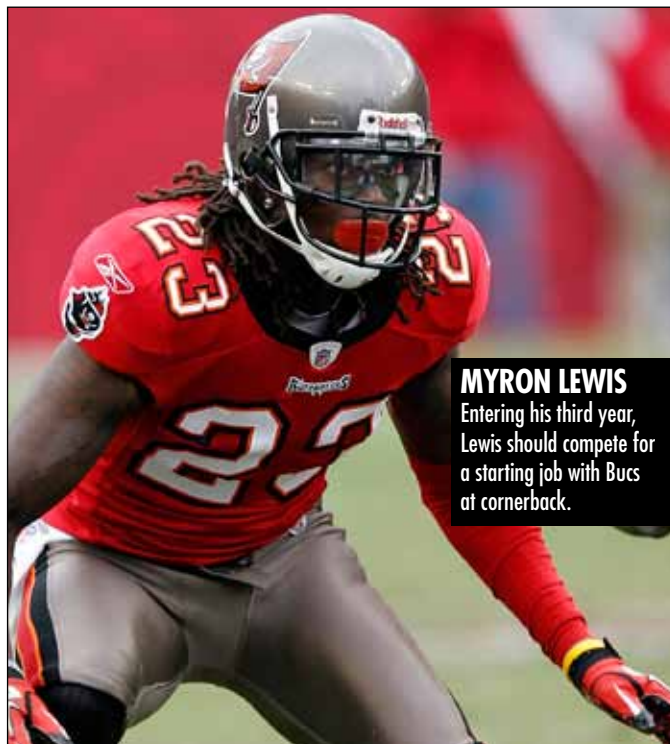

Two 2011 defensive standouts, Casey Hayward and Sean Richardson, had superb workouts at the 2012 NFL Combine.

Hayward, eventually selected in the second round by Green Bay, posted the best 20-yard shuttle of any cornerback.

Richardson, also now with the Packers, was even more impressive, turning in the top vertical jump and broad jump among all participating safeties.



CASEY HAYWARD

Eleven former Vanderbilt standouts are currently signed with National Football League teams looking to expand or begin pro careers.

The list of former Commodores includes six defensive players and five offensive standouts.

The contingent also includes four players on one NFL roster: Earl Bennett, Jay Cutler, D.J. Moore and Chris Williams are veterans on the Chicago Bears.

Two former Commodores standouts, Jonathan Goff and Thomas Welch, signed deals with new teams during the offseason. Goff, a former starting linebacker with the reigning world champion New York Giants, inked with another team from the NFC East, the Washington Redskins. Welch, an offensive lineman with New England and St. Louis last year, is with Philadelphia.

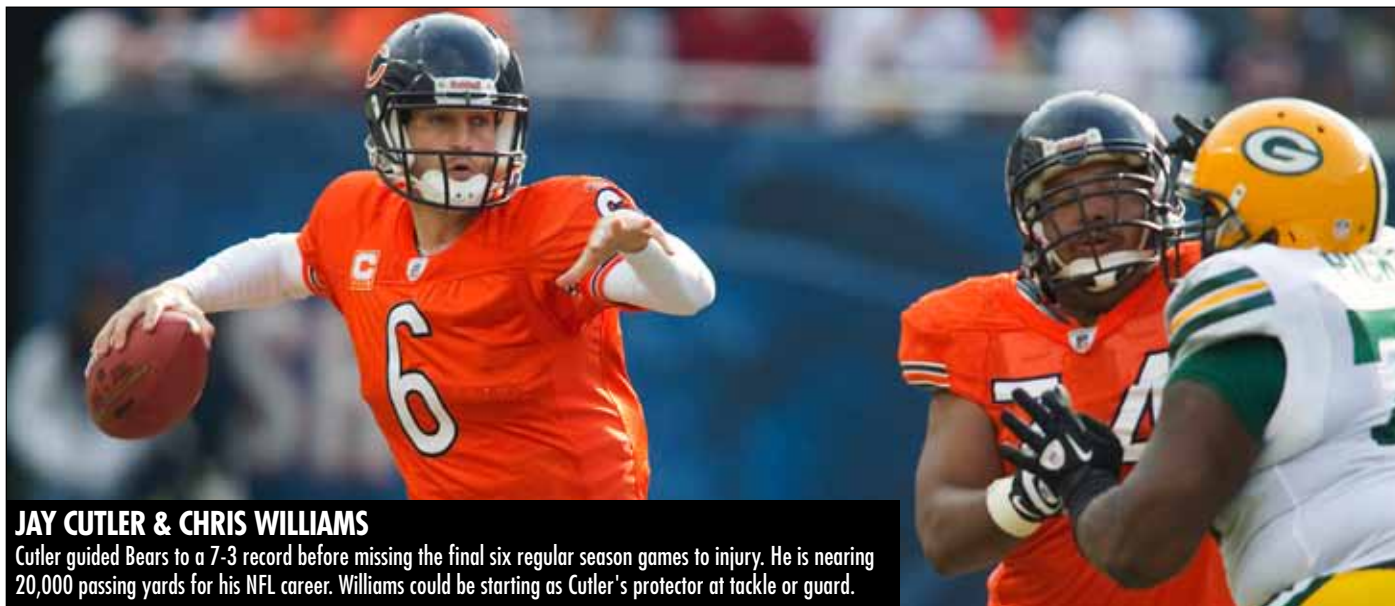
All-SEC defensive back Casey Hayward was drafted in the second round by the Green Bay Packers. Another 2011 All-SEC player, Tim Fugger, was later selected by Indianapolis.

Two others, Brandon Barden and Sean Richardson, signed rookie contracts with Tennessee and Green Bay, respectively.

Cutler guided Bears to a 7-3 record before missing the final six regular season games to injury. He is nearing 20,000 passing yards for his NFL career. Williams could be starting as Cutler's protector at tackle or guard.



D.J. MOORE

One of the NFL's top nickelbacks, Moore led Chicago with four interceptions last year.

FOUR FORMER 'DORES LIKELY TO START FOR BEARS

For the second straight year, four former Commodore standouts – quarterback Jay Cutler, offensive lineman Chris Williams, wide receiver Earl Bennett and defensive back D.J. Moore – could start for the Chicago Bears.

Cutler was off to his finest year in 2011 until an injury prematurely ended his season. The six-year veteran still threw for 2,319 yards and 13 touchdowns.

Moore's four interceptions topped the Bears' secondary for the second consecutive season.

Bennett averaged 15.9 yards on 24 receptions while limited to just nine appearances.

Williams was playing at a Pro Bowl level last year as a first-year starter at guard. The versatile Williams is expected to play left tackle this season.

PRODUCTIVE PRO DAY ON CAMPUS

Dwight Galt, known for producing some of the elite performers at the NFL Combine during his time at Maryland, lived up to that reputation in his first Pro Day as Vanderbilt's Director of Performance Enhancement.

NFL scouts raved about impressive individual performances at Vanderbilt's first Pro Day activity under Galt's direction. The on-campus event is held annually just before the NFL Draft.

Seven of the eight Commodore seniors that trained with Galt and participated in Pro Day made their way into NFL camps.

Two of the eight, Casey Hayward and Tim Fugger, were selected in the draft. Two others, Sean Richardson and Brandon Barden, signed rookie free agent deals. T.J. Greenstone, Larry Smith and Kyle Fischer used the training to earn tryouts.

Pro Day provides players a stage to showcase their skills in front of NFL teams through a series of agility tests and on-field drills.

VANDERBILT FOOTBALL SEC ACADEMIC LEADERS

The Vanderbilt football team continues to be an academic achievement leader in the Southeastern Conference and NCAA.

Vanderbilt topped the SEC in graduation success rates released by the NCAA in June 2012. The Commodore football program also received the NCAA's APR Public Recognition Award.

In 2008, the Commodore program received the American Football Coaches Association Academic Achievement Award after graduating 95 percent of its 2001 recruiting class. It marked the third time for Vanderbilt to claim the award.

SCENIC URBAN CAMPUS HOME TO UNIQUE EDUCATION

Located in the popular Midtown district of Nashville, Vanderbilt is regarded among the nation's finest universities. The private research university enrolled 6,817 undergraduate and 6,042 postgraduate students last year. Those students arrive on campus from all 50 states and nearly 100 countries.

The university was founded 139 years ago when shipping and rail magnate "Commodore" Cornelius Vanderbilt provided an initial \$1 million endowment.

Vanderbilt is one of 10 charter members of the Southeastern Conference. It is the only private school among the SEC's expanded 14-member universities.

Vanderbilt is ranked among the top universities in America. In its popular annual "Best Colleges" edition, *U.S. News & World Report* most recently ranked Vanderbilt No. 17 among all national universities. The magazine also placed Vanderbilt No. 2 among schools located in the Southeast.

The campus is located 1.5 miles southwest of downtown Nashville on 330 pristine acres that was designated a national arboretum in 1988. Two focal areas of campus closed to vehicles – the Peabody campus and the collection of academic buildings surrounding Kirkland Hall that form the original campus – are frequently listed among the most beautiful college environments in the South.

Though located within walking distance of downtown activities, the quality of Vanderbilt life is reflected in much smaller, less public ways – running into friends while walking on campus, researching papers or grabbing a late-night snack with friends, choosing between a public policy lecture or athletic event, or having dinner at a professor's home.

Most Vanderbilt undergraduates live on campus during their time at the university. Thirty-four residential halls dot the campus, ranging from the four towers off West End Avenue to The Ingram Commons, a state-of-the-art complex for Vanderbilt's first-year students that has attracted national acclaim for its design and unique living experience.

Vanderbilt offers numerous degrees in four undergraduate colleges: the College of Arts and Science, Peabody College, School of Engineering and Blair School of Music.

From its scenic location along the Cumberland River, Nashville is a metropolitan place that proudly exudes all of the charm and hospitality one expects from a grand Southern capital city.

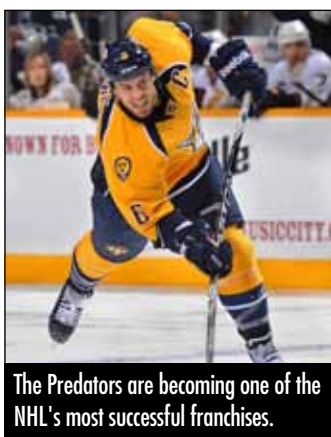

NASHVILLE: HOME TO GREAT SPORTS

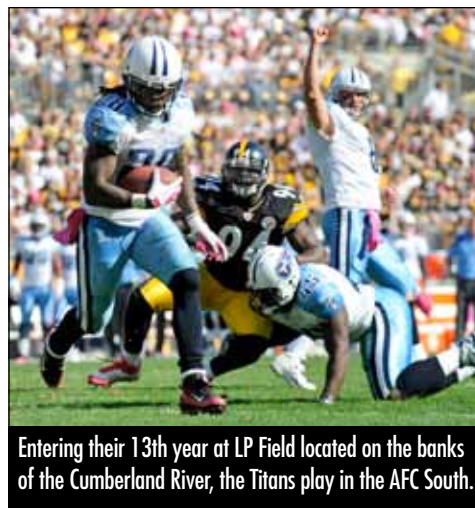


The Predators are becoming one of the NHL's most successful franchises.

Nashville ranks among the nation's best destinations for sports fans. In its 2011 "America's Best Sports Cities" edition, *The Sporting News* placed Nashville 16th on its list.

Of course, Vanderbilt athletic events are high on the Music City sports calendar. In addition to the Commodores, Nashville is home to two successful pro teams: the NFL's Titans and the NHL's Predators. Every Titans game features capacity crowds.

Bridgestone Arena has been named by various sources as one of American's top multi-event venues. The 18,000-seat arena is home to the Predators and will host the SEC basketball tourney, opening rounds of the men's NCAA tourney and the NCAA women's basketball Final Four in the near future.

THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE



A LEAGUE WITHOUT PEER



Vanderbilt is a charter member of the Southeastern Conference, which expanded to 14 teams this year with the addition of Missouri and Texas A&M. During the last six years, SEC football has experienced success that is unparalleled in college football history.

- Remarkably, SEC teams have captured the last six BCS national championships. How deep is the SEC quality? Those six straight national titles have been captured by four different teams.
- In the BCS era that dates to 1998, the SEC owns eight titles, six more than any other conference. Even more impressively, SEC teams are an undefeated 8-0 in title games.

- For the first time in 75 years of the Associated Press poll, the SEC has also claimed six consecutive Press national titles.
- Since 2006, the SEC is 9-3 in BCS bowl games. Overall, the league is 36-19 (.655) in bowl games since 2006. This includes two appearances by the Commodores.
- SEC teams were 48-8 (.857) in non-conference play last year, with Vanderbilt enjoying a 4-0 mark.
- In 2011, 283 former SEC players were on NFL rosters. That's more than any other conference. Ten of those players were former Vanderbilt standouts.
- Since 2006, the SEC has averaged 39.5 players drafted in the NFL, more than any other league. Ten were picked in the 1st round last year. Two Commodores, Jay Cutler and Chris Williams, have been selected in the 1st round since the 2006 draft.
- Three of the last five Heisman Trophy winners have come from SEC schools. In recent years, top SEC players have walked away with virtually every other significant postseason award.

THE COMMODORES ON TV

Vanderbilt is part of the Southeastern Conference's unmatched national TV package.

On Aug. 30, the Commodores will kick off ESPN's 2012 coverage of college football by hosting South Carolina.



Every Commodore game is available on television due to national contracts between the SEC and CBS Sports and ESPN, and regional packages with Comcast Sports Southeast and FOX.

Annually, SEC encounters on CBS, ESPN and ESPN2 are among the most watched college games of the year.

Vanderbilt games also bring outstanding audiences. In 2011, the Vanderbilt-Alabama encounter was ESPN's highest rated college football game of the year for the primetime slot.

Vanderbilt's conference victories over Ole Miss and Kentucky were among four Commodore games aired on the SEC Network.





RISING EXPECTATIONS

The Vanderbilt Commodores return 16 starters and 44 letterwinners for the 2012 season. The returnees include nine starters and 20 letterwinners on offense, seven starters and 20 letterwinners on defense, and the team's top three specialists.

Vanderbilt looks to improve off a 2011 campaign that featured first-year Head Coach James Franklin guiding the Commodores to their fifth postseason bowl appearance in team history. The Commodores showed across-the-board progress last year, with both offensive and defensive units ranking as the most improved in the Southeastern Conference. For the first time in 28 years, the Commodores produced more points and total offense than their opponents.

The Commodore offense, which topped the SEC last year in explosive plays, features a backfield of All-SEC running back Zac Stacy and fifth-year senior quarterback Jordan Rodgers and looks to have 2009 SEC Freshman of the Year Warren Norman available at running back. Nine of the team's top receivers from 2011 return, including productive wideouts Chris Boyd and Jordan Matthews. The bulk of Vanderbilt's offensive line also returns, including starters Wesley Johnson, Ryan Seymour, Josh Jelesky and Andrew Bridges.

The Commodores return eight of its top defensive line performers from last year, including starting tackles Rob Lohr and Colt Nichter, and ends Walker May and Johnell Thomas. Three

linebackers with starting experience in 2011 – Archibald Barnes, Chase Garnham and Tristan Strong – headline the linebacking corps. Cornerback Trey Wilson and safeties Kenny Ladler and Javon Marshall are returning starters in a deep Commodore

secondary.

For the second time in six years, Vanderbilt kicks off ESPN's coverage of FBS college football. On Thursday, Aug. 30, the on-campus meeting between Vanderbilt and

South Carolina serves as ESPN's first broadcast on a busy Labor Day Weekend.

The schedule has Vanderbilt making early-season road trips to Northwestern, Georgia and Missouri before returning to Nashville for home games against Florida on Oct. 13, Auburn on Oct. 20 and Massachusetts on Oct. 27. In November, road games against Kentucky, Ole Miss and Wake Forest are sandwiched around the Commodores' home finale against Tennessee on Nov. 17.

OFFENSIVE BACKFIELD

STARTERS BACK: 2 LETTERWINNERS: 6

Blessed with one of the Southeastern Conference's top running backs and a returning starter at quarterback, the Commodore backfield appears to be a team strength as the 2012 season nears.

While senior tailback **Zac Stacy** and senior quarterback **Jordan Rodgers** are expected to headline the Commodore offense, several others possess the skill to produce breakout seasons.

The coaches expect Rodgers to build off an impressive late-season performance. Inserted midway through the season, Rodgers ranked among the SEC regular season leaders in passing yards and total offense. Utilizing dual-threat abilities, the younger brother of Green Bay Packers' standout Aaron Rodgers helped the offense average 31.6 points and 413 yards as a starter. Rodgers also created superb chemistry with young receivers **Jordan Matthews** and **Chris Boyd**.

Rodgers will face stiff competition at quarterback. Waiting in the wings is junior **Austyn Carta-Samuels**, who like Rodgers, transferred to Vanderbilt from the West. Carta-Samuels' credentials as a two-year starter at Wyoming of the Mountain West Conference rival those of Rodgers. He threw for 3,655 yards and 19 touchdowns at Wyoming, and guided the Cowboys to a bowl victory in 2009.

Freshman **Patton Robinette** also impressed in spring drills.

One of the top aims for Vanderbilt's quarterback will be to get the ball in Stacy's hands. Stacy earned All-SEC honors after setting team records with 1,193 rushing yards and 14 rushing touchdowns. Stacy also proved that he can handle the load of a No. 1 running back in the SEC, averaging 121 yards over the final seven games.

One of the most pleasant developments from Spring Practice was the return of Stacy's former running mate, junior **Warren Norman**. The coaches hope the Norman that rushed for 1,242 yards in 2009-10 returns this fall.

Powerfully built sophomore **Jerron Seymour** was a potent No. 2 back to Stacy in 2011. Versatile athlete **Wesley Tate** also impressed the staff during spring drills, bringing greater size and power to the run game. Tate also has been productive as a receiving threat.

Brian Kimbrow is a highly regarded freshman who possesses tremendous quickness and explosive moves.

The top fullbacks are juniors **Fitz Lassing** and **Marc Panu**.

RECEIVING CORPS

STARTERS BACK: 3 LETTERWINNERS: 8

The Commodores return one of the Southeastern Conference's top wide receiver tandems and a crop of newcomers hoping to bring big-play abilities to the Vanderbilt offense.

First-year coach **Josh Gattis** returns virtually the entire wide receiving corps intact from the AutoZone Liberty Bowl squad. Tight ends mentor **Charles Bankins** also has multiple letterwinners back, though he must replace graduated starter Brandon Barden.

The Commodores return their four most productive wide receivers from a year ago: **Jordan Matthews**, **Chris Boyd**, **Jonathan Krause**

and **Wesley Tate**. Together, the four accumulated 117 catches for 1,609 yards.

Matthews and Boyd became one of the SEC's most potent duos during 2011, combining for 13 touchdown catches. Matthews comes off the best season by a Vanderbilt receiver since Earl Bennett smashed numerous team records in 2007. He also finished the season off in style, averaging 110 receiving yards during the final six games. Boyd posted eight touchdown catches, the most by a Commodore since 2005.

Krause and Tate each topped 20 receptions last year. **John Cole**, the team's active career leader in catches, and **Trent Pruitt** also return.

Redshirt freshmen

Josh Grady and **Jacquese Kirk** were standouts during spring drills and could easily play their way into substantial roles this fall.

The heralded 2012 signing class also includes two prospects at wide receiver, **Cory Batey** and **Tip McKenzie**.

Sixth-year player **Austin Monahan** is the Commodores' most experienced tight end. He will compete with a pair of talented youngsters, sophomore **Dillon van der Wal** and redshirt freshman **Steven Scheu**.

One of the team's most impressive performers during Spring Practice was redshirt freshman **Kris Kentera**, who made numerous plays after moving from quarterback to H-back. Kentera and junior **Fitz Lassing** are the team's top H-backs.

OFFENSIVE LINE

STARTERS BACK: 4 LETTERWINNERS: 7

For the second straight year, the Commodores return an offensive line largely intact from the previous season. The returnees also include some of the top offensive linemen in recent team history.

In 2011, the line helped Vanderbilt produce the Southeastern Conference's most improved offense. The Commodores scored 38 touchdowns in 2011, the most since 1948. The team's 24 rushing touchdowns nearly matched the combined total from the 2009-10

seasons. The squad averaged nearly 50 yards more per game, allowing Vanderbilt to enjoy big increases in total first downs and time of possession. Individually, the line opened gaps for **Zac Stacy**, who set new Vanderbilt single-season records with 1,193 rushing yards and 14 touchdowns.

The line will be anchored by a pair of veterans in **Ryan Seymour** and **Wesley Johnson**. Both are experienced, versatile and All-SEC caliber

performers. Seymour gives the Commodores a physical presence at left guard and has the abilities to play either tackle role. Johnson was one of the SEC's top linemen in 2011, playing effectively while starting at all three line positions.

Josh Jelesky and **Andrew Bridges** gave the Commodores a big lift last year as first-year starters at right guard and right tackle, respectively.

Two improving sophomores, **Spencer Pulley** and **Joe Townsend**, pushed each other in Spring Ball at center and appear destined to compete for that starting role in preseason camp.

Several young prospects, including **Chase White**, **Jake Bernstein**, **James Lewis** and **Grant Ramsay**, are expected to push for key playing roles.

Last winter, the Commodores did a superb job of creating depth by inking six offensive line prospects. Keen recruiting experts believe the signing class of **Adam Butler**, **Blake Fromang**, **Barrett Gouger**, **Will Holden**, **Andrew Jelks** and **Kevin McCoy** ranks as the finest collection of offensive line prospects in team history.

DEFENSIVE LINE

STARTERS BACK: 3 LETTERWINNERS: 9

The Vanderbilt defensive line looks to continue the same aggressive and opportunistic play that characterized its performance in 2011.

Nine of 12 letterwinners return from a corps that helped Vanderbilt witness a tremendous, one-year turnaround in its defensive play. The unit produced across-the-board improvements last season, soaring from 95th to 18th in total defense, 99th to 25th in rush defense, 92nd to 29th in scoring defense, and 89th to sixth in total interceptions.

Second-year coach **Sean Spencer** has plenty of key contributors back from a year ago. The Commodores return their entire five-player rotation at tackle and four of their most productive ends from the 2011 squad.

Returning starters **Rob Lohr** and **Colt Nichter** are back for their final seasons at tackle. With nine sacks and 20.5 tackles for loss to his credit, Lohr has a chance to conclude his career as the most accomplished Vanderbilt defensive tackle since James Manley earned All-SEC honors in the mid-1990s.

Lohr and Nichter face plenty of competition trying to secure their starting roles. **Jared Morse**, **Vince Taylor** and **Barron Dixon** are experienced tackles who will contend for starting assignments. **Conor Hart** is another untested prospect. **Thad McHaney**, a big defensive end, can also contribute inside at tackle.

Barnes, Strong and Garnham will be asked to produce on the field and fill a leadership void left by the departure of three-time all-conference recipient Chris Marve, who graduated as the team's No. 8 all-time tackler and as one of the finest leaders in program history.

Garnham appears likely to replace Marve at inside linebacker. Blessed with outstanding physical abilities, Garnham impressed the coaches during spring drills with his growing knowledge of the defensive scheme.

Barnes was extremely productive when inserted into the lineup as an outside linebacker last year.

In just nine starts,

Barnes ranked fourth on the team with 59 total tackles. He also consistently caused turnovers, sharing the team lead with three forced fumbles and nabbing two interceptions, including one at Tennessee that he returned for a 100-yard touchdown.

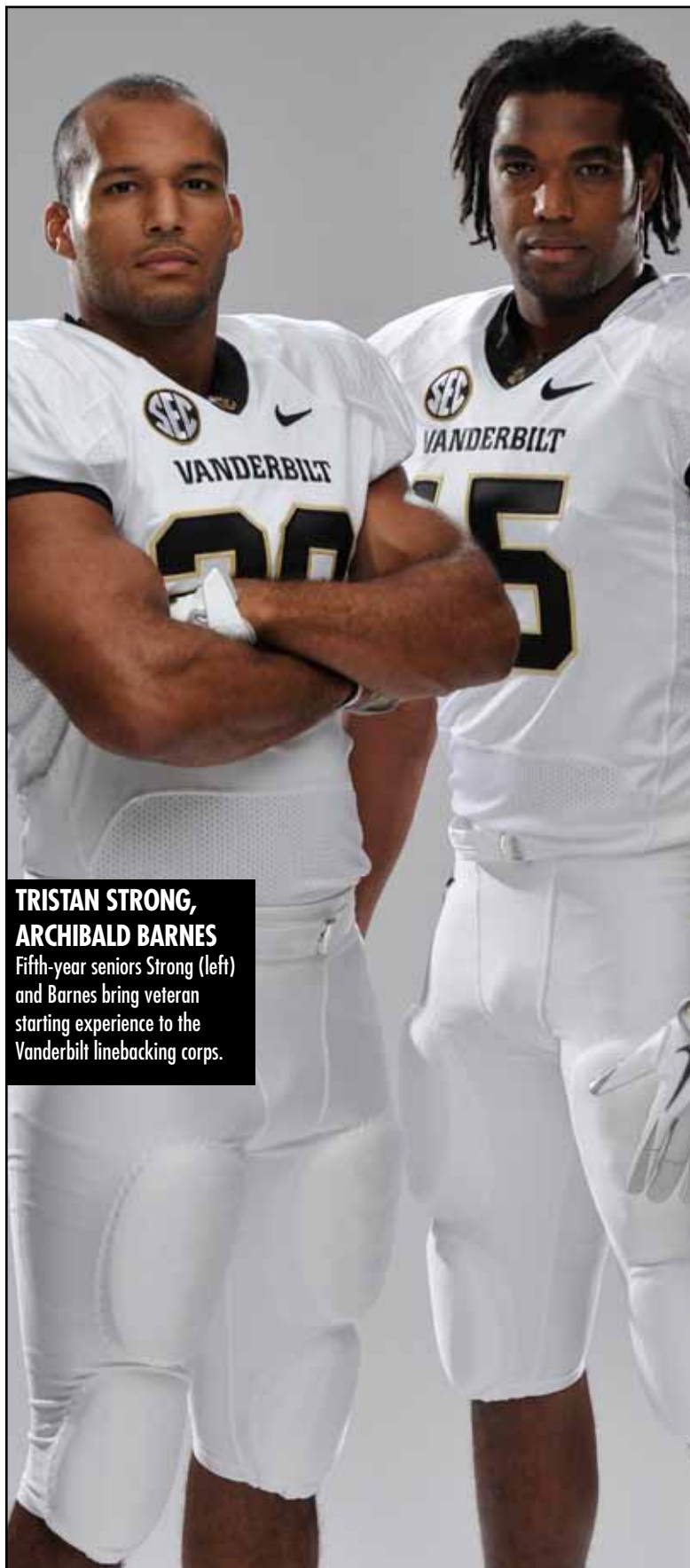
Early in the 2011 season, Strong was one of the team's top defensive performers, contributing 13 solo tackles in four starts.

Darreon Herring, a mature freshman who enrolled last January, impressed with his athleticism and natural ability to find the football during spring drills.

Another promising linebacker exiting Spring Practice was redshirt freshman **Kellen Williams** at the inside role.

Harding Harper, **Jake Sealand** and **Ja'karri Thomas** are three other signees that bring plenty of promise to the linebacking corps: Sealand has tremendous leadership skills and appears to fit the inside linebacker role; Harper and Thomas are superb athletes who could make strong cases for playing time during camp.

The staff also used spring drills to introduce the Star position as a future linebacker-safety hybrid role. Junior **Karl Butler** was a spring standout playing the role. Redshirt freshman **Larry Franklin** also enjoyed snaps at the position.

Vanderbilt returns a bevy of talented cornerbacks and safeties from a secondary that ranked among the NCAA leaders in interceptions last year.

Two starters are back in the defensive secondary: senior cornerback **Trey Wilson** and junior safety **Javon Marshall** at safety. Junior **Kenny Ladler** also returns with starts at safety.

The Commodores must replace two productive starters in All-America cornerback Casey Hayward and three-year starting safety Sean Richardson. Hayward finished his career with a share of the team all-time interceptions record and was drafted by Green Bay in the second round. Richardson, among Vanderbilt's all-time Top 25 tacklers, also inked a free agent deal with Green Bay.

As a first-year starter in 2011, Wilson posted three interceptions and tied a team record by returning two for scores.

Junior **Andre Hal** earned Hayward's vacant starting role with an impressive spring performance. Senior **Eddie Foster** and junior **Steven Clarke**, will compete for key roles in multiple defensive back sets.

Redshirt freshman **Derek King** and a trio of promising signees – **Brandon Banks**, **Paris Head** and **Torren McGlaster** – will get a close look during camp.

At safety, Marshall brings a reputation for punishing tackles at safety. He also possesses natural leadership skills. Ladler has been a productive player

for two years, and enters the season with 110 total tackles, most of any current player in the secondary.

Two other returning safeties with plenty of talent, senior **Eric Samuels** and junior **Karl Butler**, will compete for starting roles. Samuels is one of the Commodores' top athletes, owning the skill to play safety or nickel in multiple receiver formations. Butler is a physical, hard-hitter, and appears tailored to the unit's "Star" hybrid position that was introduced during spring drills.

The coaches also are eager to see the development of two redshirt freshman safeties, **Andrew Williamson** and **Jahmel McIntosh**.

The Commodores return veteran and productive performers in all phases of special teams.

In 2011, Vanderbilt featured an efficient and innovative kicking game and big-play capabilities in the return game. With the starting punter, placekicker, snapper and returners back from a year ago, there's reason to expect continued improvement in Vanderbilt special teams.

Two-year starter **Richard Kent** is one of the nation's most underrated punters. Likely to finish his career among the elite punters in team history, Kent maintains one of the nation's top net punt averages. In 2011, Vanderbilt ranked No. 6 nationally in punt coverage.

Ryan Fowler and **Carey Spear** will compete for the team's placekicking duties. Both impressed during Spring Practice when Franklin and his staff placed even more attention on their kickers.

Walk-ons **Taylor Hudson** and **Marc Rosen** provide kicking depth.

Andrew East is expected to return as the team's top snapper. He handled all of the snapping responsibilities last year as a first-year player. East will be backed by **Connor Morrison** among others.

The 'Dores also expect to have **Warren Norman** available for kick returns. In 2009, Norman set a Vanderbilt record by returning three kicks for touchdowns. Norman's 25.9-yard career average also ranks as a team record.

Eric Samuels and **Steven Clarke** also have solid experience returning kicks.

Jonathan Krause and **John Cole** are the Commodores' most experienced punt returners.

HEAD COACH JAMES FRANKLIN



In one season, Vanderbilt Head Coach James Franklin became the only first-year coach in school history to guide the Commodores to a bowl game, surpassed the total wins achieved by the program in each of its previous two seasons and reeled in the best recruiting class in school history.

Through his successes, Franklin has sent a jolt of positive energy throughout Vanderbilt's football program that has been buoyed by an infectious personality and unmatched passion for the Commodores.

Hired as the first African-American head coach in Vanderbilt gridiron history on Dec. 17, 2010, Franklin guided the Commodores to an appearance in the 53rd AutoZone Liberty Bowl on New Year's Eve and had the Commodores competing at a high level in the best college football conference in the nation.

Franklin's 2011 Commodores did not just compete; they did so at levels rarely witnessed at the school. The team totally reversed two consecutive seasons of disappointment by earning the fifth postseason appearance in school history.

Vanderbilt's drastic improvements can also be measured by statistics. Under Franklin, the Commodores featured the Southeastern Conference's most improved offense and defense. Offensively, the unit scored more points than any Vanderbilt team in the previous 50 years. The defense soared from 95th nationally in total defense to 18th in Franklin's first year.

Just as Franklin has made an immediate impact on the football field, he has done the same in the Vanderbilt and Nashville community. Whether it

is speaking before civic groups or helping move students into their dorms, Franklin has made a strong impact in the community by embracing each opportunity with the same passion he does a football game.

At the same time, Franklin's openness has provided other members of the community with unforgettable behind-the-scenes experiences, such as an inspiring local 11-year-old boy joining Franklin to lead the team on the field for homecoming.

Franklin has also given the public never-before-seen access by allowing cameras and journalists inside the program. Such media outlets as Sports Illustrated, CNN/SI.com, SBNation.com and the Washington Post have chronicled the Commodores with in-depth stories in Franklin's first year.

Franklin's first season began with a convincing 45-14 season-opening victory. In the second game against defending Big East champion UCONN, he set the tone for the season. Seeing a lack of energy with his team trailing 21-14 in the fourth quarter, an emotional Franklin rallied his squad, telling all that this Vanderbilt football team was different from the others. Within minutes, cornerback Casey Hayward returned an interception 50 yards for a touchdown, and Carey Spear capped the comeback with a 31-yard field goal. One week later, the Commodores were off to an impressive 3-0 start after a resounding 30-7 win over Ole Miss.

Two games later, the Commodores returned home to play eventual SEC East champion Georgia in what turned out to be one of the most intense games of the season. But it was Franklin's reaction after the bitter 33-28





midseason defeat to the Bulldogs drew more admiration from Commodore fans. "We're going to compete with class," Franklin said at the postgame press conference. "But we are not going to sit back and take stuff from anybody. Those days are long gone and never coming back. Ever!"

The Commodores seemed to take momentum from the Georgia disappointment. Vanderbilt outscored its final six opponents by a 193-117 margin. Late-season victories included a 38-8 win over Kentucky, which marked the the program's widest margin over an SEC team in 40 years, and a decisive 41-7 road triumph over Wake Forest to achieve bowl eligibility.

Vanderbilt's six wins were two more than the combined total of the 2009 and 2010 Commodore teams. The team went 4-0 in non-SEC games and won five of its games at home, the most victories at Vanderbilt Stadium since the mid-1990s. The Commodores also outscored their opponents by 73 points, a remarkable 244-point improvement over the previous year. The 73-point differential is the program's largest since 1974.

Several Vanderbilt players enjoyed tremendous seasons during Franklin's first year on campus. Junior running back Zac Stacy put together the finest rushing season in Commodore history, setting a team single-season record of 1,193 yards. He also rushed for 14 touchdowns, the highest total in modern-day team history. Junior Jordan Rodgers passed for 1,523 yards – the most ever by a first-year Vanderbilt quarterback – and tossed nine touchdowns. Sophomore Jordan Mathews blossomed as Rodgers' top target, averaging 111 receiving yards during the final six regular season games. Another young receiver, Chris Boyd, topped all SEC freshmen with seven touchdown catches. Wesley Johnson, Ryan Seymour and Kyle Fischer earned weekly honors from the SEC. On defense, Hayward matched the all-time Vanderbilt record with 15 interceptions, became just the third Commodore All-American in the last decade, and was selected by the Green Bay Packers in the second round of the NFL Draft. Hayward, senior linebacker Chris Marve and senior defensive end Tim Fugger also earned All-SEC recognition.

As a result of his success, Vanderbilt's administration committed to Franklin on a long-term basis following the regular season. Vanderbilt extended his contract with a pay raise and promised a series of major

upgrades, including the addition of new team and position meeting rooms, new videoboard, lights and synthetic turf in the stadium, and the construction of an indoor multi-purpose facility on campus in 2013.

Numerous media outlets focusing on college football have taken notice. In a recent article, the *Sporting News* named Franklin as one of the nation's Top 25 head coaches. An array of national publications have journeyed to Nashville to chronicle Franklin's impact on the Commodore program.

Prior to accepting the Vanderbilt position, Franklin spent the last five seasons coordinating highly productive offensive units at top Division I programs. Most recently, Franklin served as offensive coordinator and assistant head coach at the University of Maryland. In 2010, Maryland enjoyed an impressive one-year turnaround with a 9-4 campaign. Franklin's explosive offense averaged 32.2 points and topped 50 points in three games. Maryland redshirt freshman quarterback Danny O'Brien finished the season as one of the nation's most efficient signal callers, throwing for 2,438 yards, 22 touchdowns, and only eight interceptions while earning ACC Rookie of the Year honors. First team All-ACC receiver Torrey Smith, an eventual second round NFL pick, flourished under Franklin's system, finishing 2010 with 67 receptions, 1,055 receiving yards and 12 touchdowns.

Franklin went to Maryland after spending the 2006-07 seasons as offensive coordinator at Kansas State. He helped the Wildcats earn their first winning season in four years and a berth in the inaugural Texas Bowl. In 2006, Franklin focused on mentoring talented true freshman quarterback Josh Freeman. In 2007, Franklin's offense produced a 3,000-yard passer (Freeman), 1,500-yard receiver (All-America wide receiver Jordy Nelson), and 1,000-yard rusher for the first time in school history.

Today, Freeman and Nelson have found great success in the NFL. Freeman is the starting quarterback for Tampa Bay after being selected in the first round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Nelson grabbed a touchdown pass in the Green Bay Packers' 2011 victory in Super Bowl XLV.

Franklin spent the 2005 season coaching wide receivers for the Green Bay Packers under Mike Sherman. During that season, wide receiver Donald Driver set new career-high marks with 86 receptions for 1,221 yards.

After his brief but successful NFL tenure, Franklin returned to college coaching for the opportunity to devise offensive schemes and gain in-game play calling experience at the coordinator level. Franklin's opportunity with the most storied team in the NFL came on the heels of a five-year role coaching wide receivers at Maryland. During his tenure, the Terps earned three postseason berths including an appearance in the 2002 BCS FedEx Orange Bowl.

Franklin's role expanded to recruiting coordinator in 2003. Franklin delivered back-to-back recruiting classes ranked in the Top-25 by Rivals.com.

Early in his career, Franklin committed himself to being a student of

Franklin began his career in 1995 as the wide receivers coach at Kutztown (Pa.) University. Then, he returned to his alma mater, East Stroudsburg (Pa.) University learning the game from the defensive side of the ball coaching cornerbacks and safeties under veteran coach Denny Douds. He earned a Division I position at James Madison University coaching wide receivers.

In 1998, Franklin earned his first opportunity to participate in the NFL's Minority Coaching Fellowship Program. Franklin interned with the Minnesota Vikings, the Philadelphia Eagles and the Miami Dolphins. Franklin also worked with Mike Price coaching tight ends at Washington State in 1998. The following year, Franklin helped Idaho State rank among the NCAA's best in total offense as ISU's receivers coach.

Franklin developed a passion for the game as a four-year letter winning quarterback at East Stroudsburg. He was a two-time Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference selection. As a senior, he garnered MVP honors and was a Harlon Hill Trophy nominee for Division II Player of the Year after setting seven school records.

Franklin earned a Bachelor's in psychology from East Stroudsburg in 1995 and a Master's in educational leadership from Washington State in 1999.

Franklin and his family have become fast fans of Nashville. He and his wife, Fumi, are the parents of two daughters, Shola, 5, and Addy, 4.

JOHN DONOVAN

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR; RUNNING BACKS

The first Commodore offense coordinated by John Donovan was a big hit on the Vanderbilt campus.

Donovan, who helped develop explosive offenses at the University of Maryland with James Franklin, coordinated the most productive Vanderbilt unit in decades during the 2011 season.

Donovan's offense was the Southeastern Conference's most improved last year. The offense averaged 26.7 points, nearly 10 more than the previous year, and produced more rushing and passing yards than in 2010.

Donovan's top running back last year, junior Zac Stacy, set new single-season team records with 1,193 rushing yards and 14 rushing touchdowns.

The Vanderbilt offense scored 347 total points, the most by any Commodore team since the 1920s.

The unit rushed for 13 more touchdowns than in 2010. The team's 339.1-yard total offense average was the highest since Jay Cutler guided the Commodore attack in the mid-2000s. The offense also produced a substantial one-year increase in time of possession by amassing more first downs, enjoying higher third down and red-zone successes, and permitting less turnovers than the 2010 edition.

Franklin and Donovan were key offensive assistants under Ralph Friedgen at Maryland – Franklin

serving as coordinator and Donovan working with running backs. After Franklin accepted the Vanderbilt post in December 2010, Donovan called offensive plays during the Terrapins' impressive 51-20 Military Bowl victory. The resounding postseason win capped a 9-4 season for Maryland.

The 2010 Terrapins featured a powerful offensive attack that ranked second in the Atlantic Coast Conference in scoring offense with a 32.2-point average. The unit was also efficient with just 14 turnovers, allowing Maryland to rank No. 6 nationally in turnover margin.

The 2010 campaign was Donovan's fourth at Maryland working with running backs. His top back, Da'Rel Scott, enjoyed a breakout campaign with 1,133 rushing yards and first team All-ACC honors in 2008.

Donovan mentored Maryland's quarterbacks in the 2006 and 2007 campaigns. In 2006, Donovan coached All-ACC quarterback Sam Hollenbach to his finest year as he threw for 2,371 yards and 15 touchdowns, and was named MVP of Maryland's Champs Sports Bowl victory over Purdue. Prior to taking over as running backs coach in 2005, Donovan served as Maryland's assistant recruiting coordinator under Friedgen, who hired Donovan as an offensive graduate assistant from 1998-2000 at Georgia Tech.

A 1997 graduate of Johns Hopkins, Donovan was a three-year starter at defensive back for the Blue Jays, earning 12 career interceptions.

Donovan earned a Bachelor's in Sociology from Johns Hopkins in 1997. He later earned a Master's in Economics from Georgia Tech.

Donovan and his wife, Stacey, are the parents of a son, John Patrick, 6; and two daughters: Cate, 4, and Shea, 2.

BOB SHOOP

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR; SAFETIES

Defensive coordinator Bob Shoop returns for his second year with the Commodores after guiding one of the NCAA's most impressive defensive turnarounds in 2011.

The Vanderbilt coordinator and safeties coach directed the 2011 unit to staggering levels of improvement. Under Shoop's guidance, the Commodore defense ranked ninth in the NCAA in pass defense efficiency and 18th in total defense. It also ranked among the nation's top units in total interceptions, points allowed and rush defense.

A 24-year veteran in the coaching ranks, Shoop joined James Franklin in Nashville following a superb four-year tenure as defensive coordinator at William & Mary where the one-time Columbia head coach guided a remarkable transformation of the Tribe defense.

was staggering: in 2010, the Commodores ranked 10th or worse among SEC teams in virtually every defensive statistic; in 2011, Vanderbilt ranked seventh or better in 12 of 13 top defensive statistical categories. The 2011 Commodore defense allowed 9.6 fewer points and 96.4 less yards than a year earlier.

Shoop's unit also nabbed 19 interceptions, 10 more than in 2010, helping the Commodores to a plus-5 improvement in turnover margin.

Shoop's 2011 defense limited three BCS-level teams – Ole Miss, Kentucky and Wake Forest – to eight points or less. The unit also held five opponents to under 100 rushing yards.

At William & Mary, Shoop's defenses ranked among the top defenses in NCAA FCS football. In 2009, W&M ended the year first nationally in rush defense (61.1 ypg) and second in scoring defense (12.1 ppg.). The performance helped earn Shoop the 2009 *FootballScoop* NCAA FCS Coordinator of the Year Award. He was also nominated for *FootballScoop*'s 2011 Defensive Back Coach of the Year Award after his first season at Vanderbilt.

Shoop's résumé spans two decades, including three stints as a defensive coordinator (Yale, 1994-96; Villanova, 1997; William & Mary, 2007-10) and three years as the head coach at Columbia (2003-05).

Before becoming Columbia's head coach, Shoop served as secondary coach at Boston College from 1999-2002.

As an assistant, Shoop has been on the winning sideline of three classic college rivalries: Army-Navy, Harvard-Yale and Boston College-Notre Dame.

Shoop played collegiate football at Yale. He earned honorable mention All-Ivy accolades in 1987 as a receiver and was recognized with Yale Football's prestigious Robert Gardner Anderson Memorial Award for team spirit, dedication and leadership. He also earned four letters in baseball. A native of Oakmont, Pa., Shoop was inducted into the Allegheny-Kiski Valley Sports Hall of Fame.

Shoop and his wife, Maura, have two children, Tyler and Jay. Shoop's brother, John, is regarded as a top offensive mind and served as offensive coordinator at the University of North Carolina last year.

Charles Banks enters his second season at Vanderbilt as special teams coordinator and tight ends coach under James Franklin.

After working alongside Franklin at Maryland in 2009-10, Banks brought his special teams expertise to Vanderbilt last year and quickly gave the Commodore program improved play in the third phase of football.

Banks' special teams lived up to Franklin's promise of special teams excellence, helping spark Vanderbilt's eventual berth in the AutoZone Liberty

Bowl. The Commodores' kickoff return and net punting ranked among the top five in the SEC. The Commodores also were splendid in punt and kickoff coverage. In a midseason game against Georgia, his units produced three big plays: – a 96-yard kickoff return touchdown, a blocked punt, and a 35-yard pass completion on a fake punt that resulted in a key first down.

Banks' special team schemes made fourth downs fun to watch for Commodore fans. The team converted several fourth-down fakes.

Prior to arriving at Vanderbilt, Banks distinguished himself at Maryland. In 2010, Terrapin special teams played an instrumental part in one of the most impressive year-to-year turnarounds in the NCAA as Maryland improved seven games in the win column enroute to a 9-4 overall season.

Banks has experience coaching offense, defense and special teams. He also has coached at three levels of football: the National Football League, collegiate and high school level.

In 2010, Banks' demonstrated his special teams expertise by mentoring Maryland punt returner Tony Logan to first team All-ACC honors. Logan, who returned two punts for touchdowns, also topped the Atlantic Coast Conference with a 18.8-yard punt return average. In 2009, another Banks' standout at Maryland, Torrey Smith, earned All-ACC honors by breaking the conference single-season record for kickoff return yards. Smith now plays with the Baltimore Ravens. Banks also groomed Nick Ferrara to freshman All-America honors as a placekicker in 2009.

Prior to working with Franklin at Maryland, Banks enjoyed success as an assistant at the University of Richmond from 2007-08. In Banks' final game as a Richmond coach, the Spiders claimed the 2008 NCAA FCS national title with a victory over Montana.

Banks oversaw Richmond's superb special teams in 2008 when the Spiders ranked 27th nationally in punt returns and 22nd in kickoff coverage. In 2007, Richmond returner Justin Rogers was named the conference's Special Teams Player of the Year after posting a 30.4-yard kickoff return average.

Banks had two stints at Hampton University (2000-04; 2006) and spent 2005 with the St. Louis Rams. While serving as an assistant special teams coach in St. Louis, the Rams improved from 32nd to 17th in NFL special teams rankings.

Banks also coached a year at Indiana (Pa.) University and James Madison. He started coaching at his alma mater, Leonardtown H.S., in 1995.

Banks played running back for James Madison, where he earned a bachelor's degree in speech communications in 1994. He earned a master's from Eastern Kentucky in 1998.

Banks and his wife, Katrina, are the parents of a daughter, Ashley, and son, William.

GEORGE BARLOW

DEF. RECRUITING COORDINATOR;

George Barlow, formerly interim head coach and defensive coordinator at the University of New Mexico, enters his first year at Vanderbilt. He will serve as defensive backs coach and defensive recruiting coordinator on James Franklin's staff.

Barlow served three years at New Mexico after a successful stint mentoring defenses at James Madison University in Virginia, one of the top teams in the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (FCS).

Barlow becomes the third highly respected former FCS defensive coordinator on Franklin's Vanderbilt staff. The Commodore defense is directed by Bob Shoop, former coordinator at William & Mary. Brent Pry, the former coordinator at Georgia Southern, serves as co-coordinator and linebackers coach.

Barlow began the 2011 season as UNM's assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. Four games into the season, Barlow was named the team's interim head coach after Mike Locksley was relieved.

Barlow's 2011 New Mexico defense was led by middle linebacker Carmen Messina. The senior was a first-team All-Mountain West Conference recipient after topping the league in tackles for a third straight year. He also broke the WAC career record with 454 tackles, including

a career-high 21 stops in the 2011 finale at Boise State.

Barlow joined New Mexico after a highly successful decade of coaching at James Madison. Barlow experienced tremendous success at JMU, helping guide the Dukes to the 2004 NCAA I-AA national championship and FCS postseason appearances in 2006, 2007 and 2008.

Barlow's JMU was consistently among the nation's best. In 2006, the Dukes were second nationally in sacks and fourth in rush defense (84.8 ypg). In 2005, the unit ranked first nationally in rush defense. In JMU's championship season of 2004, the Dukes set a FCS record for sacks and ranked second in the nation in rush defense.

Barlow coached several JMU defensive standouts, including linebacker Akeem Jordan, the AFCA NCAA I-AA Player of the Year in 2006.

Serving as JMU's running backs coach in 1999 prior moving to the defensive staff, Barlow tutored Curtis Keaton to team records with 1,719 rushing yards and 20 rushing TDs. Keaton was later selected in the fourth round of the 2000 NFL Draft. The following year, Barlow coached JMU's Delvin Joyce when he became the first Division I-AA player to reach the 1,000-yard career mark in rushing, receiving, punt returns and kickoff returns.

Prior to James Madison, Barlow spent three years at Oklahoma, coaching outside linebackers and strong safeties in 1998 after serving as a defensive graduate assistant in 1996-97.

Barlow was the defensive coordinator at West Virginia State in 1995 and defensive line coach at Hutchinson (Kan.) Community College in 1994. He started his coaching career as a defensive assistant at Marshall.

In college, Barlow was an all-conference safety at Marshall from 1986-90. He was a member of the 1987 Thundering Herd squad that played in the NCAA I-AA national title game.

Barlow graduated in 1990 with a degree in business administration concentrating in finance and business law.

Barlow has a daughter, Kierstin Paige.

JOSH GATTIS

OFF. RECRUITING COORDINATOR; WIDE RECEIVERS

Josh Gattis enters his first year as a Vanderbilt offensive assistant under James Franklin. He will mentor Commodore wide receivers and serve as the team's offensive recruiting coordinator.

Gattis comes to Vanderbilt after one year as wide receivers coach at Western Michigan where he helped the 7-6 Broncos to the 2011 Little Caesars Pizza Bowl, the fifth postseason appearance in team history.

Wide receiver Jordan White, Gattis' top pupil at Western Michigan, established a slew of team and Mid-American Conference (MAC) records en route to consensus All-America recognition. As a senior in 2011, White topped the nation with 140 receptions and 1,911 receiving yards. His 17 touchdown catches ranked third in the NCAA. He finished his career with 306 catches and set a new MAC record with 4,187 receiving yards. White owns virtually every Western Michigan receiving record. He capped his Bronco career by setting a Little Caesars Bowl record with 265 receiving yards.

White became Western Michigan's first consensus All-America recipient, earning recognition from the Associated Press, Walter Camp

Football Foundation, American Football Coaches Association, Sports Illustrated and Yahoo! Sports.

After the 2011 season, White was selected in the seventh round by the New York Jets.

Two other Western Michigan wide receivers, seniors Chleb Ravenell and Robert Arnheim, produced career campaigns under Gattis' guidance. Ravenell had 67 receptions and nine touchdown catches. Arnheim finished the year with 62 receptions.

Gattis joined Western Michigan after serving as a graduate assistant in 2010 at the University of North Carolina.

Gattis was a two-time All-Atlantic Coast Conference recipient during an outstanding career at Wake Forest. A three-year starter at safety, Gattis earned All-ACC honors in 2005-06. He finished his career with 32 starts, 253 total tackles, six forced fumbles and 12 interceptions. He posted five picks in both his junior and senior campaigns.

Gattis participated in the 2007 Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine Game. He was drafted in the fifth round of the 2007 NFL Draft by Jacksonville. He played the 2007-08 season with the Chicago Bears.

Gattis earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in sociology from Wake Forest in December 2006.

HERB HAND

OFFENSIVE LINE

Herb Hand returns for a third year to the Commodore coaching staff as offensive line coach.

In 2011, Hand did a remarkable job molding an undersized offensive line corps. He innovatively dealt with the lack of roster spots along the offensive line, switching three returning starters to new positions during the summer. The moves – senior Kyle Fischer from guard to tackle, junior Ryan Seymour from tackle to guard, and sophomore Wesley Johnson from tackle to center – gave Hand the versatility needed to get the most out of his unit.

The improved line helped Vanderbilt add 25.8 yards to its 2010 rushing average and 41 yards more in total offense. The unit also did a better job of protecting the quarterback, allowing nine fewer sacks.

Hand's offensive line also paved the way for junior Zac Stacy to

establish new team records with 1,193 rushing yards and 14 rushing touchdowns.

The three players that switched positions with Hand's encouragement also were rewarded for making a decision for the good of the team. All three enjoyed the distinction of earning SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week honors during the year.

In 2010, Johnson earned Freshman All-SEC honors and Freshman All-America recognition from *Phil Steele's*.

Prior to accepting the Vanderbilt offensive position, Hand worked three years at Tulsa, serving as

assistant head coach, offensive coordinator and line coach. Hand helped guide Tulsa to consecutive GMAC Bowl appearances behind one of the NCAA's most explosive spread offenses.

As Tulsa's co-offensive coordinator, Hand coached an offensive line that paved the way for the nation's top ranked offense in 2007 and 2008. He was also a finalist for national offensive line coach of the year in 2008.

Before joining Tulsa, Hand spent six successful years at West Virginia, serving as tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator. Hand helped the Mountaineers to three Big East Conference titles and five straight postseason bowl games during the span, including a 36-35 victory over Southeastern Conference champion Georgia in the 2006 Sugar Bowl.

In 2006, West Virginia finished with an 11-2 record and was among the nation's top-10 teams for most of the season. Hand helped guide an offense that ranked second nationally in rushing, third in scoring, and fourth in total offense.

Prior to moving to West Virginia, Hand served as an offensive graduate assistant at Clemson in 1999-2000, as the Tigers participated in the 1999 Peach Bowl and 2000 Gator Bowl.

Before that, he served as defensive coordinator and special teams coordinator at Concord College in West Virginia. He also was defensive coordinator at another university in the state, Glenville State, where he helped coach the squad to three WVIAC Championships.

A 1990 Hamilton College graduate, Hand received his bachelor's in history. He also earned a master's in 1993 from West Virginia Wesleyan in business administration.

Hand and his wife, Debbie, have three children: sons, Trey, 16, and Cade, 10, and daughter, Bailey, 14.

BRENT PRY

CO-DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR; LINEBACKERS

Brent Pry enters his second year on James Franklin's staff, serving as linebackers coach. He also holds the title of co-defensive coordinator.

Pry joined the Commodore staff after a hugely successful season as defensive coordinator at Georgia Southern, sharing a similar route to Nashville as Vanderbilt defensive coordinator Bob Shoop. And much like Shoop, Pry made the most of the Southeastern Conference coaching opportunity in 2011.

Building his linebackers around All-SEC recipient Chris Marve, Pry's corps became one of the most productive defensive positions. The linebackers were vital to Vanderbilt's improvement in virtually every defensive statistical category. The defense soared in SEC and NCAA rankings, finishing the year 18th nationally in total defense. The unit also finished fourth in the SEC in rush defense.

While Marve earned All-SEC honors for the third straight year, Pry mentored several untested prospects into key productive roles, including Archibald Barnes, Chase Garnham and Tristan Strong.

Pry joined Vanderbilt after leading a quick resurgence at Georgia Southern. With Pry's help, the Eagles roared back to national prominence among Division I FCS teams in 2010.

With Pry serving as defensive coordinator and safeties coach, Georgia Southern advanced to the 2010 NCAA FCS national semifinals with a 10-5 overall record. The campaign also included a

regular season victory over No. 1-ranked Appalachian State.

The GSU defense under Pry contributed greatly to the rise in prominence. The unit ranked ninth nationally in total defense and 11th in scoring defense.

Pry joined Georgia Southern from the University of Memphis, where he served three years as the Tigers' defensive line coach. At Memphis, he was part of a staff that guided the Tigers to two bowl games, and molded a defensive line in 2008 into one of the Conference USA's best.

From 2002-06, Pry served at Louisiana-Lafayette, holding positions of assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. The 2005 Louisiana-Lafayette squad earned a Sun Belt Conference title and featured five players that eventually played in the NFL.

Pry was an assistant coach at Western Carolina from 1998-2001, mentoring the defensive line for two years, then secondary and special teams for two years. He also worked three years as a graduate assistant at Virginia Tech.

Pry began his coaching career at East Stroudsburg (Pa.) University in 1993. During Pry's tenure, East Stroudsburg's offense was directed by a standout quarterback who now serves as Vanderbilt's newest head coach.

A free safety at Maryville (Tenn.) College in 1988, Pry later transferred to the University of Buffalo. Pry lettered in 1990, then suffered a career-ending injury in 1991, only to return as a student coach in 1992.

Pry is a second generation college football coach. His father, Jim, has coached at the college level for more than 30 years.

Pry and his wife, Amy, are the parents of a son, Colby, and two daughters, Madeline, and Catherine.

RICKY RAHNE

QUARTERBACKS

Ricky Rahne returns for his second season as Vanderbilt's quarterback coach under James Franklin.

Rahne's coaching ties with Franklin date to his role as an offensive graduate assistant at Kansas State during the mid-2000s.

Vanderbilt senior Larry Smith and junior Jordan Rodgers enjoyed success under the former Kansas State offensive coach. Smith increased his completion percentage to a career high 55 percent and provided superb leadership through the season. Rodgers also responded well when called upon at midseason, passing for 1,523 yards, the highest total ever by a first-year Vanderbilt quarterback. Rodgers also threw nine touchdowns, including at least one in all six of his regular season starts.

Rahne also utilized Rodgers' running abilities to open up the Vanderbilt offense. The dual abilities allowed Rodgers to rank among the Southeastern Conference total offense leaders during his run as the starter.

Rahne, who enjoyed a record-breaking collegiate career as quarterback at Cornell University, worked previously with Franklin at K-State during the 2006-07 seasons. While on the Wildcat staff, Franklin and Rahne helped mentor talented quarterback Josh Freeman into an All-Big 12 signal caller and an eventual first-round National Football League draft pick.

Rahne served as a full-time member of the Kansas State coaching staff for the last four years. He held the position of tight

ends coach under legendary Wildcat head coach Bill Snyder the last two years, after mentoring Kansas State running backs in 2007-08.

In 2010, Rahne helped Kansas State secure a berth in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl at Yankee Stadium after a 7-5 regular season. The Wildcat offense averaged 33.6 points per game, ranking 22nd in the nation, and produced nearly 200 rushing yards per game.

In 2009, Rahne tutored first team All-Big 12 tight end Jeron Mastrud, who ranks second in school history in receptions among tight ends. Directing the Wildcat running backs from 2007-08, Rahne helped tutor All-Big 12 selection James Johnson, who became the fastest Wildcat to rush for 1,000 yards in a season in 2007.

Rahne served as the Wildcats' graduate assistant during the 2006 season, working hand-in-hand with Franklin with Wildcat quarterbacks. Specifically, they helped develop a young Freeman into K-State's starting quarterback.

Eventually, Freeman put together one of the greatest careers ever by a Kansas State signal caller and became a first-round draft pick of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Freeman just completed his second year as an NFL starter and is considered one of the league's future stars at quarterback.

Before joining the staff at Kansas State, Rahne spent the 2005 season as the running backs coach at Cornell. In 2004, he served as an assistant defensive coach at Holy Cross.

A native of Morrison, Colo., Rahne finished his career as Cornell's all-time leader in nearly every passing category and earned the team's MVP honors three times.

Rahne earned a bachelor's degree in industrial and labor relations from Cornell.

Rahne and his wife, Jennifer, are the parents of two young sons, Ryder and Jake.

Spencer's corps was topped by senior defensive end Tim Fugger and junior tackle Rob Lohr, both of whom enjoyed impressive campaigns working with the first-year coach.

Fugger was rewarded for an impressive campaign with second team All-SEC recognition. After posting eight sacks and 13.5 tackles for loss, Fugger also attracted the attention of pro teams and was selected in the NFL Draft by Indianapolis. Lohr also ranked among the SEC's most productive defensive tackles with 11.5 tackles for loss and 4.5 sacks.

Several other Commodores, including Johnell Thomas, Walker May, Colt Nichter, Jared Morse and Barron Dixon played well under Spencer's direction.

Spencer joined the Vanderbilt staff after a successful two-year stint at Bowling Green State University.

Spencer's top pupil at Bowling Green, defensive tackle Chris Jones, garnered six quarterback sacks in 2010, including 3.5 sacks in a win over Central Michigan that

helped Jones earn National Defensive Lineman of the Week honors. Jones later also earned All-MAC Conference recognition.

The BGSU defensive front posted 40 sacks during Spencer's tenure. He also helped Bowling Green to the Humanitarian Bowl in 2009 despite opening the year without a single returning starter on the defensive front.

Spencer enjoyed two successful stints at UMass, serving from 2007-08 after working with the Minutemen from 2001-03. He was a defensive line coach in both tenures, and also guided UMass special teams in 2007-08.

In 2007 the Minutemen ranked among the nation's best with 44 sacks. That UMass unit was led by All-America and Buck Buchanan Award finalist David Burris. In the early 2000s, Spencer mentored another top Minuteman defensive lineman, Buchanan Award finalist Valdamar Brower.

Spencer enjoyed team success at UMass, helping the Minutemen to consecutive Colonial Athletic Association titles.

Spencer mentored two special teams phenoms at UMass: kick returner Courtney Robinson and punter Brett Arnold. Robinson earned first team All-CAA honors after breaking the team's record for kick return yards. Arnold earned first team All-America honors.

Spencer spent the 2006 season at Hofstra University where he was the defensive line coach for the Pride. In the summer of 2006, Spencer took part in an NFL summer internship with the New York Jets.

Prior to Hofstra, Spencer served as linebackers coach at Villanova University in 2005 where he coached All-American Brian Hulea, who finished his career as the all-time tackler in the CAA.

Spencer also spent the 2004 season at the College of Holy Cross and served the 2001-03 seasons as an assistant at UMass where he served as defensive line coach in 2004. Previously, he served tenures at Trinity College, Shippensburg University and Wesleyan University.

Spencer started three years at free safety as an undergraduate at Clarion University. Spencer is the parent of a daughter, Alysia.

DWIGHT GALT

DIRECTOR OF PERFORMANCE ENHANCEMENT

Dwight Galt enters his second season as Director of Performance Enhancement of the Vanderbilt football program. A veteran strength coach of 29 years, Galt joined James Franklin's staff before the 2011 campaign.

Galt and his strength staff had an impressive impact on the Commodores in 2011. The Vanderbilt team conditioned by Galt proved to be a superbly conditioned squad during a much-improved 6-win regular season that followed consecutive 2-10 marks. The Commodores' team fitness was most obvious after intermission when they held a 172-151 accumulative scoring advantage.

Galt came to Vanderbilt from Maryland, where he worked with Franklin while conditioning some of the Terps' finest gridiron teams and players.

Many Galt pupils rank among the elite performers at the NFL Combine. At the 2012 combine, Vanderbilt's Sean Richardson ranked first among all safeties in the vertical jump, board jump and bench press. Another

Commodore, Casey Hayward, put up the No. 1 20-yard shuttle among cornerbacks. In past years, performances by a slew of Galt-trained athletes have amazed NFL scouts, such as tight end Vernon Davis, wide receiver Darrius Heyward-Bey and cornerback Dominique Foxworth. Davis and Heyward-Bey rank among the Top 10 all-time performers at the combine, with Davis posting a fastest 40-yard dash ever by a tight end (4.36) and Heyward-Bey running the fastest 40 (4.30) by a wide receiver in a decade.

Nearly 40 of Galt's former athletes are currently playing in the NFL.

Three-time All-SEC linebacker Chris Marve was one of the two that didn't seek an NFL future, instead opting to enter Vanderbilt Law School.

Galt served as Director of Strength & Conditioning at Maryland for the last 17 of 27 years he spent with the football program. He assisted in the preparation of ACC championship football teams in 1984 and 1985, and also was the conditioning coach for the Terps' men's basketball program that featured phenom Len Bias.

After starting as a full-time strength coach with Maryland in 1989, Galt was named Maryland's Head Strength Coach in 1993, with responsibility for the physical preparation of 27 Terrapin varsity sports.

Throughout his career, Galt has been extremely fortunate to employ several superb assistants, including Evan Marcus, head strength coach at the University of Virginia; Craig Fitzgerald, head strength coach at Penn State University; and Ray Wright, head strength coach of the Washington Redskins.

Galt and his wife, Janice, have been married for 33 years. They have four children: Angie, 29; Teri, 28; and 25-year-old twin sons, Dwight IV and Tommy.

Both daughters played intercollegiate sports: Angie as a softball catcher at Brown University; Teri as an all-conference soccer defender at Frostburg State (Md.). Both sons played football at Maryland and remain active in collegiate athletics: Dwight IV is a strength coach at Penn State; Tommy is an offensive graduate assistant at South Carolina.

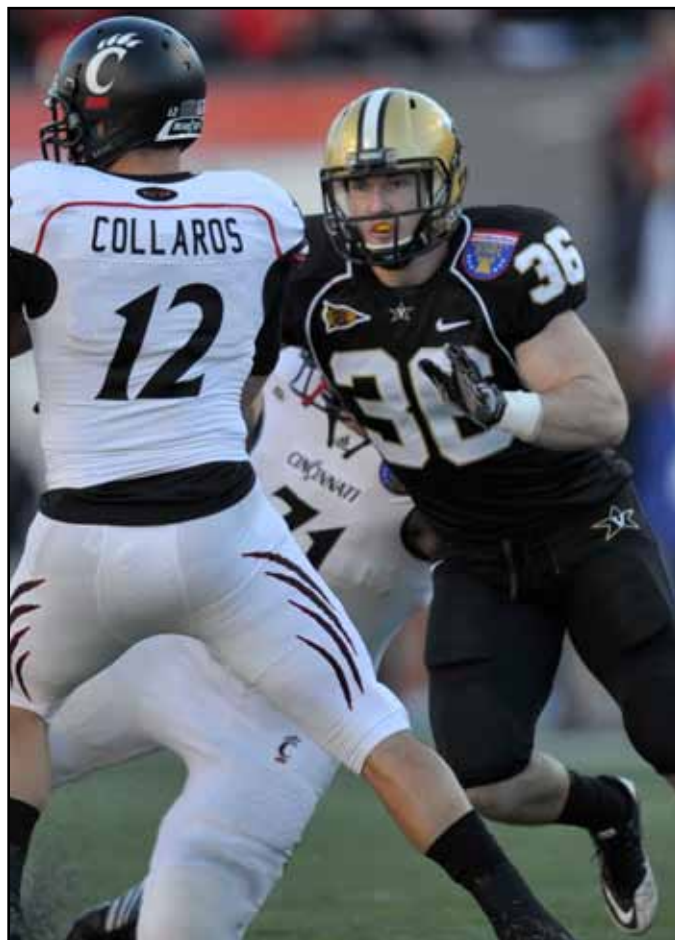

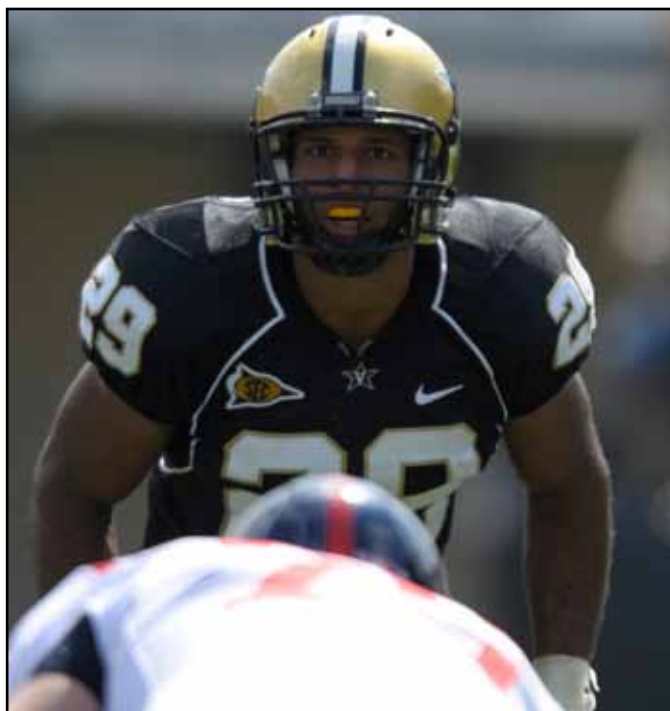

James Franklin Era Opens With Convincing Victory Over Elon

NASHVILLE – Larry Smith threw for two touchdowns and ran for another score, and Vanderbilt beat Elon 45-14 in coach James Franklin's debut with the Commodores.

Franklin showed his willingness to gamble with the team considered the worst in the Southeastern Conference, going for it on fourth down three times to keep drives alive scoring 17 points. Smith converted the

second on 4th-and-3, running 16 yards for a touchdown.

The win snapped a seven-game skid for the Commodores who scored more points than they did in all but two games last season. When Trey Wilson picked off a pass and ran it 21 yards for a TD after Smith's second score, Vandy had

almost as many points in 14 seconds as the Commodores averaged (16.9) per game in 2010.

Elon outgained the Commodores 323-309 in total offense and held the ball for more than 35 minutes. But Vanderbilt forced three turnovers and turned each of them into touchdowns.

Five Interceptions Propel Vanderbilt to Convincing Win Over Ole Miss

NASHVILLE – Larry Smith ran for a touchdown, and Trey Wilson returned one of his two interceptions for a 52-yard TD as Vanderbilt scored 21 straight points in the second quarter and beat Mississippi 30-7 in making James Franklin the first new Commodores coach to start 3-0 since World War II.

The win marks Vanderbilt's first 3-0 start since 2008 when the

Commodores won their first bowl since 1955.

The Commodores also beat Mississippi (1-2) in the Southeastern Conference opener for both teams for their fifth win in seven years in this series.

Vanderbilt picked off five Ole Miss passes, all off Zack Stoudt, and Wilson's interception return

for a touchdown was the Commodores' third this season. It tied the most Vanderbilt interceptions in a game since duplicating the feat against Eastern Michigan four years ago.

The Commodores outgained Ole Miss 387-234 in total offense. Jerron Seymour's 9-yard TD run capped the second-quarter scoring for Vandy, and Zac Stacy also ran for 169 yards, including a 77-yard touchdown run.

Kentucky (4-6, 1-5) had won two straight and eight of the last 10 in this series. The Wildcats, with freshman Maxwell Smith making his first road start, never threatened in this game and now must win both at No. 14 Georgia and in

their home finale against Tennessee to extend their school-record streak to a sixth straight bowl game.

The Commodores sacked Smith four times and forced a turnover. They did it with their biggest win over Kentucky since a 42-6 win in 1969 and matched their largest margin of victory in an SEC game since 1971 when they beat Mississippi State 49-19.

Large Audience Watches Black & Gold Spring Game

NASHVILLE, Tenn. – The Commodores concluded Spring Practice with Team Black earning a 33-0 win over Team Gold in the annual Black & Gold Spring Game at Vanderbilt Stadium.

Team Black, comprised mostly of first-teamers dominated the pass-heavy game on both sides of the ball, but it was the play of junior wide receiver Jordan Matthews and redshirt freshman wide receiver Josh Grady that the 8,500 in attendance will remember most.

Playing for Team Black, the duo combined to score three of Vanderbilt's touchdowns, including the final score of the game when Grady took a direct snap and found Matthews, who bobbled the pass a few times before hauling it in and racing down the field for a 54-yard score with 1:34 to play.

Matthews had scored earlier on a 17-yard strike from quarterback Jordan Rodgers in the second quarter and Grady rushed for an eight-yard touchdown out of the Wildcat formation in the third quarter.

Matthews finished with seven catches for 105 yards and two touchdowns. Grady did not catch a pass, but carried the ball three times for 35 yards and a score, and completed both of his passes for 58 yards and a touchdown.

It was the first real public glimpse at what Grady can do on the field after redshirting last season, and he did not disappoint.

Rodgers led Team Black through the air, completing 14-of-29 passes for 126 yards and touchdown passes to Matthews and tight end Austin Monahan. Rodgers' pass to Monahan was the first touchdown of the game, coming with 13:34 to play in the second quarter.

The first points of the game came off the foot of kicker Ryan Fowler, who made a 40-yard field goal with 11:19 to play in the first quarter. Fowler's field goal was setup after Austyn Carta-Samuels, the starting quarterback for Team Gold, had his pass attempt intercepted by Steven Clarke.

Team Black scored two more points on an errant snap by Team Gold that resulted in a safety with 7:25 to play in the fourth quarter after Carta-Samuels lost his footing in the end zone after scooping up the ball.

Carta-Samuels saw the bulk of the snaps for Team Gold and finished 6-of-12 passing for 47 yards. Patton Robinette went 3-for-9 for 24 yards for Team Gold, which struggled to move the ball for much of the game.

Senior running back Zac Stacy, the SEC's leading returning rusher, carried the ball just two times for one yard for Team Black. Grady led all ball carriers with 35 yards on three carries. Fitz Lassing carried the ball four times for 21 yards for Team Black.

Defensively, Eddie Foster paced Team Gold with a game-high eight tackles, including one for a loss, three pass breakups and one interception. Freshman Darreon Herring added a sack of Rodgers to go with five tackles. Team Black was led by Archibald Barnes, who had six tackles. Colt Nichter also added a sack.

The game was televised on a tape-delayed basis by CSS.

Playing the Texas State Fair

Before Oklahoma and Texas started the Red River Shootout, it was Vanderbilt vs. Texas at the Texas State Fair in Dallas. Vanderbilt won five of seven games with the Longhorns between 1921 and 1928.

Aug. 10, 1918

One of the greatest and most beloved Commodores of all-time, Irby "Rabbit" Curry, gave his life defending America in the skies over France.

Curry was a standout quarterback from 1914-16, a scholar and student leader. As a senior, classmates elected him "Bachelor of Ugliness" — the highest award given to a male Vanderbilt undergrad.

Looking Within to Replace a Legend

McGugin picked one of his best Commodore players, Ray Morrison, as a replacement. Morrison came after a stellar tenure as SMU's coach.

Oct. 23, 1937

Early in the game against No. 6 LSU, tackle Greer Ricketson took the ball cleverly hidden on the ground by the Vanderbilt quarterback and rambled 50 yards for a score. The 'Dores would win 7-6.



Nov. 22, 1941

In his second year, Sanders returned the 'Dores to prominence. Their 7-0 win over Alabama on this date gave the team an 8-1 mark.

Sanders' 1941 Staff

Vanderbilt Head Coach Red Sanders, far left, hired excellent assistants. In 1941, his staff included a future legend in Paul "Bear" Bryant, who mentored Commodore linemen in the 1941-42 seasons.

Competing on the road in 1958, the Commodores played to 0-0 ties at Alabama and Kentucky, and to a 6-6 draw at Florida.

Oct. 14, 1955

A 12-0 shutout of Chattanooga sparks Vanderbilt run that leads to the team's first bowl appearance. Gator Bowl officials paired the Commodores against No. 8 Auburn after Vanderbilt's 7-3 regular season.



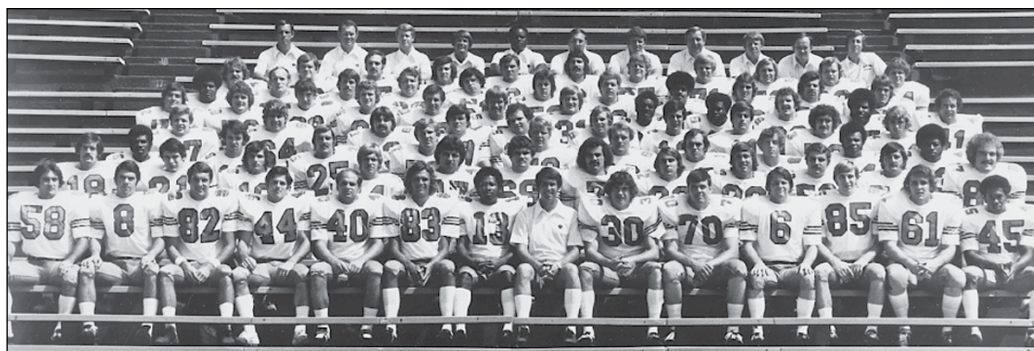
Dec. 31, 1955

CASEY HAYWARD

DEFENSIVE BACK, 2011



Defensive back Casey Hayward capped a remarkable career in 2011 by earning second team All-America honors from the Walter Camp Football Federation.

He was also recognized on All-America teams by Rivals.com, Yahoo! Sports, and Phil Steele's.

Hayward, a product of Perry, Ga., finished his career with 15 interceptions, and shares the team career mark with former All-America Leonard Coleman.

As a senior, Hayward contributed seven picks and matched his team record with 17 passes defended, helping the Commodores to an appearance in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

A three-year starter, Hayward also holds the Vanderbilt career mark with 46 passes defended.

He was selected by Green Bay in the second round of the 2012 NFL Draft.

D.J. MOORE

DEFENSIVE BACK, 2008



In 2008, Moore became the first Vandy cornerback to earn All-America honors in 25 years.

He was named second team by Associated Press, *Sporting News*, *SI.com* and *Rivals.com* after a sensational junior season.

Moore posted six interceptions and 58 tackles,

contributing to the 'Dores' 7-6 campaign that ended with a win over Boston College at the Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl.

He ended his career tied for second among Commodores with 13 career interceptions.

Moore also was the SEC's most versatile player in 2008, also seeing action as a running back, wide receiver and return specialist. In a late-season win at Kentucky, he achieved a truly rare feat with a 2-interception, 2-TD catch effort.

Moore was selected in the 4th round by Chicago.

EARL BENNETT

WIDE RECEIVER, 2006



Bennett concluded his career as the SEC's all-time leading receiver.

As a sophomore in 2006, the Birmingham product was named third-team All-America by *Rivals.com* in 2006 after catching 82 passes.

After three years,

Bennett left Vandy with 236 career catches, 28 more than any other SEC receiver.

In 2007, Bennett caught 75 passes, becoming the only receiver in SEC history to post three straight seasons with at least 75 catches.

Bennett was a three-time All-SEC recipient.

Many fans remember Bennett and Jay Cutler connecting on many memorable plays in the 2005 season, including the game-winning touchdown to defeat Tennessee in Knoxville.

Bennett was selected by Chicago in the third round of the 2008 draft.

JAMIE WINBORN

LINEBACKER, 1999



Winborn was named All-America by *Football News* following the 1999 season after leading the 'Dores and the SEC with 141 tackles. It was the second straight year that Winborn led the league in tackles.

A two-time All-SEC Coaches selection, Winborn was the complete

linebacker package in 1999. He was a run stopper who delivered punishing blows, making plays sideline to sideline.

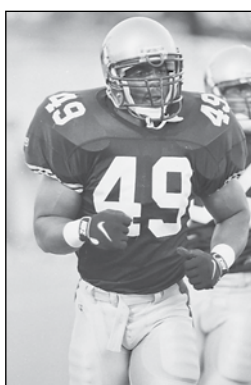
He led the squad with a team-record 23 tackles for loss. Winborn's season included a 20-tackle, two-sack performance versus South Carolina.

Winborn finished his Commodore career with 377 total tackles, 45 tackles for loss, 16.5 QB sacks and six forced fumbles. Winborn topped the squad in solo tackles for three consecutive years.

Winborn was selected by the 49ers in the 2001 NFL Draft. He has played with the 49ers, Bucs, Broncos and Titans.

JAMIE DUNCAN

LINEBACKER, 1997



Duncan was a dominating linebackers and a player who always rose to the occasion.

In 1997, Duncan was named First Team All-America by the Football Writers Association. He was also named Second Team All-America by the

Associated Press and *Football News*.

In 1997, he became the only Commodore player to earn SEC Defensive Player of the Year honors from the Associated Press. He also received similar recognition from the *Mobile Press Register*.

As a junior, Duncan amassed 152 tackles, six sacks, 14 tackles for loss and five forced fumbles. He finished his career with 425 tackles. His effort against No. 1 Florida remains one of the best ever by a Commodore.

Duncan's career included stops with Bucs, Rams and Falcons.

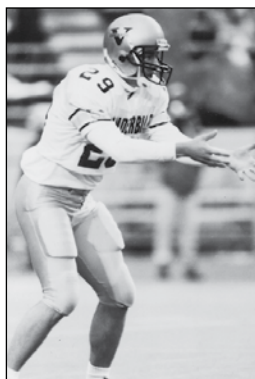

BILL MARINANGEL

PUNTER, 1996



Marinangel was named First Team All-America by the *Sporting News* in 1996 after topping the NCAA in punting.

Marinangel is perhaps best remembered for one heroic play in his senior year. In the second game against Alabama, Marinangel

surprised the Tide special teams and 72,000 onlookers, as he took the snap from center, and then scampered 81 yards for an unbelievable and unlikely touchdown.

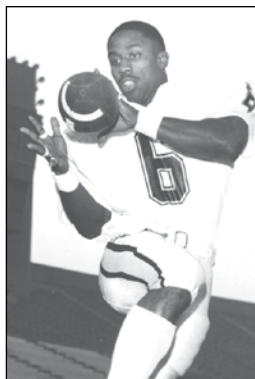
The run was the longest in the SEC that season and still stands as the longest in school history.

Marinangel's 46.6-yard average is the second highest single-season in team history.

His 79-yard punt versus South Carolina is also tied for the Commodores' second longest ever.

BOO MITCHELL

RECEIVER, 1988



In 1988, Mitchell was a Third Team All-America after compiling one of the finest seasons ever by a Commodore receiver. Teaming with quarterback Eric Jones, Mitchell hauled in 78 catches for 1,213 yards

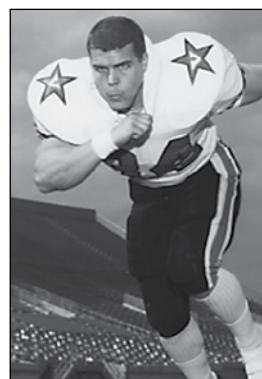
and five touchdowns. The receiving yardage total remains a Vanderbilt team record and the SEC's seventh highest total ever. He surpassed 100 yards receiving in six games that season.

Mitchell burst onto the SEC scene as a freshman, hauling in a team-record 45 receptions. He added 31 and 34 receptions as a sophomore and junior, respectively.

Mitchell ranks among team leaders in virtually every career receiving category. He tops the list, — and ranks third all-time in the SEC, with 2,964 receiving yards.

CHRIS GAINES

LINEBACKER, 1987



A Nashville native, Gaines was selected First Team Kodak All-America by the nation's football coaches. In 1987, he established an SEC single-season record for total tackles with 214. *Nashville Tennessean* columnist Larry

Woody once described Gaines as "sort of a Rambo on a leash. An avid weightlifter, Gaines was one of the strongest Commodores of his era.

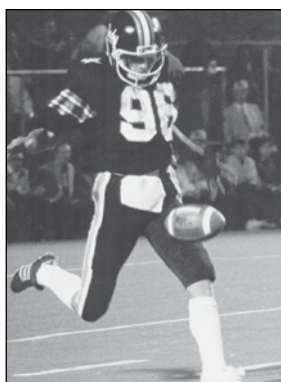
Gaines also posted one of the greatest greatest efforts ever by a 'Dore as a senior by recording a school-record 37 tackles versus Tulane.

After the season, he was named MVP of the Blue-Gray Game after racking up 18 tackles and was named Tennessee Amateur Athlete of the Year by the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame.

Gaines played two years in the NFL, then returned to Vanderbilt as an assistant football coach from 1995-97.

RICKY ANDERSON

PUNTER, 1984



Anderson arrived on campus as a walk-on. Four years later, he departed as the nation's top punter-kicker in the nation and a consensus All-American.

Anderson's senior season was remarkable. As a punter, he topped the nation with a 48.2-yard average. It remains as the highest yearly punting average ever in the SEC by more than a yard.

Anderson's 1984 campaign also is tied for seventh all-time in NCAA history.

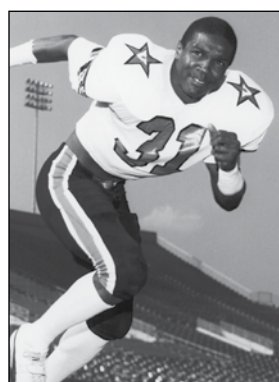
Following the 1984 season, he was named a consensus First Team All-American and All-SEC selection.

Anderson holds several team kicking marks. Besides the single-season average record, his 82-yard punt against Georgia in 1984 remains the longest in team history.

Anderson's career average of 45.6 yards also ranks first, as does his single-season scoring total of 73 points in 1982. He also ranks third on the team's all-time scoring list with 192 points.

LEONARD COLEMAN

DEFENSIVE BACK, 1983



Coleman was named First Team All-America in 1983 by the Gannett News Service and was a Third Team All-America selection by the Associated Press.

A consensus All-SEC selection, Coleman left Vanderbilt rated as the nation's No. 1 cornerback by NFL scouts.

Coleman was a four-year starter. As a freshman, he contributed

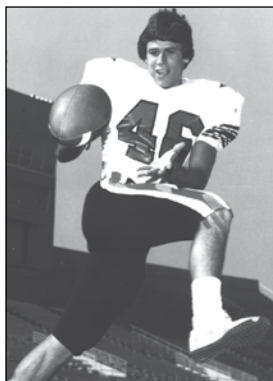
four interceptions, including a team-record tying three picks in a victory over Chattanooga. At the time, his effort versus Chattanooga also tied a SEC mark.

Coleman's efforts as a junior was a key for Vanderbilt's Hall of Fame Bowl season in 1982, including a pair of interceptions in the season-opening win over Memphis. He finished the year by setting a team mark with eight interceptions.

He remains tied for team record with 15 career interceptions.

Coleman played professionally in the USFL and several seasons in the NFL with Indianapolis and San Diego.

CHUCK SCOTT TIGHT END, 1983



Early in his career, Scott struggled to make an impact at flanker. He just needed to switch positions.

In 1983, Scott blossomed after moving to tight end. Scott hauled in 70 receptions and nine

touchdowns to tie the existing NCAA record for catches by a tight end. He was named First Team All-America by *The Sporting News*.

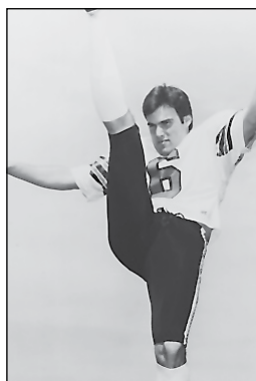
Scott followed up that season by posting 54 receptions and eight TD catches in 1984.

Scott also contributed 21 receptions in the Commodores' 1982 Hall of Fame Bowl season.

A two-time Academic All-SEC selection, Scott ranks among the team leaders in several career receiving records. His 20 career touchdown receptions remains the second most in school history. Scott also ranks sixth all-time with 145 catches and fifth with 2,219 receiving yards.

Scott played three seasons in the NFL

JIM ARNOLD PUNTER, 1982



Arnold became the first Vanderbilt kicking specialist to receive All-America honors, paving the way for several kicking standouts to follow in his footsteps.

A native of Dalton, Ga., Arnold quickly impacted the squad, breaking the freshman

mark with a 41.9-yard average. By the time he graduated, head coach George McIntyre said, "Jim's the best kicker in the country, pro or college."

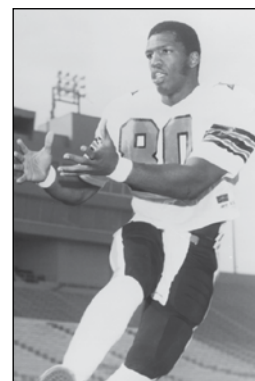
As a senior in 1982, he was named to six All-America teams after averaging a then-record 45.8-yard average.

He ended his career with a 43.9-yard average, and still holds the SEC mark with 277 punts. Arnold's senior average remains third all-time by a 'Dore and fifth all-time by a SEC punter.

Arnold owns two of the longest punts in team history, including a 79-yarder at Ole Miss.

After Vanderbilt, Arnold took his game to the NFL, enjoying an 11-year pro career.

ALLAMA MATTHEWS TIGHT END, 1982



Early in his Vanderbilt career, coaches tried the Matthews at safety and receiver. Once all parties settled on tight end, Matthews put together one of the finest receiving campaigns ever, helping spark the team's run to the

Hall of Fame Bowl.

In 1982, Matthews was named First Team All-America by *Football News* after posting 61 receptions for 797 yards and 14 TDs, most ever by a Commodore. Later that season, Matthews was also named SEC Offensive Lineman of the Year by the Atlanta Touchdown Club.

Matthews also earned First Team All-SEC honors by the Associated Press and United Press International in 1982.

He concluded his Commodore career with 114 catches and 18 touchdowns.

Matthews was drafted and played three seasons with the Atlanta Falcons.

PRESTON BROWN BACK, 1979



Brown was named Third Team All-America as a senior after posting career receiving marks in 1979. He topped all SEC receivers with 52 catches, good for 786 yards and three TDs.

Brown's season was topped by three 100-yard receiving games, including a 175-yard output versus Ole Miss.

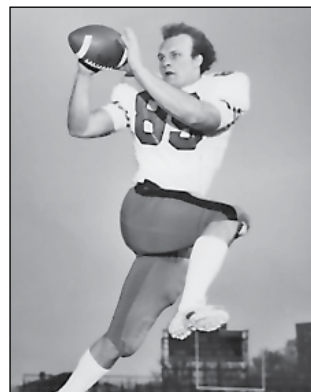
Brown also was a dynamic returner for the Commodores. He

remains sixth on team's all-time leaders for kickoff returns and fifth in punt returns. Brown also returned three kickoffs for scores. His 100-yard kickoff return against Ole Miss in 1977 remains the longest in team history.

After finishing his senior season, Brown played in the Blue-Gray Classic and Senior Bowl.

He played three seasons for the New England Patriots and one year each for the New York Jets and Cleveland Browns.

BARRY BURTON TIGHT END, 1974



As a junior in 1974, the Nashville native and Hillsboro High graduate helped the 'Dores to a 7-4 regular season record and berth in the 1974 Peach Bowl.

Following the season, he was named First Team All-America by *Football News*. He was also a First Team All-SEC pick that year.

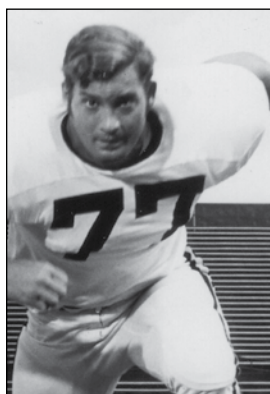
Burton was a genuine triple-threat.

In addition to receiving, he also ran the end-around, and handled punting duties. In 1974, Burton caught 22 passes for 378 yards and three touchdowns; ran 31 times for 307 yards and a score; and punted 54 times for a 40.2-yard average.

As a senior, Burton came back to catch a career-high 31 passes and two touchdowns. He topped the Commodores in receptions as a senior.

As a punter, Burton has two of the longest efforts in team: a 79-yarder versus Georgia in 1973 and a 78-yarder versus Kentucky in 1975.

BOB ASHER OFFENSIVE TACKLE, 1969



Virginia native Asher started every game of his three-year varsity Vanderbilt career, concluding with the Associated Press and NEA naming him to the First Team All-American squad at tackle.

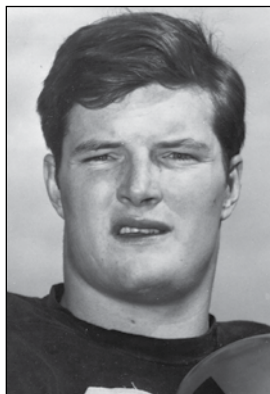
Asher was known as an impenetrable pass blocker,

regarded by observers as one of the top blocking tackles in school history. He also earned First Team All-SEC and All-South honors as a junior.

Following his college career, Asher played in the College All-Star Game, the Senior Bowl, the North-South Shrine Game and the Canadian American Bowl.

In 1970, he was drafted by Dallas. One of his Cowboys' teammates was a former Vanderbilt teammate, defensive lineman Pat Toomay. Together, they played key roles in the Cowboy's 1971 squad that eventually won the Super Bowl.

CHIP HEALY LINEBACKER, 1968



A linebacker from Chattanooga, Healy's All-America recognition as a defensive standout set the stage for numerous linebackers to follow in later years.

In 1968, Healy was named First Team

All-American by the Central Press and Second Team All-American by *The Sporting News*.

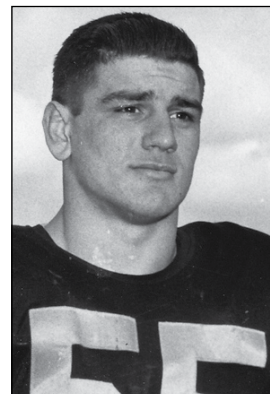
Healy was also selected as a First Team All-SEC player as a sophomore.

Healy played superb defense as a junior after hurting his knee the previous spring. As a senior, Healy topped the team in tackles. He also posted six interceptions in his career.

Healy played in the East-West Shrine Game and Senior Bowl.

Selected by the St. Louis Cardinals in the 1968 draft, Healy played two seasons in the NFL.

GEORGE DIEDERICH GUARD, 1958



Known to his teammates as "LuLu", Diederich was a two-way line standout for the Commodores, culminating a Vanderbilt career by earning First Team All-America honors by Associated Press, the nation's coaches, *Look Magazine*,

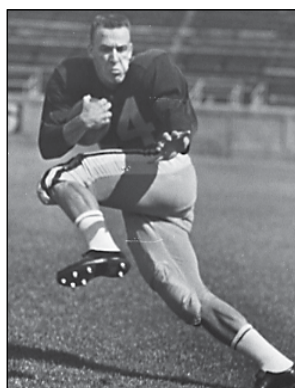
and the Football Writers Association of America.

He was also named First Team All-SEC in 1957 and 1958. Diederich played both offensive and defensive guard, though he specialized as a defensive lineman.

Diederich was also an outstanding track athlete, setting a school record in the 120-yard high hurdles.

After his senior season, Diederich represented the Commodores at the Senior Bowl. Drafted by the Rams, Diederich decided to take his football talents north of the border with Montreal.

CHARLEY HORTON RUNNING BACK, 1955



Horton was named Third Team All-America by INS following a superb 1955 season in which he established a then-school mark of 12 touchdowns.

Horton's outstanding play at halfback propelled the Commodores to an 8-3 season and their first ever bowl game – a 25-13 win over No. 8 Auburn in the Gator

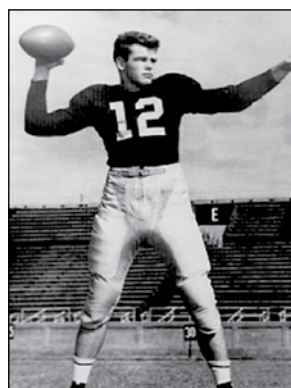
Bowl.

Horton had a knack for getting the Commodores on the scoreboard, as he scored the first touchdown in seven of the 10 regular season contests in the 1955 season.

Horton was an outstanding returner, and still ranks second all-time with a 14.4-yard punt return average.

Though selected 11th overall by the Rams in the 1956 draft, Horton joined the military. After completing his service, Horton played in 1959 season with the CFL's Toronto Argonauts.

BILL WADE QUARTERBACK, 1951



A Nashville legend, Wade was the 1951 SEC Player of the Year and a Second Team All-America by the Associated Press, after completing 111 passes for 1,609 yards and 13 touchdowns.

A *Look Magazine* coverboy, Wade set virtually every Commodore passing record by the time his career ended in 1951.

As a junior in 1950, Wade threw for 16 touchdowns, a total not eclipsed by a Vanderbilt quarterback until Whit Taylor threw for 22 touchdowns in 1982.

He remains one of the team's most celebrated players. He remains the lone Vanderbilt player selected No. 1 overall in the NFL Draft – by the Los Angeles in 1952. He had a 14-year career with the Rams and Chicago, and led the Bears to the 1963 NFL title, rushing for two scores in a win over New York.

Upon retirement from football, Wade returned to Nashville, retiring from Third National Bank.



BOB WERCKLE TACKLE, 1951



A New Jersey native, Werckle overcame injuries to become one of the team's finest linemen. In 1951, he was named as a Second Team All-America by INS and the AP.

By 1949, he was given little chance to

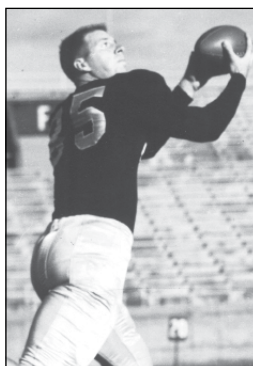
succeed after twice breaking a leg in practice. By 1950, the injury jinx was beaten, with Werckle playing more minutes than any teammate. Across the South, Werckle was known for his blocking and tackling abilities.

In 1951, Werckle earned First Team All-SEC recognition after serving as a captain.

Werckle was selected in the NFL Draft by Detroit.

Later, he earned with distinction as a Marine Corps officer in Korea.

BUCKY CURTIS RECEIVER, 1950



One of the team's first downfield receiving threats, Curtis was selected First Team All-American by the Football Writers, INS and *Look Magazine* in 1950.

He ranked among the nation's best receiving yardage

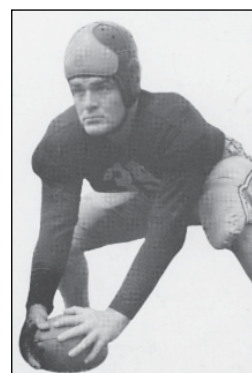
in 1950. As a senior, Curtis led the team to a 7-4 record, and set a SEC mark with 791 receiving yards. He still ranks fifth all-time on the team with 17 touchdown catches.

After his senior season, Curtis was named MVP of the Senior Bowl, and played in the College All-Star Game. He was selected in the second round of the NFL Draft by Cleveland.

He went on to serve four years in the Navy. Eventually, he played with Toronto of the CFL.

In 1975, he received a Silver Anniversary Award by the NCAA.

BOB GUDE CENTER, 1941



Gude played three years of tremendous football before entering the military service during World War II.

Gude was named to the Fox-Movietone All-America team in 1941.

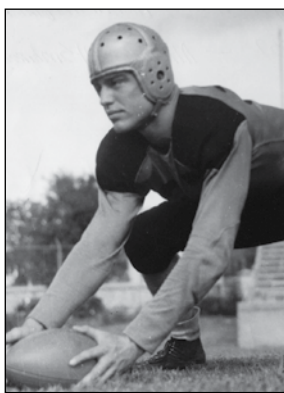
As a center, Gude was

frequently compared to former Commodore greats Carl Hinkle and Pete Gracey.

After his senior season, Gude was selected by the Chicago in the 1942 NFL Draft.

Gude played two seasons of pro football, starting with the Bears in 1942, then returning with Philadelphia in 1946.

CARL HINKLE CENTER, 1937



Hinkle continued the Commodore tradition of quality centers. The 1937 captain was named First Team All-America by the Associated Press, Grantland Rice, and Liberty.

He was an ironman, playing every minute in seven games in

1937. Named the SEC's Most Valuable Player, Hinkle guided the squad within inches of the Rose Bowl.

Though selected by the Philadelphia in the 11th round of the 1938 NFL Draft, Hinkle decided on another career path. After graduating from Vanderbilt, he entered West Point and earned the highest cadet honor. He then served with distinction in World War II.

Hinkle was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1959.

PETE GRACEY CENTER, 1932



A native of nearby Franklin, Clarence "Pete" Gracey was an anchor on both the offense and defense fronts.

In 1932, he became the last of 13 All-America players mentored by legendary Coach Dan McGugin.

While the last of McGugin's prize

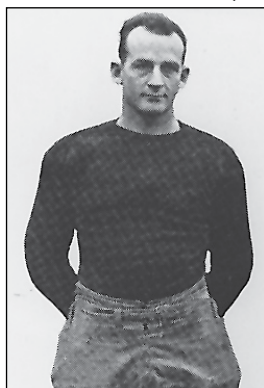
pupils, Gracey also ushered a decade of superb Vanderbilt centers, including Carl Hinkle and Bob Gude.

In Gracey's final season, he opened holes for such backs as Dixie Roberts and Larry Burton as a center. A possible unde-feated season ended in the finale when the 'Dores fell to Alabama.

A versatile athlete, he also lettered in baseball and basketball.

JOHN BROWN

GUARD, 1929



A senior captain, John Neil Brown was named First Team All-America by the nation's coaches. He also was a three-time All-Conference recipient.

Known as "Bull," Brown helped anchor both sides of the line of scrimmage.

Brown was a key contributor on the line for the 1926 Commodores. He missed 1927, only to return as a standout in 1928-29. One of his best defensive games came against Minnesota and legend Bronko Nagurski.

Brown also was a standout rightfielder on the baseball team.

DICK ABERNATHY

END, 1928



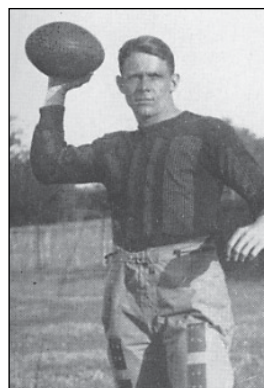
Abernathy earned All-America honors as an end in 1928, helping the 'Dores to an 8-2 record.

Abernathy had a key 38-yard touchdown catch that enabled the Commodores to defeat visiting Colgate, 12-7.

A week later in Dallas, Abernathy blocked a punt that was recovered in the end zone which would stand up to be the winning score in the Commodores' 13-12 win over Texas.

BILL SPEARS

QUARTERBACK, 1927



One of Vandy's top offensive players ever, Spears was a acclaimed quarterback for some of McGugin's best Vanderbilt teams.

In 1927, he was selected First Team All-America by NEA and Associated Press.

In 1927, he guided the squad to an 8-1-2 record, including a win over Tulane when noted writer Blinkey Horn described Spears as "All-World" after a two-touchdown effort.

Spears concluded his career by outgaining the entire Alabama squad in a 14-7 Vanderbilt win.

One of McGugin's most beloved players, Spears went on to chair his own law firm.

He was a significant contributor to Vanderbilt, serving on the Board of Trust from 1954 until his death in 1992.

HENRY WAKEFIELD

END, 1924



Known as "Hek," Wakefield was a two-way standout for McGugin's Commodores.

In 1924 was named First Team All-America by INS, Lawrence Perry, Outing and Billy Evans publications.

In 1922, Wakefield helped the 'Dores to a 8-0-1 campaign. He was a starter in the inaugural 0-0 game in Dudley Field against Michigan.

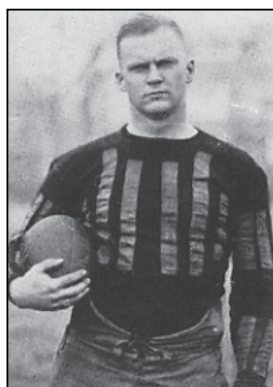
Wakefield starred on teams that went 26-5-4.

As injuries mounted in 1924, Wakefield was named captain. He quickly proved worthy of the honor, scoring twice in a win over Auburn, then defeating Georgia Tech with a 37-yard drop-kick field goal.

In the finale, he played every minute in a 16-0 win over Minnesota.

LYNN BOMAR

END, 1923



A devastating blocker and outstanding runner, Bomar was the first great end of the Dan McGugin Era.

Bomar was named All-America by Walter Camp.

Known to fans as the "Blonde Bear," Bomar helped Vanderbilt to "the

Championship of the South."

His athletic career ended in 1924 when he suffered a brain hemorrhage following a blow to the chin. Though temporarily in danger, he fully recovered and enjoyed a distinguished law enforcement career.

He was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame in 1956.



JOSH CODY TACKLE, 1915-16, 1919



Cody is arguably the most decorated player in Vanderbilt team history.

Known as a punishing blocker, Cody is the only Commodore ever to earn All-America honors in three different

seasons. The Football Writers Association honored Cody after the 1915, 1916 and 1919 seasons by the Football Writers Association.

Cody was the main ingredient of a powerful offensive line that propelled Vanderbilt to 23 wins in 25 games. He sparked the McGugin's famous "Point-A-Minute" offense of 1915.

Cody became a successful head coach, serving in that role at Clemson and Temple.

Cody was inducted into the National College Football Hall of Fame in 1970.

IRBY "RABBIT" CURRY BACK, 1916



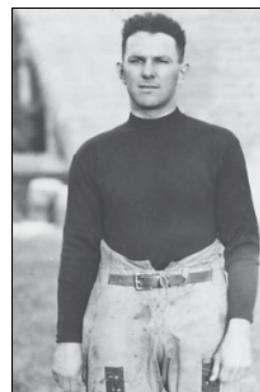
A legend in Vanderbilt history, Curry was superb on and off the field. Small in stature, Curry's display of talent, heart and leadership and heart was cherished by Vandy followers.

Selected as a Third Team All-America and

All-Southern Conference pick in 1916, Curry was a field general at quarterback who displayed a knack for brilliant runs. The Texan guided the team to a 7-1-1 record in 1916 and directed the famous "Point-A-Minute" squad of 1915. He was also a scholar athlete, elected junior class president and as the school's prestigious Bachelor of Ugliness by the student body.

Unfortunately, Curry's life was cut short. Just two years after graduating, Curry died when his plane was shot down over France in WWI.

LEWIS HARDAGE BACK, 1912



After transferring from Auburn to enter Dental School, Hardage was part of what observers called the Commodores' "fastest backfield."

Hardage starred on tremendous squads. As

captain in 1911-12, he helped Vanderbilt go 16-2-1 overall, and their opponents 578-27.

Hardage earned Third Team All-America and All-Southern Conference recognition as a senior.

Hardage dominated several games in 1912, scoring 95 points for the squad that was the nation's top scoring team.

He also was a chief factor in a pair of early season blowouts, 105-0 over Bethel and 100-0 against Maryville. The total against Bethel remains a team record.

RAY MORRISON QUARTERBACK, 1911



When Ray Morrison ended his career in 1911, Coach McGugin called him "the best I ever saw."

More than two decades later, a panel of local sportswriters tabbed Morrison as the 'Dores' top QB through its first 50 years.

An All-America in 1911, the slightly-built Morrison was a talented player and leader. In two years as a starter, Morrison guided the team to a 16-1-1 – the lone loss coming at powerful Michigan 9-8.

He later became a great coach, serving 34 seasons at the collegiate level.

While McGugin served in the military during 1918, he was the team's interim coach. When McGugin retired in 1934, Morrison was his handpicked successor.

He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1954.

W.E. METZER GUARD, 1910



Nicknamed "Frog," Metzger was Dan McGugin's first great lineman, earning Third Team All-America recognition in 1910.

In 1909, Metzger was a sensation in the backfield, rushing for four

scores to singlehandedly beat Mercer 28-0, before suffering a leg fracture.

In 1910, he moved to the line, anchoring a unit that helped produce a 8-0-1 record. On defense, he assisted a unit that allowed only eight points.

Metzger shared the spotlight with QB Ray Morrison in 1911. He played brilliantly, helping the Commodores to a 8-1 record.

OWSLEY MANIER BACK, 1906



Joining the team in Dan McGugin's first year on campus, Manier was a three-year starter and a big reason why Vanderbilt became an instant Southern power under McGugin.

As the team's top fullback,

Manier was All-Southern and a Third Team All-America in 1906, becoming the first Commodore so honored.

He was an offensive machine for McGugin's 1906 squad, scoring three times against Kentucky and on five occasions in 78-0 victory over Alabama.

Manier was a key factor in the Commodores' 24-1 overall record.

Eventually, Manier returned to academia, and became professor emeritus of clinical medicine at the Vanderbilt School of Medicine.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — Still hurting from a dislocated elbow suffered in the Tennessee game, quarterback Don Orr scored two touchdowns and set up another as the Commodores defeated No. 8-ranked Auburn in the 11th Gator Bowl 25-13.

The Vanderbilt defense provided a huge lift for the Commodores, recovering five fumbles in the victory.

Vanderbilt's first score was set up when Orr recovered an Auburn fumble. Eight plays later, Joe Stephenson ran seven yards for the VU touchdown.

Auburn answered on a 38-yard TD pass from Howell Tubbs to Rob James in the second quarter, but the rest of the game belonged to the Black and Gold. On Vanderbilt's following possession, Orr carried the ball 44 yards to the Tigers' 28. He then passed to Joe Scales, who advanced to the Auburn 4-yard line. On the next play, Orr carried the ball over the line after a fake to fullback Phil King to give Vanderbilt a 13-7 lead at the half.

At the opening of the third quarter, Vanderbilt guard Sonny Tatum recovered an Auburn fumble, and the Commodores marched quickly into scoring position as Orr crossed the goal line for his second touchdown of the day to make the score 19-7. Both teams scored once more in the fourth quarter. Vanderbilt's score came on a one-yard run off right tackle by Charley Horton.

Vanderbilt coach Art Guepe cleared his bench in the final minutes, using 38 of the 39 men dressed for the game. Capitalizing on Auburn's five fumbles and using an ailing quarterback, the Commodores captured its first bowl appearance.

ATLANTA, Ga. — The 1974 Peach Bowl was a game with no champion but two winners, the Commodores and Texas Tech Red Raiders.

Despite the effective rushing of Red Raider tailback Larry Isaac and fullback Cliff Hoskins, the Commodore defense held Texas Tech without points in the first half and entered halftime with a 3-0 lead after Mark Adams kicked a 31-yard field goal with 10 minutes remaining.

Neither team was able to muster much offense in the third quarter, though Texas Tech did tie the score at 3-3 after a drive stalled at the Vanderbilt 16-yard line.

Early in the fourth quarter, the Commodores' freshman lineman Dennis Harrison stopped a deep Texas Tech threat by blocking a Red Raider field goal attempt. The Tech drive started following one of two Vanderbilt turnovers during the game.

After the blocked field goal, the Commodores responded with a possession that ended with Adams' second field goal of the day, a 26-yarder that resulted in a 6-3 Vanderbilt margin. However, Texas Tech tied the game at the 2:00 mark on a 35-yard field goal by Brian Hall. On its final drive, Vanderbilt could not move into scoring range.

The Commodore offense struggled much of the day, with quarterback David Lee hitting just five of 14 attempts. Running back Jamie O'Rourke had 76 rushing yards.

The limited offensive production from both teams resulted in numerous defensive and scoring records being set in the game.

Within hours of the conclusion, Vanderbilt Head Coach Steve Sloan announced he was leaving his position to accept the head coaching job at Texas Tech.

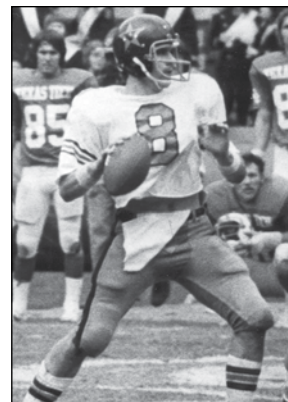

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — Without question, the Hall of Fame Bowl was one of college football's most exciting 1982 postseason games.

The game matched one of the nation's most potent aerial attacks featuring Vanderbilt All-SEC quarterback Whit Taylor and one of America's most devastating rushing attacks in the Falcons' vaunted option attack.

Offensively, this game lived up to the hype as 33 Hall of Fame records were broken and another eight were tied in Legion Field. Unfortunately for Vanderbilt, Air Force walked away the winner 36-28 after a remarkable comeback.

For three quarters, Whit Taylor was unstoppable. Connecting with a variety of wide receivers and running backs, Taylor's fourth touchdown pass of the game, a four-yarder to Norman Jordan, gave the Commodores a 28-17 margin entering the fourth quarter. Down by double digits, the Air Force Academy scored rushing touchdowns on three consecutive possessions to take the victory.

Taylor was named the Most Valuable Player, after completing a team-record 38 passes of 51 attempts for 452 yards, which remains as the second highest single-game passing yardage total in Vanderbilt history. Jordan's performance arguably was more remarkable. Though rushing for just four yards, Jordan hauled in 20 receptions for 173 yards and three TDs, breaking five Hall of Fame Bowl records.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Vanderbilt won a bowl game for the first time in exactly 53 years, with Bryant Hahnfeldt kicking a 45-yard field goal with 3:26 left for a 16-14 win over #24 Boston College in the Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl held on New Year's Eve in Nashville's LP Field.

The Commodores hadn't played in a bowl since 1982 — the SEC's longest drought. The victory gave Vanderbilt (7-6) its first winning season since that season. This is just the fourth time in the past 50 years that Vanderbilt has won seven games in a season.

The Eagles got the ball twice after Hahnfeldt's third field goal. They had to punt the first time, then Vanderbilt DB Myron Lewis picked off a pass with 1:36 left.

Vanderbilt scored its lone touchdown when freshman safety Sean Richardson fell on a Commodore punt that bounced off the knee of BC's Paul Anderson with 10:35 left in the third quarter.

The Commodores played musical chairs at quarterback, giving redshirt freshman Larry Smith his first career start.

Hahnfeldt, a Nashville product playing his final game as a Commodore, matched a single-game career high with the three field goals. The Commodores also forced two interceptions while allowing none.

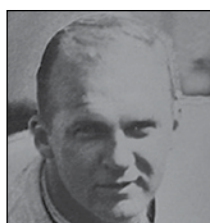

THE INGRAM COMMONS: RARE LIVING EXPERIENCE FOR STUDENTS

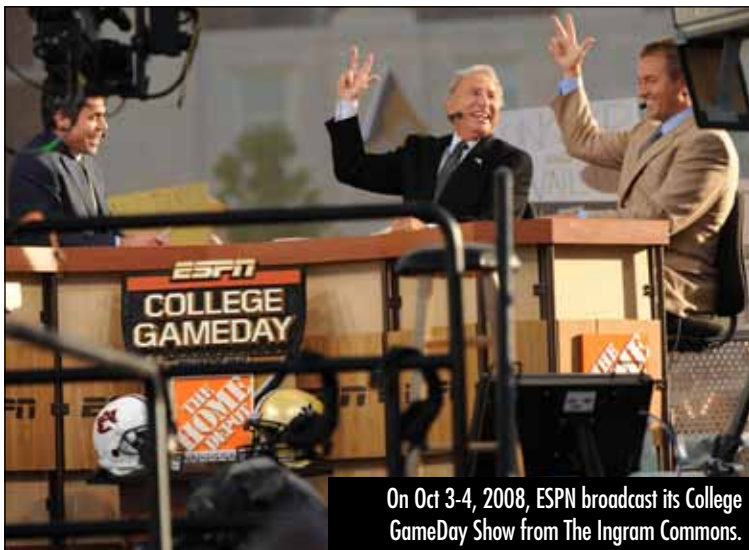
The Martha Rivers Ingram Commons ranks among the finest on-campus living and learning experiences on the American higher education landscape.

★ CHANCELLOR NICK ZEPPOS



Chancellor Nicholas S. Zeppos was raised in Milwaukee, where he spent many an afternoon watching the great Hank Aaron of the Braves slug home runs in the old County Stadium.

Named Vanderbilt's eighth chancellor in 2008, Zeppos has taken a keen interest in athletics at Vanderbilt during his more than two decades at the university.

"I don't do the operations," Zeppos said. "I don't call the plays, I don't throw the passes. I

see my job as simply trying to do whatever I can to support all of the talented people who do these things."

This support has included the endorsement of an athletics capital improvement plan expected to surpass \$50 million, which orchestrates efforts to improve the student experience for athletes and assists with recruiting.

"One thing I consider the ultimate compliment is when a coach calls me and says, 'I've got a couple of recruits here. Could you meet them?'"

A distinguished legal scholar, teacher and executive, Zeppos served from 2002 to February 2008 as Vanderbilt's chief academic officer, overseeing the university's undergraduate, graduate and professional education programs and research in liberal arts and sciences, engineering, music, education, business, law and divinity. As provost and vice chancellor, he chaired Vanderbilt's budgeting and capital planning council, as well as oversaw the dean of students and dean of admissions.

Zeppos has led a number of important initiatives at Vanderbilt, including the planning process for The Ingram Commons, a landmark transformation of the first-year experience; the Strategic Academic Planning Group; innovative efforts in undergraduate admissions and financial aid; and the development of new programs in Jewish studies, law and economics and genetics, among others.

In a bold move to strength Vanderbilt's commitment to admitting undergraduates on the basis of accomplishment and achievement, rather than their ability to pay, Zeppos significantly expanded the financial aid program in 2009. By replacing undergraduate, need-based loans with grant and scholarship assistance, the university opened its doors wider to highly talented and qualified students of all economic, cultural and geographical backgrounds. The expanded aid program is funded by a combination of strategic budget allocations, the university's *Shape the Future* fundraising campaign, which under Zeppos' leadership raised over \$1.9 billion, and the current Opportunity Vanderbilt campaign.

Zeppos was recognized with five teaching awards at the law school before serving as an associate dean, associate provost, and provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. He also served as interim chancellor for eight months prior to being formally appointed as Vanderbilt's eighth chancellor on March 1, 2008.

Zeppos is the Vice President of the 2012-13 executive committee of the Southeastern Conference.

In the Nashville community, Zeppos serves on the boards of the Nashville Area Chamber of Commerce and the Nashville Public Education Foundation. He also serves on the National Security Higher Education Advisory Board and the Freedom Forum Diversity



Institute Board.

From 1982 to 1987, Zeppos practiced law in Washington, D.C., at the United States Department of Justice and at Wilmer, Cutler & Pickering, where he specialized in appellate litigation involving complex regulatory, statutory and constitutional matters.

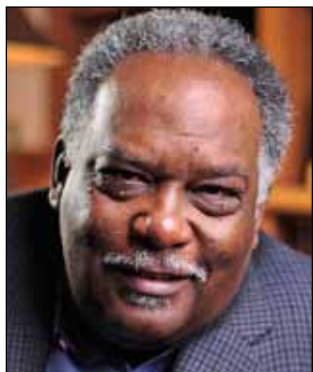
Zeppos is a 1979 magna cum laude graduate of the University of Wisconsin Law School, where he served as editor in chief of the Wisconsin Law Review and was selected as the outstanding graduate of his class. He studied history during his undergraduate years at the university, where he was a 1976 Phi Beta Kappa graduate.

VICE CHANCELLOR DAVID WILLIAMS II



David Williams II is Vice Chancellor for Athletics and University Affairs and Athletics Director. He guides the Vanderbilt Athletics, Recreation, Intramural and Club Sports programs.

Williams has firmly placed his stamp on Vanderbilt Athletics and has positioned the program among the most innovative in the nation. The university's increased athletic success and investment in its athletics and recreation programs resulted in Chancellor Nicholas S. Zeppos asking Williams in July 2012 to take on a larger role in shaping these areas of the university - allowing for

Williams to focus on maintaining and building on this momentum after previously also holding the positions of general counsel for the university and secretary for the university and Vanderbilt University Medical Center while guiding the athletics program.

Williams' key leadership role in the administration of Vanderbilt Athletics since 2003 has led to a bold new direction. Under Williams, the Vanderbilt program has had many successes on and off the field of competition, including an initiative to more fully integrate Commodore athletics into the total Vanderbilt student life experience.

The model has been successful. Under his guidance, a program was started to allow more overseas travel and study for student athletes and the cumulative grade point for Vanderbilt student-athletes has continued to improve, reaching its highest level in more than two decades. Competitive success, such as all four revenue sports (men's and women's basketball, football and baseball) participating in post-season play, is becoming an expectation on campus and beyond. Under Williams' tenure, Vanderbilt won the SEC tournament and regular season baseball championships and made its first appearance in the College World Series. Vanderbilt captured its first national championship (in women's bowling), went to two bowl games after a 26-year drought, saw the women's basketball team compete in the NCAA tournament every year and sent the men's basketball team into postseason play, advancing as far as the Sweet 16 in the NCAA tournament. In 2012, the men's basketball team won its first SEC tournament championship in 61 years. The women's cross country team won its first SEC championship in fall 2011.

In addition, there have been numerous teams playing in the postseason and finishing in the top 25 in the nation. Individual accomplishment has also been increasing, with numerous Vanderbilt athletes playing professional sports all over the world. In 2011, an SEC-record 12 baseball players were drafted into Major League Baseball and two men's basketball players were drafted in the first round of the 2012 NBA draft - along with the first pick in the second round.

The university is also increasingly hosting postseason play - including the first and second rounds of the NCAA women's basketball tournament, two NCAA baseball regionals and one NCAA baseball super regional, and the 2012 NCAA women's golf championship, which was the first time Vanderbilt has hosted a national championship.

Williams has overseen the recruitment and hiring of nine outstanding head coaches - most recently football coach James Franklin and mens' golf coach Scott Limbaugh. He also has overseen numerous facility upgrades, including an extensive refurbishing of Vanderbilt Stadium - new turf, lights, video board and football locker rooms, an expansion of baseball park Hawkins Field, the addition of new tennis courts and amenities at Brownlee O. Currey Center and renovations in Memorial Gym, which includes the recently installed new Jumbotron, the Hendrix Dining Room and McGugin Center. In addition to the facility upgrades, he is also spearheading a project that reimagines sports and fitness at Vanderbilt moving toward the trend on many college campuses of combined recreation facilities that serve students, faculty and staff. The project involves enhancing the existing Student Recreation Center and making it open to the entire Vanderbilt community as well as the construction of a multipurpose facility that will include an indoor practice field that can be used for varsity football, soccer and lacrosse as well as intramural and club sports teams. An indoor track - open for use by the university's

athletic teams and students, faculty and staff - will also be part of the multipurpose facility.

Williams has also played an increasing role in collegiate athletics with his service on a number of NCAA panels. He is a member of the Division I Academic Cabinet, which reviews all measures dealing with academics before they are passed on to the Board of Directors; is chairman of the five-member Infractions Appeals Committee, which is responsible for hearing all the appeals for NCAA violations and makes the final decisions regarding appeals; a member of the working group on enforcement, which is planning the adoption of an expanded, four-level violation structure for infractions as part of NCAA President Mark Emmert's intercollegiate reform effort.

He is also a member of the SEC team responsible for negotiating national television contracts for the conference.

Williams' activities at Vanderbilt also include his being a tenured full professor at the Law School where he teaches tax law, sports law and education law. He has also taught a class on Law and Higher Education at the university's Peabody College of education and human development, and occasionally teaches courses in the undergraduate curriculum.

He was named vice chancellor, general counsel and secretary of Vanderbilt in 2000 and previously oversaw Vanderbilt student affairs. He joined Vanderbilt after serving as a professor of law and in numerous administrative roles at the Ohio State University for 14 years.

A native of Detroit, Williams is a graduate of Northern Michigan University where he was a member of the track team. He also earned a Master of Business Administration and a Doctor of Jurisprudence from the University of Detroit, and an LL.M. in taxation from New York University. Before entering law school, Williams spent 10 years as a teacher and coach in the Detroit public school system.

Williams is active in the Nashville area community, serving with several organizations, including the Nashville Public Television Board of Directors, Nashville Symphony, Nashville Sports Council, Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame, Adventure Science Center, 100 Black Men of Middle Tennessee, the Community Foundation, Special Olympics of Tennessee, the Center for Nonprofit Management and the Rotary Club of Nashville. He is a former member of the Nashville branch of the Atlanta Federal Reserve Board.

Professionally, he is an active member of the American Corporate Counsel Association, the National Association of College and University Attorneys and the American Bar Association. As a member of ABA's Section of Business Law, Williams has served as a member of the Corporate Counsel Committee. He held terms on two prestigious legal committees - the ABA Standing Committee on Public Education and the ABA Section on Legal Education and Admissions Standards Review Committee.

Williams also is a member of the American Law Institute, and a past member of the Harry Phillips Inn of Court. He has served on a number of ABA Accreditation site visits of law schools and has completed a term on the Membership Review Committee of the American Association of Law Schools. Williams recently completed a three-year term on the board of directors for the National Association for Colleges and University Attorneys. He is serving a second term on Nashville Mayor Karl Dean's Procurement Standards Board.

Williams has taught at the law schools of the University of Detroit, Capital University, The Ohio State University and Vanderbilt, and directed the Ohio State University Law Program in Oxford, England, in 1992 and 1995. He was elected outstanding law professor at both the University of Detroit and The Ohio State University.

Williams and his wife, Gail, have four children: Erika, a grade school teacher in Detroit; David Williams III, an academic counselor at Michigan State University; Samantha, a recent Brown University graduate who is now working in Washington, DC, and Nicholas, a high school senior who competes in basketball, soccer and track. Gail Williams, a graduate of the University of Michigan and the University of Detroit College of Law, serves as the associate director of community relations of Vanderbilt. She is serving her third year as president of the University School of Nashville Board of Trustees and is the past chair of the Metro Transit Authority where she continues to serve as a Board member. In addition, she serves on the boards of many nonprofit organizations, including The Frist Center, The Women's Fund Advisory Board and the YWCA.

NEW STADIUM IMPROVEMENTS

Several substantial improvements are in progress at Vanderbilt Stadium, the Commodores' on-campus venue for the last three decades.

Crews are nearing completion of the latest upgrades to the 40,550-capacity stadium opened in 1981, including construction of a fan-friendly hillside in the north end zone, installation of an expanded video board in the north end zone, new stadium lighting system, and a synthetic surface on Dudley Field.

The work adds to other major recent improvements. A thorough exterior renovation was completed in 2008-09, including new plazas and entrances at Gates 2 & 3, expansion of the concourse and an exterior paint and brick effort to unify Vanderbilt Stadium and the program's two other biggest sporting venues, Hawkins Field and Memorial Gym.

The stadium was opened in 1981 on the same site as Dudley Field, which stood at the corner of Jess Neely Drive and Natchez Trace since 1922. Though the old stadium was demolished prior to the 1981 project, the Commodores continue to play on the original Dudley Field plot.
