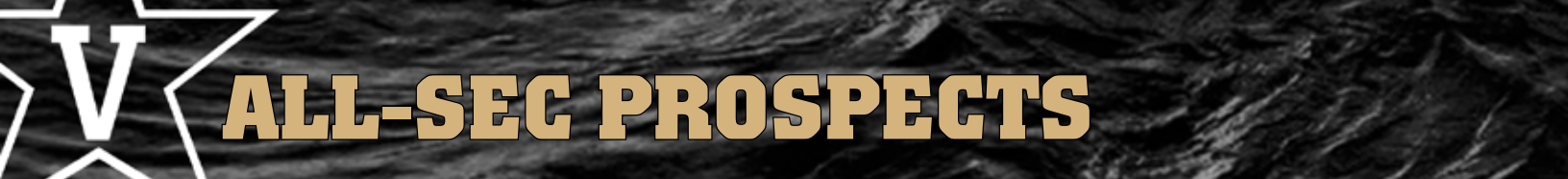

JR - LINEBACKER

- ★ Unanimous First Team All-SEC Linebacker in 2015; 2016 Bednarik Award watch list nominee.

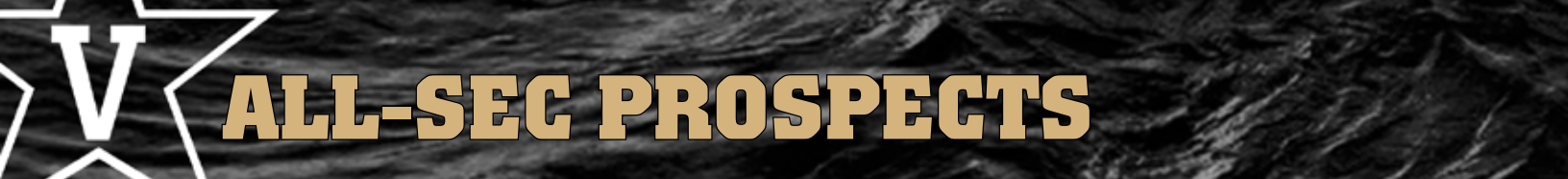
**20 OREN BURKS**

## MASON'S PROGRAM MESSAGE: DEVELOPING VANDERBILT MEN

Since arriving on West End, Derek Mason has talked about his desire to develop a program of "Vanderbilt Men" – student-athletes who have ample experiences to succeed on the field, in the classroom, and well after their football careers have concluded.

Mason's emphasis on developing the total student-athlete has shown early success in the classroom. The Commodores are among national and SEC leaders academically. A novel component of the campus academic philosophy also offers select members of the student-athlete population opportunities to study abroad.

An innovative summer internship started by Mason and his staff two years ago continues to give student-athletes valuable work experience during summer months. This year, 41 active Commodores participated with businesses, governmental entities and non-profit organizations in the Nashville area.

Vanderbilt student-athletes also are encouraged to contribute to a number of service efforts intent on improving the Nashville community.

This May, defensive lineman Jonathan Wynn (top) and safety Emmanuel Smith (left) participated - Wynn studying the origins of modernism art in Vienna, Switzerland and Smith studying ecology and conservation biology in rural Brazil. Another current Commodore, placekicker Hayden Lekacz, spent the winter semester doing coursework in New Zealand.

Other players have participated in the program. In 2015, running back Ralph Webb and a teammate studied rainforest and ocean ecosystems along Australia's Gold Coast and Great Barrier Reef. # COMMODORES IN THE NFL



## CUTLER ENTERS EIGHTH YEAR AS BEARS' STARTING QB

Entering his 11th NFL season, the former first-round draft pick is a captain in Chicago where he looks to get the Bears back to the NFC playoffs. Cutler threw for 21 touchdowns and 3,659 yards in 2015. Cutler surpassed two significant career milestones in the last year - 200 touchdown passes and 30,000 passing yards.

## FIFTEEN COMMODORES ON NFL PRESEASON ROSTERS

Fifteen former Vanderbilt standouts are currently signed with National Football League teams looking to continue or start professional careers.

The list includes nine offensive players, five defensive standouts and a specialist.

Three NFL franchises – the New York Giants, Philadelphia Eagles and San Diego Chargers – have multiple former Commodores on their rosters.

In the offseason, former Green Bay defensive back **Casey Hayward** was one of the NFL's top free agents, eventually signing a long-term deal with the San Diego.

Outside linebacker **Stephen Weatherly** was selected by Minnesota in the 2016 Draft. Five more 2015 seniors are in NFL camps: OL **Jake Bernstein**, Arizona; LB **Darreon Herring**, Los Angeles; OL **Spencer Pulley**, San Diego; TE **Steven Scheu**, New England; and safety **Andrew Williamson**, Indianapolis.

## HAL STARTING AS SAFETY IN HOUSTON

In 2015, Andre Hal moved to safety and quickly became a starter in the Houston secondary. He set career highs with 44 tackles and four interceptions, including one returned for the score.



## HAYWARD INKS FREE AGENT DEAL

After registering 65 solo tackles in 2015, Casey Hayward became one of the NFL's most coveted defensive backs in free agency. He eventually signed a three-year deal with San Diego.



## JORDAN MATTHEWS ENTERS THIRD YEAR WITH EAGLES

Matthews is well on his way to becoming the most prolific former Commodore receiver in the NFL. In two years, Matthews has 152 catches for 1,869 yards and 16 touchdowns. In 2015, he narrowly missed surpassing 1,000 receiving yards for the first time as a pro.

## PRO DAY ACTIVITY, POSTSEASON GAMES HELP PLAYERS ATTRACT ROOKIE DEALS

Six Commodore seniors from a year ago used impressive workouts at the annual Pro Day activity on campus and post-season All-Star games to secure rookie free agent tryouts with NFL teams.

Five of the six – linebacker **Darreon Herring**, offensive linemen **Jake Bernstein** and **Spencer Pulley**, tight end **Steven Scheu** and safety **Andrew Williamson** – remain in camps this summer competing for roster spots.

In early March, they were among eight Commodore seniors who impressed during an array of agility, speed and strength tests at Pro Day. Scouts representing 28 NFL teams attended the event.

Scheu and Williamson also were invited to the East-West Shrine Game while Pulley participated at the inaugural Tropic Bowl.



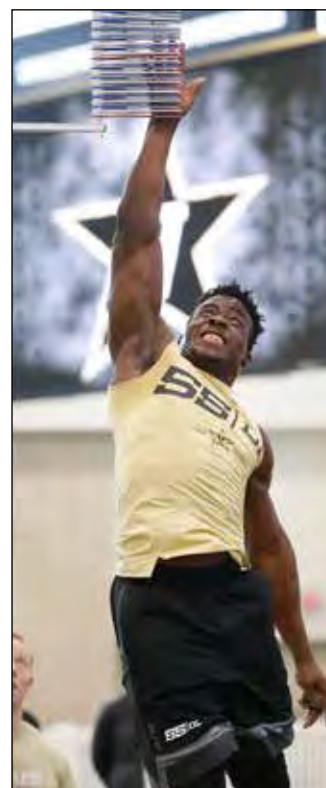

# FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS



## STATE-OF-THE-ART ATHLETIC TRAINING CENTER NOW OPEN

Vanderbilt players have one of the nation's top athletic training facilities for injury evaluation, rehabilitation and treatment. The center opened this February, and features three hydrotherapy pools, examination and treatment rooms, doctor and trainer offices, large taping lobby, and a variety of modern equipment to heal injuries.

## TRAINING CENTER ENHANCES ATHLETES' CARE



### INDOOR FACILITY

Weather has not hindered the Commodores from practicing since the \$31 million indoor facility and multipurpose center opened in 2013.

Vanderbilt Athletics staff and student-athletes moved into the modern athletic training center in February.

The \$6.5 million venue, located in McGugin Athletics Center, provides state-of-the-art facilities and equipment to aid rehabilitation and treatment of Vanderbilt student-athletes.

This March, the athletic department also approved the installation of new Shaw Sportex synthetic turf on the team's main practice venue at the John Rich Facility.

### PROGRAM UPGRADES

## COMPETING AT THE HIGH LEVELS

Vanderbilt student-athletes enjoy an abundance of success, on and off fields of competition.

While the Commodore football team improved vastly in 2015 and looks for a postseason appearance this year, members of the squad helped Vanderbilt capture the prestigious AFCA Academic Achievement Trophy for the fourth time. Thirty-eight members of the team also earned SEC Academic Honor Roll recognition.

Vanderbilt teams and student-athletes experienced plenty of competitive successes. For the first time, the women's cross country squad captured back-to-back NCAA regional titles. Vanderbilt's defending national champion women's tennis team reached the NCAA Final Four, while the men's golf team advanced to the eight-team NCAA Match Play finals for the second time in school history.

Individually, eight Commodore student-athletes earned first-team All-America honors, topped by NCAA outdoor triple jump runnerup Simone Charley, cross country runner Caroline Pietryzk and golfer Matthias Schwab. Three former 'Dores were first-round draftees in their respective sports.

## A CONFERENCE SECOND TO NONE

**Vanderbilt holds charter membership in the Southeastern Conference. In the last decade, Vanderbilt has shared in the league's unparalleled level of success. The league promises to capture even more of the nation's college football attention in 2016.**

- In the last decade, the SEC has accrued 64 bowl wins, more bowl wins than any other conference. The league also is 64-30 (.681) in bowls since 2006. During the span, Vanderbilt is 3-1 in postseason appearances.
- In 2015, SEC teams captured eight bowl victories, the highest single-season total ever by a conference. Three times previously, league teams captured seven bowls.
- Incredibly, SEC football teams won eight of the last 10 national championships, the last coming when Alabama took the College Football Playoff title last year. Five different league teams have won the national championship in the last decade.
- SEC teams were 54-12 (.818) in non-league play last year. It marked the best non-league record of all conferences.
- In the 2016 NFL Draft, 51 former SEC players were selected, the most by any conference for the 10th consecutive year.
- Eight former SEC standouts were taken in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, also the most of any conference.



### ESPN, CBS, SEC Network bring Commodores to national audiences

Vanderbilt is part of the Southeastern Conference's unmatched television package that features the heralded SEC Network, a wide array of ESPN-affiliated outlets, and CBS Sports.

On Thursday, Sept. 1, the Commodores and South Carolina will kick off national coverage of the 2016 season on ESPN. It marks the fourth consecutive year that Vanderbilt will be featured on the opening night of college football.

The Commodores' second game against MTSU – and several more during the year – will air on SEC Network, which focuses its programming on all things SEC. The network has greatly enhanced the league's footprint across America when it was unveiled in 2014. The network features



multiple SEC games each Saturday, along with a live "SEC Nation" game-day morning show.

The featured 'SEC on CBS' game each Saturday is one of the nation's most viewed

college football games. In 2015, the network featured the Vanderbilt-Georgia game early in September from campus.

Every Vanderbilt game is available on television due to national contracts between the SEC, ESPN and the SEC Network, and CBS Sports.

# TEAM OUTLOOK



## MASON'S SQUAD LOOKS FOR MORE PROGRESS

Head Coach **Derek Mason** will welcome a more experienced Vanderbilt squad when he starts his third season on campus.

Twenty-one players who started at least four games in 2015 and 57 letterwinners will greet Mason when preseason camp opens in early August. The returnees include eight position starters and 25 letterwinners on offense, 11 starters and 28 letterwinners on defense, and two starting specialists.

Vanderbilt looks to improve on a 2015 campaign when they finished fourth in the SEC Eastern Division. Mason believes his staff and Commodore student-athletes are on the right path.

"A 'team first' attitude prevails on this squad. I see great effort and camaraderie throughout the roster," Mason said. "After two years, we also have more upperclassmen, guys that know what it takes to play and compete in SEC football. The added experience will help this team succeed."

Three key areas of continuity should benefit the Commodores. The team enters its second year with Strength Coach **James Dobson**, whose early impact drastically upgraded fitness and conditioning throughout the roster in 2015. It also marks the second year that **Andy Ludwig** will guide the Commodore offense, which looks to vastly improve this year. And lastly, it's the second year that Mason will coordinate the Vanderbilt defense that was one of the nation's most improved units last year.

Ludwig's offense features 11 players who started multiple games last year, including quarterback **Kyle Shurmur**, running back **Ralph Webb**, wide receivers **Trent Sherfield**, **Darrius Sims** and **Caleb Scott**, and linemen **Will Holden** and **Barrett Gouger**. The offense also gets four key players who missed all or most of last year with injury: offensive tackle **Andrew Jelks**, wide receiver **C.J. Duncan**, and tight ends **DeAndre Woods**

and **Jared Pinkney**.

The defense returns several top players from 2015, including All-SEC linebacker **Zach Cunningham**, defensive linemen **Adam Butler** and **Nifae Lealao**, cornerbacks **Torren McGaster** and **Tre Herndon**, and safety/linebacker **Oren Burks**. The unit also gets former standout linebacker **Nigel Bowden** back from injury.

Mason expects the 2016 Commodores to be more competitive and physical, and play smarter, more efficient football.

Vanderbilt kicks off with a Thursday night matchup, hosting South Carolina on Sept. 1 before an ESPN national television audience.

The schedule features five more games on campus: Middle Tennessee on Sept. 10, Florida on Oct. 1, Tennessee State on Oct. 22, Ole Miss on Nov. 19, and Tennessee on Nov. 26.

# OFFENSIVE BACKFIELD

## STARTERS BACK: 2 LETTERWINNERS: 6

Much has changed for second-year coordinator **Andy Ludwig**, who managed to develop several quality playmakers from an offensive backfield that ranked among the SEC's least experienced units last year.

The 2016 backfield looks to feature two quarterbacks with starting collegiate experience and the top four rushers from a year ago.

Ludwig also has new quarterback and running back coaches, with **Gerry Gdowski** directing the signal callers and first-year coach **Jeff Genyk** mentoring running backs.

Gdowski expects young quarterbacks **Kyle Shurmur** (So.) and **Wade Freebeck** (Jr.) to be much improved from a year ago. Shurmur started five games as a true freshman last year, displaying maturity, leadership and confidence as the season endured. Freebeck, who earned four starts in 2014, showed poise and played the position efficiently during Spring Ball.

**Shawn Stankavage** (R-So.) continued to develop during spring drills, bringing dual-threat abilities to the position. **Deuce Wallace** (Fr.) showed ability during the spring after enrolling in classes last January.

The strength of the 'Dore backfield could be in the running back corps where record-breaking **Ralph Webb** (R-Jr.) leads a solid contingent.

In two years, Webb has smashed freshman and sophomore rushing records, and sits No. 8 all-time on the Commodore career charts entering the season. With 2,059 rushing yards, he also ranks fourth among all SEC backs.

Two top reserve backs from last year, **Dallas Rivers** (Jr.) and **Josh Crawford** (So.), also return for the Commodores. They combined for 253 yards in 2015.

No Commodore made a better impression during Spring Ball than **Khari Blasingame** (R-So.). Blasingame brings an athletic, physical presence to the Vanderbilt offense after playing defense last year.

**Jaire George** (R-Fr.) will look to impress coaches in August camp.

The signing class includes running back prospect **Jamauri Wakefield**.

# RECEIVING CORPS

## STARTERS BACK: 3 LETTERWINNERS: 12

The Commodores return three starters and a dozen letterwinners in an improved receiving corps that looks for further development this year.

Seven of the team's top eight aerial targets are back for offensive coordinator **Andy Ludwig** and wide receivers coach **Cortez Hankton**. The corps also is bolstered by the return of a top performer from 2014 that missed the entire 2015 season with injury.

The corps is led by **Trent Sherfield** (Jr.) and **Caleb Scott** (Jr.), who combined for 75 catches, 998 receiving yards and five touchdowns in 2015 as first-time starters at wide receiver. Sherfield gained All-SEC consideration with a breakout campaign, registering 51 receptions, 659 yards and three TDs.

Four veterans – **Latevius Rayford** (Sr.), **Darrius Sims** (Sr.), **C.J. Duncan** (R-So.) and **Chandler Dorrell** (Sr.) – bring quality depth to the wide receiver unit. In 2014, Rayford and Duncan paced 'Dore WRs with 36 receptions and 441 receiving yards, respectively. The team's receiving production in 2015 was hindered by Duncan's season-ending injury that came in preseason camp.

The roster of wideouts includes **Trey Ellis** (Jr.) and three talented prospects in the 2016 signing class: **Kalija Lipscomb**, **Donaven Tennyson** and **Jackson Winrow**.

# OFFENSIVE LINE

## STARTERS BACK: 3 LETTERWINNERS: 8

The Vanderbilt offensive line features eight returning letterwinners, including five players who earned multiple starts last year.

The unit showed greater cohesiveness during Spring Ball under the direction of offensive line coach **Cameron Norcross**, who joined the staff in the offseason following a successful tenure at Fresno State.

Norcross concentrated on fundamentals and chemistry during spring drills. This August, he will have to determine who will fill voids left by the graduation of multi-year starters **Spencer Pulley** and **Jake Bernstein**.

The Commodore line is headlined by senior tackles **Will Holden** and **Andrew Jelks**. Both Holden, with 23 career starts, and Jelks, with 21 starts, possesses All-SEC abilities.

Holden protected the quarterback's blindside at left tackle last year after starting at right tackle as a sophomore in 2014. Holden's move was necessitated when Jelks, a 2013 Freshman All-America and SEC All-Freshman performer, suffered a season-ending injury in summer camp. Jelks has returned with an impressive offseason regiment and enters his final season at full strength.

**Bailey Granier** (R-So.) and **Justin Skule** (So.) will benefit substantially from limited starting assignments at tackle last year. **Jared Southers** (Fr.)

also impressed during spring drills and will compete for playing time.

Three players return with starting experience at guard: **Barrett Gouger** (Sr.), **Delando Crooks** (R-Jr.) and **Bruno Reagan** (R-Fr.). Gouger and Reagan were multi-game starters last year. The 'Dores need a healthy campaign from Crooks, who started the 2015 opener but struggled with injuries much of the year.

**Egidio DellaRipa** (Jr.) also will look to break into the guard rotation this August.

At center, Gouger, **Cole Hardin** (R-So.) and **Ean Pfeifer** (R-Fr.) are prospects to replace Pulley.

New arrivals on the offensive line include highly regarded signees **Sean Auwae-McMoore**, **Devin Cochran** and **Braden Kopp**.

# DEFENSIVE LINE

### STARTERS BACK: 5 LETTERWINNERS: 7

With five veterans back with starting experience, the defensive line appears to be one of the Commodores' deepest position groupings.

First-year defensive coach **C.J. Ah You** will welcome seven key letterwinners, including four tackles and two ends who earned multiple starts a year ago.

The Commodores feature **Nifae Lealao** (Jr.) and **Jay Woods** (R-Jr.) at the nose of their 3-4 defense. After totalling 18 tackles and concluding the 2015 season with four straight starts, Lealao continued to develop his skills during Spring Ball. Woods topped all defensive line returnees with 24 tackles and two forced fumbles as a five-game starter in 2015, but missed much of spring drills due to injury.

Coaches hope **Darion DeBrossard** (R-Fr.) can develop into a key contributor with Lealao and Woods.

Two fifth-year seniors, **Torey Agee** and **Adam Butler**, are proven performers who have the versatility to handle all three defensive line responsibilities. The duo combined for 35 tackles, 10 tackles for loss and five quarterback sacks last year.

At the end position, the Commodores can match Agee and Butler with **Jonathan Wynn** (R-Jr.) and **Nehemiah Mitchell** (Sr.). After playing outside linebacker in 2014, Wynn contributed 21 tackles and added three tackles for loss as a four-game starter at end last year. Mitchell moved to end during spring drills after registering 24 tackles in 2015 as an outside linebacker.

Two young 'Dores who flashed in Spring Ball, **Dare Odeyingdo** (So.) and **Riley Tindol** (Jr.) could break into the playing rotation with a strong preseason camp.

The Commodores also added three defensive line prospects in the '16 signing class: **Drew Birchmeier**, **Josiah Sa'o** and **Cameron Tidd**.

# LINEBACKERS

## STARTERS BACK: 3 LETTERWINNERS: 10

Four starters and 10 letterwinners from a year ago highlight a talented Commodore linebacker corps.

The unit, headlined by the return of All-SEC performers **Zach Cunningham** (R-Jr.) and **Nigel Bowden** (R-Jr.), was a strength of the 2015 defense that ranked among the nation's most improved.

This year, the corps will be mentored by new position coaches **Osia Lewis** and **Chris Marve**. Lewis, hired by Derek Mason as a senior assistant, will coach outside linebackers in Vanderbilt's 3-4 base alignment. Marve, a former Commodore standout, will coach inside linebackers.

Potentially, Marve's inside duo of Cunningham and Bowden ranks among the nation's best. Cunningham enjoyed a breakout season in 2015, earning third team All-America and unanimous first team All-SEC honors after posting 103 tackles, 16.5 tackles for loss, four sacks, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. Cunningham should benefit from the return of Bowden, a physical presence who missed nearly all of last year with injury after earning SEC All-Freshman recognition in 2014.

With 59 career tackles, **Ja'kari Thomas** (Sr.) provides experienced, quality inside depth.

The staff is eager to see the progress of a highly-regarded group of

second-year linebackers, including **Josh Smith** (So.), **Jordan Griffin** (So.) and **Jay Hockaday** (So.).

At outside linebacker, Lewis has **Landon Stokes** (Jr.) back after starting the last five games a year ago. Stokes contributed 24 tackles, including three for loss, in 2015.

**Charles Wright** (R-So.) was one of the top defensive performers in spring drills, showing speed and explosiveness as an edge rusher.

**Caleb Peart** (R-Fr.) also impressed the staff during Spring Ball with his continued development.

The entire corps was strengthened during the spring when **Oren Burks** (R-Jr.) moved to the hybrid 'Star' position. The physical former safety, who contributed a team-high three interceptions last year, brings tremendous versatility to the corps.

The Commodores also added two linebacker prospects in the 2016 signing class: **Kenny Hebert** and **Andre Mintze**.

Sporting one of the Southeastern Conference's leading cornerback duos, the Commodores return an athletic defensive secondary.

The youthful secondary includes just one senior performer among 10 returnees who played significant minutes a year ago.

This year, coach **Marc Mattioli** will look for the secondary to create more turnovers. In 2015, the unit registered just six interceptions and four fumble recoveries.

The unit is headlined by returning cornerback starters **Torren McGaster** (Sr.) and **Tre Herndon** (Jr.). McGaster, an All-SEC caliber player, was one of the league's most active defensive backs in 2015, registering 13 defensed passes and 41 solo tackles. Herndon impressed as a first-year starter last year, notching 35 solo tackles among 47 total stops.

**Taurean Ferguson** (R-Jr.), a seven-game career starter, is expected to push McGaster and Herndon for a starting role. Three young cornerbacks – **Donovan Sheffield** (So.), **Bryce Lewis** (R-So.) and freshman early enrollee **Joejuan Williams** – also impressed during Spring Ball and will contend for more playing time this year.

The 2016 signing class also includes prospective cornerbacks

White enjoyed his finest year in 2015, providing leadership while contributing 28 tackles, a forced fumble and interception. Tarpley totalled 36 tackles as an eight-game starter. Smith also produced double-digit tackles in the secondary.

**Jalen Banks** (R-Jr.), **LaDarius Wiley** (R-So.), **Andrew Rector** (So.) early enrollee **Zaire Jones** (Fr.) and 2016 signee **Austin Quillen** will get plenty of opportunities this summer looking to break into the rotation.

# SPECIAL TEAMS

### STARTERS BACK: 3 LETTERWINNERS: 7

**Derek Mason** made substantial offseason changes intended to upgrade Commodore special teams. The most significant move was to attract **Jeff Genyk** aboard to coordinate the units.

Genyk, a former collegiate head coach who comes to Vanderbilt following successful stints at two Big Ten schools, will look to improve return and coverage squads that ranked low in the Southeastern Conference. Mason and Genyk focused attention to all aspects of special teams during Spring Ball.

One of Genyk's priorities is to lessen the workload on junior **Tommy Openshaw**. Genyk plans to have Openshaw, a dual kicker-punter last year, concentrate on placekicking where he has All-SEC potential. As a sophomore, Openshaw made 12 of 19 field goals, including seven of 11 from 40 yards and beyond, but tired late in the season.

Junior walk-on **Hayden Lekacz** will compete with Openshaw for the kicking duties. Lekacz also brings experience as a kickoff specialist.

**Reid Nelson** (Jr.) or **Sam Loy** (Fr.) are likely candidates to handle the team's punting responsibilities.

Two seniors, **Jacob Schultz** and **Wilson Johnson**, are expected to handle the Commodores' snap responsibilities. Schultz, who performed all snapping chores for much of the 2015 season, likely will snap for all conversions. Johnson is expected to be the team's long snapper.

**Davis Winkie** (Jr.) will compete with Schultz and Johnson for the

# HEAD COACH MASON



In 2015, Mason returned to his roots, adding defensive coordinator duties to his Vanderbilt role. The change resulted in one of the nation's most improved defenses.

Derek Mason enters his third season in charge of the Commodores with the program headed in the right direction, on and off the field.

Led by an attacking defense, Mason's Commodores showed plenty of improvement on the field last year, notching conference wins against Missouri and Kentucky en route to a fourth place finish in the SEC East. Following the season, Mason successfully revamped his staff with very accomplished coaches while attracting another outstanding signing class.

In 2015, Mason demonstrated his skills as one of college football's leading defensive minds by becoming his own defensive coordinator. The results were staggering – Vanderbilt's defense ranked among the nation's most improved, finishing among the NCAA Top 30 in scoring defense, total defense, first downs allowed, red zone defense and third-down efficiency.

Mason has strengthened the Commodore coaching staff since arriving on campus. After the 2014 season, he lured highly regarded offensive coordinator Andy Ludwig and head strength James Dobson, along with impressive young staffers in secondary coach Marc Mattioli and wide receivers coach Cortez Hankton. Following the 2015 campaign, Mason continued to enhance the staff, hiring Jeff Genyk as special teams coordinator/running backs coach, Cameron Norcross as offensive line coach and Osia Lewis as outside linebackers. Coach Mason has also brought two rising stars in the profession, C.J. Ah You and Chris Marve, to mentor the defensive line and inside linebackers, respectively.

The changes helped Mason guide an improved Commodore squad in 2015, and one that most keen observers of college football see as continuing to progress in 2016.

In February, Mason welcomed a 20-player signing class that features

In that time, Stanford owned a 45-8 overall record, captured two Pac 12 titles and played in four straight BCS bowl games: the 2011 Orange Bowl, 2012 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, 2013 Rose Bowl and 2014 Rose Bowl.

Off the football field, Mason's Commodores are enjoying plenty of recognition. The Commodores were co-recipients of the 2015 Academic Achievement Award, given annually by the American Football Coaches Association and Memphis Touchdown Club to the school that performs best in graduation success. Three former football players, including quarterback Patton Robinette, were accepted into the Vanderbilt Medical School last year. In the last two calendar years, the team has 80 SEC Academic Honor Roll recipients and more than 40 Dean's List honorees. It is recognized as a national and Southeastern Conference leader in its Academic Progress Rate (APR) graduation performance.

Since arriving on campus, Mason has also been instrumental in creating a summer internship program for Commodore student-athletes that is one of the most innovative in the nation. Started in 2014 within the football team, the internship program has been expanded to other Vanderbilt squads, providing excellent work experience opportunities for student-athletes.

Mason has also supported foreign study by members of the team. Since 2014, five Commodore players have studied abroad, including defensive end Jonathan Wynn, safety Emmanuel Smith and kicker Hayden Lekacz this year.

The personable Mason is actively involved in the Middle Tennessee community, contributing to several local and university causes, while making appearances at various social and sporting events.

Mason became Vanderbilt's 28th head coach in January 2014,

hired. "This university combines the best of what's good about college athletics and academics. We expect to be competitive and look forward to competing for an SEC East crown."

Mason became defensive coordinator at Stanford in 2011, and helped the Cardinal to Rose Bowl appearances and consecutive Pac-12 titles in 2013 with one of the nation's top defensive units. Under Mason, the Cardinal ranked among the NCAA Top 15 in defensive efficiency for three consecutive years.

Mason's plan in Nashville is to build the Commodore defense into a top-tier unit, much as he did at Stanford where he served as coordinator from 2011-13. Mason's defense was a critical ingredient in helping the Cardinal to Rose Bowl appearances in 2013 and 2014, and consecutive Pac-12 titles with one of the nation's top defensive units. Under Mason, the Cardinal ranked among the NCAA national Top 15 in defensive efficiency for three consecutive years.

In 2013 while facing seven ranked opponents and one of the nation's toughest schedules, the Stanford defense ranked third in the NCAA in rushing defense (89.4 yards), 10th in scoring defense (19.0 points) and 16th in total offense (343.1 yards).

The Cardinal was also one of only five teams to allow less than 100 rushing yards per game in 2013. The team was also among the best nationally in producing stops for negative yardage, ranking fifth with 44 sacks and seventh with 109 tackles for loss. The defense was also superb on third downs, holding opponents to a 32% conversion rate.

In 2012, Mason was a finalist for the Broyles Award, given annually to the nation's top assistant coach, after directing a defense that ranks among the best in the nation and finest in Stanford history. The 2012 unit broke Stanford's single season record for quarterback sacks and topped the Pac-12 in numerous categories, including scoring defense and total defense, helping the Cardinal to a 11-2 season capped off with a Rose Bowl crown.

Mason's leadership paved the way to a historic defensive output in 2012, breaking Stanford's single-season record with 57 sacks and pacing the Pac-12 in scoring defense, total defense and rushing defense. In 11 of 14 games in 2012, Stanford held its opponent to 20 or fewer points, including a 14-point effort in the overtime win at top-ranked Oregon, who led the FBS with a 54.8 scoring average.

The 2012 Stanford defense held eight of 13 opponents under 100 yards rushing, and in a string of three consecutive games, the Cardinal recorded three of its top-10, single-game rushing defense performances in school history.

In 2011, Mason's first year as co-defensive coordinator, he teamed

with Jason Tarver to mold Stanford into one of the Pac-12's top defensive units. That season, the unit ranked either first or second in the Pac-12 in six defensive categories, including rushing defense, third-down conversion defense, scoring defense, total defense, sacks and opponent first downs. Stanford finished third nationally in rushing defense. Mason joined the Cardinal staff in 2010, serving as secondary coach under then-Stanford coach Jim Harbaugh. Mason's 2010 secondary, which featured three current NFL players, registered 18 total interceptions.

At Stanford, Mason also helped develop an array of Cardinal defensive standouts, including All-Pro cornerback Richard Sherman of the world champion Seattle Seahawks, All-America defensive end Trent Murphy, All-America linebacker Shayne Skov, All-Pacific 12 safety Ed Reynolds.

Prior to his arrival in Palo Alto, Mason served as an assistant defensive backs coach for the Minnesota Vikings from 2007 to 2009. He played a vital role in the team ranking sixth in total defense in 2008 and 2009 as the Vikings won NFC North titles each season. Mason was introduced to the NFL coaching circles through the Minority Fellowship program in 1996 with the St. Louis Rams. He also spent time with the coaching staffs of the New York Giants and Oakland Raiders. He joined the Vikings staff in 2007, where he worked with defensive backs coach Joe Woods.

Before joining the Vikings, Mason tutored wide receivers at Ohio University under head coach Frank Solich, helping the Bobcats improve from 4-7 in 2005 to a 9-5 campaign the following year that ended with an appearance in the GMAC Bowl. Mason spent the 2004 season as the wide receivers coach at New Mexico State, where he helped the Aggies lead the conference in passing.

During the 2002 campaign, Mason mentored the receivers and assisted with the special teams at Utah. The Utes also featured the NFL Draft's No. 1 overall pick in quarterback Alex Smith and eventual 7th round pick receiver Paris Warren.

Mason's move to Utah came after a three-year stint at Bucknell (1999-2001) in which he gained his first experience as a defensive assistant coach. At Bucknell, Mason served as defensive backs mentor for three straight winning Bison squads.

Mason's first three collegiate positions came as an offensive assistant at Mesa Community College (in 1994), Weber State (1995-96) and Idaho State (1997-98).

As a player, Mason was a two-year starter and four-year letter-winner

at Northern Arizona. He was recruited to the university by Head Coach Larry Kentera, the grandfather of former Vanderbilt receiver Kris Kentera.

During his NAU career, Mason was influenced by several outstanding coaches, including Kentera, Kansas City head coach Andy Reid, former Minnesota head coach Brad Childress, former NFL head coach and offensive coordinator Marty Mornhingweg.

Mason earned a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Northern Arizona University in 1993.

A native of Phoenix, Mason attended Camelback High School.

Derek and his wife, LeighAnne, have two daughters, Makenzie, 17, and Sydney, 15.

Andy Ludwig, regarded among the leading college offensive coordinators in America, enters his second year on the staff. In 2016, he will serve as tight ends coach while handling coordinator duties.

In 2015, Ludwig's position role was quarterback coach. He mentored a young signal calling corps that included Kyle Shurmur, Wade Freebeck and Johnny McCrary. Collectively, the trio threw for 2,062 yards and 11 touchdowns.

Ludwig's 2015 offense featured sophomore Ralph Webb, who established a new team sophomore record with 1,152 rushing yards, the second highest single-season total in program history. Sophomore receiver Trent Sherfield also produced 51 catches for 659 yards.

Ludwig joined Vanderbilt after two seasons as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Wisconsin, where the Badgers set numerous offensive records. A coaching veteran with 28 years of experience, Ludwig's coaching career also includes stops as coordinator at San Diego State (2011-12), Cal (2009-10), Utah (2005-08), Oregon (2002-04) and Fresno State (1998-2001).

Ludwig helped rewrite the Wisconsin record book as the Badgers tallied two of the three highest offensive outputs in school history en route to a 20-7 overall record and consecutive Jan. 1 postseason bowl appearances. The 2013 Wisconsin offense averaged a school-record 480.8 yards per game. The 2014 squad nearly matched those totals, averaging 34.6 points and 468.9 total yards.



Gordon, the 2014 Badgers amassed a school-record 4,482 rushing yards.

In 2013, Wisconsin was one of just four FBS teams to amass 3,500 rushing yards and 2,500 passing yards. Overall, UW's explosive offense ranked second in the country with 15 plays of 50-plus yards, with the Badgers scoring on 10 of those home-run plays.

Prior to joining Wisconsin, Ludwig spent the 2011-12 seasons at San Diego State. In 2012, the Aztecs enjoyed success, going 9-4. In 2011, the SDSU offense featuring running back and eventual third round pick Ronnie Hillman averaged 427.4 yards. Aztec quarterback Ryan Lindley also became a sixth-round draft choice of the Arizona Cardinals.

Ludwig has been an offensive coordinator at the NCAA level for 21 years. His teams have been to 15 bowl games. Prior to his years at Vanderbilt and San Diego, Ludwig served as offensive coordinator at California (2009-10), Utah (2005-08), Oregon (2002-04), Fresno State (1998-01), Cal Poly (1997) and Augustana (1993-94). Ludwig helped Utah go to four bowls, including a 2009 Sugar Bowl win over Alabama, as the Utes finished 13-0 and No. 2

in the nation.

Ludwig's mentoring of quarterbacks includes two other signal callers that eventually played in the NFL, Kellen Clemens of Oregon and 2002 NFL Draft No. 1 pick David Carr of Fresno State.

Ludwig played two seasons as a wide receiver at Snow College in Utah (1982-83) before earning two more letters at Portland State (1985-86).

Ludwig and his wife, Jill, are the parents of son Joe, and daughter Delaney.

rushing total in NCAA FBS history. Gordon also paced all NCAA FBS backs with 29 rushing touchdowns and briefly held the NCAA single-game rushing record after a 408-yard effort in a November win over Nebraska. Behind

Jeff Genyk, one of the nation's most respected special teams instructors and a former collegiate head coach, enters his first year on the staff. Genyk will serve as Vanderbilt's special teams coordinator and running backs coach.

In 2015, Genyk rekindled a working relationship with Northwestern University, serving as a consultant to Head Coach Pat Fitzgerald on special teams, offense and game management. The Wildcats went 10-3 and advanced to the Outback Bowl.

In 2013-14, Genyk coordinated special teams and worked with tight ends at the University of Wisconsin. During the two years at Wisconsin, he worked with current Vanderbilt offensive coordinator Andy Ludwig.

The Badgers had plenty of successes, including capturing the 2014 Big Ten West title, beating Auburn in the 2014 Outback Bowl and playing in the 2013 Citrus Bowl.

Before joining Wisconsin, Genyk held similar positions at University of California under Head Coach Jeff Tedford. While in Berkeley, Genyk led dramatic improvement with the Cal special teams units, including back-to-back first-team All-Pac 12 selections in kicker Giorgio Tavecchio and punter Bryan Anger, who is now a four-year veteran with Jacksonville after being a third-round draft pick by the Jaguars.



Genyk completed his eighth NFL season. Wellock was a finalist for the 2004 Lou Groza Award. Genyk also coached offensive tackle T.J. Lang, who remains a starter on the Green Bay offensive front.

From 1994-2003, Genyk worked at Northwestern, with responsibility for the special teams unit during each of his final five campaigns with the Wildcats. He was also the running backs coach and recruiting coordinator for five seasons (1999-2003) after having worked with the safeties in 1998 and the outside linebackers in 1997.

Genyk was on the Northwestern football staff for three Big Ten championship teams and four bowl appearances. The 1995, 1996 and 2000 teams all won Big Ten titles.

At Northwestern, Genyk mentored Fitzgerald as an All-America linebacker and defensive player of the year.

Genyk was a quarterback and punter at Bowling Green State from 1978-81. He earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from Bowling Green in 1982. He later earned a master's of business administration and marketing from Western Michigan in 1989 and a master's of education and social policy from Northwestern in 1994.

Genyk and his wife Lisa are the parents of a son Jake, and a daughter McKenna.

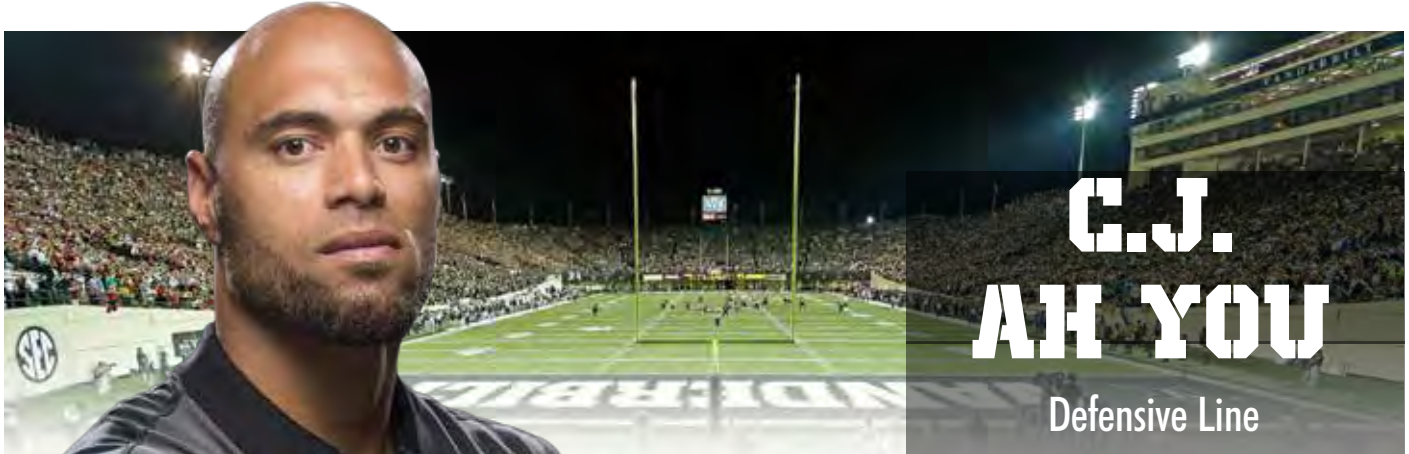

C.J. Ah You, a former University of Oklahoma defensive standout and assistant, enters his first year with Derek Mason's staff. He serves as defensive line coach.

Ah You served on Bob Stoops' Oklahoma staff for the last two years. In 2015, Ah You assisted with an Oklahoma squad that finished 11-2, captured the Big 12 Conference championship and played in the College Football Playoff national semifinals. The Sooners' season was highlighted by regular season victories over Baylor, TCU, Oklahoma State and Tennessee.

In 2015, Ah You assisted defensive line coach Diron Reynolds, who worked alongside Mason as a defensive staffer with the Minnesota Vikings in 2009. He also contributed with Sooner special teams.

The 2015 Oklahoma defense played an important role in the Sooners' team success. The Sooner pass rush ranked sixth nationally with 40 quarterback sacks and helped produce 20 interceptions, eighth most in the NCAA. The unit was dominant against Big 12 competition, ranking among the conference leaders in scoring defense, total defense, defensive pass efficiency, sacks, interceptions and first downs allowed.

Anchoring the 2015 Sooner defense was senior defensive lineman Charles Tapper. Named first-team All-Big 12 by the Associated Press, Tapper registered seven quarterback sacks and four forced fumbles. He played in the 2016 Reese's Senior Bowl and is currently in camp with the Dallas Cowboys. Tapper's defensive line teammate Charles Walker, also garnered All-Big 12 recognition



Bowl. He also served as the Sooners' defensive captain in 2006.

Ah You started 25 games for the Sooners at defensive end. As a senior in 2006, he earned first-team All-Big 12 honors after registering 10 tackles for loss, 6.5 quarterback sacks and three forced fumbles. Ah You was named Big 12 Defensive Newcomer of the Year as a junior when he contributed 41 tackles, 8.5 tackles for loss and four sacks.

Selected by Buffalo in the seventh round of the 2007 NFL Draft, Ah You eventually was a member of the St. Louis Rams from 2007-12. Ah You saw action in 33 games over three seasons, contributing six sacks among 41 tackles.

Ah You worked closely with several charities as an NFL player, including United Way, Red Cross and the National Breast Cancer Foundation among others.

Ah You completed a bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of Oklahoma in 2006.

## GERRY GDOWSKI

Quarterbacks

Gerry Gdowski enters his third season on Derek Mason's staff. After serving as tight ends coach in 2014-15, Gdowski becomes quarterbacks coach this year.

In 2015, Gdowski's pupil Steven Scheu topped the tight end corps with 26 catches. Scheu is now in camp with the New England Patriots.

Gdowski's tight end roster lost promising sophomore DeAndre Woods and freshman Jared Pinkney to injury early in the 2015 campaign.

Gdowski came to Vanderbilt after spending nine years at Ohio where he mentored quarterbacks. Gdowski also had titles of assistant head coach and co-offensive coordinator.

At Ohio, Gdowski helped mold Tyler Tettleton into one of the greatest quarterbacks in Bobcats' history. Under Gdowski's tutelage, Tettleton set Ohio career records in passing yards and TDs, and became the only quarterback in school history to post three straight seasons of at least 2,500 yards passing. In 2013, the Bobcats averaged nearly 27.4 points and 380 yards of total offense, including 245.4 passing yards.

Gdowski's 2011 offense was the most productive unit in modern Ohio University history, totaling 427 points and 6,241 total yards. In all, the Bobcats' offensive unit set eight program records during the year.

Other standout quarterbacks mentored by Gdowski at Ohio were Boo Jackson, (38 career touchdown passes), Theo Scott (20 touchdown passes in 2009), Brad Bower and Austen Everson (ranks among team's



all-time Top Ten passers in numerous categories).

Gdowski went to Ohio after eight seasons at New Mexico State. He was the Aggies' recruiting coordinator and quarterbacks coach until 2003 when he took over as offensive coordinator. The Aggies ranked second in the Sun Belt Conference in 2004 in scoring offense and passing offense.

Gdowski began his coaching career at Nebraska, working with the quarterbacks, tight ends and receivers as a graduate assistant from 1991 to 1993. He then moved to South Dakota State, where he coached for three seasons. After two years as quarterbacks and wide receivers coach, Gdowski was promoted to offensive coordinator.

As a player, he earned three letters at Nebraska under legendary coach Tom Osborne. Gdowski was the starting quarterback and team captain for the Cornhuskers in 1989 and was

named to the All-Big Eight First Team. He was an eighth round draft choice of the New Orleans Saints that spring.

Gdowski excelled off the field at Nebraska as well. He earned CoSIDA Academic All-America honors in 1989 and was awarded the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Postgraduate Scholarship as well as the NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship. A 1990 graduate of Nebraska with a bachelor's in business administration, Gdowski also went on to earn his master's in education administration from Nebraska in 1996.

A native of Fremont, Neb., Gdowski and his wife, Sam, are the parents of three sons: Isaac, Luke, and Tommy.

Wide Receivers

Cortez Hankton enters his second year as an offensive assistant coach. He coaches Commodore wide receivers.

Hankton, a former National Football League wide receiver who has enjoyed recent success mentoring receivers in the Ivy League, joined Derek's Mason staff in January 2015.

A pair of sophomores wideouts, Trent Sherfield and Caleb Scott, stepped forward as solid receiving threats in Hankton's first year on campus. Sherfield finished the year with 51 catches, good for 659 yards and three touchdowns. Sherfield's reception total ranks third all-time by a Commodore sophomore. Scott finished the year with new career highs of 24 catches and 339 receiving yards.

Hankton, a former six-year NFL veteran out of Texas Southern University, spent the last three years mentoring wide receivers at Dartmouth University, helping the Big Green to a 20-10 overall record, including an 8-2 mark in 2014.

In 2014, Hankton's receivers helped the Dartmouth offense average 31.3 points and 248.1 passing yards. His top receiver, Ryan McManus, earned All-Ivy League honors after catching 68 passes for 879 yards and eight touchdowns.

Hankton produced All-Ivy caliber receivers all three years at Dartmouth. In 2012, senior Michael Reilly earned first-team recognition with McManus receiving honorable mention. In 2013, Big Green receiver Bo Patterson was an Ivy League honorable mention recipient.



Signed as an undrafted rookie free agent in April of 2003 by the Jacksonville Jaguars, Hankton proceeded to play in all 16 games as a rookie, catching 17 passes for 166 yards. In his four years with

then moved to Virginia for the 2011 season. There, Hankton was a part of a squad that won the league championship.

Hankton joined Dartmouth in 2012 by way of University of Central Florida, where he spent three months working as a volunteer assistant of player personnel. In that role, he helped formulate recruiting priorities and travel plans, plus evaluated prospective student-athletes and broke down film of recruits. From 2008-10, Hankton also has spent time training draft-eligible athletes for the NFL combines with Tom Shaw Performance Training Camps. In early 2010, he also served as non-paid receiver coach at Dr. Phillips High School in Orlando.

Hankton received his bachelor's in business administration from Texas Southern in 2002, where he set school season and career records for receiving yards. A four-year letterwinner and two-year starter, Hankton culminated his collegiate career by being named as a Division I-AA third-team All-America by the Associated Press.

A native of New Orleans, Hankton is the son of Cortez Sr. and Sherome Hankton, both officers in the New Orleans Police Department. Hankton was a standout athlete and multi-year starter at St. Augustine High School in New Orleans.

Hankton and his wife, the former Shon Holder, were married in July 2014. They are the parents of an infant son, Cortez III.

Senior Defensive Assistant;  
Outside Linebackers

Oslia Lewis, a 26-year veteran of the collegiate coaching ranks, enters his first year on Derek Mason's staff. He will mentor outside linebackers and serve as the team's senior defensive assistant.

For the last five years, Lewis has worked as defensive line coach at San Diego State with head coach and defensive innovator Rocky Long.

Lewis brings extensive experience to Vanderbilt, having served as a defensive coordinator at the collegiate and professional levels. He has coached in 10 bowl games with teams from the Pac-12, Big Ten, Conference USA and Mountain West.

In 2015, San Diego State enjoyed a banner year on the strength of a top-ranked defense. The Aztecs finished 11-3 overall, captured the MWC championship and earned a 42-7 win over Cincinnati in the Hawai'i Bowl.

The Aztecs were sparked by an outstanding defense that ranked among the NCAA Top Ten in several defensive categories. The team finished the year fifth nationally in total defense (287.3 ypg), seventh in scoring defense (16.4 ppg), seventh in rushing defense (108.7 ypg), and 10th in pass efficiency.

The defense also helped SDSU lead the nation in turnover margin. The



Aztecs' interior pressure forced opponents into 34 turnovers, en route to a remarkable plus-19 turnover margin by season's end.

One of Lewis' top pupils in 2015 was junior Alex Barrett, who produced 13 tackles for loss and 5.5 QB sacks while earning first team All-Mountain West honors. Barrett also was the fourth Aztec lineman to receive

From 2003-07, Lewis served as defensive coordinator at the University of New Mexico. He also had stints coaching the Lobos' defensive line and linebackers.

In his tenure at New Mexico, the Lobos went to four bowl games and its defensive unit ranked fifth nationally in rushing defense in 2003.

In 2008-09, Lewis served as defensive coordinator at Texas-El Paso, then spent 2010 coaching in the United Football League.

From 1997-2002, Lewis guided linebackers and the defensive line at the University of Illinois. In his final year, the Illini played in the 2002 Nokia Sugar Bowl and posted a final No. 12 national ranking.

Lewis' first full-time coaching position at the NCAA FBS level came at his alma mater, Oregon State. He served as a linebackers coach and special teams coach with the Beavers from 1991-96.

Lewis' initial entry into the collegiate coaching ranks came as an assistant at

Western Oregon in 1989-90.

A native of Tucson, Ariz., Lewis was a team captain and honorable mention All-America at Oregon State. Lewis was All-Pac 10 and named the Beavers' most inspirational player. He continued his playing career professionally in the Canadian Football League and in the Arena Football League.

Lewis earned a bachelor's in social science education from Oregon State in 1986. He also completed a master's in education from Oregon State in 1989.

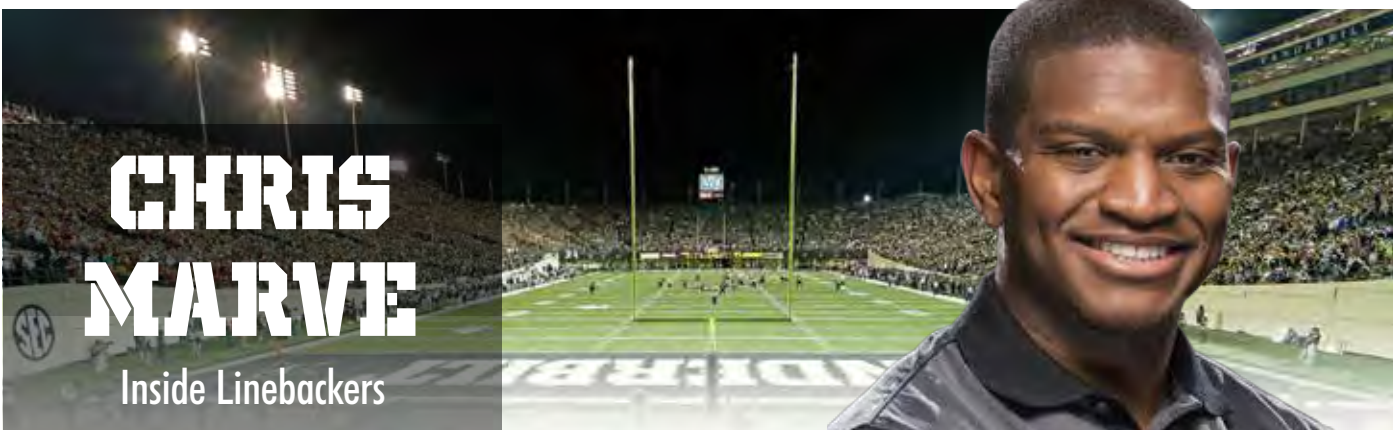

Chris Marve, a former two-time Commodore defensive co-captain who ranks among the program's all-time leading tacklers, enters his first year as a position coach. He will direct the team's inside linebackers.

In 2014-15, Marve served as a Commodore defensive assistant under Head Coach Derek Mason. In 2015, he worked as a graduate assistant focusing on linebackers. In 2014, he contributed as a quality control assistant.

Mason, who mentored Marve last year as the team's defensive coordinator, described the former four-year Vanderbilt starting linebacker as "one of the top young defensive minds" in college football.

Marve became one of the most decorated players in Vanderbilt modern history by garnering All-Southeastern Conference accolades in each of his four years. He was a three-time team leader for tackles, and was an instrumental leader that pushed the Commodores to postseason appearances in the 2008 Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl and the 2011 AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

Marve's value to the Commodore defense and its linebackers has been evident since joining the staff. In 2015, the unit ranked among the nation's most improved, finishing fourth in first downs allowed, sixth in red-zone defense and third down efficiency, 22nd in scoring defense and 28th in total defense.



after registering 105 tackles and four forced fumbles. He capped the season with a 10-tackle performance in the Commodores' Music City Bowl victory over Boston College.

As a sophomore, Marve earned second team All-SEC recognition from league coaches after posting career highs with 121 total tackles and 57 solo stops. He also averaged 10.1 tackles in conference play.

In 2010, Marve again earned coaches' All-SEC honors as a junior defensive co-captain. That year, he finished with 80 tackles and eight tackles for loss.

As a senior captain, Marve contributed 91 tackles, earned All-SEC recognition from coaches and the Associated Press, and was instrumental in leading the Commodores back to postseason play. Marve's final appearance came in his hometown at the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

Marve ranks eighth on the team's career defensive charts with 397 total tackles. His career total of 28 tackles for loss ranks ninth all-time among Commodores.

Marve completed bachelor's degrees in sociology and human & organizational development in December 2011. He earned a master's of education in higher education administration from Vanderbilt in 2015.

Marve is married to the former Lauren Dillard, a fellow Vanderbilt graduate.

Marve also helped develop Zach Cunningham into an All-SEC linebacker in his first year as a starter in 2015. Cunningham registered 103 total tackles, 16.5 tackles for loss, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries en route to earning

consensus first team all-conference recognition and third team All-America honors from Phil Steele.

In Marve's first year on staff, inside linebacker Nigel Bowden produced a banner 2014 campaign, achieving Freshman All-SEC recognition after leading all SEC freshmen with 78 tackles.

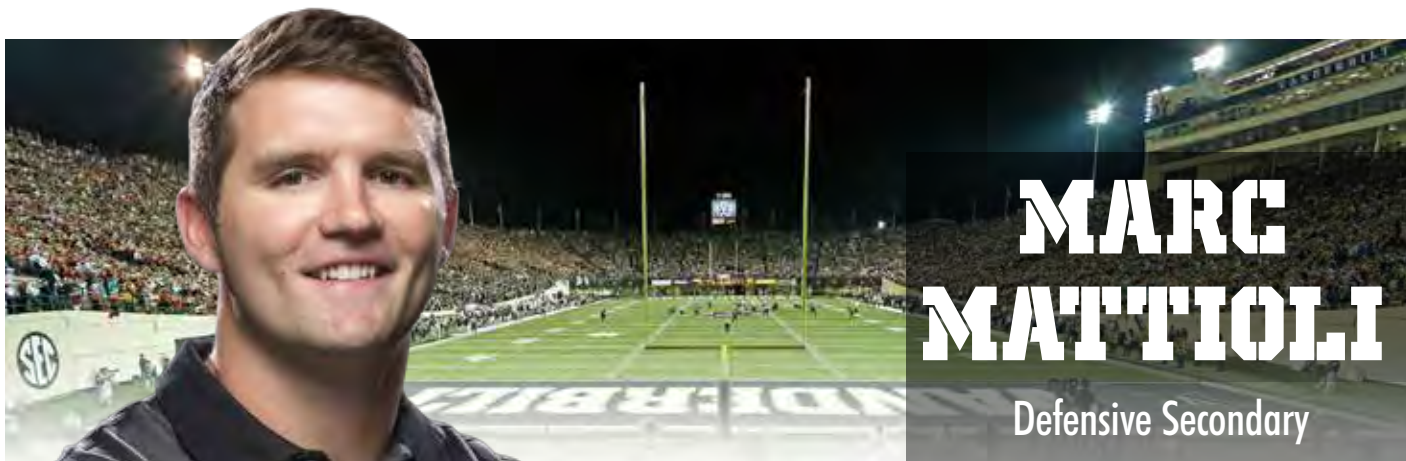

Former Stanford assistant Marc Mattioli enters his second year on the defensive staff. After focusing on Commodore safeties in 2015, Mattioli widens his interests in 2016 as defensive secondary coach.

Mattioli, a former four-year letterwinner at Rhodes College in Memphis, did an excellent job with Vanderbilt's safeties in 2015, mentoring senior Andrew Williamson and sophomore Oren Burks to campaigns that garnered All-Southeastern Conference consideration. Williamson posted 41 tackles, provided veteran leadership and capped the season by making an appearance in the East-West Shrine Game. He signed with the Indianapolis Colts as a rookie free agent. Burks also became an important leader in the secondary, topped the Commodores with three interceptions, and ranked third with 59 total tackles.

Mattioli joined Vanderbilt after serving three years at Stanford, including two seasons with Mason as a defensive graduate assistant.

Mattioli was a defensive quality control assistant for the Cardinal secondary in 2014, focusing his efforts on the Stanford secondary. In 2012-13, he served as a defensive graduate assistant, helping Mason as a



The Cardinal ranked 10th nationally in scoring defense during a run to the Rose Bowl in 2013, and led the Pac-12 in scoring defense and total defense in the 2012 campaign that included another Rose Bowl appearance and conference title.

Mattioli has strong ties to the South. Prior to joining the Stanford staff, Mattioli served two seasons as the defensive line coach for LaGrange (Ga.) College.

Mattioli played tight end as a freshman at Rhodes College before transitioning to the defensive line for his final three campaigns. He served as team captain as a senior in 2008, and was part of the 2006 Rhodes

defense that ranked fifth nationally.

He earned Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference All-Academic honors four times. Mattioli was the National Foundation and College Hall of Fame Outstanding Student-Athlete Award recipient for Rhodes and was an all-SCAC choice in 2006 and 2008.

Mattioli was a standout athlete at Roswell (Ga.) H.S., starting at tight end and linebacker.

Mattioli graduated from Rhodes with a bachelor's in political science. He earned a master's from LaGrange College and worked toward a postgraduate degree in liberal arts from Stanford.

In 2014, Stanford finished second nationally in scoring defense, third in total defense, and eighth in passing defense. The Cardinal did not allow a touchdown pass in five games, and permitted just one score via the

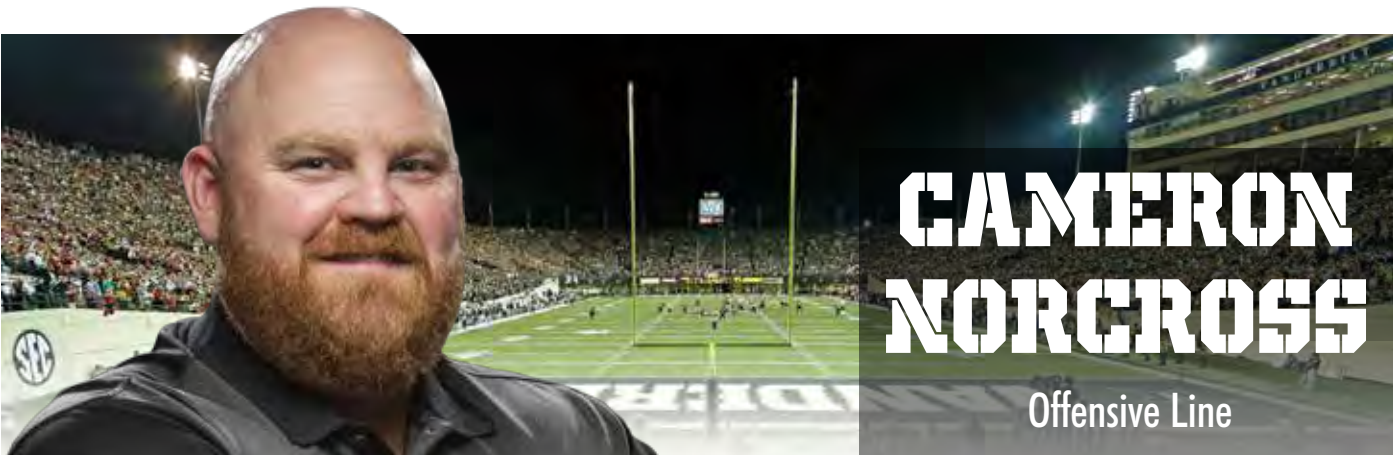
pass in four other games. The team also produced as many interceptions (12) as touchdown passes allowed.

The 2014 Cardinal secondary was led by strong safety Jordan Richards with three interceptions and three forced fumbles. A first team All-Pac 12 selection as a senior, Richards also was awarded the 2014 National Football Foundation's Scholar-Athlete Award. Mattioli also worked with highly ranked Stanford defenses as a graduate assistant in 2012 and 2013.





# COACHING STAFF



Former Fresno State assistant coach Cameron Norcross enters his first year with the Commodores, guiding the offensive line.

Norcross comes to the Southeastern Conference after serving four years at Fresno State and an 11-year stint at his alma mater, the University of Nevada.

As a Fresno State staffer, Norcross helped the Bulldogs to a 29-23 overall record and three bowl appearances. Norcross' tenure at Fresno State featured an 11-2 campaign in 2013 that ended with the No. 21 Bulldogs facing Southern California in the Las Vegas Bowl.

Norcross' lines were the backbone of a potent offensive attack at Fresno State. From 2012-14, the unit helped Fresno to put up 500 or more yards of offense 18 times. The offense also tallied at least 40 points in 18 games.

The line led Fresno State in 2013 to one of its best seasons in program history, as the Bulldogs tied the school record for wins and captured the Mountain West championship. With Norcross' aid, the Bulldog offense established nearly 20 school records during the season, including new marks for total offense and points. The Fresno State line



also allowed just 11 sacks in 13 games, ranking No. 7 in the NCAA. Remarkably, the Bulldogs threw 675 passes in 2013, nearly 250 more attempts than any of the six teams ranked ahead of the 'Dogs.

Norcross has mentored

All-America and all-conference linemen at Fresno State. In 2014, senior Alex Fifita earned second team All-Mountain West honors. Another pupil, senior tackle Justin Northern, became the sixth Academic All-America in Fresno State history.

Before joining the Fresno State staff, Norcross served at Nevada, helping his alma mater to seven consecutive bowl appearances from 2005-11. A three-year letterman on the Wolf Pack offensive line (1997-99), Norcross was an All-Big West selection in 1998.

Norcross started at Nevada as a graduate assistant under coach Chris Tormey in 2001-02. In 2003, he was hired on full time as the tight ends

and co-offensive line coach. Wolf Pack Hall of Fame Head Coach Ault returned to the program as head coach in 2004, keeping Norcross on his staff in the same role all the way up until 2010 when he was promoted to the run-game coordinator and offensive line coach. Norcross played an important role in the development of Ault's innovative "Pistol" offense since its inception in 2005.

Nevada led the nation in rushing in 2009, a year in which the Wolf Pack became the first team in NCAA history to have three 1,000-yard rushers in the same season. In nine seasons coaching offensive linemen at Nevada, Norcross mentored eight players to first-team all-conference honors and another eight to second-team accolades.

Prior to joining Tim DeRuyter's staff at Fresno State in 2012, the two had previously worked together at Nevada in 2005 and 2006 when DeRuyter was the co-defensive coordinator for the Wolf Pack. Over those two seasons, DeRuyter and Norcross helped

lead Nevada to a 17-8 record, a share of the 2005 WAC Championship and two bowl appearances.

A native of Ely, Nev., Norcross earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Nevada in management.

He and his wife, Jennifer, are the parents of a son, Jacob, and two daughters, Kylie and Madison.

Former University of Nebraska conditioning coordinator James Dobson enters his second year as head strength coach of the Vanderbilt football team.

Dobson oversees all aspects of the Vanderbilt strength program for football, which includes winter conditioning, summer workouts and in-season training.

Dobson put his stamp on the Commodore program in 2015, developing a roster that played with energy and enthusiasm to the last snap. The Commodores' overall fitness was on display in the fourth quarter when they outscored opponents 58-47.

Dobson, a native of Mt. Horeb, Wis., spent the last seven years guiding Nebraska's conditioning programs under former Cornhusker football head coach Bo Pelini. In Dobson's tenure, Nebraska was one of three teams nationally, joining Alabama and Oregon, to post at least nine wins every year.

The 2014 Nebraska squad, ranked No. 22 in the Coaches Poll, faced Southern California in the Holiday Bowl. The Huskers made a post-season bowl appearance every year in Dobson's tenure. Utilizing Dobson's strength program, the Huskers were regarded among the nation's most outstanding fourth-quarter teams. In 2014, the Huskers outscored opponents by a remarkable 119-62 margin. Nebraska also scored more fourth-quarter points by its foes in 2008 (155-52), 2009 (96-32), 2010 (64-53) and 2012 (101-82).

In 2014, Dobson's conditioning program helped the Nebraska offense



average 37.4 points, 248.2 rushing yards and 446.2 total yards. Dobson's efforts also produced a tenacious Nebraska squad. The Huskers were known for producing remarkable comeback victories in recent years, including four such wins during the 2012 season and a thrilling 37-34 overtime victory over Iowa in the 2014 regular season finale.

Prior to Nebraska, Dobson spent nine years with the Iowa Hawkeye football program. He was in Iowa City during one of the most successful periods in school history. Iowa appeared in bowl games in six seasons and won 38 games from 2002 to 2005.

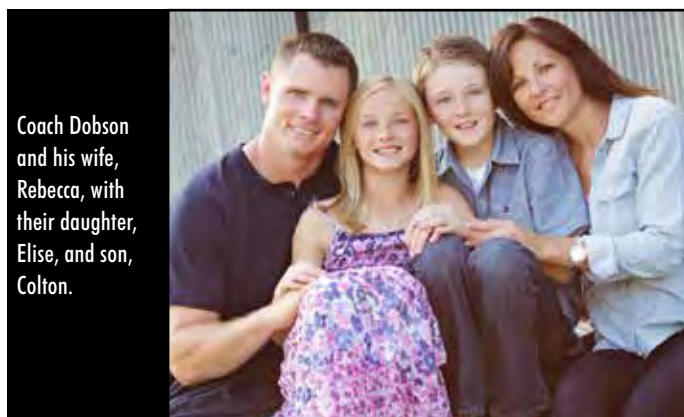
Dobson has had a history of working with some of the top college football players in the country over the past decade. Top pupils Dobson has worked with include running back Ameer Abdullah, defensive tackle Ndamukong Suh, cornerback Prince Amukamara and linebacker Lavonte David at Nebraska along with safety Bob Sanders, tight end Dallas Clark, offensive tackle Robert Gallery and linebacker Chad Greenway at Iowa.

In addition to his experience at Iowa, Dobson worked for two years as an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Southern Methodist.

Jason Grooms enters his third season as a Vanderbilt football administrator. Grooms is serving his second season at Assistant Athletics Director for Football after being hired by Head Coach Derek Mason in 2014 as director of football operations.

Grooms continues a working relationship with Mason that dates back a decade. When Grooms became Ohio University's first director of football operations in 2005, Mason was the Bobcats' receivers coach.

Grooms oversees all facets of the Vanderbilt Football operations program, from the day-to-day operations to responsibilities including budget control, team travel, player development/unity council, office organization including staff and personnel coordination and the Gridiron Club.

Grooms has managed Vanderbilt's future scheduling under Mason. During the last two years, the Commodores have announced upcoming series with Stanford from the Pac 12, Kansas State of the Big 12, Purdue from the Big Ten, and Wake Forest from the ACC. Several agreements with Football Championship Series (FCS) teams also have been finalized.

Grooms has been active with several football projects at Vanderbilt. He oversaw a complete remodel of the football facilities with the additions of all new graphics in every area of the football complex, helped with the redesign of the John Rich Practice Complex synthetic turf and weight room, developed the player lounge and recruiting display room, and helped produce a stadium facelift consisting of graphics and bowl recognitions. He has also helped create a player development department, aided with a summer internship program that now includes student-athletes from other Vanderbilt sports, and introduced several new technologies such as iPad playbooks, Catapult testing and the Teamworks communication network.

Grooms has been an active member of the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) since 2001. He serves on the College Football Playoff National Championship Advisory Group and will serve as President of the AFCA National Committee for Directors of Football Operations in 2017. In 2013, Grooms was named FootballScoop.com's Director of Football Operations of the Year for his contributions at Ohio University.

Grooms was promoted to Ohio's assistant athletic director for football operations prior to the 2011 season after serving six years as the Bobcats' director of operations. During his time at Ohio, Grooms oversaw six major facility renovation projects. He also established a fundraising plan and designed the extensive locker room renovation at Ohio completed in 2015.

During Grooms' tenure, Ohio played in six bowl games and three Mid-American Conference championship games under Frank Solich.

Prior to joining Ohio, Grooms spent the 2004 season at Elon, serving as linebacker coach/recruiting coordinator. Grooms spent the 2003 season as outside linebackers coach and video coordinator at East Tennessee State.

Grooms began his career at Ohio as a student assistant from 1997-2001. After earning his degree, Grooms joined Ohio coach Jim Grobe at Wake Forest as a graduate assistant, working with WFU safeties in 2001 and linebackers in 2002.

Grooms graduated from Ohio in 2001 with a bachelor's in sports sciences. He earned his master's in recreation and sports sciences from Ohio in 2011.

Stewart was a two-time All-America cornerback at Northern Arizona. He was selected by Houston in the fifth round of the 1996 NFL draft.

Stewart earned a bachelor's in advertising from Northern Arizona, and master's in education administration from Tennessee State.

Stewart and his wife, Sonia, have four children: ShaRae, Tre, Mycah and Jadyn. His wife is an executive principal in the Nashville school system, and earned her doctorate of education at Vanderbilt.

### Playing the Texas State Fair

Before Oklahoma and Texas started the Red River Shootout, it was Vanderbilt vs. Texas at the Texas State Fair in Dallas. Vanderbilt won five of seven games with the Longhorns between 1921 and 1928.

### Aug. 10, 1918

One of the greatest and most beloved 'Dores of all-time, Irby "Rabbit" Curry, gave his life defending America in the skies over France.

Curry was a standout quarterback from 1914-16, a scholar and student leader. As a senior, classmates elected him "Bachelor of Ugliness" — the highest award given to a male Vanderbilt undergrad.

### Oct. 14, 1922

McGugin invites powerful Michigan as the Commodores' initial opponent in Dudley Field. The teams play to a 0-0 tie before a huge crowd. The tie was preserved when captain Jess Neely recovered a fumble near in Commodore goal.

## Nov. 22, 1941

In his second year, Sanders returned the 'Dores to prominence. Their 7-0 win over Alabama on this date gave the team an 8-1 mark.

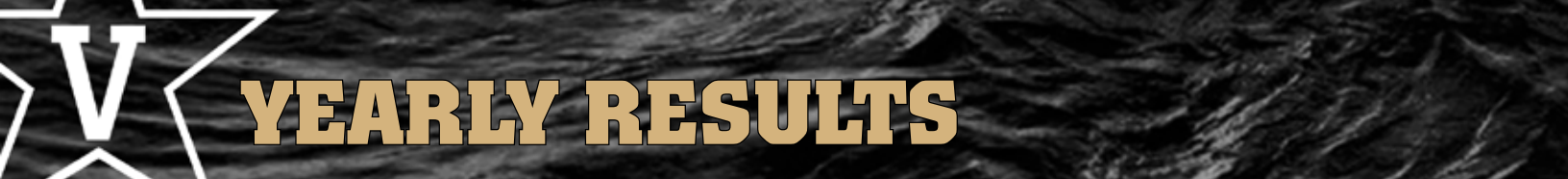

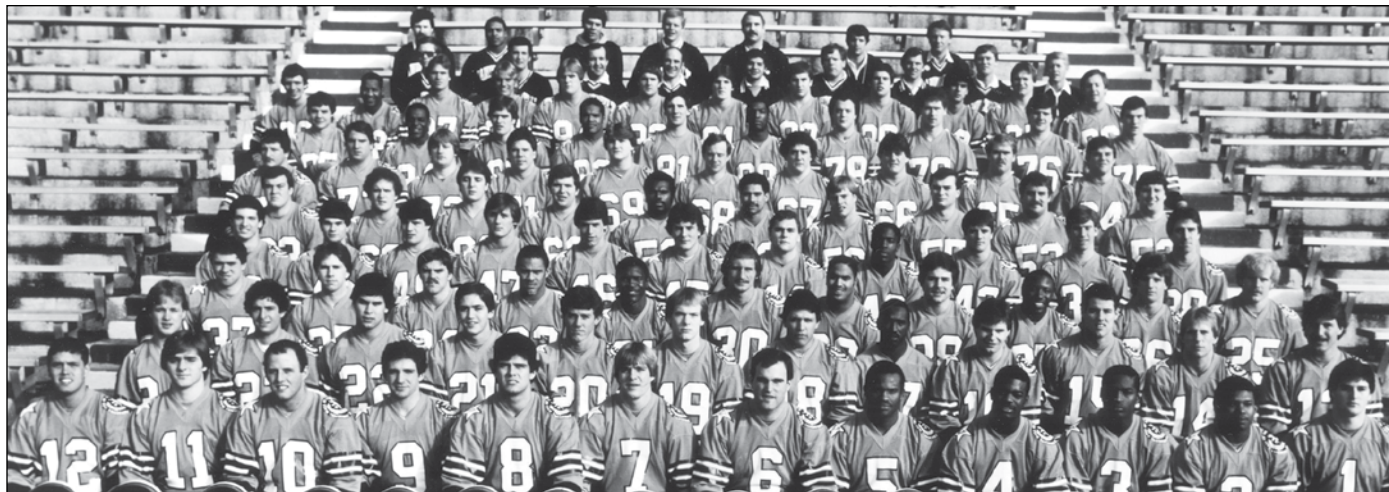

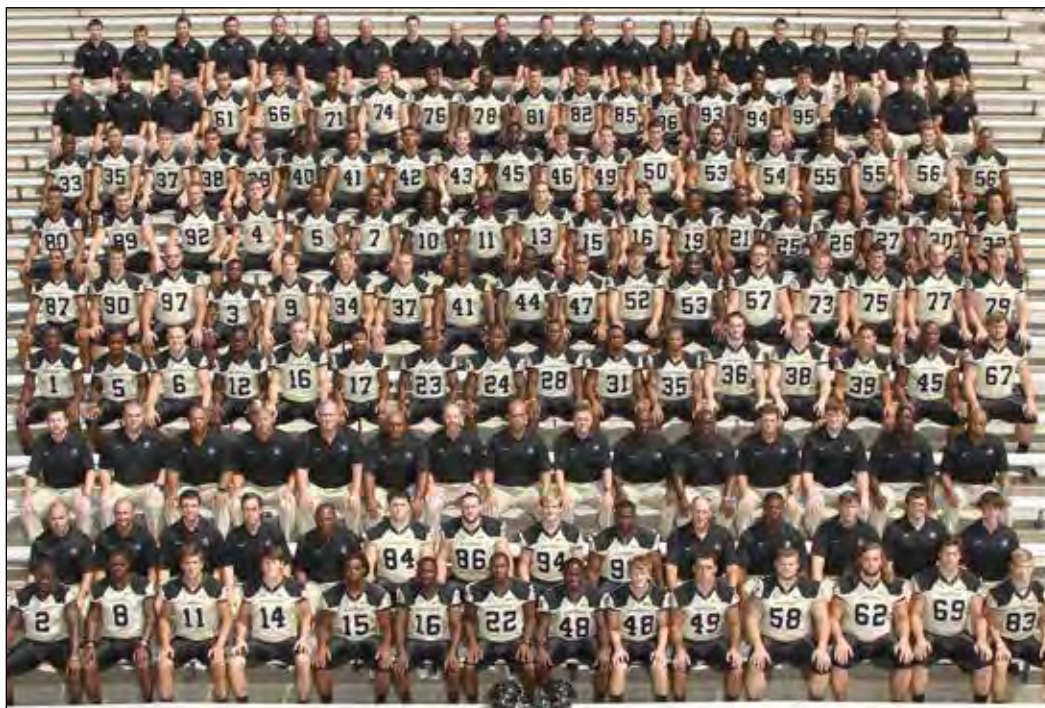

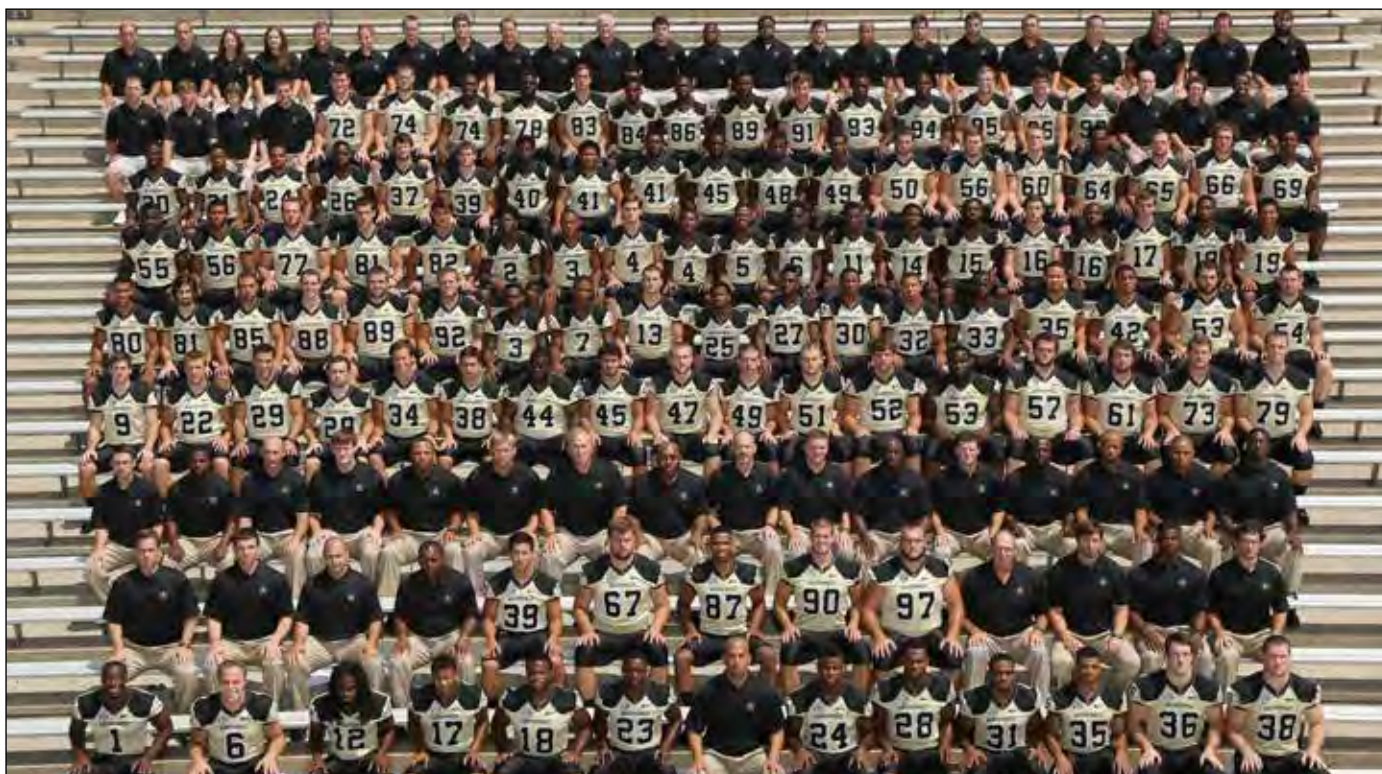
Nov. 17, 2012

# ALL-AMERICANS

## ZACH CUNNINGHAM LINEBACKER, 2015



After starting his sophomore season as a reserve in 2015, Cunningham became one of the SEC's most productive performers.

Cunningham was named as a third team All-America linebacker by Phil Steele Publications after topping the Commodores with virtually every

defensive statistic, including 103 total tackles, 69 solo tackles, tackles for loss, forced fumbles and fumble recoveries.

Cunningham's season total of 16.5 tackles for loss ranked third among all SEC players and was the highest total by a Commodore defender since Jamie Winborn registered 23 tackles for loss in 1999.

Cunningham also ranked among the SEC's top three players with four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

Cunningham earned consensus first team All-SEC recognition after the 2015 season.

## JORDAN MATTHEWS WIDE RECEIVER, 2012, 2013



Jordan Matthews put together arguably the greatest receiving season ever by a SEC player.

As a senior, Matthews earned First Team All-America honors from USA Today and Athlons. He was named on second or third teams by the AP, SI.com and CBS Sports.

In 2013, Matthews set new SEC records with 112 receptions, 262 career catches, and 3,759 receiving yards. Matthews' 1,477 receiving yards in 2013 also broke a team record, as did his career touchdown reception total of 24.

As a junior in 2012, Matthews had 94 catches for 1,323 receiving yards and eight touchdown catches. He earned third team All-America from CBS Sports and Phil Steele that season.

Matthews enjoyed his finest games against top competition. He averaged more than 110 receiving yards against SEC foes as a junior and senior.

## CASEY HAYWARD DEFENSIVE BACK, 2011



Defensive back Casey Hayward capped a remarkable career in 2011 by earning second team All-America honors from the Walter Camp Football Federation.

He was also recognized on All-America teams by Rivals.com, Yahoo! Sports, and Phil Steele

Publications.

Hayward, of Perry, Ga., finished his career with 15 interceptions, and shares the team career mark with former All-America Leonard Coleman.

As a senior, Hayward contributed seven picks and matched his team record with 17 passes defended, helping the Commodores to an appearance in the AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

A three-year starter, Hayward also holds the Vanderbilt career mark with 46 passes defended.

He was selected by Green Bay in the second round of the 2012 NFL Draft.

## D.J. MOORE DEFENSIVE BACK, 2008



In 2008, Moore became the first cornerback to earn All-America honors in 25 years.

He was named second team by Associated Press, *Sporting News*, *SI.com* and *Rivals.com* after a sensational junior season.

Moore posted six interceptions and

58 tackles, contributing to the 'Dores' 7-6 campaign that ended with a win over Boston College at the Gaylord Hotels Music City Bowl.

He ended his career tied for second among Commodores with 13 career interceptions.

Moore also was the SEC's most versatile player in 2008, also seeing action as a running back, wide receiver and return specialist. In a late-season win at Kentucky, he achieved a truly rare feat with a 2-interception, 2-TD catch effort.

Moore was selected in the fourth round by the Chicago Bears. He enjoyed a four-year NFL career, playing with Chicago, Carolina and Tampa Bay.

## EARL BENNETT WIDE RECEIVER, 2006



Bennett concluded his career as the SEC's all-time leading receiver.

As a sophomore in 2006, the Birmingham product was named third-team All-America by *Rivals.com* in 2006 after catching 82 passes.

After three years, Bennett left Vandy

with 236 career catches, nearly 30 more than any other SEC receiver up to that time. Today, he ranks second all-time in the SEC and at Vanderbilt in career receptions.

In 2007, Bennett caught 75 passes, becoming the only receiver in SEC history to post three straight seasons with at least 75 catches.

Bennett was a three-time All-SEC recipient.

Many fans remember Bennett and Jay Cutler connecting on many memorable plays in the 2005 season, including the game-winning touchdown to defeat Tennessee in Knoxville.

Bennett was selected by Chicago in the third round of the 2008 draft. He played five years with the Bears.

## JAMIE WINBORN LINEBACKER, 1999



Winborn was named All-America by *Football News* following the 1999 season after leading the 'Dores and the SEC with 141 tackles. It was the second straight year that Winborn led the league in tackles.

A two-time All-SEC Coaches selection, Winborn

was the complete linebacker package in 1999. He was a run stopper who delivered punishing blows, making plays sideline to sideline.

He led the squad with a team-record 23 tackles for loss. Winborn's season included a 20-tackle, two-sack performance versus South Carolina.

Winborn finished his Commodore career with 377 total tackles, 45 tackles for loss, 16.5 QB sacks and six forced fumbles. Winborn topped the squad in solo tackles for three consecutive years.

Winborn was selected by the 49ers in the 2001 NFL Draft. He has played with the 49ers, Bucs, Broncos and Titans.

# ALL-AMERICANS

## JAMIE DUNCAN LINEBACKER, 1997



Duncan was a dominating linebacker and a player who always rose to the occasion.

In 1997, Duncan was named First Team All-America by the Football Writers Assn. He was also named Second Team All-America by the Associated Press

and *Football News*.

In 1997, he became the only Commodore player to earn Associated Press SEC Defensive Player of the Year honors. He also received similar recognition from the *Mobile Press Register*.

As a junior, Duncan amassed 152 tackles, six sacks, 14 tackles for loss and five forced fumbles. He finished his career with 425 tackles. His effort against No. 1 Florida remains one of the best ever by a Commodore.

Duncan's NFL career included stops with Bucs, Rams and Falcons.

Duncan was named to the Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame in 2013.

## BILL MARINANGEL PUNTER, 1996



Marinangel was named First Team All-America by the *Sporting News* in 1996 after topping the NCAA in punting.

Marinangel is perhaps best remembered for one heroic play in his senior year. In the second game against Alabama, Marinangel

surprised the Tide special teams and 72,000 onlookers, as he took the snap from center, and then scampered 81 yards for an unbelievable and unlikely touchdown.

The run was the longest in the SEC that season and still stands as the longest in school history.

Marinangel's 46.6-yard average is the second highest single-season in team history.

His 79-yard punt versus South Carolina is also tied for the Commodores' second longest ever.

## BOO MITCHELL WIDE RECEIVER, 1988



In 1988, Mitchell was a Third Team All-America after compiling one of the finest seasons ever by a Commodore receiver.

Teaming with quarterback Eric Jones, Mitchell hauled in 78 catches for 1,213 yards and five

touchdowns. The receiving yardage total remains a Vanderbilt team record and the SEC's seventh highest total ever. He surpassed 100 yards receiving in six games that season.

Mitchell burst onto the SEC scene as a freshman, hauling in a team-record 45 receptions. He added 31 and 34 receptions as a sophomore and junior, respectively.

Mitchell ranks among team leaders in virtually every career receiving category. He tops the list, — and ranks third all-time in the SEC, with 2,964 receiving yards.

## CHRIS GAINES LINEBACKER, 1987



A Nashville native, Gaines was selected First Team Kodak All-America by the nation's football coaches. In 1987, he established an SEC single-season record for total tackles with 214.

*Nashville Tennessean* columnist Larry

Woody once described Gaines as "sort of a Rambo on a leash." An avid weightlifter, Gaines was one of the strongest Commodores of his era.

Gaines also posted one of the greatest efforts ever by a 'Dore as a senior by recording a school-record 37 tackles versus Tulane.

After the season, he was named MVP of the Blue-Gray Game after racking up 18 tackles and was named Tennessee Amateur Athlete of the Year by the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame.

Gaines played two years in the NFL, then returned to Vanderbilt as an assistant football coach from 1995-97.

## RICKY ANDERSON PUNTER, 1984



Anderson arrived on campus as a walk-on. Four years later, he departed as the nation's top punter-kicker in the nation and a consensus All-American.

Anderson's senior season was remarkable. As a punter, he topped

the nation with a 48.2-yard average. It remains as the highest yearly punting average ever in the SEC by more than a yard. Anderson's 1984 campaign also is tied for seventh all-time in NCAA history. Following the 1984 season, he was named a consensus First Team All-American.

Anderson holds several team kicking marks. Besides the single-season average record, his 82-yard punt against Georgia in 1984 remains the longest in team history.

Anderson's career average of 45.6 yards also ranks first, as does his single-season scoring total of 73 points in 1982. He also ranks third on the team's all-time scoring list with 192 points.

## LEONARD COLEMAN DEFENSIVE BACK, 1983



Coleman was named First Team All-America in 1983 by the Gannett News Service and was a Third Team All-America selection by the Associated Press.

A consensus All-SEC selection, Coleman left Vanderbilt rated as the nation's No. 1

cornerback by NFL scouts.

Coleman was a four-year starter. As a freshman, he contributed four interceptions, including a team-record tying three picks in a victory over Chattanooga.

Coleman's efforts as a junior was a key for Vanderbilt's Hall of Fame Bowl season in 1982, including a pair of interceptions in the season-opening win over Memphis. He finished the year by setting a team mark with eight INTs.

He remains tied for team record with 15 career interceptions.

Coleman played professionally in the USFL and several seasons in the NFL with the Colts.



# V ALL-AMERICANS

## CHUCK SCOTT

TIGHT END, 1983



Early in his career, Scott struggled to make an impact at flanker. He just needed to switch positions.

In 1983, Scott blossomed after moving to tight end. Scott hauled in 70 receptions and nine touchdowns to tie the

existing NCAA record for catches by a tight end. He was named First Team All-America by *The Sporting News*.

Scott followed up that season by posting 54 receptions and eight TD catches in 1984.

Scott also contributed 21 receptions in the Commodores' 1982 Hall of Fame Bowl season.

A two-time Academic All-SEC selection, Scott ranks among the team leaders in several career receiving records. His 20 career touchdown receptions remains the second most in school history. Scott also ranks sixth all-time with 145 catches and fifth with 2,219 receiving yards,

## JIM ARNOLD

PUNTER, 1982



Arnold became the first Vanderbilt kicking specialist to receive All-America honors, paving the way for several kicking standouts to follow in his footsteps.

A native of Dalton, Ga., Arnold quickly impacted the squad, breaking the freshman

mark with a 41.9-yard avg. By the time he graduated, coach George McIntyre said, "Jim's the best kicker in the country, pro or college."

As a senior in 1982, he was named to six All-America teams after averaging a then-record 45.8-yard average.

Arnold ended his career with a 43.9-yard average. Arnold's senior average remains third all-time by a 'Dore and fifth all-time by a SEC punter. He owns two of the longest punts in team history, including a 79-yarder at Ole Miss.

After Vanderbilt, Arnold took his game to the NFL, enjoying an 11-year pro career.

He was inducted into the Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame in 2009.

## ALLAMA MATTHEWS

TIGHT END, 1982



Early in his Vanderbilt career, coaches tried Matthews at safety and receiver. Once all parties settled on tight end, Matthews put together one of the finest receiving campaigns ever, helping spark the team's run to the Hall of Fame Bowl.

In 1982, Matthews was named First Team All-America by *Football News* after posting 61 receptions for 797 yards and 14 TDs, most ever by a Commodore. Later that season, Matthews was also named SEC Offensive Lineman of the Year by the Atlanta Touchdown Club.

Matthews also earned First Team All-SEC honors by the Associated Press and United Press International in 1982.

He concluded his career with 18 touchdowns.

Matthews was drafted and played three seasons with the Atlanta Falcons.

## PRESTON BROWN

BACK, 1979



Brown was named Third Team All-America as a senior after posting career receiving marks in 1979. He topped all SEC receivers with 52 catches, good for 786 yards and three TDs.

Brown's season was topped by three 100-yard

receiving games, including a 175-yard output versus Ole Miss.

Brown also was a dynamic returner for the Commodores. He remains sixth on team's all-time leaders for kickoff returns and fifth in punt returns. Brown also returned three kickoffs for scores. His 100-yard kickoff return against Ole Miss in 1977 remains the longest in team history.

After finishing his senior season, Brown played in the Blue-Gray Classic and Senior Bowl.

He played three seasons for the New England Patriots and one year each for the New York Jets and Cleveland Browns.

## BARRY BURTON

TIGHT END, 1974



As a junior in 1974, the Nashville native helped the 'Dores to a 7-4 regular season record and berth in the 1974 Peach Bowl.

He was named First Team All-America by *Football News*. He was also a First Team All-SEC

pick.

Burton was a genuine triple-threat. In addition to receiving, he also ran the end-around, and handled punting duties. In 1974, Burton caught 22 passes for 378 yards and three touchdowns; ran 31 times for 307 yards and a score; and punted 54 times for a 40.2-yard average.

As a senior, Burton came back to catch a career-high 31 passes and two touchdowns.

As a punter, Burton has two of the longest efforts in team: a 79-yarder versus Georgia in 1973 and a 78-yarder versus Kentucky in 1975.

## BOB ASHER

OFFENSIVE TACKLE, 1969



Virginia native Asher started every game of his three-year varsity Vanderbilt career, concluding with the Associated Press and NEA naming him to the First Team All-American squad at tackle.

Asher was

known as an impenetrable pass blocker, regarded by observers as one of the top blocking tackles in school history. He also earned First Team All-SEC and All-South honors as a junior.

Asher later played in the College All-Star Game, the Senior Bowl, the North-South Shrine Game and the Canadian American Bowl.

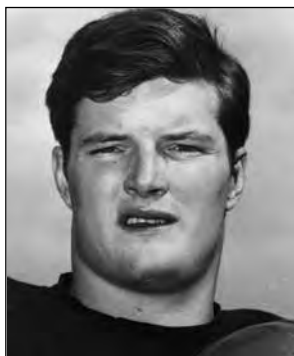
In 1970, he was drafted by Dallas. One of his Cowboys' teammates was a former Vanderbilt teammate, defensive lineman Pat Toomay. Together, they played key roles in the Cowboy's 1971 squad that eventually won the Super Bowl.

# ALL-AMERICANS



## CHIP HEALY

LINEBACKER, 1968



A product of Chattanooga, Heal's All-America recognition as a defensive standout set the stage for numerous Commodore linebackers to follow in his footsteps.

In 1968,

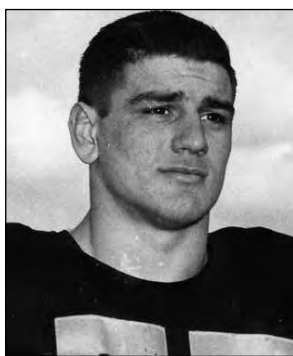
Healy was named First Team All-American by the Central Press and Second Team All-American by The Sporting News.

Healy played superb defense as a junior after injuring his knee the previous spring. As a senior, Healy topped the Commodores in total tackles. He registered six interceptions in his career.

Healy played in the East-West Shrine Bowl and Senior Bowl, and was selected by the St. Louis Cardinals in the 1968 draft. He played two seasons in the NFL.

## GEORGE DIEDERICH

GUARD, 1958



Known to his teammates as "LuLu", Deiderich was a two-way line standout for the Commodores, culminating a Vanderbilt career by earning First Team All-America honors by Associated

Press, the nation's coaches, *Look Magazine*, and the FWAA.

He was also named First Team All-SEC in 1957 and 1958. Deiderich played both offensive and defensive guard.

Deiderich was also an outstanding track athlete, setting a school record in the high hurdles.

After his senior season, Deiderich represented the Commodores at the Senior Bowl. Drafted by the Rams, Deiderich decided to take his football talents north of the border to Montreal in the Canadian Football League.

## CHARLEY HORTON

RUNNING BACK, 1955



Horton was named Third Team All-America by INS after a superb 1955 season in which he established a then-school mark of 12 TDs.

Horton's outstanding play propelled the 'Dores to an

8-3 season and their first ever bowl game – a 25-13 win over Auburn in the Gator Bowl.

Horton had a knack for getting the 'Dores on the scoreboard, as he scored the first touchdown in seven of the 10 regular season contests in the 1955 season. Horton was an outstanding returner, and still ranks second all-time with a 14.4-yard punt return average.

Though selected 11th overall by the Rams in the 1956 draft, Horton joined the military.

Horton is a member of the 2015 Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame class.

## BILL WADE

QUARTERBACK, 1951



A Nashville legend, Wade was the 1951 SEC Player of the Year and a Second Team All-America by the Associated Press.

A *Look Magazine* coverboy, Wade set virtually every Commodore

passing record. As a junior in 1950, Wade threw for 16 TDs, a total not eclipsed by a Vanderbilt quarterback until Whit Taylor threw for 22 TDs in 1982.

Wade is one of the team's most celebrated players. He remains the only Vanderbilt player selected No. 1 overall in the NFL Draft – taken by Los Angeles in 1952. He had a 14-year career with the Rams and Chicago, and led the Bears to the 1963 NFL title, rushing for two TDs in the championship game over the N.Y. Giants.

Wade is a member of the first Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame class inducted in 2008. He died in early 2016 after a long illness.

## BOB WERCKLE

TACKLE, 1951



A New Jersey native, Werckle overcame injuries to become one of the team's finest linemen. In 1951, he was named as a Second Team All-America by INS and the AP.

By 1949, he was given little chance to

succeed after twice breaking a leg in practice. By 1950, the injury jinx was beaten, with Werckle playing more minutes than any teammate. Across the South, Werckle was known for his blocking and tackling abilities.

In 1951, Werckle earned First Team All-SEC recognition after serving as a captain.

Werckle was selected in the NFL Draft by Detroit. Later, he earned with distinction as a Marine Corps officer in Korea.

## BUCKY CURTIS

RECEIVER, 1950



One of the team's first downfield receiving threats, Curtis was selected First Team All-American by the Football Writers, INS and *Look Magazine* in 1950.

He ranked among the nation's best

receiving yardage in 1950. As a senior, Curtis led the team to a 7-4 record, and set a SEC mark with 791 receiving yards. He still ranks fifth all-time on the team with 17 TDs.

After his senior season, Curtis was named MVP of the Senior Bowl, and played in the College All-Star Game. He was selected in the second round of the NFL Draft by Cleveland.

He went on to serve in the Navy. In 1975, he received the NCAA Silver Anniversary Award.

Curtis was inducted into the 2010 Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame class.



# ALL-AMERICANS

## BOB GUDE CENTER, 1941



Gude played three years of tremendous football before entering the military service during World War II.

Gude was named to the Fox-Movietone All-America

team in 1941.

As a center, Gude was frequently compared to former Commodore greats Carl Hinkle and Pete Gracey.

After his senior season, Gude was selected by Chicago Bears in the 1942 NFL Draft.

Gude played two seasons of pro football, starting with the Bears in 1942, then returning with Philadelphia in 1946.

## CARL HINKLE CENTER, 1937



Hinkle continued the Commodore tradition of quality centers. The 1937 captain was named First Team All-America by the Associated Press, Grantland

Rice, and Liberty.

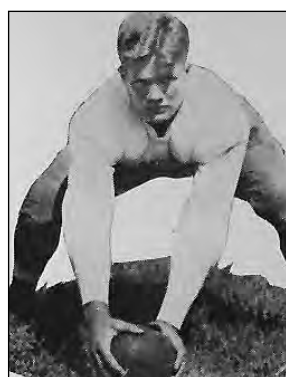
He was an ironman, playing every minute in seven games in 1937. Named the SEC's Most Valuable Player, Hinkle guided the squad within inches of the Rose Bowl.

Though selected by Philadelphia in the 11th round of the 1938 NFL Draft, Hinkle decided on another career path. After graduating, he entered West Point and earned the highest cadet honor. He then served with distinction in WWII.

Hinkle was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1959.

He was inducted into the 2010 Vanderbilt Athletics Hall of Fame class.

## PETE GRACEY CENTER, 1932



A native of nearby Franklin, Clarence "Pete" Gracey was an anchor on both the offense and and defense fronts.

In 1932, he became the last of 13 All-America

players mentored by Coach Dan McGugin.

While the last of McGugin's prize pupils, Gracey also ushered a decade of superb Vandy centers, including Carl Hinkle and Bob Gude.

In Gracey's final season, he opened holes for such backs as Dixie Roberts and Larry Burton as a center. A possible undefeated season ended in the finale when the 'Dores fell to Alabama.

A versatile athlete, he also lettered in baseball and basketball.

## JOHN BROWN GUARD, 1929



A senior captain, John Neil Brown was named First Team All-America by the nation's coaches. He also was a three-time All-Conference recipient.

Known as "Bull," Brown helped

anchor both sides of the line of scrimmage.

Brown was a key contributor on the line for the 1926 Commodores. He missed 1927, only to return as a standout in 1928-29. One of his best defensive games came against University of Minnesota legendary running back Bronko Nagurski.

Brown also was a standout rightfielder on the Vanderbilt baseball team.

## DICK ABERNATHY END, 1928



Abernathy earned All-America honors as an end in 1928, helping the 'Dores to an 8-2 record.

Abernathy had a key 38-yard touchdown catch that enabled the Commodores

to defeat visiting Colgate, 12-7.

A week later in Dallas, Abernathy blocked a punt that was recovered in the end zone which would stand up to be the winning score in the Commodores' 13-12 win over Texas.

## BILL SPEARS QUARTERBACK, 1927



One of Vandy's top offensive players ever, Spears was a acclaimed quarterback for some of McGugin's best Vanderbilt teams. In 1927, he was selected First Team All-America by NEA and

Associated Press.

In 1927, he guided the squad to an 8-1-2 record, including a win over Tulane when noted writer Blinkey Horn described Spears as "All-World" after a two-touchdown effort.

Spears concluded his career by outgaining the entire Alabama squad in a 14-7 Vanderbilt win.

Spears went on to chair his own law firm. He was a significant contributor to Vanderbilt, serving on the Board of Trust from 1954 until his death in 1992.

# ALL-AMERICANS



## HENRY WAKEFIELD

END, 1924

Known as "Hek," Wakefield was a two-way standout for McGugin's Commodores.

In 1924 was named First Team All-America by INS, Lawrence Perry, Outing and Billy Evans publications.

In 1922, Wakefield helped the 'Dores to a 8-0-1 campaign. He was a starter in the inaugural 0-0 game in Dudley Field against Michigan.

Wakefield starred on teams that went 26-5-4.

As injuries mounted in 1924, Wakefield was named captain. He quickly proved worthy of the honor, scoring twice in a win over Auburn, then defeating Georgia Tech with a 37-yard drop-kick field goal.



## LYNN BOMAR

END, 1923

A superb blocker and outstanding runner, Bomar was the first great end of the Dan McGugin Era.

Bomar was named All-America by Walter Camp.

Known to fans as the "Blonde Bear," Bomar helped Vanderbilt to "the Championship of the South."

His athletic career ended in 1924 when he suffered a brain hemorrhage following a blow to the chin. Though temporarily in danger, he fully recovered and enjoyed a distinguished law enforcement career.

He was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame in 1956.



## JOSH CODY

TACKLE, 1915, 1916, 1919

Cody is arguably the most decorated player in Vanderbilt team history.

Known as a punishing blocker, Cody is the only Commodore ever to earn All-America honors in three different seasons. The Football Writers Association honored Cody after the 1915, 1916 and 1919 seasons by the Football Writers Association.

Cody was the main ingredient of a powerful offensive line that propelled Vanderbilt to 23 wins in 25 games. He sparked the McGugin's famous "Point-A-Minute" offense of 1915.

Cody became a successful head coach, serving in that role at Clemson and Temple. Cody was inducted into the Football Hall of Fame in 1970.



## "RABBIT" CURRY

BACK, 1916

A legend in team history, Curry was superb on and off the field. Small in stature, Curry's display of talent, heart and leadership was cherished by fans.

Selected as a Third Team All-America in 1916, Curry was a field general at QB who displayed a knack for brilliant runs. The Texan guided the team to a 7-1-1 record in 1916 and directed the famous "Point-A-Minute" squad of 1915. He was also elected junior class president and as the school's prestigious Bachelor of Ugliness by the student body.

Curry's life was cut short. Just two years after graduating, Curry died when his plane was shot down over France in WWI.



## LEWIS HARDAGE

BACK, 1912

After transferring from Auburn to enter Dental School, Hardage was part of what observers called the Commodores' fastest backfield.

Hardage starred on tremendous squads. As captain in 1911-12, he helped Vanderbilt go 16-2-1 overall, and outscore their opponents 578-27.

Hardage earned Third Team All-America and All-Southern Conference recognition as a senior.

Hardage dominated several games in 1912, scoring 95 points for the squad that topped the nation in points.

He also was a chief factor in a pair of early season blowouts, 105-0 over Bethel and 100-0 against Maryville.



## RAY MORRISON

QUARTERBACK, 1911

When Morrison ended his career in 1911, McGugin called him "the best I ever saw."

More than two decades later, a panel of writers tabbed Morrison as VU's top QB through its first 50 years.

An All-America in 1911, Morrison was a talented player and leader. In his two years, the team went 16-1-1.

He later became a great coach, serving 34 seasons at the collegiate level. While McGugin served in the military during 1918, he was the team's interim coach. When McGugin retired in 1934, Morrison was his handpicked successor.

He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1954.



## W.E. METZGER

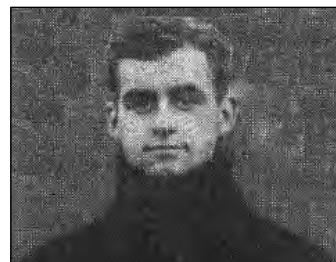
GUARD, 1910

Metzger was Dan McGugin's first great lineman, earning Third Team All-America recognition in 1910.

In 1909, Metzger was a sensation in the backfield, rushing for fourscores to singlehandedly beat Mercer 28-0, before suffering a leg fracture.

In 1910, he moved to the line, anchoring a unit that helped produce a 8-0-1 record. On defense, he assisted a unit that allowed only eight points.

Metzger shared the spotlight with QB Ray Morrison in 1911. He played brilliantly, helping the Commodores to a 8-1 record.



## OWSLEY MANIER

BACK, 1906

Joining the team in Dan McGugin's first year on campus, Manier was a three-year starter and a big reason why Vanderbilt became an instant Southern power under McGugin.

As the team's fullback, Manier was named All-America in 1906, becoming the first Commodore so honored.

He was an offensive machine for McGugin's squad, scoring three times against Kentucky and on five occasions in 78-0 victory over Alabama.

Manier was a key factor in the Commodores' 24-1 overall record.

Eventually, Manier returned to academia, and became professor emeritus of clinical medicine at the Vanderbilt School of Medicine.

**JACKSONVILLE** – Still hurting from a dislocated elbow suffered in the Tennessee game, quarterback Don Orr scored two touchdowns and set up another as the Commodores defeated No. 8-ranked Auburn in the 11th Gator Bowl 25-13.

The Vanderbilt defense provided a huge lift for the Commodores, recovering five fumbles in the victory.

Vanderbilt's first score was set up when Orr recovered an Auburn fumble. Eight plays later, Joe Stephenson ran seven yards for the VU touchdown.

Auburn answered on a 38-yard TD pass from Howell Tubbs to Rob James in the second quarter, but the rest of the game belonged to the Black and Gold. On Vanderbilt's following possession, Orr carried the ball 44 yards to the Tigers' 28. He then passed to Joe Scales, who advanced to the Auburn 4-yard line. On the next play, Orr carried the ball over the line after a fake to fullback Phil King to give Vanderbilt a 13-7 lead at the half.

At the opening of the third quarter, Vanderbilt guard Sonny Tatum recovered an Auburn fumble, and the Commodores marched quickly into scoring position as Orr crossed the goal line for his second touchdown of the day to make the score 19-7. Both teams scored once more in the fourth quarter. Vanderbilt's score came on a one-yard run off right tackle by Charley Horton.

Vanderbilt coach Art Guepe cleared his bench in the final minutes, using 38 of the 39 men dressed for the game. Capitalizing on Auburn's five fumbles and using an ailing quarterback, the Commodores captured its first bowl appearance.

**ATLANTA, Ga.** – The 1974 Peach Bowl was a game with no champion but two winners, the Commodores and Texas Tech Red Raiders.

Despite the effective rushing of Red Raider tailback Larry Isaac and fullback Cliff Hoskins, the Commodore defense held Texas Tech without points in the first half and entered halftime with a 3-0 lead after Mark Adams kicked a 31-yard field goal with 10 minutes remaining.

Neither team was able to muster much offense in the third quarter, though Texas Tech did tie the score at 3-3 after a drive stalled at the Vanderbilt 16-yard line.

Early in the fourth quarter, the Commodores' freshman lineman Dennis Harrison stopped a deep Texas Tech threat by blocking a Red Raider field goal attempt. The Tech drive started following one of two Vanderbilt turnovers during the game.

After the blocked field goal, the Commodores responded with a possession that ended with Adams' second field goal of the day, a 26-yarder that resulted in a 6-3 Vanderbilt margin. However, Texas Tech tied the game at the 2:00 mark on a 35-yard field goal by Brian Hall. On its final drive, Vanderbilt could not move into scoring range.

The Commodore offense struggled much of the day, with quarterback David Lee hitting just five of 14 attempts. Running back Jamie O'Rourke had 76 rushing yards.

The limited offensive production from both teams resulted in numerous defensive and scoring records being set in the game.

Within hours of the conclusion, Vanderbilt Head Coach Steve Sloan announced he was leaving his position to accept the head coaching job at Texas Tech.

## 1982 HALL OF FAME BOWL

12/31/1982 • Legion Field, Birmingham, Ala.

### VANDERBILT 28 AIR FORCE 36

**BIRMINGHAM, Ala.** – Without question, the Hall of Fame Bowl was one of college football's most exciting 1982 postseason games.

The game matched one of the nation's most potent aerial attacks featuring Vanderbilt All-SEC quarterback Whit Taylor and one of America's most devastating rushing attacks in the Falcons' vaunted option attack.

Offensively, this game lived up to the hype as 33 Hall of Fame records were broken and another eight were tied in Legion Field. Unfortunately for Vanderbilt, Air Force walked away the winner 36-28 after a remarkable comeback.

For three quarters, Whit Taylor was unstoppable. Connecting with a variety of wide receivers and running backs, Taylor's fourth touchdown pass of the game, a four-yarder to Norman Jordan, gave the Commodores a 28-17 margin entering the fourth quarter. Down by double digits, the Air Force Academy scored rushing touchdowns on three consecutive possessions to take the victory.

Taylor was named the Most Valuable Player, after completing a team-record 38 passes of 51 attempts for 452 yards, which remains as the second highest single-game passing yardage total in Vanderbilt history. Jordan's performance arguably was more remarkable. Though rushing for just four yards, Jordan hauled in 20 receptions for 173 yards and three TDs, breaking five Hall of Fame Bowl records.

The Commodores played musical chairs at quarterback, giving redshirt freshman Larry Smith his first career start.

Hahnfeldt, a Nashville product playing his final game as a Commodore, matched a single-game career high with the three field goals. The Commodores also forced two interceptions while allowing none.

Vanderbilt, founded 143 years ago by a \$1 million gift by Commodore Cornelius Vanderbilt, is one of the nation's leading institutions of higher learning, a mid-size, private comprehensive research university that emphasizes undergraduate learning and living experiences.

Members of the 2016-17 undergraduate student body, including Vanderbilt student-athletes, are outstanding

academic achievers and active participants in the campuses' many organizations and activities. They also compose the most diverse enrollment ever as Vanderbilt continues to attract students from many ethnic, cultural, socio-economic, geographic and religious backgrounds.

Since its inception, the university has taken great pride in the quality of education – and quality of life – its students enjoy. Each of the four undergraduate colleges – College of Arts and Science, School of Engineering, Blair School of Music and Peabody College – attracts students with varying goals and dreams.

At Vanderbilt, professors know their students' names and take an interest in students' ideas. Recognized globally for their research and scholarship prowess, faculty members believe in the importance of

## WARREN, MOORE COLLEGE HALLS ADD TO RARE ON-CAMPUS LIVING EXPERIENCES FOR UNDERGRADS

Vanderbilt's national reputation of providing students with a remarkable on-campus living experience were enhanced in 2015 with the christening of the beautiful Warren and Moore residential college halls.

Warren and Moore college halls, each accommodating nearly 350 upper-class students, are located on the university's scenic main campus directly across from historic Kirkland Hall. A mixture of sophomores, juniors and seniors – to be led by a faculty director and two graduate students in residence – call Warren and Moore home during the academic year.

The signatures of a two-year College Halls of Kissam construction project, Warren and Moore halls join The Martha Rivers Ingram Commons as elite on-campus living and learning experiences on the American higher education landscape. The Ingram Commons, opened in 2007 and home to Vanderbilt's entire first-year population, consists of 10 modern residential "houses" and a Commons Center located in the southeast quadrant of Vanderbilt, on its Peabody campus.

The Ingram Commons also was showcased in October 2008 when ESPN selected the site as its location for the popular *College Football GameDay* broadcast prior to airing Vanderbilt's victory over Auburn on campus.

# CHANCELLOR ZEPPOS

Vanderbilt Chancellor Nicholas S. Zeppos continues to demonstrate his appreciation for and commitment to the University's athletic program in a variety of ways.

For the eighth time since becoming Chancellor in 2008, Zeppos will put on his running shoes to lead the 2016 freshman class through the Vanderbilt Stadium tunnel and across Dudley Field in the Anchor Dash, moments before the Commodores kick off their new football season against South Carolina.

His active role in Southeastern Conference leadership and regulatory issues and his vocal support of college athletics becoming more diverse and inclusive are just two examples of how Zeppos' influence has been felt far beyond the Nashville campus.

Zeppos has taken a keen interest in athletics at Vanderbilt during his more than two decades at the University.

"I don't call the plays. I don't throw the passes. I see my job as simply trying to do whatever I can to support all of the talented people who do these things," Zeppos said.

This past spring the chancellor displayed that support yet again during the hiring of Bryce Drew and Stephanie White to lead the Commodores' men's and women's respective basketball programs. Both coaches are regarded as among the nation's best.

At an April press conference, Zeppos shared that he spent lots of time with Drew during the selection process. "I became very convinced that Bryce Drew was our choice," he said. "He will be a great representative of Vanderbilt."

Just a month later, Zeppos again took to the podium. "Above all else, academics, research, scholarship, and service define the Vanderbilt experience, yet we also compete at the highest levels in athletics," he said as he announced White's hiring. "Coach White's values align perfectly with those of our University community."

In the mid-1960s, Wallace became the first African-American to play basketball in the SEC. He has gone on to a distinguished career, and currently is a professor at Washington College of Law.

Zeppos previously endorsed an athletics capital improvement plan that has surpassed \$60 million, orchestrating efforts to improve the student experience for athletes and assist with recruiting.

"One thing I consider the ultimate compliment is when a coach calls me and says, 'I've got a couple of recruits here. Could you meet them?'" Zeppos has said.

A distinguished legal scholar, teacher and executive, Zeppos served from 2002 to February 2008 as Vanderbilt's chief academic officer, overseeing the University's undergraduate, graduate, and professional education programs as well as research efforts in liberal arts and sciences, engineering, music, education, business, law and divinity. As provost and vice chancellor, he chaired Vanderbilt's budgeting and capital planning council and led all fundraising and alumni relations efforts across the institution, in addition to overseeing the dean of students and dean of admissions.

Zeppos has led a number of important initiatives at Vanderbilt, including the planning process for The Ingram Commons, a landmark transformation of the first-year experience; Warren and Moore colleges; and Vanderbilt Barnard College, the next phase of the university's unique living-learning residential college system. Other key advancements include restructuring of the institution to split out clinical health care operations into a new corporate entity; the Strategic Academic Planning Group; innovative efforts in undergraduate admissions and financial aid; and the development of new programs in Jewish studies, law and economics and genetics, among others. In February of 2016, Zeppos was honored by Insight Into Diversity magazine for his commitment to diversity and inclusion with its national Giving Back award.

In a bold move to strengthen Vanderbilt's commitment to admitting undergraduates on the basis of accomplishment and achievement, rather than their ability to pay, Zeppos significantly expanded the financial aid program in 2009. By replacing undergraduate, need-based loans with grant and scholarship assistance, the University opened its doors wider to highly talented and qualified students of all economic, cultural and geographical backgrounds. The expanded aid program is funded by a combination of strategic budget allocations and gifts from thousands of generous donors to the current Opportunity Vanderbilt campaign.

Zeppos was recognized with five teaching awards at the law school before serving as an associate dean, associate provost, and provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. He served as interim chancellor for eight months prior to being formally appointed as Vanderbilt's eighth chancellor on March 1, 2008.

Zeppos serves on the National Security Higher Education Advisory Board; the Foundation for Educational Exchange Between Canada and the United States of America (Fulbright Canada) Board of Directors; and the Conexión Américas Board of Directors. He also served as president of the Southeastern Conference from June 2014 to June 2016.

From 1982 to 1987, Zeppos practiced law in Washington, D.C., at the United States Department of Justice and at Wilmer, Cutler & Pickering, where he specialized in appellate litigation involving complex regulatory, statutory and constitutional matters.

A Milwaukee native, Zeppos is a 1979 magna cum laude graduate of the University of Wisconsin Law School, where he served as editor-in-chief of the Wisconsin Law Review and was selected as the outstanding graduate of his class. He studied history during his undergraduate years at the university, where he was a 1976 Phi Beta Kappa graduate.

He is married to Lydia A. Howarth, an accomplished editor. They have two sons, Benjamin and Nicholas.

# A.D. DAVID WILLIAMS II



Vanderbilt Director of Athletics David Williams II ranks among the university's most prominent leaders.

Aside from his role in McGugin Center, Williams is Vice-Chancellor for University Affairs and Athletics as well as a tenured professor at the University's nationally ranked law school. He continues to teach at the Law School where he conducts courses on Taxation and Education as well as Sports Law. He is also an active participant in the SEC and NCAA in matters of negotiations, reforms, enforcements and planning. Williams is a regular speaker on collegiate athletics and recently spoke at the Law Schools at Harvard and Arizona State; he also served as

the keynote speaker at the Black Male Student Athlete Summit at the University of Texas.

Since adding athletics to his multiple titles and responsibilities in 2002, Vanderbilt has seen its athletic department and its individual programs recognized as being among the nation's most innovative and successful. The 2015-16 academic year may have been one of the best yet under Williams' leadership.

Nine Vanderbilt teams reached NCAA postseason competition, including a Final Four appearance by the defending 2015 NCAA national champion women's tennis team and a second straight top eight finish by the men's Golf team. The baseball team holds the title of 2014 College World Series champions and 2015 runner-ups and again made it to the 2016 NCAA playoffs, while the women's bowling team finished in the top ten for the fourth consecutive years.

Academically, Vanderbilt student-athletes amassed a 3.11 cumulative GPA for the 2016 Spring semester, with seven teams achieving the highest APR in the SEC. The department finished its 10th straight year with an overall achieved GPA over 3.0. Five Commodore teams posted perfect APR scores, while three teams had every member of their team achieve a GPA of 3.0 or better. Fourteen of the varsity teams achieved a GPA of 3.0 or higher in the 2015 - 16 academic year. The last Federal Graduation Rate (FGR) information, released in November of 2015, recorded Vanderbilt's Student Athlete Graduation rate at 92 percent, which was within one percent of Vanderbilt's overall graduation rate.

In the spring of 2016, Williams again demonstrated his hiring prowess. Williams orchestrated two successful searches resulting in the hiring of two of the nation's top basketball coaches, Bryce Drew and Stephanie White, to led the respective Vanderbilt men's and women's programs. In addition, the return of Commodore legend and favorite Carolyn Peck as a member of the women's staff was very well received by the Vanderbilt faithful.

Drew and White join a growing list of highly regarded head coaches hired by Williams, including head football coach Derek Mason, who came onboard in 2013. The next year, Williams attracted Darren Ambrose from the University of Pennsylvania to direct the women's soccer program. In 2012, Williams directed the search for men's golf coach Scott Limbaugh, who has since led the team in back to back NCAA Final Eight appearances. In addition, Williams has hired Greg Allen (women's golf coach), Ian Duvenhage (men's tennis coach) and Steven Keith (cross country/track coach), all who have taken their teams to NCAA postseason. Allen and Keith have also guided their teams to SEC Championships. Williams has also retained top coaches and staffs by orchestrating extensions for baseball coach Tim Corbin, women's tennis coach Geoff MacDonald, women's bowling coach John Williamson and women's lacrosse coach Cathy Swezey.

Williams has addressed numerous facility upgrades, including a state-of-the-art training center which opened February 2016 in McGugin Center. The new training center provides top-notch medical care for Vanderbilt student-athletes. Crews recently finished replacing the football practice field, on the John Rich Practice Facility, with highly sought after Shaw Sports synthetic turf. Ground was broken immediately after this past baseball season for a new expansion of our wonderful baseball complex, Hawkins Field. Other improvements in recent years include refurbishing of Vanderbilt Stadium and its football locker rooms, an addition of new tennis courts and amenities at Brownlee O. Currey Tennis Center, renovations in Memorial Gym and McGugin Center, a new multi-purpose facility for athletic and general university use, a new four-lane bowling center and a clubhouse with hitting bays for our men's and women's golf programs.

An initiative to allow more overseas travel and study abroad for Vanderbilt

student-athletes also has become reality during Williams' tenure. Three years ago, 15 athletes ventured to Tanzania during the summer for a service trip to bring shoes to underprivileged communities in Africa in conjunction with Soles4Souls. The partnership continued in 2014 with another community service effort to Costa Rica. In 2015, Williams led the summer service trip to Cuba. Vanderbilt athletes were honored to be in Havana during the opening of the new United States Embassy and were able to be a part of the first briefing. More students within Vanderbilt's athletic community were able to study abroad, football players Ralph Webb, Jonathan Wynn and Emmanuel Smith were among the participants. Last year, the Athletic Department began a newly created Internship Program for student-athletes which matches them with employers who provide real life training for life after college. The program has received rave reviews from the student athletes, the employers, the NCAA as well as other colleges and universities.

In association with Vanderbilt Athletics, Williams has served as a member of the SEC team that negotiated past ESPN and CBS television partner contracts. Williams also serves as Chair of the NCAA Infraction Appeals Committee and was a member of the NCAA Enforcement Working Group.

Williams came to Vanderbilt in 2000 to serve as Vice Chancellor, General Counsel and University Secretary, after a 14-year tenure at The Ohio State University, where he served in numerous administrative roles including Vice Provost for Minority Affairs, Vice President of Student and Urban/Community Affairs and Professor of Law

A native of Detroit, Williams received a Bachelor of Science in Social Sciences and Master of Arts in Education from Northern Michigan University, where he was a member of the university track team. He also earned a Master of Business Administration (MBA) and a Doctor of Jurisprudence (JD) from the University of Detroit, where Williams presently serves on the University's Board of Trust. Williams also earned an LL.M. in Taxation from New York University. Before entering law school, Williams spent 10 years as a teacher and coach in the Detroit public school system.

Williams has taught at the law schools of the University of Detroit, Capital University, The Ohio State University and Vanderbilt. He also twice directed The Ohio State University's Law program in Oxford England. Williams was elected outstanding law professor at both the University of Detroit and at The Ohio State University.

Williams is active in the greater Nashville area community, serving as a board member with several organizations. He served two terms on former Nashville Mayor Karl Dean's Procurement Standards Board and two terms as a Nashville branch member on the Atlanta Federal Reserve Board. Williams also served as chair of the Nashville United Way Board and treasurer and board member for the Nashville Symphony. He is presently serving on the boards of the Middle Tennessee Community Foundation, the Nashville Sports Council, the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame and the Nashville Public Education Foundation. In addition, Williams is the Co-Chair of the transition team for Dr. Shawn Joseph, the new Director of Schools for Metro Nashville.

Williams and his wife, Gail met in law school and have four children: Erika, a grade school teacher in Detroit and graduate of Eastern Michigan University; David III, a two-time graduate of Bowling Green State University and is an academic counselor at Michigan State University, where he recently was awarded his Doctorate degree; Samantha (Sam), a graduate of Brown University, where she was a member of the swimming team and presently a third-year law student at Vanderbilt Law School; and Nicholas (Nick), a senior at High Point (N.C.) where he is a three-time scholar athlete member of the track team. Sam and Nick both attended pre-college school here in Nashville where Sam was an All-State swimmer at Harpeth Hall and Nick was an All-State athlete in soccer and track and a four-year basketball member at the University School of Nashville.

Gail is a graduate of the University of Michigan and the University of Detroit Law School. Prior to attending the University of Michigan, Gail attended Cranbrook School in the Detroit area where she played basketball and field hockey. She serves as Associate Director of Community Relations for Vanderbilt and is past president and former board member of the University School of Nashville Board of Trustees. In addition, she is past Board Chair of the Metro Transit Authority where she continues to serve as a board member. Gail also serves on the boards of many non-profit organizations including the Frist Center, the Women's Fund Advisory Board, the YWCA, the Tennessee Performance Arts Center and the Baptist Healing Trust. She was also recently elected President of the Nashville Chapter of The Links, Inc.

Take I-65 South into downtown and take Exit 209B (Broadway-West End). Turn right on Broadway. When Broadway splits, stay to the right to enter West End Avenue. Take West End past the University on the left, turn left on 25th Avenue. Access into Kensington Garage is a block on right just before Memorial Gym.

### ARRIVING FROM EAST OF NASHVILLE

Take I-40 West/I-65 North downtown to Exit 209A (Broadway-West End). Turn left at light, headed west on Broadway. When Broadway splits, veer right to enter West End Ave. Take West End past the University's three high-rise dorms and turn left on 25th Ave. Garage access is one block on right, just before Memorial Gym.

### ARRIVING FROM WEST OF NASHVILLE

Take I-40 East to I-440 East. Take the first exit (Murphy Road-West End) and turn left at redlight. In .25 mile, turn left onto West End. The campus will be on your right. Turn right on 25th Avenue (one block past Wendy's). Kensington Garage access is one block on right, just before Memorial Gym.

## VANDERBILT STADIUM: COMMODORE HOME SINCE 1981

Several improvements have been made to 40,350-capacity Vanderbilt Stadium, which has served as home to the Commodores since 1981.

The gameday experience in Vanderbilt's on-campus venue were substantially improved in 2013 with the construction of a 450-capacity hillside berm next to the north end zone. Behind the berm, university officials installed a new video board that more than doubled the size of the stadium's former visual board.

Vanderbilt Stadium's Dudley Field playing surface, where the 'Dores have played dating back to 1922, also has received recent updates. In 2012, it returned to a synthetic surface for the first time in more than a decade when the university decided to add cushioned Shaw Sportexe turf. The surface has drawn rave reviews from players, who also benefited with the addition of new stadium lights the same year.

The 2012 work adds to other major recent improvements. A thorough exterior renovation was completed in 2008-10, including new plazas and entrances at Gates 2 & 3 and an exterior effort to unify Vanderbilt Stadium, Hawkins Field and Memorial Gym.
