## Opening Draw

- Stanford (2-0, 1-0 ACC) is back in action on a quick turnaround, having earned its first ranked win - and first ACC win - of the season with a 10-9 decision over No. 9/8 Clemson on Saturday. Stanford, which up until the latter stages of the third quarter had not led in the game, utilized a five-goal swing between the third and fourth quarters while holding strong defensively to ride out the victory over previously undefeated Clemson.
- Leading the charge for the Cardinal in the contest against Clemson was Mallory Hasselbeck and Amanda Lawson who both tallied two goals on the afternoon. Lawson tallied both of her goals in the second quarter, earning one off of a free position attempt while her other sent the game tied heading into halftime after her shot grazed the stick of Aliya Polisky and into the cage. Hasselbeck, however, snagged Stanford's third goal of the afternoon and kickstarted Stanford's comeback, scoring in transition after Anna Colpack fed the attacker having gone coast-to-coast on the clear.
- Eight different players recorded a goal in the win over Clemson which marked the second-straight game that the Cardinal has had eight or more different goal-scorers in a game since the last season when the Cardinal had nine against #21/20 Colorado (Feb. 13) and 10 against UC Davis (Feb. 15). Stanford had 11 different goal-scorers in the season-opening win over UC Davis - including four hat tricks - which was the most goal-scorers in a game since April 20, 2024 when Stanford also had 11 players record a goal in what was a 21-8 win over UC Davis.
- Returning to action for the first time since April 13, 2024, Annabel Frist has been clinical in her first two games this season, recording two goals and an assist while tallying 12 draw controls and four caused turnovers. First currently ranks ninth all-time in career goals with 127 while slotting second all-time in draw controls with 330, just 42 draw controls away from tying Genesis Lucero for the top spot all-time.
- Stanford enters the week at No. 4 in the IWLCA DI Coaches Poll, tying the highest ranking in program history. Stanford entered the season ranked No. 5 in both the ILWomen.com and IWLCA Polls which was the highest preseason ranking for the Cardinal all-time. Stanford's No. 4 ranking is the third time the Cardinal has been ranked No. 4 in any poll and the second time in the IWLCA Poll after the Cardinal earned the No. 4 rank during the week of March 24, 2025.
- Entering the weekend, Aliya Polisky and Mallory Hasselbeck sit tied atop the team lead in points with six on the campaign. Hasselbeck, Polisky and Ava Arceri sit tied atop the team lead in assists with two so far in two games. Stanford, however, has five players tied for the team lead in goals with Polisky, Hasselbeck, Rylee Bouvier, Martha Oakey and Amanda Lawson each potting four goals on the campaign. Stanford currently has 13 players who have recorded a point after Lindsey Devir (1 goal) and Anna Colpack (1 assist) earned points in the win over Clemson.
- On the draw, Annabel Frist leads Stanford with 12 on the year following a strong season opener where she tabbed nine draw controls against Davis. Stanford currently has eight players who have recorded a draw control on the season with Jordyn Case slotting second on the team with seven draw controls. Arceri and Case return as part of four Cardinal who tallied 50+ draw controls a season ago as the Cardinal returns

## Coaching Staff

### Danielle Spencer - Paul A. Violich Women's Lacrosse Head Coach



- Danielle Spencer enters her seventh season as Stanford's Paul A. Violich Women's Lacrosse Head Coach in 2026. Spencer was appointed the seventh head coach in program history on June 12, 2019.
- Under Spencer's guidance, Stanford swept the Pac-12 regular-season and tournament titles in 2021, 2022 and 2024 while making four NCAA Tournament appearances including Stanford's first NCAA Tournament win since 2016 in the 2025 First Round. In six seasons on The Farm, Spencer has compiled a 66-31 overall record.
- Spencer has produced eight All-Americans during her tenure on The Farm: Ali Baiocco (2021 IWFLCA Second Team), Ashley Humphrey (2022 IWFLCA Third Team), Annabel Frist (2024 USA Lacrosse Third Team), Aliya Polisky (2024 USA Lacrosse Honorable Mention, 2025 IWFLCA Second Team, 2025 USA Lacrosse Third Team, 2025 ILWomen Third Team), Madison McPherson (2024 ILWomen Honorable Mention) Lucy Pearson (2024 ILWomen Honorable Mention), Sophia Brindisi (2025 ILWomen Honorable Mention, 2025 USA Lacrosse Honorable Mention) and Ava Arceri (2025 ILWomen Honorable Mention, 2025 USA Lacrosse Honorable Mention).
- Since Spencer's arrival, multiple players have earned the following major conference awards: Pac-12 Attacker of the Year (2), Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year (1), Pac-12 Draw Specialist of the Year (2), Pac-12 Goalkeeper of the Year (3) and Pac-12 Freshman of the Year (2).
- A three-time conference coach of the year recipient, Spencer owns a 95-50 career overall record entering her 10th season as a head coach, which includes a three-year stint at Dartmouth (29-19 overall).
- In 2025, Stanford (15-6, 7-2 ACC) finished third in the regular season in its debut in the Atlantic Coast Conference, making it to the ACC Tournament semifinal and an at-large berth in the NCAA Tournament - marking its second-straight appearance. Spencer led the Cardinal to its most wins in a single-season since 2015 and second-most all-time while earning the first NCAA Tournament win since 2016 and the first during her tenure. Aliya Polisky, Ava Arceri and Sophia Brindisi were honored as All-Americans while Stanford earned six members on All-ACC Teams. Stanford earned eight ranked wins in 2025 and was ranked for the entire season in the IWFLCA and ILWomen Polls. The Cardinal placed inside the top-10 for 10 weeks during the campaign and earned its highest-ever ranking on March 24, slotting in at No. 4 in the IWFLCA Poll. Stanford finished the season ranked at No. 8 in the IWFLCA Poll and No. 7 in the ILWomen.com Poll.
- Spencer, who served as an assistant at Stanford in 2012, returned to The Farm after she turned around the Dartmouth program in just three years and earned Ivy League Coach of the Year honors in each of her final two seasons (2018-19). Spencer inherited a program coming off three consecutive losing campaigns, but the Big Green won 11 games in her second year and captured an Ivy League regular season title in her third season (2019). The Big Green earned an at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament, a first for the program since 2013.
- A four-year standout at Northwestern from 2006-10, Spencer was a member of three national championship teams (2007-09) and one national runner-up (2010) during her outstanding playing career.
- Spencer finished her four seasons with the Wildcats having played in 83 games, making 65 starts. Her career totals ranked among the best in Northwestern's storied history as she departed with 193 goals (7th), 238 points (8th) and 203 draw controls (3rd). The 110 draw controls as a senior were the third-most by a collegiate player in NCAA history at the time.
- The Brighton, New York, native was named a member of the US Lacrosse Greater Rochester Hall of Fame Induction Class of 2018. Spencer graduated from Northwestern in 2010 with a degree in social policy.

### Kelsey Howard - Werdegard Family Assistant Women's Lacrosse Coach



- Kelsey Howard enters her third season on The Farm in 2025-26 and now serves as the Defensive Coordinator and Recruiting Coordinator for the Cardinal.
- Prior to Stanford, Howard worked with Colby College Women's Lacrosse, serving as Assistant Head Coach since 2021 and previously as an assistant coach since 2018. While at Colby, Howard led the offensive unit, taking control of play calling duties and developing scouting reports while also assisting in recruiting.
- Howard also spent time at Bentley University as a Volunteer Assistant Coach and with MaineIax Lacrosse Club where she led 20 players to collegiate rosters. Howard has worked closely with the IWFLCA, serving as the organization's treasurer and Division III Coaches Poll Master.
- Howard is a two-time graduate of Bentley University, where she earned her Master's Degree in 2017 and her Bachelor's Degree in 2015. Howard played lacrosse and field hockey at Bentley, an NCAA Division II athletics program.
- Howard earned Intercollegiate Lacrosse Coaches Association All-Region honors, was a Northeast-10 Conference all-league selection, and earned conference all-academic honors during her time at Bentley. She was Bentley's NCAA Woman of the Year nominee and a captain for both teams.

### Brian Kelly - Assistant Coach



- Brian Kelly enters his first season on The Farm in 2025 having been named to Danielle Spencer's staff in August 2025.
- Kelly comes to The Farm after a four-year stint at Johns Hopkins where he served as both an offensive coordinator as well as a goalie coach for the men's lacrosse team. Having been tasked with handling defensive and goalie coaching duties from 2023-24, Kelly helped improve the Blue Jays from top-50 in scoring defense in 2022 to top-10 in 2024 while leading a goalie room that earned a higher than 50% save percentage for the first time since 2018. Additionally, Kelly helped Chayse Ierlan to a career-best in save percentage in 2024 as the Blue Jay goalkeeper ranked top-10 in both save percentage and goals against average while recording the most saves by a Blue Jay goalie since 2008.
- Serving on Peter Milliman's staff, Kelly helped guide the Blue Jays to at least a share of the Big Ten regular season title in his first two seasons while aiding the Blue Jays to two trips to the NCAA Quarterfinals and a 29-19 record. Kelly also helped the Blue Jays produce 15 All-Americans in total from 2023-25 including four from his defensive corps in 2024.
- Prior to his time with the Blue Jays, Kelly was on staff at Goucher College for 15 years, serving as an assistant coach from 2008-12 before finishing his tenure as the head coach from 2012-2022. As the head coach of the Gophers, Kelly led the program to three appearances in the Landmark Conference Tournament (2013, 2014, 2018) including a trip to the title game in 2014. Before garnering the head coaching position, Kelly helped lead the Gophers to a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances including a program-defining run in 2012 where the Gophers set records for wins (18) and winning percentage (.900) while setting a program-best 15-game win streak before falling to eventual national champions Salisbury in the second round.
- As a player, Kelly helped lead the Blue Jays to two NCAA semifinal appearances in 1992 and 1993 and was named an Honorable Mention USILA All-American as a midfielder in 1993. He was also awarded Johns Hopkins' George D. Penniman Award, symbolizing the team's top midfielder, as well as the Turnbull-Reynolds Trophy for Outstanding Sportsmanship and Leadership during his final season. Prior to his time at Johns Hopkins as a player, Kelly was the captain of the Community College of Baltimore County NJCAA Championship lacrosse team in 1991 where he subsequently earned NJCAA Second Team All-American honors.
- A 2003 graduate of Johns Hopkins, Kelly holds a bachelor of arts degree in Social and Behavioral Sciences. He also earned his master of education in Athletic Program Leadership and Administration from Goucher College in 2021. Kelly is a 2015 NJCAA Lacrosse Hall of Fame inductee and was inducted into the Towson High School Athletics Hall of Fame in 2017.

### Emily Cummings - Assistant Coach



- Emily Cummings enters her seventh season at Stanford in 2025-26 and serves as an assistant coach for women's lacrosse. Previously the Director of Operations for women's lacross from 2019-25, Cummings also served as the Director of Operations for women's gymnastics at Stanford from 2019-23.
- Cummings comes to The Farm after six years at Dartmouth where she served as a Peak Performance Assistant, Compliance Specialist and the Assistant Athletic Director for Facilities and Events. In her most recent role, Cummings helped plan, manage and schedule the use of 26 facilities, supporting 35 varsity teams. She monitored monthly billing and revenue generation, developed and administered annual budgets for assigned rental areas, and collaborated with more than 20 summer camp directors, conferences and events.
- Prior to Dartmouth, Cummings spent three seasons as an assistant women's basketball coach at Clarkson University.
- Cummings earned a bachelor's in psychology and sociology-based human relations from Connecticut College, where she was a two-year captain for the women's basketball team and was named to the NESCAC All-Academic team.
- Cummings also earned a master's in business administration from Clarkson University.

- Ava Arceri returns for her junior season having scored in all 21 games last season, earning 56 goals and 19 assists for 75 points while tallying 11 hat tricks
- Arceri's 56 goals in 2025 ranks fourth-most all time in a single season while her 75 points in seventh all-time in a single season
- Arceri tallied a career-high six goals in the 19-4 win over Cal (April 17, 2025)

- Olivia Prosper makes her Cardinal debut in 2026 having redshirted the 2025 season. Prosper was a member of the USA U18 Select National Team (2024) and ranked #17 in the ILWomen Power 100 Freshman rankings in 2025
- Mallory Hasselbeck makes her Stanford debut in 2026 after a four-year career at Boston College where she won two ACC titles and an NCAA Championship
- Hasselbeck has appeared in 46 games and has potted 17 goals during her career
- Ella Thomforde enters her freshman campaign as a highly touted recruit having been named a USA Lacrosse High School All-American last season

## 2026 PREVIEW

- Stanford, which finished 2025 with its most wins since 2018, returns a majority of its offensive and defensive production from a season ago despite the departure of five players. The Cardinal also welcomes the addition of eight freshmen and transfer Mallory Hasselbeck to the squad while returning veterans Annabel Frist, Jordyn Case and Kate Bellissimo for their fifth-year season.
- Stanford heads into the 2026 season with a plethora of preseason accolades headlined by five USA Lacrosse Preseason All-American honorees. Aliya Polisky was slotted on the second team while Olivia Rose was named to the third team. Lucy Pearson, Jordyn Case and Ava Arceri were tabbed as Honorable Mentions.
- Stanford's No. 5 ranking in both the IWLCA and ILWomen/Kane Polls is the highest preseason ranking all-time in the program's history and the second highest by any program on the West Coast. Stanford finished the 2025 season ranked inside the top-10 and spent every week inside the top-20. Stanford claimed its highest poll placement ever in the ILWCA Poll on March 24, 2025 when it placed at No. 4.
- The Cardinal also earned multiple preseason nods from the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) after Stanford placed third in the regular season in 2025 in its conference debut. Polisky was tabbed as a Preseason All-ACC Team member while Arceri was listed as a Preseason All-ACC At-Large nominee while the Cardinal slotted third in the preseason coaches' poll.
- Offensively, Stanford returns 95% of its goals, 94% of its assists and 98% of its draw controls from a season ago. Junior Aliya Polisky returns having broken Stanford's single-season goal mark with 65 last season while fellow junior Ava Arceri notched a career-high 56 goals in 2025. On the draw, the Cardinal returns four players who achieved 50+ draw controls in 2025 including Amanda Lawson who returns for her sophomore season following a team-leading 54 draw controls a season ago.
- Elsewhere on the offense, Elise Murphy and Martha Oakey return to lend a helping hand after a stellar 2025 campaign that saw them both grab 28 assists which was tied for ninth all-time for the Cardinal.
- Defensively, Stanford returns one of the best defenses in the country from a season ago, keeping 70% of its caused turnovers and all of its saves from 2025 as the Cardinal recorded the eighth best scoring defense in the country in 2025. Olivia Rose and Rylee Bouvier return for Stanford having led the Cardinal in caused turnovers while Lucy Pearson is back in the cage after recording the second-most minutes all-time in a single season by a Stanford goalkeeper with 1,197 and posting a career-high 160 saves.
- Paul A. Violich Women's Lacrosse Head Coach Danielle Spencer leads the Cardinal in her seventh season at the helm and earning her first NCAA Tournament victory as a head coach in 2025. Spencer holds a 64-31 record with the Cardinal and is approaching her 100th career coaching victory this season, holding a 93-50 record in 10 seasons following a three-year stint at Dartmouth (2017-2019).

## CARD AT CAGAN

- Following the 17-9 loss to No. 1 Boston College, Stanford's nearly three-season long win streak was capped at 20 games (which was the longest in DI at the time). With a win against Pitt on February 27, Stanford broke its home win-streak record at Cagan Stadium set from the 2010-11 seasons which was originally 16-consecutive wins.
- Until the loss to Boston College, Stanford had not lost at Cagan since the 2023 season opener against Virginia (11-14) with the Cardinal grabbing 20-straight wins across the three-season stretch. During that span, Stanford had outscored its opponents 336-185 (+151).
- Stanford's 20-game win streak at Cagan is the seventh-longest home winning streak in

## On No. 9/8 Clemson

- Vanderbilt (1-1, 0-0 AAC) heads into Monday's contest having earned its first win of the campaign on Thursday, dispatching the Mercer Bears, 14-11 in the 'Dores' home opener. Vanderbilt, coming off a loss to No. 12/9 Clemson to open the season last Saturday, never trailed in the win, having traded goals with the visitors before opening up a three goal lead heading into the second quarter. Vanderbilt continued the offensive pressure in the second half, amassing a 12-6 lead heading into the final frame. Though Mercer showed signs of the comeback bid with a five-goal final frame, the 'Dores held firm, scoring twice in the frame to earn a 14-11 decision.
- Nancy Halleron leads the 'Dores in points with six following a four-goal outing against Mercer where she tallied three of her four goals in the first quarter. Halleron's six tallies on the season also leads the team in that regard. Shea Panzik is second on the team in points with five on the campaign, courtesy of a 1-4-5 line as she leads the 'Dores in assists. Brooke Baker is second on the team in goals as the senior has tallied three on the season after a two-goal outing against the Bears.
- On the circle, Vanderbilt has received production from freshman Gabrielle Putman as she leads the 'Dores with 13 draw controls in two games. Putman has also tallied one goal from the free position hash while also earning 1 ground ball and one caused turnover. Elsewhere along the circle, Bailey Lower has recorded five draw controls in two games as the 'Dores rank in the top-30 nationally in draw controls per game (14.00) and 44th nationally in draw control percentage (52.8%).
- Junior Alex Gladding leads the Vanderbilt defense having tallied six caused turnovers through two games this season. Gladding also tallied a goal in the win over Mercer on Thursday. Emme Martin has earned both starts this season, having amassed a 15.43 goals-against average coupled with a .357 save percentage. Caelen Jones has also seen limited action for Vanderbilt on the young season, holding a 16.00 goals-against average and a .333 save percentage.
- Beth Hewitt leads Vanderbilt in her eighth season with the program, earning a 60-54 record in that time. Hewitt owns a 131-74 record in 13 seasons as a head coach which included a stop at Le Moyne where she earned a 71-20 record. Hewitt has led the 'Dores to five AAC Tournament appearances and an appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 2021. Stanford leads the all-time series 8-6 including taking the last meeting between the two teams in what was a late February clash on The Farm that Stanford won, 18-5.

**STANFORD ENTERED ITS INAUGURAL SEASON** in the Atlantic Coast Conference having been picked to finish fifth in the preseason coaches poll, headlined by the return of a trio of preseason All-Americans and Tewaaraton Watch List honorees in Annabel Frist, Lucy Pearson and Aliya Polisky. However, Stanford embodied a new team identity that showed through its perfect 6-0 start to the season, beginning with a pair of wins over former Pac-12 foes, No. 22 USC and No. 21/20 Colorado.

Against the Trojans, Polisky tied her single-game high with seven goals to begin her season ledger while Elise Murphy - who had made just four appearances the season prior - nabbed four goals to begin her campaign. Against Colorado, the Cardinal utilized a 10-2 run in the second half in the rain to earn a 15-10 comeback win - setting the tone for what was to come in 2025.

Following a 20-3 win over UC Davis to move to 3-0, the Cardinal hit the road for its first major challenge of the season - facing off against the No. 7 Virginia Cavaliers in its ACC debut. Down 3-2 through the first quarter, Stanford's youth on offense took over to take a one-goal lead into the half. Defensively, the Cardinal stymied Virginia in the second half, outscoring the Cavaliers 7-2 in the half while forcing four shot clock violations as Stanford earned its first-ever win over UVA and its first win in the ACC.

Stanford returned home from its visit to East Coast in prime form, earning its first ACC home win in a 16-12 decision over Pitt before fending off a late push from Villanova to move to 6-0 on the year. A week later, Stanford made the trip to The Empire State to face one of the conference's best programs - Syracuse. In what was a dog fight at the JMA Wireless Dome that could not be settled in regulation, it was the No. 11/10 Orange that fended off Stanford in the second overtime period to hand the Cardinal its first loss of the season. In resilient fashion, however, Stanford ended its New York escapade in unnerved fashion, dispatching Cornell in the cold thanks to a near-second-half shutout to get back to winning ways.

### Card at Cagan

With eight games gone by in the campaign and a 4-0 start to the home slate, the Cardinal returned to The Farm for a season-long three-game homestand looking to extend its already program-best home win streak even further. Having broken the previous mark of 16-consecutive wins at Cagan with its 17th-straight win in the game against UC Davis, the Cardinal moved to 19-straight wins with a dominant outing against Virginia Tech, earning another valuable ACC win.

Following the route of the Hokies, the Cardinal avenged last season's one-goal defeat to the Yale Bulldogs in thrilling fashion at Cagan. Having surged ahead thanks to a six-goal third quarter, Stanford closed down the comeback attempt from the No. 4 team in the country with Lucy Pearson's career-high 15th save in the closing minute of action proving the difference to give Stanford its second-highest ranked win in program history and highest ever ranked win at Cagan Stadium.

After the 11-10 thriller against Yale, Stanford once again set records, playing and hosting in the programs highest-ever ranked matchup as the No. 5 Cardinal hosted No. 1 Boston College. In front of the best crowd since 2012, Stanford fought well before a crowd of 1,177 fans but could not overcome a halftime deficit as the best win-streak in DI at the time was snapped at 20 games.

### The Final Stretch

With six games left on the ledger, Stanford ran into its first road block of the season, battling hard in the elements in a gruelling 12-9 defeat at Army. However, Stanford bounced back with a convincing win against Louisville to put itself in prime position to

earn a conference postseason tournament berth.

With consecutive ranked ACC opponents on the docket, the Cardinal trekked up to South Bend and took care of business, holding No. 21 Notre Dame at bay to lock up a spot in the ACC postseason tournament with an 8-7 victory before earning the win in the inaugural matchup against No. 15/14 Clemson for its sixth ranked win of the season.

Stanford held its home finale on Senior Day, honoring its eight seniors in Erin Schaefer, Sophia Brindisi, Ashley Thurston, Jordyn Case, Maddigan Miller, Kate Bellissimo, Allison Baldwin and Annabel Frist. Following the senior day festivities, Stanford locked up a third-place finish in the ACC with a dominant, 19-4 win over Cal just a few days later to solidify a 13-win regular season and a 7-2 mark in its ACC debut.

### Revenge Tour

Stanford hit the road to Charlotte, N.C. for its debut in the ACC Women's Lacrosse Tournament, earning the No. 3 seed and the right to avenge its regular season loss to Syracuse which earned the No. 6 seed. Having fallen into a three-goal deficit at the half-time break, Stanford went on a 10-2 run that included six different scorers in the second half while suffocating the Syracuse offense to grab its first ACC Tournament win, 15-10.

Following the win over the Orange, Stanford looked to exact revenge against the No. 2 seed Boston College Eagles. In what was a tight game through a majority of regulation, it was the Eagles who pulled out the win, ending Stanford's bid at an inaugural ACC Tournament crown.

### Revenge Tour: Tournament Edition

With a 14-5 record, Stanford earned its second-consecutive appearance - and 13th overall - in the NCAA Tournament, grabbing an at-large bid as the No. 2 seed in the Gainesville pod and a chance at redemption with a first round matchup against No. 22 Denver.

Having fallen to the Pioneers on Senior Day nearly a month prior, Stanford exacted revenge in the best way possible, earning its first NCAA tournament victory since 2016 and snapping a 10-game skid against the Pioneers with a 10-4 victory. On the strength of hat trick outings from Martha Oakey and Aliya Polisky - who tied the single-season goal record with her 62nd goal of the season in the fourth quarter - and a shutout performance from the Stanford defense, the Cardinal grabbed its first NCAA win in the Danielle Spencer era while setting up a soon-to-be thriller against Florida in the second round.

38 hours after dispatching the Pioneers, Stanford battled the elements and the early morning start time in what was to be one of the most exhilarating games of the season for a chance to make it out of the first weekend of the NCAA Tournament for the first time ever.

In a back-and-forth affair through the first half, Stanford entered the final 30 minutes, unwavering in its belief it could mount a comeback as the Cardinal entered the half down 6-4. After trading blows with the Gators, Stanford snatched the final three goals of the quarter to take its first lead of the game heading into the final frame. Though Florida stormed out of the gates in the fourth to regain a three-goal lead, Stanford once again showed its grit, scoring three times inside a five-minute span to force the game into overtime.

With neither side finding the breakthrough in the first half of overtime, the game was decided by a matter of inches as Florida's final shot of the afternoon was deemed to

have crossed the goal line before Lucy Pearson could shovel it back into the crease as Stanford's season came to a heartbreaking end in the second round.

### A Season To Remember

Stanford ended the 2025 campaign with its second-most wins in program history and its best season since 2015 with a 15-6 record, proving itself as a formidable force in the best conference in DI women's lacrosse.

Aliya Polisky broke two program records in her sophomore year on The Farm, breaking the single-season record for shots with 150 on the campaign and securing the single-season goal record by tallying a hat trick in the season-finale against Florida for her 65th. Martha Oakey solidified the record for assists by a true freshman in a single season after tallying 28 helpers in her debut for the Cardinal. Both her and sophomore Elise Murphy's 28 assists stand tied for eighth most in a single-season all-time.

Ava Arceri had a career season as well, earning 56 goals which is tied for fourth most in a single-season all-time while her and Polisky became the second duo to record 50+ goals in a single season in the program's history. Defensively, Olivia Rose earned a career-high 31 caused turnovers on the season to place in a tie for fourth all-time.
