A two-year starter, Boyd is on pace to become one of 'Dores' all-time leading receivers. Hauled in 50 catches for 774 yards and five TDs in 2012. Has 13 career TD catches.



## 36 CHASE GARNHAM

Sr., Linebacker  
Fairhope, Ala.

A two-year starter, Garnham ranks among the top SEC returning LBs with seven sacks and 12.5 tackles for loss. He posted a career-high 84 total tackles in 2012.

Krause's punt return average of 11.2 yards ranked third in the SEC in 2012. He also returned two punts for touchdowns, the first Commodore to do so since 1968.

# INDOOR PRACTICE FACILITY OPENS IN OCTOBER



## BUILDING THE BRAND

"Anchor Down" is fast becoming a standard greeting for fans. Graphics with the slogan are now common throughout McGugin Center.

Construction crews are expecting to put the finishing touches on a spacious Indoor Practice Facility this October. It is part of a new, on-campus multi-purpose facility.

The \$31 million project, which includes a regulation-size football field, should be available to James Franklin's team for the final month of the regular season. Vanderbilt track and cross country teams also are expected to have access to the facility's 300-meter track by November.

University and athletics administrators also are studying future projects that will enhance experiences for both Vanderbilt student-athletes and fans. The next project officials want to address is a renovation of the athletic training facilities in McGugin Center, with a goal of creating a state-of-the-art facility to physically treat Vanderbilt student-athletes.

A major improvement to Vanderbilt Stadium also is being evaluated.

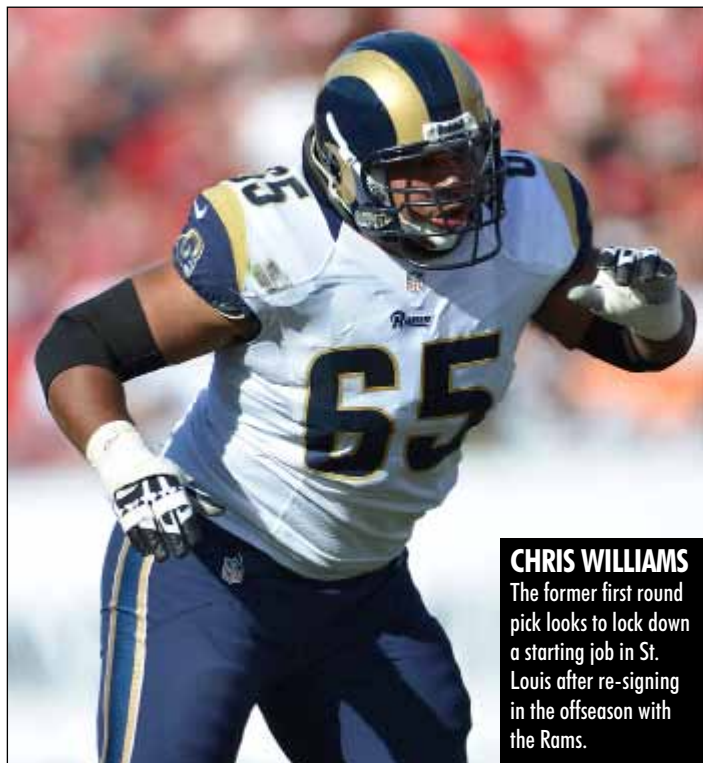

Franklin's staff quickly got to work upgrading the players' locker room in McGugin Center with a major construction effort that gave the facility a complete facelift.



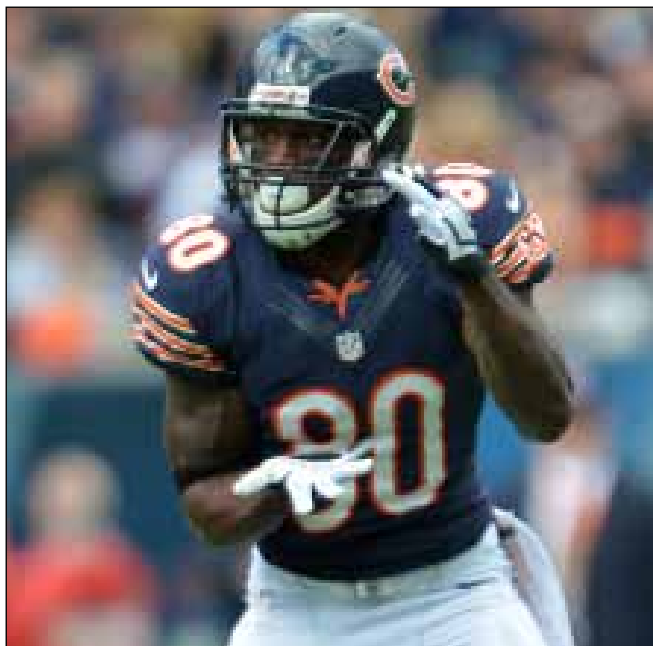

## STACY DISPLAYS SKILLS AT NFL COMBINE

**Zac Stacy**, the most productive runner in Vanderbilt history, turned in one of the most impressive performances of any running back at the 2013 NFL Combine.

Stacy, the only running back in Vanderbilt history to produce consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons, posted top ten results in

several competitions at the Combine, including the 225-lb. bench press, 40-yard dash, broad jump, 3-cone drill and 20-yard shuttle. Stacy's 27 repetitions in the bench press and 6.7 clocking in the 3-cone drill were among the top four efforts among running backs.

Stacy was drafted by the St. Louis Rams.

Fifteen former Vanderbilt standouts, including five from the 2012 roster, are currently signed with National Football League teams looking to expand or begin pro careers.

The list of former Commodores includes eight offensive players, six defensive standouts and a punter.

Three pro teams – the Chicago Bears, Green Bay Packers and St. Louis Rams – each have multiple former Commodores on their preseason rosters.

One former 'Dore, **D.J. Moore**, signed an off-season deal with a new team. The former Chicago starting nickelback inked with Carolina.

Two Commodore seniors off the 2012 squad were selected in the 2013 NFL Draft. Two-time All-SEC running back **Zac Stacy** was picked in the fifth round by the St. Louis Rams. Another offensive starter, guard **Ryan Seymour**, was later selected by the Seattle Seahawks.

Three others from the 2012 Vanderbilt roster are with teams after signing rookie free agent deals: punter **Richard Kent** with San Diego, defensive tackle **Rob Lohr** with Kansas City, and quarterback **Jordan Rodgers** with Jacksonville.

# COMMODORES IN THE PROS



## CASEY HAYWARD

Selected in the second round by Green Bay, Hayward was sensational as a rookie cornerback in 2012. Hayward paced all rookies and ranked fifth in the NFL with six interceptions while claiming Rod Woodson's former cornerback role in the Packer secondary. Hayward finished third in the NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year vote.



## JAY CUTLER

Cutler is 34-22 as the Bears' starting quarterback and ranks second to Hall of Famer Sid Luckman in career passing yards and touchdowns among Chicago quarterbacks. Cutler, who topped all NFL QBs last year with a fourth-quarter passer rating of 114.7, has passed for 21,316 yards and 136 touchdowns during a seven-year career.

## PRO DAY SERVES AS SHOWCASE FOR SENIORS

In the last two years, eight Commodore seniors who did not participate in the NFL Combine used Vanderbilt's Pro Day as their avenue into pro football.

Since arriving on campus, Director of Performance Enhancement Dwight Galt has lived up to his well-earned reputation for producing top-flight performers in strength and agility tests used by NFL scouts to evaluate prospects.

In late March, four former Commodores used the Pro Day activity to impress scouts enough to earn a rookie free agent deal with NFL clubs: quarterback **Jordan Rodgers**, defensive tackle **Rob Lohr**, defensive back **Trey Wilson** and punter **Richard Kent**.

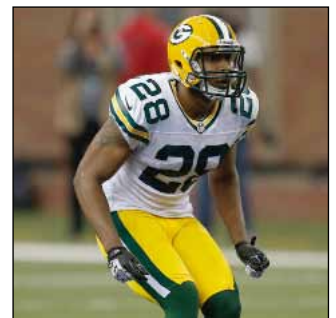

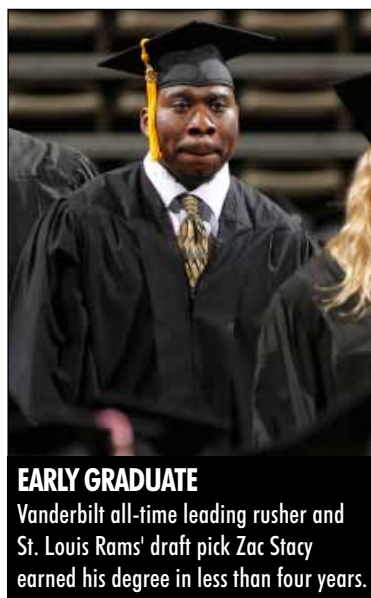

## SCENIC URBAN CAMPUS, TOP-FLIGHT EDUCATION

Located in the popular Midtown district of Nashville, Vanderbilt is regarded among the nation's finest universities. The private research university enrolled 6,796 undergraduate and 5,949 postgraduate students last year. Those students came from all 50 states and around the globe.

The university was founded 140 years ago when magnate Cornelius "Commodore" Vanderbilt provided an initial endowment.

Vanderbilt is a charter member of the 80-year-old Southeastern Conference, and is the only private school among its 14-member universities.

Vanderbilt is considered among the top universities in America. In its popular annual "Best Colleges" edition, *U.S. News & World Report* most recently ranked Vanderbilt No. 17 among all national universities and No. 2 among schools located in the Southeast.

The campus is just southwest of downtown Nashville on 330 pristine acres that are designated as a national arboretum. Two areas of campus closed to vehicles – the Peabody campus and the collection of academic buildings surrounding Kirkland Hall that form the original campus – are frequently named among the South's most beautiful college environments.

Though located within walking distance of downtown activities, the quality of Vanderbilt life is reflected in much smaller, less public ways – running into friends while walking on campus, researching papers or grabbing a late-night snack with friends, attending an athletic event, or having dinner at a professor's home.

Most Vanderbilt undergraduates live on campus during their time at the university. More than 30 residential halls dot the campus, ranging from the four towers off West End Avenue to The Martha Rivers Ingram Commons. In 2014, the university will add the stunning Kissam College Halls to its residential communities.

Vanderbilt offers numerous degrees in four undergraduate colleges: the College of Arts and Science, Peabody College, School of Engineering and Blair School of Music.

## NASHVILLE: OFFERS PLENTY OF SPORTS

Nashville is one of the South's top cities for sports enthusiasts.

On the collegiate scene, Vanderbilt gives the city exposure to SEC competition and superb athletic events.

Nashville also is home to two successful pro teams: the NFL's Titans and the NHL's Predators. They play downtown at LP Field and Bridgestone Arena, respectively.

The arena will host the SEC men's basketball tourney in 2015, 2016 and 2019, and the 2014 NCAA Women's Basketball Final Four. The venue is expected to also host early-round action of the NCAA men's tourney in coming years.



## MUSIC CITY POPULARITY SOARS

Vanderbilt's vibrant hometown of Nashville is one of the fastest-growing cities and visitor destinations in the United States.

Vanderbilt students, faculty, staff and visitors cite Music City as one of the leading perks of the university, which is located in the bustling Midtown district about two miles from an exciting and welcoming downtown.

Ranked No. 3 in *Travel+Leisure's* Favorite Cities poll, Nashville proudly exudes all of the charm and hospitality one expects from a grand Southern capital city with the amenities expected in the largest destinations.

The secret is out on Nashville and its metro population of 1.6 million. Magazines and national newspapers rave about the city's diversity in attractions, accommodation, niche districts and growing food reputation. It's become, according to multiple travel publications, a must-see destination.

Of course, ABC's popular song-filled drama "Nashville" hasn't hindered the soaring popularity.

Nashville enjoys a diverse and youthful population, unique neighborhoods and parks, and an abundance of entertainment districts.

Nashville also ranks among the nation's top cities for career opportunity and new businesses.

Many acts, including Kayne West (left) and the Dave Matthews Band, have performed recently on campus. Still others, such as Lenny Kravitz (right), make sure Nashville is on their schedule. The next generation of top bands and musicians play an array of small clubs around Music City, many within blocks of the Nashville campus.





# THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE



## LEAGUE WITHOUT PEER

**Vanderbilt is a charter member of the 14-team SEC. During the last decade, the SEC has experienced success that is unparalleled in college football history.**

- Remarkably, SEC teams have captured the last seven BCS national championships. During that time, the SEC's average margin of victory in BCS title games is 17 points.
- Since the BCS started in 1998, the SEC owns nine titles, seven more than any other conference. Even more impressively, SEC teams are 9-0 in title games.
- Since 2006, the SEC has posted a 10-4 record in BCS bowl games, more wins and a higher winning percentage (.750) than any other conference.
- SEC teams were 54-11 (.831) in non-league play last year, the highest percentage among FBS conferences.
- Four of the last six Heisman Trophy winners have come from SEC schools. In recent years, top SEC players have walked away with virtually every other significant postseason award.



- In 2012, 257 former SEC players were on NFL rosters. That's more than any other conference. Eight of those players were former Vanderbilt standouts.
- In the 2013 NFL Draft, 63 former SEC players were selected, a modern record for the draft and more than double any other conference. In fact, the SEC East alone had more picks (32) than any other conference.
- The SEC produced 11 first round picks in the 2013 Draft, tying a record from 2007. Two former Vanderbilt standouts, **Jay Cutler** and **Chris Williams**, have been selected in the first round since 2006.



## THE COMMODORES ON NATIONAL TELEVISION

Vanderbilt is again part of the Southeastern Conference's unmatched national TV package.

On Aug. 29, the Commodores will participate in the opening night of ESPN's 2013 coverage with a prime-time home game against Ole Miss.

Every Commodore game is available on television due to national contracts between the SEC and CBS Sports and ESPN, and regional packages with Comcast Sports Southeast and FOX.

Vanderbilt's conference victories last year over Ole Miss and Kentucky were among four Commodore games aired on the SEC Network.



Annually, SEC games on CBS and ESPN channels are among the most watched on the college schedule. Vanderbilt games also bring outstanding audiences. In 2011, a Vanderbilt game was ESPN's highest rated primetime college football game of the year.





# FRANKLIN'S THIRD YEAR: CONTINUED IMPROVEMENT

The Vanderbilt Commodores return 17 starters and 41 letter-winners for the 2013 season. The returnees include eight starters and 18 letterwinners on offense, seven starters and 21 letterwinners on defense, and two of three specialists.

Vanderbilt looks to improve off a 2012 campaign that featured second-year Head Coach James Franklin guiding the Commodores to a 9-4 overall record capped by a 38-24 victory over N.C. State in the Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl. The squad tied a school record for both single-season wins and SEC victories en route to securing a Top 25 final ranking and the first back-to-back postseason bowl appearances in program history. Offensively, the 2012 Commodores produced more points than any Vanderbilt squad since 1916. On defense, the Commodores ranked among the NCAA Top 20 in numerous categories and limited opponents to the lowest scoring average in more than a decade. Special teams also ranked among the nation's best, with placekicker **Carey Spear** and punter Richard Kent earning All-SEC honors.

The Commodore offense, which averaged 40.1 more yards in 2012 than the previous year, features the veteran wide receiver tandem of **Jordan Matthews** and **Chris Boyd**, who amassed 2,097 receiving yards and 13 touchdowns in 2012. Three backs with productive resumes – **Wesley Tate**, **Brian Kimbrow** and **Jerron Seymour** – will step in to fill the void left by two-time All-SEC recipient Zac Stacy. Senior **Austyn Carta-Samuels**, a two-year starter in the Mountain West Conference prior to transferring to Vanderbilt, is pushing to replace Jordan Rodgers at quarterback. The offensive line features

four returning starters, including All-SEC candidate **Wesley Johnson**.

The defense returns six of its top seven tacklers from last year. The secondary is loaded with talented veterans, including cornerback **Andre Hal** and safeties **Kenny Ladler** and **Javon Marshall**. The linebackers are paced by returning seniors **Chase Garnham** and **Karl**

**Butler**. Ends **Walker May**, **Kyle Woestmann** and **Caleb Azubike** are key returnees on the defensive front.

For the second straight year – and third time in seven seasons, Vanderbilt kicks off ESPN's coverage of FBS college football when

the Commodores host Ole Miss on Thursday, Aug. 29.

The schedule has Vanderbilt making mid-September road trips to South Carolina and UMass sandwiched around home games against Ole Miss, Austin Peay, UAB, Missouri and Georgia. The slate also includes back-to-back SEC road games at Texas A&M and Florida. In late November, the Commodores play Kentucky at home and Tennessee on the road before hosting Wake Forest in the season finale.

## OFFENSIVE BACKFIELD

### STARTERS BACK: 1 LETTERWINNERS: 6

Despite the graduation of two-time All-Southeastern Conference running back **Zac Stacy** and two-year starting quarterback **Jordan Rodgers**, the Commodores have several talented players ready to step forward in the offensive backfield.

At quarterback, four prospects topped by redshirt senior **Austyn Carta-Samuels** will enter preseason camp competing for the starting role in Vanderbilt's opener against Ole Miss. Likewise, at least four contenders are hoping to secure the tailback vacancy left by Stacy's departure.

Though Carta-Samuels has started just one game at Vanderbilt, he was a two-year starter at Wyoming, guided the Cowboys to a bowl win and was the 2010 Mountain West Conference Freshman of the Year. He came out of spring drills with an edge over his competition, giving the offense a strong-armed veteran at the quarterback role.

Redshirt sophomore **Josh Grady**, redshirt freshman **Patton Robinette** and true freshman **Johnny McCrary** are expected to provide strong competition for Carta-Samuels.

Grady is a dual-threat prospect who moved to quarterback in Spring Practice after participating as a wide receiver last year. Robinette showed mobility, thorough knowledge of the offense, and an accurate arm during the spring. McCrary displayed plenty of athleticism and arm strength throughout spring practice.

The tailback role looks to be a competition between redshirt senior **Wesley Tate**, sophomore **Brian Kimbrow** and redshirt sophomore **Jerron Seymour**.

Redshirt sophomore **Derek King** and two freshmen, **Ralph Webb** and **C.J. Duncan**, also are candidates.

Tate and Kimbrow combined for 789 rushing yards and 11 TDs last year in support of Stacy. They bring different skills to the position: Tate bringing power to the attack, Kimbrow offering more quickness and big-play abilities.

Senior **Fitz Lassing** returns as the starter when the Commodores add a fullback to the mix. He has competition from redshirt junior **Blake Gowder** among others.

Three walk-on prospects – **Hasan Clayton**, **Will Fritz** and **Joseph Hoffman** – complete the running back corps.

# RECEIVING CORPS

## STARTERS BACK: 4 LETTERWINNERS: 8

The Commodores return arguably their impressive receiver corps in program history, paced by the Southeastern Conference's most potent duos at wide receiver.

Second-year coach **Josh Gattis** returns the team's top three wideouts for a second straight year. Tight ends mentor **Charles Bankins** also has multiple letterwinners back. Both coaches have newcomers on the roster ready to make their case for playing roles.

Leading the Commodore returnees at wide receiver are senior **Jordan Matthews**, a preseason Biletnikoff Award candidate and consensus All-SEC pick, and redshirt junior **Chris Boyd**. Together, the Matthews-Boyd tandem has combined for 231 catches, 3,537 receiving yards and 31 touchdowns. They were the SEC's No. 1 duo last year, setting a team record with 2,097 combined receiving yards.

Matthews is on pace to challenge several SEC career records. Remarkably, Boyd is ahead of Matthews' pace through two years.

Vanderbilt also returns a third multiple-year starter at wide receiver in senior **Jonathan Krause**. The team's top punt returner, Krause has 56 career receptions. Redshirt junior **Trent Pruitt** could easily play their way into roles this fall.

The staff also signed five talented wide receivers last February: **Carlos Burse**, **Jordan Cunningham**, **Gerald Perry**, **Latevius Rayford** and **DeAndre Woods**.

Along with the abundance of outside receiving threats, offensive coaches expect to see more production this season from a young corps of tight ends. A pair of redshirt sophomores **Steven Scheu** and **Kris Kentera**, were becoming aerial targets as the 2012 campaign closed. Scheu, like junior **Dillon van der Wal**, is more of a classic tight end, possessing the physical frame to effectively block SEC ends and linebackers. Kentera, a converted quarterback who has packed on nearly 30 pounds since arriving on campus, might be the team's most versatile receiving option over the middle.

Bankins is eager to evaluate tight end prospects **Nathan Marcus** and **Mitchell Parsons** from the 2013 signee class.

Kentera and senior **Fitz Lassing** also are potential H-backs on offense.

## OFFENSIVE LINE

**STARTERS BACK: 5 LETTERWINNERS: 6**

The Commodores return an offensive line that features six veterans with starting experience and a corps of talented redshirt freshmen eager to begin their collegiate careers.

In 2012, Herb Hand's line helped Vanderbilt produce its most potent offense of the modern era. The unit's 30.0-point scoring average is the highest single-season average since the mid-1910s. The 379.7-yard total offense average was 40 yards more than the previous year, and the fourth highest by a Commodore offense since the 1940s. Holes opened by the line also helped senior **Zac Stacy** become the first Commodore running back to post back-to-back 1,000-yard rushing seasons and set new team career standards with 3,143 yards and 30 rushing touchdowns.

Anchoring the line is versatile All-SEC candidate and 2012 co-captain **Wesley Johnson**, who enters his fifth year with 38 career starts at four different line positions. He projects as the team's starting left tackle. In 2012, Johnson didn't allow a single

Redshirt junior **Andrew Bridges**, who spent the offseason adding bulk, is back to compete for the tackle role across from Johnson.

The staff will need to replace two starting guards that graduated, Seattle draftee **Ryan Seymour** and **Josh Jelesky**.

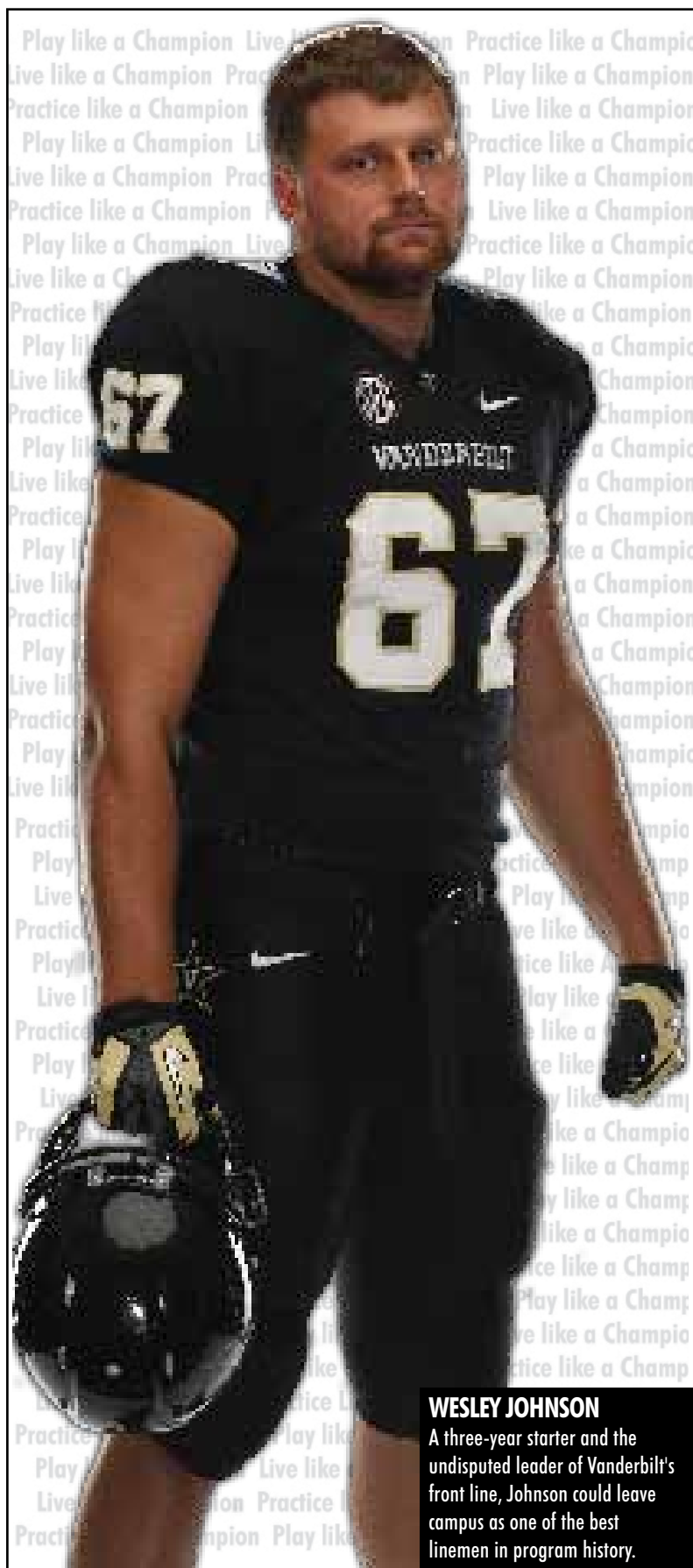
Two juniors, **Spencer Pulley** and **Joe Townsend**, and redshirt sophomore **Jake Bernstein** were effective interior starters in 2012. Pulley and Townsend both started at center while Bernstein impressed as a physical presence while starting multiple games at both guard positions.

Redshirt junior **Chase White** adds quality depth, with game experience at guard and tackle. Senior **Ryan Brockway** also provides depth at guard.

At the conclusion of spring drills, redshirt freshmen **Barrett Gouger** and **Andrew Jelks** were contending for starting roles at guard and tackle, respectively. Both are big, talented prospects who should contribute this season.

Three other redshirt freshmen – **Blake Fromang**, **Will Holden** and **Kevin McCoy** – bring more potential to the corps.

The team's signing class also includes highly regarded prospects **Delando Crooks** and **Sean Dowling**.

## DEFENSIVE LINE

### STARTERS BACK: 2 LETTERWINNERS: 8

The Vanderbilt defensive line returns with six proven performers and numerous young Commodores just waiting for an opportunity to state their case for playing time.

Third-year coach **Sean Spencer** will mentor a unit that could qualify as Vanderbilt's most athletic defensive line corps in recent years. Spencer also expects to see more size and bulk at all four positions.

Three valuable contributors from a year ago – tackles Rob Lohr and Colt Nichter and end Johnell Thomas – have graduated, but those likely to fill their roles are quality players who enjoyed success with the Commodores in 2012.

Three upperclassmen tipping the scale at more than 300 pounds – senior **Jared Morse**, redshirt junior **Vince Taylor** and junior **Barron Dixon** – are expected to be in Spencer's tackle rotation. They will compete with at least four talented newcomers during preseason camp.

Morse is back for his final season after contributing nine tackles for loss and a pair of sacks among 24 tackles. Taylor might have been the team's most improved down lineman during spring drills, showing superb quickness and strength. Dixon is coming off his best year, having registered 22 tackles in 2012.

The newcomers at tackle include three intriguing redshirt freshmen – **Adam Butler**, **Ladarius Banks** and **Torey Agee** – and 2013 signee Jay Woods. Butler and Agee showed promise in Spring Ball after moving from offensive guard and defensive end, respectively.

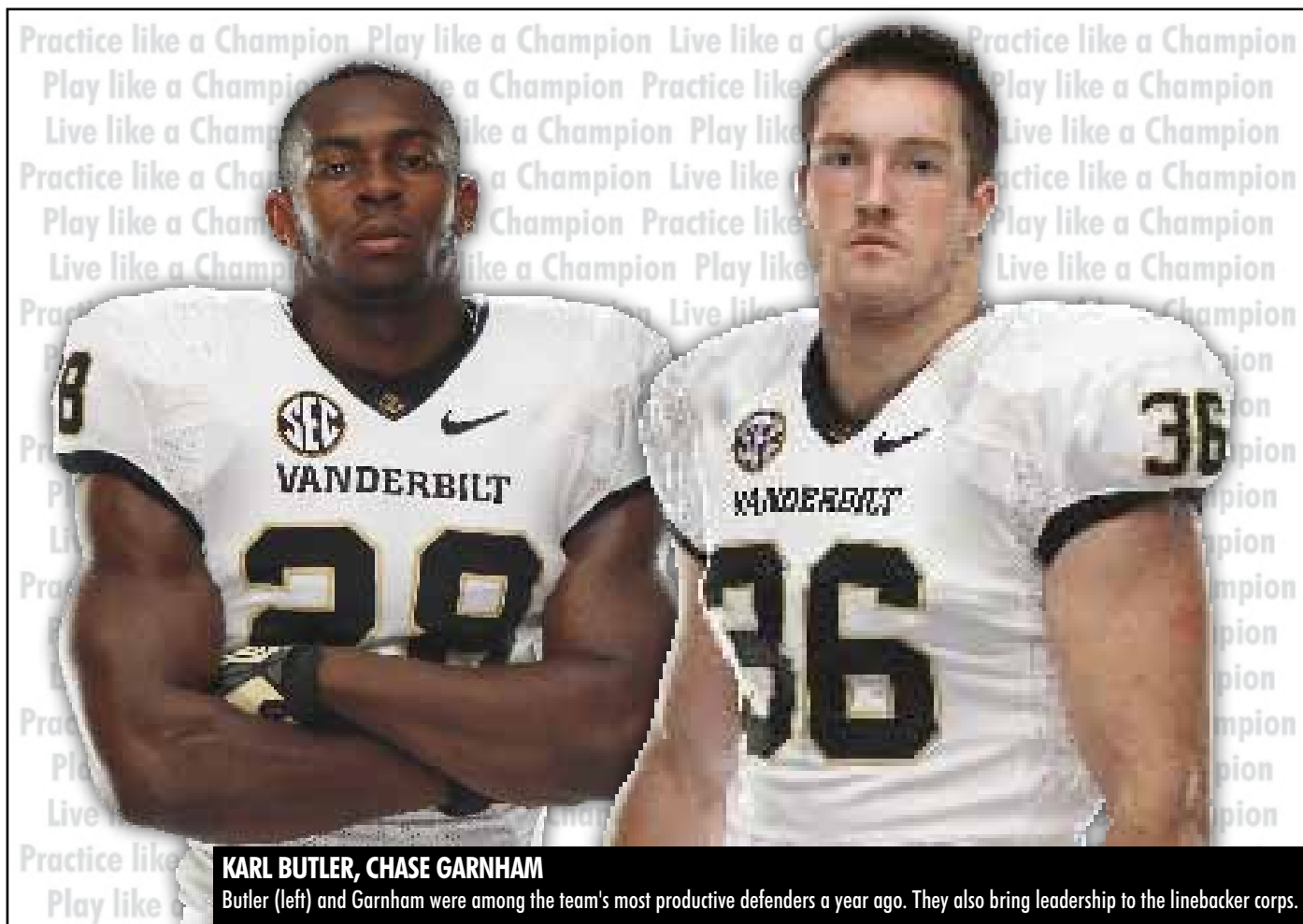

## LINEBACKER CORPS

### STARTERS BACK: 2 LETTERWINNERS: 7

Two veteran starters and five other letterwinners from a year ago headline Vanderbilt's linebacking corps.

The returning starters, seniors **Chase Garnham** and **Karl Butler**, are joined by a bevy of talented young prospects ready to step into increased roles for third-year coach **Brent Pry**.

Garnham has earned a reputation for making big plays as an outside linebacker in 2011 and middle linebacker last year. It's a short list of returning Southeastern Conference linebackers that can match Garnham's 2012 stats of 84 total tackles, seven sacks and 12.5 tackles for loss.

Butler came into his own as a first-year starter at outside linebacker in 2012. Arguably the team's most athletic linebacker, Butler contributed 51 total tackles and was extremely productive in passing situations.

Garnham and Butler also bring excellent leadership to the corps that only loses one key contributor to graduation, **Archibald Barnes**.

The staff has big plans for sophomores **Darreon Herring** and **Jake Sealand**. Both earned valuable roles as true freshmen in 2012, and exited spring drills in the mix for expanding roles and potential starting jobs.

Herring, projected as an outside linebacker, and Sealand, a classic inside linebacker, were big hitters last year. Herring had 33 tackles, forced two fumbles, and showed solid skills as a pass defender. Sealand posted

24 tackles, a forced fumble and frequently applied pressure on opposing quarterbacks.

Redshirt sophomore **Larry Franklin**, who played in the two-deep last year with Herring and Sealand, and junior **Kellen Williams** should see plenty of action.

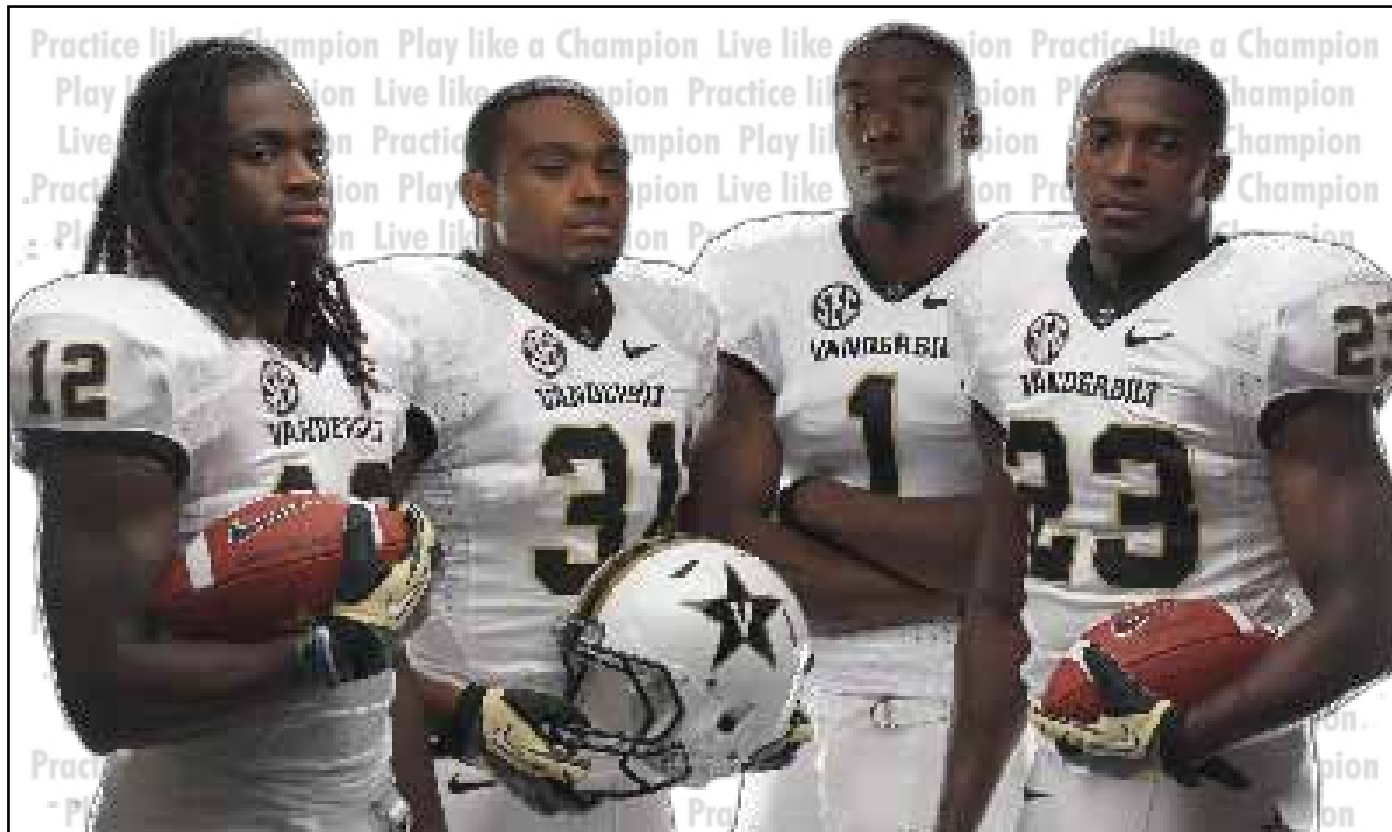

The defensive secondary should be a strength of the squad this fall, with the Commodores returning three quality starters and several newcomers that impressed during spring drills.

Leading the corps is senior **Andre Hal**, regarded by many as one of the nation's top cornerbacks, and a pair of starters covering the deep middle of the field, free safety **Kenny Ladler** and strong safety **Javon Marshall**.

They are supported by three-year letterwinner **Steve Clarke** and a pair of promising redshirt freshmen cornerbacks – **Paris Head** and **Torren McGlaster** – and the top two reserve safeties from a year ago, redshirt sophomores **Jahmel McIntosh** and **Andrew Williamson**.

The Commodores must replace two-year starting corner **Trey Wilson**, who earned a reputation of creating touchdowns on defense. Wilson set a new team record with four interception returns for scores.

Hal's ability to cover and reaction in passing situations was on full display in 2012, when he deflected 14 passes and picked off two others. The preseason Thorpe Award candidate possesses the tools to run with top SEC receivers and play physical in man-to-man coverage.

In Ladler and Marshall, Vanderbilt returns the SEC's active leading tacklers from the safety position. Both possess years of experience in the

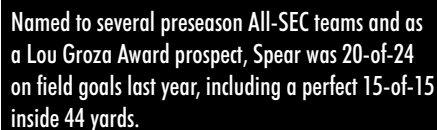

# HEAD COACH JAMES FRANKLIN



Doubters said it could not be done, but in two short years Vanderbilt Head Coach James Franklin has already taken the Commodores to heights not seen in decades, while completely changing the culture of the football program. Now, as Franklin enters his third season on campus, Vanderbilt's future appears brighter than ever before.

Armed with a tireless work ethic, contagious personality, strong leadership and an invigorating passion for his team, Franklin has guided Vanderbilt to back-to-back bowl games for the first time in school history, signed the highest-rated recruiting class in school history three years in a row, energized the Commodore fan base, and mentored a squad of student-athletes that collectively earned praise for their academic achievement.

The program's all-around success has turned heads of fans and media members across the country as people look to learn more about the mind behind the team's rise from the depths of the SEC.

In two years, Franklin has reshaped the image of Vanderbilt football by not only the team's success, but also through his energy and love for the program. He has created a fun, energetic and close-knit family atmosphere that players crave.

His passion for Vanderbilt is also on full display publicly through his relentless promotion of the program and random acts of kindness. Whether it is speaking to local organizations in Nashville, halting a press conference to hug a grateful bystander, helping Vanderbilt freshmen move into dorms, allowing an inspiring 11-year-old boy to lead the team onto the field for homecoming, passing out ice cream on campus or sitting in the home of a potential student-athlete, Franklin spreads goodwill and vision for the program to all that will listen.

To help spread his message, Franklin has provided unprecedented access to what takes place behind the scenes with his program. From pregame and postgame locker room speeches, to team meetings and trips inside the war room on signing day, Franklin has made a conscious effort to provide the public with an inside look at his program.

His efforts have paid dividends with feature stories and videos landing on prominent websites such as SI.com and ESPN.com and in publications such as Sports Illustrated, the New York Times and the Washington Post. Just last August, a video featuring Franklin awarding a scholarship to walk-on fullback Marc Panu went viral, collecting 400,000 views on YouTube and was featured on ESPN SportsCenter.

Hired as the first African-American head coach in Vanderbilt gridiron history on Dec. 17, 2010, Franklin's off-the-field accomplishments have been outstanding, but the results on the field have simply been staggering.

In his initial season with Vanderbilt in 2011, Franklin became the only first-year coach in school history to guide the Commodores to a bowl game and surpassed the total wins achieved by the program in each of its previous two seasons. As an encore, all Franklin did in his second season was run circles around what he achieved in 2011 and more, much more.

He guided Vanderbilt to a 9-4 overall season, matching the school record for wins last achieved in 1915, and ending the season with the longest winning streak in the Southeastern Conference, having won seven straight. It was Vanderbilt's longest win streak since an eight-game streak in 1948.

The remarkable 2012 campaign also included Vanderbilt tying another school record with five victories in SEC play. One of those conference

wins, against Tennessee, marked Vanderbilt's most decisive victory in the series since 1954.

The team also won on the road in 2012. Three of Vanderbilt's five SEC wins came at Missouri, Kentucky and Ole Miss. A convincing win at Wake Forest gave Vanderbilt four road victories, the most by a Commodore squad since 1948.

Vanderbilt's victory at Missouri was Franklin's first road triumph in the SEC. The team's 40-0 shutout at Kentucky was its second shutout of the season, marking the first time Vanderbilt had two shutouts in the same year since 1968. The win at Ole Miss was its sixth win of the season and came after facing a 23-6 deficit in the third quarter.

The Commodores culminated the season with a 38-24 win over N.C. State in the 2012 Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl. After the victory Franklin also was named as one of five finalists for National Coach of the Year honors from the Bryant Awards.

Vanderbilt also ended the season ranked No. 20 in the USA Today-Coaches Top 25 poll and No. 23 in the Associated Press ballot. It marked the program's first inclusion in the final Top 25 poll since 1958.

Other wins came against Presbyterian, UMass and Wake Forest. Vanderbilt won at Wake Forest, 55-21, and scored the second-most points ever allowed at BB&T Field. The win also helped Vanderbilt eclipse 300 points for the second straight year – a first in school history.

Vanderbilt excelled in all three phases of the game in 2012. On offense, the team scored 40-plus points on five occasions for the first time since 1915. The team's 30.0-point scoring offense was the highest of the modern era, and best by any Vanderbilt unit since World War I. The defense allowed just 18.2 points per game during the regular season – the fewest since 1975. On special teams, Vanderbilt had an All-SEC punter and kicker in the same year for the first time in team history.

Vanderbilt finished among the nation's best in a number of defensive statistical categories, ranking No. 6 in pass efficiency defense, No. 14 in

pass defense, No. 15 in scoring defense and No. 19 on total defense.

Franklin also helped mentor three players to school records in 2012. Running back Zac Stacy became Vanderbilt's all-time leading rusher and was the first player in school history to rush for 1,000 yards in back-to-back seasons. Receiver Jordan Matthews set Vanderbilt's single-season receiving yardage record with 1,323 yards and accumulated 94 catches, the second highest receptions total in Vanderbilt and SEC history. Kicker Carey Spear set a new school record by making 20 of 24 field goals.

In two seasons at the helm, Franklin has compiled a 15-11 overall record. Only one other Vanderbilt head coach, College Football Hall of Fame member Dan McGugin, registered more victories (16, 1904-05). Franklin's success through two years is unmatched since the Commodores became charter members of the SEC in 1933.

Vanderbilt's performance in SEC action under Franklin has been impressive. Four of the team's seven conference wins under Franklin have come by 23 points or more. From 1957-2010, Vanderbilt had four total wins against SEC opponents by 23-plus points.

In non-SEC games, Franklin's Vanderbilt teams are 7-1, including an 4-0 mark in 2011.

Franklin has also reversed a historical struggle for the Commodores – finishing seasons on a strong note. For the first time since 1948, the 2012 Commodores were undefeated during the month of November. Franklin's teams are 6-2 in November. In the decade before he arrived on campus, the 'Dores was just 3-32 in November games.

The success of the team on the field has also translated to the stands. In 2012, home attendance jumped 16 percent, with Vanderbilt Stadium experiencing three sellouts.

Franklin has also pushed for facility upgrades for the Vanderbilt program. Before the 2012 season, a new video board and hillside seating area in the south end zone were added to Vanderbilt Stadium. Additionally, new stadium lights enhanced the gameday experience and an artificial surface improved playing conditions on Dudley Field.

In late October, the team's new Indoor Practice Facility is expected to open near McGugin Athletics Center and existing practice fields. Franklin pushed for the much-needed venue, which will feature a regulation football field, upon arriving on campus.

Prior to Franklin's arrival on campus, the Commodores posted consecutive two-win seasons. In his first season at Vanderbilt, Franklin guided the 2011 Commodores to an appearance in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

Prior to accepting the Vanderbilt position, Franklin spent five seasons coordinating highly productive offensive units at the University of Maryland and Kansas State University. From 2008-10, Franklin served as offensive coordinator, and later added the title of assistant head coach. In 2010, he helped the Terrapins to an impressive 9-4 turnaround in 2010. That season, Franklin's explosive offense averaged 32.2 points and topped 50 points in three games. Maryland redshirt freshman quarterback Danny O'Brien finished the 2010 season as one of the nation's most efficient signal callers, throwing for 2,438 yards, 22 touchdowns, and only eight interceptions while earning ACC Rookie of the Year honors. First team All-ACC receiver Torrey Smith, an eventual second

round NFL pick, flourished under Franklin's system, finishing 2010 with 67 receptions, 1,055 receiving yards and 12 touchdowns.

Franklin went to Maryland after spending the 2006-07 seasons as offensive coordinator at Kansas State. He helped the Wildcats earn their first winning season in four years and a berth in the inaugural Texas Bowl. In 2006, Franklin focused on mentoring talented true freshman quarterback Josh Freeman. In 2007, Franklin's offense produced a 3,000-yard passer (Freeman), 1,500-yard receiver (All-America wide receiver Jordy Nelson), and 1,000-yard rusher for the first time in school history.

Today, Freeman and Nelson have found great success in the NFL. Freeman is the starting quarterback for Tampa Bay after being selected in the first round of the 2009 NFL Draft. Nelson grabbed a touchdown pass in the Green Bay Packers' 2011 victory in Super Bowl XLV.

Franklin spent the 2005 season coaching wide receivers for the Green Bay Packers. During that season, wide receiver Donald Driver set new career-high marks with 86 receptions for 1,221 yards.

After his brief but successful NFL tenure, Franklin returned to the college ranks for the opportunity to devise offensive schemes and gain in-game play calling experience at the coordinator level. Franklin's opportunity with the most-storied team in the NFL came on the heels of a five-year role coaching wide receivers at Maryland. During his tenure, the Terps earned three postseason berths including an appearance in the 2002 BCS FedEx Orange Bowl.

Franklin's role expanded to recruiting coordinator in 2003. Franklin delivered back-to-back recruiting classes ranked in the Top-25 by Rivals.com.

Early in his career, Franklin committed himself to being a student of the game: taking strategies, tools and tips from great coaches at a variety of competitive levels.

Franklin began his career in 1995 as the wide receivers coach at Kutztown (Pa.) University. Then, he returned to his alma mater, East Stroudsburg (Pa.) University learning the game from the defensive side of the ball coaching cornerbacks and safeties under veteran coach Denny Douds. He then earned a Division I position at James Madison University coaching wide receivers.

In 1998, Franklin earned his first opportunity to participate in the NFL's Minority Coaching Fellowship Program. Franklin interned with the Minnesota Vikings, the Philadelphia Eagles and the Miami Dolphins. Franklin also worked with Mike Price coaching tight ends at Washington State in 1998. The following year, Franklin helped Idaho State rank among the NCAA's best in total offense as ISU's receivers coach.

Franklin developed a passion for the game as a four-year letter-winning quarterback at East Stroudsburg. He was a two-time Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference selection. As a senior, he garnered MVP honors and was a Harlon Hill Trophy nominee for Division II Player of the Year after setting seven school records.

Franklin earned a Bachelor's in psychology from East Stroudsburg in 1995 and a Master's in educational leadership from Washington State in 1999.

Franklin and his family have become fast fans of Nashville. He and his wife, Fumi, are the parents of two daughters, Shola, 6, and Addy, 5.

### 2008-10 MARYLAND (assistant head coach/offensive coordinator/QBs)

On December 23, 2007, Ralph Friedgen sways Franklin back to Maryland as the Terps' assistant head coach and offensive coordinator. Quarterback Danny O'Brien earns ACC Rookie of the Year and Freshman All-America honors under Franklin's mentorship, ranking third nationally among freshmen in pass efficiency rating... O'Brien throws for 22 touchdowns against only eight picks after becoming the team's starter in Week Four... Franklin's 2010 offense ranks among the nation's best in limiting turnovers... Torrey Smith, now starting with the Ravens, also flourishes in 2010, catching 67 passes for 1,055 yards to earn first-team All-ACC honors... For the fourth time in his career, Franklin also is honored as a Top 25 recruiter by Rivals.com for helping to secure a class that included a number of four-star athletes... In 2008, the Terps defeat four ranked teams en route to a win in the Humanitarian Bowl to cap an 8-5 record... Terp WR Darrius Heyward-Bey becomes No. 9 overall pick of the 2009 NFL Draft.

Excitement surrounds the Commodore program as players arrive on campus to open preseason camp. Inside the program, coaches, staff and student-athletes are thrilled to cut the ribbon on a massive McGugin Center facility upgrade that includes a 140-person auditorium and team room, and new meeting rooms for each position grouping. Playing before a second straight home sellout, the Commodores smother Auburn's offense and ride a huge rushing effort by Zac Stacy to a 17-13 win. Late in the game, Stacy breaks the team record for career rushing yards.



## COMEBACK SEALS WIN IN OXFORD ★ Nov. 10, 2012

Trailing 23-6 early in the third quarter, the Commodores rally with a last-minute touchdown to post a thrilling 27-26 victory in Oxford. Afterward, Franklin carries Mr. Commodore into the post-game locker room.

Looking for their first victory over Tennessee in Nashville since 1982, the Commodores claim victory in convincing fashion, beating the Vols 41-18. It marks Vanderbilt's biggest margin of victory over Tennessee since 1954.

## ACCEPTING A MUSIC CITY POSTSEASON INVITE ★ Dec. 2, 2012

Commodore players celebrate with nearly 2,000 fans in the Student Life Center as leaders of the Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl officially invite Vanderbilt to the Dec. 31st game in Nashville by presenting a guitar to Franklin.

## CLAIMING A 7TH STRAIGHT WIN AT THE MUSIC CITY BOWL ★ Dec. 31, 2012

For the first time in Vanderbilt history, the Commodores make back-to-back bowl appearances. Before a highly partisan Vanderbilt crowd, Franklin guides the 'Dores to a 38-24 victory over N.C. State in the Music City Bowl. The 9-4 Commodores exit the season ranked in the final AP Poll for the first time since 1948. The team's seven-game win streak ranks as the longest active streak in the SEC.



## FINALIST FOR BRYANT AWARDS' COACH OF THE YEAR HONOR ★ Jan. 17, 2013

After guiding the Commodores to their most victories since the 1915 season, Franklin becomes the first Vanderbilt coach to be named as a finalist for the Bear Bryant Awards' Coach of the Year Trophy.

## A COMMODORE SIGNING CLASS LIKE NONE OTHER ★ Feb. 6, 2013

For the first time in team history, the Commodores' 2013 signing class is among the Top 20 classes by Rivals.com. While all 26 signees have three-star ratings, 13 from the class boast four-star consideration.







John Donovan enters his third season on the Vanderbilt staff having coordinated two of the team's most productive offenses in the modern era.

Donovan, who assisted James Franklin at the University of Maryland prior to joining him at Vanderbilt, serves as offensive coordinator and running backs coach.

In 2012, Donovan's offense produced 390 points and 4,936 total yards, the highest season total witnessed at Vanderbilt since World War II.

**NOTES:** Donovan's offense, led by all-time rushing leader Zac Stacy, receiver Jordan Matthews and quarterback Jordan Rodgers, averaged 39.8 points during the Commodores' six-game win streak to conclude the regular season. It also topped 40 points in five games, the most by a Vanderbilt squad since 1915.

Donovan's balanced attack also resulted in three of the finest individual seasons ever by Vanderbilt players. Zac Stacy became the team's most decorated running back ever, setting career records with 3,143 rushing yards and 30 rushing TDs. Stacy also became the first Commodore to ever produce back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons. Jordan Matthews set a team single-season record with 1,323 receiving yards. His 94-reception total also ranks No. 2 all-time

among Commodores. Quarterback Jordan Rodgers also produced a career year, passing for 2,539 yards and 15 touchdowns.

The offense also showed marked improvement in turnovers and third down efficiency.

Donovan also overlooks the play of Commodore running backs. Besides helping Stacy, Donovan mentored Wesley Tate and Brian Kimbrow in 2012. They combined for 789 yards and 11 touchdowns.

In 2011, Donovan's offense was the SEC's most improved. The offense averaged 26.7 points, nearly 10 points more than in 2010. Stacy also set new single-season team records with 1,193 rushing yards and 14 rushing touchdowns in 2011.

Franklin and Donovan were key offensive assistants under Ralph Friedgen at Maryland – Franklin serving as coordinator and Donovan working with running backs. In 2010, they helped the Terps to a 9-4 record and one of the nation's most impressive year-to-year turnarounds. That season, Maryland featured a powerful offensive attack that averaged 32.2 points. The unit was also efficient with just 14 turnovers.

The 2010 campaign was Donovan's fourth at Maryland working with running backs. His top back, Da'Rel Scott, enjoyed a breakout campaign with 1,133 rushing yards and first team All-ACC honors in 2008.

Donovan mentored Maryland quarterbacks in the 2006 and 2007 campaigns. In 2006, Donovan coached All-ACC quarterback Sam Hollenbach to his finest year as he threw for 2,371 yards and 15 touchdowns, and was named MVP of Maryland's Champs Sports Bowl victory over Purdue. Prior to taking over as running backs coach in 2005, Donovan served as Maryland's assistant recruiting coordinator under Friedgen, who hired Donovan as a graduate assistant from 1998-2000 at Georgia Tech.

A 1997 graduate of Johns Hopkins, Donovan was a three-year starter at defensive back for the Blue Jays, earning 12 career interceptions.

Donovan earned a bachelor's in sociology from Johns Hopkins in 1997. He later earned a master's in economics from Georgia Tech.

Donovan and his wife, Stacey, are the parents of a son, John Patrick, 7; and two daughters: Cate, 5, and Shea, 3.

## BOB SHOOP

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR;  
SAFETIES

Defensive coordinator and safeties coach Bob Shoop returns for his third year after guiding two of the most impressive 'Dore defenses in many years.

Shoop's 2012 defense continued the same positive trend that began in 2011 when it enjoyed stunning, across-the-board improvement.

In 2012, the unit ranked among the nation's best in several key

statistics: 14th in pass defense, 15th in scoring defense and 19th in total defense

Vanderbilt's 18.6-point scoring defense has been bettered only once in the last 30 years on campus. Its pass defense averaged allowing just 191.8 yards, third in the SEC. The Commodores' total defense of 339.9 ranked fifth best in the conference.

Shoop's attacking squad also performed well in third down situations. In 2012, the unit ranked fifth in the SEC

— and 25th in the NCAA — in third down success. The 'Dores allowed just 18.2 first downs. The pressuring unit also producing tackles for losses in bunches, ranking second in the SEC with 97 tackles for loss.

Several of Shoop's defensive standouts enjoyed individual success. Cornerback Andre Hal garnered All-SEC honors. Shoop also mentored rapidly-developing safeties Kenny Ladler and Javon Marshall. The duo

shared the team lead with 60 total tackles.

Shoop directed the 2011 unit to staggering levels of improvement. Under Shoop's guidance, the Commodore defense ranked ninth in the NCAA in pass defense efficiency and 18th in total defense. The 2011 defense was paced by All-America cornerback Casey Hayward, who tied the team career record with 15 interceptions, and linebacker Chris Marve, who earned All-SEC honors for the third straight year.

Shoop joined Vanderbilt following a superb four-year tenure as defensive coordinator at William & Mary where the one-time Columbia head coach guided a remarkable transformation of the Tribe defense.

At William & Mary, Shoop's defenses ranked among the top units in NCAA FCS football. In 2009, W&M ended the year first nationally in rush defense and second in scoring defense. The performance helped earn Shoop the 2009 *FootballScoop* NCAA FCS Coordinator of the Year Award.

Shoop's résumé spans two decades, including three stints as a defensive coordinator (Yale, 1994-96; Villanova, 1997; William & Mary, 2007-10) and three years as the head coach at Columbia (2003-05).

Before becoming Columbia's head coach, Shoop served as secondary coach at Boston College from 1999-2002. As an assistant, Shoop has been on the winning sideline of three classic college rivalries: Army-Navy, Harvard-Yale and Boston College-Notre Dame.

Shoop played collegiate football at Yale. He earned honorable mention All-Ivy accolades in 1987 as a receiver and was recognized with Yale Football's prestigious Robert Gardner Anderson Memorial Award for team spirit, dedication and leadership. He also earned four letters in baseball. A native of Oakmont, Pa., Shoop was inducted into the Allegheny-Kiski Valley Sports Hall of Fame.

Shoop and his wife, Maura, have two children, Tyler and Jay. Shoop's brother, John, is the offensive coordinator at Purdue.

## CHARLES BANKS

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR;  
TIGHT ENDS

Charles Banks enters his third season at Vanderbilt as special teams coordinator and tight ends coach under James Franklin.

After working alongside Franklin at Maryland in 2009-10, Banks brought his special teams expertise to Vanderbilt last year and quickly achieved across-the-board Commodore improvement in the third phase of football. In 2012, Banks continued his remarkable job with Vanderbilt special teams.

Behind the placekicking of Carey Spear and the punting of Richard Kent, the 'Dores put together arguably the finest combined special teams effort in school history.

Spear was sensational, earning All-SEC honors after setting school records with 20 field goals and 87 points scored by a kicker. He also ranked among the SEC's most accurate kickers, hitting 83.3 percent of his field goal attempts (20-of-24).

Kent wasn't outdone by Spear. The third-year starter averaged 44.9 yards, the fourth highest average ever by a Commodore. Kent's ability to directionally punt was extremely effective in limiting returns and pinning teams deep inside their 20-yard line.

Jonathan Krause also made huge strides as a punt returner. His 11.2-yard average in 2012 was the team's second highest in the 20 years. Krause also became the first 'Dore since 1968 to score on two returns.

Banks also mentored a young and improving corps of tight ends. A pair of redshirt freshmen who developed nicely during the season, Steven Scheu and Kris Kentera, combined for 18 receptions and three touchdown catches.

Banks has experience coaching offense, defense and special teams. He also has coached at the NFL, collegiate and high school levels.

Prior to arriving at Vanderbilt, Banks distinguished himself at Maryland. In 2010, Terrapin special teams played an instrumental part in one of the NCAA's most impressive year-to-year turnarounds as the Terps improved seven games in the win column enroute to a 9-4 overall season. That season, Banks mentored Maryland's Tony Logan to a 18.8-yard punt return

average and first team All-ACC honors. In 2009, another Banks' standout at Maryland, Torrey Smith, earned All-ACC honors by breaking the conference single-season record for kickoff return yards. Smith is now a NFL star with Baltimore. Banks also groomed Nick Ferrara to freshman All-America honors as a placekicker in 2009.

Banks enjoyed success as an assistant at the University of Richmond from 2007-08. In Banks' final game at Richmond, the Spiders claimed the 2008 NCAA FCS national title with a win over Montana.

Banks played running back for James Madison, where he earned a bachelor's in speech communications in 1994. He earned a master's from Eastern Kentucky in 1998.

George Barlow enters his second year as Vanderbilt's defensive backs coach and defensive recruiting coordinator. He joined James Franklin's staff after serving as interim head coach and defensive coordinator at the University of New Mexico.

Barlow is one of three highly respected former FCS defensive coordinators on the staff. The unit is directed by Bob Shoop, former coordinator at William & Mary. Brent Pry, formerly at Georgia Southern, serves as assistant head coach, co-coordinator and linebackers coach.

In his first season at Vanderbilt, Barlow mentored the team's defensive backs into one of the SEC's most productive units. The corps was an important ingredient of a defense that ranked third in the SEC and 14th in the NCAA in pass defense.

Barlow also did a superb job developing first-year starting cornerback Andre Hal. The junior was named second team All-SEC after posting 16 passes defended as a shutdown cover opposite Trey Wilson, who inked a NFL free agent deal with Jacksonville after the season.

Prior to joining Vanderbilt, Barlow served three years at New Mexico after

successfully mentoring defenses at James Madison University, one of the top teams in the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (FCS).

Barlow began the 2011 season as UNM's assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. Four games into the season, Barlow was named the Lobos' interim head coach. The 2011 UNM defense was led by All-Mountain West Conference linebacker Carmen Messina, who broke the WAC career record with 454 tackles.

Barlow joined New Mexico after experiencing tremendous success at James Madison. He helped guide the Dukes to the 2004 NCAA I-AA national championship and FCS postseason appearances in 2006, 2007 and 2008.

Barlow's JMU was consistently among the nation's best. In 2006, the Dukes were second nationally in sacks and fourth in rush defense. In 2005, the unit ranked first nationally in rush defense. In JMU's championship season of 2004, the Dukes set the I-AA record for sacks. His top pupil at JMU was linebacker Akeem Jordan, the 2006 AFCA I-AA Player of the Year.

Serving as JMU's running backs coach in 1999 prior moving to the defensive staff, Barlow tutored Curtis Keaton to team records with 1,719 rushing yards and 20 rushing TDs. Keaton was later selected in the fourth round of the 2000 NFL Draft. The following year, Barlow coached JMU's Delvin Joyce when he became the first Division I-AA player to reach the 1,000-yard career mark in rushing, receiving, punt returns and kickoff returns.

Prior to JMU, Barlow spent three years at Oklahoma, coaching safeties and linebackers in 1998 after serving as a defensive graduate assistant in 1996-97.

Barlow was an all-conference safety at Marshall from 1986-90. He was a member of the 1987 Thundering Herd squad that played for the I-AA title.

Barlow graduated in 1990 with a degree in business administration concentrating in finance and business law.

Barlow is the parent of a daughter, Kierstin Paige.

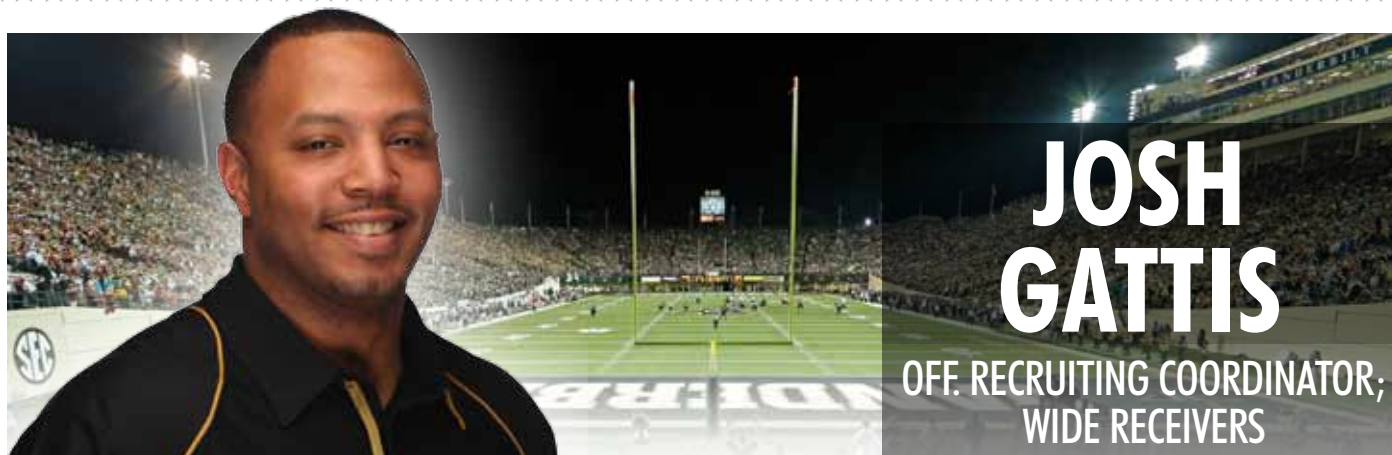

Gattis, who joined the Commodores after serving as receivers coach at Western Michigan in 2011, helped Jordan Matthews and Chris Boyd put together receiving statistics unmatched by any other Vanderbilt duo. The Matthews-Boyd tandem totalled 144 catches and 2,097 receiving yards, 217 yards more than the next closest Commodore duo.

Matthews was superb, earning consensus First Team All-SEC and third-team All-America honors after registering 94 catches and 1,323 receiving yards. Boyd also enjoyed a sensational season with 50 catches and 774 receiving yards. They combined to haul in 13 touchdown passes.

In just two years as a collegiate coach, Gattis has mentored All-America receivers at both Vanderbilt and Western Michigan.

Prior to arriving in Nashville, Gattis helped Western Michigan to a 7-6 mark and the 2011 Little Caesars Pizza Bowl, just the fifth postseason bowl in team history.

Gattis' top pupil at Western Michigan, wide receiver Jordan White,

established a slew of team and Mid-American Conference (MAC) records en route to consensus All-America recognition. As a senior in 2011, White topped the nation with 140 receptions and 1,911 receiving yards. His 17 touchdown catches ranked third in the NCAA. He finished his career with

306 catches and set a new MAC record with 4,187 receiving yards. White capped his WMU career by setting a Little Caesars Bowl record with 265 receiving yards.

White became Western Michigan's first consensus All-America recipient, earning recognition from the Associated Press, Walter Camp Football Foundation, American Football Coaches Association, Sports Illustrated and Yahoo! Sports. White was drafted by the New York Jets and continues to play for the NFL team.

Two other WMU receivers, Chleb Ravenell and Robert Arnheim, produced career campaigns under Gattis: Ravenell posting 67 receptions for 839 yards and nine touchdowns; Arnheim registering 62 catches for 702 yards and four touchdowns.

Gattis joined Western Michigan after serving as a graduate assistant in 2010 at the University of North Carolina.

Gattis was a two-time All-ACC recipient during a superb career at Wake Forest. He was a three-year starter at safety, finishing his career with 32 starts, 253 total tackles, six forced fumbles and 12 interceptions.

Gattis participated in the 2007 Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine Game. He was drafted in the fifth round of the 2007 NFL Draft by Jacksonville. He played the 2007-08 season with the Chicago Bears.

Gattis earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in sociology from Wake Forest in December 2006.

## HERB HAND

RUN GAME COORDINATOR;  
OFFENSIVE LINE

Herb Hand returns for a fourth year as the Vanderbilt offensive line coach. He also adds the duties of run game coordinator this season.

In 2012, Hand continued to use innovation to maximize the effectiveness of his offensive line. Hand's belief in preparing linemen for multiple positions was on full display late in the season with the

play of redshirt junior Wesley Johnson and redshirt senior Ryan Seymour. Johnson, recognized as an honorable mention All-SEC selection, played extremely well at both tackles. Seymour, a starting guard who was picked by Seattle in the 2013 NFL Draft, performed at a high level when moved to Johnson's vacant left tackle role.

Several other members of Hand's corps performed well in what became the most potent offensive attack in modern Commodore history. Sophomore Joe Townsend and redshirt freshman Jake Bernstein were extremely productive when inserted during the season at center and guard, respectively.

In 2011, Hand did a remarkable job molding an undersized offensive line corps into a cohesive unit. The line helped Vanderbilt add 25.8 yards to its rushing average and 41 yards to its average total offense. The unit also allowed nine fewer sacks than

the year before.

In 2011-12, the line paved the way for Zac Stacy to establish new team career and single-season rushing records. The St. Louis draftee finished with 3,143 rushing yards and 30 TDs.

Prior to joining Vanderbilt, Hand worked three years at Tulsa, serving as assistant head coach, offensive coordinator and line coach. Hand helped guide Tulsa to consecutive GMAC Bowl games behind one of the NCAA's most explosive spread offenses. As Tulsa's co-coordinator, Hand coached a line that paved the way for the nation's top ranked offense in 2007-08. He was a finalist for national offensive line coach of the year in 2008.

Before joining Tulsa, Hand spent six successful years at West Virginia, serving as tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator. Hand helped the Mountaineers to three Big East titles and five straight postseason bowls, including a 38-35 win over SEC champion Georgia in the 2006 Sugar Bowl.

That 2006 West Virginia team finished 11-2 and was among the nation's top-10 teams for most of the year. Hand helped guide an offense that ranked second nationally in rushing, third in scoring, and fourth in total offense.

Prior to joining West Virginia, Hand was a graduate assistant at Clemson in 1999-2000 when the Tigers played in the Peach Bowl and Gator Bowl.

Before that, he served as defensive coordinator and special teams coordinator at Concord (W. Va.) College. He also was defensive coordinator at another university in the state, Glenville State, where he helped coach the squad to three WVIAC Championships.

In 1990, Hand received his bachelor's in history from Hamilton College. He also earned a master's in 1993 while coaching linebackers from West Virginia Wesleyan.

Hand and his wife, Debbie, have three children: sons, Trey, 17, and Cade, 11, and daughter, Bailey, 15.

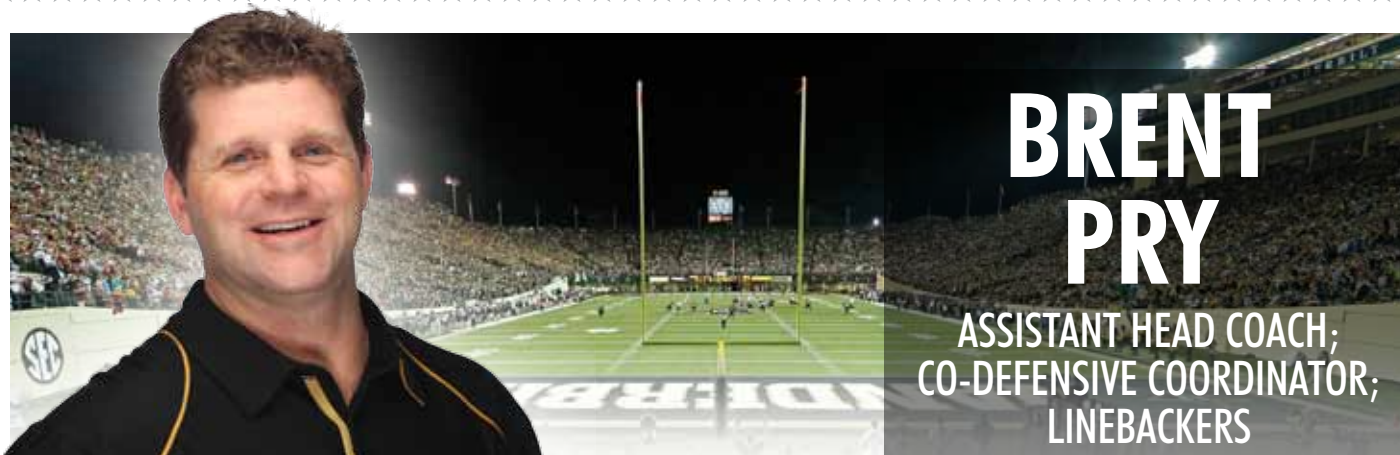

In 2012, Pry developed a linebacking corps that lacked game experience entering the year into one of the defense's most productive position groups by the end of the season.

Pry got career seasons from returning starters Chase Garnham and Archibald Barnes, developed Karl Butler into a quality third starter, and introduced three first-year players into key reserve roles.

Garnham topped the corps with 84 total tackles, seven sacks and 12.5 tackles for loss after moving to middle linebacker. Barnes contributed 66 tackles while Butler added 48 stops.

Pry also mentored a pair of true freshmen, Darreon Herring and Jake Sealand, and redshirt freshman Larry Franklin into key reserve contributors in 2012. The trio combined for 75 total tackles.

In 2011, Pry built a solid unit around All-SEC recipient Chris Marve. The linebackers were vital to Vanderbilt's improvement in virtually every defensive statistical category. The defense soared in SEC and NCAA rankings, finishing the year 18th nationally in total defense. Marve

finished the year by earning All-SEC honors for the third straight season.

Pry joined Vanderbilt after leading a resurgence at Georgia Southern. With Pry's help, the Eagles roared back to national prominence among Division I FCS teams in 2010. With Pry serving as defensive coordinator and safeties coach, Georgia Southern advanced to the 2010 NCAA FCS national semifinals and beat No. 1-ranked Appalachian State in the regular season.

Pry joined Georgia Southern from the University of Memphis, where he served three years as the Tigers' defensive line coach. At Memphis, he was part of a staff that guided the Tigers to two bowl games.

From 2002-06, Pry served at La.-Lafayette, holding positions of assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. The 2005 Lafayette squad earned a Sun Belt title and featured five players that eventually played in the NFL. Pry was an assistant coach at Western Carolina from 1998-2001, mentoring the defensive line for two years, then secondary and special teams for two years. He also worked three years as a graduate assistant at Virginia Tech.

Pry began his coaching career at East Stroudsburg (Pa.) University in 1993. During Pry's tenure, East Stroudsburg's offense was directed by a standout quarterback who now serves as Vanderbilt's newest head coach.

A free safety at Maryville (Tenn.) College in 1988, Pry later transferred to the University of Buffalo. Pry lettered in 1990, then suffered a career-ending injury in 1991, only to return as a student coach in 1992.

Pry is a second generation college football coach. His father, Jim, has coached at the college level for more than 35 years.

Pry and his wife, Amy, are the parents of a son, Colby, and two daughters, Madeline and Catherine.

# ASSISTANT COACHES



Ricky Rahne returns for his third season as Vanderbilt's quarterback coach. The coaching ties between Rahne and James Franklin date to the mid-2000s when Rahne served as offensive graduate assistant under Franklin at Kansas State.

Rahne's work with senior Jordan Rodgers in 2012 helped produce one of the finest campaigns ever by a Vanderbilt quarterback. Rodgers, prospering under Rahne's guidance, finished the year ranking among the team's single-season Top Ten passers with 2,539 yards and 15 touchdowns. More importantly, Rodgers substantially improved as an efficient quarterback during his final season, hitting on a career-high 60 percent of his passes and ranking among SEC leaders with just five interceptions. After the season, Rodgers signed a free agent deal with Jacksonville.

In 2011, Rodgers and Larry Smith enjoyed success under Rahne's watchful eye. Smith increased his completion percentage to a career-high 55% and provided superb leadership through the season. Rodgers also responded well when called upon at midseason, passing for 1,523 yards, the highest total ever by a first-year Vanderbilt quarterback. Rodgers also threw nine TDs.

Rahne, who enjoyed a record-breaking collegiate career as quarterback at Cornell University, and Franklin were members of the Kansas State staff during the 2006-07 seasons.

While on the Wildcat staff, Franklin and Rahne helped mentor talented quarterback Josh Freeman into an All-Big 12 signal caller and an eventual first-round NFL draft pick.

Rahne served as a full-time member of the Kansas State coaching staff from 2007-10. He held the position of tight ends coach under legendary Wildcat head coach Bill Snyder in 2009-10 after mentoring Kansas State running backs the first two years as a staffer.

In 2010, Rahne helped Kansas State secure a berth in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl at Yankee Stadium after a 7-5 regular season. In 2009, Rahne tutored first team All-Big 12 tight end Jeron Mastrud, who ranks second in school history in receptions among tight ends. Directing the Wildcat running backs from 2007-08, Rahne helped tutor All-Big 12 selection James Johnson, who became the fastest Wildcat to rush for 1,000 yards in a season in 2007.

Rahne served as the Wildcats' graduate assistant during the 2006 season, working hand-in-hand with Franklin with Wildcat quarterbacks. Specifically, they helped develop a young Freeman into K-State's starting quarterback.

Eventually, Freeman put together one of the greatest careers ever by a Kansas State signal caller and became a first-round draft pick of the Tampa Bay Bucs. Freeman, who just completed his fourth year as an NFL starter, is considered one of the league's future stars at quarterback.

Before joining Kansas State, Rahne worked as a Cornell running backs coach in 2005 mentoring first team All-Ivy running back Luke Siwula, and as an assistant defensive coach at Holy Cross in 2004.

A native of Morrison, Colo., Rahne finished his career as Cornell's all-time leader in nearly every passing category and earned the team's MVP honors three times.

Rahne earned a degree in industrial and labor relations from Cornell.

Rahne and his wife, Jennifer, are the parents of two young sons, Ryder and Jake.

Sean Spencer enters his third year on James Franklin's staff. He coaches the Commodores' defensive line.

Several in Spencer's corps, including ends Walker May, Kyle Woestmann and Caleb Azubike, and tackles Jared Morse, Barren Dixon and Vince Taylor, enjoyed career campaigns last year.

In just two years, Spencer has developed one of the deepest lines in recent Vanderbilt history. In 2012, Spencer used 10 players in his defensive line rotations.

Woestmann closed the 2012 season in superb fashion, totalling six sacks. Azubike set a new team record for true freshmen with four sacks. May, posted 10.5 tackles for loss and three quarterback sacks. Morse registered 26 tackles, including nine for losses. Dixon and Taylor also developed into key interior contributors.

In 2011, the defensive front fed off Spencer's energy, with several standouts enjoying career years, including defensive end Tim Fugger and tackle Rob Lohr. Fugger, drafted by Indianapolis and now with Arizona, was rewarded for an impressive 2011 campaign with second team All-SEC honors, posting eight sacks and 13.5 tackles for loss. Lohr, who signed as a free agent by Kansas City after the 2012 season, also ranked among the SEC's most productive defensive tackles with 11.5 tackles for loss and 4.5 sacks.

Spencer came to Nashville after two successful years at Bowling Green. Spencer's top pupil at Bowling Green, defensive tackle Chris Jones,

garnered six quarterback sacks in 2010, including 3.5 sacks in a win over Central Michigan that helped Jones earn National Defensive Lineman of the Week honors. Jones later also earned All-MAC Conference recognition.

The BGSU defensive front posted 40 sacks during Spencer's tenure. He also helped Bowling Green to the Humanitarian Bowl in 2009 despite opening the year without a single returning starter on the defensive front.

Spencer enjoyed two successful stints at UMass, serving from 2007-08 after working with the Minutemen from 2001-03. He was a defensive line coach in both tenures, and also guided UMass special teams in 2007-08.

In 2007 the Minutemen ranked among the nation's best with 44 sacks. That UMass unit was led by All-America and Buck Buchanan Award finalist David Burris. In the early 2000s, Spencer mentored another top Minuteman defensive lineman, Buchanan Award finalist Valdamar Brower.

Spencer enjoyed team success at UMass, helping the Minutemen to consecutive Colonial Athletic Association titles.

Spencer mentored two special teams phenoms at UMass: kick returner Courtney Robinson and punter Brett Arnold. Robinson earned first team All-CAA honors after breaking the team's record for kick return yards. Arnold earned first team All-America honors.

Spencer spent the 2006 season at Hofstra University where he was the defensive line coach for the Pride. In the summer of 2006, Spencer took part in an NFL summer internship with the New York Jets.

Prior to Hofstra, Spencer served as linebackers coach at Villanova University in 2005 where he coached All-American Brian Hulea. Spencer also spent the 2004 season at the College of Holy Cross and served the 2001-03 seasons as an assistant at UMass. Previously, he served tenures at Trinity College, Shippensburg University and Wesleyan University.

Spencer started three years at free safety at Clarion University.

Spencer is the parent of a daughter, Alysia.

# ASSISTANT COACHES



Dwight Galt enters his third season as Director of Performance Enhancement of the Vanderbilt football program. A veteran strength coach of three decades, Galt joined James Franklin's staff before the 2011 campaign.

Vanderbilt football student-athletes have flourished under the strength and conditioning program instituted three years ago by Galt and his top assistants, Chuck Losey and Barry Gant.

The year-round program aimed at improving speed, agility, strength, and power throughout the Commodore roster has produced superb results. The 2012 squad held an impressive 191-129 scoring advantage over opponents after intermission. It marked the second consecutive season that Vanderbilt has vastly outscored foes in the second half.

Galt came to Vanderbilt from Maryland, where he worked with Franklin while conditioning some of the Terps' finest gridiron teams

At the 2013 combine, Vanderbilt's Zac Stacy ranked high among all running backs in several categories, including the broad jump, bench press and 20-yard shuttle. Later, at the team's Pro Day, several other Commodore seniors trained by Galt registered impressive agility and strength feats.

In past years, performances by a slew of Galt-trained athletes have amazed NFL scouts, such as tight end Vernon Davis, receiver Darrius Heyward-Bey and cornerback Dominique Foxworth. Davis and Heyward-Bey rank among the Top 10 all-time performers at the combine: Davis posting the fastest 40-yard dash ever by a tight end (4.36) and Heyward-Bey running the fastest 40 (4.30) by a wideout in more than a decade.

Currently, nearly 40 former athletes trained by Galt are active in the National Football League.

Galt served as Director of Strength & Conditioning at Maryland for the last 17 of 27 years he spent with the football program. After starting as a full-time strength coach with Maryland in 1989, Galt was named Maryland's Head Strength Coach in 1993, with responsibility over 27 varsity sports.

Throughout his career, Galt has been fortunate to mentor several superb assistants who have become industry leaders: including University of Virginia head strength coach Evan Marcus, Penn State head strength coach Craig Fitzgerald and Washington Redskins head strength coach Ray Wright.

Galt and his wife, Janice, have been married for 34 years. They have four children: Angie, 30; Teri, 29; and 26-year-old twin sons, Dwight IV and Tommy.

All four children played intercollegiate sports: Angie as a softball catcher at Brown University; Teri as an all-conference soccer defender at Frostburg State (Md.). Both sons played football at Maryland and remain active in collegiate athletics: Dwight IV is strength associate head coach at Penn State; Tommy is the offensive line coach at North Greenville (S.C.) University.

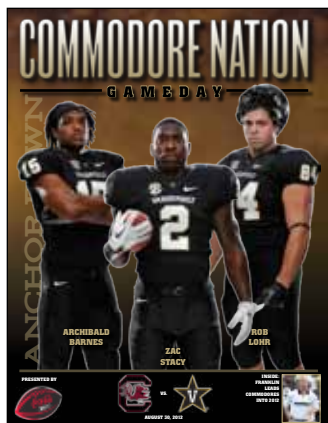
Lattimore scored the go-ahead TD on a 1-yard run with 11:25 to go.

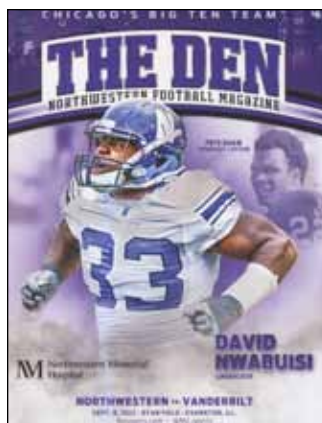

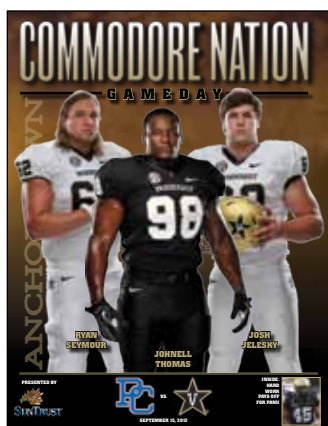
"This was a great win for us," Vanderbilt Head Coach James Franklin said. "We are 1-0 this week. We're undefeated in the 2012 season that started today."

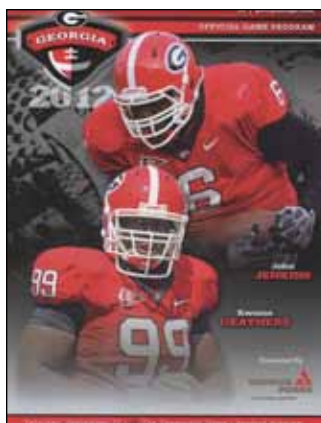

offense after an early injury to quarterback James Franklin, who sprained his left knee on a first-quarter run and didn't return.

Vanderbilt's first points of the game came when Missouri punter Trey Barrow couldn't handle a snap while standing in the back of Missouri's end zone, with the ball rolling out the back. A 5-yard Stacy run late in the second half gave the Commodores a 9-6 lead they wouldn't relinquish.

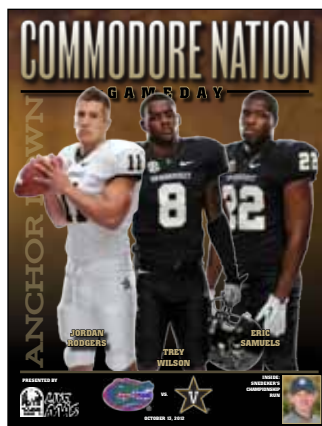

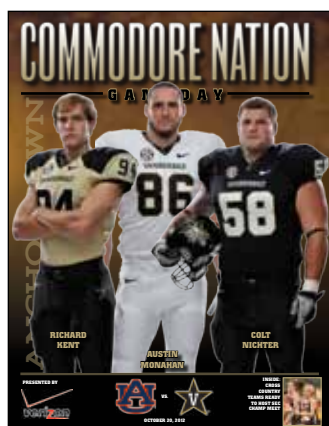

## 'DORES WIN SECOND STRAIGHT; SOUNDLY DEFEAT UMASS

**NASHVILLE** – For more than 25 minutes, Vanderbilt didn't look the part of the favorite. But the Commodores needed just 55 seconds to assume the role. Two late first-half touchdowns made up for a penalty-filled opening half and broke open a tight game as Vanderbilt rolled to a 49-7 victory over winless Massachusetts on Saturday.

Jordan Rodgers completed 17 of 21 passes for 217 yards and two touchdowns. He also ran for a score as the Commodores (4-4) overcame 11 penalties, two turnovers and the loss of their starting running back to blow out UMass (0-8).

Vanderbilt made it look easy in the second half - specifically the third quarter. Within five minutes, the Commodores leapt to a 49-0 lead thanks to four touchdowns, including an interception return and the team's first punt return for a score since 1999.

"It was huge," Rodgers said. "We needed it. We got off to a slow start and we needed to hit a couple of those touchdowns late in the half to give us some momentum - some kind of confidence going into halftime because we had too many mental mistakes."

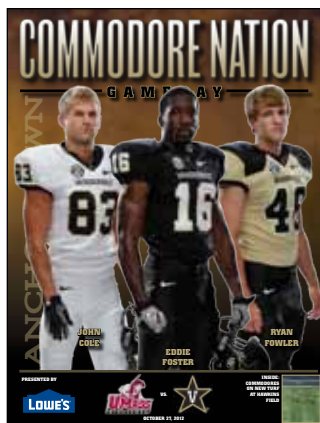

## VANDERBILT BLANKS KENTUCKY; FIRST SEC SHUTOUT SINCE 1968

**LEXINGTON, Ky.** – Before this game on the Kentucky campus, Vanderbilt hadn't shut out a SEC opponent since 1968.

That streak was broken in a 40-0 road win against Kentucky in which the Commodores dominated on offense, defense and special teams.

Quarterback Jordan Rodgers completed 18 of 29 passes for 220 yards, two touchdowns and one interception, and three different Commodores running backs rushed for scores against the over-matched Kentucky defense.

**GAME 9**  
**Nov. 3, 2012**  
**LEXINGTON, Ky.**

Vanderbilt's 40-point victory margin was its largest over the Wildcats in 96 years.

In the teams' 85 meetings, only two of Vanderbilt's wins have been more lopsided: 45-0 in 1916, and 50-0 in 1897.

The Commodores (5-4, 3-3) scored touchdowns on four of their five first-half drives, and none of the scoring drives took more than four minutes.

Rodgers led his team 71 yards on 11 plays begin the game, ending the drive with a 34-yard touchdown pass to Jordan Matthews. It was the fourth time this season has scored on its first drive of the game.

### PLAY OF THE GAME

After a 16-play opening drive, Kentucky misses a 50-yard field goal. The Commodores force nine of the Wildcats final 11 drives to five plays or less, including three three and outs.

### KEY STATISTIC

The shutout was the first in SEC play for Vanderbilt since blanking Kentucky 6-0 in 1968.

Andre Hal intercepted two passes and Jordan Rodgers threw for two touchdowns as Vanderbilt routed Tennessee 41-18 Saturday night for the Commodores' fifth straight victory, clinching their first winning record in the regular season since 1982.

In-state rival Tennessee had won 34 of the past 35 games in this series coming into this game. The Commodores (7-4, 5-3 SEC) also snapped a 14-game skid against Tennessee at home with their first win in Nashville since 1982 and the most points they've scored against the Vols since a 51-7 win in 1923.

"This is what we all envisioned when we came here, that we could build something special here at Vanderbilt right here in Nashville. We are Nashville's team," Franklin said.

### PLAY OF THE GAME

Jordan Matthews' first career rushing touchdown opened the scoring in the second half and was the beginning of a 21-point third quarter for the Commodores. Matthews took the ball 47 yards on a reverse for the score.

the end zone for a touchdown and also returning a punt 83 yards for a score.

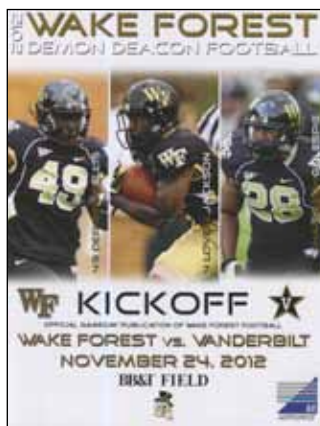

Instead of electing to tie the game at 14, Gold went for two and was successful, taking a 15-14 lead with 4:40 to play after Johnny McCrary found Tip McKenzie for a 49-yard touchdown and again for the two-point conversion.

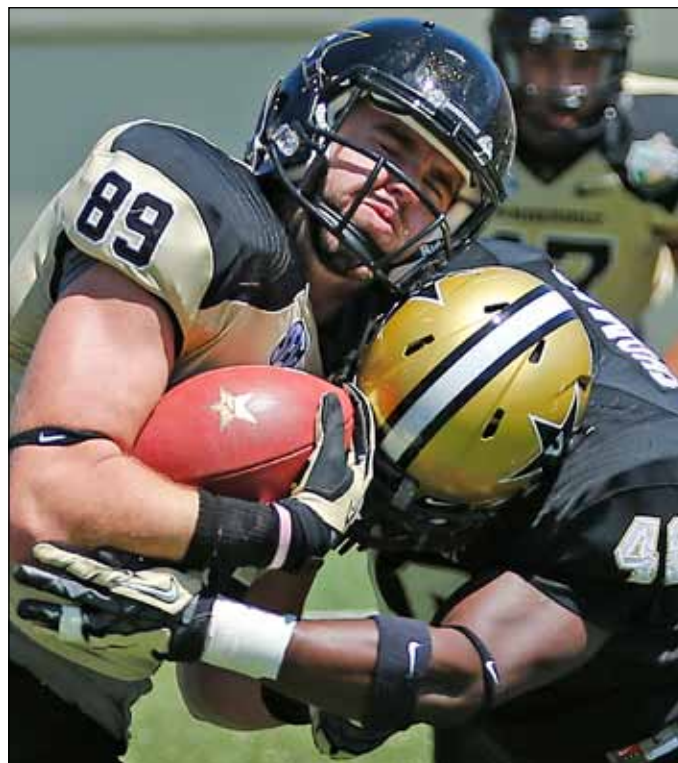

Austyn Carta-Samuels, who started for Black and went 14-of-20 for 196 yards and one TD, directed the closing drive, converting a 4th-and-25 with a 44-yard pass to Chris Boyd. Five plays later, Spear made the winning kick.

Quarterback Patton Robinette started for Gold and connected on 11-of-15 passes for 101 yards and one touchdown. Johnny McCrary went 6-of-13 for 108 yards and a touchdown. Josh Grady was 3-of-6 for 33 yards for the Black team.

Wesley Tate led the charge on the ground with 59 yards on nine carries for Black. Gold's Tip McKenzie led all receivers with 83 yards and one touchdown on four catches. Chris Boyd had three catches for 68 yards and Jordan Matthews had six catches for 60 yards for Black.

On defense, the Black team was led by Vince Taylor, who dominated the line in the first half and finished with four tackles, including 2.5 for a loss and one sack. Gold's defense was paced by Kellen Williams' eight tackles. Darien Bryant had 2.5 sacks and five total tackles.

After ending the season 6-0 and unscored upon, Vanderbilt agrees to host Virginia for the Southern Championship. The teams play to a classic 0-0 tie in front of 2,500 fans.

**Scholars in Uniform**  
Two top players on the 1903 squad, John J. Tigert and Bob Blake, became Rhodes scholars after their playing days.

**The "Commodores"**  
In 1897, former QB William Beard first applied the "Commodore" nickname as a staffer at the Nashville Banner.



**The "Point-A-Minute" Commodores**  
McGugin's first squad in 1904, left, went 9-0, outscoring its opponents by a remarkable 452-4 margin.

**Nov. 24, 1906**  
The famed Carlisle Indians fall 4-0 to the Commodores.

**Nov. 7, 1908**  
Vanderbilt wins its 20th straight versus Southern Conference foes, 16-9 over Tennessee.

**Sept. 17, 1904**  
One-time Michigan star and law school grad Dan McGugin arrives as Vanderbilt's coach. By the time he retires, McGugin will become a legend of the sport.

**Nov. 7, 1891**  
Vanderbilt and Sewanee, charter members of the Southern Intercollegiate Conference, play their first game. The rivalry, typically reserved for Thanksgiving Day, continues into WWII. Vanderbilt owned a 40-8-4 advantage.

## Playing the Texas State Fair

Before Oklahoma and Texas started the Red River Shootout, it was Vanderbilt vs. Texas at the Texas State Fair in Dallas. Vanderbilt won five of seven games with the Longhorns between 1921 and 1928.

## Aug. 10, 1918

One of the greatest and most beloved 'Dores of all-time, Irby "Rabbit" Curry, gave his life defending America in the skies over France.

Curry was a standout quarterback from 1914-16, a scholar and student leader. As a senior, classmates elected him "Bachelor of Ugliness" — the highest award given to a male Vanderbilt undergrad.

## Oct. 14, 1922

McGugin invites powerful Michigan as the Commodores' initial opponent in Dudley Field. The teams play to a 0-0 tie before a huge crowd. The tie was preserved when captain Jess Neely recovered a fumble near in Commodore goal.

### Looking Within to Replace a Legend

McGugin picked one of his best Commodore players, Ray Morrison, as a replacement. Morrison came after a stellar tenure as SMU's coach.

Oct. 23, 1937

Early in the game against No. 6 LSU, tackle Greer Ricketson took the ball cleverly hidden on the ground by the Vanderbilt quarterback and rammed 50 yards for a score. The 'Dores would win 7-6.



Nov. 22, 1941

In his second year, Sanders returned the 'Dores to prominence. Their 7-0 win over Alabama on this date gave the team an 8-1 mark.

### Sanders' 1941 Staff

A 12-0 shutout of Chattanooga sparks Vanderbilt run that leads to the team's first bowl appearance. Gator Bowl officials paired the Commodores against No. 8 Auburn after Vanderbilt's 7-3 regular season.



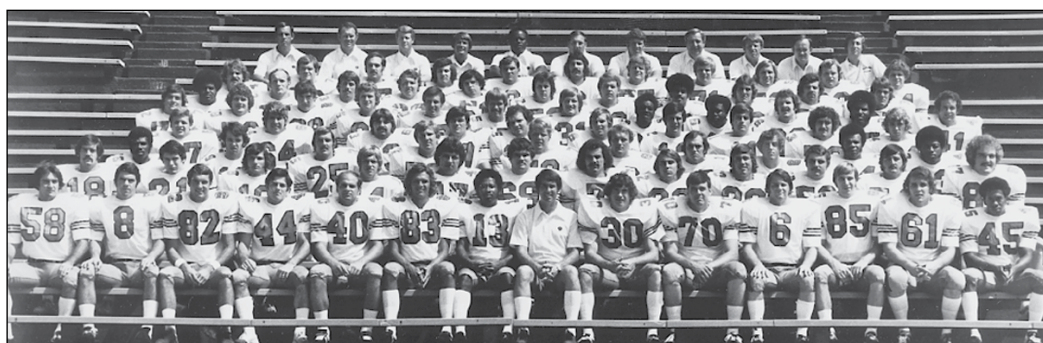
Dec. 31, 1955

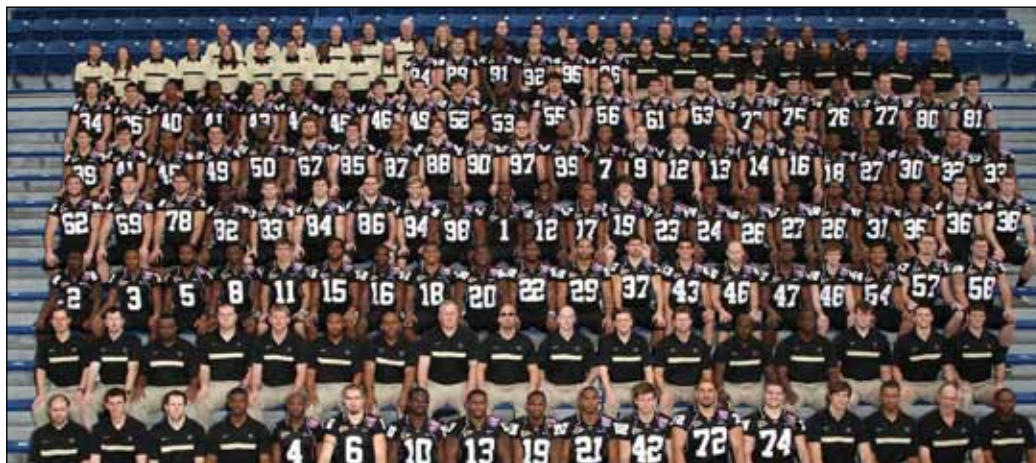

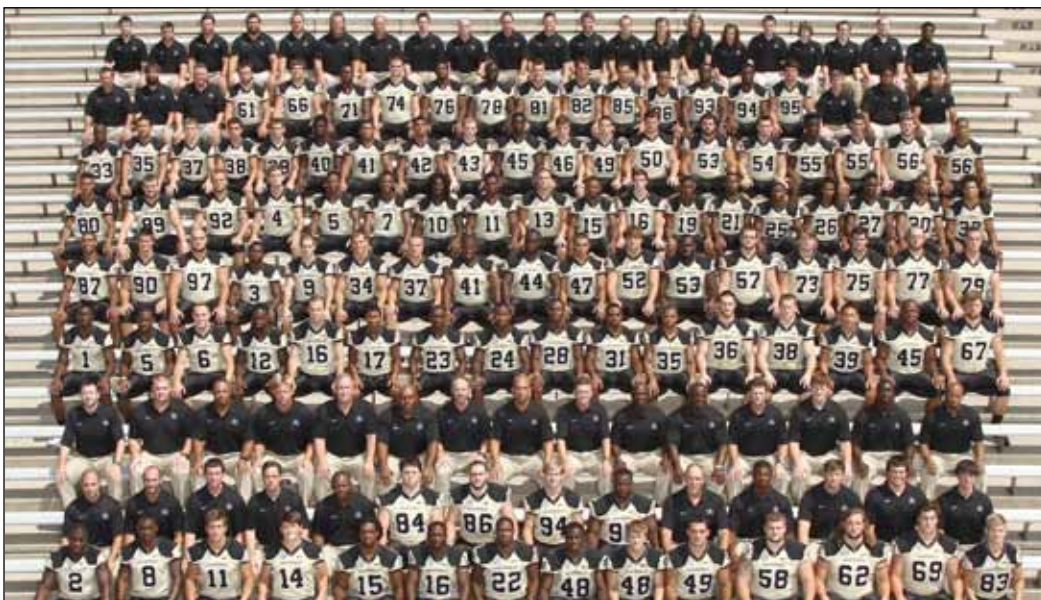

## JORDAN MATTHEWS

WIDE RECEIVER, 2012



Junior Jordan Matthews put together arguably the greatest receiving season ever by a Commodore.

Matthews set a new Vanderbilt single-season record with 1,323 receiving yards on 94 catches. The reception total ranks second in both Vanderbilt and

SEC record books. He also added eight TD catches.

Recognized as a third team All-America by CBSSports and Phil Steele, Matthews helped the Commodores to a 9-4 mark, its highest win total since World War I.

Matthews enjoyed his finest games against the top competition. He topped the SEC with a 109.6-yard average against conference opponents. He topped the 100-yard receiving mark against seven foes, including five from the SEC. His top performance was a 9-catch, 153-yard effort in the Commodores' road win at Ole Miss.

## CASEY HAYWARD

DEFENSIVE BACK, 2011



Defensive back Casey Hayward capped a remarkable career in 2011 by earning second team All-America honors from the Walter Camp Football Federation.

He was also recognized on All-America teams by Rivals.com, Yahoo! Sports, and Phil Steele's.

Hayward, a product of Perry, Ga., finished his career with 15 interceptions, and shares the team career mark with former All-America Leonard Coleman.

As a senior, Hayward contributed seven picks and matched his team record with 17 passes defended, helping the Commodores to an appearance in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

A three-year starter, Hayward also holds the Vanderbilt career mark with 46 passes defended.

He was selected by Green Bay in the second round of the 2012 NFL Draft.

## D.J. MOORE

DEFENSIVE BACK, 2008



In 2008, Moore became the first Vandy cornerback to earn All-America honors in 25 years.

He was named second team by Associated Press, *Sporting News*, *SI.com* and *Rivals.com* after a sensational junior season.

Moore posted six interceptions

and 58 tackles, contributing to the 'Dores' 7-6 campaign that ended with a win over Boston College at the Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl.

He ended his career tied for second among Commodores with 13 career interceptions.

Moore also was the SEC's most versatile player in 2008, also seeing action as a running back, wide receiver and return specialist. In a late-season win at Kentucky, he achieved a truly rare feat with a 2-interception, 2-TD catch effort.

Moore was selected in the 4th round by Chicago.

## EARL BENNETT

WIDE RECEIVER, 2006



Bennett concluded his career as the SEC's all-time leading receiver.

As a sophomore in 2006, the Birmingham product was named third-team All-America by *Rivals.com* in 2006 after catching 82 passes.

After three years, Bennett left Vandy

with 236 career catches, 28 more than any other SEC receiver.

In 2007, Bennett caught 75 passes, becoming the only receiver in SEC history to post three straight seasons with at least 75 catches.

Bennett was a three-time All-SEC recipient.

Many fans remember Bennett and Jay Cutler connecting on many memorable plays in the 2005 season, including the game-winning touchdown to defeat Tennessee in Knoxville.

Bennett was selected by Chicago in the third round of the 2008 draft.

## JAMIE WINBORN

LINEBACKER, 1999



Winborn was named All-America by *Football News* following the 1999 season after leading the 'Dores and the SEC with 141 tackles. It was the second straight year that Winborn led the league in tackles.

A two-time All-SEC Coaches selection, Winborn was the complete

linebacker package in 1999. He was a run stopper who delivered punishing blows, making plays sideline to sideline.

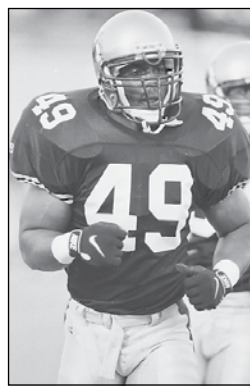
He led the squad with a team-record 23 tackles for loss. Winborn's season included a 20-tackle, two-sack performance versus South Carolina.

Winborn finished his Commodore career with 377 total tackles, 45 tackles for loss, 16.5 QB sacks and six forced fumbles. Winborn topped the squad in solo tackles for three consecutive years.

Winborn was selected by the 49ers in the 2001 NFL Draft. He has played with the 49ers, Bucs, Broncos and Titans.

## JAMIE DUNCAN

LINEBACKER, 1997



Duncan was a dominating linebackers and a player who always rose to the occasion.

In 1997, Duncan was named First Team All-America by the Football Writers Association. He was also named Second Team All-America by the

Associated Press and *Football News*.

In 1997, he became the only Commodore player to earn SEC Defensive Player of the Year honors from the Associated Press. He also received similar recognition from the *Mobile Press Register*.

As a junior, Duncan amassed 152 tackles, six sacks, 14 tackles for loss and five forced fumbles. He finished his career with 425 tackles. His effort against No. 1 Florida remains one of the best ever by a Commodore.

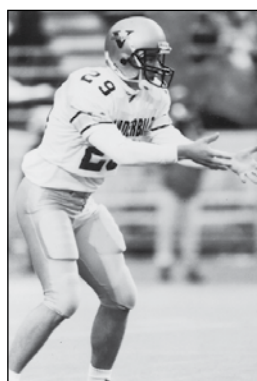
Duncan's career included stops with Bucs, Rams and Falcons.



# VANDERBILT ALL-AMERICANS

## BILL MARINANGEL

PUNTER, 1996



Marinangel was named First Team All-America by the *Sporting News* in 1996 after topping the NCAA in punting.

Marinangel is perhaps best remembered for one heroic play in his senior year. In the second game against Alabama,

Marinangel surprised the Tide special teams and 72,000 onlookers, as he took the snap from center, and then scampered 81 yards for an unbelievable and unlikely touchdown.

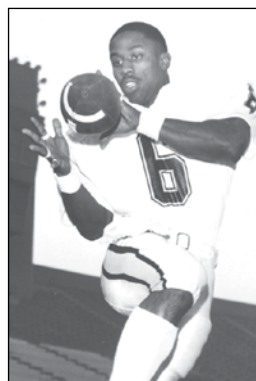
The run was the longest in the SEC that season and still stands as the longest in school history.

Marinangel's 46.6-yard average is the second highest single-season in team history.

His 79-yard punt versus South Carolina is also tied for the Commodores' second longest ever.

## BOO MITCHELL

RECEIVER, 1988



In 1988, Mitchell was a Third Team All-America after compiling one of the finest seasons ever by a Commodore receiver.

Teaming with quarterback Eric Jones, Mitchell hauled in 78 catches for 1,213 yards and five touchdowns. The

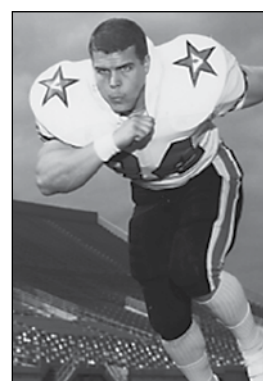
receiving yardage total remains a Vanderbilt team record and the SEC's seventh highest total ever. He surpassed 100 yards receiving in six games that season.

Mitchell burst onto the SEC scene as a freshman, hauling in a team-record 45 receptions. He added 31 and 34 receptions as a sophomore and junior, respectively.

Mitchell ranks among team leaders in virtually every career receiving category. He tops the list, — and ranks third all-time in the SEC, with 2,964 receiving yards.

## CHRIS GAINES

LINEBACKER, 1987



A Nashville native, Gaines was selected First Team Kodak All-America by the nation's football coaches. In 1987, he established an SEC single-season record for total tackles with 214.

*Nashville Tennessean* columnist Larry

Woody once described Gaines as "sort of a Rambo on a leash. An avid weightlifter, Gaines was one of the strongest Commodores of his era.

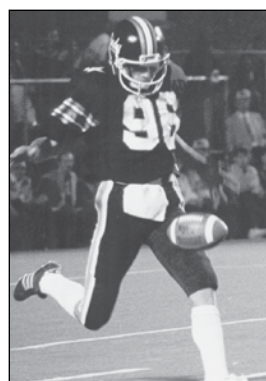
Gaines also posted one of the greatest efforts ever by a 'Dore as a senior by recording a school-record 37 tackles versus Tulane.

After the season, he was named MVP of the Blue-Gray Game after racking up 18 tackles and was named Tennessee Amateur Athlete of the Year by the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame.

Gaines played two years in the NFL, then returned to Vanderbilt as an assistant football coach from 1995-97.

## RICKY ANDERSON

PUNTER, 1984



Anderson arrived on campus as a walk-on. Four years later, he departed as the nation's top punter-kicker in the nation and a consensus All-American.

Anderson's senior season was remarkable. As a punter,

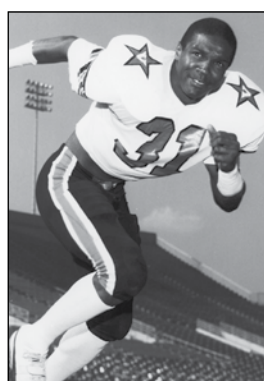
he topped the nation with a 48.2-yard average. It remains as the highest yearly punting average ever in the SEC by more than a yard. Anderson's 1984 campaign also is tied for seventh all-time in NCAA history. Following the 1984 season, he was named a consensus First Team All-American.

Anderson holds several team kicking marks. Besides the single-season average record, his 82-yard punt against Georgia in 1984 remains the longest in team history.

Anderson's career average of 45.6 yards also ranks first, as does his single-season scoring total of 73 points in 1982. He also ranks third on the team's all-time scoring list with 192 points.

## LEONARD COLEMAN

DEFENSIVE BACK, 1983



Coleman was named First Team All-America in 1983 by the Gannett News Service and was a Third Team All-America selection by the Associated Press.

A consensus All-SEC selection, Coleman left Vanderbilt rated as the nation's

No. 1 cornerback by NFL scouts.

Coleman was a four-year starter. As a freshman, he contributed four interceptions, including a team-record tying three picks in a victory over Chattanooga.

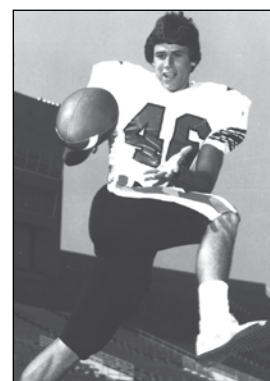
Coleman's efforts as a junior was a key for Vanderbilt's Hall of Fame Bowl season in 1982, including a pair of interceptions in the season-opening win over Memphis. He finished the year by setting a team mark with eight INTs.

He remains tied for team record with 15 career interceptions.

Coleman played professionally in the USFL and several seasons in the NFL with the Colts.

## CHUCK SCOTT

TIGHT END, 1983



Early in his career, Scott struggled to make an impact at flanker. He just needed to switch positions. In 1983, Scott blossomed after moving to tight end. Scott hauled in 70 recep-

tions and nine touchdowns to tie the existing NCAA record for catches by a tight end. He was named First Team All-America by *The Sporting News*.

Scott followed up that season by posting 54 receptions and eight TD catches in 1984.

Scott also contributed 21 receptions in the Commodores' 1982 Hall of Fame Bowl season.

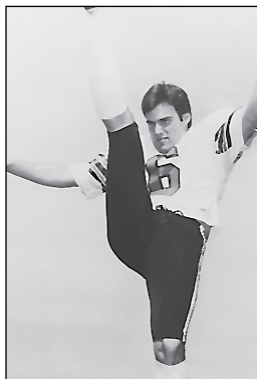
A two-time Academic All-SEC selection, Scott ranks among the team leaders in several career receiving records. His 20 career touchdown receptions remains the second most in school history. Scott also ranks sixth all-time with 145 catches and fifth with 2,219 receiving yards.





## JIM ARNOLD

PUNTER, 1982



Arnold became the first Vanderbilt kicking specialist to receive All-America honors, paving the way for several kicking standouts to follow in his footsteps.

A native of Dalton, Ga., Arnold quickly impacted the squad, breaking the

freshman mark with a 41.9-yard avg. By the time he graduated, coach George McIntyre said, "Jim's the best kicker in the country, pro or college."

As a senior in 1982, he was named to six All-America teams after averaging a then-record 45.8-yard average.

He ended his career with a 43.9-yard average, and still holds the SEC mark with 277 punts. Arnold's senior average remains third all-time by a 'Dore and fifth all-time by a SEC punter.

Arnold owns two of the longest punts in team history, including a 79-yarder at Ole Miss.

After Vanderbilt, Arnold took his game to the NFL, enjoying an 11-year pro career.

## ALLAMA MATTHEWS

TIGHT END, 1982



Early in his Vanderbilt career, coaches tried the Matthews at safety and receiver. Once all parties settled on tight end, Matthews put together one of the finest receiving campaigns ever, helping spark the team's run to the

Hall of Fame Bowl.

In 1982, Matthews was named First Team All-America by *Football News* after posting 61 receptions for 797 yards and 14 TDs, most ever by a Commodore. Later that season, Matthews was also named SEC Offensive Lineman of the Year by the Atlanta Touchdown Club.

Matthews also earned First Team All-SEC honors by the Associated Press and United Press International in 1982.

He concluded his career with 18 touchdowns.

Matthews was drafted and played three seasons with the Atlanta Falcons.

## PRESTON BROWN

BACK, 1979



Brown was named Third Team All-America as a senior after posting career receiving marks in 1979. He topped all SEC receivers with 52 catches, good for 786 yards and three TDs.

Brown's season was topped by three 100-yard receiving games, including a

175-yard output versus Ole Miss.

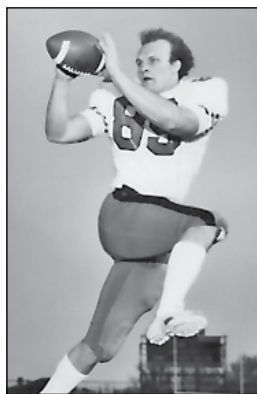
Brown also was a dynamic returner for the Commodores. He remains sixth on team's all-time leaders for kickoff returns and fifth in punt returns. Brown also returned three kickoffs for scores. His 100-yard kickoff return against Ole Miss in 1977 remains the longest in team history.

After finishing his senior season, Brown played in the Blue-Gray Classic and Senior Bowl.

He played three seasons for the New England Patriots and one year each for the New York Jets and Cleveland Browns.

## BARRY BURTON

TIGHT END, 1974



As a junior in 1974, the Nashville native helped the 'Dores to a 7-4 regular season record and berth in the 1974 Peach Bowl.

He was named First Team All-America by *Football News*. He was also a First Team All-SEC pick.

Burton was a genuine triple-threat. In addition to receiving, he also ran the end-around, and handled punting duties. In 1974, Burton caught 22 passes for 378 yards and three touchdowns; ran 31 times for 307 yards and a score; and punted 54 times for a 40.2-yard average.

As a senior, Burton came back to catch a career-high 31 passes and two touchdowns.

As a punter, Burton has two of the longest efforts in team: a 79-yarder versus Georgia in 1973 and a 78-yarder versus Kentucky in 1975.

## BOB ASHER

OFFENSIVE TACKLE, 1969



Virginia native Asher started every game of his three-year varsity Vanderbilt career, concluding with the Associated Press and NEA naming him to the First Team All-American squad at tackle.

Asher was known as an impenetrable

pass blocker, regarded by observers as one of the top blocking tackles in school history. He also earned First Team All-SEC and All-South honors as a junior.

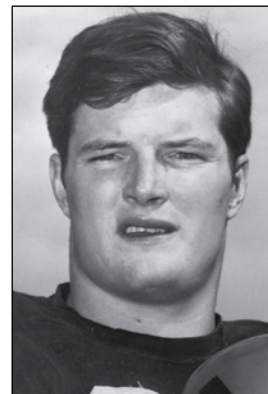
Asher later played in the College All-Star Game, the Senior Bowl, the North-South Shrine Game and the Canadian American Bowl.

In 1970, he was drafted by Dallas. One of his Cowboys' teammates was a former Vanderbilt teammate, defensive lineman Pat Toomay.

Together, they played key roles in the Cowboy's 1971 squad that eventually won the Super Bowl.

## CHIP HEALY

LINEBACKER, 1968



A product of Chattanooga, Healy's All-America recognition as a defensive standout set the stage for numerous linebackers to follow in later years.

In 1968, Healy was named First Team All-American

linebacker by the Central Press and Second Team All-American by *The Sporting News*.

Healy was also selected as a First Team All-SEC player as a sophomore.

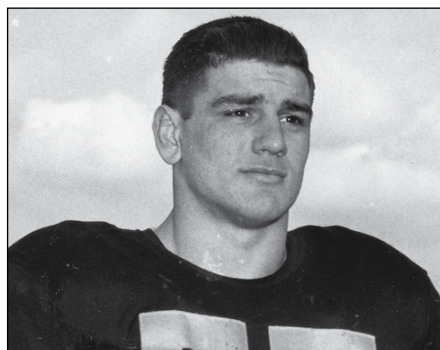
Healy played superb defense as a junior after hurting his knee the previous spring. As a senior, Healy topped the team in tackles. He also posted six interceptions in his career.

Healy played in the East-West Shrine Game and Senior Bowl.

Selected by the St. Louis Cardinals in the 1968 draft, Healy played two seasons in the NFL.

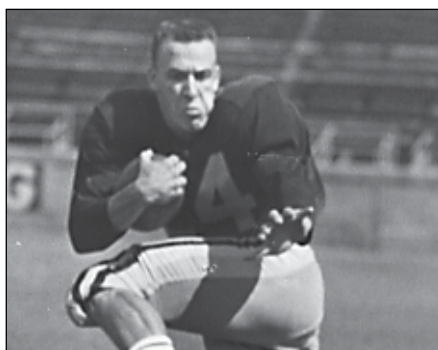
## GEORGE DIEDERICH GUARD, 1958

Known to his teammates as "LuLu", Deiderich was a two-way line standout for the Commodores, culminating a Vanderbilt career by earning First Team All-America honors by Associated Press, the nation's coaches, *Look Magazine*, and the FWAA.

He was also named First Team All-SEC in 1957 and 1958. Deiderich played both offensive and defensive guard.

Deiderich was also an outstanding track athlete, setting a school record in the high hurdles.

After his senior season, Deiderich represented the Commodores at the Senior Bowl. Drafted by the Rams, Deiderich decided to take his football talents north of the border with Montreal.



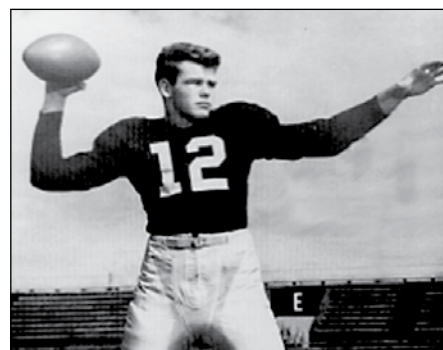
## CHARLEY HORTON RUNNING BACK, 1955

Horton was named Third Team All-America by INS after a superb 1955 season in which he established a then-school mark of 12 TDs.

Horton's outstanding play propelled the 'Dores to an 8-3 season and their first ever bowl game – a 25-13 win over Auburn in the Gator Bowl.

Horton had a knack for getting the 'Dores on the scoreboard, as he scored the first touchdown in seven of the 10 regular season contests in the 1955 season. Horton was an outstanding returner, and still ranks second all-time with a 14.4-yard punt return average.

Though selected 11th overall by the Rams in the 1956 draft, Horton joined the military. After completing his service, Horton played in 1959 season with the CFL's Toronto Argonauts.



## BILL WADE QUARTERBACK, 1951

A Nashville legend, Wade was the 1951 SEC Player of the Year and a Second Team All-America by the Associated Press, after completing 111 passes for 1,609 yards and 13 touchdowns.

A *Look Magazine* coverboy, Wade set virtually every Commodore passing record.

As a junior in 1950, Wade threw for 16 TDs, a total not eclipsed by a Vanderbilt quarterback until Whit Taylor threw for 22 TDs in 1982.

He remains one of the team's most celebrated players. He remains the lone Vanderbilt player selected No. 1 overall in the NFL Draft – by the Los Angeles in 1952. He had a 14-year career with the Rams and Chicago, and led the Bears to the 1963 NFL Championship, rushing for two TDs in the title win over New York.



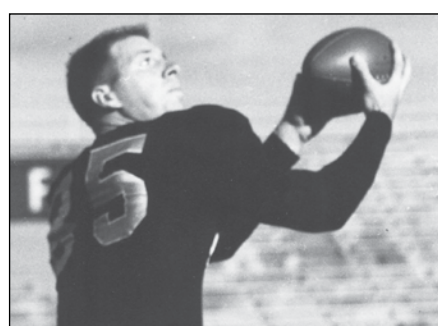
## BOB WERCKLE TACKLE, 1951

A New Jersey native, Werckle overcame injuries to become one of the team's finest linemen. In 1951, he was named as a Second Team All-America by INS and the AP.

By 1949, he was given little chance to succeed after twice breaking a leg in practice. By 1950, the injury jinx was beaten, with Werckle playing more minutes than any teammate. Across the South, Werckle was known for his blocking and tackling abilities.

In 1951, Werckle earned First Team All-SEC recognition after serving as a captain.

Werckle was selected in the NFL Draft by Detroit. Later, he earned with distinction as a Marine Corps officer in Korea.



## BUCKY CURTIS RECEIVER, 1950

One of the team's first downfield receiving threats, Curtis was selected First Team All-American by the Football Writers, INS and *Look Magazine* in 1950.

He ranked among the nation's best receiving yardage in 1950. As a senior, Curtis led the team to a 7-4 record, and set a SEC mark with 791 receiving yards. He still ranks fifth all-time on the team with 17 touchdown catches.

After his senior season, Curtis was named MVP of the Senior Bowl, and played in the College All-Star Game. He was selected in the second round of the NFL Draft by Cleveland.

He went on to serve in the Navy. In 1975, he received the NCAA Silver Anniversary Award.



## BOB GUDE CENTER, 1941

Gude played three years of tremendous football before entering the military service during World War II.

Gude was named to the Fox-Movietone All-America team in 1941.

As a center, Gude was frequently compared to former Commodore greats Carl Hinkle and Pete Gracey.

After his senior season, Gude was selected by the Chicago in the 1942 NFL Draft.

Gude played two seasons of pro football, starting with the Bears in 1942, then returning with Philadelphia in 1946.







**CARL HINKLE**  
CENTER, 1937

Hinkle continued the Commodore tradition of quality centers. The 1937 captain was named First Team All-America by the Associated Press, Grantland Rice, and Liberty.

He was an ironman, playing every minute in seven games in 1937. Named the SEC's Most Valuable Player, Hinkle guided the squad within inches of the Rose Bowl.

Though selected by the Philadelphia in the 11th round of the 1938 NFL Draft, Hinkle decided on another career path. After graduating, he entered West Point and earned the highest cadet honor. He then served with distinction in WWII.

Hinkle was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1959.



**PETE GRACEY**  
CENTER, 1932

A native of nearby Franklin, Clarence "Pete" Gracey was an anchor on both the offense and and defense fronts.

In 1932, he became the last of 13 All-America players mentored by Coach Dan McGugin.

While the last of McGugin's prize pupils, Gracey also ushered a decade of superb Vandy centers, including Carl Hinkle and Bob Gude.

In Gracey's final season, he opened holes for such backs as Dixie Roberts and Larry Burton as a center. A possible unde-feated season ended in the finale when the 'Dores fell to Alabama.

A versatile athlete, he also lettered in baseball and basketball.



**JOHN BROWN**  
GUARD, 1929

A senior captain, John Neil Brown was named First Team All-America by the nation's coaches. He also was a three-time All-Conference recipient.

Known as "Bull," Brown helped anchor both sides of the line of scrimmage.

Brown was a key contributor on the line for the 1926 Commodores. He missed 1927, only to return as a standout in 1928-29. One of his best defensive games came against University of Minnesota legendary running back Bronko Nagurski.

Brown also was a standout rightfielder on the Vanderbilt baseball team.



**DICK ABERNATHY**  
END, 1928

Abernathy earned All-America honors as an end in 1928, helping the 'Dores to an 8-2 record.

Abernathy had a key 38-yard touchdown catch that enabled the Commodores to defeat visiting Colgate, 12-7.

A week later in Dallas, Abernathy blocked a punt that was recovered in the end zone which would stand up to be the winning score in the Commodores' 13-12 win over Texas.



**BILL SPEARS**  
QUARTERBACK, 1927

One of Vandy's top offensive players ever, Spears was a acclaimed quarterback for some of McGugin's best Vanderbilt teams. In 1927, he was selected First Team All-America by NEA and Associated Press.

In 1927, he guided the squad to an 8-1-2 record, including a win over Tulane when noted writer Blinkey Horn described Spears as "All-World" after a two-touchdown effort.

Spears concluded his career by outgaining the entire Alabama squad in a 14-7 Vanderbilt win.

Spears went on to chair his own law firm. He was a significant contributor to Vanderbilt, serving on the Board of Trust from 1954 until his death in 1992.



**HENRY WAKEFIELD**  
END, 1924

Known as "Hek," Wakefield was a two-way standout for McGugin's Commodores.

In 1924 was named First Team All-America by INS, Lawrence Perry, Outing and Billy Evans publications.

In 1922, Wakefield helped the 'Dores to a 8-0-1 campaign. He was a starter in the inaugural 0-0 game in Dudley Field against Michigan.

Wakefield starred on teams that went 26-5-4.

As injuries mounted in 1924, Wakefield was named captain. He quickly proved worthy of the honor, scoring twice in a win over Auburn, then defeating Georgia Tech with a 37-yard drop-kick field goal.



# VANDERBILT ALL-AMERICANS



## LYNN BOMAR

END, 1923

A superb blocker and outstanding runner, Bomar was the first great end of the Dan McGugin Era.

Bomar was named All-America by Walter Camp.

Known to fans as the "Blonde Bear," Bomar helped Vanderbilt to "the Championship of the South."

His athletic career ended in 1924 when he suffered a brain hemorrhage following a blow to the chin. Though temporarily in danger, he fully recovered and enjoyed a distinguished law enforcement career.

He was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame in 1956.



## JOSH CODY

TACKLE, 1915-16, 1919

Cody is arguably the most decorated player in Vanderbilt team history.

Known as a punishing blocker, Cody is the only Commodore ever to earn All-America honors in three different seasons. The Football Writers Association honored Cody after the 1915, 1916 and 1919 seasons by the Football Writers Association.

Cody was the main ingredient of a powerful offensive line that propelled Vanderbilt to 23 wins in 25 games. He sparked the McGugin's famous "Point-A-Minute" offense of 1915.

Cody became a successful head coach, serving in that role at Clemson and Temple. Cody was inducted into the Football Hall of Fame in 1970.



## "RABBIT" CURRY

BACK, 1916

A legend in team history, Curry was superb on and off the field. Small in stature, Curry's display of talent, heart and leadership was cherished by fans.

Selected as a Third Team All-America in 1916, Curry was a field general at QB who displayed a knack for brilliant runs. The Texan guided the team to a 7-1-1 record in 1916 and directed the famous "Point-A-Minute" squad of 1915. He was also elected junior class president and as the school's prestigious Bachelor of Ugliness by the student body.

Curry's life was cut short. Just two years after graduating, Curry died when his plane was shot down over France in WWI.



## LEWIS HARDAGE

BACK, 1912

After transferring from Auburn to enter Dental School, Hardage was part of what observers called the 'Dores' fastest backfield.

Hardage starred on tremendous squads. As captain in 1911-12, he helped Vanderbilt go 16-2-1 overall, and their opponents 578-27.

Hardage earned Third Team All-America and All-Southern Conference recognition as a senior.

Hardage dominated several games in 1912, scoring 95 points for the squad that topped the nation in points.

He also was a chief factor in a pair of early season blowouts, 105-0 over Bethel and 100-0 against Maryville.



## RAY MORRISON

QUARTERBACK, 1911

When Morrison ended his career in 1911, McGugin called him "the best I ever saw."

More than two decades later, a panel of writers tabbed Morrison as VU's top QB through its first 50 years.

An All-America in 1911, Morrison was a talented player and leader. In his two years, the team went 16-1-1.

He later became a great coach, serving 34 seasons at the collegiate level. While McGugin served in the military during 1918, he was the team's interim coach. When McGugin retired in 1934, Morrison was his handpicked successor.

He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1954.



## W.E. METZGER

GUARD, 1910

Metzger was Dan McGugin's first great lineman, earning Third Team All-America recognition in 1910.

In 1909, Metzger was a sensation in the backfield, rushing for fourscores to singlehandedly beat Mercer 28-0, before suffering a leg fracture.

In 1910, he moved to the line, anchoring a unit that helped produce a 8-0-1 record. On defense, he assisted a unit that allowed only eight points.

Metzger shared the spotlight with QB Ray Morrison in 1911. He played brilliantly, helping the Commodores to a 8-1 record.



## OWSLEY MANIER

BACK, 1906

Joining the team in Dan McGugin's first year on campus, Manier was a three-year starter and a big reason why Vanderbilt became an instant Southern power under McGugin.

As the team's fullback, Manier was named All-America in 1906, becoming the first Commodore so honored.

He was an offensive machine for McGugin's squad, scoring three times against Kentucky and on five occasions in 78-0 victory over Alabama.

Manier was a key factor in the Commodores' 24-1 overall record.

Eventually, Manier returned to academia, and became professor emeritus of clinical medicine at the Vanderbilt School of Medicine.





## 1955 GATOR BOWL

12/31/1955 • Gator Bowl, Jacksonville, Fla.

**VANDERBILT 25**  
**AUBURN 13**

JACKSONVILLE – Still hurting from a dislocated elbow suffered in the Tennessee game, quarterback Don Orr scored two touchdowns and set up another as the Commodores defeated No. 8-ranked Auburn in the 11th Gator Bowl 25-13.

The Vanderbilt defense provided a huge lift for the Commodores, recovering five fumbles in the victory.

Vanderbilt's first score was set up when Orr recovered an Auburn fumble. Eight plays later, Joe Stephenson ran seven yards for the VU touchdown.

Auburn answered on a 38-yard TD pass from Howell Tubbs to Rob James in the second quarter, but the rest of the game belonged to the Black and Gold. On Vanderbilt's following possession, Orr carried the ball 44 yards to the Tigers' 28. He then passed to Joe Scales, who advanced to the Auburn 4-yard line. On the next play, Orr carried the ball over the line after a fake to fullback Phil King to give Vanderbilt a 13-7 lead at the half.

At the opening of the third quarter, Vanderbilt guard Sonny Tatum recovered an Auburn fumble, and the Commodores marched quickly into scoring position as Orr crossed the goal line for his second touchdown of the day to make the score 19-7. Both teams scored once more in the fourth quarter. Vanderbilt's score came on a one-yard run off right tackle by Charley Horton.

Vanderbilt coach Art Guepe cleared his bench in the final minutes, using 38 of the 39 men dressed for the game. Capitalizing on Auburn's five fumbles and using an ailing quarterback, the Commodores captured its first bowl appearance.

## 1974 PEACH BOWL

12/28/1974 • Fulton Co. Stadium, Atlanta, Ga.

**TEXAS TECH 6**  
**VANDERBILT 6**

ATLANTA – The 1974 Peach Bowl was a game with no champion but two winners, the Commodores and Texas Tech Red Raiders.

Despite the effective rushing of Red Raider tailback Larry Isaac and fullback Cliff Hoskins, the Commodore defense held Texas Tech without points in the first half and entered halftime with a 3-0 lead after Mark Adams kicked a 31-yard field goal with 10 minutes remaining.

Neither team was able to muster much offense in the third quarter, though Texas Tech did tie the score at 3-3 after a drive stalled at the Vanderbilt 16-yard line.

Early in the fourth quarter, the Commodores' freshman lineman Dennis Harrison stopped a deep Texas Tech threat by blocking a Red Raider field goal attempt. The Tech drive started following one of two Vanderbilt turnovers during the game.

After the blocked field goal, the Commodores responded with a possession that ended with Adams' second field goal of the day, a 26-yarder that resulted in a 6-3 Vanderbilt margin. However, Texas Tech tied the game at the 2:00 mark on a 35-yard field goal by Brian Hall. On its final drive, Vanderbilt could not move into scoring range.

The Commodore offense struggled much of the day, with quarterback David Lee hitting just five of 14 attempts. Running back Jamie O'Rourke had 76 rushing yards.

The limited offensive production from both teams resulted in numerous defensive and scoring records being set in the game.

Within hours of the conclusion, Vanderbilt Head Coach Steve Sloan announced he was leaving his position to accept the head coaching job at Texas Tech.

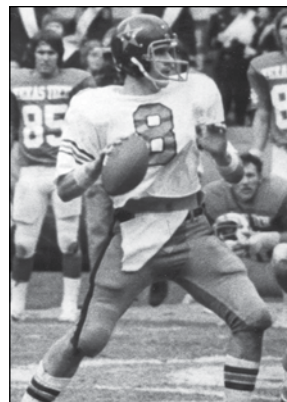

## 1982 HALL OF FAME BOWL

12/31/1982 • Legion Field, Birmingham, Ala.

**VANDERBILT 28**  
**AIR FORCE 36**

BIRMINGHAM — Without question, the Hall of Fame Bowl was one of college football's most exciting 1982 postseason games.

The game matched one of the nation's most potent aerial attacks featuring Vanderbilt All-SEC quarterback Whit Taylor and one of America's most devastating rushing attacks in the Falcons' vaunted option attack.

Offensively, this game lived up to the hype as 33 Hall of Fame records were broken and another eight were tied in Legion Field. Unfortunately for Vanderbilt, Air Force walked away the winner 36-28 after a remarkable comeback.

For three quarters, Whit Taylor was unstoppable. Connecting with a variety of wide receivers and running backs, Taylor's fourth touchdown pass of the game, a four-yarder to Norman Jordan, gave the Commodores a 28-17 margin entering the fourth quarter. Down by double digits, the Air Force Academy scored rushing touchdowns on three consecutive possessions to take the victory.

Taylor was named the Most Valuable Player, after completing a team-record 38 passes of 51 attempts for 452 yards, which remains as the second highest single-game passing yardage total in Vanderbilt history. Jordan's performance arguably was more remarkable. Though rushing for just four yards, Jordan hauled in 20 receptions for 173 yards and three TDs, breaking five Hall of Fame Bowl records.

## 2008 MUSIC CITY BOWL

**BOSTON COLLEGE 14**  
**VANDERBILT 16**

NASHVILLE — Vanderbilt won a bowl game for the first time in exactly 53 years, with Bryant Hahnfeldt kicking a 45-yard field goal with 3:26 left for a 16-14 win over #24 Boston College in the Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl held on New Year's Eve in Nashville's LP Field.

The Commodores hadn't played in a bowl since 1982 — the SEC's longest drought. The victory gave Vanderbilt (7-6) its first winning season since that season. This is just the fourth time in the past 50 years that Vanderbilt has won seven games in a season.

The Eagles got the ball twice after Hahnfeldt's third field goal. They had to punt the first time, then Vanderbilt DB Myron Lewis picked off a pass with 1:36 left.

Vanderbilt scored its lone touchdown when freshman safety Sean Richardson fell on a Commodore punt that bounced off the knee of BC's Paul Anderson with 10:35 left in the third quarter.

The Commodores played musical chairs at quarterback, giving redshirt freshman Larry Smith his first career start.

Hahnfeldt, a Nashville product playing his final game as a Commodore, matched a single-game career high with the three field goals. The Commodores also forced two interceptions while allowing none.

MEMPHIS – Isaiah Pead ran for 149 yards and a touchdown, and Ralph David Abernathy IV's 90-yard kickoff return put Cincinnati ahead to stay as the Bearcats edged Vanderbilt 31-24 in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

But the 10-3 co-Big East champion Bearcats (10-3) had to work to put away Vanderbilt (6-7), a team that tied for fourth in the SEC's East Division. The Commodores led 21-17 early in the fourth quarter until Abernathy became the first Cincinnati player to return a kickoff for a TD in the program's 13 bowl appearances.

The Commodores, making their fifth bowl appearance and first since 2008, finished the season with a 6-7 record.

Senior quarterback Larry Smith replaced Vanderbilt starter Jordan Rodgers in the third quarter, and he threw for a season-high 142 yards. Smith's biggest completion was a 68-yard scoring toss to Chris Boyd that gave the Commodores for a 21-17 lead early in the fourth quarter. Vanderbilt lost the lead on the ensuing kickoff.

Jordan Rodgers threw two touchdown passes and ran for another score as the Commodores capped their best season since 1915 by defeating North Carolina State 38-24 in Nashville's LP Field.

"We're not going anywhere," a smiling and teary Franklin said. The Commodores finished 9-4 for their best record since going 9-1 in 1915. It marks only the third time the smallest and only private university in the SEC has won as many as nine games in a season.

Vandy closed the season with seven straight wins for its longest streak since an eight-game run in 1948.

Senior Zac Stacy earned the bowl's MVP honors with 108 rushing yards and one touchdowns.

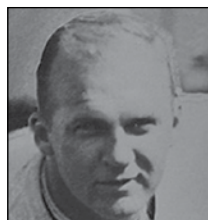

Consisting of 10 modern residential "houses" and a full-service Commons Center, the community serves as home to all first-year Vanderbilt undergraduates. Christened in 2007, The Ingram Commons is located in the southeast quadrant of Vanderbilt, on its Peabody campus.

The Ingram Commons also was showcased in October 2008 when ESPN selected the site as its location for the popular *College Football GameDay* broadcast prior to airing Vanderbilt's victory over Auburn on campus.

An experienced staff of student life professionals and undergraduate and graduate resident advisers assures the health, well-being, and safety of each member of The Ingram Commons community. Residents of each house are mentored by a member of the university faculty.

The showpiece Commons Center, a modern dining and activity hub surrounded by the residential houses, features a diverse selection of great food in the Eatery dining hall. The climate-controlled facility brings plenty of variety, ranging from the place to study with friends to hosting an occasional musical performance. The Commons Cafe also brings students, faculty and staff together for delicious food and social interaction.

Economist and Nobel Peace Prize recipient **Muhammad Yunus** is taking his community-based Grameen Bank concept across the globe from Bangladesh. # ★ CHANCELLOR NICK ZEPPOS



Chancellor Nicholas S. Zeppos was raised in Milwaukee, where he spent many an afternoon watching the great Hank Aaron of the Braves slug home runs in the old County Stadium.

Named Vanderbilt's eighth chancellor in 2008, Zeppos has taken a keen interest in athletics at Vanderbilt during his more than two decades at the university.

"I don't do the operations," Zeppos said. "I don't call the plays, I don't throw the passes. I see my job as simply trying to do whatever

I can to support all of the talented people who do these things."

This support has included the endorsement of an athletics capital improvement plan expected to surpass \$50 million, which orchestrates efforts to improve the student experience for athletes and assists with recruiting.

"One thing I consider the ultimate compliment is when a coach calls me and says, 'I've got a couple of recruits here. Could you meet them?'"

A distinguished legal scholar, teacher and executive, Zeppos served from 2002 to February 2008 as Vanderbilt's chief academic officer, overseeing the university's undergraduate, graduate and professional education programs and research in liberal arts and sciences, engineering, music, education, business, law and divinity. As provost and vice chancellor, he chaired Vanderbilt's budgeting and capital planning council, as well as oversaw the dean of students and dean of admissions.

Zeppos has led a number of important initiatives at Vanderbilt, including the planning process for The Ingram Commons, a landmark transformation of the first-year experience; the Strategic Academic Planning Group; innovative efforts in undergraduate admissions and financial aid; and the development of new programs in Jewish studies, law and economics and genetics, among others.

In a bold move to strengthen Vanderbilt's commitment to admitting undergraduates on the basis of accomplishment and achievement, rather than their ability to pay, Zeppos significantly expanded the financial aid program in 2009. By replacing undergraduate, need-based loans with grant and scholarship assistance, the university opened its doors wider to highly talented and qualified students of all economic, cultural and

geographical backgrounds. The expanded aid program is top university priority and is funded by a combination of strategic budget allocations and gifts from thousands of generous donors to Opportunity Vanderbilt, a campaign to increase undergraduate scholarship endowment.

Zeppos was recognized with five teaching awards at the law school before serving as an associate dean, associate provost, and provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. He also served as interim chancellor for eight months prior to being formally appointed as Vanderbilt's eighth chancellor on March 1, 2008.

Zeppos is the Vice President of the 2013-14 executive committee of the Southeastern Conference and has been named President-elect for the 2014-16 term.

In the Nashville community, Zeppos serves on the boards of the Nashville Area Chamber of Commerce and the Nashville Public Education Foundation. He also serves on the National Security Higher Education Advisory Board and the Freedom Forum Diversity Institute Board.

From 1982 to 1987, Zeppos practiced law in Washington, D.C., at the United States Department of Justice and at Wilmer, Cutler & Pickering, where he specialized in appellate litigation involving complex regulatory, statutory and constitutional matters.

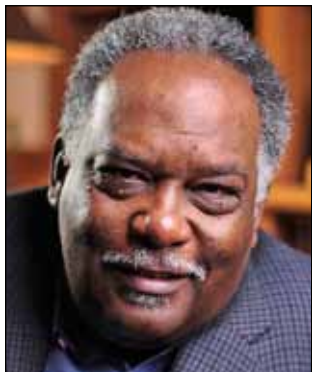
Zeppos is a 1979 magna cum laude graduate of the University of Wisconsin Law School, where he served as editor in chief of the Wisconsin Law Review and was selected as the outstanding graduate of his class. He studied history during his undergraduate years at the university, where he was a 1976 Phi Beta Kappa graduate.

He is married to Lydia A. Howarth, a graduate of the University of Chicago and Lawrence University, who is an editor. They have two sons, Benjamin and Nicholas.





# ATHLETICS DIRECTOR DAVID WILLIAMS II



An integral part of the Commodore athletics community for the last decade, David Williams II serves in a full-time role as Athletics Director at Vanderbilt University.

Williams ranks among the university's most prominent leaders, serving in numerous capacities since arriving in Nashville in 2000. Aside from his role in McGugin Center, Williams holds the titles of Vice Chancellor for University Affairs and Athletics and law professor at Vanderbilt.

He also is active with the SEC and NCAA in matters of negotiations, reforms, regulations and planning.

Williams has guided Vanderbilt Athletics since 2003 when the Board of Trustees and its administration accepted an initiative to more fully integrate Commodore athletics into the total Vanderbilt student life experience.

Today, Williams has firmly placed his stamp on the program, and has positioned Vanderbilt Athletics among the most innovative in the nation. The cumulative grade point for Vanderbilt student-athletes has continued to improve through Williams' tenure, reaching its highest level in more than two decades. Competitive successes, such as back-to-back bowl appearances in football, recent SEC titles in baseball and women's cross country, is becoming an expectation on campus. Individual accomplishment has been increasing, with 11 Vanderbilt athletes being selected in the first round of their respective professional drafts in the last nine years.

Williams also demonstrated his leadership within the Vanderbilt program by orchestrating successful searches for exceptional coaches to guide Commodore sports. In December 2010, he enticed University of Maryland Assistant Head Coach and Offensive Coordinator James Franklin to become the 27th head coach in Vanderbilt football history – and the first African-American head coach to guide a revenue sport on campus. Since the hiring, Franklin has been a smashing success and had their best single-season record since the university joined the SEC as a charter member in 1933.

Williams also directed the search for new men's golf coach Scott Limbaugh, who guided his first Vanderbilt squad to the NCAA Regional Championships.

Williams has kept top coaches and staffs on campus. In recent months, he orchestrated extensions for baseball coach Tim Corbin and men's tennis coach Ian Duvenhage. He also worked to retain Franklin's assistant coaches after the team's 9-4 success in 2012. As the 2013 season approaches, Vanderbilt is the only SEC squad with its entire football coaching staff intact.

Williams has addressed numerous facility upgrades, including an extensive refurbishing of Vanderbilt Stadium and football locker rooms, expansion of Hawkins Field, addition of new tennis courts and amenities at Brownlee O. Currey Tennis Center and renovations in Memorial Gym, the Hendrix Room and the McGugin Center. This October, several Vanderbilt teams will start using a new on-campus indoor multipurpose facility that will house an eight-lane track complex and regulation football field.

An initiative to allow more overseas travel and study for Vanderbilt teams and student-athletes also has become reality during Williams' tenure.

In association with Vanderbilt Athletics, Williams has served as a member of the SEC team that negotiated recent ESPN and CBS television partner contracts, and is beginning the final year of a four-year term on the NCAA Division I Academic Cabinet. He also serves as Chair of the NCAA Infraction Appeals Committee and is a member of the Enforcement Working Group.

Williams joined Vanderbilt from The Ohio State University in 2000 as Vice Chancellor, General Counsel and University Secretary. His role expanded to Vanderbilt Athletics in 2002.

Williams served numerous administrative roles at Ohio State over 14 years. When he accepted the Vanderbilt role, Williams was Vice President of Student and Urban/Community Affairs and Professor of Law at Ohio State.

A native of Detroit, Williams received a Bachelor of Science in Social Science and Master of Arts in Education from Northern Michigan University where he ran track. He also earned a Master of Business Administration and a Doctor of Jurisprudence from the University of Detroit, and an L.L.M. in taxation from New York University. Before entering law school, Williams spent 10 years as a teacher and coach in the Detroit public school system.

Williams has taught at the law schools of the University of Detroit, Capital University, Ohio State and Vanderbilt, and twice directed the Ohio State Law Program in Oxford, England. He was elected outstanding law professor at both the University of Detroit and The Ohio State University.

Williams is active in the Nashville area community, serving as a board member with several organizations.

Currently, Williams is serving a second term on Nashville Mayor Karl Dean's Procurement Standards Board. He is also a former two-term member of the Nashville branch of the Atlanta Federal Reserve Board.

Williams and his wife, Gail, have four children: Erika, who is a grade school teacher in Detroit and graduate of Eastern Michigan University; David Williams III, who is a two-time graduate of Bowling Green State University, and is an academic counselor at Michigan State where he is working toward a doctorate; Samantha, who is a graduate of Brown University where she competing in swimming, and is now working in the U.S. Senate; and Nick, who will enroll this fall at High Point (N.C.) University after graduating from University School of Nashville. Nick was selected as USN's 2012-13 co-Athlete of the Year after competing in cross country, basketball, track and soccer.

Williams' wife, Gail, is a graduate of the University of Michigan and the University of Detroit College of Law and serves as the Associate Director of Community Relations of Vanderbilt. She is a past president and current board member of the University School of Nashville Board of Trustees and is the past Chair of the Metro Transit Authority where she continues to serve as a board member. In addition, Gail serves on the Boards of many non-profit organizations, including The Frist Center, The Women's Fund Advisory Board, and the YWCA.

## DIRECTIONS TO STADIUM

### ARRIVING FROM SOUTH OF NASHVILLE

Take I-65 North to I-40 West to Exit 209A (Broadway-West End). Turn left to go west on Broadway. When Broadway splits, stay to the right to enter West End Ave. Take West End past the University on the left and turn left on 25th Avenue. The entrance into Kensington Garage is located just one block on right, just before Memorial Gym.

### ARRIVING FROM NORTH OF NASHVILLE

Take I-65 South into downtown and take Exit 209B (Broadway-West End). Turn right on Broadway. When Broadway splits, stay to the right to enter West End Avenue. Take West End past the University on the left, turn left on 25th Avenue. Access into Kensington Garage is a block on right just before Memorial Gym.

### ARRIVING FROM EAST OF NASHVILLE

Take I-40 West/I-65 North downtown to Exit 209A (Broadway-West End). Turn left at light to go west on Broadway. When Broadway splits, stay to the right to enter West End Ave. Take West End past the University on the left and turn left on 25th Avenue. The garage access is one block on right, just before Memorial Gym.

### ARRIVING FROM WEST OF NASHVILLE

Take I-40 East to I-440 East. Take the first exit (Murphy Road-West End) and turn left at redlight. In .25 mile, turn left onto West End. The campus will be on your right. Turn right on 25th Avenue (one block past Wendy's). Kensington Garage access is one block on right, just before Memorial Gym.

### ARRIVING FROM CHATTANOOGA/ATLANTA

## STADIUM UPGRADES IN PLACE; MORE IMPROVEMENTS STUDIED

Several substantial improvements were finished at Vanderbilt Stadium just before the 2012 season opener. Many additional enhancements, potentially significant in nature, could be coming in the near future.

The gameday experience in Vanderbilt's 30-year-old, on-campus venue were substantially improved last year with the construction of a hillside berm next to the north end zone. Behind the berm, officials installed a new video board that more than doubled the size of the stadium's former Jumbotron.

Dudley Field in Vanderbilt Stadium, playing surface for Commodore football since 1922, returned to a synthetic surface for the first time in more than decade when the university decided to add cushioned Shaw Sportexe turf. The new surface drew rave reviews from Commodore players, who also benefited with the final enhancement – a new stadium lighting system.

The hillside berm, that accommodates 400 general admission ticket holders, brings total stadium capacity to 40,330.

The work last year adds to other major recent improvements. A thorough exterior renovation was completed in 2008-09, including new plazas and entrances at Gates 2 & 3 and an exterior paint and brick effort to unify Vanderbilt Stadium and the program's two other biggest sporting venues, Hawkins Field and Memorial Gym.

Plans for a future renovation have not been announced, but Vanderbilt administrators have journeyed to campuses across the nation to examine other stadium projects.
