Florida is coming off its most rushing yards (374 vs. South Carolina) in an SEC game since running for 418 yards vs. Georgia on Nov. 1, 2014. Florida ranks second in the FBS with 6.1 yards/carry and 11th with 225.7 yards/game. Vanderbilt is allowing 4.8 yards per carry (13th in SEC, 113th in FBS) and 164.3 rushing yards per game (10th in SEC, 90th in FBS).

THE STORYLINE

- Week 12 marks the 56th meeting between Florida and Vanderbilt including the 29th matchup in Nashville.
- Florida wields a 43-10-2 series lead with wins in 30 of the last 31 meetings, highlighted by an eight-game win streak.
- The Gators have won 15-straight games against Vanderbilt in Nashville dating back through 1992 (30-year span).
- The last time Florida and Vanderbilt met (Oct. 9, 2021) was the last time Florida shut out an opponent (W, 42-0).
- This is the first meeting between UF HC **Billy Napier** and VU HC Clark Lea as head coaches.
- **QB Anthony Richardson's** 6.6 yards per carry ranks second among FBS QBs -- Vandy's Mike Wright (8.3 YPC) ranks first.
- Florida has been among the best offensive teams in the nation in road games this season (at No. 11 Tennessee, at Texas A&M), ranking third in the FBS with 543.0 yards/game and ninth with 37.0 points/game in away contests.
- In road games, Richardson's 327.0 passing yards/game ranks fifth in the FBS.
- UF is coming off its top-two rushing totals of 2022, combining for 665 yards (291 at Texas A&M, 374 vs. South Carolina).
- Florida's defense has not allowed a point in the last six quarters (spanning 20 possessions).
- In the last six quarters, UF has allowed just 343 yards (76 passing) while holding teams to 4-for-19 on third down (21.1%).
- The Gators' 6.1 yards per carry ranks second in the FBS and is in line to set a school record (current: 2008 - 5.9).
- Florida's 225.7 rushing YPG ranks 11th in the FBS, fifth in the Power Five and second in the SEC (behind Ole Miss).
- Florida has rushed for 200-plus yards in seven games including five of the last six contests. The Gators have also rushed for 100 yards in 12-straight games dating back to 2021.
- The Gators boast three of the top-seven rushers in the SEC in yards per carry: Richardson (second - 6.6), **RB Trevor Etienne** (fourth - 6.4) and **RB Montrell Johnson Jr.** (seventh - 6.1).
- Florida is one of two FBS teams (alongside Oregon) with three qualified players averaging over 6.0 yards per carry.
- In their first seasons as Gators, the duo of Johnson Jr. and Etienne has combined for a rushing touchdown in all 10 games this season while scoring 14 total rushing touchdowns.
- When Etienne and Richardson surpass 600 rushing yards, the trio of Etienne (577), Richardson (588) and Johnson Jr. (710) will become the third trio in UF history to eclipse 600 rush yards apiece (1984 - Anderson, Williams, Hampton | 2008 - Tebow, Harvin, Raine, Demps). No UF trio has ever eclipsed 700 rushing yards apiece.
- Richardson is one of six FBS players (four in P5) with 1,900 passing yards and 550 rushing yards this season.
- Richardson is one of five FBS players (four in P5) with nine-plus passing TDs and nine-plus rushing TDs.
- Richardson's nine rushing TDs rank second among SEC QBs, T-sixth among FBS QBs and sixth by a UF QB in a season.
- **G O'Cyrrus Torrence** is the top-rated guard in the nation at 88.6, according to Pro Football Focus (has never allowed a sack).
- Florida has turned the ball over one time in its last 51 possessions (spanning the last four games).
- Florida boasts four come-from-behind wins this season (vs. No. 7 Utah, vs. USF, vs. EWU, at Texas A&M).
- Florida has scored in 433-consecutive games dating back to 1988 -- an NCAA record and 56 games longer than any other college football team in the history of the sport.

DETAILED LOOK AT RICHARDSON'S 2022 CAMPAIGN

- The five-highest passing yardage totals of Richardson's career (453 at No. 11 Tennessee, 240 vs. EWU, 185 vs. LSU, 271 vs. No. 1 Georgia, 201 at Texas A&M) have all come in the last seven games.
- Richardson has not thrown an INT in the last four games while throwing six TDs -- 113 attempts without a pick.

- Week 11 vs. South Carolina:** Passed for 2 TDs and 112 yards, rushed for 96 yards and 1 TD on 15 carries (6.4 YPC).
- Richardson posted his fourth game of the season with three-or-more total touchdowns (two with four).
- Week 10 at Texas A&M:** Richardson passed for 200-plus yards for the fourth time in his career and finished with two passing TDs and two rushing TDs each for the second time this season.
- At Texas A&M, Richardson's 60-yard TD rush marked his third TD rush of 45-plus yards this season and across the last 10 seasons, he owns each of Florida's five-longest touchdown rushes by a quarterback:
 - » Oct. 15, 2022 vs. LSU: 81-yard TD rush; Sept. 11, 2021 at USF: 80-yard TD rush; Sept. 4, 2021 vs. FAU: 73-yard TD rush; Nov. 5, 2022 at Texas A&M: 60-yard TD rush; Sept. 3, 2022 vs. Utah: 45-yard TD rush
- Week 9 vs. No. 1 Georgia:** Notched his third-career 200-yard passing game with 271 yards.
- Week 7 vs. LSU:** Richardson passed for 150 yards and rushed for 100 yards for the third time this season.
 - » He is one of three Florida players to accomplish the feat in the last 25 years (Tim Tebow, Emory Jones).
 - » Richardson's 81-yard touchdown run to open the fourth quarter marked Florida's third-longest TD rush since 1996 and the longest by a UF QB in that time.
 - » T-11th-longest TD rush in FBS in 2022; Second-longest TD rush in FBS among QBs in 2022
- Of Richardson's 30 career touchdowns (18 passing, 12 rushing), he has:
 - » Six TDs of 70-plus yards, 11 TDs of 40-plus yards and 13 TDs of 25-plus yards.
 - » Three TD rushes of 70-plus yards, four TD rushes of 60 yards and five TD rushes of 45 yards
 - » Three 75-plus-yard TD passes, six 40-yard TD passes, seven 30-yard TD passes and eight 25-yard TD passes
- Weeks 4 & 5 (at No. 11 Tennessee, vs. EWU):** Richardson threw for 693 yards, four TDs and two INTs while rushing 18 times for 107 yards and two TDs -- equating to 800 total yards and six multi-purpose TDs.
- Week 4 at No. 11 Tennessee:** Richardson completed 24-of-44 passes for 453 yards and two touchdowns while rushing 17 times for 62 yards and two touchdowns on the ground.
- Week 4:** Richardson finished with 515 total yards of offense, which ranks third all-time in a single game in program history. His 515 yards of offense is the top mark in the SEC and ranks second in the P5 this season.
 - » 1. Emory Jones, 550 vs. Samford (2021) 2. Tim Tebow, 533 vs. Cincinnati (2009)
- Week 4:** Richardson's 453 yards passing ranked ninth in a single game in program history and ranks fifth in the P5 this year (third in FBS). Richardson broke his previous career high of 168 yards passing by 285 yards.
- Week 4:** Richardson became the first Florida quarterback to pass for 450-plus yards and two-plus passing touchdowns while rushing for 50-plus yards and two-plus rushing touchdowns in a single game.

JOHNSON JR. + ETIENNE REINVIGORATING RUN GAME

- In their first seasons as Gators, **RB Montrell Johnson Jr.** (116 carries, 710 yards, 6.1 YPC, 9 TD) and **RB Trevor Etienne** (89 carries, 567 yards, 6.4 YPC, 5 TD) have been highly efficient leading UF's running game.
- They are one of three RB duos in the FBS to have rushed for over 500 yards each on over 6.0 YPC this season.
- The RB duo has combined for 39 of Florida's 65 explosive rushes (10-plus yards) this season (60%).
- Johnson Jr. is coming off back-to-back 100-yard rushing games, including a career-high 161 yards last week vs. South Carolina. He is the first UF RB with consecutive 100-yard games since Jordan Scarlett in 2016.
- Johnson Jr. is going for three-straight 100-yard games, which would be the 16th instance in UF history (first since '15).
- Etienne also rushed for a career-high 100 yards in Week 11, as Johnson Jr. and Etienne became Florida's first pair of 100-yard rushers in 22 games (9/4/21 vs. FAU).
- Etienne's 85-yard TD rush was the seventh-longest TD rush in school history, and the longest by a UF player since Lamical Perine's 88-yard TD run vs. Auburn in 2019. It was also the second-longest TD run by a freshman in school history, and the tied for the eighth-longest TD rush in the FBS this season.
- Etienne, Johnson Jr. and **QB Anthony Richardson** all rushed for 95+ yards and scored a rushing TD in Week 11.
- Etienne's 6.4 YPC ranks fourth in the FBS among true freshmen.
- Johnson Jr. ranks T-third in the SEC and T-21st in the Power Five with nine rushing touchdowns.
- Johnson Jr. has eight rushing TDs across the last eight games with rushing TDs in seven of the last eight.
- Florida has eight games with three-plus players scoring a rushing TD since last season (third in SEC).
- 10 Power Five players have rushed for over 6.0 YPC while scoring at least nine rushing touchdowns this season. Johnson Jr. and Richardson are two of those players, with Richardson being one of three QBs.

- In 2021, Florida averaged over 425 YPG for the third time in the last-four seasons.
- In 2020, Florida logged the 10th season in school history in which it averaged 300-plus passing yards per game (2019, 2001, 2000, 1998, 1996, 1995, 1994, 1993, 1991).

PRODUCTION ON THE OFFENSIVE LINE

- The Gators' 12 sacks allowed are tied for the 22nd-fewest in the FBS (11th in P5) and rank fourth in the SEC.
- Since the start of last season, Florida has out-sacked its opponents by a plus-29 margin, and the Gators' 26 sacks allowed are tied for the 10th-fewest in the FBS (second in the SEC behind Georgia).
- Two UF offensive lineman are graded inside the top-10 at their position according to Pro Football Focus: **G O'Cyrus Torrence** (#1, 88.6) and **T Austin Barber** (#7, 82.9).

A BALANCED RECEIVERS ROOM

- On Senior Day, **TE Jonathan Odom** recorded his first-career reception and touchdown vs. South Carolina.
- With Odom recording his first receptions of 2022, 19 different players have caught a pass for UF this season.
- WR Caleb Douglas** made his first-career start vs. South Carolina, becoming the first true freshman to start at WR since Kadarius Toney (10/7/17 vs. LSU). Douglas led UF with three receptions and 53 yards in Week 11.
- Douglas' 53 yards were the most by a UF WR in his first start since Josh Hammond's 72 vs. North Texas (9/17/16).
- Five UF receivers have led or shared the team's weekly lead in receiving yards: **WR Justin Shorter** (five), **WR Xzavier Henderson** (two), **WR Ricky Pearsall** (two), **WR Trent Whittemore** (one) and Douglas (one).
- Shorter's 471 yards receiving lead the team, while Henderson's 38 catches pace the squad (by 15).
- Henderson has led or owned a share of the team lead in receptions in eight of 10 games.
- Henderson set a career high with 110 yards receiving vs. UGA (Oct. 29), notching the first 100-yard game of his career.
- QB Anthony Richardson** connected with Henderson for a 78-yard touchdown pass vs. UGA in Week 9 – setting a new career passing long for Richardson and a new career receiving long for Henderson.
- The score was UF's longest pass play since Austin Appleby's 85-yard TD pass to Mark Thompson on Jan. 2, 2017 vs. Iowa. It tied for UF's 11th-longest pass since 1996 and is tied for the 20th-longest TD pass in the FBS this year.
- Shorter ranks first in the SEC and second in the FBS with 22.4 yards per catch (behind UNC's Antoine Green).
- Shorter has had a 30-yard reception in five of his last six games. He has three catches of 40-plus yards.
- Shorter is the first UF player since Kadarius Toney and Kyle Pitts in 2020 with multiple 50-yard receiving TDs in the same season.
- Pearsall** has recorded a reception in 25-consecutive games. He ranks sixth in the SEC with 18.3 yards per catch.
- Pearsall's 76-yard TD run vs. Eastern Washington is the longest rush by an FBS WR this season and ranks t-10th in the FBS across the last five seasons (third-longest run by a UF wide receiver in the last 25 years).

RICHARDSON'S TIME CAPSULE

- QB Anthony Richardson** earned SEC Offensive Player of the Week honors in Week 1 after setting a career high with three rushing TDs while passing for 168 yards, becoming the first UF QB to rush for three-plus TDs and pass for 150-plus yards in the same game since Tim Tebow vs. Georgia on Nov. 1, 2008.
 - Richardson became the first UF QB to rush for three-plus TDs in a contest since Emory Jones accomplished the feat vs. Vanderbilt on Nov. 9, 2019.
 - Richardson is one of three UF QBs since 1996 to rush for three TDs and pass for 150-plus yards in the same game, joining Jesse Palmer and Tim Tebow (twice). He is one of 14 FBS QBs to do so since 2021.
- Richardson entered '22 as a projected 1st-round pick (13th) by ESPN's Mel Kiper, and now sits at No. 15.
- Richardson's 7.9 YPC ranked fourth in the FBS among QBs with 50-plus carries last season.
- Richardson also ranked t-ninth among FBS quarterbacks with 57.3 rushing yards per game in 2021.
- Against USF last season, Richardson completed a 75-yard TD pass and 41-yard TD pass (both in first half), as well as breaking off an 80-yard TD rush.
- Richardson is the only player in the last 11 seasons with an 80-yard run and 75-yard pass in the same game – since Nebraska's Taylor Martinez on Oct. 7, 2010 vs. Kansas State.
- Richardson's 80-yard TD rush in the fourth quarter vs. USF tied for the 10th-longest touchdown rush in Florida football history. It was also the longest rush by a UF quarterback in the last 25 years, as well as the third-longest TD rush by an FBS QB in 2021.
- Richardson's 75-yard TD pass to Jacob Copeland in the first quarter was Florida's longest passing play since January 2, 2017 vs. Iowa in the Outback Bowl – until he did it again in Week 5 vs. EWU (75 yards to Shorter).

OFFENSIVE GRAB BAG

- Over the last five seasons, the Gators rank ninth in the Power Five with 453.6 scrimmage yards per game and 12th in the Power Five with 34.1 points per game, ranking third and fourth in the SEC, respectively.
- Since 2018, UF ranks eighth in the P5 in passing efficiency (153.0) and 11th in TD-INT ratio (2.86).
- Florida has out-gained its opponents in 17 of 23 games dating back to last season.
- The Gators have had 500-plus yards in three of the last seven games and in 15 of their last 34 games.
- Florida has amassed 400-plus total yards in six of 10 games this season, as well as 22 times in its last 33 games, and 35 of the last 52.
- Florida rushed for 200-plus yards 25 times in its last 61 games including 13 times since 2021.
- UF scored 30-plus points 38 times in 61 games since 2018 (62.3%), and 30-plus in 25 of the last 37 (67.6%).
- UF scored 40 points 20 times in the last 61 games and six times in 23 games the last two seasons.
- The Gators have scored 50 points seven times in the last 61 games.



LONG-TERM DEFENSIVE TRENDS

- Florida ranks second in the SEC and seventh nationally in sacks since the 2018 season with 174 - trailing only Pittsburgh (220), Clemson (217), Alabama (200), Miami (183), Ohio State (178) and Oklahoma State (176).
 - » Since the start of last season, Florida has out-sacked its opponents by a plus-29 margin.
 - » Since 1996, UF is 13th in the FBS with 848 sacks and rank second in the SEC behind Alabama at 872.
- UF has held opponents to a 54.0 passing completion percentage since 1996, which ranks seventh-lowest in the FBS and third in the SEC.
- Since 1996, The Gators are third nationally in interceptions with 408 and lead the SEC with the next closest team, Alabama, 20 picks behind.
 - » Florida is fourth in the SEC with eight interceptions this season.
 - » The Gators have recorded an interception in five games this season - No. 7 Utah (1), No. 20 Kentucky (1), USF (2), Missouri (2) and No. 1 Georgia (2).
- Florida's defense has produced 559 turnovers since 2000, leading the SEC and tied for 7th in the country.

DEFENSIVE YOUTH

- Ten Florida defensive players have made their collegiate debuts through the first ten games of the season, including 11 that appeared for the first time as a Gator.
 - » Five players - **LB Shemar James**, **DL Chris McClellan**, **S Miguel Mitchell**, **DL Tyreek Sapp** and **S Kamari Wilson** - all made their collegiate debuts in the season opener vs. No. 7 Utah and have appeared in every game this season.
 - » James started at LB, becoming the first Gator true freshman to start a season opener since Marco Wilson vs. Michigan in 2017 and the first true freshman LB since David Reese II vs. South Carolina in 2016.
 - » James ranks sixth on the team in tackles (36), t-fifth in sacks (1.0) and t-sixth in QB hurries (3).
 - » At No. 11 Tennessee, James recorded his first-career sack in the first quarter, getting to Tennessee QB Hendon Hooker for a six-yard loss. The sack also marked his first-career TFL.
 - » Wilson earned his first-career start vs. Eastern Washington. The last true freshman to start for the Gators at safety was Trey Dean III in 2018 vs. Colorado State.
 - » Freshman **LB Jack Pyburn** and Sophomore **DL Keenan Landry** both made their college debuts vs. Eastern Washington as Pyburn had a solo tackle. Freshman **OLB Bryce Capers** later made his debut vs. South Carolina.
- Georgia transfer **DB Jalen Kimber** made his UF debut and finished with two tackles vs. No. 7 Utah.
 - » His 39-yard interception return TD vs. USF in the second quarter represented Florida's first pick-six since CJ Gardner-Johnson's 30-yard interception return TD against Michigan in the Chick-Fil-A Peach Bowl on Dec. 29, 2018. The pick-six marked Florida's 51st since 1996.
- Sophomore **CB Jason Marshall Jr.** has started all ten games this season for a total of 17 all-time and has played in all 23 games in his career.
 - » Four other underclassmen have earned their first-career starts this season in **DL Desmond Watson** (at No. 11 Tenn.), **DL Justus Boone** (vs. Eastern Washington), **JACK Antwaun Powell-Ryland Jr.** (at Texas A&M) and **S Miguel Mitchell** (vs. South Carolina).
- Six of the 19 turnovers forced by the Gators have come from underclassmen - Powell-Ryland (2), Jalen Kimber (1), Miguel Mitchell (1), Desmond Watson (1) and Kamari Wilson (1).

TURNOVERS TRENDING IN 2022

- The Gators have produced 19 turnovers this season with at least one each game, including six with multiple - two interceptions and a forced fumble vs. USF, two forced fumbles at No. 11 Tennessee, two interceptions vs. Missouri, two interceptions and a forced fumble vs. No. 1 Georgia, two forced fumbles at Texas A&M and three forced fumbles vs. South Carolina.
 - » Last season, UF only had nine turnovers gained through the first-nine games and finished the season with 13 total.
 - » The last time the Gators produced at least 19 turnovers in a season was in 2019 when they finished with 23.
 - » Against South Carolina, Florida caused three-consecutive turnovers to start the second half as USC only ran a total of four offensive plays - the non-turnover play was zero-yard rush.
- The 19 total takeaways have resulted in 70 points for the Gators, including the game-winning touchdown vs. USF.
 - » The Gators rank first in the SEC in turnovers gained and second in turnover margin.
- Ten of the turnovers caused marked career firsts for a group of Gators: **Antwaun Powell-Ryland Jr.** (forced fumble vs. USF), **Jalen Kimber** (interception vs. USF), **Ventrell Miller** (forced fumble at Tenn.), **Amari Burney** (forced fumble at Tenn.), **Miguel Mitchell** (forced fumble vs. Eastern Wash.), **CB Jaydon Hill** (interception vs. Missouri), **Jadarrius Perkins** (interception vs. UGA), **Rashad Torrence II** (forced fumble vs. USC), **Desmond Watson** (forced fumble vs. USC) and **Kamari Wilson** (forced fumble vs. USC).
 - » The first turnover of the season by the defense was Burney's game-winning interception vs. No. 7 Utah in the season opener.
- Burney (four), Hill (two), Powell-Ryland Jr. (two) and Umanmielen (two) have forced multiple takeaways this year.
- The fumble forced on the Vols' opening drive by Miller marked the second game in which Florida caused a fumble on the opponent's opening drive - vs. USF, Powell-Ryland Jr. forced a fumble.

BREAKOUT BURNEY

- **LB Amari Burney** has had a breakout season in his fifth campaign with the Gators, contributing in a multitude of ways.
- The St. Petersburg, Fla. native leads the team in sacks (4.0), tied-first in interceptions (2), forced fumbles (2), third in TFL (6.5), t-third in pass breakups (2) and fourth in tackles (55).
- Burney is one of two LBs in the FBS with 2 INTs, 2 forced fumbles and 4.0 sacks (Monty Montgomery, Louisville).
- Burney is one of three LBs in the FBS with 2 INTs and 4.0 sacks (Monty Montgomery, Louisville & Austin Ajiaka, UNLV).
- He sealed a 29-26 season-opening victory over No. 7 Utah with his third-career interception, which came in the endzone with 0:17 remaining in the fourth quarter.
 - » The victory marked UF's highest-ranked victory in a season opener in program history.
- Burney forced his first career fumble at No. 11 Tennessee as he finished with 2.5 TFL, 2.0 solo sacks, and eight total tackles (seven solo).
- Vs. No. 1 Georgia, he caused two turnovers (forced fumble and interception) on back-to-back drives in the third quarter.
 - » Both set up scores for the Gators: 26-yard FG from **K Adam Mihalek** and 78-yard TD pass from **QB Anthony Richardson** to **WR Xavier Henderson**.
 - » He also had a quarterback hurry and a pass breakup on third down that forced Georgia to punt.
- He has now been involved on five takeaways this season: two interceptions, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

THE RETURN OF HILL

- After missing last season due to an injury and the beginning of the 2022 campaign, **CB Jaydon Hill** has started the last six games for the Gators.
 - » His season debut vs. Eastern Washington marked 641 days since his last appearance, which was in the Cotton Bowl vs Oklahoma in 2020.
- In his second start, he recorded two interceptions, including a 49-yard interception return touchdown in the first quarter vs. Missouri.
 - » The first pick marked his first-career interception and first-career touchdown.
 - » His first interception also represented Florida's longest pick-six since Ventrell Miller's 82-yard interception return touchdown vs. Idaho on Nov. 17, 2018
 - » Hill became the first Florida player with two interceptions and a pick-six in the same game since CJ Gardner-Johnson vs. Michigan in the Peach Bowl on Dec. 29, 2018.
- The second interception late in the 3rd quarter setup a 9-play 91-yard touchdown drive that put Florida ahead 24-10 with a 9-yard touchdown pass from Anthony Richardson to Ricky Pearsall early in the 4th quarter.

PRINCELY + POWELL

- In the last two games, the sophomore duo of **DE Princely Umanmielen** and **JACK Antwaun Powell-Ryland Jr.** has combined for 11 total tackles that are made of 5.5 TFLs and 3.5 sacks with five quarterback hurries and two forced fumbles.
 - » The Florida defense continued its shutout streak against South Carolina and have not allowed a score in the last six quarters - the TD by USC came on special teams.
 - » UF has only allowed 4-of-19 third down conversions during the past six quarters.
 - » The shut out of the Aggies in the second half, marked UF's first second half shutout since Oct. 9, 2021 vs. Vanderbilt (W, 42-0).
 - » The Gators also held Texas A&M to 106 total yards in the second half, including 29 yards in the third quarter and 11 total rushing yards.
 - » The Gamecocks were held to 44 rushing yards (1.9 per attempt) and only 237 yards of total offense.
- A Manor, Tex. native, Umanmielen added two quarterback hurries on third-down as he was UF's highest-graded defensive player by PFF with a grade of 90.5 overall and 92.6 on pass rush vs. the Aggies.
- Making his first-career start at Texas A&M, Powell-Ryland Jr. set career highs with six tackles (three solo) and forced his second fumble of the season.

SPECIAL TEAMS

- **K Adam Mihalek's** three 50-yard FGs are tied for the most in a single season by a UF kicker (sixth to do so).
 - » 52 yards vs. No. 1 Georgia, 50 yards vs. No. 20 Kentucky and 50 yards at Texas A&M
 - » His field goal vs. the Bulldogs was Florida's longest since Evan McPherson drilled a 53-yarder on Oct. 10, 2020 vs. Texas A&M. The 52-yarder is tied for fifth-longest in the SEC and t-12th among Power 5 kickers.
 - » Mihalek is one of two FBS kickers with three 50+ yarders and 100% extra-point accuracy on 30+ attempts.
 - » Mihalek is one of six FBS kickers with three-or-more 50-yarders this season.
- **P Jeremy Crawshaw** is averaging 46.9 yards per punt in 25 attempts this season with seven 50-plus and season-long of 67 yds vs. USC.
 - » In two punts vs. LSU, he totaled 112 yards with a long of 62 as both were placed inside the opposing-20 and over 50-plus yards, including one that was muffed and recovered by **LS Rocco Underwood** that setup a TD rush.
 - » Florida is fourth in the nation in net punting with an average of 42.6 yards.
- Freshman kicker **Trey Smack** made his collegiate debut, handling kickoff duties vs. Eastern Washington
- **WR Xavier Henderson's** 48-yard punt return marked a career high as well as Florida's longest return of the 2022 season.
 - » Henderson's return represented Florida's longest since Kadarius Toney's 50-yard punt return touchdown on Nov. 28, 2020 vs. Kentucky.
- **RB Trevor Etienne** returned three kicks for an average of 33.0 yards vs. LSU including a long return of 47 yards on the game's opening kick.
 - » The return was the Gators' longest since Kadarius Toney's 51 yards vs. Georgia on Oct. 27, 2018.

- For the first time this season, the Gators lead the SEC in rushing offense and are among the top-11 in the nation with 225.3 yards per game on the ground. The rushing attack has been spearheaded by **Montrell Johnson Jr.** who became the first Florida RB to tally back-to-back games with 100 yard rushing since **Jordan Scarlett** in 2016.
- Takeaways continue to build up for the Florida defense, as the Gators forced and recovered three fumbles against South Carolina to improve to a SEC-leading 21 total turnovers. Both **Desmond Watson** and **Kamari Wilson** forced the first fumbles of their young careers.
- Punter **Jeremy Crawshaw** has been a weapon for the special teams and produced a season-high 67-yard punt against South Carolina pinning the Gamecocks at the 4-yard line. Florida has been among the top-5 in the nation in net punting the last four weeks.
- Florida showed vast improvements defensively against South Carolina. The Gators defense held South Carolina to 44 yards rushing marking the first time UF has held an opponent to under 50 yards rushing since allowing 40 yards against Missouri on Oct. 31, 2020.

HEAD COACH BILLY NAPIER

Napier hired as the 28th head coach in Florida football history

Following a late-morning flight from Louisiana and a police escort from the Gainesville Air Center, Billy Napier planted his feet on the University of Florida campus at 12:12 p.m. on Sunday, Dec. 5.

That's the time Napier stepped from a van that carried his wife, their three kids and his mother, and into a throng of cheering fans ready to welcome him to Gator Nation. Napier arrived to similar fanfare at the airport when he was met by the UF band and cheerleaders.

"Let's go Napier!" yelled a young man as soon as Napier appeared from behind the van's sliding door.

"We love you Napier family," another young man screamed.

Napier flashed a big grin, did a Gator Chomp and then wiggled his way through the crowd — stopping for a few selfies along the way — toward the Heavener Football Complex to begin a day full of first-day-on-the-job tasks, including an introductory press conference.

"Well, back to finals," one of the young men said as Napier passed.

Much like finals week for UF students, it's been whirlwind week for Napier since he was announced as Florida's head coach a week ago.

Napier concluded his four seasons as head coach at Louisiana Lafayette on Saturday, Dec. 4, with a 24-16 win over Appalachian State in the Sun Belt Conference Championship Game. He said he slept about six hours before packing up the family for the trip to Florida.

"We made a great memory there, so I slept a lot better after we took care of business," Napier said minutes after his first visit to the Gators' locker room. "It was a great week. I don't think we could have drawn up a better ending, just so happy for the players. Four years of work kind of culminated there at Cajun Field. To see them be rewarded was a pretty awesome experience."

Prior to Dec. 5, the 42-year-old Napier said the last time he touched down at UF was in 2011 as an offensive analyst for Alabama when the Crimson Tide rolled into town. While he took care of unfinished business at Louisiana and did not visit campus before accepting an offer from UF Athletic Director Scott Stricklin to take over the program, Napier has a past relationship with the Gators.

He can thank his late father, Bill Napier, for that.

The elder Napier was a longtime high school head coach in north Georgia and is the all-time winningest coach at Murray County High in Chatsworth, the same school Billy Napier played quarterback. Bill Napier started to root for the Gators in the early 1990s when Steve Spurrier was UF's head coach and found inspiration for his Murray County Indians from the Gators.

The memory brought a smile to Bill's son on Sunday. They used to watch Spurrier's Gators play on TV together when Billy was growing up. Bill Napier died in 2017 from Lou Gehrig's Disease.

"He was a big Spurrier, Gators fan," Billy said. "I grew up watching Danny Wuerffel, all the greats. It probably wouldn't be right for me to mention more and then miss a few. My dad actually was at the same school for 23 years. Eventually, he got the head coaching job and he changed the uniforms at the school to be exactly like Florida's."

"It's humbling. That's all I can say," he said. "I am just thankful. A lot of people contributed to me being here. This is certainly not about me. I just want everybody to know how humbled I am to have this opportunity to lead at the University of Florida. I look forward to taking great pride in representing this university, this community, all the people that came before me."

"I'm going to work and be relentless in our approach here. There's no question that we've got work to do and we look forward to the challenge."

Napier finished 40-12 at Louisiana and returns to the Southeastern Conference, where he spent a season as an Alabama offensive analyst in 2011 and then four seasons coaching receivers from 2013-16.

Napier's deep roots in the game include stints on both Clemson coach Dabo

Swinney's staff and five seasons overall under Nick Saban at Alabama. After multiple offers to leave Louisiana the past couple of seasons, Napier finally decided the time was right when the Gators called.

"I think it was time for the next challenge," he said. "I think it's a unique time at the University of Florida, relative to the investment the administration was willing to make. The great opportunity that we have moving into the new facility this summer, and the history and the tradition, the iconic players and coaches that have competed here. I think this is a unique place at a unique time and I'm looking forward to the challenge of leading here."

Billy Napier enters his first season with the Gators after being named the 29th head coach in program history on Nov. 28, 2021

In a short period of time since his arrival in Gainesville, Napier made an unprecedented impact on the Gators Football program. Within the first 60 days, he built a top-notch football staff—both on and off the field—and signed a recruiting class that ranked among the top 20 in the nation.

Louisiana (2018-21)

Napier spent four seasons at Louisiana-Lafayette and finished with a career record of 40-12, a perfect 16-0 mark against members of the Sun Belt West Division, four consecutive West Division titles, four straight bowl appearances, a share of the Sun Belt title in 2020 and 2021 Sun Belt Conference Champions.

A two-time Sun Belt Conference Coach of the Year (2019 & 2021), Napier took the Ragin' Cajuns to unprecedented heights when the team broke into the national rankings in 2020 for the first time in the modern era. The team finished the campaign ranked No. 15 in the AP Top-25, No. 16 in the USA Today/Amway Coaches Poll and No. 19 in the College Football Playoff, Louisiana's highest rankings in all three polls.

In 2021, he led the program to their first conference championship title since 2005 and only the second time in program history. Napier concluded his final season with a 12-1 record, the most single-season wins in school history after setting it with 11 in his second year. The 12 straight wins also set the program record for consecutive victories, as the previous record was eight in 1976.

Napier led Louisiana to its fourth straight Sun Belt Conference Championship game with a 24-16 victory over Appalachian State to finish with a career record of 28-7 against conference opponents. Louisiana became the first team in conference history to make all four conference championship games.

Napier's Louisiana team produced two 2022 NFL Draft picks in safety Percy Butler and tackle Max Mitchell, who were both drafted in the fourth round by the Washington Commanders and the New York Jets, respectively.

The 2020 Louisiana Sports Writer Association Coach of the Year, Napier navigated Louisiana through a season heavily impacted by COVID-19 and claimed a share of the Sun Belt

Conference Championship, its third-straight West Division title and its second-straight bowl victory, a 31-24 win over UTSA in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl. The Ragin' Cajuns also advanced to its third consecutive Sun Belt Championship game, but was canceled due to COVID-19.

Napier's team broke into the national rankings for the first time in the modern era following its week one upset at No. 23 Iowa State, marking the first win over a ranked opponent on the road and only the second time in program history. He concluded non-conference matchups at Louisiana with a record of 13-5, as three of the losses came against ranked opponents - No.1 Alabama, No. 16 Mississippi State and No. 19 Texas.

Both the offense and defense continued to flourish in 2020 under Napier's watch. Offensively, the team ranked 29th nationally in scoring offense (33.6) and 43rd nationally in total offense (421.5), while the defense ranked 31st in scoring defense (22.0) and 33rd in total defense (355.4).

Napier coached Louisiana to 14 Sun Belt All-Conference selections, led by First Team selections Elijah Mitchell and Chris Smith. Mitchell wrapped up his stellar career ranking fifth in career scoring (276), fifth in career rushing touchdowns (41) and sixth in career rushing yards (3,267) before being drafted in the sixth round by the San Francisco 49ers.

Smith additionally earned First Team All-America honors from CBS Sports/24/7 Sports, Pro Football Focus and Second Team All-America honors from the FWAA, marking the second consecutive season that a Ragin' Cajun earned All-America honors under Napier.

In just the second season (2019) under Napier, the program set the all-time single season victories (11) at the time and second-straight trip to the Sun Belt Championship Game after clinching the league's West Division title with a 53-3 victory over Troy. The 11 victories also marked the first double-digit win season in program history and the first of three consecutive 10-plus win years by Napier. He was voted the program's first Sun Belt Coach of the Year, becoming the third Louisiana coach to earn the distinction of top coach and the first since 1993 in their respective conference.

Napier coached three 2020 NFL Draft picks in Raymond Calais (RB), Kevin Dotson (G) and Robert Hunt (G), tying the

program record for draft selections in a year. Hunt became the third-highest pick in team history as he was selected 39th overall by the Miami Dolphins. A First Team All-American selection by the Associated Press, USA Today, Sports Illustrated, Pro Football Focus and a Second Team All-American by Sporting News, Dotson was drafted in the fourth round by the Pittsburgh Steelers. Calais was tabbed by the reigning Super Bowl Champions, Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the seventh round.

In Napier's first season at the helm, the Ragin' Cajuns (7-7, 5-3) won the 2018 Sun Belt Conference West Division Championship, advancing to the inaugural conference championship game. Louisiana accepted an invitation to the AutoNation Cure Bowl, its first bowl trip since 2016.

Arizona State (2017)

Prior to his stint at Louisiana, Napier was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Arizona State in 2017.

Napier guided the Sun Devils' offense to the 14th highest-graded offense in the FBS according to Pro Football Focus - including the 10th highest-graded passing attack in the nation. ASU was ranked 54th in the nation in total offense last season and 86th in the passing game the season prior. The offensive turnaround (+40 positions) was the eighth-largest in the FBS and ASU was one of just three programs to move from outside the Top-50 to inside of it in just one season. The 76-spot swing in the passing game rankings was the third highest in all of the FBS.

ASU developed one of the elite red zone scoring teams in the nation under Napier, tied for first nationally in converting on 95.83 percent of its red zone appearances (46-of-48) with the only two "blemishes" against the Sun Devils coming when the team took a knee late in the fourth quarter. ASU was 11th nationally in red zone touchdown scoring rate with 36 touchdowns on those 48 attempts (75.00).

Ball security was another notable facet of Napier's offense. The Sun Devils turned the ball over just 11 times in 2017, which ranked 12th nationally after finishing 82nd in the country a year ago with 21 turnovers.

Alabama (2011, 2013-16)

Napier's first experience in the SEC came at Alabama in 2011 and he later returned to Crimson Tide from 2013-17 as the wide receivers coach.

He was instrumental in helping Nick Saban and Alabama achieve a 63-7 record in five seasons (2011, 2013-2016), two National Championships (2011 & 2015) and was part of the great run of 26 consecutive wins from 2015-2016. In 70 games at Alabama, the Crimson Tide offense averaged 6.27 yards per play and 36.4 points per game. Napier coached three first round draft picks in Amari Cooper, Jerry Jeudy, Amari Cooper and Calvin Ridley while in Tuscaloosa.

In 2016, Napier's wide receiver corps were led by junior ArDarius Stewart, a third-round pick by the New York Jets in 2017 and Ridley. Stewart snagged in a team-leading eight touchdowns and 864 yards while Ridley totaled a team-high 72 receptions. Napier also helped develop wide outs Gehrig Dieter (Kansas City) and Cam Sims (Wash-

ington), both who were NFL free agent signees.

After recruiting Ridley to sign with the Crimson Tide, Napier coached him to a freshman-record and team-leading 89 catches for 1,045 yards and seven touchdowns in 2015 along with being named a USA Today Freshman All-American.

Napier played a vital role in Cooper's historical campaign in the 2014 season. He became Alabama's first Biletnikoff Award winner and caught a school- and SEC-record 124 passes for a UA-record 1,727 receiving yards and 16 touchdowns. Cooper led the country in receptions (124), was second nationally in receiving yards (1,727), receiving touchdowns (16) and catches per game (8.9) while ranking third in yards per game (123.4). A Heisman Trophy finalist and unanimous first team All-American, Cooper smashed all of the Tide's career receiving marks with 228 receptions, 3,463 yards and tied the SEC record with 31 receiving touchdowns.

In his first season as the Crimson Tide's receivers coach in 2013, Napier built a deep and talented group of wide outs. Alabama had four players with at least 32 receptions, led by Cooper's 45 catches for 736 yards.

The 2011 season marked the first year for Napier

on the Alabama staff as he served as an offensive analyst, helping the Crimson Tide win the 2011 BCS national championship. The Tide ranked 16th in scoring offense, 30th in total offense and 17th in rushing offense in 2011.

Colorado State (2012)

After a year at Alabama, Napier served as the assistant head coach and quarterbacks coach at Colorado State in 2012 for former Florida head coach Jim McElwain.

Injuries forced Napier to go deep down the bench looking for quarterbacks during his one season in Fort Collins. The Rams saw three quarterbacks play significant snaps as the starter with Garrett Grayson going down early in the season and M.J. McPeck followed two weeks later, forcing redshirt freshman Conner Smith into action. The trio combined to throw for 2,520 yards and 17 touchdowns in 2012 as Colorado State won three of its final five games.

Clemson (2003-04, 2006-10)

Before his first stretch at Alabama, Napier spent seven years in two different stints at Clemson. During Napier's final two seasons at Clemson he was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.





At the age of 29, he became the youngest coordinator in the nation and in Clemson history. In his first season as Clemson's coordinator, the 2009 Tigers scored a school-record 436 points and collected 54 touchdowns (third-most in school history), averaged 5.73 yards per play (fourth best) and finished as the ACC Atlantic Division champions. Quarterback Kyle Parker was named a Freshman All-American and nine players Napier coached from 2009-10 went on to have careers in the NFL.

He also served as Clemson's recruiting coordinator from 2006-08. In those three seasons, he compiled two top-25 recruiting classes, according to Rivals.com, and in 2008, his class was tabbed as the second-best in the nation by ESPN.com. Known to his peers as a top recruiter, Napier signed several players who went on to the NFL, including Kavell Conner, Crezdon Butler, Brandon Thompson and Marcus Gilchrist.

Napier was the 2007-08 tight ends coach at Clemson, helping lead the Tigers to two bowl games and a prolific offense.

The 2007 season featured a 9-4 record and the ACC's highest-scoring offense. In his first year back with Clemson (2006), Napier worked primarily with the Tigers' tight ends but also was responsible for the punt team and assisted in several special-teams capacities. The 2006 Tigers led the ACC in total offense, rushing and scoring offense, advancing to the Music City Bowl.

Clemson averaged 410.9 yards per game and

32.7 points, more than doubling its opponent's totals. Tight end Hunter Thomas started all 11 games for the Tigers, averaging 19.1 yards per reception. Michael Palmer, who Napier coached for three seasons, went on to the NFL. He also worked with the special teams units, helping develop the 2009 ACC Player of the Year and a unanimous All-American, C.J. Spiller.

He began his coaching career as an offensive graduate assistant at Clemson in 2003-04. The Tigers won nine games, including the Peach Bowl against Tennessee. The following season, Napier was a graduate assistant on defense, and gained his first experience with recruiting off the field.

Background

As a player, Napier was a four-year letterwinner and two-time All-Southern Conference selection as the starting quarterback at Furman. The Paladins won two conference championships and in 2001, Napier's junior year, advanced to the Division I-AA national championship game, losing to Montana.

He completed 64.8-percent of his career passes, setting a school record. As the team captain during a record-setting senior season, Napier amassed 2,475 passing yards, also a Furman record, and was a finalist for the Walter Payton Award, given annually to the nation's most outstanding FCS offensive player.

Napier grew up in Chatsworth, Georgia, and graduated from Murray County High School in

1998. He is married to the former Ali Gunn and the couple has a daughter, Annie, and sons, Sammy Nelson and Charlie. He earned his Bachelor's degree in health & exercise science from Furman in 2002.

ROB SALE

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR / OFFENSIVE LINE

Rob Sale enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's offensive coordinator/offensive line coach prior to the 2022 season.

Sale joined the Gators after serving as the New York Giants' offensive line coach in 2021.

A 14-year collegiate coaching veteran, Sale spent three seasons at Louisiana (2018-20) as the Ragin' Cajuns offensive coordinator and offensive line coach under Napier.

Sale's unit produced three NFL Draft picks out of Louisiana, including Robert Hunt and Kevin Dotson in 2020, and Max Mitchell in 2022.

In 2020, the Ragin' Cajuns offense ranked third in the Sun Belt Conference in points per game (33.6), fifth in yards per game (421.5), third in yards per play (6.3) and fourth in rushing yards per game (213.0).

In 2019, Sale's offense set numerous school records, including total yards (6,918), touchdowns (69), rushing yards (3,604), rushing touchdowns (42) and passing touchdowns (27).

In his first season coaching the Louisiana offense, three players rushed for more than 700 yards each. Trey Ragas logged 1,149 yards and nine touchdowns, Elijah Mitchell led the Sun Belt with 16 touchdowns and ran for 985 yards of his own, while Raymond Calais tallied 754 yards and seven scores.

Prior to Louisiana, Sale was the offensive line coach/running game coordinator at Arizona State in 2017, when the Sun Devils averaged 31.9 points, 427.6 total yards and 179.9 rushing yards a game.

In 2016, Sale served as the offensive line coach at the University of Louisiana Monroe. That season, the Warhawks ranked third in the Sun Belt with 181.3 rushing yards per game and allowed just 19 sacks.

Prior to ULM, Sale was the offensive line coach at Georgia in 2015, when the Bulldogs averaged 375 yards a game. The offensive line – led by All-SEC first-team offensive tackle John Theus – helped the team rush for more than 190 rushing yards per game.

Sale spent three seasons at McNeese State serving as the offensive line coach for the Cowboys from 2012-13 before being elevated to co-offensive coordinator in 2014. In his final season, the Cowboys offense averaged 32.4 points, 396.5 total yards and 221.9 rushing yards a game.

From 2007-11, Sale gained his first college coaching experience as a strength and conditioning assistant and offensive analyst at Alabama. He began his coaching career as the offensive line coach at Catholic High of Pointe Coupee in New Roads, La. in 2006.

Sale played in 35 games with 25 starts, including 13 at right guard as a senior in 2002, at LSU. As a junior, he started at both center and guard when the Tigers won the SEC title. During his sophomore season, he started the final five games of the regular season and the Peach Bowl at left guard.

Sale is a native of Monroe, La. He and his wife Amanda have two sons, Tripp and Briggs.

PATRICK TONEY

CO-DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR / SAFETIES

Patrick Toney enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's co-defensive coordinator/safeties coach.

Patrick Toney spent four seasons at the University of Louisiana on Napier's staff, where he served as the Ragin' Cajuns defensive coordinator (2020-21) in addition to coaching safeties (2018-2020) and outside linebackers (2021).

During his two seasons as defensive coordinator at Louisiana, Toney helped the Ragin' Cajun to two Sun Belt Championships.

In year one under Toney's guidance the Louisiana defense set the tone, ranking fourth in the Sun Belt and 31st nationally in scoring defense (22.0), while also ranking fourth in the league and 33rd nationally in total defense (355.4).

In 2021, Toney's defense finished first in the conference in scoring defense (18.3), and tied-for-ninth nationally, while ranking fourth in passing defense in the league (2,589).

During his time at Louisiana, Toney coached Percy Butler who was selected by the Washington Commanders in the fourth round of the 2022 NFL Draft.

Before arriving at Louisiana, Toney spent two seasons as the safeties coach at UTSA. In 2017, the Roadrunners' defense ranked seventh amongst FBS programs, allowing 287.8 yards per game. The team finished eighth in scoring defense (17.0 PPG), second in first downs defense (166) and 19th in pass efficiency defense (112.19).

In his first year in San Antonio, he helped lead the

Roadrunners to six wins and the program's first-ever bowl game in the 2016 Gildan New Mexico Bowl.

Prior to UTSA, Toney spent the 2015 season as the secondary coach at Sam Houston State, helping the Bearkats to an 11-4 record and a run to the semifinals of the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) playoffs.

Before joining Sam Houston State, Toney spent three seasons at Southeastern Louisiana. He was the safeties coach and special teams coordinator in 2014 after serving as a defensive assistant working with the secondary the previous two seasons.

During his time at Southeastern Louisiana, the Lions ranked first in the FCS in pass efficiency defense, second in interceptions, fifth in red zone defense, seventh in total defense and eighth in scoring defense.

His special teams topped the nation in kickoff return average, sixth in blocked kicks and 13th in kickoff return defense.

Toney coached two NFL Draft picks at Southeastern Louisiana, including Robert Alford (2013) and Harlan Miller (2016).

A native of Poway, Calif., Toney is a 2012 graduate of South Eastern Louisiana and is married to Courtney Toney.

SEAN SPENCER

CO-DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR / DEFENSIVE LINE

Sean Spencer enters his first season with the Gators after being named co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach prior to the 2022 season.

A veteran of more than 20 years at the collegiate and professional levels, Spencer joined the Gators after spending two seasons (2020-21) as the New York Giants defensive line coach.

Spencer made an immediate impact to the Giants defense during his first season in 2020. That year, the defensive front registered 40 sacks, the most sacks since the 2014 season when they tallied 47.

He worked with Leonard Williams, who doubled his stats in from 2019 to finish with 11.5 sacks the following season. Williams was named a Top-100 Player in the NFL entering the 2022 season, voted by his peers. He was also named NFC Defensive Player of the Week twice in 2020.

Under Spencer's guidance, the line helped the defense rank 12th in the NFL, allowing 349.3 yards per game in 2020. It was their best defensive finish since 2016, when they were 10th in the league by allowing 339.7 yards per game. The Giants' rushing defense ranked 10th, allowing 111.4 yards per game, also their best figures since 2016 when they were tied for third at 88.6 rushing yards per game.

Prior to the Giants, Spencer spent six seasons (2014-19) at Penn State, where he was also associate head coach and run game coordinator his final two years (2018-19).

The Nittany Lions' line was traditionally one of the best in the nation under Spencer. In 2019, Penn State had 45 sacks, the seventh-highest total in the country and third-highest in the Big Ten. It was Penn State's fifth consecutive season with at least 40 sacks, the first such streak for the Nittany Lions since team sacks were recorded in 1988.

That season, Spencer's linemen were also significant contributors to Penn State's run defense, which finished first in the nation by allowing only 2.6 yards per carry. The Nittany Lions also finished fifth in the country and first in the conference in yards per game with 95.0 in 2019.

In 2015 and 2018, Penn State led the nation in sacks, first with 50 and then with 47. Additionally, the Nittany Lions ranked fourth in the country with 8.2 tackles for loss a game in 2018. That year, the defense was a frequent fixture in the opposition's backfield, leading the country in sacks (3.62) for the second time in four years and ranking fourth in tackles for loss (8.2).

In 2017, the line helped the defense finish in the top 25 in FBS in scoring defense (7th; 16.5), sacks (7th; 3.23), rushing defense (14th; 118.0), total defense (17th; 329.5), takeaways (23rd; 25) and tackles for loss (25th; 7.2).

The line played a pivotal role in Penn State's Big Ten Championship run in 2016, when the defense finished seventh in FBS in tackles for loss (8.1) and 19th in sacks (2.86).

In 2015, the defensive line not only paced a unit that led the FBS in sacks (3.54 a game) but was sixth in tackles for loss (8.2) and 14th in total defense (324.5).

Spencer led a unit that in 2014 helped Penn State finish third in the FBS rushing defense (100.5) and second in total defense (278.7).

Prior to Penn State, Spence spent three seasons (2011-13) at Vanderbilt. During his tenure, the defensive lines helped the Commodores finish in the top 25 in the nation in total defense all three years. Vanderbilt recorded 28, 31 and 28 sacks under Spencer, with the defensive line posting 42.5 tackles for loss in 2013.

Spencer coached the Bowling Green defensive line in 2009-10 and had two stints at Massachusetts, also coaching the defensive front in 2001-03 and in 2007-08. He also has coached at Hofstra (2006), Villanova (2005), Holy Cross (2004), Trinity College (1998-2000), Shippensburg (1996-97) and Wesleyan (1995).

Spencer was a three-year starter at safety at Clarion (Pa.) University where he earned a bachelor's degree in political science in 1995.

Spencer is a native of Hartford, Conn. He and his wife Allyson have a daughter, Alysia.

JABBAR JULUKE

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH - OFFENSE / RUNNING BACKS

Jabbar Juluke enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's associate head coach - offense/running backs.

Juluke spent the last four years (2018-21) on Head Coach Billy Napier's staff at Louisiana, which included four straight Sun Belt West Division titles, a share of the Sun Belt title in 2020 and 2021 Sun Belt Conference Championship.

Juluke coached two running backs that were drafted in back-to-back years (2020-21). Eli Mitchel by the San Francisco 49ers and Raymond Calais by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Mitchel was named First Team All-Sun Belt in 2020 and led Louisiana in rushing, with 141 carries for 878 yards and eight touchdowns. His yardage total was third in the league and 23rd nationally, while his eight rushing scores were the fifth most in the Sun Belt and tied for 41st nationally. Mitchel finished his career ranked fifth in career rushing touchdowns (41) and sixth in career rushing yards (3,267) and set the program record for most rushing yards in a bowl game after tallying 127 yards and a touchdown in the 2020 SERVPRO First Responder Bowl.

The 2019 FootballScoop Running Backs Coach of the Year, Juluke led the Ragin' Cajuns to its best rushing season in program history in 2019, setting school records in total rushing yards (3,604) and rushing touchdowns (42). Louisiana finished the season ranked third nationally in yards per rush (6.28), rushing touchdowns (42) and sixth in total rushing yards.

Prior to a season at Texas Tech (2017), he was the running backs coach at LSU in 2016. Juluke tutored one of the nations top running backs

in Leonard Fournette who was the No. 5 overall selection in the 2017 NFL Draft. He also worked with Derrius Guice that season, pushing the sophomore to 1,428 yards and 11 touchdowns while being named to the All-SEC First Team with Fournette.

He began his collegiate coaching career at Louisiana Tech, where he spent two seasons (2014-15) as the running backs coach. Juluke helped the Bulldogs win the Conference USA West Division title in 2014. He also heavily involved in recurring efforts and helped land three 2017 NFL Draft picks in wide receivers Carlos Henderson (Denver Broncos), Trent Tylor (San Francisco 49ers) and safety Xavier Woods (Dallas Cowboys).

Juluke arrived at Louisiana Tech following nine years as the head coach at Edna Karr High School in New Orleans. Juluke was regarded as one of Louisiana's top high school coaches during that time as he compiled an 80-39 record that was capped by a perfect 14-0 mark and a Class 4A state title in 2012.

Juluke guided Edna Karr to seven district titles and two state runner-up finishes during his tenure. He boasted a 49-8 record over his final four seasons alone which featured three appearances in the state championship game. Most impressively, Juluke helped over 70 of his players earn college football scholarships during his head coaching career. Prior to his stint at Edna Karr, Juluke served as the defensive back coach and special teams coordinator at O.P. Walker High school for one sea-

son (2002). Juluke coached linebackers at St. Augustine High School in 2000 and 2001 after serving as the wide receivers coach for Brother Martin High School in 1999.

Juluke began his coaching career as the defensive coordinator for Frederick Douglas High School from 1996-98.

As a player, Juluke helped guide Southern University to an 11-1 record and a Black National Championship in 1993. In addition to his time as a standout safety for the Jaguars, Juluke also lettered one season with the men's basketball program during the 1994-95 campaign. He earned his bachelor's degree in sociology from Southern in 1999.

Juluke is a native of New Orleans. He and his wife, Denise, are parents to three children – Jahmad, Jamari and Dyrius Smith.

COREY RAYMOND

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH - DEFENSE / CORNERBACKS

Corey Raymond enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's assistant head coach - defense/cornerbacks.

Corey Raymond, who played six years in the NFL, spent 10 seasons at LSU where he coached defensive backs (2012-17) and cornerbacks (2018-21) prior to Florida.

Raymond's secondary produced seven first team All-Americans during his time at LSU, and a Jim Thorpe Award winner in Grant Delpit in 2019.

Under Raymond, 15 Tigers were picked in the NFL Draft, including four first rounders – Derek Stingley Jr. (2022), Jamal Adams and Tre'Davious White (2017), and Eric Reid (2013), along with five second round picks that include Grant Delpit (2020), Kristen Fulton (2020), Donte Jackson (2019), Greedy Williams (2018) and Jalen Collins (2015).

In 2020, LSU ranked No. 2 in the SEC in interceptions with 13 with true freshman Eli Ricks ranking No. 2 in the conference with four to his credit.

During LSU's national championship season in 2019, Stingley Jr. led the SEC in interceptions with six and earned SEC Newcomer of the Year honors to go with his first team All-America awards.

In 2019, the Tigers, for the second straight season, led the SEC in interceptions with 17 and LSU ranked No. 2 in the league in pass efficiency defense, allowing opponents to complete just 50.7 percent of its passes – the best percentage in the league.

In 2018, LSU led the SEC interceptions with 17 and ranked second in the league in pass defense efficiency in that year.

In 2017, LSU allowed only 11 passing touchdowns, which was the second-lowest total in the SEC, and the Tigers were No. 2 in the league in pass efficiency defense.

In 2016, Raymond's secondary allowed only nine passing touchdowns all season and ranked No. 3 in the Southeastern Conference in yards per game at 197.2.

LSU's 2015 secondary featured Jalen Mills, a first team All-America selection. Mills was joined in the secondary by White and Adams, who were both second team All-

SEC selections. Adams led all Tiger defensive backs with 67 tackles and four interceptions.

In 2014, LSU's secondary led the SEC in total defense (316.8 yards per game), pass defense (164.2 yards per game) and pass efficiency defense (101.6 rating). LSU allowed an SEC-best 10 passing touchdowns in that year.

LSU ranked No. 4 in the SEC in pass defense in 2013, allowing 197.5 yards per game. The Tigers limited opponents to 15 touchdown passes and ranked second in the league in yards allowed per attempt (6.4) and third in the conference in completion percentage at 56.0 percent.

In his first year back with the Tigers in 2012, Raymond coached safety Reid to first team All-America honors, and who was later chosen No. 18 overall in the NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers. Meanwhile, cornerback Tharold Simon was picked in the fifth round by the Seattle Seahawks.

As a unit in 2012, LSU's secondary combined for 15 interceptions and helped the Tigers rank No. 11 nationally in pass efficiency defense.

Raymond spent 2011 season as the secondary coach at Nebraska. In his one season with the Cornhuskers, Raymond coached a Nebraska secondary that featured the 2011 Big Ten Defensive Back of the Year in Alfonzo Dennard. Raymond's secondary helped Nebraska rank No. 18 in the nation in pass defense in 2011.

Prior to Nebraska, Raymond served as the cornerbacks coach for two seasons at Utah State. Raymond coached Curtis Marsh, who earned All-WAC honors and later went on to become a third-round pick in the NFL Draft.

Raymond served on the LSU staff for three years from 2006-08 before taking the job at Utah State.

During his three years on the LSU staff from 2006-08, Raymond was part of two BCS bowl victories, including a 38-24 win over Ohio State in the BCS National Championship. LSU's defense ranked No. 3 nationally in both 2006 and 2007 as the Tigers combined to post a 23-4 record during that span.

Prior to joining the LSU staff in 2006, Raymond coached at the high school level for three years in his hometown of New Iberia. Raymond was the defensive coordinator at New Iberia High School in 2003 and then held the same position at Westgate High School in 2004-05.

Raymond was a three-year starter in the secondary for the Tigers from 1989-91. He capped his LSU career with 185 tackles and eight interceptions. Following his career with the Tigers, Raymond spent six seasons in the NFL – three with the New York Giants and three with the Detroit Lions. In 90 games in the NFL, Raymond started 60 times and intercepted 11 passes to go with 258 tackles.

Raymond, who earned his undergraduate degree from LSU in 1993, is a native of New Iberia, La. He has four children – Cody, Ariel, Christopher and Madison.

JAY BATEMAN

INSIDE LINEBACKERS

Jay Bateman enters his first season with the Gators after being hired at as an assistant, coaching the inside linebackers.

A 24-year coaching veteran, Bateman arrived in Gainesville after spending three seasons as North Carolina's co-defensive coordinator and safeties coach (2019-21).

Upon his arrival in Carolina in 2019, Bateman helped engineer major improvements in the Tar Heel defense, which was one of the nation's top five most improved units in total defense, scoring defense and rushing defense that year.

Bateman's aggressive style was evident in the 36 sacks the team produced in 2020, the most for a Carolina defense since 2000 and tied for fifth nationally. The scoring defense, total defense and rushing defense all ranked in the Top 35 nationally of teams that played at least 10 games that season. The unit produced a first-team All-America in linebacker Chazz Surratt.

During his time with the Tar Heels, Bateman helped develop two NFL Draft picks, including Surratt who was picked in the third round by the Minnesota Vikings in 2021, along with Jason Strowbridge who was selected in the fifth round by the Miami Dolphins in 2020.

Prior to UNC, Bateman spent five seasons (2014-18) as Army's defensive coordinator.

Army won 29 games during Bateman's tenure, including three bowl games during his last three seasons, which included two Top-10 finishes in total defense. Bateman was one of five finalists for the 2018 Broyles Award and a semifinalist in 2016.

In 2018, Bateman led Army's defense to finish eighth nationally in total defense (295.5 ypg) and 10th in scoring defense (17.7 ppg).

The Black Knights finished third in the nation in red zone defense and 14th in passing defense in 2017.

In 2016, Bateman guided a defense that ranked fourth nationally in total defense (291.5 ypg), sixth in passing defense (170.2 ypg) and 18th in rushing defense (121.2 ypg). The Army defensive unit also ranked 16th in scoring defense, allowing 19 points per game, while increasing its interception total from six in 2015 to 17 in 2016.

Prior to Army, Bateman spent three seasons as the defensive coordinator at Ball State (2011-13). His 2013 defensive unit ranked ninth nationally in turnovers gained with 31 and 12th in turnover margin at +0.9.

Bateman's defensive unit at Ball State produced an NFL Draft selection in Jonathan Newsome, who was selected in the fifth round by the Indianapolis Colts in 2015.

Bateman spent five seasons as the defensive

coordinator and linebackers coach at Elon (2006-10) prior to Ball State. At Elon, Bateman coached Chad Nkang who was drafted by the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2007.

He also made stops at Lehigh (2005) and Richmond (2004). Bateman gained head-coaching experience at Siena College. He led the program from 2000-03 after spending one season as an assistant coach on staff.

Bateman began his coaching career in 1997, spending two years on staff at Hampden-Sydney. Bateman is a 1995 graduate of Randolph-Macon.

Bateman is a native of Richmond, Va. He and his wife Heather have two children, Bea and CJ.

KEARY COLBERT

WIDE RECEIVERS

Keary Colbert enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's assistant coach / wide receivers prior to the 2022 season.

Colbert arrived in The Swamp after spending the previous six seasons at his alma mater, USC, in roles of offensive analyst (2016-17), tight ends (2018) and wide receivers coach (2019-21).

He coached five NFL draft picks on the offensive side of the ball, including Drake London, Jordan Cameron, Michael Pittman Jr, Amon Ra St. Brown and Robert Davis.

He developed Pittman Jr. into finishing top-20 nationally in receptions, receiving yards and receiving touchdowns while being a finalist for the Biletnikoff and Witten awards in 2019.

During the 2021 NFL season, St. Brown locked up the all-time Detroit Lion's record for rookie receiving yards with 912 yards, while also notching a team-leading 5 touchdowns.

Meanwhile, Pittman led the Colts in receiving yards and receiving touchdowns and receiving touchdowns during the 2021 regular season. He was also named a NFL Pro Bowl Alternate.

Colbert worked with Florida Head Coach Billy Napier from 2014-15 as an offensive analyst at Alabama when the Tide won the National Championship in 2015 and went a combined 26-3.

Prior to his stint with Alabama, he was the wide receivers coach at Georgia State in 2013 and worked with Albert Wilson to a 1,000 yard pass

catcher that year. Colbert arrived at GSU after serving as volunteer coach (2012) at Pace Academy in Atlanta.

A four-year starter at wide receiver at USC, he broke the program all-time receptions record (207) while gaining 2,964 receiving yards and 19 touchdown passes in his career.

Colbert was a team captain his senior year when the Trojans captured the 2003 National Championship and was a two-time All Pac-10 second-team selection (2002-03).

Colbert was drafted in the second round of the 2004 NFL draft by the Carolina Panthers and spent four seasons (2004-07) in Carolina where he set rookie season records for receptions (47), receiving yards (754) and receiving touchdowns (5). He also spent time with the Denver Broncos (2008), Seattle Seahawks (2008), Detroit Lions (2008-09) and Kansas City Chiefs (2011).

He started his coaching career with the USC staff in 2010 as a graduate assistant working with the tight ends.

An Oxnard, Calif., native, Colbert received his bachelor's degree in sociology from USC in 2006.

He and his wife, Safiya, have two sons; Kaden and Khari.

WILLIAM PEAGLER

TIGHT ENDS

William Peagler enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's tight ends coach prior to the 2022 season.

Peagler arrives in Gainesville after spending two seasons as Michigan State's running backs coach, helping the Spartans finish the 2021 regular season with a 10-2 record and reach their third New Year's Six Bowl. Peagler and MSU defeated Pittsburgh in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl on Dec. 30 with a score of 31-21.

Peagler was awarded the 2021 FootballScoop Running Backs Coach of the Year, after coaching running back Kenneth Walker III to the Doak Walker award. Walker III is the first Spartan to win the award after rushing for 1,636 yards and 18 touchdowns on 263 carries.

During his time at Michigan State, Peagler coached Kenneth Walker III who was selected by the Seattle Seahawks in the second round of the 2022 NFL Draft.

Prior to Michigan State, Peagler was the director of quality control for the offense in 2019 at Colorado.

Peagler spent the 2018 season as Louisiana's director of player personnel and quality control coordinator, helping the Ragin' Cajuns recruit the No. 1 class in the Sun Belt Conference that year.

Prior to Louisiana, he served as a graduate assistant at Georgia during the Bulldogs' run to the College Football Playoff National Championship in 2017. Peagler worked with NFL first-rounder Isaiah Wynn, who earned first-team All-SEC honors as an offensive tackle that year.

In Athens, Peagler was also part of the staff that signed the nation's consensus top recruiting class for 2018.

Peagler spent the 2016 season at Minnesota, where he served as an assistant in quality control for the offense. Prior to that, he was the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Olive Branch High School in Mississippi in 2015, and the run game coordinator and recruiting coordinator at Coffeyville Community College in 2014.

Peagler spent the 2011-13 seasons at Louisiana. He initially joined the Ragin' Cajuns staff as an offensive quality control assistant and then was an offensive graduate assistant coach in his final two years there. UL won the New Orleans Bowl all three seasons he was on the staff.

A 2010 Clemson graduate, Peagler began his coaching career as student assistant for the Tigers from 2006-09 and later as the tight ends coach at Valdosta State for the 2010 season.

Peagler is a native of Santee, S.C.

MIKE PETERSON

OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS / ALUMNI LIAISON

Mike Peterson enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's outside linebackers coach/alumni liaison prior to the 2022 season.

Peterson spent the six previous seasons (2016-21) at South Carolina as an outside linebackers / defensive ends coach.

During his time with the Gamecocks, Peterson developed two NFL Draft picks in Kingsley Enagbare (fifth round, 2022) and D.J. Wonnum (fourth round, 2020).

In 2020, he coached Enagbare to a first-team All-SEC selection and the conference leader in sacks and forced fumbles.

While under Peterson's tutelage, Wonnum wrapped up his Gamecock career ranked ninth with 29.5 tackles for loss. He was a second-team All-SEC selection in 2019.

Peterson is credited with the development of Bryson Allen-Williams, who logged 10 tackles for loss in 2018 despite playing in just nine games, and finished his career 10th on the school's all-time list with 27.5 tackles for loss.

In 2017, Peterson was instrumental in the development of Wonnum, who ranked tied for seventh in the SEC in tackles for loss with 13.0, while leading the team with 6.0 sacks.

With Peterson's mentoring, Darius English turned in his finest season in South Carolina in 2016, garnering 9.0 sacks to move him into both the single-season and career (15.0) sacks top-10 lists in school history while earning second-team All-SEC accolades.

A member of the Florida 1996 National Championship team, he played linebacker for Steve Spurrier from 1995-98. His senior year, he served as a team captain and earned First-Team All-SEC and All-America honors. Peterson was inducted into the University of Florida Athletic Hall of Fame in 2011.

He was selected in the second-round (36th pick overall) in the 1999 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts. Peterson earned second-team All-Pro honors in 2005 and finished his career with 883 tackles, 21.5 sacks and 19 interceptions in 196 career games. A graduate of Santa Fe High School, he played 14 years in the NFL with the Colts (1999-02), Jacksonville Jaguars (2003-08) and Atlanta Falcons (2009-12).

After retiring from the NFL, he returned to Florida in 2013 where he finished his degree while working as undergraduate assistant coach on the strength and conditioning staff. Upon graduation, he was named to a full-time position as a strength and condition coordinator.

Peterson and his wife established the Mike Peterson Foundation in 2004. The foundation was

constituted in an attempt to support and benefit under-served youth and socio-economically challenged families in Peterson's hometown of Alachua and his NFL cities of Jacksonville and Atlanta.

Since its inception, the Mike Peterson Foundation has already served over 50,000 youth and families through several community events and programs, most notably the Top Dog Readers Club literacy program at the Grove Park Elementary School in Atlanta.

A Gainesville native, Peterson attended Santa Fe High School in Alachua.

Peterson and his wife, Chantal, have two sons; Mike Jr. and Gavin.

Peterson is the older brother of former Chicago Bears running back Adrian Peterson.

DARNELL STAPLETON

OFFENSIVE LINE

Darnell Stapleton enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's assistant coach/offensive line.

Stapleton joined the Gators staff after spending the 2021 the season with Napier at Louisiana, where he helped the Ragin' Cajuns to a Sun Belt Conference championship.

Stapleton's unit blocked for 2021 Sun Belt Conference Championship Game MVP Levi Lewis, who compiled 2,646 yards of passing, the second-best in the league, threw the third-most touchdowns in the conference (19) and ranked fifth with 203.5 passing yards per game through 13 games.

On the ground, Louisiana's offensive line helped the Ragin' Cajuns to 31 rushing touchdowns and 2,496 rushing yards, ranking 14th and 24th respectively in the nation, while placing second and third in the conference in 13 games.

Prior to Louisiana, Stapleton spent four seasons at Sam Houston State, where he was the offensive line coach and the run game coordinator from 2017-20. In 2019, the Bearkat offensive line produced a pair of All-Southland Conference selections in first teamer Colby Thomas and third teamer Tyler Edwards, who help running back Donovan Williams finish second in the Southland in rushing with 925 yards and 14 touchdowns.

From 2014-17, he served at the offensive line coach at Bucknell University.

In 2016, Stapleton coached Julián Davenport, who captured First Team All-America honors from the Associated Press, American Football Coaches Association, Walter Camp Foundation and STATS. Also a four-time All-Patriot League selection, Davenport became Bucknell's first NFL Draft pick since 1969 when he was taken in the fourth round by the Houston Texans.

The offensive line coach at Pace University for six months prior to joining the Bucknell staff, Stapleton completed two years as a graduate assistant at Rutgers, working closely with an offensive line that ranked in the top 10 nationally in fewest sacks allowed in 2012. The Scarlet Knights went to two bowl games during Stapleton's tenure, which also included a Big East title.

Stapleton joined the Rutgers program in 2005 after two playing years at Hudson Valley Community College. He started all 25 games at center during his two years at Rutgers, earning recognition as a finalist for the Rimington Trophy as a senior. Stapleton anchored an offensive line that blocked for future NFL Pro Bowl running back Ray Rice.

Stapleton graduated from Rutgers in 2007 with a degree in business and labor relations.

Stapleton was a member of the Pittsburgh Steelers from 2007 to 2010 and was on the squad that won Super Bowl XLIII at the conclusion of the 2008 campaign. He started 18 games on the offensive line during his time in Pittsburgh, includ-

ing the Super Bowl. Overall, he played in 26 career games with the Steelers.

Stapleton's coaching career started in 2011 with the New York Sharks, a women's professional football team. He followed that stint with one season coaching both the offensive and defensive lines at Montclair Kimberly Academy. The squad posted a 9-2 mark, surpassing the program record for wins by three.

Stapleton has coached two NFL Draft selections in Max Mitchell (2022, Louisiana) and Julien Davenport (2017, Bucknell).

Stapleton is a native of Union Township, NJ.

Mark Hocke enters his first season with the Gators after being hired as Florida's Associate Head Coach/Director of Football Strength and Conditioning ahead of the 2022 season.

Hocke (Pronounced: "Hockey") spent all four seasons (2018-21) at Louisiana with Napier, which included four straight Sun Belt West Division titles, a share of the Sun Belt title in 2020 and 2021 Sun Belt Conference Champions.

Prior to Louisiana, Hocke spent the 2017 season at Texas A&M where he served as the Football Strength and Conditioning.

Prior to Texas A&M, Hocke spent one season as the co-associate head football strength and conditioning coach at Florida State where he served under head football coach Jimbo Fisher and strength coach Vic Vilorio. The Seminoles won the final five games of the 2016 season on their way to a 10-3 record that included a 33-32 win over Michigan in the Orange Bowl.

He also served as the head strength and conditioning coach at the University of Georgia in 2015, where he directed a 15-person staff that trained a pair of All-SEC honorees in offensive lineman as the Bulldogs finished the year with a 10-3 record, which included a win over Penn State in the Gator Bowl.

Hocke began his collegiate coaching career at the University of Alabama in 2009 spending six seasons on head coach Nick Saban's staff and was with Napier in Tuscaloosa during the 2011 and 2014-15 seasons.

He helped coach three teams that won BCS National Championships (2009, 2012, 2013) and trained over 35 players that signed NFL contracts, including 10 first-round NFL Draft picks.

The New Orleans native also headed the off-season Player Leadership Council.

Overall, Hocke has worked with more the 60 players who have been selected in the NFL Draft including top-five picks Julio Jones (2011 NFL Draft), Trent Richardson (2012 NFL Draft) and Amari Cooper (2015 NFL Draft).

Hocke's first coaching job was at Jesuit High School in New Orleans, La., where he served as a position coach (wide receivers, running backs and defensive backs) and oversaw the team's strength and conditioning from 2003-2008. His certifications include CSCCC Certified, FMS Screen Certified as well as USA Weightlifting

Level 1 Sports Performance Coach Certified.

Hocke is a native of New Orleans. He and his wife Katherine have two children, Palmer and Hartman.

WHAT HAPPENED: Senior linebacker Amari Burney's diving interception of red-hot Cameron Rising's pass into the end zone with just 17 seconds remaining preserved a pulsating victory for the host Gators over the seventh-ranked Utes in what was a classic of a 2022 season opener Saturday night at Spurrier/Florida Field. The game marked the debut of Coach Billy Napier, who became the first coach in UF history to knock off a ranked opponent in his first game with the Gators. It wasn't easy, but against the defending Pac-12 champion Utes it wasn't supposed to be, either. Florida had to come from behind four times and had the will, firepower and weapon to do it behind sophomore quarterback Anthony Richardson. The 6-foot-4, 235-pound Richardson lived up to his preseason Heisman Trophy hype by passing for 168 yards and rushing for 106 and a career-best three touchdowns, including the go-ahead score with 1:25 to go that capped a clutch and poised drive of 14 plays and 75 yards over 4:57. He gave the Gators their three-point margin, but still left plenty of time for Rising, a junior and veteran, to give his team a chance. And he did. Rising (216 yards and 1 TD passing, 115 yards and 1 TD rushing) moved the Utes from their 25, with the big play his 29-yard run to the UF 19 on third-and-7. Three plays later, Rising faced a second-and-goal from the 6 and looked to force a low throw into traffic. Burney was part of that traffic and took a nose dive to cradle the ball, secure the victory and send the "Swamp" into hysterics. Richardson scored on runs of 2, 45 and the game-winning 2 yards. The Gators also got 76 yards and a touchdown from tailback Montrell Johnson, the sophomore who came to UF with Napier from the University of Louisiana. Johnson more than made up for an opening-drive fumble (his team's only turnover of the night) that set up a Utah touchdown and early 7-0 lead. From there, the game became a back-and-forth affair with seven lead changes. Both teams finished with well over 400 yards of total offense, with Utah getting 115 yards and a score from tailback Tavion Thomas and nine catches for 105 yards and a score from tight end Brant Kuithe. Of Florida's 451 total yards, 283 came on the ground, while the Gators converted seven of 13 third downs and scored touchdowns on all three red zone possessions.

WHAT IT MEANS: Napier went 40-12 and won the 2021 Sun Belt Conference championship at Louisiana. He inherited a team that went 6-7 last season, but now has expectations after beating a ranked opponent in an opener for only the third time program history and for the first time since 1982. Meanwhile, the Gators extended their FBS-record streak of season-opening home wins to 33, but it's who they beat that made the feat all the more impressive and almost certainly will vault UF into next week's Associated Press Top 25 just in time for another big-time challenge that will have bigger-picture ramifications in the Southeastern Conference.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: The 2022 Gators were always going to be about Richardson and nothing occurred Saturday night to think otherwise. He had some fabulous moments (without a turnover, no less) and will have plenty more, as the UF coaching staff continues to open things up for him and let him play.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: The highest-ranked team Florida had ever defeated in an opener was No. 7 in Houston back in 1969 (the first year of Reaves-to-Alvarez). Openers over the last 30-plus years had been against overmatched directional schools. As for a showdown like this one, basically 53 years in the making, ask the largest opening-day crowd (90,799) in Florida history of it was worth the wait.

UP NEXT: The Gators (1-0) will ride this high into next week's start to the SEC schedule when Eastern Division foe and 20th-ranked Kentucky (1-0), which handled Miami-Ohio 37-13 in its opener, rolls into town. The Wildcats, under Coach Mark Stoops, return a boatload of players from the program's second 10-win team over the last four seasons, which happen to be UK's only double-digit victory campaigns of the last 44 years. Kentucky has beaten UF two of the last four meetings, including last year's 20-13 win at Lexington, after losing 31 straight in the series from 1987-2017. The 1-2 start to the Florida season very likely is the most difficult first two games for any team in FBS classification.

WHAT HAPPENED: Cornerback Keidron Smith returned an Anthony Richardson third-quarter interception 65 yards for the go-ahead score and Matt Ruffolo kicked a 26-yard game-sealing field goal with 1:25 to play, as the 20th-ranked Wildcats manhandled the 12th-ranked Gators on both sides of the ball in the second half on the way to their victory Saturday night in the Southeastern Conference opener for both teams at Spurrier/Florida Field. UK quarterback Will Levis passed for 202 yards and accounted for a touchdown each rushing and passing. Tailback Kavosiey Smoke had 14 carries for 80 yards and wide receiver Dane Key caught three passes for 83 yards and a score, including a 55-yarder in the first half. Richardson, the hero in last week's upset of seventh-ranked Utah, struggled all night against the UK defense, finishing with just 14 completions on 35 attempts for 143 yards, no touchdowns and two interceptions. The Wildcats also bottled up Richardson's threat to run, limiting him to just four yards on six carries. They dared "AR" to beat them and he had no answers, as the Gators finished with only 279 yards of total offense, just 91 after halftime, and went 4-for-16 on third. The Gators had a 16-7 first-half lead, thanks to a couple of Adam Mihalek field goals, a Trevor Etienne touchdown run and two-point conversion catch, plus a safety on a bad snap on a UK punt attempt. The Wildcats, though, cut the margin to 16-13 at the half after turning a Richardson interception into a 2-yard TD run by Levis. UK tied the game on a short field goal from Ruffolo in the third quarter, then took the lead on Smith's interception with 3:25 to play in the period. After the pick-6, the Gators had three possessions to make up for the miscue and tie the game, but those three possessions ended with a punt and back-to-back surrenders on downs.

WHAT IT MEANS: It's tough to start the conference season with a defeat, and it's even worse against a division opponent. After that record run of 31 straight losses in the series, the Wildcats have defeated the Gators three of the last five. Didn't take long for the euphoria of that season-opening upset of the Utes last week to give way to reality, what with Kentucky a near-unanimous preseason pick to finish second in the SEC East. The Gators (and their QB) have lots of work to do.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Levis ran away with his QB duel against Richardson, but it was the Kentucky defense, which repeatedly thwarted and confused Richardson, that decided the game.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: Kentucky has now beaten Florida in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 1976-77. That would be 45 years. On the other sideline, Kentucky coach Mark Stoops won his 61st game with the Wildcats, breaking the previous program record held by the legendary Paul "Bear" Bryant.

UP NEXT: The Gators (1-1, 0-1) will step out of league play with a third straight home game, this one against South Florida (1-1, 0-0), as part of the two-for-one home-and-home-and-home series arrangement (UF played at USF in '21). The Bulls, from the American Athletic Conference, opened their season by getting blasted at home, 50-21, by No. 25 Brigham Young, but handled FCS opponent Howard 42-20 Saturday night in Tampa. The game will mark the third meeting between Florida and USF.

WHAT HAPPENED: USF kicker Spencer Shrader missed a 49-yard field goal with 23 seconds left and the 18th-ranked Gators got out of Spurrier/Florida Field with a victory in a game Saturday night that easily could have gone the mega-underdog Bulls' way. The snap on the game-tying kick attempt from Bryce Bernard was just fine, but holder Andrew Beardall fumbled the exchange and Shrader didn't get a clean swing at the ball, which was wide to the right and short. It was the second fortuitous snap for Florida in three plays. Two snaps earlier, USF was at the UF 18 with 44 seconds to go — with a chance to win the game with a touchdown — but Bulls center Brad Cecil grounded a snap past quarterback Gerry Bohanon for a 14-yard loss that, eventually, made Shrader's field goal all the longer, all the more difficult. Florida survived despite two second-half interceptions by sophomore quarterback Anthony Richardson, the first leading to a South Florida touchdown (and two-point conversion) that cut the Gators' lead to just three, and the second coming on a throw into the end zone on a first-and-goal from the USF 5 and the home team trailing 28-24. The Bulls, though, gave the ball right back when Bohanon overthrew his intended receiver and defensive back Tre'Vez Johnson made a diving interception at the USF 28. Four Trevor Etienne runs later the Gators were in the end zone and leading 31-28 with 5:05 to play, setting up the final frantic drive. The Bulls came as 24-point underdogs and with just one win over an FBS team in 21 tries the last three seasons. They left having out-gained the Gators in total offense 402 yards to 329, including 286 on the ground, led by tailback Brian Battie's 17 carries, 150 yards and one score, plus another 102 on 15 carries and a score from Bohanon. Richardson had a second straight uneven game, finishing 10 of 18 for 112 yards, no touchdowns and the two interceptions, and only rushed seven times for 24 yards. UF, though, still ran for 217 yards and three scores, led by sophomore Montrell Johnson Jr.'s six carries and 103 yards. Florida twice trailed in the first half, but rallied back and even opened a 24-10 lead late in the second quarter after sophomore cornerback Jalen Kimber returned a Bohanon interception 39 yards for a score. The Bulls, though, scored the next 18 points, bridging the halves with a Shrader 49-yard field goal with 10 seconds to go and then capitalizing on a Richardson interception on UF's opening second-half possession. Linebacker Dwayne Boyles went 37 yards on the return to set up a six-yard scoring run by Bohanon that was followed by a two-point conversion that closed the UF lead to 24-21. The Gators, meanwhile, went without a first down on its first three possessions after intermission, which allowed the Bulls to surge in front with an 11-play, 51-yard drive finished off by a 1-yard run by tailback Michel Dukes for a 28-24 lead with 11:14 to go. Then came the crazy final 11-plus minutes.

WHAT IT MEANS: A second win. That's pretty much it. It certainly wasn't the confidence-building kind of night Richardson and the Gators needed after last week's home loss to Kentucky.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: It's clear, after Richardson's big night in the season-opening upset of then-No. 7 Utah, that defenses are not going to let the Florida quarterback beat them on the ground, so the Gators might as well lean on those three very talented tailbacks to eat up rushing yards. Johnson, the sophomore transfer who followed Coach Billy Napier from Louisiana, Etienne, the collegiate rookie, and Nay'Quan Wright, the redshirt sophomore coming off season-ending foot surgery, combined for 20 carries, 196 yards (that's 9.8 per attempt) and each scored a touchdown.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: The Gators have gone their first three games of the season without a touchdown pass (versus four interceptions). We'll get back to you on the last time that's happened. Actually, we'll get back to you when we find out the last time they went 12 consecutive quarters during any season without a touchdown pass.

UP NEXT: Florida (2-1) steps back into Southeastern Conference play next weekend with a trip to Knoxville, Tenn., where the Volunteers (3-0) will get their latest crack at trying to reverse a maddening series trend for the Rocky Top faithful. UF has won 16 of the previous 17 against UT, dating to the 2005 season, with the lone loss coming in 2016. The Vols, who last week won at No. 18 Pittsburgh, massacred Akron 63-6 Saturday night to stay unbeaten.

WHAT HAPPENED: Quarterback Hendon Hooker accounted for 501 of his team's 596 yards of total offense and the 11th-ranked Volunteers went up and down the field on the way to rolling past the Gators in their Southeastern Conference showdown Saturday in front of more 101,000 at Neyland Stadium. Hooker completed 22 of 28 passes for 349 yards and two touchdowns and rushed 13 times for 112 yards and another score, all the while bamboozling the Gators in operation of Coach Josh Heupel's breakneck-pace offense to near perfection. Hooker was great, but Florida's sophomore quarterback Anthony Richardson was really, really good on the way to the best game of his young career. Much maligned for his struggles the last two weeks, Richardson bounced back to complete 23 of 41 passes for a career-high 439 yards and his first two touchdowns of the season. Richardson, who became just the sixth QB in Florida history to throw for at least 400 yards in a SEC game, also rushed 17 times for 62 yards and two touchdowns, but the Gators' high-powered running game was held to just 141 yards as they basically were forced to play catch-up all day against a Tennessee offense that never punted and only stopped itself via two fumbles and a late give-away on downs while trying to run out the clock. The Vols scored touchdowns on four consecutive drives bridging the two halves, the first coming on a 99-yard march that culminated with a 2-yard Hooker-to-Bru McCoy go-ahead touchdown pass with seven seconds to go in the period that completely flipped the game's tenor and momentum in the home team's favor. The score made it 17-14, Vols, who got the second half kickoff and 73 yards to a touchdown and 21-14 lead. Then came drives of 62 and 87 yards drive (that latter after a killer Richardson fumble deep in UT territory), all in succession, to surge in front 38-21. A 5-yard scoring run by Florida's Montrell Johnson Jr. closed the margin to nine (A 2-point attempt failed), but after a failed onside kick the Vols ran clock before turning the ball over on downs with just 1:11 left. Richardson took UF 71 yards in seven plays, hitting Ricky Pearsall for a 3-yard score to make it 38-33 with 17 seconds to go. The Gators, who actually out-gained the Vols in total yards with 594, then recovered the ensuing onside kick and Richardson got the offense to the UT 39 for one last play. Under duress in the pocket, Richardson had a Vols defender grab his ankles, taking any zip he had to heave the ball into the end zone. Instead, the pass is well under-thrown and intercepted by defensive back Kamal Hadden as time expired.

WHAT IT MEANS: The Gators have to feel better about what Richardson was able to do in a wickedly hostile environment. That will be the positive takeaway. On the other side, the defense has a lot of work to do. Meanwhile, UF is winless through two games in SEC play and, for now, is tied with South Carolina at the bottom of the East Division standings. Tennessee snapped Florida's five-game winning streak in the series and won for just the second time since 2005 and just the ninth time dating to their 37 meetings since 1976. So, for at least the next 12 months, the Gators' mastery of the Vols will be in a pause.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Hooker certainly will surge into the Heisman Trophy conversation, as the Volunteers remained unbeaten, with an open date ahead to soak in all the feels before an Oct. 8 trip to LSU, followed by what likely will be the most hotly anticipated meeting with rival Alabama since Peyton Manning wore an Big Orange No. 16 jersey.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: UF is 0-2 in SEC play for the first time since 1986 when the on-probation Gators started their conference schedule with a 21-7 home loss against Alabama and 16-10 road defeat at Mississippi State.

UP NEXT: Florida (2-2) steps back out of conference with a home game against Eastern Washington (2-2) for a Saturday noon game. The Eagles lost 50-31 at home against Buffalo on Saturday and were obliterated 70-14 two weeks ago at Oregon in their only crack against an FBS opponent this season.

WHAT HAPPENED: Sophomore quarterback Anthony Richardson passed for 240 yards and two scores in not quite three quarters of work and wide receiver Ricky Pearsall had a 76-yard touchdown run on an end-around to highlight the demo job done by the Gators on Sunday against the FCS-classified Eagles in a game that was pushed back 24 hours due to the threat last week of Hurricane Ian. Backup redshirt freshman quarterback Jalen Kitna, in his first collegiate action, had a hand in a trio of touchdown drives and also threw the first TD pass of his career. The Eagles, out of the Big Sky Conference, took the opening kickoff and marched to a 44-yard field goal from Seth Harrison and 3-0 lead not quite six minutes into the game. The Gators, though, answered instantly with Richardson dropping a 75-yard touchdown bomb to Justin Shorter on their first play from scrimmage. That started a run of 52 unanswered points for the home team, their most to date in five games under Coach Billy Napier. For the afternoon, Florida totaled 666 yards of offense, which tied for the seventh-most in program history, versus EWU's 411. Richardson, who exited the game for a half-dozen plays in the second quarter after an awkward-landing pass attempt, hit eight of his 10 throws and also had an interception on a deep ball thrown into double coverage. Kitna finished 8-for-12 for 152 yards, with a 62-yard scoring strike to true freshman Caleb Douglas. Reserve tailback Lorenzo Lingard's 11-yard touchdown run with 11:53 to play put the Gators up 52-3. Eastern Washington was led by quarterback Gunner Talkington, who went 24 of 37 for 250 yards and threw a 28-yard touchdown pass midway into the fourth quarter for the Eagles' first trip into the end zone. They added a second TD with 3:17 to go when backup QB Kekoa Visperas ran 25 yards up the middle of the UF defense to wrap the game's scoring.

WHAT IT MEANS: So far this season it's been win one, lose one, win one, lose one, win one. As such, the Gators are back above .500, with all three of their victories out of Southeastern Conference play. UF has now won 15 consecutive regular-season non-league games, dating to the 2018 season-opening 53-6 victory over Charleston Southern. The Gators' last non-conference defeat in a regular season was a 38-22 loss at Florida State on Nov. 25, 2017.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Decent debut for Kitna, the son of 18-year NFL veteran Jon Kitna, who played his college football at Central Washington in Ellensburg, Wash., about 160 miles from Cheney, Wash., home to EWU. The younger Kitna, who was born in Tacoma during his father's days with the Seattle Seahawks, got the call because Jack Miller III, the transfer from Ohio State, remained out with a thumb injury suffered during the preseason. Miller was listed as "questionable" for the game, but did not dress out. He should be available if needed next week.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: OK, so it's not staggering in the least, but the Gators improved to 22-1 against FBS teams since 1981, with the lone loss the 2013 debacle against Georgia Southern, a 26-20 loss on the way to the program's first losing record in 34 years.

UP NEXT: The Gators (3-2, 0-2), with a short week, return to SEC play next Saturday, with another noon game, this one against Missouri (2-3, 0-2), which threw a nasty scare into No. 1-ranked Georgia before falling 26-22 Saturday night at Columbia. The winner of the UF-Mizzou game will climb out of the SEC East winless cellar.

WHAT HAPPENED: Redshirt sophomore cornerback Jaydon Hill intercepted two passes, returning one for a score, and his defensive mates (after a tough afternoon at times) bowed up for a late-game stop to seal the outcome and allow the Gators to come away with their first Southeastern Conference victory under Coach Billy Napier in Saturday's homecoming game at Spurrier/Florida Field. Sophomore tailback Montrell Johnson Jr. rushed for a third-quarter score as part of second-half UF ground game assault of 212 yards. Sophomore Anthony Richardson and junior Ricky Pearsall paired for a 9-yard scoring toss with 11:10 to play in what proved to be the decisive score on a day the Gators passed for just 66 yards against a Mizzou defense that threw a nasty scare at No. 1 Georgia a week earlier. A 37-yard field goal by Adam Mihalek in the first quarter and Hill's 49-yard pick-six had Florida up 10 early in the second quarter, but the Gators were unable to muster anything on offense (and missed a pair of long field goals) in finishing with just 66 yards on 18 first-half plays. With Florida flailing, the Tigers were able to erase the 10-0 deficit and tie the game at the break on a 5-yard scoring run from Cody Schrader and 28-yard field goal by Harrison Mevis 20 seconds before halftime. An 82-yard UF drive ended with Johnson's 3-yard score at the 6:55 mark of the third and after Hill intercepted Mizzou's Brady Cook (22 of 30, 220 yards, 0 TD, 2 INT) inside the UF 5, the Gators responded with a nine-play, 91-yard drive capped by Richardson's on-the-move dart to Pearsall in the back of the end zone. Back came the Tigers, though, converting on third-and-22 and third-and-15 on the way to an 18-yard touchdown run by Nathaniel Peat that drew the visitors within seven with six minutes to go. After Richardson's tip-ball interception with 2:57 left, Mizzou reached the UF 48, but Cook's fourth-down slant (under pressure from linebacker Ventrell Miller) for wideout Tauskie Dove fell incomplete with 1:17 to go. Florida was out-gained in total yards 370-297 and gave up nine of 17 third-down situations, yet still managed to come away with the victory.

WHAT IT MEANS: A first win in SEC play for the Gators (against the still-winless Tigers), who climbed out of the East Division cellar and inched their way up to a momentary spot in fourth place with five conference games to go. It was also Florida's SEC win since beating Vanderbilt 42-0 on Oct. 9, 2021, breaking a run of six straight defeats.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Hill would be the obvious choice, right? The guy missed all last season with a knee injury, suffered another knee injury in the offseason and made his UF debut just last week, announcing himself with seven tackles and two interceptions in his two games. But the Gators, with all their problems on third down, don't win Saturday without the inspired play from Miller, the sixth-year senior who's battled injuries of his own this season. Miller finished with 11 tackles, 10 of them solos and two of them for loss, and had the QB pressure on Missouri's final play that helped clinched the win.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: The 66 first-half yards for the Gators marked the team's fewest in a half since gaining just 61 against Missouri in the 2014 homecoming meeting at the "Swamp." UF lost that one 42-13, despite eventually out-gaining the Tigers 283-119 in yards from scrimmage.

UP NEXT: Florida (4-2, 1-2) will be home again, for the fifth time in the first six games of the season, to face No. 25 LSU (4-2, 2-1), which was manhandled at home by No. 8 Tennessee 40-13 in another league noon game Saturday. The Gators have lost three straight in their series against the Tigers.

WHAT HAPPENED: Quarterback Jayden Daniels led the Tigers to long touchdowns on their offense's first six possessions, as LSU rolled to a big lead and closed out the Gators with a late field goal in their Southeastern Conference showdown Saturday night at Spurrier/Florida Field. Daniels completed 23 of 32 passes for 349 yards and three touchdowns, while rushing for 44 yards and three more TDs. He was on the finishing/scoring end in some facet as LSU scored touchdowns on consecutive drives of 75, 73, 75, 83, 75 and 88 yards — in great part by converting eight of its first nine third-down situations — over the first three quarters to take a 42-21 lead into the fourth. On the first snap of that period, though, UF sophomore quarterback Anthony Richardson took off for an 81-yard touchdown run to draw his team within two scores. The Florida defense forced its first punt of the game on LSU's next possession and UF went 80 yards in 11 plays, with freshman tailback Trevor Etienne making it 42-35 on a 1-yard run with 5:18 to go. It was up to the Gators to make another stop and they appeared to do just that when Daniels, under pressure, threw down the middle of the field and was intercepted by cornerback Jason Marshall Jr. The pressure came from rushing defensive tackle Gervon Dexter Sr., who was flagged for roughing the passing, giving the Tigers an automatic first down at the UF 46. Nine plays and 17 yards later, Damian Ramos kicked a season-long 47-yard field goal to make it a 10-point lead with 1:52 remaining and ice the game. LSU finished with 528 yards of total offense, compared to 395 for Florida, and went 5-for-5 when in the red zone, with all of those scores TDs. Richardson completed 15 of 23 throws for 185 yards with one TD, that one coming on a 51-yard strike to Justin Shorter on the game's second offensive play. UF had leads of 7-0, 14-7 and 21-14 before LSU scored four unanswered TDs to seize command of the game.

WHAT IT MEANS: UF and LSU were probably viewed externally at about the same place, as far as their respective rebuilding situations. It would seem UF coach Billy Napier has a tougher rebuild on his hands, as the Gators have now lost three of their first four SEC games for the first time since 1986 and clearly have issues on the defensive side of the ball.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Daniels, the transfer from Arizona State, finished with 393 yards of total offense and had a hand in all six Tigers touchdowns. He also had some tremendous on-target throws and was a step ahead of the UF pass rush all night.

UP NEXT: Florida (4-3, 1-3) is idle next week and will be back on the field Oct. 29 for its annual rivalry game against No. 1 and defending national champion Georgia (7-0, 4-0). The Bulldogs, also off next week, beat up Vanderbilt 55-0 at home Saturday and will take a three-game winning streak against the Gators into the 100th all-time meeting between the two charter SEC programs.

WHAT HAPPENED: Quarterback Stetson Bennett passed for 316 yards and two touchdowns, the tailback duo of Kenny McIntosh and Daijun Edwards combined for 196 rushing yards and four scores, and the top-ranked Bulldogs' vaunted defense gave Anthony Richardson and company fits Saturday in routing the Gators in the 100th meeting of their storied Southeastern Conference rivalry at Jacksonville. Short touchdown runs in the first quarter by Edwards and McIntosh were followed by Bennett scoring throws of 73 yards to tight end Brock Bowers and seven to wide receiver Ladd McConkey in the second, as UGA opened a commanding 28-3 halftime lead, with UF limited to a career-best 52-yard field goal from Adam Mihalik. The scoreboard wasn't the only thing that was lopsided at intermission. The Bulldogs out-gained the Gators 346 yards to 84 in total offense, while forcing a half-dozen UF punts (compared to a combined four over the previous four games). UF, though, gave the fans in its half of TIAA Bank Field reason to stick around, thanks to a 75-yard drive to a 3-yard touchdown run by tailback Trevor Etienne, followed by a forced McIntosh fumble and defensive recovery that led to a 26-yard Mihalik field goal and made the score 28-13 midway through the third quarter. On the Bulldogs' ensuing possession, Bennett was intercepted by linebacker Amari Burney, further igniting the UF side, with the energy going next level when Richardson fired a 78-yard touchdown strike to Xavier Henderson that made it a one-possession game, 28-20, with 3:31 to go in the third. That was as close as it got, though. Georgia answered with a 78-yard drive, capped by Edwards' second rushing TD, a 22-yard run up the middle that made it 35-20 with 35 seconds left in the period. Then, after turning Florida away on downs, the Bulldogs drove to a 4-yard McIntosh scoring run, keyed by a Bennett-to-Bowers completion of 29 yards on fourth-and-7 to set up what amounted to the put-away touchdown. When it was over, the Bulldogs had cranked out 555 yards of offense -- the most ever by a Georgia team in the series (surpassing the previous high of 505 in 1976) -- versus 371 for the Gators. Richardson completed 18 of 37 passes for 271 yards and one score, was held to just 19 yards on 11 rushing attempts, was sacked three times and hurried all game. The UF ground attack, averaging 212.6 yards per game coming in, was limited to 100 yards on 34 carries by a defense ranked No. 2 nationally, including fourth against the run.

WHAT IT MEANS: Georgia's recent dominance in the series now shows five wins over the previous six meetings by an average of 22 points. Meanwhile, the Gators have dropped four of their first five SEC games for the first time since the 1979, the first under Charley Pell, that finished 0-10-1.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Take your pick of Bulldogs, but what an X-factor Bowers is for that offense, whether he's lined up tight or split out. He finished with five catches for 154 yards and the long TD.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: The Bulldogs' 25-point halftime lead marked the largest at the break in the series for either team since 1996. Florida was up 34-0 on Georgia that year on the way to a 47-7 victory. That UF team was ranked No. 1, as well, and went on to win the national title.

UP NEXT: Florida (4-4, 1-4) hits the SEC road with a trip to face Texas A&M (3-4, 1-3). The Aggies took a three-game losing streak into Saturday night's road game at 15th-ranked Ole Miss. Meanwhile, Georgia and No. 3 Tennessee will play next week at Athens, Ga., for what could be the SEC game of the year (and a possible College Football Playoff preview).

WHAT HAPPENED: Quarterback Anthony Richardson passed for two touchdowns and ran for a couple more, including a 60-yard dash, as the Gators snapped a two-game losing streak with a Southeastern Conference road victory against the depleted Aggies in front of more than 97,000 at Kyle Field. The game was a first-half shootout, featuring six lead changes, but UF dominated after intermission, getting an especially inspired performance from a defense that had taken its share of criticism in giving up more than 40 points and 500 yards in consecutive losses (at home against LSU and against top-ranked Georgia in Jacksonville) the last two weeks. Against the undermanned Aggies, who had six players out with flu and down another 11 due to injury, the Gators erased a 24-20 halftime deficit by outscoring the home team 21-0 on Richardson touchdown tosses of 19 yards to Ja'Quavion Fraziers and 12 yards to Caleb Douglas in the third quarter, plus Montrell Johnson Jr.'s 5-yard, put-away scoring run with 1:21 to play. The seven possessions of the first half all ended in scores, including Richardson's electrifying and untouched 60-yard run up the right sideline, with A&M tailback Devon Achane's 2-yard TD run with a minute left before intermission putting A&M ahead; for the last time, as it turned out. The Florida defense forced the first A&M three-and-out to start the second half and Richardson, who completed 17 of 28 passes for 201 yards, took possession after a 28-yard punt return by Xzavier Henderson, and needed just two plays to get the Gators in the end zone on a beautiful back-shoulder fade pass that Fraziers hauled in with one hand at the left-front pylon. After that, it was basically all Florida the rest of the way. UF finished with 492 yards of total offense, including 291 on the ground, while A&M, which had to turn to backup quarterback Haynes King (23 of 45 for 279 yards, 1 TD) after Conner Weigman was scratched due to the flu, finished with 413 yards. The overwhelming majority of those yards (read on) came before halftime.

WHAT IT MEANS: With their fifth win of the season, the Gators snapped a five-game SEC road losing streak (their previous last away victory in league play was 2020 at Tennessee). More importantly to the here and now, Florida needs just one win in its last three games to become bowl eligible, which has been a stated goal for Coach Billy Napier in his first UF season. The Gators also snapped their pseudo-hex of games against Coach Jimbo Fisher, winning for just the second time in 10 cracks (eight at Florida State, two at A&M) against their former cross-state nemesis.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Credit to UF's co-defensive coordinators, Patrick Toney and Sean Spencer, for whatever adjustments they made at halftime. The Aggies scored 24 points in the first and rolled up 307 yards of total offense, averaging more than nine yards a play while punting just once. In the second half, the Florida defense held A&M to no points, a measly 106 yards, forced five punts, a pair of turnovers and also turned the Aggies away on downs deep in their own territory in the fourth quarter. The Gators came into the game ranked 130th in the country (out of 131 FBS teams) in third-down conversion defense, surrendering a whopping 52 percent. The Aggies converted their first three third-down chances, but went 1-for-10 the rest of the way.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: A&M, which began the 2022 season ranked No. 6 in the country and a trendy pick to reach the College Football Playoff, has lost five straight games for the first time since 1980. That was way back when the Aggies were part of the Southwest Conference (32 years from joining the SEC). A&M needs to win its final three games to avoid missing a bowl game for the first time since 2008.

UP NEXT: Florida (5-4, 2-4) will play its final home game (and celebrate its annual "Senior Day") against SEC East foe South Carolina (5-3, 2-3) on Nov. 12 at "The Swamp." The Gamecocks, who trampled the Gators 40-17 last season at Columbia, broke into the Associated Press Top 25 last weekend but lost at home to Missouri. USC is on the road later Saturday night at league-winless Vanderbilt.

WHAT HAPPENED: At last, Billy Napier got a wire-to-wire rout — in a Southeastern Conference game, no less — as the UF offense and defense had their finest all-around performances of the season in Saturday's plucking of the Gamecocks at Spurrier/Florida Field, giving the Gators' first-year coach a sixth victory and making his team bowl eligible. Sophomore quarterback Anthony Richardson only passed for 112 yards, but tossed a pair of scores and rushed for another. The Gators absolutely manhandled the Gamecocks on the ground, cranking out 374 yards rushing, including 281 in a first half when UF scored touchdowns on its first three possessions and eventually built a 24-0 lead. At one point, the Gators had three players with at least 100 yards rushing, but Richardson, with 102 yards, was sacked for a 6-yard loss, and what would have been an historic note was suddenly for naught. No matter. Sophomore Montrell Johnson Jr. carried 24 times for a career-high 161 yards and a touchdown. Richardson had 96 yards on 15 attempts. The running play of the day, however, came from freshman Trevor Etienne (8 carries, 100 yards) who took an inside handoff late in the first quarter, broke the line, hit the second level and sped for an 85-yard touchdown run that represented the program's longest play from scrimmage since 2018. Etienne's score put the Gators up 21-0, with Adam Mihalek's 28-yard field goal with just over six minutes to go in the first half making it 24-0. USC got on the board late with just inside two minutes to go in the half when punter Kai Krueger hit a wide open Dakereon Joyner on a fake, with Joyner racing 48 yards for a touchdown. The ensuing two-point conversion failed. Midway through the third quarter, 415-pound nose tackle Desmond Watson stripped Gamecocks tailback Jaheim Bell on a stuffed run into the line for a turnover at the USC 12. Richardson capitalized with a 3-yard touchdown toss to sophomore tight end Jonathan Odom to go up 31-6, his second scoring pass of the day (along with a 15-yarder to wideout Ricky Pearsall in the first quarter). Johnson finished the scoring with an 8-yard run with 6:02 left. For the game, UF finished amassed 515 yards of offense, while holding USC and quarterback Spencer Rattler (8 of 16 for 145 yards) to just 237 total yards, only 44 on the ground, and forcing three turnovers. The Florida defense has now gone six consecutive quarters without surrendering a touchdown (after shutting out Texas A&M in the second half last weekend). The Gamecocks played without their top running back, MarShawn Lloyd (556 yards, 9 TDs), who missed the game with a deep thigh bruise. Doubtful he would have made much of a difference.

WHAT IT MEANS: Being bowl eligible was a stated goal by Napier in his first season of this rebuild. No, the Gators aren't going to a New Year's Six game, but they're now assured of those all-important handful of extra holiday-season practices and, if they can build on these back-to-back wins, could end up at a cool venue. Somewhere like, say, Nashville for the Music City Bowl, Memphis for the Liberty Bowl or, closer to home, the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville. There's already some buzz about a potential matchup against Notre Dame.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: Etienne's touchdown was the longest by a UF freshman running back since John L. Williams ripped off an 86-yarder against West Texas State on Oct. 16, 1982, a homecoming game the Gators won 77-14. He officially got his first 100-yard game on his eighth carry, which came early in the fourth quarter. UF gets two more years (at least) with Travis's little brother who is well on his way to playing his way out of big bro's shadow.

STAGGERING STATISTIC: UF was thisclose from playing a fourth straight game without committing a turnover. Alas, with 1:14 to play, senior Nay'Quan Wright fumbled at the South Carolina 9 and thus stopped a run of 51 consecutive possessions without a turnover. That's a significant development (and a reason for UF's improved offensive numbers the last few weeks), considering how turnovers undermined the offense during the first half of the season. The Gators' last turnover before Wright's fumble came on the next-to-last possession (a Richardson interception) of their 24-17 home win against Missouri on Oct. 8.

UP NEXT: Florida (6-4, 3-4) goes to Vanderbilt to close out the SEC slate with a noon game. The Commodores (4-6, 1-5) began Saturday not only winless in league play this season, but on a 26-game conference losing streak, only to upset Kentucky 24-21 earlier in the day at Lexington. UF has an eight-game winning streak over Vandy, dating to 2014, and has won 30 of the previous 31 in the series, dating to 1989. South Carolina (6-4, 3-4) finishes the season — get this — at home against No. 5 Tennessee and at No. 12 Clemson.

GatorMade Program Aims For Holistic Development

Developing Gators far beyond the football field

When Gators head football coach Billy Napier arrived in Gainesville, he made clear that player development was going to be a priority at Florida. Shortly after taking over the program, he introduced GatorMade, a player-focused and purpose-driven initiative that seeks to develop Gators beyond the football field by providing them with the necessary skills to succeed in life. The program was part of Napier's master plan when he got a job at a school with the resources to support his vision.

Led by Senior Director of Player Relations and GatorMade Savannah Bailey, GatorMade holistically develops each football scholar-athlete within UF's football program. The initiative not only addresses the needs of scholar-athletes, but also empowers them with opportunities to learn, serve, and lead. GatorMade translates the skills of football into personal and professional contexts, instilling independence in the scholar-athletes to be agents of change in their

teams, homes, communities, and world. "GatorMade provides opportunities in financial literacy, micro-internships, networking, mentorship, agent education, NIL, business weekend trips and even service abroad," Napier said. "We want to have a place where we work toward having a life-changing impact as a person, as a student and as a player. And GatorMade provides the building blocks." In Summer 2022, the program kicked off its first annual Service Abroad Trip. Sixteen scholar-athletes across seven different sports traveled to Greece for a 10-day service trip, logging more than 600 hours of community service. "It's a different perspective.

I think it helps people grow their understanding of the world and understanding of themselves," Bailey said on the importance of facilitating abroad opportunities. "I think that brings home the message that anyone can serve anywhere, so whether it's across the world, in your hometown, or right here in Gainesville, there's always going to be someone who needs help." Earlier in the year, GatorMade also hosted a business trip to Atlanta for nine football scholar-athletes over spring break. The group met with the Atlanta Gator Club and nine different companies, an opportunity for the players to explore future options and network with Gator Nation.

The GatorMade staff includes former UF player Vernell Brown Jr., who serves as senior director of student-athlete development and alumni relations and Marcus Castro-Walker, director of player engagement and NIL. Diane Lebon, another staff member with experience at UF, serves as football business manager and GatorMade coordinator. "We are just in the beginning stages. This is a comprehensive year-round curriculum and series of experiences that a player has," Napier said. "What I've seen is that these experiences change the perspective of the player, and then all of sudden, when they go to class, or they go to Hawkins Center, or they're

living life, they're visualizing what they want to do or who they want to become. One of the ways you change people is that you expose them to different people and different events. That's what we want to do with GatorMade. "We're hopeful that this becomes the absolute best player-development program in the entire country. This is an area where people can invest in the player. And at the University of Florida, with the alumni network that we have and the top-five university education that we offer, there's no reason we can't do just that."

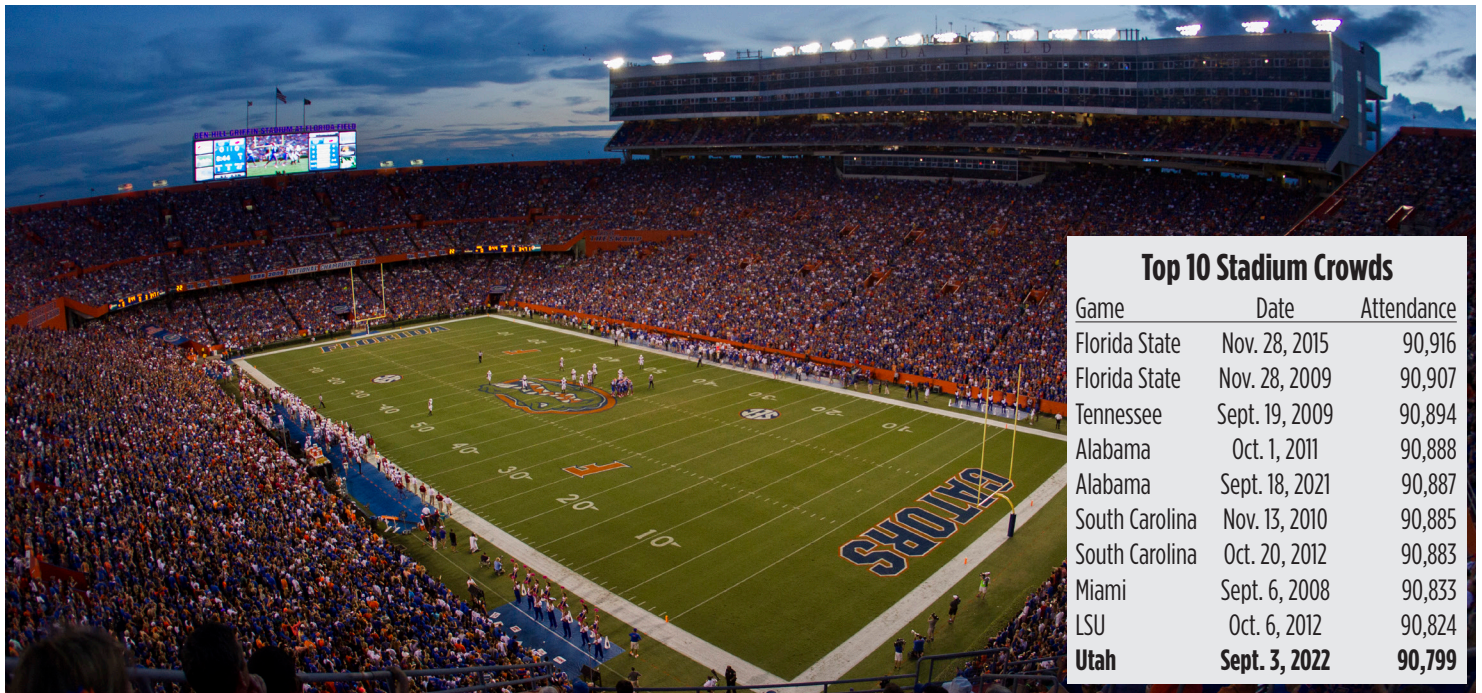

June 9, 1992. Once The Gainesville Sun hit newstands that Tuesday, Ben Hill Griffin Stadium's fitting nickname came to life.

Steve Spurrier, entering season three as Gators head coach, called writer Mike Bianchi the day prior and pitched him the storyline. It was seven months after the Gators ended the 1991 regular season with consecutive wins over Kentucky (which clinched an undefeated SEC record and the first league title in school history) and a thrilling 14-9 defeat of No. 3 Florida State, snapping a four-game losing streak to the Seminoles. It also gave UF a perfect 12-0 home record under Spurrier.

"The 'Swamp' is where Gators live," Spurrier told Bianchi. "We feel comfortable there, but we hope our opponents feel tentative. A swamp is hot and sticky and can be dangerous."

Initially, the UF athletic department didn't embrace the nickname. No posters, bumper stickers or marketing campaigns were put together right away. But Spurrier continued to use it. Then he and then-UF communications director Norm Carlson did some research. Turns out, in 1930, UF President John J. Tigert selected the location for the school's football stadium and described the area as a "swampy depression." The school hired engineers to drain the area and install pipes that funneled water down the hill along North-South Drive and dumped it into what is now known as Graham Pond.

Needless to say, the nickname caught on, and Spurrier delivered the perfect quote for the athletic department to utilize once it eventually did embrace the moniker: "The 'Swamp' is a place where only Gators get out alive."
