KENTUCKY ON THE HUNT FOR SIXTH STRAIGHT WIN VS. VANDERBILT

Kentucky travels to Music City, USA on Saturday in hopes of extending one streak and ending another when it takes on the Vanderbilt Commodores. Game time is 7 p.m. ET and it will air on ESPN2 and the UK Sports Network.

The Wildcats are seeking a sixth consecutive win against the Commodores and seventh in the past eight meetings as they look to continue their recent advantage in the series. A win also would end a three-game losing streak after opening the season with six straight wins.

Offensively, the Wildcats have been guided by quarterback Will Levis, who is completing 65.7 percent of his passes for 1,848 yards and 17 touchdowns. He accounted for 419 yards of total offense and five touchdowns in last week's slugfest with Tennessee. Levis' top target has been Wan'Dale Robinson, who is among the leading receivers in the Southeastern Conference with 71 catches for 825 yards and five TDs. The ground game has been paced by Christopher Rodriguez Jr., who has rushed for 918 yards and five scores, and he ranks second in the league in rushing with 102 yards per game.

The Kentucky defense has been exceptional at times in 2021, with linebackers DeAndre Square and Jacquez Jones leading the team in tackles, while safety Yusuf Corker and defensive end Josh Paschal are among the SEC leaders in pass breakups and tackles for loss, respectively.

QUICK NOTES

- UK is receiving votes in both the Associated Press Poll and USA Today Coaches Poll.
- Coach Mark Stoops is his ninth season in Lexington. He is 55-53 overall, ranking second in school history behind Paul "Bear" Bryant (60).
- Stoops started his tenure 12-26 but has gone an astounding 43-27 (.614) since that time, moving over .500 for the first time in his term as head coach.
- Stoops was recently named one of 16 coaches on the Dodd Trophy Midseason Watch List, college football's most coveted coaching award.
- UK is seeking a sixth consecutive win over Vanderbilt and seventh in the past eight meetings.
- The Wildcats dropped a wild affair vs. Tennessee last Saturday in heartbreaking fashion, falling 45-42 in a game the Cats piled up more than 600 yards of offense, 99 plays and 46 minutes of possession.

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- Before falling at No. 1 Georgia on Oct. 16, Kentucky had won its last eight games, marking the fifth-longest win streak in school history.
- Kentucky opened the season 6-0. UK's previous 6-0 starts include 1950 (10-0), 1910 (7-0), 1903 (7-0) and 1898 (7-0).
- Kentucky started 4-0 in the SEC for the fourth time in school history (also 1949, 1950, 1977).
- The win over Florida was Kentucky's first win over a AP top-10 team since a 31-28 win over South Carolina in 2010.
- UK's 29 victories since the start of the 2018 season rank sixth-most in the SEC.
- Those 29 wins rank 16th among Power Five programs.
- Senior offensive tackle Darian Kinnard (CBS Sports, Sporting News, The Athletic) and sophomore offensive guard Eli Cox (AP, ESPN) each have been named midseason All-Americans.
- Junior quarterback Will Levis was named the Walter Camp National Offensive Player of the Week after accounting for UK's first five touchdowns (three passing, two rushing) in the win over LSU.
- Senior linebacker Jacquez Jones was named the Walter Camp National FBS Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts in the win over Florida on Oct. 2, which included batting down a pass in the end zone to seal the win in the closing seconds.
- Senior defensive end Josh Paschal was named the Reese's Senior Bowl Defensive Player of the Week after tallying 7.0 tackles, 2.5 tackles for loss and the game-changing blocked field goal in the win over UF.
- Stoops is the first UK coach to defeat Florida and Tennessee both home and away since Fran Curci (1976, 1977).
- Stoops has reached two additional milestones this season. His ninth season ties Fran Curci (1973-81) for the most seasons as head coach at Kentucky and his 108 games has passed Curci (100 games) for most games as head coach.
- Stoops is the second-longest tenured coach in the SEC (behind Alabama's Nick Saban) and the 13th-longest nationally.
- Stoops became the first head coach to take UK to five straight bowl games. The previous record was by Rich Brooks in his last four seasons, 2006-09.

MILESTONES TO LOOK FOR...

- Head coach Mark Stoops has 55 career victories at Kentucky, No. 2 on the school's all-time list. Paul "Bear" Bryant is first with 60.
- Coach Stoops has 28 SEC wins, surpassing Fran Curci (25) for the most in school history.
- Coach Stoops now holds the record for most total home wins in school history (40).
- Junior RB Chris Rodriguez Jr. has 2,279 career rushing yards for ninth place on the school's all-time list and is the 10th player in school history to reach 2,000. He needs 232 more yards to tie Stanley "Boom" Williams (2,511 from 2014-16) at No. 8.
- Rodriguez has 22 career rushing touchdowns and needs three to tie for fourth in UK history with Mark Higgs, George Adams and Derrick Ramsey.
- Rodriguez has 11 career 100-yard rushing games, tied for 5th-most.
- Rodriguez has 918 rushing yards this season and needs 82 to reach 1,000. If he makes it, he would be the 10th Wildcat to do so and the 14th time it has been accomplished.
- Junior WR Wan'Dale Robinson has 71 receptions and is seventh on the school's singleseason list. He needs two to tie Craig Yeast, who caught 73 in 1997.
- Senior WR Josh Ali is No. 26 on the all-time receiving yards list with 1,177. He needs 23 more to move up to No. 25 with Steve Johnson (1,200 from 2006-07). He also has 116 career receptions, the 18th Wildcat to reach the century mark in catches.
- Junior RB Kavosiey Smoke has 1,240 career rushing yards. He currently sits at No. 33 and needs 10 more to move up to No. 32.
- Senior DE Josh Paschal has 32.5 career tackles for loss, tied for sixth in school history. He needs 4.5 to move into a four-way tie for third.
- With six wins, Kentucky already is eligible for a school-record sixth straight bowl season.
- Kentucky has 11 players in school history who have rushed for at least 1,900 career yards. Four of those have come during Stoops' tenure: Benny Snell Jr. (3,873), Stanley "Boom" Williams (2,511), Chris Rodriguez Jr. (2,279) and A.J. Rose (1,971).
- RB Chris Rodriguez Jr. is second in the SEC and 16th nationally with 102.0 yards per game.
- Guided by defensive coordinator Brad White, UK is fourth in the FBS in fourth down defense (25%), 22nd in tackles for loss (6.6 per game) and 39th in total defense (349.4).
- UK has allowed 30 or fewer points in 40 of the past 47 games.
- After entering the lineup in the third game of the season, senior Colin Goodfellow has emerged as one of the nation's best punters, averaging 47.5 yards per kick.
- During Stoops' tenure, the Wildcats have had nine different starting quarterbacks win a game in Jalen Whitlow, Maxwell Smith, Patrick Towles, Drew Barker, Stephen Johnson, Luke Wright, Lynn Bowden Jr., Terry Wilson and now Will Levis.
- Kentucky was predicted to finish third in the SEC Eastern Division by a preseason poll of media covering SEC Media Days.
- Since 2016, UK is 19-8 (.704) in games decided by seven points or less.
- The Wildcats signed their eighth straight top-50 recruiting class under Stoops in 2020.

SERIES VS. VANDERBILT

- Kentucky leads the all-time series 47-42-4.
- Vanderbilt leads 27-21-2 in Nashville, but the Wildcats have won the past two in the Music City.
- UK has won the past five meetings and six of the past seven.
- UK has held Vanderbilt to 22 points or less in six of the last seven meetings.
- The first meeting between the schools came in 1896, a 6-0 Vanderbilt win in Nashville. Of SEC teams, only the Tennessee series dates back further (1893).
- The last time UK traveled to Vanderbilt, Kentucky defeated Vanderbilt, 38-14, in Nashville.
- The Cats erased a 14-3 first quarter deficit by scoring the game's final 35 points.
- At the time, it was UK's largest SEC road win since in 18 years. The Cats defeated Vanderbilt 56-30 in Nashville in 2001.
- Throughout the series' history it has typically featured close outcomes. Thirty-eight meetings have been decided by a touchdown or less in the series, including four of the past six.
- Biggest UK win: 51 (53-2) in 1978 in Lexington.

- Biggest Vanderbilt win: 50 (50-0) in 1897 in Nashville.
- Games decided by eight points or less: UK leads 20-17.
- The series has had three scoreless ties in its history.
- UK coach Mark Stoops is 6-2 vs. Vanderbilt during his tenure.
- UK running back Chris Rodriguez Jr. has been outstanding vs. Vanderbilt in his career. He has rushed for at least 129 yards and two scores in each of the past two seasons. In total, he has 278 rushing yards on 28 carries and four scores. He is averaging 9.9 yards per rush vs. Vanderbilt.

A UK WIN WOULD...

- Give Kentucky a sixth consecutive win over Vanderbilt and seventh in the past eight meetings.
- Move UK to 5-3 in SEC play and secure a winning conference record for the second time under head coach Mark Stoops (2018). It would be the second winning SEC record for UK since the 1977 team finished 6-0 in league play.
- Clinch second place in the 2021 SEC Eastern Division standings.
- Give Kentucky multiple SEC road wins this season.
- Give the Cats nine wins in the past 12 games.
- Give Stoops 29 SEC victories at UK, extending his school record.
- Give Stoops 56 career victories at UK, putting him just four wins shy of tying Paul "Bear"
 Bryant for the school's all-time winning coach.

- Kentucky has three players from state of Tennessee: DB Adrian Huey (Nashville), OT Darian Kinnard (Knoxville) and DL Tre'Vonn Rybka (Dickson).
- Vanderbilt has one player on its roster from Kentucky: LB Michael Spencer (Union)

LAST MEETING VS. VANDERBILT

- Kentucky defeated Vanderbilt, 38-35, in Lexington on November 14, 2020.
- It was Kentucky's fifth consecutive win in the series and fourth straight in Lexington vs. the Commodores.
- The game was played just days after the death of offensive line coach John Schlarman, who was battling stage four cancer.
- The team honored Schlarman by wearing a black sticker on their helmets with the
 initials "JS" in white letters. Senior offensive tackle Landon Young wore jersey number 65,
 Schlarman's number at UK.
- On the first offensive play, UK took a delay of game penalty, graciously declined by Vanderbilt, as Young took the field wearing Schlarman's jersey.
- Kentucky scored on its first five offensive possessions, extending into the third quarter.
- Kentucky has had a 100-yard rusher vs. Vanderbilt for four straight seasons, first time that has happened against VU since 1981-84.
- Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed 13 times for a career-high 149 yards and a career-high-tying two touchdown. He averaged 11.5 yards per attempt, best for a UK rusher against an SEC

KENNETH HORSEY NAMED TO ALLSTATE AFCA GOOD WORKS TEAM

- Junior offensive guard Kenneth Horsey was one of 22 student-athletes, including one of
 just 11 football players from the FBS, to be named to the 2021 Allstate American Football
 Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team®. The team honors football players for their
 dedication to community service and the positive impact they have made on the lives of
 others.
- Horsey, was the 2020 Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year, has a remarkable comeback story that has inspired his community service work for heart health.
- In the spring of 2018, before he was to arrive at Kentucky for his freshman season, he was complaining of a pain in his side. His parents rushed him to the emergency room where doctors ultimately found a growth on one of his heart valves. He went through open-heart surgery on April 8, 2018 and was even told by a few doctors that his football career was over. However, Horsey would not be deterred. He came to Kentucky and redshirted the 2018 season with a goal of earning a starting spot on Kentucky's offensive line, affectionately known as the "Big Blue Wall." In 2019, he saw action in four games and continued to train and prepare his body for the rigors of the Southeastern Conference. Since his surgery in 2018, he has lost 50 pounds and because of his hard work and dedication, has earned the starting left guard spot on the "Big Blue Wall." He started in eight games played in 2020, helping the Wildcats rank fifth in the Southeastern Conference in rushing offense (187.4) and is the current starter at left guard on the 2021 squad.
- Because of his heart condition and how supported he felt through his surgery and
 recovery, he began volunteering with the Lexington chapter of the American Heart
 Association in 2020. Earlier this month, Horsey was even awarded the Finn Collier Service
 Award by the AHA in recognition of his work to support its lifesaving mission to be a
 relentless force for a world of longer, healthier lives.
- Horsey coordinated and planned a hands-only CPR training for the UK Football team and staff in the spring of 2021 and helped plan a Hands-Only CPR media availability on June 14 that promoted Hands-Only CPR awareness to the media for CPR Awareness Month.
- Kentucky has the second-most honorees on the national Good Works Team with 17.
 Horsey is the fifth player under head coach Mark Stoops to be named to the prestigious team, including the third straight Landon Young, 2019; Luke Fortner, 2020. He's also the third straight offensive lineman named to the team.

WILL LEVIS-TATING AS THE STARTING QB

- Quarterback Will Levis earned the starting spot early in fall camp after transferring from Penn State and he has taken his role and run with it. The 6-foot-3, 232-pound signal caller has started every game and his pass efficiency rating of 141.1 rating points is the highest for a UK starting quarterback since MIke Hartline (146.4) in the 2010 season.
- Ranks eighth in the SEC in passing yards per game (205.3) and fifth in passing TDs (17)
- Ranks 10th in the SEC in total offense (231.0 yards per game)
- Against LSU, named National Offensive Player of the Week by the Walter Camp Football
 Foundation after accounting for the first five touchdowns (three passing, two rushing) in the
 win over the Tigers.
- Against Tennessee he accounted for 419 yards total offense and five touchdowns. He
 completed 31 of 49 passes for a career-high 372 yards and three touchdowns and, despite
 being sacked three times, rushed 15 times for a net 47 yards and two TDs.
- It is the most passing yards for a Wildcat since Patrick Towles threw for 390 yards vs.
 Mississippi State in 2014 and the most yards total offense since Towles had 466 (390 passing, 76 rushing) vs. Mississippi State in 2014.
- He is the first Wildcat to have at least 15 rushing touchdowns and five rushing TDs in one season since Jared Lorenzen in 2003.

IT'S A WAN'DERFUL LIFE

- The Cats scored big in the offseason when Nebraska transfer **Wan'Dale Robinson**, a Frankfort, Kentucky native, transferred back to the Commonwealth.
- Through nine games, Robinson ranks eighth nationally and leads the SEC with 7.1 rpg.
- He is 24th nationally and second in the SEC in receiving yards per game (90.1), and eightth in the SEC in all-purpose yards per game (102.1). He currently has eight plays of 30+ yards.
- He has four 100-yard games this season.
- Against Tennessee he set career highs with 13 receptions for 166 yards. The 13 catches ties for second-most in a game in UK history, most since Lynn Bowden Jr. at Missouri in 2018.
- He is the first UK player with at least nine catches in three straight games since Anthony White in 1998
- 166 yards marks the second-most in school history against Tennessee, behind 170 by Dee Smith in 1987.
- He has 71 catches this season, seventh on the UK single-season list and most since Randall Cobb in 2010.
- Robinson showed he was worth all the hype in the opener vs. ULM, hauling in a pair of touchdown receptions as he roasted the coverage on his way to 125 yards on five catches.
- He caught nine passes at Mississippi State and 12 at Georgia, becoming the first Wildcat to catch at least nine in consecutive games since Keenan Burton in 2006.
- In week two against Missouri, he set the tone with a 64-yard run on the second play from

- In the win over No. 10 Florida he delivered a jaw-dropping catch-and-run in which he took a tunnel screen pass, cut inside, juked a pair of defenders and raced for a 41-yard score.
- He brings a wealth of experience after two seasons with the Huskers. In 2020, he led Nebraska with 51 catches and 461 receiving yards despite playing only eight games and splitting duties at running back. As a freshman in 2019, Robinson caught 40 passes for 443 yards and two touchdowns while rushing for 340 yards and three scores. The 40 catches and 443 receiving yards were the most by any true freshman in Nebraska history.

HOT C-ROD

- Junior RB **Chris Rodriguez Jr.** has 918 rushing yards this season and is one of the nation's top running backs this season
- He set a school record for a UK player in the first two games of a season (332).
- He is second in the SEC and is 16th nationally with 102.0 yards per game and sixth in the SEC in all-purpose yards (108.2).
- He has 2,279 career rushing yards, ninth place in school history and is the 10th player in school history to reach 2,000 career yards.
- Rodriguez rushed for a touchdown in five consecutive games, second-longest streak in school history, before seeing it end vs. Chattanooga.
- He is the 10th player in school history with at least 20 rushing touchdowns.
- He ranks third in yards per carry for his career (min. 200) at 6.53.
- He has 11 career 100-yard rushing games, tied for fifth-most in school history.
- He has had only 11 of his 349 career carries go for negative yardage, a staggering testament to his ability to hit the hole and grind out yards.
- He set new career highs with 27 carries for 207 yards vs. Missouri. The 207 rushing yards are
 the most for a UK player vs. Missouri and broke the UK record for most rushing yards in an SEC
 opener. He earned Co-SEC Offensive Player of the Week honors.

MARK STOOPS ON DODD TROPHY, BRYANT COACH OF YEAR WATCH LISTS

- Kentucky head coach Mark Stoops was named one of 16 head coaches named to the Dodd Trophy Midseason Watch List by the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Foundation and Peach Bowl, Inc.
- The Dodd Trophy, college football's most coveted coaching award, celebrates the head coach of a team who enjoys success on the gridiron, while also stressing the importance of scholarship, leadership and integrity – the three pillars of legendary coach Bobby Dodd's philosophy.
- The midseason watch list takes into consideration each program's current performance during the 2021 season, Academic Progress Rate (APR), and each coach's commitment to service and charity in the community.
- Stoops also is on the American Heart Association's 2021 Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year
 Award watch list. The award is given annually to a college football coach for contributions that
 make the sport better for athletes and fans alike by demonstrating grit, integrity and a winning
 approach to coaching and life -- both on and off the field.
- Stoops has done a remarkable job in his ninth season at Kentucky, starting the season at 6-0 for the first time since 1950 and leading the Wildcats to top-15 national ranking.
- After two games of the 2016 season, his record was 12-26 but he has gone 43-27 (.614) since.
 Overall, Stoops is now 55-53 at Kentucky and is nearing Paul "Bear" Bryant's school-record 60 victories
- Stoops currently holds school records for most home wins (40), total SEC wins (28) and total games coached at UK (108).
- Off the field, Stoops is a staunch supporter of the Kentucky Children's Hospital, helping raise more than \$500,000 annually for the kids.

SIMPLY STOOPS-ENDOUS

UK head coach Mark Stoops has proven to be an excellent hire, turning around a struggling program and making him the first UK coach to lead the program to a fifth consecutive bowl appearance. He also has erased a number of the long-standing hurdles and streaks that have plagued the program's history.

The accomplishments include, but aren't limited to:

- First New Year's Day bowl win since 1951 (2018)
- First 10-win season since 1977 (2018)
- First winning SEC record since 1977 (2018)
- First SEC Coach of the Year since 1983 (2018)
- First ranking in the final AP Poll since 1984 (2018)

- First win at Florida since 1979 (2018)
- Ended 31-game losing streak to Florida (2018) and followed up by ending a 35-year home drought against the Gators on Oct. 2, 2021.

- Senior defensive end Josh Paschal's story is well-chronicled, his return from cancer a remarkable testament to his courage and perserverance. But focusing solely on that would do a disservice to his on-field exploits.
- Paschal played perhaps the game of his life in the Cats' win over No. 10 Florida, highlighted by a blocked field goal that teammate Trevin Wallace caught and returned 76 yards for a go-ahead touchdown in the third quarter.
- It was Kentucky's first blocked field goal returned for a touchdown since David Jones had a 57-yard blocked field goal return against Vanderbilt in 2008.
- It is Paschal's third blocked kick of his career, also a blocked punt vs. Eastern Michigan in 2017 and blocked punt vs. Tennessee in
- Paschal currently has the Cats' most recent blocked field goal and
- In addition to the game-changing blocked field goal, Paschal added seven tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss while dominating the game at the line of scrimmage.

- The Kentucky offensive line was one of 19 units named to the midseason honor roll for the Joe Moore Award, recognizing the Most Outstanding Offensive Line Unit in college football.
- It's the fourth consecutive season that the Kentucky offensive line, known as the "Big Blue Wall," has been named to the honor roll.
- Behind Kentucky's talented "Big Blue Wall," running back Chris Rodriguez Jr. leads the SEC in rushing and is ninth nationally in total rushing yardage.
- UK linemen, led by offensive line coach Eric Wolford and graduate assistant coach Ryan Finck, were chosen SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week three times in the first six weeks of the season.

WARFORD ELECTED TO UK ATHLETICS HOF

The University of Kentucky Athletics Hall of Fame Class of 2021 was announced in June of 2021, with Bettie Lou Evans (women's golf), Kendra Harrison (women's track and field), Nazr Mohammed (men's basketball), Larry Warford (football), Bob Whelan (men's track and field/cross country) and Arin Gilliland Wright (women's soccer) chosen for induction.

The new Hall of Famers were inducted on Thursday, Nov. 4, during Hall of Fame Weekend. They were joined by the 2020 class that could not be honored last year because of Covid precautions – Chanda Bell (softball), Sawyer Carroll (baseball), Ron Mercer (men's basketball), AJ Reed (baseball), Danny Trevathan (football) and Wayne Turner (men's basketball).

Larry Warford, Football (2009-12)

One of the greatest offensive linemen in Kentucky history went on to an outstanding career in the NFL ... Helped UK to two bowl games ... Did not allow a quarterback sack and graded over 90% during his senior year ... Earned all-star recognition all four years at UK ... Earned All-America Third Team honors as a senior from Associated Press and Phil Steele's College Football ... All-SEC First Team as a senior by ESPN.com and CBSsports.com ... All-SEC Second Team as a junior and sophomore ... Named to the Sophomore All-America Team by College Football News ... Freshman All-SEC by league coaches ... Seven-year NFL career with Detroit and New Orleans ... Pro Bowl selection in 2017, 2018 and 2019.

- All totaled, the Wildcats have 99 combined starts on the offensive line. Senior right tackle Darian Kinnard has started in 34 consecutive games, while super senior Luke Fortner has started in 31 straight games, including the last eight at center.
- Kinnard and sophomore right guard Eli Cox have both received midseason All-America honors this season. Kinnard is on the midseason All-America watch lists for The Athletic, Sporting News and CBS Sports, while Cox has earned midseason honors from ESPN and AP.

UK TAKES ADVANTAGE OF NCAA TRANSFER PORTAL WITH SEVEN NEW **ADDITIONS**

Head coach Mark Stoops took advantage of the NCAA Transfer Portal to fulfill needs in key positions for the 2021 season and beyond. UK has welcomed seven new Wildcats to the program in 2021, all who will be eligible immediately due to the NCAA's one-time transfer rule.

KENTUCKY HONORS LATE OL COACH JOHN SCHLARMAN WITH NO. 65

- Kentucky offensive line coach John Schlarman and an All-SEC offensive lineman during his playing days at UK, died on Nov. 12, 2020 following a two-year battle with cancer. He was 45.
 - He was diagnosed with cholangiocarcinoma in the summer of 2018 and was an absolute warrior in his two-year fight against cancer, not missing a game through Oct. 17, 2020, and very few practices along the way.
- To honor his fight, members of the offensive line chose to rotate No. 65 in 2020, the number Schlarman wore as an offensive lineman at Kentucky. They also rotate the number this season during home games.
- Schlarman was a four-year starter from 1994-97 and was named SEC All-Freshman in 1994, UK's most outstanding lineman in 1995 and '96, and first-team All-SEC in 1997.
- He was given posthumously the Broyles Lifetime Achievement Award by the Frank & Barbara Broyles Foundation.
- The team also will wear black stickers on their helmets with the initials "JS" in white
- Kentucky will honor senior linebacker Chris Oats for the remainder of the season by placing his No. 22 game jersey on the defensive bench each game. Oats is recovering from a stroke suffered in the spring of 2020.
- The team also wears #22OATSSTRONG wristbands to show their support and they conclude each team practice with "22!"

CATS IN THE NFL DRAFT

- Kentucky had six NFL Draft picks in the 2021 NFL Draft - Jamin Davis (1st

- A picture of longevity, UK Equipment Manager **Tom Kalinowski** enters his 44th season in that role. He also was a student manager in 1974-77, marking his 48th year in UK football. He has worked more than 500 consecutive games.
- UK is one of only 10 schools that have won an NCAA men's basketball championship while also having a claim on a national championship in football.
- UK is one of only seven universities in the U.S. that have programs in agriculture, engineering, law, medicine and pharmacy on a single campus.
- The Kentucky cheerleaders have won an unprecedented 24 national cheerleading championships, including 20 of the last 26, at the annual Universal Cheerleaders Association championships.

UK ALUMNUS TIM COUCH INDUCTED INTO NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL HOF/ LISTED ON COLLEGE FOOTBALL HOF **BALLOT**

- Former UK quarterback Tim Couch was one of seven athletes inducted into the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) National High School Hall of Fame on July 1 in Orlando. Couch has also been named to the 2022 ballot for induction into the College Football Hall of Fame. That announcment will be made in early 2022.
- During his football career at Leslie County High School in Hyden, Kentucky in the mid-1990s, Couch set three national career passing records - 872 completions, 12,104 yards and 133 touchdowns. He helped Leslie County to a 13-1 record as a junior while completing an amazing 75 percent of his passes – a national record that stood for 15 years. As a senior, he passed for 42 touchdowns and led his team to an 11-3 mark, and he was named Gatorade and USA Today National Player of the Year while earning Mr. Football honors in Kentucky. ESPN.com selected Couch the sixth-best high school athlete in history. Couch was equally dominant on the basketball court. He scored 3,023 points in his career, leading the state in scoring as a senior at 37 points per game. He was two-time all-state in basketball. Couch's football prowess continued at the University of Kentucky, where he passed for 8,159 yards and 73

touchdowns in his final two seasons. He led Kentucky to the Outback Bowl after his junior season and was fourth in the Heisman Trophy voting. Couch was the No. 1 pick in the 1999 NFL draft by the Cleveland Browns and passed for more than 11,000 yards and 64 touchdowns in his five years with the Browns.

OFFENSIVE QUICK HITTERS

- Excitement is in the air as the Cats' new offense scheme, directed by offensive coordinator Liam Coen, has taken shape tihs season. The former quarterbacks coach for the Los Angeles Rams brings a pro-style offense to the Bluegrass and it's a welcomed change. UK threw just 243 passes for 1,336 yards last season, ranking 14th in the SEC in passing offense.
- UK's offense is built around a solid group of six offensive starters which includes "super seniors" wide receiver Josh Ali, offensive guard Luke Fortner and tight end Justin Rigg. Also returning is wide receiver DeMarcus Harris, offensive guard Kenneth Horsey and preseason All-America tackle Darian Kinnard.
- Leading returning rusher Chris Rodriguez Jr. is UK's most productive offensive threat from a year ago. He finished fifth in the SEC







in rushing in 2020 with 119 rushes for 785 yards (87.2 ypg) in just nine games. He's currently the SEC's second-leading rusher with 102.0 yards per game.

- The "Big Blue Wall" returns three starters from 2020 in Darian Kinnard, Kenneth Horsey and Luke Fortner. Through ninth games this season the entirety of the line has 104 combined career starts and recently was named to the Joe Moore Award midseason honor roll list for the fourth straight season.
- Against top-ranked Georgia's historically good defense on Oct. 16, the UK offense tied for the most points scored (13) of anyone in 2021 against the unit. UK is the only team this season to score two touchdowns against the Bulldogs. UK also turned in a 22-play, 75yard, 11:23-minute touchdown drive to end the game, the longest scoring possession for a Georgia opponent ever. Previously, Florida's 21-play, 10:57 drive in 1993 was the longest.

QUARTERBACKS

- During Stoops' tenure, the Wildcats have had nine different starting quarterbacks win a game in Jalen Whitlow, Maxwell Smith, Patrick Towles, Drew Barker, Stephen Johnson, Luke Wright, Lynn Bowden Jr., Terry Wilson and now Will Levis.
- Levis earned the starting spot early in fall camp and was sensational in his UK debut, passing for 367 yards and four scores. It was the most passing yards for a Wildcat in his debut and the most for any UK quarterback since Drew Barker in 2016.
- For more on Levis, see p. 6 of this release.
- With starting lineups available since 1993, he is the first UK quarterback since that time to win his first six starts.
- Sophomore Beau Allen is the backup. He saw action vs. ULM. completing 4-of-7 passes for 52 yards.

RUNNING BACKS/FULLBACKS

- Veteran running backs coach John Settle was hired in March of 2021 after spending the last six seasons and 11 years total at Wisconsin.
- The running back room features juniors Chris Rodriguez Jr. and Kavosiey Smoke most heavily but also can utilize youngsters JuTahn McClain and Mike Drennen II.
- Rodriguez got off to a great start with 125 yards and a touchdown in the season opener vs. ULM, his seventh career 100-yard game.
- He was even better in the SEC opener vs. Missouri, setting new career highs with 207 yards on 27 attempts and two touchdowns.
- Rodriguez now ranks ninth in school history with 2,279 rushing yards.
- Rodriguez has proven nearly impossible to bring down behind the line of scrimmage, having lost yardage on just 11 of his 349 career rushing attempts. In 2020, he lost yards on his first attempt of the season before starting a streak of 105 consecutive carries of positive yards.
- Rodriguez has scored a touchdown once every 15.9 rush attempts in his career (22 in 349 attempts). By comparison, UK all-time leading rusher and scorer Benny Snell Jr. hit paydirt once every 15.4 rush attempts.

- Smoke has played in 31 career games and has 1,240 yards. He currently averages 5.68 per carry. He had a career-high 104 yards in the win over LSU.

WIDE RECEIVERS

- Kentucky has 19 total wide receivers this fall, and it includes a mix of experience and young talent. Twelve of the 19 are returners, while seven are newcomers to the program.
- Three players had a 50+ yard reception vs. ULM in Josh Ali, Isaiah Epps and Wan'Dale Robinson). The last time UK had three different players with a 50+ yard reception in the same game was October 25, 2014 vs. Mississippi State (Javess Blue, Demarco Robinson and Ryan Timmons).
- UK had two 100-yard receivers against ULM, the first time that's happened since 2011 vs. Ole Miss (La'Rod King and Matt Roark).
- The top returning pass catcher from last season is Josh Ali. He currently has 116 career receptions for 1,177 yards and six scores.
- He was a blur in the opener, going over 100 yards for the first time in his career while hauling in five balls for 136 yards and a score.
- Wan'Dale Robinson has proven to be every bit the home run threat the Cats thought they were getting when he transferred back home from Nebraska (see page 7 of this release). He ranks as one of the nation's most explosive playmakers.
- Wan'Dale Robinson went over 100 receiving vards in each of the first three games and has 88 yards on six rushes. He had career bests with 13 catches for 166 yards vs. Tennessee.
- Senior Isaiah Epps returned midseason from a foot injury that cost him the 2019 season and flashed his potential down the stretch, catching eight passes for 63 yards. That continued in the 2021 opener with three grabs for a career-best 83 yards and followed that up with his first career scoring catch in the win over Chattanooga, a 20-yarder.

TIGHT ENDS

- The tight ends have played a role in the growth of the passing game this season. They have 35 catches for 282 yards and five scores this season. Four tight ends have caught a pass.
- The tight ends were key blockers for UK's explosive running game last season, which averaged nearly 200 yards per game and ranked third in the SEC.
- Senior Justin Rigg is back after taking advantage of the NCAA's blanket eligibility waiver for all 2020 fall student-athletes due to COVID-19. Rigg has 39 career receptions for 462 yards and two scores.

- UK received a huge blow when it was announced that junior Keaton Upshaw would miss the season due to injury. Upshaw had 16 catches for 198 yards and three TDs in 2020, both leading the tight end corps and ranking second on the team overall.
- In spring practice and preseason camp, coaches spoke very highly about junior Brenden Bates and he made them look prophetic as he caught his first UK touchdown with a four-yard score vs. ULM.
- Another addition to the room is sophomore Izayah Cummings who moved from wide receiver to tight end during fall camp and made an immediate impression at his new position, catching his first touchdown pass in the win over Chattanooga (31 yards). He also caught a TD against Tennessee.

OFFENSIVE LINE

- John Schlarman was Kentucky's offensive line coach for eight seasons before passing away on Nov. 12, 2020 after a two-year battle with cancer.
- Eric Wolford was hired to replace Schlarman in December of 2020 after four seasons at South Carolina.
- The O-line, known as the "Big Blue Wall" returns three of five starters from 2020 in Darian Kinnard, Kenneth Horsey and Luke
- The addition of LSU transfer Za'Darius "Dare" Rosenthal in July was a huge boost for the "Big Blue Wall." The 6-foot-7, 327-pound offensive tackle played in 13 career games with eight career starts for the Tigers. He has started every game this season for UK at left tackle.
- Two big losses that need replacing in 2021 are All-SEC center Drake Jackson and All-SEC left tackle Landon Young. Jackson started in 44 consecutive games at center, while Young was a starter at left tackle for 24 straight games.
- Kinnard (42 career games, 35 career starts) held down the right tackle position since he entered the starting lineup at the end of the 2018 season. He had 47 knockdowns in 2020, grading out at 87.4 percent with 142 blocks at the point of attack. He was named first-team All-America by Pro Football Focus, secondteam All-America by CBS/247sports and The Sporting News, third team by AP and fourth team by Phil Steele. He received All-SEC First Team accolades from AP, Phil Steele and PFF

and second-team All-SEC honors from the SEC Coaches. He's already been rated by Pro Football Focus as the top returning Power 5 offensive lineman in the country and is listed on two-preseason All-America teams.

- Fortner (51 career games, 32 career starts) is another "super senior" who provided the coaching staff with a late Christmas present when he announced he'd return for the 2021 season. He started in 10 games at right guard in 2020 and graded at 82.9 percent with 26 knockdowns and 146 blocks at the point of attack.
- Fortner moved to center for 2021 and is starting at that position. He already has been named SEC Offensive Lineman of the Week twice this season, following wins vs. ULM and at South Carolina. He's also on the watch list for the Rimington Trophy given to the nation's top center.
- Horsey (21 career games, 17 career starts) manned the left guard spot last season, starting in eight games. An interesting note about Horsey - he had open-heart surgery







- in April of 2018 and was named winner of the 2020 Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year. He graded at 82.6 percent, had 17 knockdowns and 93 blocks at the point of attack.
- Sophomore Eli Cox has emerged at right guard, earning Associated Press and ESPN Midseason All-America honors. He has been described as, pound-for-pound, perhaps the strongest player on the team. He made first collegiate start in the opener vs. ULM. Against Missouri, he scored the gamewinning touchdown by recovering a fumble in the end zone.
- The "Big Blue Wall", along with UK tight ends, have helped Kentucky post five consecutive seasons of 2,000 or more rushing yards, with at least one 1,000-yard individual in four of those.

DEFENSIVE QUICK HITTERS

- Defensive coordinator Brad White is in his third season as the defensive coordinator, his fourth as the outside linebackers coach at UK. Also helping with the coordinator duties is former Wildcat and inside linebackers coach Jon Sumrall. He added co-defensive coordinator title to his resume in 2020.
- Kentucky welcomed back 26 returning letterwinners, including five starters in DE Josh Paschal, WLB DeAndre Square, LB Jordan Wright, DB Tyrell Aijan, and FS Yusuf Corker.
- The depth and experience was on display in the opener as:
- The Kentucky defense limited ULM to 87 total yards. That's the fewest in a game in 33 years, since holding Central Michigan to 78 total yards in the 1988 season opener.
- UK held ULM to 17 net rushing yards, fewest since Eastern Michigan had 13 rushing yards in 2017.
- UK held ULM to 70 passing yards, fewest since Georgia had 35 passing yards in 2019.
- Ten seniors started on defense against ULM.
 With starting lineups available since 1993,
 it is the most seniors starting on offense or defense in a season opener since that time.
- The Wildcats turned in a sterling defensive performance in the win at South Carolina

as well ... UK limited the Gamecocks to 10 points, 51 total plays, 58 net rushing yards (2.2 per attempt), 216 total yards, 3 of 12 on third-down conversions and 0 of 3 on fourth down ... UK turned it over three times against the Gamecocks but Wildcats held on all three of the ensuing possessions.

DEFENSIVE LINE

- Former Wildcat Anwar Stewart is in his second season coaching the defensive line. His unit is a position of strength for UK despite losing two key starters in All-SEC nose guard Quinton Bohanna (Dallas Cowboys) and defensive tackle Phil Hoskins (Carolina Panthers).
- Returning senior Josh Paschal moved from outside linebacker to defensive end in 2020 and was a shining star in his new role.
- Paschal has 32.5 career TFL and 9.5 sacks, along with three blocked kicks. He ranks sixth on the school's all-time TFL list.
- This season, Paschal leads the team in tackles for loss (11.0) and quarterback hurries (eight).
- Another senior who is playing a major role
 on the defensive line this season is Marquan
 "Bully" McCall. His mountainous force in
 the middle wreaks havoc on opponents. He
 currently has six tackles, 2.5 for loss and
 one QBH this season. He has missed the last
 three games because of an ankle injury.
- Josaih Hayes and Justin Rogers have been sharing the noseguard position in McCall's absence.
- Octavious Oxendine (2.0 sacks vs. LSU)
 emerged as the starting defensive tackle
 but has been lost for the season because of
 injury. Senior Abule Abadi-Fitzgerald (2.0
 sacks vs. Tennessee) has been starting in
 place of Oxendine..

SECONDARY

- The secondary unit is in the hands of two
 of the most energetic and talented young
 coaches in Chris Collins and Frank Buffano.
 Collins, who coaches the defensive backs,
 was hired in June of 2021 after spending
 the last four seasons at Georgia State.
 Buffano enters his second season coaching
 the safeties, a position he earned in March
 of 2020.
- UK has ranked in the top four of the SEC in pass defense, including leading the league in both 2019 and 2020, for three straight seasons.

- UK also led the SEC and ranked third nationally in total interceptions (16) in 2020, eight coming from the secondary.
- Returning cornerbacks Cedrick Dort, Jr. (40 career games, 22 career starts), and Carrington Valentine have starting experience under their belts.
- Another "super senior" looking to take his game to the next level is corner Quandre
 Mosely (32 career games, two career starts).
- At safety, "super senior" Yusuf Corker (45 career games, 32 career starts) is one of the SEC's most underrated players. For the season, he is tied for fourth in the SEC in pass breakups with eight.
- Safety Tyrell Ajian (44 career games, 20 career starts) led UK in the win over Missouri with a career-high eight tackles and sealed the Chattanooga win with a 95-yard interception return for a score in the fourth quarter.
- Safety Davonte Robinson (45 career games, 15 career starts), another "super senior," is back from a quadriceps injury that robbed him of the 2019 season.

LINEBACKERS

- Only three letterwinners in sophomores
 K.D. McDaniel and J.J. Weaver and senior
 Jordan Wright returned for White's outside linebackers group.
- Wright and Weaver both got off to good starts this season -- Wright with six tackles, two TFL, a sack and a pass breakup while Weaver had 1.5 sacks in the opener. Weaver had a huge defensive play vs. Missouri with an eight-yard sack on the Tigers' final possession. He leads the team in sacks with 6.0. Wright had a crucial interception against Florida to set up a touchdown.
- The inside linebackers are led by lone returning starter **DeAndre Square** (45 career games, 31 career starts). He was UK's secondleading tackler in 2019 (69) and in 2020 he ranked third on the team (60).
- Square is second on the team in tackles with 64 and tackles for loss with 8.5. He also has three quarterback hurries. He is sixth in the SEC in tackles per game.
- Transfer Jacquez Jones was a three-year letterwinner who played in 33 games with 19 starts, totaling 182 tackles in his Ole Miss career. In 2020, he led the Rebels with 75 tackles, while adding 2.5 tackles for loss and three quarterback hurries.





- Jones has started all nine games and has 69 tackles, ranking sixth in the SEC in tackles per game. He has made three huge plays in pass defense -- an interception vs. Missouri, a touchdown-saving pass breakup vs.
 Chattanooga and game-saving tipped pass to seal the Florida win.
- He had a career-high 18 tackles vs.
 Mississippi State.
- Highly-regarded freshmen Martez Thrower (Rochella, Ga.) and Trevin Wallace (Jesup, Ga.) have showcased why they were two of Georgia's top prep defensive players.
- Wallace helped turn the Florida game when he caught a blocked field goal in midair and raced untouched 76 yards for the go-ahead touchdown. Making his first collegiate start at Mississippi State, he notched 11 tackles and was named SEC Freshman of the Week.

SPECIAL TEAMS

- Special teams will be coached by new running backs coach John Settle and safeties coach Frank Buffano this season. The Wildcats return all but their Australian transplant and 2019 Ray Guy Award winner in punter and holder Max Duffy. He concluded his career as the school's all-time leading punter at 45.96 yards per kick.
- Returning are placekicker Matt Ruffolo, kickoff specialist Chance Poore, long snapper Cade Degraw, punt returner Josh Ali and kick returner Zach Johnson.
- Ali notched his first career punt return for a touchdown when he scampered 74 yards vs. Mississippi State on Oct. 30.
- Senior Colin Goodfellow is currently on the watch list for the Ray Guy Award, given to the nation's top punter. He leads the SEC and is ninth nationally by averaging 47.5 yards per punt this season, with nine ending inside the opponent 20-yard line.
- Against Georgia, Goodfellow had a careerlong 70-yard punt and an additional
 63-yarder. It is the only time in school history a punter has had two punts of 63 yards or longer with one being at least 70 yards.
- He followed that performance by booming another 70-yard punt vs. Mississippi State, making him the first player in school history to have two punts of 70 or more yards in his career.
- Ruffolo, a "super senior" who took advantage of the NCAA's blanket waiver due to the COVID-19 pandemic, was UK's

- starting placekicker last season. This season, he has made 5-of-8 field goals, with the two misses coming on blocked kicks caused by a breakdown in protection.
- For his career, Ruffolo has made 21-of-27 FG and 73-of-79 PAT. Making 77.8 percent of his field goals places him fourth on the UK career list.
- Poore handles kickoffs for the Wildcats. He also has placekicking experience, as he made 5-of-9 FGs and 24-of-26 PATs last season. He was 1-of-1 on field goals and 5-of-5 on extra points this season.
- Degraw enters his second season as UK's long snapper. He's backed up by walk-ons Clay Perry and Jordan Morrow.



KROGER FIELD

On game day, Kroger Field often becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.



- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 317 games within the friendly confines of newly-named Kroger Field. UK has a 176-138-4 record (.561), 40-22 (.645) under Mark Stoops.
- UK set a new Kroger Field attendance record when 63,543 fans packed the stadium for the Nov. 3, 2018 game vs. No. 6 Georgia.
- Two of the top five crowds in Kroger Field history came in 2018.
- UK announced its first sellout since 2015 when 62,945 fans attended the Florida game on Sept. 23, 2017.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 62,382 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 30 teams in attendance in 15 of the last 17 seasons. Both the single game and season attendance record has been broken in recent years. (*Note: Does not include 2020 season due to Covid-19 protocols).
- The playing surface is named C.M. Newton Grounds at Kroger Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

KROGER FIELD

Commonwealth Stadium was renamed to Kroger Field in May of 2017. The agreement--which is between Kroger and JMI Sports, UK's multimedia rights partner-begins at approximately \$1.85 million annually with a term of up to 12 years. With the partnership, Kroger becomes the Official Fuel Partner of the University of Kentucky and the Official Grocery Partner of Move-In at UK while also providing additional engagement opportunities with UK students. Per the agreement, Kroger

is also the Official Nutrition and Pharmacy Partner of UK Athletics.

Kroger Field was transformed into a state-ofthe-art facility after a \$126-million reinvention which was completed prior to the 2015 season. The project was handled by HNTB. The outside of the stadium underwent a dramatic external facelift, receiving a modern look, but one that remained uniquely Kentucky. Inside, the capacity of Kroger Field was reduced over the course of the two-year project to approximately 61,000, but the value of all remaining seats were increased, from the top of the upper deck to front-row seats at midfield. Concourses were revamped and widened throughout the stadium with improved concessions, restrooms and security. Players and coaches reaped the benefits of the new Kroger Field as well, as hometeam facilities were built, and a multi-purpose recruiting room hosts future Wildcats on their on-campus visits.

FACTS AND FIGURES

<u>Seating Capacity:</u> 61,000, including the Commonwealth Suites

<u>Playing Field:</u> UK switched from natural grass to synthetic turf for the 2015 season. Other SEC schools with a turf surface are: Arkansas, Ole Miss, Mississippi State and Missouri. The end zones and team sideline areas feature a checkerboard pattern in alternating shades of blue. It was designed to mimic the pattern of Secretariat's silks, which has been part of the football uniforms for five seasons. The school's new interlocking "UK" logo is positioned in the center of the field.

<u>Video Boards:</u> Video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The video boards put UK among the nation's leaders in video square footage. The interior seating bowl also has LED ribbon boards.

<u>Sound System:</u> Sportsound system delivers pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

GAME DAY EXPERIENCES

The "Cat Walk" on Talbott Todd Way: With the unveiling of the new \$45 million Kentucky Football Training Facility in August of 2016, the headquarters of the program moved next door to Kroger Field. That means the Cat Walk presented by Chevy will still begin outside Gate 1 two hours and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, but the team proceeds past Gate 1 and between Kroger Field and Nutter Field House which has been dedicated to former Wildcat Talbott Todd (1963-65). Todd, who passed away from ALS in August of 2017, was an avid supporter of the program. From Talbott Todd Way the team will walk to the locker room in the Joe Craft Kentucky Football Training Facility.

Lift Them Up: A unique partnership with Toyota Motor Manufacturing Kentucky (TMMK), the Kentucky College of Engineering and the Kentucky Children's Hospital was launched in 2019 that brings special guests to the Cat Walk presented by Chevy as the Kentucky football team arrives at Kroger Field. A brand-new and specially built push cart vehicle provides a Kentucky Children's Hospital patient the chance to both accompany the Wildcats on the Cat Walk and attend a game at Kroger Field. A new patient is chosen by the Kentucky Children's Hospital each week to participate.

KENTUCKY 45, ULM 10

SEPT. 4, 2021 • LEXINGTON, KY. KROGER FIELD (47,693)



Will Levis passed for 367 yards and four touchdowns as Kentucky opened its 2021 season with a 45-10 win over Louisiana-Monroe at Kroger Field.

Two Wildcats had more than 100 yards receiving in the game. Senior Josh Ali had five receptions for 136 yards and a touchdown while junior Wan'Dale Robinson had five catches for 125 yards and two scores. Isaiah Epps nearly made it a trio, catching three passes for 83 yards.

On the ground, Chris Rodriguez Jr. went over 100 yards for the seventh time in his career. The junior rushed $\,$

19 times for 125 yards and a touchdown.

Kentucky had 564 yards of total offense in the first game under new offensive coordinator Liam Coen. UK finished with 419 yards passing and 145 yards on the ground.

Levis became the first UK passer to throw for over 300 yards since Stephen Johnson had 338 against Louisville in 2016.

Meanwhile, the Kentucky defense more than did its job against ULM. The Cats held the Warhawks to 87 total yards (70 passing, 17 rushing) in the game. ULM had 43 yards on its first drive of the game, then 44 yards the rest of the game.

Kentucky took the opening kickoff and got one first down. But the Cats turned it over on a Levis interception, giving ULM the ball at the UK 43 yard line.

The Warhawks would take the ball into Kentucky territory but the drive would stall, and ULM would try a field goal. It was good but UK was penalized on the play and the Warhawks took three points off the board in hopes of getting more.

That decision paid off as ULM drove inside the UK five yard line and punched it in the end zone on a three-yard touchdown rush by Kadyn Roach. Calum Sutherland added the extra point and the Warhawks led 7-0 with 8:53 to play in the first quarter.

Kentucky answered on its next drive. The Cats went 84 yards in just five plays, finishing with a 33-yard Levis touchdown pass to Wan'dale Robinson in the left corner of the end zone. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT and the game was tied 7-7 with 6:13 left in the first.

After at ULM punt, Kentucky took the lead. And quickly. On the first play of the drive, Levis connected with Ali on a 58-yard touchdown bomb. Ruffolo added the point after and the Cats led 14-7 with 4:20 still left in the first. That would be the score at the end of the period.

In the second quarter, the Cats extended their advantage. UK methodically marched down the field, largely on the legs of Rodriguez. Kentucky used 14 plays to cover 84 yards, with Rodriguez covering the final 27 yards himself. The scoring play was a two-yard rush by the senior and when Ruffolo added the PAT, Kentucky led 21-7 with 10:40 left in the half.

After another ULM punt, Kentucky went to the air again. Levis connected with Robinson for 62 yards, getting the Cats to the ULM 18 yard line. Those two would connect again, on a 13-yard scoring strike, to extend the UK lead. Ruffolo's PAT made it 28-7 with 5:44 left in the first half. That would be the halftime score.

The first four possessions of the second half resulted in punts, two by each team. But on its third possession of the half, Kentucky got deep into ULM territory. The big play was a 57-yard pass from Levis to Epps, getting UK to the ULM 19. But a bad snap and a sack forced UK into a 45-yard field goal attempt from Ruffolo, which he made, giving the Cats a 31-7 lead with 3:54 left in the third quarter. UK would hold the same advantage as the quarter came to an end.

Early in the fourth quarter, Kentucky scored again. This time, it was Levis connecting with tight end Brendan Bates for a four-yard touchdown pass. It was the first career touchdown for Bates. Ruffolo's PAT made it 38-7 with 13:07 to play.

Lousiana-Monroe would add a field goal in the fourth quarter to cut the UK lead to 38-10. Kentucky would finish the scoring with a four-yard touchdown rush from Michael Drennen II with 1:00 left to play. Ruffolo's PAT made it 45-10, which would be the final score.

KENTUCKY 35, MISSOURI 28

SEPT. 11, 2021 • LEXINGTON, KY. KROGER FIELD (58,437)



Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed 27 times for 206 yards and three touchdowns as Kentucky won its Southeastern Conference opener over Missouri at Kroger Field.

For Rodriguez, both the number of carries and the yards rushing were career highs. The junior from McDonough, Georgia, also caught a pass for a touchdown.

Will Levis connected on 10 of 18 passing for 179 yards with a touchdown and an interception in the game. Levis' main target was Wan'Dale Robinson, who had a big game in his own right. The Frankfort native led the Cats with 101

yards receiving on five catches. He also had three carries for 73 yards in the game. Kentucky (2-0, 1-0 SEC) turned to the ground game in this one, rushing for 341

yards while passing for 179. The Cats ended the game with 520 yards of total offense, compared to just 398 for Missouri.

On defense, safety Tyrell Ajian led the Cats with eight tackles, while J.J. Weaver had another big game with a sack and two tackles for loss.

Kentucky took the ball first and, on the second play from scrimmage, Robinson took the jet sweep for 64 yards to the Missouri eight yard line. From there, it was a five-yard touchdown pass from Levis to Rodriguez for a touchdown. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT and Kentucky grabbed an early 7-0 lead with 12:52 still left in the first period.

After a Missouri punt, Kentucky put together its second scoring drive of the game. The Cats marched down the field, using a nice balance of rushing and passing to cover 80 yards in 12 plays, while taking more than five minutes off the clock. The drive ended on a two-yard rushing touchdown from Rodriguez, followed by a Ruffolo PAT, giving the Cats a 14-0 lead with 5:13 left in the first quarter.

Missouri would answer with a long, sustained drive of its own. The Tigers used 10 plays to cover 75 yards, ending with a six-yard touchdown pass from Connor Bazelak to Daniel Parker, Jr. The PAT by Harrison Mevis was good and the UK lead

was trimmed to 14-7 with 27 seconds left in the first period. That would be the score after 15 minutes of play.

After another Missouri punt, the Cats went on the march again. Kentucky got a couple of first downs before the biggest play of the drive, a 49-yard completion from Levis to Robinson, getting UK inside the Missouri 10. From there, it took just two plays for the Cats to hit pay dirt, this time on a three-yard rush by Levis. Ruffolo added the point after and the Cats grabbed a 21-7 lead with 9:26 left in the half.

Missouri would punt again with its next possession and Kentucky once again drove down the field. The Cats appeared to be going in for yet another touchdown but Rodriguez fumbled at the goal line and Missouri recovered in the end zone for a touchback with 1:41 left in the half.

The Tigers would take advantage of the miscue. Missouri went into two-minute mode and got into scoring territory fairly quickly. MU covered 80 yards in nine plays and just 1:37 off the clock, culminating in a 17-yard touchdown pass from Bazelak to Keke Chism with just four seconds left in the half. Mevis added the PAT at the Kentucky lead was cut to 21-14. That would be the halftime score.

Missouri took the opening possession of the second half and, on the second play from scrimmage, Bazelak was intercepted by UK linebacker Jacquez Jones, giving the Cats the ball at the MU 38.

On UK's second play from scrimmage on the ensuing drive, Rodriguez scampered 31 yards down the left sideline to the Missouri three yard line. Rodriguez then finished it off himself, scoring from three yards out to extend the UK lead. Ruffolo's PAT was good and the Cats led 28-14 with 13:19 to play in the third.

Once again, Missouri had an answer. The Tigers took the ensuing kickoff and went 75 yards in 10 plays, getting into the end zone on a Bazelak-to-Parker six-yard touchdown pass. Mevis added the point after and it was 28-21 with 9:15 left in the third.

The next three possessions ended in punts before Missouri put together a good drive near the end of the third quarter. As the period expired, MU appeared to be on its way to scoring. As the fourth quarter began, the Tigers got inside the UK red zone. But, facing third-and-14 from the 17, the drive appeared to stall. That's when Bazelak hit Tyler Badie on a screen pass that went for a score. Mevis made the extra point to tie the game at 28-28 with 13:11 to play.

Kentucky got the ball back and quickly moved into Missouri territory. After an 11-yard completion from Levis to Robinson, Rodriguez rushed up the middle for 28 yards, eclipsing his career high in both carries and yards rushing on the same play. Levis then connected with tight end Justin Rigg for a 28-yard completion, getting the ball to the MU eight. From there, Rodriguez scored for the fourth time on the night, on an eight-yard rush, with 11:28 to play. Ruffolo's PAT was good and the Cats had a 35-28 lead.

Leading by seven in the fourth quarter, it appeared that Kentucky was going in for a game-clinching score. But the drive stalled and Ruffolo's 37-yard field goal was blocked, giving Missouri the ball at their own 45 with 2:07 to play.

Missouri took possession hoping to drive for a tying score. But after getting one first down, the MU drive stalled and on fourth and 13 from the UK 45, Bazelak's pass fell incomplete, giving Kentucky possession.

Levis would take a knee on three straight plays to seal the game

Will Levis connected on 23 of 35 passing for 246 yards and two touchdowns as Kentucky overcame a sluggish effort to beat Chattanooga 28-23.

With the Cats clinging to a 21-16 lead in the fourth quarter, Tyrell Ajian made the play that saved the game. Ajian intercepted a Chattanooga pass at the UK five and returned it 95 yards for what turned out to be the game-cliniching touchdown.

Wan'Dale Robinson was Levis' favorite target on Saturday, catching eight passes for 111 yards. He became

the first UK player since Derek Abney in 2001 to have three straight 100-yard receiving games.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. led UK with 46 rushing yards, although the Kentucky run

Chris Rodriguez Jr. led UK with 46 rushing yards, although the Kentucky run game was not as effective as it was last week against Missouri. The Cats had 102 yards rushing on 27 carries in the game.

Kentucky took the opening kickoff and methodically marched down the field, using a combination of running and passing. The nine-play drive consisted of five plays and four rushes and ended with an 11-yard touchdown rush by Josh Ali, the first rushing touchdown of his career. Matt Ruffolo added the extra point and the Cats grabbed a 7-0 lead with 10:43 to play in the first quarter.

Chattanooga was able to match UK's early score. The Mocs went 75 yards themselves, aided by a Ailym Ford 48-yard rush. The Mocs would tie the score on a 12-yard touchdown pass from Cole Copeland to Reginald Henderson. Aaron Sears added the PAT and the game was tied 7-7 with 6:56 left in the first.

The teams would exchange punts. But Kentucky's next possession, which covered the end of the first quarter and beginning of the second, ended with a score. The Cats marched 68 yards in seven plays, ending with a 20-yard touchdown pass from Levis to Isaiah Epps, the first touchdown of Epps' career. Ruffolo added the PAT and the Cats took a 14-7 lead with 13:29 left in the half.

After a Chattanooga punt, the Cats took over at their own 14 yard line. On third down, Levis was intercepted by Chattanooga's CaMiron Smith, who returned it to the UK 15 yard line. The Mocs did not do much with the ensuing possession, but Sears converted a 27-yard field goal to cut the UK lead to 14-10 with 8:47 left in the half.

The teams would exchange punts before Kentucky drove into Chattanooga territory with its next possession. But on fourth-and-five from the Chattanooga 30, Levis fumbled and the Mocs recovered at their own 38. However, UTC went three-and-out and was forced to punt.

Neither team would score the remained of the half and the Cats took a 14-10 lead into the break.

The Mocs took the first possession of the second half and drove into Kentucky territory. But the drive stalled and the Mocs settled for a 43-yard field goal by Sears that cut the UK lead to 14-13 with 10:43 left in the third period.

Later in the third, Levis was intercepted again, this time on a diving effort by Rashun Freeman, giving Chattanooga the ball at their own 34 yard line. The Mocs would have possession as the third quarter ended, trailing the Cats 14-13.



The Mocs would take that possession into Kentucky territory before the drive stalled inside the red zone. Sears would make a 30-yard field goal to give Chattanooga a 16-14 lead with 13:26 to play.

Kentucky answered immediately with an impressive scoring drive. The Cats covered 77 yards in seven plays and took the lead back on a 31-yard touchdown pass from Levis to Isaiah Cummings, the first touchdown for the Louisville native. Ruffolo added the PAT and the Cats took a 21-16 advantage with 10:18 to play.

On the ensuing drive, Chattanooga again drove into Kentucky territory. But this time, the Cats had the answer. Copeland was intercepted by Ajian, who picked it at his own five yard line and returned it 95 yards for a touchdown. Ruffolo added the PAT and the Cats extended the lead to 28-16 with 7:40 to play.

Chattanooga would not go away quietly. The Mocs drove into the UK red zone and, on third-and-goal, Copeland rushed around right end for a touchdown. Sears added the PAT and the UK lead was cut to 28-23 with 1:20 to play.

The Mocs tried an onside kick, but Ali recovered at the UK 43. After the Cats took a pair of knees, the game was over.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed for 144 yards and the Kentucky defense made a number of crucial stops as the Cats topped South Carolina 16-10 at Williams-Brice Stadium.

Rodriguez led the charge on the ground as the Cats rushed 44 times for 230 yards in the game. Kavosiey Smoke had 50 yards and a touchdown on nine carries and quarterback Will Levis carried five times for 30 yards.

Levis connected on 15 of 22 through the air for 102 yards in the game. Wan'Dale Robinson was his favorite target on this night, catching seven passes for 65 yards.

Kentucky got a big defensive effort in the game. The Cats held the Gamecocks to 216 total yards and just 58 yards on the ground. UK had five tackles for loss, including a pair of sacks, in the contest. DeAndre Square led the defensive charge

with eight tackles, while Carrington Valentine had four tackles, including a sack. J.J. Weaver accounted for the other UK sack in the game.

UK took the opening kickoff and used the ground game to march down the field. Rodriguez carried four times for 35 yards and Kavosiey Smoke rushed twice for 23 yards and a 15-yard touchdown to get the Cats on the board. Matt Ruffolo added the point after and Kentucky led 7-0 with 8:27 left in the first quarter.

The next three possessions would result in punts and Kentucky would hold a 7-0 lead after 15 minutes of play.

UK would get into field goal range just before the half and, on the final play of the first half, Ruffolo drilled a 43-yard field goal to give the Cats a 10-0 advantage at the break

On the first drive of the second half, South Carolina mounted its first serious scoring threat of the game. The Gamecocks got into UK territory, riding the hot arm of quarterback Luke Doty, who eventually connected with Jalen Brooks on a five-yard touchdown pass. Parker White added the PAT and the UK lead was cut to 10-7 with 10:52 left in the third period.

Kentucky would answer with a significant drive of its own. Levis connected with Wan'Dale Robinson four times on the drive as the Cats got inside the South Carolina five yard line. But Kentucky could not punch it in but the Cats did get a 21-yard field goal from Ruffolo to extend the lead to 13-7 with 3:43 left in the third quarter.

After the Cats forced a South Carolina punt, the Cats gave the ball right back. Josh Ali took the ball on a reverse and fumbled, with the Gamecocks recovering at the UK 40. South Carolina would have the ball in UK territory as the third quarter ended.

The Gamecocks continued the drive and got inside the UK 30. But on fourth and five from the 25, Doty's pass was knocked away by Tyrell Ajian to stop the drive.

UK took over at their own 25 with 13:33 to play. The Cats were moving the ball and got near midfield before Ali fumbled again and South Carolina recovered at the UK 45 with 11:32 to play.

Once again, Kentucky's defense stood tall on the ensuing drive. Marquan McCall caught Juju McDowell in the backfield on first down for a three-yard loss. After a pair of scrambles by Doty, the Gamecocks went for it on fourth down, but Doty's pass for Dakereon Joyner was broken up by Jalen Geiger, ending the drive at the UK 40.

On the ensuing possession, Kentucky went back to the ground game with Rodriguez. He carried five straight times, for 43 yards before giving way to Smoke, who carried the ball on the next two plays as the Cats got into the red zone. On third and six, Levis connected with Ali to get the ball to the nine but it was short of the first down. Ruffolo came on and made his third field goal of the night, a 27-yarder, to extend the UK lead to 16-7 with 4:26 to play.

South Carolina went to the air again on its next possession. Doty got the Gamecocks into Kentucky territory but again, the UK defense stood tall. UK held South Carolina to a 54-yard White field goal, which he made, cutting the UK lead to 16-10 with 2:31 to play.

Kentucky turned back to the ground on the ensuing possession and was able to run the clock out and preserve the win.

Josh Paschal blocked a field goal that Trevin Wallace returned 76 yards for a touchdown as No. 23 Kentucky upset ninth-ranked Florida 20-13 at Kroger Field.

With Florida holding a 10-7 advantage in the third quarter, Paschal used all of his 6-3 frame to successfully block the 48-yard Jace Christmann attempt. Trevin Wallace then snatched the ball at the Kentucky 24 and rapidly sped down the sideline 76 yards until reaching the end zone, giving UK a lead that it would never surrender.

It was the UK defense and special teams that carried the team all evening, as Kentucky beat Florida in Lexington for the first time since

1986 and for just the second time in the last 35 meetings. Chris Rodriguez Jr. carried the offensive load for the Cats with 99 yards and a

touchdown in the game. Quarterback Will Levis was six of 15 through the air for 74 yards and a score.

DeAndre Square led the defensive attack with 13 tackles, while Jacquez Jones had nine tackles, one tackle for loss and a pass breakup on Florida's final offensive play of the game. Paschal has seven tackles, including two and a half for loss, in addition to the blocked kick, the third of his UK career.

The teams exchanged punts to start the game; however, Florida quarterback Emory Jones connected on a pass to Ja'Quavion Fraziers, who ran seven yards before diving into the end zone for a Florida touchdown. The PAT by Christmann was good, giving the Gators a 7-0 lead in the first quarter.

The Kentucky offense picked up the pace after Florida's touchdown. On a screen pass, Levis connected with Wan'Dale Robinson, who made it through Florida's aggressive defense and into the end zone for a 41-yard touchdown. The extra point by Matt Ruffalo tied the game 7-7, with 5:19 left in the first quarter.

After three-and-outs by both teams, Florida inserted backup quarterback Anthony Richardson, who sparked the Gators' offense. Florida would drive into Kentucky territory before the drive stalled. The Gators were forced into a 51-yard Christmann field goal, which was good, giving Florida a 10-7 lead with 5:32 left in the first half.

Both defenses fought hard to for the remainder of the second quarter, and the teams went to the half with Florida holding a 10-7 lead.

The Cats got the first possession of the second half and made first downs on consecutive plays. But the drive stalled near midfield, where Kentucky was forced to punt. Florida would also punt on its first possession of the second half.

But on UK's next drive, the Cats committed the game's first turnover when Levis' pass intended for Izayah Cummings was intercepted by Florida's Tre'Vez Johnson.

It was that possession which ended with Christmann's field goal attempt being blocked by Pashcal and returned for a touchdown by Wallace. It was the first time since 2008 that a Kentucky player had returned a blocked field goal for a touchdown (David Jones did so against Vanderbilt that year). The PAT was blocked, but the Cats grabbed a 13-10 lead with 6:36 to play in the third quarter.

As the fourth quarter began, Kentucky went for it on fourth-and-two, but Rodriguez was stuffed and the Gators took over on their own 34 yard line.

But on the second play from scrimmage, Jones was intercepted by UK's J.J. Weaver, who returned it to the UF 29 yard line, setting the Cats up in excellent field position. Kentucky would convert the turnover into points later in the drive when Rodriguez went around right end and scored from nine yards out. Ruffolo added the PAT and Kentucky led 20-10 with 11:32 to play.

Florida would cut into the deficit on its next possession. The Gators would drive into UK territory and eventually into the red zone. But a penalty halted the drive and Florida settled for a 33-yard field goal from Christmann to make it 20-13 with 6:23 to play.

Kentucky took possession and went three-and-out, resulting in a punt. The Gators would take over at their own 38 yard line with 4:39 to play. Florida would drive into the UK red zone and, on fourth and goal from the eight yard line, Jones' pass was broken up by Jacquez Jones to seal the victory.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. rushed for 147 yards and quarterback Will Levis accounted for five touchdowns as No. 16/14 Kentucky topped LSU 42-21 at Kroger Field.

With the win, Kentucky moved to 6-0 on the season and 4-0 in the SEC. It's the first time Kentucky has been 6-0 since 1950 and just the fifth time in school history.

Kavosiey Smoke also had a big night on the ground for the Cats, amassing 104 yards rushing. UK quarterback Will Levis had 75 yards and two touchdowns on the ground as Kentucky rushed for 330 yards as a team.

Levis hit on 14 of 17 passing for 145 yards and three touchdowns. Wan'Dale Robinson was the favorite target for Levis on this evening, catching eight passes for 60 yards and a score.

LSU took the opening possession and made a pair of first downs before the UK defense made yet another big play. DeAndre Square sacked LSU quarterback Max Johnson and forced a fumble that was recovered by Josaih Hayes at the LSU 44 yard line.

Kentucky would convert the turnover into points. The Cats drove into the LSU red zone and, on fourth-and-goal from the three, Levis connected with Rodriguez on a touchdown pass in the right side of the end zone. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT and UK grabbed a 7-0 lead with 6:17 to play in the first quarter.







On its next possession, LSU opened on their own 25 yard line and drove into Kentucky territory. However, on fourth-and-one from the UK 31, Johnson's pass intended for Jack Bech fell incomplete and the Cats took over.

Near the end of the first quarter, Kentucky drove into LSU's end again. Rodriguez went up the middle for 17 yards, then Levis connected with Justin Rigg on a 34-yard pass play, getting the Cats inside the red zone. Then, on the first play of the second quarter, Levis hit a diving Wan'Dale Robinson for an 11-yard score. Ruffolo's PAT was good at Kentucky led 14-0 with 14:54 left in the half.

The next five possessions would result in punts, three for LSU and two for Kentucky. With the last possession of the half, UK drove near midfield before running out of time. UK would take a 14-0 lead into the break.

Kentucky got the ball to start the second half and, after starting at their own 25 yard line, the Cats drove into LSU territory on the legs of Rodriguez, who had a 22-yard rush on the drive, and Levis, who scampered for 33 yards to get to the LSU $\,$ six yard line. Two plays later, Levis rushed one yard for the touchdown, extending the UK lead. Ruffolo added the point after and Kentucky led 21-0 with 10:57 left in the third period.

LSU answered with its first scoring drive of the game. The Tigers covered 75 yards in nine plays, capped by a one-yard touchdown rush from Tyrion Davis-Price. Cade York added the PAT and the UK lead was 21-7 with 6:43 left in the third quarter.

However, Kentucky responded immediately. On the ensuing drive, the Cats used a nice mix of pass and run to take the ball down the field and into scoring position. On the final play of the drive, Levis ran left and scored a five-yard touchdown, his second of the game. Ruffolo added the PAT and UK led 28-7 with just 1:06 to play in the third quarter.

After LSU gave the ball up on downs, the Cats took possession and extended the lead. Kentucky needed just three plays to cover 56 yards. Levis connected with Robinson on a 16-yard pass. Then Smoke rushed up the middle for 16 yards and finally, Levis connected with Ju'than McClain on a 10-yard touchdown pass, the first touchdown of McClain's career. Ruffolo made another PAT and the Cats led 35-7 with 12:07 left in the game.

LSU would add a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns to cut the lead to 35-21. The Tigers would try an onside kick but Rigg recovered. Then the Cats marched 44 yards in just four plays, all rushes by Rodriguez. The final play was an 18-yard scoring run and Ruffolo's PAT made it 42-21 with 4:23 to play.

Will Levis passed for 198 yards and two scores but it was not enough as No. 11 Kentucky fell at top-ranked Georgia, 30-13.

Levis connected on 32 of his 42 passes, including one-yard touchdown strikes to Justin Rigg and Wan'Dale Robinson in the game. The Cats struggled to run the ball, amassing just 51 yards on the ground against the nation's number one defense.

Kentucky's defense was led by Josh Paschal, who had six tackles, including one for a loss, and Georgia native

Yusuf Corker, who had five tackles, one for a loss and a pass breakup. Kentucky got the ball to start the game and the Cats were able to move the ball

into Georgia territory after getting two first downs. But an illegal formation penalty hurt UK and the Cats were forced to punt.

On Georgia's first possession, the Bulldogs were able to get one first down before UK forced them into a punt. The 63-yard boot by Jake Camara went into the end zone and the Cats took over at their own 20.

Kentucky went three-and-out on its next possession, then Georgia did the same. The UGA punt pinned Kentucky deep in its own territory and the Cats would be forced to punt yet again.

Georgia took over near midfield with its next possession and the Bulldogs took advantage of the opportunity. The Bulldogs would drive into the UK red zone as the first quarter ended with no score.

On the first play of the second quarter, Georgia quarterback Stetson Bennett hit James Cook across the middle and Cook did the rest, scampering to the end zone for the score. Jack Podlesny added the extra point and the Bulldogs led 7-0 with 14:54 to play in the half.

The Cats would be forced to punt again on their next possession. Georgia took over at their own 20 and proceeded to march 80 yards, all on the ground, in five plays. Zamir White finished it off with a 24-yard touchdown rush and Podlesny added the PAT to make it 14-0 Georgia with 10:35 to play in the half.

Kentucky had its best drive of the first half on its next possession. The Cats used a nice mix of running and passing plays, including a hook-and-ladder, to get into the Georgia red zone. Levis connected with Chris Rodriguez Jr. on a swing pass to get the Cats to the UGA one. From there, Levis connected with tight end Justin Rigg for a one-yard touchdown pass. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT and Georgia led 14-7 after a 15-play, 75-yard drive.

Those were the first points that Georgia has allowed in the second quarter all season. And the first touchdown the Bulldogs have allowed in the first half in 2021.

Neither team would score the remainder of the half and Georgia led by seven at the break.

Georgia took possession to start the second half and the Bulldogs were impressive. UGA went 75 yards in six plays, ending with a 27-yard touchdown pass from Bennett to Brock Bowers. Podlesny made another extra point and Georgia led 21-7 with 12:13 left in the third quarter.

After Kentucky punted again, Georgia drove into UK territory and appeared to be going in for another touchdown. But the Cats defense stood tall, forcing Georgia into a 26-yard Podlesny field goal, which was good. Georgia led 24-7 with 7:21 left in the third quarter.

After the teams exchanged punts, Kentucky drove into Georgia territory again, eventually getting into the red zone. But on the final play of the third quarter, Ruffolo's field goal attempt from 33 yards out was blocked. Georgia recovered at the Bulldogs led 24-7 after three periods.

After a Georgia touchdown made it 30-7, the Cats were able to mount a late drive. And it was a long one. UK covered 75 yards in 22 plays, culminating with a one-yard touchdown pass from Levis to Wan'Dale Robinson. The PAT was blocked and Georgia led 30-13.

MISSISSIPPI STATE 31, #12/12 KENTUCKY 31

No. 12 Kentucky struggled to get anything going offensively and was hurt by turnovers as the Cats lost to Mississippi State 31-17 at Davis Wade Stadium.

Quarterback Will Levis connected on 17 of 28 through the air for 150 yards and a touchdown. However, Levis was intercepted three times in the game.

Kentucky had just 66 yards rushing, well below the Cats' season average. Chris Rodriguez Jr. led UK with eight carries for 34 yards.

Wan'Dale Robinson caught nine passes for 79 yards to lead the Cats in that department. No other Wildcat had more than two catches.

The UK defense spent a lot of time on the field in the game and the tackling numbers reflected that. UK had four players with double-figure tackles on Saturday. Linebacker Jacquez Jones led the way with 18 tackles, while DeAndre Square and Trevin Wallace each had 12. Yusuf Corker had 11 stops for the Cats in

Kentucky took the opening kickoff and made a pair of first downs before Levis was intercepted by MSU's Shawn Preston at the MSU six yard line.

Mississippi State would make a pair of first downs on its first drive before the UK defense forced a punt. Josh Ali fielded the punt at the UK 26 and took it to the left, turned the corner and went 74 yards for the special teams touchdown. Matt Ruffolo added the point after and Kentucky grabbed a 7-0 lead with 7:14 left in the

The Bulldogs took the ensuing drive and marched into UK territory. But the drive stalled when Vito Tisdale made consecutive big plays. First, he sacked MSU quarterback Will Rogers. Then, Tisdale broke up a Rogers pass intended for Makai Polk on third down, forcing a 47-yard field goal from Brandon Ruiz that missed wide right.

On the next possession, Kentucky would take the ball into MSU territory as the first quarter ended. That drive would consume 13 plays and 48 yards before ending with a 41-yard field goal from Ruffolo, giving the Cats a 10-0 advantage with 12:14 remaining in the first half.

Mississippi State would answer on its next drive. The Bulldogs went 75 yards in eight plays, capped by a seven-yard touchdown run from Jo'Quavious Marks. Ruiz added the PAT and Kentucky's lead was cut to 10-7 with 7:45 left in the half.

Kentucky would punt on its next possession and MSU would take advantage. The Bulldogs put together a nine-play, 75-yard drive, capped by a nine-yard touchdown rush by Dillon Johnson. Ruiz added the PAT and Mississippi State led 14-10 with 1:40 left in the half.

The teams would exchange punts before Kentucky mounted one final drive in the first half. The Cats got into the MSU red zone but Levis was picked off by MSU's Jalen Green at the goal line with nine seconds left in the half. The teams would go to the half with MSU leading 14-10.

Mississippi State got the ball to open the second half and the Bulldogs would use a mix of running and passing to march down the field. The Bulldogs would get into the UK red zone. However, consecutive penalties pushed the Bulldogs back and MSU was eventually forced to try a field goal. Ruiz would convert from 27 yards out and Mississippi State took a 17-10 lead with 6:34 remaining in the third quarter.

The tide would turn on Kentucky's next possession. Kentucky took over on its own 25 yard line. Rodriguez ran for one yard on the first play of the drive. Then, on the next play, Rodriguez fumbled and MSU recovered at the UK 24.

The Bulldogs needed just three plays to make the Cats pay. Johnson scored his second rushing touchdown of the night on a one-yard plunge. Ruiz made the point after and MSU led 24-10 with 4:44 remaining in the third quarter.

On the first play of the next drive, Levis was picked off for a third time and MSU took over at the UK 24. It took the Bulldogs just three plays to hit pay dirt again, as Rogers connected with Rara Thomas on a 25-yard touchdown pass. Ruiz added the extra point and MSU led 31-10 late in the third quarter. That would be the score

Early in the fourth quarter, Kentucky cut into the MSU lead. The Cats went 75 yards in 10 plays, with Levis connecting with Demarcus Harris on a 17-yard touchdown pass. Ruffolo added the PAT and it was 31-17 MSU with 13:37 to play.

No. 18 Kentucky amassed 612 yards of total offense but the Cats came up just short, falling to Tennessee 45-42 at Kroger Field.

Quarterback Will Levis connected on 31 of 49 through the air for 372 yards and three touchdowns with an interception. Levis also rushed 15 times for 47 yards and two touchdowns.

Chris Rodriguez Jr. led the Cats' ground attack with 109 yards on 22 carries. Wide receiver Wan'Dale Robinson caught 13 passes for 166 yards and a score.

Tennessee wasted no time getting on the board. On the first play from scrimmage, quarterback Hendon Hooker hit JaVonta Payton with a screen pass that Payton took 75 yards for a touchdown. Chase McGrath added the point after and the Vols had a 7-0 lead just 11 seconds into the game.

Kentucky answered right back. With their first possession, the Cats relied on the run game, with both Rodriguez and Kavosiey Smoke gaining significant ground. UK would cover 75 yards in 14 plays, taking 8:36 off the clock. The drive ended with a nine-yard touchdown rush from Smoke. Matt Ruffolo added the PAT and the game was tied 7-7 with 6:13 to play in the first quarter.

On its second possession, Tennessee struck again, though not quite as quickly. The Vols need three plays to cover 75 yards this time. On third down, Hooker hit Velus Jones with a 72-yard scoring strike. McGrath added the PAT and UT led 14-7 with 5:47 still left in the first quarter.

Kentucky took the next possession and again marched into Tennessee territory. The Cats were threatening when the first quarter ended, with UT ahead 14-7.

The drive would stall and UK was forced into a 50-yard field goal attempt from Ruffolo. But the kick sailed right and missed, and the Vols took over at their own 32.

Tennessee quickly got into UK territory again but Hooker fumbled on the third play of the drive and UK's Jacquez Jones recovered, giving the Cats the ball on their own 29 with 13:34 left in the half.

The Cats took advantage of the miscue. UK drove into UT territory and used a couple of big plays to get into the end zone. First, Levis connected with Robinson on a 31-yard completion near the right sideline. Then, Chauncey Magwood took a lateral from Levis, then threw it back to Levis, who gained 15 yards and got the ball to the UT eight yard line. From there, Levis ran it in for the touchdown. Ruffolo added the point after and the game was tied 14-14 with 10:23 left in the half.

Tennessee would be forced to punt on its next possession, for the first time in the game. Kentucky would take advantage.

The Cats took over at its own 32 yard line and, again, used the ground game to move the ball. The first six plays of the drive were all runs and all were for positive yardage, getting UK inside UT territory. Then, Levis connected with Magwood on a 17-yard completion across the middle, getting the Cats to the Vols' 19 yard line.

After Levis took a quarterback draw up the middle for 13 yards, getting the Cats to the UT three yard line, the UK quarterback hit tight end Justin Rigg with a three-yard scoring pass. Ruffolo added the PAT and the Cats led 21-14 with 3:57 left in the half.

Tennessee would tie the game before the end of the half. The Vols had their first significant drive of the game, going 52 yards in seven plays over the span of 2:36. The drive ended when Hooker hit Jacob Warren with an 18-yard pass over the middle for a touchdown. McGrath added the point after and the game was tied 21-21 with 1:14 left in the half.

Kentucky took the ensuing drive and got into UT territory. However, the Cats could not get past the UT 39 and, on fourth down, Levis' pass for Robinson was incomplete and the Vols took over with 16 seconds left in the half.

Tennessee quickly got itself into UK territory. And, on the final play of the first half, McGrath nailed a 43-yard field goal at UT took a 24-21 lead into the half.

In the second half, Kentucky took possession first and the Cats methodically marched down the field again. The Cats used 10 plays, five passes and five rushes, to cover 75 yards in 5:04. The drive ended when Levis snuck scored on a two-yard quarterback sneak. Ruffolo added the PAT and the Cats led 28-24 with 9:56 left in the third

As they did all night, Tennessee wasted little time taking the lead back. The Vols needed just 37 seconds to cover 49 yards. Jabari Small covered the final 37 yards with a touchdown rush and McGrath added the point after, giving UT a 31-28 lead with 9:11 still left in the third quarter.

With its next drive, Kentucky was driving again. But Levis was picked off by UT's Alontae Taylor, who took it 56 yards for a Volunteer touchdown. McGrath added the PAT and the Vols led 38-28 with 6:23 left in the third quarter.

Kentucky would respond with yet another long scoring drive. The Cats would need 5:03 to cover 75 yards in nine plays. The drive culminated with a 15-yard scoring pass from Levis to Robinson. Ruffolo added another PAT and the UT lead was cut to 38-35 with 1:20 left in the third.

Tennessee took the next possession and got to UK's side of the field again very quickly. But this time, on fourth and eight, Abule Abadi-Fitzgerald caused Hooker to fumble and Kentucky took possession at their own 43.

Kentucky turned it over on downs on its next possession and UT took over at the Kentucky 47 yard line with 12:24 left in the game. The Vols would take advantage, eventually scoring when Hooker hit Cedric Tillman in the corner of the end zone for a six-yard touchdown. The PAT was good and Tennessee led 45-35 with 11:40 to play in the game.

The Cats had another answer. UK covered 75 yards in just five plays and got into the end zone when Levis connected with Izayah Cummings on a 15-yard touchdown pass. Ruffolo's PAT made it 45-42 Tennessee with 9:36 to play.

Tennessee, as they did the entire game, drove down the field and appeared ready to score. But the Vols had a penalty and a sack inside the UK red zone and were forced to try a 35-yard field goal. But McGrath pushed it wide right and the Cats took the ball back, down 45-42, with 4:42 to play.

Kentucky, needing a field goal to tie or a touchdown to win, drove near midfield but faced a fourth and 24 from its own 34. That's when Levis hit Cummings for 28 yards, extending the drive and getting the Cats into UT territory.

But from there, the Cats would have four straight incompletions and UT would take over with 29 seconds left..

When the Kentucky football team took the field for the 2021 TaxSlayer Gator Bowl, it made official yet another milestone in the remarkable term of Mark Stoops as the Wildcats' head coach.

Stoops became the first coach in school history to take his team to five consecutive bowl games, adding to his lengthy and growing list of accomplishments during his eight years at UK. As a program, it matched the school record of five straight postseason appearances, accomplished 2006-10 under two head coaches.

Even in the abbreviated 2020 season, Stoops added two more achievements: Kentucky's win at Tennessee was the Wildcats' first victory in Knoxville since 1984; and, the regular-season finale over South Carolina was Stoops' 48th win at Kentucky, moving him into sole possession of second place, behind only the legendary Paul "Bear" Bryant. The Gator Bowl improved his total to 49.

A partial accounting of Stoops' exploits also features:

- Back-to-back-to-back bowl wins the
 2021 TaxSlayer Gator Bowl, 2019 Belk Bowl and the Citrus Bowl on Jan. 1, 2019 the first time in school history that UK won bowls in three consecutive seasons;
- First New Year's Day Bowl win since 1951 (2018 season)
- First 10-win season since 1977 (2018)
- First SEC Coach of the Year since 1983 (2018)
- First final poll ranking since 1984 (2018)
- First bowl win since 2008 (2018)
- First win vs. Florida since 1986 (2018)
- First bowl appearance since 2010 (2016)

In addition to the team accomplishments, several of Stoops' players have won All-America accolades, along with awards such as the Bronko Nagurski Award, Chuck Bednarik Award, Paul Hornung Award, Ronnie Lott Trophy, Ray Guy Award, Danny Wuerffel Trophy, Pop Warner Award, Mayo Clinic Comeback Player of the Year Award, Academic All-America and National Good Works Team.

The bountiful crop of victories and honors are the fruit of the last five seasons, but the harvest didn't come easily. Arriving in 2013, inheriting a team that had gone 2-10 the season before, it took three years of plowing, planting and growing before the results came.

Stoops earned his first bowl game as head coach in 2016, when the Wildcats

overcame an 0-2 start to go 7-3 down the stretch and advance to the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl. UK duplicated seven wins in 2017, playing in the Franklin-American Mortgage Music City Bowl.

Led by linebacker Josh Allen, the National Defensive Player of the Year, and Benny Snell Jr., the school's all-time leading rusher, the 2018 squad went 10-3. It was UK's best season in 41 years, topped by a win over Penn State in the VRBO Citrus Bowl. It was only the third 10-win season in school history.

In addition, the 2018 campaign featured a win at Florida -- the Wildcats' first victory over the Gators in 32 years -- resulting in UK being named the National Team of the Week by the Football Writers Association of America. The regular season concluded with a 56-10 win at in-state rival Louisville, the largest margin of victory in the history of the Governor's Cup series.

UK was No. 11 in the final USA Today coaches' poll and No. 12 in the final Associated Press tabulation, the school's first appearance in the final rankings since 1984. The 2018 season also continued a remarkable trend -- since Stoops took over as coach of the Cats in 2013, UK was the only school in the nation that tied or improved its win total in six straight seasons.

CollegeFootballNews.com listed Stoops as the best coaching performance of the season and he was named Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year by The Associated Press, Athlon Sports and the league coaches.

The 2019 season was one of the most unusual in school history. A succession of injuries decimated the quarterbacks and Stoops turned to wide receiver Lynn Bowden Jr. to man the QB position. Running the ball almost exclusively, UK went 6-2 down the stretch and closed the season with four straight wins, topped by a dramatic come-from-behind Belk Bowl win over Virginia Tech when

Bowden threw the game-winning touchdown pass with only 15 seconds remaining.

How has Stoops accomplished all of this? The coach would tell you that there's been nothing magical about the process.

True to his blue-collar roots in Youngstown, Ohio, the methodical advancement made by Stoops' teams is a reflection of the coach's rock-steady work ethic, tireless recruiting, and ability to adapt.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12. He inherited a unit a unit ranked 108th in the nation in total defense and turned it into one of the nation's best. In the 2012 season, the Seminoles were second in the nation in total defense, allowing 254.1 yards per game, and sixth nationally in scoring defense at 14.7 points per game. Playing well against the run and the pass, FSU was third in the country in rushing defense and led the nation in pass defense. FSU led the ACC in seven defensive categories. Stoops also coached the defensive backs under head coach Jimbo Fisher.

Eight Seminoles on defense earned 2012 All-ACC honors, including four first-team selections, highlighted by one of the nation's top defensive end duos in Bjoern Werner and Cornellius Carradine, who combined for 24 sacks and 31 tackles for loss. Werner was a finalist for the 2012 Bronko Nagurski Award as the National Defensive Player of the Year and was among the national leaders in sacks with 13. Stoops also coached cornerback Ronald Darby to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year.

The Seminoles' prowess was a continuation of the 2011 season, when Stoops' defenders led the nation in fewest yards allowed per carry (2.3), ranked fourth in the nation in total defense (275 yards per game), second in rushing defense (82.7 ypg), fourth in scoring defense (15.1 points per game), and eighth in tackles for loss (8.6 per game)

and quarterback sacks (3.1 per game). FSU led the ACC in eight defensive categories.

Stoops overhauled the Florida State defense in 2010, his first season as defensive coordinator. The Seminoles gave up 19.6 points per game, third-best in the ACC and 20th nationally. FSU ranked 42nd nationally in total defense that season; in contrast, the team was 108th nationally in total defense and 94th in scoring defense in 2009, the year before Stoops' arrival. FSU improved its overall defense by more than 80 yards per game, primarily by limiting opponents to 75 fewer rushing yards per game. The Seminoles ranked third in the nation in quarterback sacks and were 21st in tackles for loss. In the secondary, Stoops coached Xavier Rhodes to ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors and National Defensive Freshman of the Year accolades.

During Stoops' three seasons, FSU went 10-4, 9-4 and 12-2, including wins over South Carolina in the 2010 Chick-fil-A Bowl, Notre Dame in the 2011 Champs Sports Bowl and Northern Illinois in the 2013 Orange Bowl.

Stoops was defensive coordinator and DBs coach at Arizona from 2004-09, working for his brother, Mike, who was head coach of the Wildcats. During Mark's time there, Arizona's records improved steadily, going 3-8, 3-8, 6-6, 5-7, 8-5 and 8-5. The Wildcats advanced to the Las Vegas Bowl and Holiday Bowl during the last two years. Mark and Mike are also brothers of Bob Stoops, who spent 18 years as the Oklahoma head coach and has been elected to the College Football Hall of Fame. The eldest Stoops brother, Ron Jr., is retired after coaching at Youngstown State

Stoops inherited an Arizona unit that was 109th in the nation in total defense and 107th in scoring defense in 2003, the year before he arrived. By the end of his term at Arizona, the Wildcats ranked in the nation's



top 25 in total defense his final two seasons and ranked as high as 33rd in scoring defense.

Prior to Arizona, Stoops coached the defensive backs three years at Miami (Fla.). The 2001 national champion Hurricanes led the nation in pass efficiency defense, scoring defense and turnover margin. That team also established a school record with 27 interceptions and 45 total takeaways.

Stoops' 2002 secondary led the nation in pass defense and pass efficiency defense. Despite having to replace all four starters in the defensive backfield, the 2003 team led the nation in pass defense. In his three seasons, Miami went 35-3, including the 12-0 Rose Bowl title campaign, plus appearances in the Fiesta and Orange bowls. Ten Miami defensive backs who played at least one season under Stoops were eventually selected in the National Football League draft - seven in the first round.

Stoops got his first experience in leading a defense as co-defensive coordinator at Houston in the 2000 season. He coached the secondary at Wyoming from 1997-99 and the Cowboys notched three straight winning seasons. A highlight of his time there was a school-record 24 interceptions in the '97 season. His first full-time coaching job was in 1996 at South Florida, helping USF in the start-up of its program before the Bulls had their first kickoff in '97.

Stoops has recruited and developed numerous outstanding defensive backs, many of whom went on to National Football

League careers. Among the notables are Antoine Cason and Michael Johnson at Arizona, Miami's Philip Buchanon, Kelly Jennings, Brandon Meriweather, Ed Reed, Antrel Rolle, Mike Rumph and Sean Taylor and Wyoming's Brian Lee.

Stoops was raised in Youngstown, Ohio. As did brothers Bob and Mike, Mark played in the secondary at the University of Iowa for Hall of Fame coach Hayden Fry. He participated in four bowl games as a player. Fry hired Stoops as a graduate assistant coach at Iowa in the 1990 and '91 seasons. The Hawkeyes won the 1990 Big Ten title and played in the Rose Bowl, duplicating feats Stoops also achieved as a player. Stoops went on to coach four years in high school before entering the collegiate ranks.

Stoops has two sons, Will and Zack.

JOHN SETTLE

RUNNING BACKS/CO-SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

Former Wisconsin running backs coach John Settle is in his first season at Kentucky. Settle comes to the Bluegrass with 26 years of coaching experience, including six in the NFL, 19 bowl appearances and a long list of successful running backs.

Eleven years of his coaching career were spent at Wisconsin, the most recent as the running backs coach from 2015-2021. He also coached the Badger running backs from 2006-10.

Settle was a four-year letterwinner (1983-86) at Appalachian State, where he finished as the school's career rushing leader with 4,409 yards (then third-most in FCS history) and 43 touchdowns. A two-time All-American, he was the Southern Conference Player of the Year as a senior after rushing for 1,661 yards and 20 TDs. His No. 23 was retired by his alma mater and he was inducted into the school's hall of fame in 1994.

VInce Marrow, aka the "Big Dawg", enters his ninth season as associate head coach/tight ends coach/recruiting coordinator/NFL liasison.

Marrow's tight ends have been a big factor in UK producing five consecutive seasons of 2,000 or more rushing yards with at least one 1,000-yard rusher in four of those (Stanley "Boom" Williams -2016; Benny Snell Jr., - 2017, 2018; Lynn Bowden - 2019). Marrow also has been instrumental in UK signing eight straight top-50 recruiting classes.

Marrow had a professional playing career as a member of NFL rosters on five teams, including Buffalo, Carolina, New York Jets, Chicago and San Francisco. After his NFL days ended, Marrow played for the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe in 1998, earning all-league honors with 32 receptions for 345 yards. He also played for the Orlando Rage in the XFL in 2001.

He began his collegiate playing career at Youngstown State before transferring to Toledo. Marrow played two seasons at Toledo, earning second-team All-MAC honors in 1991 before being drafted by the Bills in 1992.
