THIS IS SEC FOOTBALL

- Sixteen times in the last 18 seasons, a team from the SEC has advanced to the national championship game. The SEC has won 13 of those contests, with two of the losses coming in the game's final seconds. The winner of the SEC Championship Game has advanced to the National Championship Game all but twice since 2006.

- With Florida in January 2009, five different teams from the SEC (Alabama, Auburn, Florida, LSU, Georgia) have played for and won the national championship. All five have multiple appearances and at least one victory since in the national championship game since 2007.

- The SEC won four consecutive CFP National Championships, by three different programs (LSU, Alabama, Georgia), from 2019-2022.

- Not counting games versus each other, the SEC is 14-4 all-time in College Football Playoff games, playing in eight of the 10 CFP Championship Games (winning six of those eight). The SEC is 10-2 in CFP Semifinals, including 10 consecutive semifinal wins.

- Since 2006, the SEC has posted a 34-16 (.680) record in BCS/CFP games, more wins, appearances, and winning percentage than any other A5 conference.

- The Southeastern Conference led the nation yet again in 2023 with 372 former players on opening weekend 53-man active rosters, including injured reserve.

- A total of 24 former SEC players were on active rosters of Super Bowl LVI between the Kansas City Chiefs and the San Francisco 49ers.

- The SEC is 114-71 (.616) in bowl games since 2006, the only FBS league with a .600 or better winning percentage and nearly 40 wins more than the next closest conference.

- The SEC has now won 65 games in the last nine postseasons and has sent no less than eight teams to post-season bowls in each of the last 17 seasons.

- In the 10 seasons of the College Football Playoff era, only eight programs nationally have been ranked No. 1 in the weekly CFP Top-25 Poll (which begins in late October each year) – five of those seven programs (Alabama, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, Tennessee) are from the SEC. Prior to 2023, no team outside the SEC had been ranked No. 1 in the weekly CFP Poll since 2019, while four schools from the SEC were ranked No. 1 during that time.

- Ten different SEC teams, including all seven from the former SEC Western Division, have made BCS/New Year's Six bowl game appearances since 2006: Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Ole Miss, Mississippi State, Tennessee and Texas A&M. Since the formation of the College Football Playoff in 2014, six of the seven schools in the former Western Division have advanced to a New Year's Six bowl.

- With Georgia and Alabama both earning victories in the CFP Semifinals in both 2021 and 2017, the national championship game has featured two SEC teams twice in the last seven years and three times since the 2011 season.

- The SEC Championship has been the most watched conference championship nationally for 15 of the past 16 seasons, including 12 in a row from 2008-2019. The only year it was not #1 was 2020 when the SEC did not have a traditional schedule due to the pandemic. The 2023 SEC Championship Game averaged 17.519 million viewers, +61% vs. last year's game, and peaked with 22.350 million viewers. It was the most-watched Conference Championship Game on any network in five years.

- The SEC finished the 2023 season as the most-watched conference in college football based on total minutes consumed for a second-straight year. The SEC was also #1 in average audience for at least the 13th consecutive year.

2024 Media Days Preseason Poll

Georgia was predicted to win the 2024 SEC Championship, according to a preseason poll of media covering SEC Football Media Days.

The Bulldogs received 165 votes to be crowned SEC Champion on December 7 in Atlanta at Mercedes-Benz Stadium, with Texas being picked to be the Bulldogs' opponent in the Longhorns' first season in the league. Texas received 27 votes to win the SEC Championship.

This will mark the first season since 1991 with no divisions in SEC Football. The participants of the game will be determined during the eight-game regular-season conference schedule as the teams with the two best overall SEC winning percentages.

Only nine times since 1992 (32 years) has the predicted champion prior to the season at SEC Media Days proceeded to win the SEC Championship Game.

SEC FOOTBALL BOWL AGREEMENTS

The Southeastern Conference has six-year agreements with nine football post-season bowls. The nine bowls are in addition to bowl games in the College Football Playoff system for which SEC teams are eligible to qualify.

The SEC has extended its current agreements through 2025 with the Cheez-It Citrus Bowl in Orlando, the ReliaQuest Bowl in Tampa, the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, the Transperfect Music City Bowl in Nashville, the Texas Bowl in Houston, the AutoZone Liberty Bowl in Memphis, the TicketSmarter Birmingham Bowl and the Union Home Mortgage Gasparilla Bowl.

In addition, the SEC will continue its relationship with the Duke's Mayo Bowl in Charlotte, participating in that bowl game in 2025. For 2024, an SEC team will participate in the SRS Distribution Las Vegas Bowl.

The SEC will maintain its current bowl selection process in which the Citrus Bowl has the first selection of available SEC teams after any conference schools have qualified for the College Football Playoff after which the SEC assigns teams to a Pool of Six bowl.

The SEC Pool of Six consists of the ReliaQuest Bowl, TaxSlayer Gator Bowl, Transperfect Music City Bowl, Texas Bowl and Autozone Liberty Bowl, as well as the SRS Distribution Las Vegas Bowl in 2024, and the Duke's Mayo Bowl in 2025.

In consultation with SEC member institutions, as well as these six bowls, the conference will make assignments for the bowl games in the pool system. ESPN Events selects teams to participate in the Birmingham and Union Home Mortgage Gasparilla Bowls after the Pool of Six have been assigned.

2024-25 College Football Playoff

- The 12 participating teams will be the five conference champions ranked highest by the CFP selection committee, plus the next seven highest-ranked teams.
- The ranking of the teams will continue to be done by a selection committee.
- The four highest-ranked conference champions will be seeded one through four and will receive a first-round bye. The fifth conference champion will be seeded where it was ranked or at No. 12 if it is outside the top 12 rankings. Non-conference champions ranked in the top four will be seeded beginning at No. 5. Because of this, the seeding, 1 through 12, could look different than the final rankings.
- The eight teams seeded No. 5-12 will play in a first round with the higher seeds hosting the lower seeds either on campus or at other sites designated by the higher-seeded institution (No. 12 at No. 5, No. 11 at No. 6, No. 10 at No. 7 and No. 9 at No. 8.).
- The selection committee will assign the four highest-ranked conference champions to Playoff Quarterfinals hosted by bowls. This will be done in consideration of historic bowl relationships, then in consideration of rankings. For example, if the Sugar Bowl hosts a Playoff Quarterfinal and the SEC champion is ranked No. 1 and the Big 12 champion is ranked No. 3, the SEC champion would be assigned to the Sugar Bowl and the Big 12 champion would be assigned elsewhere.
- With the four highest-ranked conference champions assigned to bowls, their four Playoff Quarterfinal opponents will be dictated by the bracket (i.e., No. 1 vs. No. 8/9 winner, No. 4 vs. No. 5/12 winner, No. 2 vs. 7/10 winner; No. 3 vs. 6/11 winner.)
- The College Football Playoff bracket will follow the selection committee's rankings, with no modifications made to avoid rematches between teams that may have played during the regular season or are from the same conference.
- The bracket will remain in effect throughout the playoff (i.e., no re-seeding).
- The highest seed will receive preferential placement for the Playoff Semifinal bowl assignment.
- All 11 games will be under the CFP umbrella with the administrative policies determined by the CFP.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONS SINCE 1992

Since the first SEC expansion in 1992, the SEC has the most national championships (AP, USA Today) with 17. During that time, the SEC has had more teams with national titles than any other conference (6). Here is a breakdown:

- SEC (17) Florida (2008, 2006, 1996), LSU (2003, 2007, 2019), Tennessee (1998), Alabama (1992, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017, 2020), Auburn (2010), Georgia (2021, 2022)

- ACC (5) Florida State (1993, 1999, 2013), Clemson (2016, 18)

The SEC was the first conference to claim four consecutive Associated Press (first poll - 1936), National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame (first poll - 1959), Football Writers Association of America (first poll - 1954) and USA Today or UPI Coaches Poll (first poll - 1950) national championships.

• The SEC is 14-4 in College Football Playoff games (not versus each other) and 4-2 in College Football Playoff National Championship Games (not versus each other). The SEC has appeared in eight of the 10 CFP National Championship Games, winning six. The SEC finished 9-2 in BCS National Championship Games (LSU 2-1, Florida 2-0, Alabama 3-0, Tennessee 1-0, Auburn 1-1), 8-1 vs. non-SEC competition. The SEC had the most wins (17) and the highest winning percentage of any conference that has three-or-more appearances in BCS bowl games. The SEC was 17-10 in BCS games (.630 percentage), 16-9 (.640) in non-conference. Since 2006, the SEC has posted a 31-16 (.660) record in BCS/CFP games, more wins, appearances and winning percentage than any other A5 conference.

• Ten different SEC teams, including all seven from the former SEC Western Division, have made BCS/New Year's Six bowl game appearances since 2006: Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Ole Miss, Mississippi State, Tennessee and Texas A&M.

SEC SUCCESS SINCE 2006

During the last 18 seasons (2006-23), Southeastern Conference football has experienced success that is unparalleled in its football history and in the history of college football. During this tenure, the SEC's achievements have been demonstrated by:

- Triumphs in major bowl games, including the National Championship Game
- Non-conference success in regular season and bowl games
- Defeating highly-ranked non-conference teams
- Success in the polls and rankings
- Individual awards and All-America Teams
- Academic and Community Service Standouts
- Continued accomplishments of former SEC student-athletes in the NFL and NFL Draft

SEC IN THE CFP/BCS ERA (Since 1998)

- The SEC has won 13 of the last 18 national championships, 15 of the 265 BCS/CFP-era National Championships, six runner-up finishes and 29 overall national titles (CFP, AP, BCS, FWA, Coaches Poll) in SEC history. The SEC has appeared in 16 of the last 18 National Championship Games and in 10 of the 16 BCS Championship Games, winning nine.
- Five different SEC schools have won the National Championship since 2006 (Auburn, 2010; Alabama, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017, 2020; Florida, 2006, 2008; LSU, 2007, 2019; Georgia, 2021, 2022). Five programs have advanced to the national championship game since 2013. Tennessee (1998) has also won the former BCS crown. Auburn appeared in the 2013 BCS Championship Game, as did LSU in 2011, Georgia in 2017 and Alabama in 2021. A team from the SEC Western Division had advanced to five consecutive national championship games prior to the 2014 season, when Alabama lost in the CFP semifinals. The ACC (Clemson, Miami and Florida State) and Big Ten (Michigan, Ohio State) has had three schools win titles since 1998, while the current Big 12 (Texas and Oklahoma) has had two.
- Since 2006, over half of the slots in the National Championship Game have been taken by SEC teams (19 of 36). The Big Ten has five during that time, the ACC has four, while the Big 12 and Pac-12 has three.
- The SEC has had more teams ranked in the BCS/CFP standings than any other conference since 2006. The league has had 13 of its 14 teams ranked at one time or another since 2006. Vanderbilt is the only team to not appear in the BCS/CFP rankings during this time, however, the Commodores finished ranked in the Top 25 in both 2012 and 2013 after bowl games with 9-4 records. The BCS/CFP does not produce a poll following bowl games.
- Since 2006, the SEC has posted 34 wins in BCS/New Year's Six/Access bowls - more wins than any other conference.
- Six of the top 10 defensive performances in CFP/BCS history have been registered by SEC teams, more than any other conference. Alabama's shutout of LSU in the 2012 BCS National Championship Game was the first shutout in CFP/BCS history. Alabama defeated Michigan State soundly 38-0 in a CFP National Semifinal in 2015, while defeating Washington 24-7 in 2016 semifinal contest. Alabama dominated Clemson in the 2018 Sugar Bowl Semifinal, holding Clemson to just 188 yards, well short of their average 448 yards per game. In the 2021 CFP Semifinal, Alabama defeated Cincinnati 27-6, holding the Bearcats to 218 yards and a pair of field goals. Georgia's 65-7 victory over TCU in the 2022 national championship game, the Bulldogs held TCU to 188 total yards and nine first downs. Georgia's 63-3 defeat of Florida State in the 2023 Orange Bowl was the largest margin of victory in the entire history of postseason bowls, holding FSU to only 209 yards.
- The SEC has now won 65 games in the last eight postseasons. With 12 teams advancing to bowl games in 2016, the SEC became the first conference to send at least 10 teams to postseason bowls in four consecutive seasons. The SEC also sent a NCAA-record 12 teams to participate in postseason bowl games in 2014 and has sent no less than eight teams to post-season bowls in each of the last 16 seasons. The SEC established a national-record with nine postseason victories in 2015 and owned the previous record for postseason bowl victories with seven wins in 2007, 2013 and 2014. The SEC qualified a record 13 teams for postseason bowls in 2021 and finished 7-2 in the 2020 postseason, with all seven wins coming against Top-25 competition - the most in history for the conference.
- The SEC is 114-71 (.616) in bowl games since 2006, the only Autonomy Five league with a .600 or better winning percentage and nearly 40 wins more than the next closest conference.

SEC vs. OTHER CONFERENCES

• Since 2006, the SEC has posted the highest non-conference winning percentage (regular season & bowls) than any other conference. The league has a 864-216 record, an 80.1 winning percentage. The SEC has won no less than 43 non-conference games (regular season & bowls) during the last 18 seasons (2006-2023). Last season (2023), the SEC was 50-15 (.769), including bowl games.

SEC IN FINAL RANKINGS

- Since 2006, the SEC has had the most teams ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Poll. The conference has had 99 teams ranked in the final USA Today rankings during that span, including six in 2023.
- The SEC has either led or tied for the lead with the most teams ranked in the USA Today Top-25 for 16 of the last 18 seasons.

THIS IS SEC FOOTBALL

- Sixteen times in the last 18 seasons, a team from the SEC has advanced to the national championship game. The SEC has won 13 of those contests, with two of the losses coming in the game's final seconds. The winner of the SEC Championship Game has advanced to the National Championship Game all but twice since 2006.
- With Florida in January 2009, five different teams from the SEC (Alabama, Auburn, Florida, LSU, Georgia) have played for and won the national championship. All five have multiple appearances and at least one victory since in the national championship game since 2007.
- The SEC won four consecutive CFP National Championships, by three different programs (LSU, Alabama, Georgia), from 2019-2022.
- Not counting games versus each other, the SEC is 14-4 all-time in College Football Playoff games, playing in eight of the 10 CFP Championship Games (winning six of those eight). The SEC is 10-2 in CFP Semifinals, including 10 consecutive semifinal wins.
- Since 2006, the SEC has posted a 34-16 (.680) record in BCS/CFP games, more wins, appearances, and winning percentage than any other A5 conference.
- The Southeastern Conference led the nation yet again in 2023 with 372 former players on opening weekend 53-man active rosters, including injured reserve.
- A total of 24 former SEC players were on active rosters of Super Bowl LVI between the Kansas City Chiefs and the San Francisco 49ers.
- The SEC is 114-71 (.616) in bowl games since 2006, the only FBS league with a .600 or better winning percentage and nearly 40 wins more than the next closest conference.
- The SEC has now won 65 games in the last nine postseasons and has sent no less than eight teams to post-season bowls in each of the last 17 seasons.
- In the 10 seasons of the College Football Playoff era, only eight programs nationally have been ranked No. 1 in the weekly CFP Top-25 Poll (which begins in late October each year) - five of those seven programs (Alabama, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, Tennessee) are from the SEC. Prior to 2023, no team outside the SEC had been ranked No. 1 in the weekly CFP Poll since 2019, while four schools from the SEC were ranked No. 1 during that time.
- Ten different SEC teams, including all seven from the former SEC Western Division, have made BCS/New Year's Six bowl game appearances since 2006: Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Ole Miss, Mississippi State, Tennessee and Texas A&M. Since the formation of the College Football Playoff in 2014, six of the seven schools in the former Western Division have advanced to a New Year's Six bowl.
- With Georgia and Alabama both earning victories in the CFP Semifinals in both 2021 and 2017, the national championship game has featured two SEC teams twice in the last seven years and three times since the 2011 season.
- The SEC Championship has been the most watched conference championship nationally for 15 of the past 16 seasons, including 12 in a row from 2008-2019. The only year it was not #1 was 2020 when the SEC did not have a traditional schedule due to the pandemic. The 2023 SEC Championship Game averaged 17.519 million viewers, +61% vs. last year's game, and peaked with 22.350 million viewers. It was the most-watched Conference Championship Game on any network in five years.
- The SEC finished the 2023 season as the most-watched conference in college football based on total minutes consumed for a second-straight year. The SEC was also #1 in average audience for at least the 13th consecutive year.

SEC IN THE NFL

- The Southeastern Conference led the nation yet again in 2024 with 439 former players on opening weekend 53-man active rosters, including injured reserve.
- The SEC has had more of its former players on NFL rosters in the last 10 seasons than any other conference. Since 2012, the SEC has averaged 368 players per year on NFL opening weekend rosters.
- During the last 20 completed NFL seasons (2005-24), the SEC had had five of its former players named NFL MVP (2005 – Shaun Alexander, RB, Alabama with Seattle; 2008-09-13, Peyton Manning, QB, Tennessee with Indianapolis and Denver; 2015, Cam Newton, QB, Auburn with Carolina).
- During the last 18 Super Bowls (2006-24), three former SEC players have been named game MVP five times (2006 – Hines Ward, WR, Georgia with Pittsburgh; 2007 – Peyton Manning, QB, Tennessee with Indianapolis; 2008 and 2012 – Eli Manning, QB, Ole Miss with New York Giants. Von Miller of Texas A&M was named MVP of Super Bowl 50, although his final year was the Aggies final season prior to joining the SEC.

- The SEC led the nation's conferences in NFL Draft picks for the 17th consecutive year in 2023 with 62 selections, just three less than the SEC and national record set one year ago.
- This marks the ninth straight year for the SEC to see 50 or more players taken in the NFL Draft. Only three times in the last 28 years has another conference other than the SEC seen 50 or more players drafted.
- A total of 13 SEC teams had selections in the 2023 NFL Draft.
- This is the seventh consecutive year the SEC has seen 25 or more players selected through the first three rounds of the NFL Draft. A total of 31 selections from the SEC were made in the first three rounds in 2023. The most ever by a league outside the SEC is 25.
- The SEC has averaged over 50 selections per draft since 2006.
- Alabama and Georgia led the SEC and the nation with 10 players drafted. It was the sixth consecutive season that a SEC program led the nation in overall selections. It's also the fifth time in the last six years that the program leading the country in draft picks was Alabama or Georgia.
- The two-time reigning national champion Bulldogs set two new records for the most players selected across two drafts (25) and three drafts (34). This year's 10-player UGA class followed the record-setting 15 players selected in 2022 with nine more chosen in 2021.
- For the 12th time in the last 13 years, the SEC once again tied or led the nation in First Round NFL Draft selections, as the league produced nine opening-round draft picks.
- During the last 19 NFL Drafts, the SEC has a nation-leading 168 players taken in the opening round, an average of nearly nine per season.
- Bryce Young is the third No. 1 overall pick from the SEC in the last four NFL Drafts and fifth in the last 10 years.
- This is the second consecutive year that two of the first three selections in the NFL Draft are from the SEC.
- This is the second time in the last four NFL Drafts that two SEC quarterbacks were selected in the Top 5.
- For the third time in the last four NFL Drafts, at least half of the Top 10 selections were from the SEC.
- The SEC had eight of the first 16 selections of the 2023 NFL Draft.
- The SEC now has 144 First Round NFL Draft selections since 2010.
- Since 2010, the SEC has over double (144) the total amount of First Round selections than the next closest conference (Big Ten – 73).
- Five different SEC teams (Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi State, Tennessee) had a player taken in the First Round of the 2023 NFL Draft.
- The SEC now has 55 Top-10 picks since 2009 and 61 since 2007.
- Only four schools nationally have a Top-16 pick in each of the last two NFL Drafts – three of those schools are from the SEC (Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi State).
- Since 2009, Top 10 NFL picks by league: SEC (55); Big 12 (26); ACC (25); Pac-12 (24); B1G (23), Notre Dame (4); AAC (3); MAC (3); BYU (2); Mountain West (1).
- Alabama and Georgia led the SEC with three First Round selections in the 2023 NFL Draft.

Georgia has now seen eight defensive players drafted in the first round the last two years.

- Alabama has had a First-Round selection in each of the past 15 NFL Drafts, the longest streak in SEC and college football history, as well as the most First Round picks nationally since 2007 with 44.

The Southeastern Conference's top two teams in the regular season standings will meet in Atlanta's Mercedes-Benz Stadium to battle for the league championship and the right to represent the conference in the College Football Playoff. The 33rd-annual title game is set for December 7 and will be televised nationally by ABC.

The game was born as a result of 1992 conference expansion, which saw Arkansas and South Carolina become the first members added in SEC history. Under NCAA regulations, a conference with 12 members may play an additional football game to determine its champion, provided the regular season is played in divisions.

The participants of the game will be determined during the eight-game regular-season conference schedule as the teams with the two best overall SEC winning percentages.

The SEC Championship has been the most watched conference championship nationally for 15 of the past 16 seasons, including 12 in a row from 2008- 2019. The only year it was not No. 1 was 2020 when the SEC did not have a traditional schedule due to the pandemic.

The 2023 SEC Championship Game averaged 17.519 million viewers, +61% vs. last year's game, and peaked with 22.350 million viewers. It was the most-watched Conference Championship Game on any network in five years. The 2021 SEC Championship attracted over 15 million viewers, the most watched championship game in college football since 2018.

The 2009 SEC Championship Game earned an 11.8 rating and a 24 share, marking the highest-rated SEC Championship Game in history. The game matched the No. 1 Florida Gators (12-0) vs. the No. 2 Alabama Crimson Tide (12-0).

The SEC Championship Game has drawn 30 capacity crowds in its 32-year history. Only 1993 (Birmingham) and 1995 (Atlanta) were not sellouts.

The SEC, along with AMB Sports & Entertainment (AMBSE) and the Georgia World Congress Center Authority (GWCCA), have an agreement to host the SEC Championship Game at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta through 2031. The new agreement allows the SEC the option of adding a five-year extensions through 2036. The Georgia Dome hosted the SEC Championship Game for 23 years beginning in 1994, with capacity crowds in the last 22 consecutive years. By the end of the new agreement, including options, the Championship will have been played in Atlanta a total of 43 years.

SEC FOOTBALL TIE-BREAKING PROCESS

In the event of a tie between teams competing for a place in the Conference championship game, the following procedures will be used in descending order until the tie is broken:

- * Head-to-head competition among the tied teams
- * Record versus all common Conference opponents among the tied teams
- * Record against highest (best) placed common Conference opponent in the Conference standings, and proceeding through the Conference standings among the tied teams
- * Cumulative Conference winning percentage of all Conference opponents among the tied teams
- * Capped relative total scoring margin versus all Conference opponents among the tied teams
- * Random draw of the tied teams

If the regular season standings determine a clear Conference champion and two or more teams are tied for second place, the Conference champion will be the home team in the Championship Game and the tiebreaking procedures will be used to determine its opponent.

If a tiebreaker step produces standings with two teams tied for first place in the Conference, both will qualify for the championship game. To decide the seeding of the two teams, both will progress through the two-team tiebreaker procedures until the tie is broken, which will determine home/away designation for the SEC Championship Game.

The 2024 SEC Championship Game will be held on Saturday, Dec. 7, at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta, Ga.

1992 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida and Georgia (6-2 in the SEC) were co-champions in the Eastern Division. The Gators won the tie-breaker by virtue of a 26-24 win over the Bulldogs earlier in the season. Alabama (8-0) was the outright Western Division champion, even with a game against Auburn in the final weekend, which the Tide won, 17-0.

1993 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division and Alabama won the Western Division. The Gators finished 1/2 game ahead of Tennessee (UT tied Alabama, 17-17). Alabama, at 5-2-1, finished two games ahead second-place Arkansas. Auburn was 8-0 in the SEC, but was ineligible for the conference title.

1994 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, two games ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with an 8-0 SEC mark, three games ahead of Miss. State.

1995 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 8-0, one game ahead of Tennessee. Arkansas won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, one game ahead of Auburn and Alabama.

1996 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 8-0, one game ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, tying LSU. However, the Tide defeated the Tigers, 26-0, earlier in the year to win the tie-breaker.

1997 - Eastern Division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Tennessee defeated Vanderbilt, 17-10, to win the division on the final weekend. Tennessee, at 7-1 in the SEC, finished one game ahead of Georgia and Florida. Auburn had won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, tying LSU. However, Auburn defeated LSU, 31-28, earlier in the year to win the tie-breaker.

1998 - Western Division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Miss. State defeated Ole Miss, 28-6, on Thanksgiving night, to win division on final weekend. Arkansas and Miss. State finished in tie for the division title. However, Miss. State defeated Arkansas, 22-21, earlier that season to win the tie-breaker. Arkansas defeated LSU 41-14 on the final weekend, but when State defeated Ole Miss, the chase for the Championship Game had been won. Tennessee had clinched the Eastern Division before the final weekend and defeated Vanderbilt, 41-0, to finished the SEC at 8-0.

1999 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, one game ahead of Tennessee. Alabama won the Western Division with a 7-1 SEC mark, one game ahead of Miss. State.

2000 - Both races decided before final weekend. Florida won the Eastern Division, finishing SEC play at 7-1, two games ahead of South Carolina, Georgia and Tennessee. Auburn won the Western Division with a 6-2 SEC mark, one game ahead of LSU. LSU lost to Arkansas in the final weekend, 14-3. Even if the Tigers would have beaten the Razorbacks, Auburn would have won the tie-breaker over LSU due to a 34-17 win earlier in the season.

2001 - Both races go down to the final weekend. Due to game postponements on Sept. 15, games were reschedule for Dec. 1. On that weekend, Tennessee defeated Florida, 34-32, in Gainesville, and LSU defeated Auburn, 27-14, in Baton Rouge, to clinch berths in the SEC Championship Game. The Vols won the East with a 7-1 mark while LSU had a 5-3 mark and tied with Auburn for the West, but won the head-to-head tiebreaker.

2002 - Western division race not finalized until after the final weekend. Georgia clinched the Eastern Division championship on Nov. 16 after defeating Auburn, 24-21, in Auburn. The 7-1 Bulldogs finish one game ahead of Florida, which was 6-2. Arkansas wins the Western Division on the season's final weekend, defeating LSU, 21-20, in Little Rock on Nov. 29. The Razorbacks, LSU Tigers and Auburn Tigers are tied at 5-3 but Arkansas wins the head-to-head tiebreakers.

2003 - Both races decided on final weekend. Tennessee defeats Kentucky, 20-7, to force a three-way tie for Eastern Division championship between Vols, Georgia and Florida. Using tie-breaker involving the BCS standings, Georgia has the highest BCS ranking and has defeated Tennessee (next highest ranking) during regular season to secure SEC Championship Game berth. LSU defeats Arkansas, 55-24, and Ole Miss beats Mississippi State, 31-0, to force a tie for the Western Division championship. LSU's 17-14 win over Ole Miss the week before earns the Tigers the Western Division berth.

2004 - Auburn clinches berth in the SEC Championship Game on Oct. 30, tying the earliest since the game began in 1992 (Alabama, 1993). The Tigers (8-0) finish two games ahead in the standings of second-place LSU (6-2). Tennessee clinches berth as Eastern Division representative with 38-33 win against Vanderbilt on Nov. 20. The Vols (7-1) would win their next game on the following weekend against Kentucky to claim the division title outright. Georgia was second in the Western Division with a 6-2 mark.

2005 - Georgia (6-2) clinched Eastern Division Championship with a 45-13 win over Kentucky on Nov. 19. The Bulldogs finish one full game ahead of South Carolina and Florida in the standings. LSU clinched Western Division title with a 19-17 win over Arkansas on Nov. 25. The Tigers finished tied for the Western Division title (7-1), but defeated Auburn, 20-17, on Oct. 22, to win the tie-breaker.

2006 - Florida (7-1) clinched Eastern Division Championship and berth in the SEC Championship Game on Nov. 4, by defeating Vanderbilt, 25-19. Arkansas clinched the Western Division title and SEC Championship Game berth with a 28-14 win over Mississippi State on Nov. 18.

2007 - LSU (6-2) clinched Western Division berth in the SEC Championship Game on Week 11 after Alabama and Auburn both lose. Tennessee (6-2) gets Eastern Division berth with 52-50 four-over-time victory over Kentucky in Week 13. The Vols win the tie-breaker with Georgia (6-2), defeating the Bulldogs 35-14 in Week 6.

2008 - Alabama (8-0) clinched Western Division berth in SEC Championship Game on Week 11 (Nov. 1) after defeating LSU, 27-21. Florida (7-1) clinched Eastern Division berth in SEC Championship Game on Week 12 (Nov. 8) after defeating Vanderbilt, 42-14.

2009 - Florida (8-0) clinched Eastern Division berth in SEC Championship Game on Week 9 (Oct. 31) after defeating Georgia, 41-17. Alabama (8-0) clinched Western Division berth in SEC Championship Game on Week 11 (Nov. 14) after defeating Mississippi State, 31-3.

2010 - Both spots in the SEC Championship Game were clinched on Week 11 (Nov. 13). Auburn (8-0) clinched Western Division berth with a 49-31 win against Georgia. South Carolina (5-3) clinched Eastern Division berth with a 36-14 win against Florida.

2011 - Georgia (7-1) clinched a berth in the SEC Championship Game in Week 12 (Nov. 19) with a 19-10 win over Kentucky while LSU (8-0) clinched its berth in Week 13 (last weekend of the regular season) with a 41-17 win over Arkansas

2012 - Georgia (7-1) clinched a berth in the SEC Championship Game in Week 11 (Nov. 10) with a 38-0 win over Auburn. Alabama clinched a berth in the SEC Championship Game in Week 13 (Nov. 24) with a 49-0 win over Auburn.

2013 - For the first time since 2003, both races were determined on the final weekend. Auburn (7-1) clinched a berth in the SEC Championship Game with a dramatic 34-28 win off a 109-yard missed field goal return for a touchdown on the game's final play at Auburn. SEC newcomer Missouri (7-1) clinched a berth in the SEC Championship Game with a 28-21 home win over Texas A&M.

2014 - For the second straight season, both divisional races were determined on the final weekend. Missouri won the SEC East outright by closing the season with three straight SEC wins, including two on the road for their second straight trip to Atlanta. Alabama won the Western Division outright as well, with Ole Miss defeating Mississippi State in the Egg Bowl, while Alabama topped Auburn in the Iron Bowl.

2015 - Florida (7-1) won the Eastern Division, clinching a spot after defeating Vanderbilt on Nov. 7. Alabama (7-1) claimed the Western Division with a victory over Auburn in the Iron Bowl on the final day of the regular season. It was the fourth straight season where the Western Champion was the Iron Bowl winner.

2016 - Florida (6-2) won the Eastern Division, clinching a spot after defeating LSU in Baton Rouge on Nov. 19. Alabama claimed the Western Division with a victory over Mississippi State on Nov. 12. This marked the first time since 2010 that saw the SEC Championship Game set prior to the final weekend of the regular season.

2017 - Georgia (7-1) won the Eastern Division, clinching a spot on Nov. 4 after defeating South Carolina 24-10 in Athens. Georgia's clinching of a spot in the SEC Championship Game on Nov. 4 is the earliest a team has done so since Florida (Oct. 31) in 2009. Auburn (7-1) claimed the Western Division with a victory over Alabama the final day of the regular season. Alabama and Auburn were co-champions of the division, with Auburn representing the SEC Western Division in Atlanta due to head-to-head tiebreaker.

2018 - Georgia won the Eastern Division, clinching a spot on Nov. 3 after defeating Kentucky 34-17 in Lexington. Alabama claimed the Western Division with a 29-0 victory over LSU in Baton Rouge later that same day. It is the earliest that both participants in the SEC Championship Game have ever been determined.

2019 - Georgia won the Eastern Division for the third consecutive year, clinching a spot on Nov. 16 after defeating Auburn 21-14 in Auburn. LSU claimed the Western Division for the first time since 2011 with a 56-20 victory over Arkansas in Baton Rouge on Nov. 23.

2020 - Florida clinched the Eastern Division while Alabama claimed the Western Division on Dec. 5, two weeks prior to the SEC Championship game. Due to COVID-19, the regular season was derived of 10 conference games only.

2021 - Georgia clinched the Eastern Division on Oct. 30, tying the earliest any division had ever been clinched. Alabama claimed the Western Division on Nov. 20, two weeks prior to the SEC Championship Game.

2022 - Both spots in the SEC Championship Game were claimed on Nov. 12, as Georgia defeated Mississippi State to claim the Eastern Division title, while LSU's victory over Arkansas, combined with Alabama's win over Ole Miss, clinched a spot in the game for LSU. It marked the fifth time in the last six seasons Georgia has advanced to the SEC Championship Game.

2023 - Both spots in the SEC Championship Game were claimed on Nov. 11, as Alabama defeated Kentucky to claim the Western Division title, while Missouri's victory over Tennessee clinched a spot in the game for Georgia. It marked the sixth time in the last seven seasons Georgia has advanced to the SEC Championship Game.

The all-time record of 83,091 came in the inaugural game in 1992 at Birmingham's Legion Field between Alabama and Florida.

- This is the final SEC Championship game between the Eastern and Western Division champions. The West went 19-13 against the East. The West won eight straight from 2009-16 (Alabama-5, Auburn-2, LSU-1), while the East won six straight from 1993-98 (Florida-4, Tennessee-2).

2024 SEC FOOTBALL LEGENDS CLASS

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (October 22, 2024) – The Southeastern Conference on Tuesday announced its 2024 SEC Football Legends class presented by T-Mobile, an assemblage of former football standouts who will be honored at events surrounding the SEC Football Championship Game in Atlanta in December.

The 2024 Football Legends class includes 16 former stars who excelled on the gridiron and helped write the rich history of the sport at their respective institutions, and is the first to include representatives from new members Oklahoma and Texas. This year's class includes All-Americans, All-SEC selections, Academic All-Americans, NFL standouts and NFL first round draft picks. The group represents teams that won SEC Championships, claimed Super Bowl titles and are represented in state, school and college football halls of fame.

Combined, this class of legends was responsible for nearly 2,300 points scored and nearly 1,000 tackles on defense. Together they caught passes for more than 5,000 yards, rushed for more than 7,000 yards and passed for nearly 30,000 yards.

The class will be honored at the 2024 SEC Football "Weekend of Champions" December 6-7 in Atlanta, Ga, highlighted by the annual SEC Legends Celebration presented by T-Mobile on Friday, December 6 at the College Football Hall of Fame in Atlanta. The group will also be recognized prior to the SEC Football Championship Game, which will be held at Mercedes-Benz Stadium on Saturday, December 7.

Alabama – Barrett Jones, Offensive Lineman, 2009-12

Barrett Jones helped lead Alabama to three national championships in his four years as a starter on the Crimson Tide offensive line. He started 50 career games, playing three different positions (tackle, guard, center). A three-time All-America honoree, he earned first-team honors his final two seasons at Alabama and was named the 2011 winner of the Outland Trophy, presented annually to the nation's top interior lineman. A standout in the classroom as well, Jones was the only four-time Academic All-American in the history of Alabama football. Named the 2012 Academic All-American of the Year across all sports, he earned the NCAA Top 10 Award in 2012 along with an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship. He was also honored as the 2012 William V. Campbell Trophy winner, known as the "Academic Heisman." The 2013 SEC H. Boyd McWhorter Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year, the conference's top scholar-athlete across all sports, he finished his four years at Alabama with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average. Drafted by the St. Louis Rams, Jones spent 3.5 years playing in the NFL, including stints with the Steelers, Bears and Eagles, along with the Rams. Jones currently lives in Memphis, Tenn., with his wife Katie and their three children, where he works as a financial advisor for SFP Private Wealth.

Arkansas - Ken Hamlin, Free Safety, 2000-02

Ken Hamlin finished his career as Arkansas' record holder in tackles despite playing only three seasons from 2000-02. He racked up 381 career tackles before entering the NFL Draft following his junior campaign. His 381 tackles still rank fourth in UA history. In his final collegiate season, he earned first-team All-America and first-team All-SEC recognition. Hamlin earned first-team All-SEC honors and honorable mention All-America accolades in 2001 after he turned in his second straight 100+ tackle campaign. In 2000, he earned freshman All-America honors and a spot on the SEC All-Freshman Team. Hamlin recorded nine career interceptions after tying for the team lead in each of his three seasons. He helped lead Arkansas to three straight bowl games during his career and an SEC Western Division title in 2002. The Seattle Seahawks drafted him in the 2003 NFL Draft, and he played for the Seahawks from 2003-06. Hamlin played for the Dallas Cowboys from 2007-10 and earned a trip to the 2007 Pro Bowl. He finished his eight-year NFL career with the Baltimore Ravens and the Indianapolis Colts. He played 105 career games in the NFL racking up 489 tackles, 50 pass deflections, 15 interceptions and five sacks. Hamlin was inducted into the University of Arkansas Sports Hall of Honor in 2017.

Auburn - Marcus McNeill, Offensive Tackle, 2002-2005

Marcus McNeill was a two-time All-American offensive tackle for the Auburn Tigers from 2002-05. McNeill earned All-America honors in 2004 and 2005, becoming the program's first player since Ed King to earn the prestigious honors in consecutive years. In 2004, he helped pave the way for one of the best offenses in program history while winning the SEC Championship with an undefeated season. That season, McNeill became the first Tiger offensive lineman to receive All-America honors since 1997 and was a consensus All-American as a senior in 2005. McNeill was a first-team All-SEC selection in 2004 and 2005 and earned the Jacobs Trophy as the SEC's top blocker following his senior campaign when he was also a finalist for the Outland Trophy. A native of Decatur, Georgia, McNeill was a four-year starter and did not allow a sack in 43 consecutive games. Following his college career, McNeill was named to Auburn's Team of the Decade for the 2000s. McNeill was selected in the second round of the 2006 NFL Draft by the San Diego Chargers. In his rookie season, McNeill finished fourth in voting for the 2006 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and was named to the Pro Bowl. McNeill's NFL career spanned six seasons with the Chargers and was cut short by injuries which forced him to retire in 2012.

Florida - Rex Grossman, Quarterback, 2000-02

Rex Grossman was considered one of the nation's premier quarterbacks in his three years at Florida from 2000-02, finishing second in the Heisman Trophy as a sophomore in 2001 and receiving the 2001 AP National Player of the Year Award. He started each of his last 30 regular season games, going 23-8 record as a starter. The holder of 18 UF records, he completed 677 of 1,110 passes for 9,164 yards and 77 touchdowns in his career. Grossman had a school-record 17 career 300-plus yard passing games, and became the first Gator to throw for 300-plus yards in more than three consecutive games (first nine game of 2001) and he owns five of the top 16 single game passing yardage totals. Grossman finished second in the 2001 Heisman Trophy balloting, only the fifth sophomore ever to finish in the top two, and he was a finalist for the Walter Camp Award, Maxwell Award, and O'Brien Award in 2001 while earning Associated Press National Player of the Year honors. Grossman declared for the NFL Draft after his junior season and was drafted in the first round by the Chicago Bears with the 22nd overall choice in the 2003 NFL Draft. He played nine seasons in the NFL for Chicago, Houston and Washington, leading the Bears to an appearance in Super Bowl XLI.

Georgia - Terrence Edwards, Receiver, 1999-2002

Terrence Edwards led Georgia in receiving for four consecutive seasons from 1999-2002, starting with an All-SEC Freshman campaign that ranks third in school history with 53 catches. He remains the only Bulldog to have a 1,000-yard season after catching passes for 1,004 in 2002 to earn All-SEC First Team honors as a senior. He also

caught 11 touchdown passes his senior season. Edwards finished his career with school records in career receptions (204, No. 10 in SEC history), career receiving yards (3,093, No. 4 in SEC history after initially being a conference record that stood for 11 years) and career receiving touchdowns (30, No. 4 in SEC history). After going undrafted in the 2003 NFL Draft, he signed with the Atlanta Falcons. He spent 11 years in the NFL and CFL, becoming a standout in Canada. He played for the CFL's Winnipeg Blue Bombers and Montreal Alouettes, and he was a five-time CFL All-Star and inducted into the Blue Bombers Hall of Fame in 2017. Edwards graduated with a degree from the University of Georgia in Housing in 2012 and was inducted into the Georgia/Florida Hall of Fame. He is the younger brother of Robert Edwards, a former first round pick of the New England Patriots and also a CFL veteran with Toronto and Montreal.

Kentucky – Dicky Lyons Sr., Tailback/Receiver/Kick Returner/Defensive Back/Punter/Kicker, 1966-68

Known as one of the greatest punt and kickoff return aces in Southeastern Conference history, Dicky Lyons was also one of the most versatile athletes in SEC annals as he lettered three years at running back, receiver, kick returner, punter, kicker and defensive back at Kentucky from 1966-68. Lyons was named first-team All-Southeastern Conference as a junior and senior and earned second-team all-league honors as a sophomore. Lyons was the first player in SEC history with 1,000 yards rushing, 1,000 yards in punt returns and 1,000 yards in kickoff returns. He set an SEC record for most return yardage in a game when he racked up 235 yards of punt and kickoff returns against LSU in 1967. Lyons' career punt return average of 15.4 yards per return was one of the best in Kentucky and SEC annals. Lyons was selected in the fourth round of the 1969 NFL/AFL Draft and went on to play for the New Orleans Saints. He also played in the Canadian Football League and the World Football League. Lyons was named to Kentucky's All-Time Team during the 100th season of UK football and his jersey has been retired by the school. Lyons' son, Dicky Lyons Jr., was a star wide receiver for the Wildcats from 2004-08.

LSU - Andrew Whitworth, Offensive Tackle, 2002-05

Andrew Whitworth was a four-year starter at offensive tackle at LSU from 2002-05, earning first-team All-SEC honors in 2004 and 2005. A starter on LSU's national championship team in 2003, he played in two SEC Championship Games, winning the league title in 2003. Whitworth was named second-team All-America as a senior in 2005 after earning Freshman All-America honors in 2002. He started in 52 straight games at left tackle for the Tigers, at the time the second-longest streak in FBS history. He never missed a game in college, helping LSU to a 41-11 overall mark during his four years with the Tigers. He was selected in the second round of the 2006 NFL Draft by the Cincinnati Bengals and spent 16 seasons in the NFL (11 with Cincinnati, 5 with Los Angeles Rams). He retired following the 2021 season as the oldest offensive tackle in NFL history and he was also the oldest offensive lineman to win a Super Bowl, doing so at 40 years of age. He was twice named first-team All-Pro (2015, 2017) and was selected for the Pro Bowl 4 times (2012, 2015, 2016, 2017). Whitworth won the NFLPA Alan Page Community Award in 2019 and was named the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year in 2021. He currently serves as an analyst on Amazon's Thursday Night Football crew.

Ole Miss – Dexter McCluster, Running Back, 2006-09

Dexter McCluster was a standout running back for Ole Miss from 2006-09. He finished No. 2 on the Ole Miss career all-purpose yardage list with 4,089, behind only Deuce McAllister's 4,889 (1997-2000) and he ranks seventh among the all-time Rebel rushers with 1,955 yards. In his senior year he became the first player in SEC history with 1,000 rushing yards (1,169) and 500 receiving yards (520) in the same season. McCluster became just the second back-to-back offensive MVP in the 74-year history of the Cotton Bowl Classic, joining SMU's Doak Walker in 1948-49. He was a third team All-America by the Associated Press, a two-time All-SEC honoree as an all-pur-

pose player and he also earned All-SEC accolades as both a wide receiver (2008, 2009) and running back (2009). He competed in the 2010 Senior Bowl following his senior year and totaled three receptions for 30 yards, three rushes for four yards and three kick returns for 66 yards, then was selected in the second round (36th overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Kansas City Chiefs and played in 89 games over six seasons for the Chiefs, Tennessee Titans and San Diego Chargers. He was inducted into the Ole Miss M-Club Hall of Fame in 2022 and the Cotton Bowl Hall of Fame in 2021.

Mississippi State – Fletcher Cox, Defensive Lineman, 2009-11

Fletcher Cox was a three-year standout on the defensive line for Mississippi State and an All-American in his 2011 senior season. He was named to both the AP and Coaches' All-Southeastern Conference teams following his junior season and was a prominent figure on the State defense throughout his career. Cox helped lead the Bulldogs to Egg Bowl victories in each of his three seasons, as well as victories in the 2011 Gator Bowl and the 2012 Music City Bowl. A prized recruit in high school, he burst onto the scene at Mississippi State by earning Freshman All-Southeastern Conference honors in 2009. He started 25 games throughout his decorated career with the Bulldogs, racking up 114 total tackles, 24.5 tackles for loss, 8.5 sacks and a school-record five blocked kicks and he was a four-time SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week. Cox was selected by Philadelphia with the No. 12 overall pick in the 2012 NFL Draft and played 12 seasons for the Eagles. One of the great Eagles defenders of the franchise's rich history, he played in a franchise record six Pro Bowls, was a six-time NFL Top 100 selection, four-time NFL All-Pro and he played for Philly's Super Bowl LII title team en route to being named to the 2010's NFL All-Decade Team.

Missouri – Chase Daniel, Quarterback, 2005-08

Chase Daniel is among the most decorated student-athletes in Missouri history. Mizzou's quarterback from 2005-08, he rewrote the program's record books and helped reshape the landscape of Missouri football. He finished his career with 12,515 passing yards, 101 passing touchdowns and a completion percentage of 68 percent — which all stood as program records when the 2024 season began. He was also the first Mizzou quarterback to throw for more than 4,000 yards in a season — and did it twice. As a junior in 2007, Daniel guided Mizzou to the No. 1 ranking in the national polls late in the regular season and finished fourth in the Heisman Trophy voting, the program's highest finisher since 1939. A standout in the classroom as well, he was named a National Football Foundation scholar-athlete. Unselected in the 2009 NFL Draft, he signed with Washington and later joined the New Orleans Saints, where he spent five of his 14 NFL seasons, earning a Super Bowl championship ring as a rookie backup. Over the next decade-plus, he carved out a successful career with Kansas City, Philadelphia, Chicago, Detroit and the LA Chargers. Upon retirement following the 2022 season, Daniel launched a successful media career as a TV analyst and podcast host. He is a member of the University of Missouri Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame and Missouri Sports Hall of Fame.

Oklahoma – Barry Switzer, Head Coach, 1973-88

Barry Switzer was head coach at Oklahoma from 1973-88, leading the Sooners to two undefeated seasons (1973, 1974) while winning national championships in 1974, 1975 and 1985. During his 16-year career at Oklahoma, the Sooners won or shared 12 Big Eight Conference championships, including every season from 1973 to 1980. Switzer finished his head coaching career with a 157-29-4 record, good for an .837 winning percentage, the fourth highest among NCAA I-A coaches at the time. His Sooner teams were ranked in the AP Top 5 for 148 weeks and were ranked No. 1 for 43 weeks. Twelve of his 16 squads finished their season ranked in the AP Top 10 and nine in the AP Top 3. His players earned 28 consensus All-America honors, including 1978 Heisman Trophy-winner Billy Sims. Before becoming a head coach, he served as a graduate assistant at Arkansas then joined OU as an assistant coach in 1966 and became offensive coordinator in 1967. He was elevated to head coach in 1973 and went undefeated in his first 30 games, going 29-0-1. Switzer also served four years as

head coach of the NFL's Dallas Cowboys and led them to a win in Super Bowl XXX. He was the second of only three coaches to win both a college football national championship and a Super Bowl title. Switzer was inducted into the Oklahoma, the Oklahoma Sports and the College Football halls of fame.

South Carolina – Corey Miller, Defensive End, 1987-90

Corey Miller was a standout defensive end for the Gamecocks from 1987-90 who went on to a successful NFL career. Miller earned All-South Independent honors as a defensive end in both 1989 and 1990. During his career he totaled 187 tackles with 15 tackles for loss and 10 sacks. Selected as Carolina's Outstanding Defensive Player in 1989 and a team captain in 1990, he played in the Blue-Gray All-Star game following his senior campaign. Miller was selected by the New York Giants in the sixth round of the 1991 NFL Draft and logged seven seasons with the Giants from 1991-98 before wrapping up his playing days with the Minnesota Vikings in 1999. In his NFL career he collected 253 tackles including 14 quarterback sacks, six forced fumbles and seven interceptions. Miller was inducted into the South Carolina Lettermen's Hall of Fame in 2022. He became an ordained minister in 2003 and was given the "Pastor of Pain" nickname while working in the media by a local radio personality. He has worn many hats since then, working as a motivational speaker, mentoring athletes, as well as different opportunities working in sports media on radio and television. He currently does prison ministry and volunteers at Allen University in Columbia where he provides counseling and chapel services for student-athletes.

Tennessee – Eric Berry, Defensive Back, 2007-09

Eric Berry was a two-time unanimous All-America defensive back for Tennessee from 2007-09, the only player in Vol history to be named All-America twice. In 2009, he became the first player in school history to claim the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's top defensive back after being a finalist in 2008. A finalist for the 2009 Nagurski Trophy, he also twice claimed the Jack Tatum Award as the nation's top defensive back. A three-time All-SEC selection, Berry was named the SEC Defensive Player of the Year in 2008 after leading the conference with seven interceptions. Berry's tenure in Rocky Top established him as the SEC's all-time leader in career interception return yards (494) and single-season interception return yards (265 in 2008). He also holds the Vol record for career yards (35.3) per interception. His 14 career interceptions ranks tied for fifth in UT career picks. Berry became the highest drafted Vol defensive player since Reggie White (1984) when he was selected with the fifth overall pick in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft by Kansas City. Berry played with the Chiefs until 2018, making five Pro Bowl appearances and earning first team All-Pro honors three times. After being diagnosed with Hodgkin's lymphoma in 2014, he was named the 2015 NFL Comeback Player of the Year. In December 2023, Berry was enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame.

Texas – Vince Young, Quarterback, 2002-05

One of the most exciting players the game has ever seen as a quarterback at Texas from 2002-05, Vince Young turned in one of the greatest individual seasons in college football history in 2005. A consensus First Team All-American in 2005, Young was the runner-up for the Heisman Trophy while claiming the Davey O'Brien and Maxwell awards. That season, the unanimous Big 12 Player of the Year led the Longhorns to a perfect 13-0 season, winning the BCS National Championship Game against USC in the 2006 Rose Bowl. The win capped a remarkable season that saw Young become the first player in FBS history with more than 3,000 passing yards and 1,000 rushing yards in a single-season. Boasting a 30-2 record as a starter, Young owns multiple Longhorn records. Young became just the fourth player in FBS history to pass for 6,000 yards and rush for 3,000 yards in a career. A member of the Longhorn Hall of Honor, his No. 10 jersey is one of only six retired by Texas, and he is enshrined in the College Football, Rose Bowl, State of Texas Sports and Texas High School Football halls of fame. The Tennessee Titans selected Young with the third overall pick in the 2006 NFL Draft, and he played six seasons in the league with the Titans and Philadelphia

Eagles. The 2006 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year was selected to two Pro Bowls, becoming the first rookie quarterback to play in the game.

Texas A&M – Luke Joeckel, Offensive Tackle, 2010-12

Luke Joeckel started for three seasons at left offensive tackle for Texas A&M from 2010-12. He started his first game in 2010 and made 39 straight starts, earning three letters, at left tackle protecting the likes of quarterbacks Ryan Tannehill and Johnny Manziel, who became the first freshman to win the Heisman Trophy. Joeckel became one of the most imposing and decorated offensive linemen in program history. Joeckel earned Freshman All-Conference honors in 2010 and then All-Conference honors in 2011 and was named first-team All-SEC in 2012 and earned the SEC's Jacobs Blocking Trophy awarded to the top offensive lineman in the conference. Luke would go on to earn the 2012 Outland Trophy presented to the nation's top interior lineman as well as earning unanimous All-America honors. During Joeckel's playing days in Aggieland, the Texas A&M offense outscored opponents 2-to-1 and led the SEC in 2012 in rushing yards, passing yards, scoring offense and total offense. After his junior season, Joeckel declared for the NFL draft and was the No. 2 selection in the first round of the 2013 NFL draft by the Jacksonville Jaguars. Joeckel played five years in the NFL with the Jaguars and the Seattle Seahawks but injuries cut short his NFL career. He followed up and earned his degree from the Mays Business School at Texas A&M.

Vanderbilt – Ricky Anderson, Punter/Kicker, 1981-84

Ricky Anderson arrived on the Vanderbilt campus as a walk-on and four years later he departed as the nation's top punter-kicker and a consensus All-American. Anderson's 1984 senior season was remarkable. As a punter, he topped the nation with a 48.2-yard average, a mark that remained as the highest yearly punting average in the SEC for 34 years and still stands second in league history. Along the way, he booted a school-record 82-yard punt against Georgia, a mark which still stands. In addition, Anderson made a school-record 16 field goals, a record that stood until 2012. Following the 1984 season, he was named a unanimous First Team All-American and All-SEC selection. Anderson departed Vanderbilt with several records as both a punter and kicker. He was the career punting average leader (45.6 yards per punt) for nearly four decades and he set a school scoring record with 192 career points which stood for over 15 years. He made 40 career field goals, also a school record at the end of his career and now third all-time. Anderson is still tied for a school record with five field goal attempts in a game, while his 57 career field goal attempts were a school record and still stands third all-time. He was selected to both the Senior Bowl and East-West Shrine Game before being selected in the 11th round of the 1985 NFL Draft by the then-St. Louis Cardinals.

DAWN OF A NEW ERA FOR THE SEC

A HISTORY MAKING MOMENT OF GROWTH

The universities of Oklahoma and Texas joined the SEC this summer, which marked the third time in the history of the Conference that the SEC has expanded, adding six teams over those three occasions.

A brief history:

- The 13 members of the former Southern Conference west and south of the Appalachian Mountains reorganized as the Southeastern Conference at the annual SC meeting of Dec. 8-9, 1932, in Knoxville. The charter members of the SEC were: Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, LSU, Ole Miss, Mississippi State, Sewanee, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt.
- Sewanee withdrew Dec. 13, 1940, Georgia Tech withdrew on June 1, 1964 and Tulane on June 1, 1966.
- The SEC welcomed Arkansas on Aug. 1, 1990, and South Carolina on Sept. 25, 1990. Both joined the SEC on July 1, 1991.
- The SEC welcomed Texas A&M on Sept. 25, 2011, and Missouri on Nov. 6, 2011. Both joined the SEC on July 1, 2012.
- The SEC welcomed Oklahoma and Texas on July 30, 2021. Both joined the SEC on July 1, 2024.

SEC, ESPN ENTER NEW ERA OF PARTNERSHIP

The Southeastern Conference and ESPN this year will begin a milestone 10-year agreement that grants ABC and ESPN exclusive broadcast rights to premier SEC football and basketball events.

The landmark agreement, which represents a significant expansion of the conference's current partnership with ESPN, will establish ABC as the new broadcast network home for Saturday afternoon SEC football games, as well as selected Saturday primetime football games and the annual SEC Football Championship Game, which has grown into one of the most popular sporting events of the year. In addition, approximately eight incremental marquee men's basketball games will be featured across ABC or ESPN.

The new First Tier rights agreement puts all SEC media rights under The Walt Disney Company umbrella, giving the SEC exposure on ABC, ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU, ESPN+, SEC Network and SEC Network+.

The exclusive partnership with ESPN comes with significant scheduling flexibility that will produce an array of benefits for member schools, student-athletes and college football fans. Under the new agreement, a number of game times and broadcast windows will be announced in advance of the season, giving fans an ability to plan more seamlessly.

STUDENT-ATHLETE DEVELOPMENT AND ACHIEVEMENT

STUDENT-ATHLETE CAREER TOUR

Twenty-eight current and former SEC student-athletes participated in the annual SEC Career Tour in December in Atlanta. It marked the seventh time student-athletes from each SEC university convened in Atlanta to participate in the career tour leading up to the SEC Football Championship Game. The event was held virtually in 2020.

The annual program allows student-athletes to connect with human resource recruiters and submit resumes for entry-level jobs, internships and gain valuable knowledge of professional branding.

SEC IN NCAA'S TOP 10

Four SEC student-athletes were recipients of the NCAA's prestigious Top 10 Award, more than any other conference. The award recognizes former student-athletes for their successes in competition, in the classroom and in the community.

The four winners were honored at the NCAA Convention in January. The Today's Top 10 awardees were selected by the NCAA Honors Committee, composed of representatives from NCAA member schools and conferences, as well as nationally distinguished citizens, including past awardees.

NCAA WOMAN OF THE YEAR

Georgia swimmer Callie Dickinson was among nine finalists for NCAA Woman of the Year in 2023. Selected from 619 school nominees – the group that was then narrowed to 164 nominees at the conference level before the Top 30 honorees were determined, including 10 from each of the three NCAA divisions. Each honoree has demonstrated excellence in academics, athletics, community service and leadership.

South Carolina basketball player Aliyah Boston was among the Top 30 honorees in 2023.

Callie Dickinson was a six-time College Swimming and Diving Coaches Association of America All-American, earning first-team honors for her fifth-place finish in the 4x200- yard freestyle relay at the 2022 NCAA

Division I Women's Swimming and Diving Championships. She has represented the U.S. in international competition since 2017, including the 2023 World University Games. The five-time first-team CSCAA Scholar All-American was the 2023 SEC H. Boyd McWhorter Women's Scholar-Athlete of the Year and earned a 2023 NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship.

SEC AMONG HONDA AWARD WINNERS

Parker Valby of the Florida cross country team was named the Honda Sport Award winner for both Cross Country and Track & Field, and Haleigh Bryant of LSU was named the Honda Sport Award Winner for Gymnastics. As sport award winners Valby and Bryant became finalists for the Collegiate Woman Athlete of the Year and the prestigious 2024 Honda Cup.

- WNBA - The SEC has had the most No. 1 picks in the WNBA draft since it started in 1997 (8); 21 former players made 2023 WNBA rosters (second among conferences)
- MLB - The SEC had 88 players on opening day rosters - 32 more than any other conference -- with at least 3 former players from each SEC school.
