## Cal Poly Seeks Strong Start as 2020 Season Opens With MLB4 Tournament

### Mustangs Have Struggled With Slow Starts Four Times in Last Five Seasons; Came Within One Victory of Earning Playoff Berth in 2019

Cal Poly, which finished one victory shy of a Big West Conference championship in 2019 and its fourth NCAA Division I regional playoff berth in program history, opens the 2020 campaign this weekend with three games in the MLB4 Tournament against defending national champion Vanderbilt, runner-up Michigan and regional qualifier Connecticut.

Coach Larry Lee's Mustangs face UConn on Friday at noon, Michigan on Saturday, also at noon, and Vanderbilt on Sunday at 1 p.m. (all times Pacific) at Salt River Fields at Talking Stick, the spring training home of the Colorado Rockies and Arizona Diamondbacks in Scottsdale, Ariz.

All three games will be broadcast live on ESPN Radio 1280 with Eric Burdick calling the play-by-play. Each contest also will be video streamed on MLB.com. Links for audio and video streams as well as live stats are available on the baseball schedule page at www.GoPoly.com.

Starting with the good news, the Mustangs battled back from a 2-9 start to even their overall mark at 28-28. At one time, Cal Poly was three games above the .500 mark at 20-17, winning 18 of 26 games, before falling back. On the final weekend of the season, the Mustangs won their first two games at No. 4-ranked UC Santa Barbara before dropping the season finale with a share of the Big West title and an NCAA regional berth on the line. The Mustangs finished in the upper half of the conference standings for the 15th time in Lee's 17 seasons at the helm with their third consecutive second-place finish.

The bad news is that Cal Poly has been victimized by slow starts four of the last five seasons and will play 15 games against seven teams that qualified for the postseason a year ago. In addition to Vanderbilt and Michigan, the 2020 schedule also features five consecutive weekend series at home, including three more with the Wolverines, after the trip to Arizona along with five games

# Mustang Notes

### Mustangs at the Plate ...

Cal Poly returns 84 percent of its at-bats and 77 percent of its hits from the 2019 squad which rallied from a 2-9 start by winning 18 of 26 games midway through the season and taking the Big West title chase to the final game of the regular season, finishing 28-28 overall and 17-7 for its third straight second-place Big West finish. The returnees include 10 position starters (20 or more starts) and eight of last year's 13 pitchers.

The Mustangs opened their 2019 season with a .248 batting average in a three-game series at Oklahoma. With temperatures in the 30s and low 40s, only one Mustang collected more than three hits as junior center fielder Bradlee Beesley went 7-for-12 (.583) with two doubles and three RBI, including his fifth career four-hit contest on Feb. 16. Cal Poly hit .250 in the Cal series, led by Beesley again as he went 6-for-13 with a double and an RBI. Redshirt freshman second baseman Connor Gurnik was 5-for-13 and sophomore right fielder Elijah Greene 4-for-13. Against Washington, a trio of Mustangs — Gurnik, Greene and Nick DiCarlo — had four hits and one RBI each as Cal Poly hit just .214. In the four-game sweep of Columbia, Greene was 6-for-16, Tate Samuelson 5-for-12 with a home run and four RBI and Willie Cano 5-for-10 with a triple and three RBI. Cal Poly hit .189 at Baylor, Tate Samuelson going 5-for-11, and .256 versus Saint Mary's, Samuelson going 7-for-14 with a double and three RBI. The Mustangs hit .302 versus CSUN, Gurnik going 6-for-11 with a double, but slipped to .255 against Cal State Fullerton, then hit a season-high .320 in sweeping UC Davis, Conagher Sands driving in five runs with a 4-for-10 weekend. Greene was 5-for-13 as Cal Poly hit .252 in the sweep over Long Beach State and Sands was 5-for-13 with five RBI in the USC series (.271). Myle Emmerson was 6-for-11 with five RBI in the Hawai'i series (.229) and Cal Poly hit just .220 at UC Irvine, Samuelson going 5-for-13 with three RBI. Beesley was 6-for-13 as Cal Poly hit .295 in the UC Riverside series and the Mustangs hit .222 versus UC Santa Barbara.

The Mustangs, who hit .291 in 2018, best in the Big West, slipped to .260 last spring, No. 7 in the conference, and won seven of 15 series with sweeps against Columbia, CSUN, UC Davis and Long Beach State, and split a four-game set against Saint Mary's.

Bradlee Beesley hit safely in the first seven games and also had a nine-game streak while Elijah Greene twice hit in nine straight. Conagher Sands' 23-game hitting streak (third longest in Cal Poly's Division I history) was snapped May 17 by UC Riverside while Myles Emmerson had an 11-game streak halted by USC. Greene has a team-leading 19 multiple-hit games, Samuelson 18 and Beesley 16. Longest hitting streak in 2018 was 17 games by Nick Meyer, snapped May 25 by UC Riverside. Junior center fielder Alex McKenna led the team in multiple-hit games with 23, followed by Meyer and Kyle Marinconz with 20 each. Samuelson had a team-leading 11 multiple-RBI contests and led the team again last year with 13 multiple-RBI games.

Last year's Mustangs hit .279 with runners on base, .279 with runners in scoring position, 18-for-58 (.310) with the bases loaded (Beesley 5-for-7, Elijah Greene 3-for-9 and Samuelson 3-for-10) and .242 with the bases empty en route to a .260 team batting average, the lowest in Cal Poly's 25-year Division I history.

Cal Poly hit .248 against lefties and .264 against right-handers. Leadoff hitters reached base 31.9 percent of the time and the Mustangs, 9-for-37 (.243) as pinch-hitters in 2017 and 16-for-60 (.267) in 2018, were 5-for-43 (.116) last season (Conagher Sands 2-for-5). Kevin Morgan led the team in pinch hits three consecutive seasons (four in 2017, five in 2016, four in 2015).

### Mustangs on the Mound ...

While the percentages on offense are high, Cal Poly returns just 47 percent of the innings, 44 percent of the strikeouts, 39 percent of the wins and 43 percent of the starts off last year's squad.

The starting rotation for the first eight series of the 2019 season consisted of Jarred Zill on Friday, Bobby Ay on Saturday and Darren Nelson on Sunday with Bryan Woo the starter in the pair of four-game series and Chase Watkins the starter in the last six series openers. The relief corps was led by Michael Clark along with Taylor Dollard, Thomas Triantos, Matt Arens, Dylan Villalobos and Andrew Alvarez along with some newcomers.

The 2012 pitching staff set a school record with a 3.48 ERA, which held up for one year as the 2013 mound corps lowered the mark to 3.40. The 2014 staff had a record-shattering 3.05 ERA and posted 10 shutouts en route to Cal Poly's last appearance in an NCAA regional while the 2016 staff notched four shutouts and a 4.09 ERA. The 2017 team also earned four shutouts and a 3.61 ERA while the 2018 team finished with a 4.59 ERA and another four shutouts (three combined). Last year's squad had a 4.45 ERA (third in the Big West) with two shutouts.

### Mustangs on the Basepaths ...

Cal Poly, which swiped 81 of 102 bases in 2009, second-most in Larry Lee's 17 seasons at the helm of the Mustangs (the 2004 squad stole 90 bases), stole just 22 of 36 bases in 2019 (5-for-7 vs. Columbia), Bradlee Beesley leading the way with eight in 12 attempts.

### Mustangs in the Field ...

The Mustangs committed eight errors in three games at Oklahoma, including five in the Saturday contest, six more in the Cal series, nine in four games versus Columbia, seven in another four-game set against Saint Mary's and seven versus Cal State Fullerton. Cal Poly played just 13 errorless games last season (three in the Long Beach State series and two each in the UC Davis and USC series) and was eighth in the Big West with its .962 fielding percentage. The 2018 Mustangs, who played 14 errorless games, made 78 errors in 57 games for a .964 fielding percentage, No. 9 in the Big West. Cal Poly broke the school record with a .978 fielding percentage in 2012, committing just 46 errors in 56 games.

## Head Coach Larry Lee

After serving as head baseball coach at Cuesta College for 16 seasons, Larry Lee was hired on July 22, 2002 to guide the Cal Poly baseball program. He is 541-419-2 in 17 seasons with the Mustangs. After a 27-28-1 record and a fourth-place finish in the Big West Conference in 2003, Lee guided the Mustangs to four straight winning seasons, including 38 wins in 2004. Cal Poly earned its first NCAA Division I regional playoff berth in 2009, and the Mustangs were 40-19 in 2013 and 47-12 in 2014, earning their second and third regional berths. Cal Poly has finished at or above the .500 mark 17 times in the last 19 years, claimed its first Big West title in 2014 and has placed second six times. Lee's 541 wins are six shy of the Big West record and his 229 conference wins are No. 1 in the Big West.



Lee led Cuesta to the California Community College State Final Four on four occasions, all in the last 11 years of his tenure. The Cougars reached the state's Final Four in 1992, 1997, 2001 and 2002 and qualified for the Southern California Regionals each of the last six years of his tenure, including a No. 1 seed in 1999 and No. 2 in 2002.

Lee's overall record for 16 years at Cuesta was 460-241-3, including a state-leading 44 wins in 1997. His teams qualified for the regionals 11 times in the last 13 years. Under Lee's leadership, Cuesta claimed nine Western State Conference titles, including the last six in a row, and averaged 38 wins during that six-year stretch. His teams produced a 267-119 record in conference games.

### Assistant Coaches

**Teddy Warrecker**, head baseball coach at Santa Barbara City College the last 10 seasons, joined the Cal Poly baseball program as an assistant coach in August 2010. Warrecker compiled a 193-198-2 record as head coach of the Vaqueros. In the last seven years, Warrecker guided SBCC to six winning campaigns and three regional playoff appearances. Warrecker was a catcher and first baseman at Allan Hancock College in Santa Maria, setting school career marks in home runs and RBI. He attended the University of Arizona before signing with the Cleveland Indians after his junior year. Warrecker spent six years in the minor leagues as a pitcher with Cleveland, Los Angeles Dodgers and Atlanta Braves. After professional baseball, Warrecker completed his bachelor's degree in history at Cal State Northridge and recently finished his master's degree in sport science from the United States Sports Academy. Warrecker coached over 50 players who went on to play at the four-year and professional levels.

**Jake Silverman**, an assistant coach at Cal State Fullerton, UCLA and Nevada over the previous 11 seasons, was hired as an assistant coach at Cal Poly in August 2019, in charge of the pitching staff. Silverman worked with the catchers, served as recruiting coordinator and also assisted with hitting and base running at Nevada the last four years (2016-19). He spent five seasons (2011-15) with UCLA as an assistant to the pitching coach, helping the Bruins compile a 202-103-1 record in that span with four post-season appearances. Silverman and UCLA earned two trips to the College World Series, including the Bruins' national championship season in 2013. Silverman also coached at Cal State Fullerton as an undergraduate assistant for two seasons (2009-10). In two seasons as an undergraduate assistant coach at Cal State Fullerton, Silverman helped the Titans advance to the College World Series in 2009 and to an NCAA Super Regional in 2010. A native of Tustin, Calif., Silverman is a 2005 graduate of Foothill High School in Santa Ana. At Fullerton College, he batted .350 in 16 games as a freshman in 2006. In 2007, he earned the Art Nunn Award for exemplary acts on and off the field while seeing action in 14 games.

**Elliot Stewart**, a catcher at Cal Poly from 2010-13, is in his fifth season on the coaching staff of the baseball program. He served as Director of Baseball Operations for the 2014 and 2015 seasons, was a volunteer assistant coach in 2017 and returned in 2019, again as a volunteer assistant coach. Stewart was head baseball coach at Mission College Prep in San Luis Obispo, Calif., in 2018, guiding the Royals to a 13-15 mark, and has operated the Elliot Stewart Baseball Academy since 2016. As a player at Cal Poly, Stewart produced eight doubles, two triples and eight home runs during his senior year in 2013. Among his home runs were three-run shots at Cal and at home against UC Riverside along with game-winning homers against CSU Bakersfield and CSUN. Stewart played one season at West Valley College before transferring to Cal Poly, hitting .328 with eight doubles, three home runs and 25 RBIs en route to first-team All-Golden Gate Conference honors. A 2008 graduate of Archbishop Mitty High School in San Jose, Stewart earned his bachelor's degree in social science at Cal Poly in 2013.

## Mustang Notes

### Last Week (2019 season) ...

Seeking a share of the Big West title and the conference's automatic qualifying berth in the NCAA regionals, Cal Poly won the series at UC Santa Barbara, two games to one, but needed a sweep to achieve its goals. On **Thursday**, Bobby Ay pitched seven scoreless innings, Tate Samuelson belted his fifth home run of the season and Cole Cabrera robbed UC Santa Barbara of a pair of home runs as Cal Poly earned a 3-0 victory in the opener. Ay (9-1), who had a no-hitter through 5 2/3 innings, struck out eight, walked three and allowed just two singles for his ninth victory of the year, throwing 107 pitches. Sophomore Taylor Dollard secured the final six outs, retiring all six batters he faced, four via strikeout, for his fourth save. The victory was the 1,000th for Cal Poly head coach Larry Lee. With a 460-241-3 mark in 16 seasons at Cuesta College and 541-419-2 in 17 years at Cal Poly, Lee is 1,001-660-5 in 33 years as a head coach. Samuelson's two-run first-inning shot over the scoreboard in left field gave Cal Poly a quick 2-0 lead and Nick DiCarlo's safety squeeze bunt up the first-base line for a single scored Samuelson from third base in the fourth frame and made it a 3-0 contest. Cabrera leaped above the wall in left field to take a home run away from Tevin Mitchell in the third inning and duplicated the feat in the ninth to thwart what would have been Thomas Rowan's 13th homer of the year. The loss snapped UC Santa Barbara's second 13-game winning streak of the season – the Gauchos also won 12 straight during the first four weeks of the campaign – and the Gauchos lost at home for only the second time in 28 games. Their 19-game home winning streak was halted as well. On **Friday**, the Mustangs clinched their Big West and Blue-Green Rivalry series with a 4-3 victory, Cal Poly's 11th consecutive win over the Gauchos. Taylor Dollard pitched a career-high six innings in relief and Conagher Sands drove in three runs with a home run and a double to lead Cal Poly. Dollard (5-0) allowed two runs and three hits with one walk and three strikeouts, throwing 79 pitches in relief of starter Andrew Alvarez, who tossed three-plus innings with one run and three hits. Sands erased a 1-0 deficit with a run-scoring double in the third inning and blasted a two-run home run, his second of the year, to give Cal Poly a 3-1 lead in the fifth. UC Santa Barbara answered with two runs in the bottom of the fifth to re-tie the game at 3-3. In the seventh, Elijah Greene tripled to the gap in right-center field with one out. Tate Samuelson lined out to first base for the second out and, after Sands was intentionally walked, catcher Myles Emmerson, Cal Poly's top hitter in Big West games, singled through the right side of the Gauchos infield to score Greene with the go-ahead run. Cal Poly collected 11 hits, including two each by Sands, Greene, Samuelson and Emmerson. On **Saturday**, freshman southpaw Rodney Boone pitched 8 1/3 scoreless innings and combined with Chris Lincoln on a five-hit shutout as UC Santa Barbara earned its first Big West baseball championship in 33 years with a 7-0 victory. Boone (8-0) struck out 12 and walked three in his longest outing of the season, throwing 123 pitches. Lincoln secured the final two outs. The Mustangs finished second in the Big West for the third consecutive season. The Gauchos scored twice in the first, third and fourth innings and added another run on Tevin Mitchell's fifth home run of the season in the sixth frame to end Cal Poly's hopes of a postseason berth. Elijah Greene, Tate Samuelson, Myles Emmerson, Nick DiCarlo and Cole Cabrera all singled for Cal Poly, which had two runners on base in an inning just twice and stranded eight runners on the basepaths.

### National Rankings

As a team, Cal Poly's highest national ranking last year — and the only one in the top 100 — was No. 53 in double plays turned with 46. At the other end of the spectrum, the Mustangs were No. 285 among 297 teams in Division I in fewest home runs (13), No. 291 in stolen bases (22) and No. 273 in scoring (4.4 runs per game). Individually, Bobby Ay was No. 24 with 15 starts and Ay also was No. 22 with nine victories. Jared Zill was No. 17 in strikeouts per nine innings with a 12.63 average. Michael Clark was No. 20 with 32 appearances, 79th with his eight saves and No. 91 with his 2.61 ERA.

### Cal Poly a Winner in Season Openers

Cal Poly, which opened the 2019 campaign, its 25th season of competition at the NCAA Division I level, with a 4-1 loss at Oklahoma, is 16-9 in season openers as a Division I school. The Mustangs earned a come-from-behind 10-inning 8-7 win over Gonzaga in Surprise, Ariz., in the 2018 opener. The Mustangs had won six straight season openers from 2001-06, then lost five straight -- to San Diego 9-6 in 2007, to Alabama 10-1 in 2008, to Rice 10-7 in 2009, to USC 9-4 in 2010 and to North Carolina 2-1 in 2011 before shutting out Oklahoma State 6-0 in 2012, defeating San Francisco 5-3 in 2013 and blanking Kansas State 3-0 in 2014. The Mustangs lost the 2015 opener at Baylor 8-6 but beat Pacific 6-2 in 2016 and Cal 6-4 two years ago. Cal Poly defeated Cal Lutheran 8-6 in its first game as a Division I school in 1995 and earned a thrilling season-opening 12-inning 6-5 win over Stanford in 2001 in the first game played in Baggett Stadium. Larry Lee won his first four season openers, six of his last eight, and is now 10-7 in openers.

### Weekly Conference Honors

Senior relief pitcher Michael Clark was Cal Poly's first and second player honored by the Big West last season. In earning his second career Big West Pitcher of the Week award, Clark tossed six scoreless, hitless innings with one walk and nine strikeouts en route to three saves as the Mustangs swept CSUN on March 29-31. His third career conference honor was the result of nine scoreless innings in two relief stints at UC Davis on April 12-14, earning one victory. Cal Poly's lone player honored by the conference in 2018 was catcher Nick Meyer, named Field Player of the Week after going 9-for-17 in four mid-May games, including a five-hit contest against Pepperdine. Meyer was 4-for-11 with three doubles, three runs scored and two RBI in the UC Santa Barbara series.

# Mustang Notes

## Lee Tops in the Big West ...

Cal Poly's Larry Lee moved to the top of the Big West among head coaches in conference wins when his Mustangs defeated UC Davis 6-5 on April 14, 2019. His 219th Big West victory surpassed Cal Poly alum and former Long Beach State head coach Dave Snow, who coached the Dirtbags to 218 Big West wins from 1989-2001. Lee is now 229-167 in 17 Big West seasons and 541-419-2 overall, six wins behind Big West overall leader Bob Bennett of Fresno State.

## Setting the Records Straight ...

A quartet of Mustangs reached the overall top 10 in Cal Poly's record book or were near the elite group in 2019. Bradley Beesley's 40 career doubles are two shy of the top 10 and his 646 career at-bats are 11 out of the top 10. Connor Gurnik's 10 hit-by-pitches last season are two shy of the top 10 and Bobby Ay's nine wins fell one short of the top 10. Michael Clark is No. 2 in career saves with 19, No. 2 in career appearances with 86, tied for No. 2 with 32 appearances last season and tied for No. 8 with his eight saves last year.

## More Records ...

When one considers just the 25 Division I seasons the Mustangs have completed, one record was tied and another was broken. Cole Cabrera's 1,000 fielding percentage (93 chances) tied the mark while Bradlee Beesley's 229 career fly outs broke a record. The team broke several season marks, including lowest batting average (.260), fewest runs scored (247), fewest doubles (76), fewest home runs (13), fewest RBIs (217) and fewest stolen bases (22).

## Mustang Foes in the Top 30

Ten of Cal Poly's 22 opponents on the 2020 baseball schedule -- Vanderbilt, Michigan, Oklahoma, Stanford, Cal State Fullerton, UC Santa Barbara, San Diego State, BYU, Connecticut and UC Irvine -- were ranked in the preseason polls. Vanderbilt, the defending national champion, started the new season ranked No. 1 by Baseball America and No. 2 by Collegiate Baseball. Michigan is ranked No. 8 by Baseball America and No. 10 by Collegiate Baseball. Oklahoma earned rankings from Nos. 16-30 while Stanford was ranked from No. 15 to 25. Among Big West schools, Cal State Fullerton was ranked No. 26, UC Santa Barbara No. 27 and UC Irvine No. 37 by Collegiate Baseball. Cal Poly, ranked No. 1 for a week by Collegiate Baseball Newspaper in 2014, finished ranked from Nos. 18-20 in all five major polls. Cal Poly's highest ranking in 2013 was No. 16 in the Collegiate Baseball poll before losing two of three games to Cal State Fullerton. In 2012, the Mustangs were ranked No. 22 by Collegiate Baseball Newspaper after its 7-1 start and No. 27 in early April after sweeping UC Irvine before falling back. Cal Poly was ranked as high as No. 22 by Baseball America in 2006 after jumping to a 9-2 start, but lost 12 of its next 19 games to fall out of the polls. The Mustangs were briefly ranked by Collegiate Baseball Newspaper in 2007 after winning 10 of 12 games early in the season. Cal Poly was ranked as high as No. 12 by Collegiate Baseball and Baseball America after getting off to a 17-4 start in 2009. In 2016, Cal Poly was No. 19 in the Collegiate Baseball Newspaper poll on April 25 before the Mustangs were swept at Long Beach State. Cal Poly was never ranked during the 2017 and 2019 seasons but received some votes in a few preseason polls in 2018.

## Waiting Until the Last Moment ...

Last year Cal Poly earned two walk-off wins in the Columbia series — Cole Cabrera's RBI single on March 8 and Nick DiCarlo's run-scoring grounder to second base in the 12th inning March 9. The Mustangs also had two walk-off wins in 2018 — a wild pitch in the 10th inning against New Mexico on March 12 and another wild pitch while San Diego State was trying to intentionally walk Colby Barrick on March 17. Cal Poly earned three walk-off wins in 2017 — Kyle Marinconz tripled to score Nick Meyer from first base in the 13th inning against Wichita State, the Mustangs edged Nebraska 3-2 on Meyer's single to left field which scored Brett Binning from second base in the ninth inning, and in a 6-5 win over CSUN as Meyer singled to drive in Alex McKenna in the ninth inning. Cal Poly earned four walk-off wins in 2016, defeating Pacific 7-6 in 10 innings on Meyer's one-out single to right field, beating Pepperdine 6-5 on Kevin Morgan's one-out single to right field, edging San Francisco 2-1 on Cooper Moore's bases-loaded single to right field and blanking Cal State Fullerton 1-0 in 10 innings on a sacrifice fly by Josh George. The Mustangs' only walk-off win of the 2015 season was a 4-3 triumph in 12 innings over Long Beach State as Zack Zehner hit a leadoff home run. Cal Poly scored just two walk-off wins in 2014. Chris Hoo's single up the middle in the ninth gave Cal Poly its first walk-off win, an 8-7 triumph over UC Santa Barbara. Nick Torres doubled in the 13th inning to give the Mustangs a 4-3 win over Cal State Fullerton. In sharp contrast, Cal Poly earned seven walk-off wins in 2009, including five in extra innings, en route to a berth in the NCAA Tempe Regional.

## Reaching the 30-Wins Milestone

The 2004 Cal Poly baseball team reached 30 wins on April 9, becoming the second quickest Mustang team to reach the plateau. Cal Poly's 1977 squad won its 30th game on April 5 against Long Beach State and finished 41-20 while the 2014 squad earned its 30th win April 13 at Hawai'i. The 2016 squad reached 30 wins on May 22 and the 2018 club earned win No. 30 on the final day of the season (May 26). The 2004 Mustangs reached 20 wins on March 21, third quickest in school history. The 1997 team was 20-3 on March 12, finishing 37-21, while the 1977 team picked up its 20th win on March 20. Cal Poly's 2005 squad reached 30 wins on May 1, hit the 30-win mark in 2007 on May 25 and the 2018 squad won its 30th on May 4. The Mustangs have won 30 or more games 12 times since and including 2000, including 2016 and 2018. The 2009 team reached the 30-win mark on April 28 en route to a 37-21 season and an NCAA Regional berth. That team was 20-7 on April 4. Since the NCAA's uniform start date was implemented in 2008, the fastest team to 20 wins is the 2014 squad, hitting the mark on March 24. The 2013 squad accomplished the feat on March 30, five days faster than the 2009 team's 20th win on April 4. Fastest team to 30 wins since the 2008 uniform start date is the 2009 team (April 28). Only four Cal Poly teams have reached 40 wins in a season -- the 1977 and 1992 squads both winning 41 contests, the 2013 team earning 40 wins and the 2014 squad reaching 47 during the NCAA San Luis Obispo Regional.

## Mustang Notes

### Turn Out the Lights

Cal Poly, just 21-31 at night from 2001-03, reversed that trend the next three seasons, going 37-23 under the lights. In 2007 Cal Poly was 12-11 at night and 20-13 under the sun. In 19 seasons at Baggett Stadium, Cal Poly is 341-198 -- 141-97 in day games and 200-101 at night. Overall in 2009, the Mustangs were 21-10 in night games and 16-11 under the sun. In 2008 Cal Poly was 10-16 in day games and 14-16 at night. The Mustangs were 18-8 at night and 9-18 under the sun in 2011. In 2012 Cal Poly was 19-7 at night and 17-13 in day games. In 2013, the numbers were 18-11 at night and 22-8 in day games while in 2014 it was 22-5 in day games, 25-7 at night. In 2015: 8-15 during the day and 19-12 at night. In 2016, the Mustangs were 16-15 at night and 16-10 under the sun. In 2017: 13-16 during the day and 15-12 at night. In 2018, Cal Poly was 17-9 at night and 13-18 during the day, while the 2019 club was 18-16 during the day and 10-12 at night.

### Big West Preseason Poll

Cal Poly was picked by the Big West's nine head coaches to finish tied for second place with Long Beach State this season, behind Cal State Fullerton, which finished fourth in 2019. UC Santa Barbara, picked to finish fifth in 2019, instead earned its first Big West crown in 33 years while the Mustangs finished second for the third year in a row. In 2014, the Mustangs earned their highest preseason ranking in the Big West when Cal Poly was picked to finish No. 2 and went on to capture its first Big West title. Cal Poly has finished in the upper half of the Big West standings 15 times in Larry Lee's 17 seasons at the helm, including second-place finishes in 2005, 2012, 2013, 2017, 2018 and 2019 and the championship in 2014. The pollsters were correct for four straight years when Cal State Fullerton was picked to win the 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2013 titles and did so. Cal Poly has finished in the top five of the Big West Conference standings 18 of the last 20 seasons, tying for seventh place in 2008.

### All-Big West Conference

Seven Cal Poly baseball players were honored by the Big West in 2019, including three pitchers -- Bobby Ay, Michael Clark and Taylor Dollard -- on the first team. A quartet of Mustangs made the honorable mention list -- sophomore first baseman Tate Samuelson, freshman designated hitter Conagher Sands, junior outfielder Bradlee Beesley and junior catcher Myles Emmerson. A total of 53 Mustangs have been named to the all-conference first team since Cal Poly joined the Big West in 1997, including players of the year Mark Mathias (2014), Mitch Haniger (2012), Grant Desme (2007), Kyle Blumenthal (2005) and Alex McKenna (2018). Matt Jensen (2009), Haniger (2010) and Nick Meyer (2016) are the only former Mustangs named Big West Freshman Field Player of the Year.

### Big Crowds for Mustang Home Games ...

The Mustangs averaged 1,511 for 30 home dates last spring and surpassed the 1,000 mark in each game for the first time in Baggett Stadium history. Largest total for a series was 1,836 for Cal State Fullerton. In 2014, the year Cal Poly won the Big West title and hosted an NCAA regional, the Mustangs averaged a record 1,659 fans for 34 home games. That figure includes crowds of 2,188, 2,072 and 2,489 for the UC Santa Barbara series, 2,402, 2,831 and 2,614 for the Cal State Fullerton set, 2,582, 2,742 and 2,466 for UC Irvine and 2,922, 2,941, 2,473 and 2,937 in four regional games. The season average was No. 39 among 302 NCAA Division I baseball teams. The Cal Poly average also was No. 7 among the 47 schools in the five conferences in the West Region and No. 3 behind Hawai'i and Cal State Fullerton in the Big West Conference. With the exception of one rainy night March 12 against New Mexico, Cal Poly drew at least 1,000 fans for all of its home games last season, averaging a season-high 2,067 for the Long Beach State series. The Mustangs averaged 1,540 for 30 home dates in 2018, No. 2 all-time at Baggett Stadium. Cal Poly drew over 1,000 fans for all but one of its games and averaged 1,524 fans for its 27 home games in 2017, No. 3 on the list, including a season-high 2,850 in the middle game of the Cal State Fullerton series and an average of 2,261 for the series against the Titans. Cal Poly's top seven crowds for a single game are 3,284 for Cal State Fullerton on May 6, 2005; 3,274 for the Long Beach State game on April 23, 2004; 3,110 for Stanford on Jan. 21, 2001, the first game played at Baggett Stadium; 2,941 for Pepperdine on May 31, 2014; 2,937 for Pepperdine on June 1, 2014; 2,922 for Sacramento State on May 30, 2014; and 2,850 for Cal State Fullerton on April 22, 2017. Top six crowds for a three-game series are 8,585 for Cal State Fullerton on May 6-8, 2005; 7,847 for Cal State Fullerton in 2016, 7,790 for UC Irvine, also in 2016, 6,782 for Cal State Fullerton in 2017, 6,749 for the UCSB series in 2016 and 6,384 for Cal State Fullerton in 2013. A six-game total of 15,510 fans attended the 2014 San Luis Obispo Regional.

### Ironman Trophy

Elijah Greene was the lone Mustang who started all 56 games last season. Alex McKenna and Kyle Mariconz started all 57 games in 2018 while Tate Samuelson started the first 55. McKenna and Mariconz also were the only Mustangs to start all 56 games in 2017. Josh George played all 56 games with 49 starts. In 2016, Brett Barbier, Michael Sanderson and Mariconz started all 57 games played. Mariconz has started 169 consecutive games -- every game as a freshman, sophomore and junior. Only two Cal Poly players started all 54 games in 2015 -- Peter Van Gansen and Jordan Ellis. Jimmy Allen (183 consecutive starts) and Brian Mundell started all 59 games in 2014. Denver Chavez, Jimmy Allen and Nick Torres started all 59 games in 2013 while Peter Van Gansen (57 starts) played all 59 games. Mike Miller, Jimmy Allen and Mitch Haniger started all 56 games in 2012. No Cal Poly player started all 53 games in 2011. Right-fielder Mitch Haniger started 52 of the 53 games and designated hitter DJ Gentile started 51 games. Only one Mustang started the first 36 games of the 2010 season -- sophomore second baseman Matt Jensen -- but he dislocated his knee in practice in late April to snap the streak. Bobby Crocker played in all 55 games with 54 starts. Ryan Lee and Kyle Smith started all 58 games in 2009. Two Mustangs -- Brent Morel and Logan Schafer -- started all 56 games a year earlier. Pat Pezet started 55 games and played in all 56. Only one Mustang played in every game in 2007 -- freshman shortstop Kyle Smith played in all 56 games with 55 starts. Junior right fielder Grant Desme started the first 50 before fracturing his wrist May 12. Pezet started 55 games and freshman catcher/designated hitter Wes Dorrell played in 54 (44 starts). Josh Lansford and Jimmy Van Ostrand were the only Mustangs to start all 56 games in the 2006 season. Jimmy Gardiner and Matt Canepa played in 53 games. Outfielder Brandon Roberts was the lone Mustang to start all 56 games in the 2005 campaign, though catcher Kyle Blumenthal also played in every game (52 starts). Right fielder Chalon Tietje and center fielder Sam Herbert started all 62 games in 2004.

# Mustang Notes

## Statistics, Statistics, More Statistics ...

Cal Poly held CSUN to just four runs in the 2019 sweep, the lowest total in a three-game series since outscoring Kansas State 18-3 in a 2014 series ... last time Cal Poly swept a series to open Big West play was in 2014 against UC Davis ... the Mustangs were swept in their first three weekend series of the 2019 season (Oklahoma, Cal, Washington) for the first time in their 25-year Division I history ... Cal Poly's comeback from an 8-0 deficit for an 11-8 win over CSU Bakersfield in 2018 was its largest comeback in the Mustangs' 25 Division I seasons; the Mustangs rallied from a 9-2 deficit to beat Temple 11-10 in 2000 and erased an 8-1 deficit in a 9-8 win over Washington in 1995 ... against Columbia in 2019, Cal Poly swept a four-game series for the first time since sweeping Pacific opening the 2016 campaign; the Mustangs also swept Loyola Marymount in 2012 ... the Mustangs are 9-0 versus Columbia ... Cal Poly won its final seven games of the 2018 season, matching the school Division I mark set by the 2012 squad for longest winning streak to end the year ... Cal Poly failed to score in 25 consecutive innings in late February 2017, a school Division I record, and was shut out nine times in 2017, another record ... the Mustangs have played four 13-inning games inside Baggett Stadium, but never 14 innings ... all four extra-inning games in 2018 were 10-inning affairs, Cal Poly posting a 3-1 mark ... in the 2017 season-opening series at Cal, the Mustangs led in all three games, but won just one of the three; last spring Cal Poly had a lead or was tied with the Bears, but lost all three games; Cal Poly held the early lead in all three games of the CSUN series in 2016, only to be swept by the Matadors for the first time since 2008, and almost did the same in 2018 before rallying late to salvage a win in the finale ... in 2018 the Mustangs lost two midweek games to Santa Clara for the first time since 2012 and the Broncos swept Cal Poly again in 2019 ... against UC Riverside in 2017, Cal Poly posted two shutouts in a series for the first time since blanking Oklahoma State twice in 2012 and earned back-to-back shutouts for the first time since whitewashing Santa Clara and Seattle in 2014 ... Cal Poly went from 2011-15 without being swept in a Big West series until Long Beach State swept the Mustangs at Blair Field in 2016 ... the Mustangs had won 16 consecutive series against Pacific until the Tigers swept Cal Poly in 2017 ... Cal Poly is 16-5 against Hawai'i since the Rainbow Warriors joined the Big West in 2013, including a 9-3 mark at home and 7-2 in Honolulu; the Mustangs have won all seven series, including sweeps in 2014 and 2015 ... the series at TCU in 2015, wiped out by snow and ice, marks the only time in the Mustangs' 25-year Division I history that an entire series was canceled ... Cal Poly's pair of wins at Oregon State in 2015 were its first against the Beavers since moving to Division I 26 years ago ... Cal Poly has won 268 games over the last eight seasons (2012-19), seventh-most among the 24 Division I teams in California and No. 9 in the 47-team West Region ... the Mustangs, never swept from 2012-14, were swept twice to open the 2015 campaign and, against Grand Canyon, were swept at home for the first time since 2010 (Houston) ... Cal Poly won 18 straight home games, including the last seven of the 2013 season, before falling to Cal 8-3 on March 22, 2014 ... the Mustangs' 17-3 start in 2014 was the second best for 20 games, exceeded by the 18-2 start of the 1997 squad, while the 25-5 mark in 2014 is the best 30-game start in program history ... Cal Poly's sweep over Cal State Fullerton in 2014 was its first against the Titans since 1973 ... with 15 strikeouts against Seattle in 2014, Matt Imhof broke the school Division I record of 14 set by Mike Zirelli in 1999 and matched by Mason Radeke in 2011 and Imhof twice in 2014 ... prior to the 2014 series win over UCLA, the last time Cal Poly won a series against the Bruins was in 2005, also in Jackie Robinson Stadium ... the Mustangs were 6-3 against Pac-12 teams in 2014, 3-3 in 2015, 1-4 in 2016, 2-5 three years ago, 0-4 in 2018 and 1-9 last spring ... Slater Lee's complete-game two-hit shutout at UCLA in 2014 was the Mustangs' first since Mike Zirelli blanked Fresno State in 1996 ... Cal Poly scored 10 runs against CSU Bakersfield on May 14, 2013, snapping a streak of 27 straight games scoring less than 10 runs, and the Mustangs scored 10 or more runs just five times in 2013 (seven in 2014, nine in 2015, five in 2016, seven in 2017) ... the Mustangs' 7-0 start in 2013 was their best to open a year since the 1981 squad also went 7-0 ... both the 1954 and 1974 teams went 8-0 while the school record was set by the 1951 team at 10-0 ... Cal Poly won 14 straight games, including the final seven of the 2012 season, before Washington snapped the streak March 1, 2013 ... in 2014, Jimmy Allen was Cal Poly's only player to homer twice in a game, accomplishing the feat at CSUN; Elliot Stewart (San Francisco), Nick Torres (Washington) and Brian Mundell (Kansas State) all homered twice in a game in 2013 while Mundell (Sacramento State and Cal State Fullerton) and John Schuknecht (Long Beach State) accomplished the feat in 2015; there were none in 2016, two in 2017, Alex McKenna homering twice against Santa Clara on April 11 and Elijah Skippis at UCSB on May 21, and none in 2018; Nick DiCarlo homered twice at Fresno State in 2019 ... Nebraska's 13-run sixth inning in 2018 is the largest against Cal Poly in 25 Division I seasons; CSUN tallied 12 runs in the third inning in 1995, UCSB scored 11 in the sixth inning in 2014, Pepperdine tallied 11 runs in the second inning in 2016 and Seattle scored 10 times in the sixth inning in 2014 ... the Mustangs' 1-0 win over UC Irvine in 2014 was completed in 1 hour, 48 minutes, the fastest game ever in the 19-year history of Baggett Stadium as well as Cal Poly's 25-year Division I history ... No. 2 on the Baggett Stadium list is the 1-54 game against Cal State Fullerton on April 19, 2014 ... all four Mustang games against Sacramento State in March 2015 were completed in less than 2 hours, 20 minutes and the three games in 2016 were completed in 2:36 or less ... the Mustangs have won 30 or more games 12 times in the last 19 seasons and, in 2019, Cal Poly clinched its 17th season of .500 or better since 2000 ... Cal Poly has swept a season-opening series six times in its 25-year Division I history -- Pacific in 2016, Kansas State in 2014, San Francisco in 2013, Oklahoma State in 2012, Fresno State in 2006 and San Diego in 2005 ... Cal Poly opened the 2011 season with six consecutive losses but won 20 of its first 30 games in 2012 ... Cal Poly was 20 games above the .500 mark three times in 2009 and reached that plateau five times since moving to Division I in 1995, finally breaking through that barrier for the first time on May 19, 2013, at 37-16 with a 7-2 win over CSUN ... Cal Poly finished 35 games above the .500 mark in 2014 ... the one-hitter by Long Beach State's Shawn Stuart on April 1, 2012, was the first one-hitter thrown against Cal Poly since the Mustangs moved to Division I ... no opponent has no-hit the Mustangs and there have been nine two-hitters, the last one by Baylor on March 15, 2019 ... in 2012 Cal Poly swept UC Irvine for the first time in series history; the Mustangs handed the Anteaters their first conference series sweep since 2006 -- a stretch of 48 consecutive series -- and, as a result of the 6-0 series opener, gave UC Irvine its first loss in a conference series opener since 2008, snapping a string of 25 conference series-opening wins ... Cal Poly was 15-17 at home in 2010, the only time the Mustangs have finished below .500 in 19 seasons at Baggett Stadium; last year's squad was 16-14 ... Cal Poly won 13 of 14 weekend series (seven sweeps) in 2014 and 11 of 14 weekend series in 2009 (four sweeps) ... the 2014 squad won eight straight games before falling to Cal on March 22 and had a 12-game winning streak halted by Long Beach State on April 27 ... longest winning streak by the 2015 club was five games, the 2016 team won six in a row, the 2017 Mustangs won five straight, the 2018 squad closed out the year with seven consecutive wins and the 2019 team won six in a row ... in 2005 Cal Poly swept Fresno State in a three-game series for the first time in the then-60-year history of the rivalry, duplicated the feat opening the 2006 campaign in Baggett Stadium and did it again in 2007 at Pete Beiden Field ... the Mustangs have won 21 of their last 32 games against the Bulldogs, including three of five games during Fresno State's national championship season in 2008; the Bulldogs won both meetings in 2017 and 2019 (the two teams did not play each other in 2018) ... Cal Poly won 11 straight games against Fresno State prior to two losses to the Bulldogs in March 2008 ... the Mustangs swept the Highlanders in 2012 for the first time since 2000, duplicated the feat in 2013, 2015 and 2018 and won five straight series, taking 13 of 15 games, before losing two of three contests in 2017 ... in 2019, Cal Poly won a series at Blair Field for the first time in 10 years and swept the Dirtbags on the road for the first time since 1997 ... Long Beach State was 16-2 in a six-year stretch against the Mustangs until Cal Poly won two of three in 2009, its first series win at Blair Field since 1997, and also won two of three in 2010 at home ... the Dirtbags won four straight series against Cal Poly from 2011-14, all two games to one ... Cal Poly's sweep of the Dirtbags last year was its second straight and second since 1997 ... the Mustangs have won 50 of their last 80 games against UC Santa Barbara with sweeps in 2012, 2016, 2017 (the first at UCSB since 2007) and 2018 and are 13-14 in the last nine seasons against four-time national champion Cal State Fullerton, winning nine of the last 18 meetings ... UC Irvine had won four straight series against the Mustangs until Cal Poly swept the Anteaters in 2012 ... all three games of the 2017 series against the Anteaters were decided by one run ... Cal Poly won seven straight series against UC Davis until losing two of three at Dobbins Stadium in 2012, swept the Aggies in 2013 and 2014, also swept UC Davis at Dobbins for the first time on April 12-14, 2019, and is 39-12 all-time against the Aggies, who are 2-16 at Baggett Stadium since joining the Big West in 2008 and 3-21 all-time at Baggett Stadium ... Cal Poly won eight straight games against CSUN prior to a 6-4 setback in May 2015 ... the Mustangs have won eight straight and are 22-6 against CSU Bakersfield ... Cal Poly's 19-0 loss to UCLA on Feb. 27, 2016, is the worst in Baggett Stadium history.

## Mustang Notes

### Pitching Milestones

It's been 17 years since Cal Poly recorded its first no-hitter in more than three decades -- March 28, 2003 -- as left-hander Garrett Olson and right-hander Tony Saipe combined to no-hit Southern Utah, 7-0, in the nightcap of a doubleheader at Cedar City, Utah. Olson pitched 7 1/3 innings and walked five while striking out six. Saipe secured the final five outs with two strikeouts. It is the only no-hitter for Cal Poly since moving to Division I prior to the 1995 season. The game was played in 40-degree weather with light snow flurries and winds up to 25 mph. Prior to that game, the last Mustang no-hitter was recorded by Les Ohrn in a 1-0 win over Cal Poly Pomona on May 8, 1971. On March 26, 1970, Dean Treanor no-hit Cal Poly Pomona, 2-0, on the Mustangs' campus diamond. Two weeks after the Southern Utah no-hitter, Olson blanked Pacific 4-0 with a three-hitter, Cal Poly's first nine-inning shutout by a single pitcher since Chad Snowden blanked UC Santa Barbara 4-0 on March 8, 1997 in SLO Stadium. There have been 12 complete-game shutouts since Olson's gem, including three in 2014 (Slater Lee, Matt Imhof, Casey Bloomquist), two in 2016 (Kyle Smith and Erich Uelmen), one in 2017 (Uelmen) and one in 2018 (Trent Shelton).

### Big West Leaders

At the end of the 2019 season, Cal Poly found itself No. 7 in the Big West in hitting (.260), No. 3 in ERA (4.45) and No. 8 in fielding (.962). The Mustangs were tied for No. 1 in intentional walks allowed (13), No. 2 in the Big West in fewest home runs allowed (23) and errors (80) and No. 3 in double plays turned (46), lowest opponents' batting average (.260) and wild pitches (63). Individually, Bobby Ay is tied for No. 1 with 15 starts on the mound and No. 7 with 74 strikeouts. Bradlee Beesley was No. 7 with 15 doubles, Jarred Zill was No. 10 on the strikeouts list with 65 and Darren Nelson was No. 9 having hit eight batters. Michael Clark was No. 6 with his 2.61 ERA, Ay was third with nine wins and Tate Samuelson was No. 1 in fielding chances (466) and No. 2 in putouts (420). Connor Gurnik was fourth in assists (138) and Nick DiCarlo was 11th (110).

### Big West Finishes ...

Prior to capturing the championship in 2014, Cal Poly's best finishes in the Big West were second place alone in 2012 (16-8), a tie for second place with Long Beach State in 2005 (14-7) and another tie for second place with UC Santa Barbara in 2013 (17-10). The Mustangs, who earned their fourth second-place finish (16-8) in 2017, fifth (15-9) in 2018 and sixth last year (17-7), also were third in 2002 (15-9), 2009 (14-10) and 2011 (15-9), tied for third in 2000 (18-12) and fourth in 2003 (9-12), 2004 (10-11), 2006 (10-11), 2007 (13-8), 2015 (14-10) and 2016 (12-12). The Mustangs joined the Big West in 1997 and have a combined 310-258 conference record (.546 winning percentage) for 23 seasons, finishing in the top four 15 times in the last 17 years, including 2019.

### Four-Year Big West Winning Streak Against Non-Conference Foes Comes to an End

Big West teams were 2-2 against non-conference foes during the 15th week of play and finished the year 123-145 in the 2019 season. In conference series closing out 2019, Long Beach State swept Hawai'i while Cal Poly (at UC Santa Barbara), Cal State Fullerton (at CSUN) and UC Irvine (at UC Riverside) won two of three games. In 2018, the Big West was 4-2 in the postseason for a 119-119 mark. Big West teams were 10-6 in the 2017 postseason and finished 134-141-1 against non-conference foes for the year, snapping a streak of four seasons with a winning mark. The nine Big West teams were 169-121-1 in 2016. UC Santa Barbara advanced all the way to the College World Series and finished with a 6-2 postseason mark. The Big West was 159-128-2 against non-conference teams for the 2015 season. Big West teams finished the 2014 regular season 162-109 and were 12-9 in the postseason for a 174-118 overall mark against non-conference opposition. All four Big West teams in the 2014 regionals reached the championship finals with UC Irvine advancing to the Super Regionals and the College World Series. Big West teams were 139-145 against non-conference opponents in 2012, resulting in just one team -- Cal State Fullerton -- advancing to the postseason for the first time in 26 years. Cal Poly was 23-9 in non-conference games in 2014, 13-17 in 2015, 20-13 in 2016, 12-20 in 2017 and 15-18 in 2018.

## Mustang Notes

### Big West Fifth in Nation in Major League Draftees

Among the 31 NCAA Division I conferences in the nation, the Big West annually is ranked among the top five in terms of the number of players drafted. A total of 27 players from Big West schools were selected in the 2019 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft, exceeded only by the SEC, Big 12, Pac-12 and Atlantic Coast. One Cal Poly player was selected last year (Bobby Ay in the ninth round by Arizona) and three were chosen in 2018 (Alex McKenna, Nick Meyer and Kyle Marinconz). A total of 73 Cal Poly players have been drafted in the last 17 years. Also, since 1990 the Big West has the sixth-best winning percentage in College World Series play, posting a 31-35 record.

### Mustangs in the Professional Ranks

A total of 17 former Mustang baseball players played professionally last summer, including one in the Major Leagues -- Mitch Haniger with the Seattle Mariners. Those in the minors included pitcher Chase Johnson, infielders Mike Miller at Pawtucket and Rochester, Peter Van Gansen at El Paso and Mark Mathias at Columbus and outfielders Nick Torres at Puebla, Brian Mundell at Albuquerque and Zack Zehner at Scranton/Wilkes-Barre in Triple-A and pitchers Erich Uelmen at Tennessee and Spencer Howard at Reading in Double-A.

### Retired Numbers

Four Cal Poly jerseys have been retired, but only three numbers. That's because catcher John Orton and outfielder Monty Waltz both wore No. 9. Pitcher Mike Krukow's jersey (21) has been retired as well as that of shortstop Ozzie Smith (3).

### Class-by-Class Breakdown

The 2020 Cal Poly baseball team has seven freshmen, six sophomores, 13 juniors and five seniors -- pitcher Craig Colen, catchers Myles Emmerson and Connor Loucks, infielder Jack Kuzma and outfielder Bradlee Beesley. Cal Poly had just two seniors in 2016 and 2019, four seniors in the 2012, 2013 and 2014 seasons and five in both 2017 and 2018.

### Triple Plays

Cal Poly has hit into a pair of triple plays since moving to Division I prior to the 1995 season. Against Pepperdine on May 18, 2010, in Baggett Stadium, two Mustang batters

drew walks and, with the runners going, Bobby Crocker lined out to Pepperdine shortstop Zach Vincej. Vincej flipped the ball to second baseman Joe Sever for the second out and Sever tagged the runner from first base to complete the triple play. In Cal Poly's next-to-last game of the 2003 season at Stanford, the Mustangs hit into their first Division I triple play. Sam Herbert led off the game with a single and Scott Anderson walked. Adam Leavitt lined out to Cardinal first baseman John Mayberry Jr. Mayberry stepped on the bag for the second out and threw to shortstop Tobin Swope to complete the triple play. The Mustangs have not turned a double play since moving to Division I in 1995.

### Mustangs in Top 100

Among the 359 current and former Division I baseball programs in the NCAA, Cal Poly ranked No. 77 in total number of victories through the 2019 season with 1,983 wins over 115 seasons. Since the first baseball game played at Cal Poly in 1905, the Mustangs have compiled a 1,983-1,756-15 record (.530 winning percentage). The national leader is Fordham with 4,517 wins in 159 seasons, followed by Texas (3,512) and Southern California (3,129).

### New Rules for 2019 and 2020 Seasons

One of the major rules changes for the current two-year cycle allows a head coach to signal to the umpire when the coach intends to intentionally walk a batter without throwing four pitches. In addition, defensive conferences per regulation game will be limited to six, three by a coach. A team will be charged with an offensive conference if the batter/runner or runners leave their position during a defensive conference. A batter will be assessed a strike and not awarded first base if, in the judgment of the umpire, the batter makes an intentional movement to be hit by a pitch, regardless of where the pitch is located. A defensive player at any base, including home plate, may not block any part of the base or plate with any part of his body unless he has clear possession of the ball. A balk shall be called if a pitcher fakes a throw to third base and then throws to first base. Finally, the time between innings of a non-televvised game will be 120 seconds, 30 more than in previous seasons. The clock begins when the last out is made and visible clocks must be installed by the start of conference play this spring. A 20-second play clock will be enforced on all plays. The windup and set positions have been clarified to assist umpires in properly applying applicable pitching rules.

## Working Overtime

Cal Poly's first extra-inning game of 2019 resulted in a 12-inning 2-1 victory over Columbia on March 9. The Mustangs fell to Santa Clara 7-6 in 10 innings on April 2 and to Pepperdine 6-5 in 11 innings on May 7, finishing 1-2 in overtime contests. Cal Poly played back-to-back extra-inning games to open the 2018 campaign and finished the year 3-1, all 10-inning affairs, with wins over Gonzaga, New Mexico and UC Riverside and a loss to New Mexico. After playing eight extra-inning games in 2003 and six more in 2004, Cal Poly played just 10 extra-inning games from 2005-08. The Mustangs, however, played five overtime contests in 2009, all at home, and won them all. Cal Poly won all four of its extra-inning games of the 2010 season and was 1-2 in both 2011 and 2012. A streak of 10 consecutive extra-inning wins by the Mustangs was snapped March 29, 2011, by Pepperdine as the Waves beat the Mustangs 7-4 in 11 innings. The Mustangs are 46-25 in extra-inning affairs since moving to Division I prior to the 1995 season, including two victories in 2013, one in 2014, one in 2015, two in both the 2016 and 2017 seasons and three a year ago.

## Twin Killings

Cal Poly opened the 2019 campaign by turning just one double play in a three-game series at Oklahoma but had 46 for the year, tied for No. 2 in the Big West. In 2018, Cal Poly turned only three double plays in four games in Arizona, hit into nine twin-killings, thwarting numerous rallies. In 2018, the Mustangs hit into 56 double plays — four against New Mexico — while turning 52. The Mustangs turned five double plays in their 2017 season-opening series at Cal, four of the infield variety and a fifth when Scott Ogrin made a catch in right field and threw out a Cal runner at the plate in the season opener. Cal Poly's third twin-killing of the game. The Mustangs also turned five double plays in the Hawai'i series and had 43 double plays for the year. In 2016, the Mustangs notched 45 double plays in 57 games. Cal Poly, which turned three double plays in the Grand Canyon and UC Davis series in 2015, had 32 twin killings in 54 games. The Mustangs turned 44 double plays in 59 games four years ago. In 2013, the Mustangs turned 39 double plays -- four against UC Davis on March 30 and seven in the series with six more in the second UCSB series. The record for double plays in one game is five, turned Feb. 21, 2004, against Santa Clara. The Mustangs turned 40 double plays in 2012 -- five in the Minnesota series -- and turned 29 double plays in 2011 -- five in the CSUN series and four in a single game at Stanford on May 24. In 2009, the Mustangs, who turned five double plays in the UC Santa Barbara series, notched a total of 51. Cal Poly turned 46 double plays in 56 games in 2007, including eight in the Fresno State series. The Mustangs also turned eight double plays in the season-opening series against Fresno State in 2006 and finished with 52 in 56 games. Cal Poly turned 65 double plays in 2003, the most since moving up to Division I prior to the 1995 season.

## Playoff Bound ...

Seven of Cal Poly's 22 opponents on the 2020 schedule earned NCAA regional playoff berths a year ago -- Vanderbilt, Michigan, Baylor, Connecticut, Stanford, Fresno State and UC Santa Barbara. The Mustangs will play 15 games against those seven squads this year, including national runner-up Michigan four times. Cal State Fullerton's streak of 27 consecutive seasons in the postseason came to an end last spring.

## Another Tough Schedule ...

WarrenNolan.com rated Cal Poly's 2019 schedule as the 95th toughest in the nation as the 20 foes were 1,445-1,333. The Mustangs had an RPI of 123. At the end of the 2018 regular season, Cal Poly had an RPI of 130 and a strength of schedule of 123, according to WarrenNolan.com. In 2017, the web site calculated Cal Poly's RPI at 110 and strength of schedule at 99 at the end of the season. Cal Poly's RPI after the 2016 season was No. 121 with a strength of schedule of 149. The Mustangs finished 2015 with an RPI of 114 and a strength of schedule at 99. At the end of the 2014 season, WarrenNolan.com had Cal Poly with an RPI of 16, though Cal Poly's strength of schedule was No. 146. Cal Poly finished the 2010 season with the 13th toughest schedule in the nation, opened the 2008 campaign with the 13th-toughest schedule in the nation, was No. 1 midway through and finished No. 7. Boydsworld ranked Cal Poly as having the 10th-toughest schedule in 2006 and 18th-toughest schedule in 2005.

## Homegrown Product ...

Cal Poly, which had a Division I-record seven out-of-state players on its baseball roster in 2018, had six from outside California last year and six again this spring. Infielder Jack Kuzma and pitcher Matt Arens are from Minnesota, outfielder Cole Cabrera hails from Hawai'i, infielder Connor Gurnik is from Illinois, infielder Nick DiCarlo calls Scottsdale, Arizona, his hometown and pitcher Drew Thorpe hails from Washington, Utah. The two players with Central Coast roots are shortstop Brooks Lee from San Luis Obispo High School and catcher Mark Armstrong from Paso Robles High School.

## Kissing Your Sister

For three straight years (2002-04), Cal Poly had a tie on its record. The Mustangs and San Jose State tied 6-6 in a game Feb. 6, 2004 called after seven innings due to darkness. Cal Poly tied Gonzaga 8-8 on March 12, 2003, in a tournament game at Fresno and battled Hawai'i-Hilo to an 8-8 draw on Jan. 21, 2002, the first tie in 20 years. In 1982, the Mustangs and UC Santa Barbara battled to a 10-10 draw. Cal Poly has not had a tie on its record since 2004.

against Pac-12 schools — four at Oregon and one at home versus Stanford — along with Big West series at home against UC Irvine, UC Santa Barbara, Long Beach State and UC Davis. In all, Cal Poly plays 35 of its 59 games inside Baggett Stadium.

The Mustangs return 10 of the 11 position players who started 20 or more games in 2019 and eight of last year's 13 pitchers. The group of veterans is paced by junior corner infielder Tate Samuelson, who has led Cal Poly in home runs and RBIs each of the last two years, senior center fielder Bradlee Beesley, who is in or near the all-time top 10 in several offensive categories at Cal Poly, and junior right-hander Taylor Dollard, who was 5-0 with a 2.89 ERA and four saves as a relief pitcher a year ago and is making the switch to the weekend rotation this spring as the Mustangs' Friday night starter.

In his 18th season at the helm of the Mustangs, Lee must solve two problems.

Last year's club produced the lowest batting average (.260), lowest on-base percentage (.341), lowest slugging percentage (.332), fewest runs scored (247), fewest RBIs (217), fewest doubles (76), fewest home runs (13) and fewest steals (22) in Cal Poly's 25 Division I seasons. The Mustangs were seventh in the Big West in hitting and eighth in fielding with 80 errors in 56 games.

The other issue is the slow starts. For the third straight year and fourth in the last five seasons, Cal Poly was tormented by a slow start in 2019. The Mustangs, 2-9 after being swept for the third straight weekend, won 26 of their last 45 games to finish at the break-even mark last spring. Cal Poly was 6-10 before wrapping up the 2018 campaign 30-27 (winning their final seven contests) and 3-11 before finishing 28-28 (won seven of last nine games) in 2017. The Mustangs also opened the 2015 season 7-14 but rallied to finish 27-27 (winning 17 of its last 26 games).

Slow starts in non-conference games force the Mustangs to win the Big West to get into the postseason. They have come close with three consecutive second-place finishes, but not good enough to compile an RPI worthy of postseason consideration.

After Dollard on Friday, Cal Poly plans to start junior southpaw Andrew Alvarez (1-3, 5.10 ERA in 2019) against Michigan and freshman right-hander Drew Thorpe, a graduate of Desert Hills High in St. George, Utah, versus Vanderbilt on Sunday.

UConn was 39-25 last year, finished fourth in the American Athletic Conference and posted a 2-2 mark in the Oklahoma City Regional. In his 17th season at the helm of the Huskies, Jim Penders welcomed back 18 lettermen, including five position starters and seven pitchers. UConn will be led by first baseman/outfielder Chris Winkel (.264, 44 RBIs, 13 steals in 2019) and right-hander Colby Dunlop (7-4, 4.31 ERA).

Michigan won 50 of 72 games and finished second in the Big Ten on its way to a second-place national finish, losing to Vanderbilt 8-2 in the third and final game of last year's best-of-three championship series at the College World Series. Eighth-year head coach Erik Bakich has 26 returning lettermen, including five position starters and 13 pitchers, led by outfielders Jordan Nwogu (.321, 12 home runs, 46 RBIs) and Jesse Franklin (.262, 13 home runs, 55 RBIs) along with right-hander Jeff Criswell (7-1, 2.72 ERA, three saves).

Vanderbilt, which also won the national title in 2014, went 59-12 last spring and won the Southeastern Conference (SEC) title with a 23-7 mark. In his 18th season with the Commodores, Tim Corbin is working with 19 returning lettermen but lost six of his position starters and seven of the 15 pitchers on last year's staff. Top returnees include utility player Austin Martin (.392, 105 hits, 10 home runs, 46 RBIs, 18 steals in 2019), and pitchers Kumar Rocker (12-5, 3.25 ERA), Mason Hickman (9-0, 2.05 ERA) and Tyler Brown (3-1, 2.19 ERA, 17 saves), all right-handers.

The Mustangs are playing Vanderbilt and Connecticut for the first time in baseball and own a 2-0 advantage over Michigan with a 5-1 win in 2016 at Baggett Stadium and an 8-1 victory in 2018 in the Tony Gwynn Classic at San Diego.

Cal Poly won the Big West title in 2014 and has placed second six times, third four times and fourth six times since 2000, posting a combined record of 310-258 in 23 years as a member of the Big West.

Cal Poly won seven of its 15 weekend series in addition to a 2-2 split with Saint Mary's in 2019. Along with their sweep of Columbia to halt the early season slide, the Mustangs swept CSUN, UC Davis and Long Beach State en route to a 12-2 start in Big West play, finishing 17-7 and two games behind UC Santa Barbara. A win on the final day of the season would have resulted in a tie for first place between the Mustangs and Gauchos and Cal Poly would have attained the conference's automatic qualifying berth in the NCAA regionals. The Mustangs won six of their eight Big West series.

Cal Poly has had just three losing seasons since 2000 and has reached the 30-win mark 12 times this century. The Mustangs have won 184 of their last 259 home games for a 71.0 winning percentage.

Lee (541-419-2) reached the 500-victory milestone on April 20, 2018, with a 5-4 triumph over Long Beach State.
